


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
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

SUMMARY  
1978

- \* One law enforcement officer, an employee of the Kansas Highway Patrol, lost his life in the line of duty.
- \* Crime Index offenses decreased by 0.29%, from 104,341 in 1977 to 104,110 in 1978.
- \* Violent crimes increased by 3.2% over 1977, from 7,137 to 7,362
  - Murder decreased from 151 to 131, a factor of 13.2%
  - Rape increased by 13.4%, from 509 in 1977 to 577 in 1978.
  - Robbery decreased from 2,333 to 2,177, a factor of 6.7%.
  - Aggravated assault increased by 8.0%, from 4,144 in 1977 to 4,477 in 1978.
- \* Property crimes decreased by 0.5% in 1978, from 97,204 to 96,748.
  - Burglary increased by 1.3%, from 28,968 to 29,357.
  - Larceny (theft) decreased by 1.5%, from 62,642 to 61,720.
  - Motor vehicle theft increased by 1.4%, from 5,594 to 5,671.
- \* The value of stolen property stolen in 1978 totaled \$34,599,350.
- \* The value of property recovered in 1978 totaled \$13,066,883.
- \* There were 70,063 total arrests in 1978, a decrease of 6.7% from 1977; 17,680 for Crime Index Offenses and 52,383 were for Class II offenses.
- \* There were 1,001 assaults on Kansas law enforcement officers in 1978, compared to 1,107 in 1977.

IN MEMORIAM

The killing of a police officer has a tremendous impact not only on fellow police officers, but on society in general. In May 1978, Kansas had the misfortune of losing a four-year veteran of the Kansas Highway Patrol, Conroy G. O'Brien. Trooper O'Brien was shot to death with his own service weapon while making a routine traffic stop. Through the diligent and concentrated efforts of many other law enforcement officers, three suspects were apprehended the same day and subsequently charged with the murder of the slain officer.

Trooper O'Brien's contribution and dedication to criminal justice will not soon be forgotten.

INTRODUCTION

## Introduction

The national Uniform Crime Reporting Program evolved from a plan developed during the 1920's by the International Association of Chiefs of Police. On June 11, 1930, Congress approved a Uniform Crime Reporting Program, authorizing the Federal Bureau of Investigation to collect and compile crime statistics from state and local reporting systems. The FBI devised a crime information system for the UCR Program based on the work of the IACP.

Under K.S.A. 21-2504, enacted in 1931, the Kansas attorney general was empowered to collect data for the state. Prior to 1963, local law enforcement agencies in Kansas submitted crime statistics directly to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Between 1963 and 1969 the Kansas Bureau of Investigation collected monthly crime reports. K.S.A. 21-2501, enacted in 1969, authorized the KBI to collect Standard Offense Reports as well as monthly crime reports. In 1974, the KBI terminated previous monthly data collections and initiated use of the national Uniform Crime Reporting Program, effective January 1, 1975. Between 1975 and 1977 the Statistical Analysis Center of the Governor's Committee on Criminal Administration assumed from the Kansas Bureau of Investigation responsibility for publication of the state Uniform Crime Report. Lack of personnel for data analysis in either agency during the transition period hindered publication of annual reports. A Federal Uniform Crime Report grant awarded from FY 1979 LEAA discretionary funds alleviated staffing difficulties; in 1979 the Statistical Analysis Center of the Governor's Committee on Criminal Administration published in the Kansas Uniform Crime Report Sourcebook crime statistics for 1975, 1976, and 1977.

Local law enforcement agencies complete and submit to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation three forms on a monthly basis: "Return A"; "Supplement to Return A"; and "Age, Sex, and Race of Persons Arrested." Additionally agencies complete a

"Supplementary Homicide Report" each month in which a homicide occurs and a "Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted" form each month an individual or group assaults or kills an officer. Once yearly agencies submit a form on "Law Enforcement Employee Data."

