
COMPONENTS of the STATUS OFFENDER PROGRAM

- 1: Family Court Status Offender Unit. This unit serves as an intake point for status offenders. It is comprised of four counselors, a supervisor, and a clerk. Two counselors are located in New Castle County, one each is in Kent and Sussex.
- 2. <u>Division of Social Services Status Offender Unit</u>. This Unit develops placements and assigns children to particular placements. It is comprised of six social workers two in New Castle County, one each in Kent and Sussex and one serving both lower counties.
- 3. Child Advocate Service. Community Legal Aid Society has two major functions: to arrange for the release of status offenders currently in Ferris/Woodshaven and to represent newly-charged status offenders in Family Court.
- 4. Shelter Care. The Division of Social Services is locating 23 private home beds throughout the state to be used in lieu of detention at Stevenson/Bridge Houses. Additional funds from the Delaware Agency to Reduce Crime will be used to operate two eight-bed shelter facilities one in Wilmington and one in the Kent/Sussex area.
- 5. Long-term Group Foster Care. The Division of Social Services is locating several foster homes which will serve status offenders on a long term basis. Each home will receive a salary and board payments. Approximately 15 placements will be made.
- 6. <u>Diagnostic/Evaluation Service</u>. Delaware Curative Workshop is providing psychological, medical, and sensory/motor perception diagnosis to status offenders referred by other components. At least 150 children yearly will be served.
- 7. Family Counseling. Family Services of Northern Delaware, People's Place II and Turnabout have been contracted to provide counseling to status offenders and their families.

The above results show a significantly lower average length of detention during three months after the DSO project was initiated in the Family Courts. The stay in detention for status offenders has been nearly cut in half as compared to a comparable period in 1975.

Another study was made for the quarter April 1- June 30, 1977, to determine if the average length of stay at detention had been further reduced. The following results show a significant decrease in the time spent in detention by status offenders.

SUMMARY

DEINSTITUTIONALIZATION OF STATUS OFFENDERS GRANT

Pursuant to the authority of the Omnibus Crime Control and

BACKGROUND

Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended, and the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA), U.S. Department of Justice, has given a major priority to deinstitutionalization of status offenders. Division of Services to Children and Youth has received a two-year discretionary grant in the amount of \$987,083, through the Delaware Agency to Reduce Crime, to impact on the LEAA goal. Status offenders are defined in Section 223(a)(12) of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act as "juveniles who are charged with or who have committed offenses that would not be criminal if committed by an adult." The Act requires that within two years of the State's submission to LEAA of a Juvenile Justice Plan (November 1975), status offenders shall not be placed in juvenile detention or correctional facilities.



Summary--DSO Grant 6/9/76 Page Two

The Division of Services to Children and Youth's deinstitutionalization grant (also referred to as the status offender grant) will address status offenders who are charged, detained or incarcerated for: habitual truancy, running away, uncontrollable, ungovernable, or possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages.

The grant has a six-member advisory group called the Committee on the Administration of the Status Offender Grant. This Committee is part of the Juvenile Justice Advisory Group, appointed by the Governor pursuant to the requirements of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act:

DESCRIPTION OF THE GRANT PROGRAM

The thrust of the grant program is to, whenever possible, maintain or return status offenders to their own homes with supportive family counseling services. Children in need of living situations other than their own homes will be placed in shelters, small group homes, or foster homes.

The administration of the grant program is performed by the Division of Services to Children and Youth. Family Court and the Division of Social Services have specialized status offender units funded through the grant. Contracts for purchase of legal, counseling and diagnostic services have been executed with private agencies. The grant program is operating in all three Delaware counties. A description of each component of the program follows:

Family Court Status Offender Unit \$148,943 (2 years)

This unit is staffed by a counselor-supervisor, four counselors and a clerk-typist. It will process petitions alleging status offenses, make voluntary adjustments of such complaints where possible, and will refer status offenders to services such as legal representation, family counseling, or diagnosis.

Division of Social Services \$164,851 (2-years)

This funit is staffed by six social workers. It will seek

placement facilities such as shelters and individual and group

foster homes, assign children to such facilities, and supervise

their progress in the placement facility. Additional funds (\$238,641

are available to the Division to fund new placement alternatives such

as shelters and small group homes.

Child Advocacy Service \$119,700-(2 years)

Society. Inc. It is staffed by an attorney, social worker, parttime law clerk and secretary. Functions of this service are to provide legal representation and recommendations for treatment for status offenders who are detained, incarcerated, and/or pending ... Court disposition.

Intensive Family Counseling Services \$189,000 (2 years)

will be awarded in July 1976.

Diagnostic-Evaluation Services \$100,000 (2 years)

A contract has been awarded Delaware Curative Workshop for medical, psychological and educational evaluations.

Training . \$8,800 (2 years)

A contract or contracts will be awarded in July 1976 to provide periodic training sessions for foster and shelter parents funded through the grant program. Additional training may be provided for program staff and agencies impacted by the grant.
