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1978 CALENDAR YEAR SUMMARY OF POPULATION MOVEMENT

This bulletin summarizes the volume and movement of offender populations supervised by the Wisconsin Division of Corrections during calendar year 1978. Five-year trends are presented for the major population groups-- residents in Wisconsin correctional institutions, offenders supervised in the community under probation and parole, residents in the Bureau of Community Corrections Residential Centers, and absconders from probation and parole supervision. Appendix tables present information on counts at the beginning and end of the year, intake and separations during the year, and average daily populations.

NOTE: This bulletin is the companion publication of the C-60A, which reports the same information on a fiscal year basis.

The total population supervised by the Division of Corrections increased by 1,118 cases, or 4.3 percent, from 25,056 cases at year-end 1977, to 26,124 cases on December 31, 1978. The latter figure included 4,383 persons in correctional institutions, 19,059 active cases on field supervision, and 2,682 on absconder status from field supervision.

The probation and parole population increased again in 1978, but the rate of increase continued, as it has each year since 1975, to be less than for the previous year. The institutional population rose by less than one percent, compared with increases ranging from 4 percent to 15 percent during the previous four years.

Table A shows the average daily population for all cases supervised by the Division of Corrections in both correctional institutions and the community for calendar years 1974 through 1978. The average total population grew each year, but at a slower rate in each succeeding year. The 1978 increase was down 1.8 percentage points from 1977. The peak rate of increase in 1974 was due largely to the state absorption that year of Milwaukee County adult probation cases.

The average daily institutional population rose 34.6 percent during the five-year period, from 3,060 in 1974 to 4,120 in 1978. However, the rate of increase was only 1.0 percent in 1978, compared with a 1977 increase of 4.2 percent and increases of over 10 percent in each of the three previous years. (See Table B.)

Table C shows a steady increase in the total average daily corrections institutional population over the five-year period, 1974 through 1978. The number of adult males increased by 43.4 percent and the number of adult females by 90.1 percent during that period. The number of juvenile males declined slightly in 1977 and 1978 but remained 5.8 percent higher than in 1974. The number of juvenile females rose in each of the last three years but remained 34.7 percent less than the 1974 population.

Admissions of youthful offenders began in July 1976, but terminated with the repeal of the Youthful Offender Act effective July 1, 1978. Average daily population of youthful offenders was 104 males prior to the law's repeal. Only one female was committed as a youthful offender. For 1978, youthful offenders are included in the adult totals.

Table D shows the annual average daily population (based on end-of-month totals) of offenders under probation and parole supervision by the Division's Bureau of Community Corrections. Offenders resident in Community Corrections Residential Centers administered by the Bureau are included in institution

population counts. The probation and parole average populations increased each year, but the 1978 increase of 5.1 percent was the lowest during the five-year period.

Absconders were removed from the count of active field supervision cases as of July 1, 1976, and were not included in the 1976 Calendar Year Summary of Population Movement, published in April 1977. However, in order to facilitate comparison with previous years and to permit accurate trend analyses, the field supervision population counts for 1976, 1977, and 1978 have been recalculated to include absconders (except where otherwise noted).

Further information about probation and parole population movements is contained in Tables E, F, G, H, and I. (Slight differences in average daily population counts may be noted among these tables, due to the use of different methods of averaging during some years.)

Table E shows a steady increase in the average probation and parole populations each year during the five-year period. From 1974 to 1978 the increase totaled 42.2 percent. During the 1960's and up to about 1971, the average probation and parole populations were usually about the same size. In recent years, however, the average probation population has been about five times the number of persons under parole supervision.

Changes among specific types of probation cases can be reviewed in Table F. The combined average daily population for adult male and adult female probationers dropped slightly in 1976 because absconders were excluded from the count of active cases. If absconders are added to the active cases, the average end-of-month population shows an increase of 45.4 percent from 1974 to 1978.

The number of adult male probationers declined slightly in 1976 and again in 1978, but the number of adult female probationers showed a steady increase throughout the five-year period.

The youthful offender probation program began in July 1976. The number of youthful offender probationers increased ten-fold in 1977 and doubled in 1978. Because the Youthful Offender Law was repealed effective July 1, 1978, the number of youthful offender probationers will decline sharply in subsequent years.

The male juvenile probation population increased steadily during the five-year period, but the female juvenile probation population dropped in 1975 to one-half the 1974 population and continued near the 1975 level in subsequent years.

The population of males and females from other states supervised in Wisconsin (Interstate Compact cases) increased gradually each year during the five-year period, reaching a combined total of 375 in 1978. Approximately 95 percent of all cases from other states supervised in Wisconsin were adults.

The average number of absconders from probation supervision in calendar years 1977 and 1978, based on end-of-month totals, is shown in Table G. The number of absconders rose from 2,161 in 1977 to 2,303 in 1978. Over 80 percent of the absconders were adult males.

Table H shows that the adult parole population increased in four of the five years, reaching 2,374 in 1978. The female juvenile aftercare population decreased by nearly 40 percent over the five-year period, while the male juvenile aftercare population increased by 41.6 percent, reaching 664 in 1978. The youthful offender parole population rose from two male clients in 1977, the year after the program's inception, to 31 male clients in 1978. There were no females under supervision as youthful offenders.

Table I shows the average end-of-month number of absconders from parole and juvenile aftercare supervision in calendar years 1977 and 1978. The total number of absconders remained relatively stable at 272 in 1977 and 277 in 1978. The only significant change was a rise in the number of juvenile male absconders from 8 to 18.