One significant problem with the Uniform Crime Reporting statistics to date has been an inability to resolve discrepancies in the data between the forms. Through grant funds from the Comprehensive Data System program, in-house data editing and keypunching has been initiated; hence this difficulty will be corrected in 1979. A second problem arises from the fact that since the Uniform Crime Reporting program is a national one, some of the crimes and some of the demographic characteristics investigated are relatively minor categories in terms of numbers in Kansas, whereas other more predominant ones are omitted.

SECTION I  
OFFENSES COMMITTED

Chapter 1  
Crime Index Offenses

Seven categories of offense selected by the International Association of Chiefs of Police were adopted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation to constitute the Crime Index: murder and non-negligent manslaughter, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny (theft), and motor vehicle theft. Both felony and misdemeanor instances of the seven offenses are included in the Index. The Crime Index offenses share the characteristics of seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and probability of being reported to law enforcement agencies. Class II crimes are all offenses which are considered less serious, occur less frequently or are less likely to be reported; they are expected to follow the trends of the Crime Index. With the addition of negligent manslaughter the Crime Index Offenses are considered Class I or Part I crimes; however, for purposes of this document the three terms are used interchangeably.

As in other states Kansas statutes do not define offenses in precisely the same way as the federal Uniform Crime Report does. Crimes are classified for the Uniform Crime Report according to UCR definitions whenever state and national definitions differ. When multiple crimes are committed, only the "most serious" crime is tabulated in the Uniform Crime Report.

Murder and non-negligent manslaughter are defined in Kansas as follows:

(K.S.A. 21-3401) Murder in the first degree is the killing of a human being committed maliciously, willfully, deliberately, and with premeditation or committed in the perpetration or attempt to perpetrate any felony.

(K.S.A. 21-3402) Murder in the second degree is the malicious killing of a human being committed without deliberation or premeditation and not in the perpetration or attempt to perpetrate a felony.

(K.S.A. 21-3403) Voluntary manslaughter is the unlawful killing of a human being, without malice, which is done intentionally upon a sudden quarrel or in the heat of passion.

The UCR definition of criminal homicide, that is, murder and non-negligent manslaughter, is "the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another." This is compatible with Kansas statutory definition. One offense is tabulated for each victim.

Rape in Kansas is "the act of sexual intercourse committed by a man with a woman not his wife, and without her consent . . ." (K.S.A. 21-3502, 1979 Supp.). The UCR definition of rape is "the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will." The Kansas definition of rape is included within the UCR definition. However, whereas the UCR definition includes within its scope rape of a woman by her husband, such an act is not a crime in Kansas. One offense is tabulated for each person raped and for each person upon whom an assault to rape or attempt to commit rape has been made.

Robbery in Kansas is (K.S.A. 21-3426) "the taking of property from the person or presence of another by threat of bodily harm to his person or the person of another or by force." This is equivalent to the UCR definition: "the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear." Each distinct operation is tabulated.

Aggravated assault (K.S.A. 21-3410) is defined in Kansas as:

- (a) Unlawfully assaulting or striking at another with a deadly weapon.
- (b) Committing assault by threatening or menacing another while disguised in any manner designed to conceal identity; or
- (c) Willfully and intentionally assaulting another with intent to commit any felony.

Included is the UCR definition of assault:

an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

The UCR uses as determinants of the crime the type of weapon used, the seriousness

of injury, and in limited instances, the intent of the assailant to cause serious injury. One offense is counted for each aggravated assault, attempt to commit aggravated assault, or attempt to commit murder.

Kansas defines burglary as:

(K.S.A. 21-3715) knowingly and without authority entering into or remaining within any building, mobile home, tent or other structure, or any motor vehicle, aircraft, watercraft, railroad car or other means of conveyance of persons or property, with intent to commit a felony or theft therein.

The UCR defines burglary as "the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft." In its explanation of how to classify offenses the UCR includes as forcible entry concealment within a building. The UCR excludes from burglary the illegal entry of a tent or recreational vehicle to commit a theft or felony. Each burglary of a separate area is tabulated according to the provisions of the "Hotel Rule," under which multiple burglaries of transient dwellings or commercial units most likely to be reported to police by the manager rather than the lessees are counted as one offense.

