

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this report is to provide a nationwide comparison and analysis of total state corrections expenditures for fiscal 1975, correctional research allocation for fiscal 1975, and inmate population trends between 1975 and 1976.

The statistics regarding current state populations and state population projections were obtained from the U. S. Department of Census. However, all other statistics were derived from responses to our recent survey which was initiated by the letter and questionnaire contained in Exhibit I.

Copies of this letter and questionnaire were sent to the directors of the corrections departments of each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico. The guidelines which respondents were requested to observe in completing the questionnaire are contained in this letter. When pursuing the data contained in this report, it would be beneficial to take these guidelines into consideration. It also should be noted that many of the respondents were unable to provide exact answers to some of the questions in the questionnaire. Consequently, some of the resultant data represent estimates rather than precise figures. The authors have made every effort possible to insure accuracy and consistency; however, they cannot assume responsibility for accuracy of the data contained in this report.

The information obtained from the survey responses can be interpreted in a multitude of ways, depending on the perspective and objectives of the interpreter. Therefore, rather than providing an extensive interpretation, which might serve the needs and interests of only a few, we have compiled the data into tables which can be used as bases for individual interpretation, as reference sources, and as aids for future planning and research activities.

We wish to thank all of the people in the corrections departments of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico who took the time and special effort to provide the information for completion of our questionnaire. We hope you have found our survey entitled Comparison of Nationwide Correctional Research Allocations and State Correctional Statistics which was mailed to you in November, 1975, both interesting and useful. Since nationwide distribution of this survey, we have received requests from the correctional departments of many states to update the survey this year and include additional information. Because of the volume of this positive feedback and also because of the assistance the survey has provided to our department, this letter is being written to initiate a survey of 1975 research activities and correctional statistics.

We would appreciate your cooperation in completing the attached questionnaire and returning it at your earliest convenience. To enable standard comparisons of the data in this survey, please observe the following guidelines when responding to the questions:

- (1) Please consider <u>all</u> basic and applied research undertaken by your departmental staff and by outside consultants. Research activities relating to in-house inmate programs, out-of-house inmate programs, and parole programs should be included.
- (2) Since the fiscal year observed by most correctional departments is July 1 through June 30, this period should be utilized when furnishing your data if at all possible. If not, please indicate the fiscal period for which the data apply.
- (3) Data relating only to adult correctional activities should be considered. If your department is responsible for offenders who are defined by your state as juvenile (usually under age sixteen or eighteen) as well as those who are defined as adult, please estimate the proportion allocated for use in the adult program and note that these figures are estimates.
- (4) A number of inaccuracies have been brought to our attention by other states regarding the inmate population figures contained in our last survey. Since all data about inmate population were obtained from federal sources, we are requesting that each state furnish these data individually to insure accuracy.

- (5) If you feel any explanations of your data are necessary to assure accurate interpretation, please make these notations on the questionnaire or on an attached sheet.
- (6) In addition to the information specifically requested in the questionnaire, a brief summary of the nature of the research undertaken by your department in 1975 and planned for 1975 would be helpful. However, you may consider a response to this request optional.

Our department found the last survey extremely helpful in preparation of our annual budget and in providing justification to others for our needs. The improvements and additions incorporated into our current survey should make the findings even more beneficial to all participant states as well as to our department. Your contributions to this survey are vital to its success, and your cooperation will be appreciated. As soon as all of the data have been received and analyzed, we shall mail a copy of the survey to you.

INCIDENCE OF COURT ACTIONS DESIGNATING AN INMATE CAPACITY IN CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTIONS

The survey questionnaire included the following questions: "Have there been any court actions in your state designating an inmate capacity which limit the number of inmates confined to your correctional institutions?"

All respondents answered "no" to this question except Alabama, Arkansas, District of Columbia, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Jersey, Ohio, and Puerto Rico. Their explanations to the following questions are below:

a) If so, what limitations are set forth by these court actions, and what are the major effects these court actions have had on your department's operations?

Alabama: "Court enjoined the state from receiving new inmates until stipulated design capacity reached. Total available stipulated design capacity as of June 1, 1976, is 3,939 with total population that date of 3,997. Major effect has been a significant overcrowding of city and county jails with some 1,600 state inmates awaiting transfer to state institutions as of June 1."

<u>Arkansas</u>: "The effects of Finney v. Hutto are far-reaching. This case, which is presently on appeal, has resulted in many significant changes in prison food, work details, racial and religious discrimination, employee discrimination, qualifications in hiring, prison housing and disciplinary hearings."

District

of Columbia: "Youth Center I=324. Other orders have focused on staff/inmate rations and square footage of living space per inmate."

Florida:

Louisiana: The court required the Department of Corrections to provide 85 square feet of bed space and/or 4300 for the dormitory. The Department asked for a reduction to 65 square feet per bed. The Department planned to open another facility using the 60 square feet per bed in the construction, if they received permission. The decision on the reduction had not been made at the time the information was received.

Mississippi: "50 Square feet per inmate."

New Jersey: "Cannot admit more than they release."

Ohio: "Federal District Judge Young of Toledo has limited the number of inmates to be confined in Marion Correctional Institution to 1,418."

Puerto Rico:

"(1) The San Juan District Jail (LaPrincesa) should not have more than 250 inmates at anytime. (2) The San Juan District Jail should be closed on August 1, 1976. (3) As a major effect, other institutions like the State Penitentiary and the Institution for Youthful Offenders are overcrowded, mainly with inmate awaiting trial."
