TERMINATIONS FROM JUVENILE AFTERCARE WISCONSIN DIVISION OF CORRECTIONS CALENDAR YEARS 1973 - 1977

ACQUISITIONS

This report summarizes trends in selected characteristics of juveniles terminated from aftercare in calendar years 1973 through 1977. Data for these tables were reported by field agents of the Bureau of Community Corrections and compiled by the Office of Systems and Evaluation.

A total of 3,584 juvenile cases--2,924 boys and 660 girls--were removed from aftercare in the five years 1973 through 1977. Of these, 2,189 (61 percent) were automatically terminated from aftercare upon the juvenile's reaching the age of majority (18 years). In 1,062 cases (29.6 percent), juveniles were revoked after absconding, committing a new offense, or violating the terms of supervision. Three juveniles, all boys, died while under supervision.

The number of terminations declined steadily from 1973 to 1977. Total cases declined from 894 to 595, with the number of boys dropping from 700 to 524 and the number of girls from 194 to 71. The ratio of boys to girls increased from 3.6 to 1 in 1973 to 7.4 to 1 in 1977.

Type of Termination (Table 1)

The percentage of boys who successfully completed aftercare supervision (viz., discharge, early discharge, and off records) averaged 68.6 percent for the five-year period and remained virtually constant from year to year. The precentage of successful completions for girls fluctuated from a high of 80.1 percent in 1976 to a low of 73.6 percent in 1977, averaging 75.6 percent.

County of Residence (Table 2)

More than 60 percent of the juveniles were living in the state's 10 largest counties when supervision was terminated. The number of juveniles from Milwaukee County declined steadily, from 389 in 1973 to 139 in 1977. The rate of successful completions by juveniles from Milwaukee County was about two percentage points lower than the statewide average but higher than the rates for Brown, Dane, and Waukesha Counties. Among larger counties, the percentage of successful completions during the four years 1974 through 1977 was highest in Rock County.

Time Under Supervision (Table 3)

The proportion of juveniles under aftercare supervision for less than one year before termination rose from 45.4 percent in 1973 to 57.5 percent in 1977. For the entire five-year period, about 28 percent had been under supervision less than six months and 54 percent for less than one year before termination.

The rate of successful completions rose as the length of time under supervision increased. It was only 55.8 percent for those under supervision less than six months, but 65.2 percent for those under supervision six months up to one year, 74.5 percent for those under supervision one year up to 18 months, 81.9 percent for those supervised 18 months up to two years, and almost 90 percent for those supervised for two years or more.

As noted in Table 4, the significant factor was probably age rather than time under supervision. An analysis of time under supervision and age at termination would verify that assumption. Impact of the 1978 Children's Code will result in 1979 data that will be dramatically different from those of previous years. Since the effective date was November 1978, the statistics for 1978 will probably follow the trends analyzed in this report.

Age at Termination (Table 4)

As noted earlier, 61 percent of the juvenile cases removed from aftercare supervision during the five-year period were terminated automatically upon the juvenile's reaching the age of 18. All but two of the 2,189 juveniles so terminated were listed as successful completions, for a success rate of 99.9 percent. However, only 23.1 percent of those terminated before reaching 18 (23.3 percent of the boys and 22.1 percent of the girls) successfully completed supervision—one—third of those 17 years old and only 13.8 percent of those younger than 17.

Race (Table 5)

Of all juveniles terminated from aftercare supervision from 1973 to 1977, 72.7 percent were White (including 1.4 percent Whites of Mexican origin), 21.8 percent Black, and 5.1 percent Native American. Whites of Mexican origin had the highest rate of successful completions, 75.5 percent. The success rates of other Whites and Blacks were virtually identical (70.3 percent and 70.1 percent), while the success rate for Native Americans was 66.3 percent. Among boys, Blacks had successful completions in 71.1 percent of the cases, compared with 69.0 percent for Whites. However, 77.2 percent of White girls had successful completions, compared with 71.8 percent of Black girls. Among juveniles of Native American and Mexican origin, girls had a higher rate of successful completions than boys.

Residence During Supervision (Table 6)

Nearly three-fourths of the boys (74.5 percent) but fewer than one-half of the girls (49.4 percent) were living with their parents when aftercare supervision was terminated. The proportion of all juveniles living with their parents was over 70 percent from 1973 through 1976 but dropped to 60.7 percent in 1977. Nearly 10 percent of the juveniles (7.5 percent of the boys and 18.9 percent of the girls) lived in group homes and nearly 5 percent in foster family homes.

Supervision was successfully completed by 74.9 percent of those living with relatives and by 73.1 percent of those living with their parents. Only 54.3 percent of those living in group homes, foster homes, or halfway houses successfully completed supervision. The highest rate of successful completions was recorded by juveniles who lived alone or with a spouse. Thirty-five of 37 juveniles who lived alone and 37 of 39 who lived with a spouse successfully completed supervision. Again, as noted in Tables 3 and 4, age was probably a significant factor.

Employment (Table 7)

About 10 percent of the juveniles had full-time jobs but over 60 percent were unemployed at the time aftercare supervision was terminated. Less than 20 percent had regular part-time jobs and about 5 percent had occasional part-time jobs. Over 90 percent of the boys who held full-time jobs, but little more than 60 percent of those who were unemployed, completed supervision successfully. Among girls, those who worked sporadically had the highest rate of successful aftercare terminations and those who worked part-time had a higher success rate than those who worked full-time. Again, attention must be directed to the effect of age on successful completion of supervision.

Reason for Revocation (Table 8)

Approximately 30 percent of the boys and 25 percent of the girls were revoked each year, but the reasons for revocation differed between the sexes.

One-third of the boys were revoked in lieu of conviction of a new offense, compared with only 7.3 percent of the girls; nearly one-half of the girls were revoked for absconding, as against 17.1 percent of the boys; about one-fourth of the girls were revoked for other rules violations, compared with one-sixth of the boys; and 16.5 percent of the boys, but only 7.3 percent of the girls, were revoked after being charged with a new offense but not yet convicted.

Most Serious Violation (Table 9)

The proportion of revocations resulting from offenses against persons and drug offenses declined substantially between 1976 and 1977. However, the proportion attributable to crimes against property rose from 46.3 percent in 1974 to 64.1 percent in 1977. Burglary and auto theft were the most frequent violations leading to revocation.