Larceny is defined under Kansas statute K.S.A. 21-3701:

Theft is any of the following acts done with intent to deprive the owner permanently of the possession, use, or benefit of the owner's property:

- (a) Obtaining or exerting unauthorized control over property; or
- (b) Obtaining by deception control over property; or
- (c) Obtaining by threat control over property; or
- (d) Obtaining control over stolen property knowing the property to have been stolen by another.

Theft under \$100 is a misdemeanor in Kansas. Under the UCR definition larceny is "the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another." All thefts and attempted thefts not associated with robbery, burglary, or motor vehicle theft are tabulated in this category; monetary value is irrelevant.

Motor vehicle theft is included within the scope of the Kansas theft statute, K.S.A. 21-3701. Because of the large number and value of motor vehicle thefts the UCR tabulates them in a separate category from larceny. The UCR defines motor vehicle theft as "the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle." One offense is counted for each theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

Over three-fourths (78.9%) of the 227 law enforcement agencies participating in the UCR Program submitted reports for all twelve months of 1978. Only one county had no reporting agencies. Based on statistics available, there were 104,110 Crime Index Offenses in Kansas in 1978. The population of the state was 2,358,993. Altogether 44.1 crimes occurred for every 1,000 residents, consisting of 3.1 violent crimes and 41.0 property crimes.

The number of Crime Index offenses increased from 66,287 in 1969 to 104,110 in 1978. This amounted to a 57.1% increase in ten years. The largest increase over the previous year was a 23.1% increase in 1974. The largest number of Class I offenses in one year, 108,097, occurred in 1976. Between 1976 and 1978, Crime Index offenses decreased 3.7%, reflecting decreases in burglary and larceny (theft) in 1977 and in murder and non-negligent manslaughter, robbery, and larceny (theft) in 1978.

The rates of change differed for each of the Class I crimes. Consequently larceny (theft) constituted 64.5% of all Crime Index offenses in 1969 and 59.3% in 1978. Burglary occurred 34.9% as often as larceny in 1969 and 47.6% as often as larceny in 1978. Robbery occurred 24.4% as often as motor vehicle theft in 1969, but increased much more rapidly, occurring 78.9% as often in 1978.

The population of Kansas increased by 3.1%, from 2,287,302 in 1969 to 2,358,993 in 1978. If the increase in the number of crimes were due to only the increase in population, then the offense rate per 1,000 people would have remained constant. The largest influence that controlling for population growth has on crime trends is with aggravated assault, which increased at a higher rate than the other Crime

Index offenses. However, the influence is relatively small: whereas the number of aggravated assaults increased 129.2% in ten years, the rate of aggravated assaults per 1,000 people increased 122.2%, a 7.0% difference.



The graph of trends in Class I offenses closely resembles the graph of trends in larceny (theft) due to the large proportion of larcenies. The average increase in Crime Index offenses per year is 4,992. The predicted number of Crime Index offenses in 1979 is 115,577 and in 1980 is 120,569.

There were 19,894 Crime Index offenses in Wichita and 15,460 in Kansas City. No other agency had more than 10,000 Index offenses. Topeka had 9,111. Agencies with populations greater than 10,000 had 77.8% of the Crime Index offenses.

The metropolitan county with the largest number of Class I offenses was Sedgwick County, which had 22,784 Index offenses. Wyandotte County had 16,169 Crime Index offenses and Johnson County had 11,555. Together the two Kansas

counties included in metropolitan Kansas City had 26.6% of the Crime Index offenses in Kansas.

The metropolitan areas of the state had 58.3% of the state's Crime Index offenses. Forty-one percent (40.7%) of Kansas' population lived in those locales. Clearances of Crime Index offenses by arrest or by exceptional means increased 32.5% between 1969 and 1978. The largest number of clearances in one year, 23,995 occurred in 1974, preceding a decrease of 11.1% by 1978.

1978




FIGURE 3

1978



Chapter 2  
Violent Crimes

"Violent crimes" is a statistical category consisting of murder and non-negligent manslaughter, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Violent crimes increased by 106.0% from 3,563 in 1969 to 7,362 in 1978. They comprised 5.4% of the Crime Index offenses in 1969 and 7.1% in 1978. Since 1972 there has been no decrease in violent crimes, so the largest number in one year was 7,362 in 1978. The largest one-year increase was a 31.0% increase between 1973 and 1974.

Clearances of violent crimes increased by 68.6% from 2,099 in 1969 to 3,538 in 1978. Since 1972 there have been three years in which the number of clearances of violent crimes was less than in the previous year. The number of clearances in 1974 surpassed the number in 1975 and 1976 and was only 18 fewer than in 1978. The largest single increase was a 39.1% increase to the 3,520 clearances in 1974. The largest number of clearances of violent crimes was 3,606, in 1977.

Slightly more than half (54.7%) of the violent crimes in 1969 were aggravated assaults. Aggravated assault increased more rapidly than the other three violent offenses, and by 1978, it represented 60.8% of the violent crimes. In 1978 murder constituted less than 2.5% of violent crimes; rape, approximately 8%; and robbery, approximately 30%.

Kansas City had 2,159 violent crimes, 29.3% of the violent crimes in Kansas. Wichita had 1,231, or 16.7% of the total. Only eleven of the agencies with populations greater than 10,000 had at least 1% of the violent crimes in Kansas. Smaller agencies together had 17.3% of Kansas' violent crimes.

1969 - 1978





Chapter 3  
Property Crimes

"Property crimes" is a statistical category comprised of burglary, larceny (theft), and motor vehicle theft.

Property crimes increased by 54.3%, from 62,714 in 1969 to 96,748 in 1978. In 1969 property crimes comprised 94.6% of all Crime Index offenses and in 1978

they comprised 92.9%. The most property crimes in one year was 101,633 in 1976. The largest one-year increase was by 22.6% in 1974; the largest one-year decrease was by 4.4% in 1977.

Clearances of property crimes increased 27.1%, from 13,995 to 17,784, between 1969 and 1978. The largest number of clearances was 20,475 in 1974. The largest one-year increase in clearances was by 26.6%, also in 1974. By 1978 clearances decreased by 13.1% from the peak in 1974.

Larceny (theft) comprised 68.1% of all property crimes in 1969 and 63.8% in 1978. The percentage of burglaries doubled, from 15.4% of property crimes in 1969 to 30.3% in 1978. Motor vehicle theft decreased from 8.1% to 5.1% of property crimes.

The largest percentage of property crimes in a single agency in 1978 was 19.3% in Wichita, which had 18,663 offenses. Kansas City had 13.7% of all property crimes in Kansas. Seventeen agencies with populations greater than 10,000 all had at least 1% of the crimes against property. Smaller agencies had 21,829, or 22.6% of the crimes against property.

Chapter 4

Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter

In 1978, there were 139 homicides in Kansas. Of this number four were ruled justifiable homicide and four were ruled manslaughter due to negligence. Justifiable homicide is not an offense. Negligent manslaughter is a Class I offense but is not included in the Crime Index (Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook, p. 5). The remaining 131 criminal deaths occurred by murder or non-negligent manslaughter. Murder and non-negligent manslaughter are classified together as a Crime Index offense.

Negligent Manslaughter

In Kansas negligent and involuntary manslaughter are synonymous.

(K.S.A. 21-3404) Involuntary manslaughter is the unlawful killing of a human being, without malice, which is done unintentionally in the commission of an act not amounting to a felony, or in the commission of a lawful act in an unlawful or wanton manner.

Three of the four manslaughters due to negligence involved the use of firearms. Two were caused by a handgun; the third, by a rifle. An undetermined weapon precipitated the fourth death. Circumstances of the deaths included children playing with a gun, "other" handling of a gun, and two incidents of "other negligence".

All victims and perpetrators of negligent manslaughter were male. Two

offenders were related to their victims, one was a friend, and one was a stranger. Age and race relationships between the victim and offender are found in Table 12 and Table 13, respectively.

Prior to 1978, negligent manslaughter was a comprehensive category, including within its scope vehicular manslaughter. In 1977 there were 75 negligent manslaughters, the majority of which occurred as a result of negligent operation of a motor vehicle. Effective in 1978 vehicular manslaughter was deleted from the category negligent manslaughter. There were 4 negligent manslaughters in 1978. The substantial reduction is a consequence of the reduction in the range of the definition of negligent manslaughter.

#### Justifiable Homicide

Homicides are ruled "justifiable" when causing the death of another stems from legal performance of an official duty or occurs under circumstances constituting legal justification. All four incidents of justifiable homicide in 1978 transpired when police officers intercepted persons committing felonious acts. One such death occurred when police intervened in an assault on a civilian; the other three occurred when police attempted to detain individuals in the act of committing property crimes. Two of the deceased were white and two were black; all were male. All police officers were white males. Officers used

handguns in two of the deaths and shotguns in the other two deaths.

#### Murder And Non-Negligent Manslaughter

Murder and non-negligent manslaughter are defined in the Kansas statutes under three separate entries:

(K.S.A. 21-3401) Murder in the first degree is the killing of a human being committed maliciously, willfully, deliberately and with premeditation or committed in the perpetration or attempt to perpetrate any felony.

(K.S.A. 21-3402) Murder in the second degree is the malicious killing of a human being, committed without deliberation or premeditation and not in the perpetration or attempt to perpetrate a felony.

(K.S.A. 21-3403) Voluntary manslaughter is the unlawful killing of a human being, without malice, which is done intentionally upon a sudden quarrel or in the heat of passion.

In 1978, Kansas recorded 131 incidents of murder and non-negligent manslaughter, compared to 151 in 1977. This represents a decrease of 13.2%. Although the incidence of murder continues to increase over time, the rate of increase has leveled off.

In 1978 murder and non-negligent manslaughter constituted 1.8% of the violent crimes and 0.13% of all Crime Index offenses. This compares with 2.1% and 0.14% respectively for 1977. Table 2 (page 29) contains supporting data for these figures.


Crime rates for murder and non-negligent manslaughter based on population are exhibited in Table 3 (page 29). The 1978 rate of 0.056 per 1,000 population was a decrease of 0.009 per 1,000 from the 1977 rate of 0.065 per 1,000.

In 1978, there were 103 clearances of homicide offenses, a decrease of 7.2% from the 1977 total of 111 (Table 6, page 33).

The number of murders and non-negligent manslaughters occurring in January increased by 10.3%, from 8 in 1976 to 23 in 1978. January had the most murders over three years, 46, and April had the least, 24. March, July, and October were the most consistent months.

Three-fourths (76.3%) of murders and non-negligent manslaughters in 1978 were

of one victim by one offender. Nine cases, or 6.8%, involved multiple victims. Thirteen cases, 9.9%, involved one victim and an unknown number of offenders.



Of the 131 victims of murder and non-negligent manslaughter in 1978, 35, or 26.7%, were in the age range 22-30. More than twice as many males as females were victims of murder and non-negligent manslaughter: 88 victims (67.2%) were male, and 43 (32.8%) were female.

Nearly three-fourths of the victims, 93 or 71.0%, were white and 36 victims, or 27.4%, were black.

Firearms were involved in 87, or 66.4% of the murders and non-negligent manslaughters; handguns contributed 70.1% of this figure. Handguns were involved in nearly one-half 46.6% of all murders and non-negligent manslaughters in 1978. Knives ranked second to handguns as the weapon most frequently used in criminal deaths.

Twenty percent (19.8%) of all murders and non-negligent manslaughters occurred

during the commission of a felony. Of the 26 felony-related murders, 14, or 53.8%, occurred during robberies. The largest number of murders and non-negligent manslaughters, 81, or 61.8%, occurred as a result of arguments.

In 28 murders and non-negligent manslaughters, or 21.4%, offender and victim were members of the same family. Half of those cases (50.0%) involved spouses; 64.3% of the victims in such cases were wives. Offender and victim were acquaintances in 54 cases, amounting to 52.4% of non-family incidents and 41.2% of all murders and non-negligent manslaughters. They were strangers in 16.8% of all cases of murder and non-negligent manslaughter.

Offender and victim most often are in the same age category. Of all age ranges the one with the largest number of incidents of murder and non-negligent manslaughter, 15, or 11.5%, ranges from 22 through 30.

Generally males are both offender and victim. Sixty-one, or 46.6% of all murders and non-negligent manslaughters, involved male victims of male offenders. Seventy-eight percent (78.2%) of male victims were killed by males and 85.7% of female victims were killed by males.

As with age, offender and victim most often are also members of the same race. Of the 76 white victims of offenders of known race, 62, or 81.6% were

killed by white offenders. Of the 35 black victims of offenders of known race, 33, or 94.3% were killed by black offenders. Eighteen percent (18.3%) of white victims and 2.8% of black victims were killed by offenders of unknown race.



Chapter 5

Rape

In Kansas rape is (K.S.A. 21-3502, 1979 Supp.) "the act of sexual intercourse committed by a man with a woman not his wife, and without her consent. . . ." The FBI definition of rape is the "carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will" (UCR Manual, p. 12).

Rape increased by 87.9% in ten years, from 307 in 1969 to 577 in 1978. Between 1975 and 1978 the number of rapes increased 45.3%. The largest increase in one year was in 1976 by 23.7% to 491 rapes; the second largest increase was by 13.4% in 1978. The incidence of rape has not decreased since 1975; the largest annual number of rapes to date was 577 in 1978.

On the average 28.7 additional rapes occurred each year between 1969 and 1978. If the trend of the past ten years continues at the same rate, statistical analysis indicates that there will be 569 rapes in 1979, 8 fewer than in 1978, and 597.7 rapes in 1980.

Of the 577 total rape offenses in 1978, 437, or 75.7%, were forcible rape and 140, or 24.3%, were attempted rape. Of the agencies with over 10,000 people, only El Dorado, Hutchinson, and Emporia had more attempted rapes than forcible rapes.

Kansas City and Wichita had 149 and 133 rapes respectively; together they had 48.9% of Kansas' rapes in 1978. Five other agencies with population greater than 10,000 had more than 10 rapes in 1978: Topeka had 63, Lawrence had 27, Junction City and Hutchinson had 17, and Dodge City had 12. Eighty-five percent (84.7%) of all rapes occurred in the large agencies.

The four metropolitan counties, Sedgwick, Wyandotte, Shawnee, and Johnson,

experienced 70.7% of the rapes in Kansas. Statewide the rate of rape per 1,000 women is 0.480. In three metropolitan counties the rate is higher than the state average: in Sedgwick County it is 0.900, in Wyandotte County it is 1.644, and in Shawnee County it is 0.719. In Johnson County there were 0.253 rapes per 1,000 women.



In 1978, 279 rapes in Kansas were cleared, an increase of 24.6% since 1969. Fifty-nine of the clearances were of attempted rape and 220 were of forcible rape.

Twenty-one clearances were of rapes perpetrated by one or more juveniles and no adults.

## Chapter 6

### Robbery


Robbery is defined in Kansas as (K.S.A. 21-3426) "the taking of property from the person or presence of another by threat of bodily harm to his person or the person of another or by force." The F.B.I. definition is similar, and includes attempts to commit robbery (UCR Manual, p. 14). Data collected on types of robbery for the Uniform Crime Report are based on UCR terminology and not on Kansas statutes.

There were 1,235 robberies in 1969 and 2,177 robberies in 1978, a 76.3% increase in ten years. There were two lulls in the increase of robberies, one from 1971 through 1973 and the second from 1975 through 1976. The largest number of robberies in one year, 2,248, occurred in 1974, following a 37.3% decrease in one year. The second largest number of robberies in one year, 2,333, occurred in 1977, preceding a 6.7% decrease in 1978. The average yearly increase in robbery for the ten-year period was by 107.6 offenses. The anticipated number of robberies in 1979 is 2,473, and in 1980 is 2,581.

In 1978, robbery occurred primarily in the large cities. Kansas City, Wichita, and Topeka together has 1,513 robberies, 69.5% of all robberies in Kansas. All other agencies experienced fewer than 100 robberies. Junction City had 84; Leavenworth, 73; and Lawrence, 70. The remaining agencies had fewer than 50 robberies in 1978. Winfield, Ottawa, and Leawood, all with population greater than 10,000, sustained no known robberies.

Highway robbery, that which occurs on streets, alleys, and generally outside of structures, constituted 37.8% of all robberies. Kansas City experienced 65.5% more highway robberies than Wichita; Wichita had 145.6% more than Topeka; and Topeka sustained 64.6% more than Junction City. The least common type of robbery was bank robbery. Ten bank robberies occurred altogether, 3 in Topeka, 2 in

Wichita, 1 each in Garden City, Overland Park, and 2 in cities with populations smaller than 10,000.



Seventy-seven percent (76.5%) of all robberies occurred in Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte counties. The distribution of each of the types of robbery

is quite similar to the distribution of total robberies. Discrepancies may reflect the distribution of the classification rather than a preference for a particular target. Thus the fact that 86.9% of convenience store robberies occurred in the metropolitan counties may be explained by the fact that more convenience stores are located in metropolitan areas than in less populous regions. Likewise, that only 37.9% of the miscellaneous robberies occurred in urban areas reflects the inclusion in this category of robberies occurring on waterways and in wooded areas.

The total value of property stolen by robbery in 1978 was \$633,879. Wichita had the largest loss in a single classification of robbery as well as the largest total loss to robbery. In Wichita \$39,293 was stolen by highway robbery, contributing to the loss of \$106,732 in that city. Pittsburg reported the smallest loss in a single classification: \$1 in a robbery of miscellaneous type. Parsons reported the smallest total loss of the cities with population greater than 10,000 which had robberies: \$85.

The four metropolitan counties sustained 63.4% of the loss of property by robbery in Kansas. Those counties lost \$401,881 by robbery. The largest single contributor to that sum was the loss of \$148,880 by highway robbery. The value of property stolen in bank robberies and miscellaneous robberies was relatively disbursed throughout Kansas, as only 21.8% of the loss to bank robberies and 47.7% of the loss to miscellaneous robberies occurred in the four metropolitan counties.

Robbery in 1978 most often took place at some type of commercial establishment, excluding banking institutions. Forty-three percent (42.6%) of robberies occurred at businesses. Over half of these (59.7%) occurred at convenience stores or gas stations. Thirty-nine percent (38.8%) of the value stolen by robbery was sustained

by businesses, of which 37.8% was from convenience stores and gas stations. Only 0.46% of robberies were of banks, whereas 10.5% of the value of property stolen was from banks. Highway robbery constituted 37.8% of robberies; the value of property stolen in such a manner was 28.8% of the total value of property stolen in robberies.

The number of clearances of robbery offenses increased from 484 in 1969 to 622 in 1978, a factor of 28.5%. The largest number of clearances, 709, occurred in 1976.

 1978





FIGURE 11

Chapter 7

Aggravated Assault

Aggravated assault is defined in Kansas under K.S.A. 21-3410 as:

- (a) Unlawfully assaulting or striking at another with a deadly weapon; or
- (b) Committing assault by threatening or menacing another while disguised in any manner designed to conceal identity; or
- (c) Willfully and intentionally assaulting another with intent to commit any felony.

The UCR defines aggravated assault as an unlawful attack on someone with the purpose and the means of producing death or great bodily harm (UCR Manual, p. 18).

Aggravated assault is the only violent crime which more than doubled in ten years. The 129.2% increase brought the number of aggravated assaults from 1,953 in 1969 to 4,477 in 1978. There has been no decrease in the number of offenses since 1973. The largest increase was by 30.2% in 1974.

There were an average of 274.5 additional aggravated assaults each year. Based on a decade of known assaults, the predicted number of aggravated assaults in 1979 is 4,674, and in 1980 is 4,949.

Some type of weapon was used in 78.9% of aggravated assaults. Firearms were used in 29.4% of the offenses. Knives were used 18.6% of the time. Other weapons, e.g. blunt instruments, chemicals, fire, were used in 30.9% of aggravated assaults. Use of personal weapons, i.e., hands, fists, feet, etc., occurred in 21.1% of aggravated assaults.

The largest number of aggravated assaults within one agency, 1,215, occurred in Kansas City. Wichita had 531 aggravated assaults, 56.3% as many as Kansas City. Topeka had 415 assaults. Table 4, page 31, bears supporting data.

The four metropolitan counties, Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte, together had 65.4% of all aggravated assaults, while bearing 40.7% of the population.

There were 2,534 clearances of aggravated assault in 1978, an increase of 92.0% since 1969. The largest number of clearances in one year, 2,571, occurred in 1977.

1969 - 1978




Chapter 8

Burglary

Kansas defines burglary as (K.S.A. 21-3715):

. . . knowingly and without authority entering into or remaining within any building, mobile home, tent or other structure, or any motor vehicle, aircraft, watercraft, railroad car or other means of conveyance of persons or property, with intent to commit a felony or theft therein.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program defines burglary as "the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft." (UCR Manual, p. 22). Differences in types of structures included within each definition are discussed in the section on Class I offenses, page 9.

From 14,926 incidences in 1969, burglary increased by 96.7% to a total of 29,357 in 1978. The largest surge in the period, a 39.2% increase, occurred between 1972 and 1974. The number of burglaries has changed little since 1974, increasing only 1.8 percent in four years. The largest number of burglaries, 29,905, occurred in 1976.

Burglary increased by an average of 1,670 offenses per year. Based on the ten-year trend, the anticipated number of burglaries in 1979 is 33,793 and in 1980 is 35,463.

Forcible entry was used in 21,763 burglaries, 74.1% of the total number in 1978. Entry occurred without use of force in 20.1% of all burglaries. The remaining 5.7% of burglaries were the 1,679 attempts of forcible entry.

In 1978, Wichita experienced the largest number of burglaries, 5,421, or 18.5% of all burglaries in Kansas. Kansas City had a similar quantity, 5,009. Topeka had 2,374. No other city had more than 1,000 burglaries. Overland Park had 893. Agencies with fewer than 10,000 people together had 7,409 burglaries, 25.2% of the total.

1969 - 1978




Large and small agencies experienced burglaries of similar nature. One-third (36.2%) of residential burglaries in agencies of all sizes occurred at night, and 31.1% occurred during daytime. The remaining 32.6% of residential burglaries occurred at unknown times. Non-residence burglaries in agencies of all sizes occurred at night 64.5% of the time and during the day 6.0% of the time. Whereas 64.9% of burglaries in agencies with populations greater than 10,000 were of residences, only 50.1% of burglaries in agencies with population less than 10,000 were of residences.

The financial loss due to burglary in 1978 was \$10,339,644. Almost two-thirds of that amount was in the agencies with populations greater than 10,000. Burglaries in Wichita contributed \$1,345,288, or 13.0% of the total value. Residence Burglaries contributed \$6,401,771, or 61.9% to the total loss to burglary in Kansas in 1978.

The four metropolitan counties experienced 58.7% of Kansas' burglaries. Altogether they had 11,479 residence burglaries and 5,763 non-residence burglaries.

In Johnson County 33.5% of residence burglaries occurred at night and 56.3% of non-residence burglaries occurred at night. In Sedgwick County 39.7% of residence burglaries occurred at night and 74.1% of non-residence burglaries occurred at night. The time of day of 34.1% of all burglaries in Johnson County and 22.7% of all burglaries in Sedgwick County is not known.

Twenty percent (20.3%) of the value of property stolen in burglaries came from Johnson County. In Johnson County the total value of the loss due to burglaries was \$2,100,486; the average loss was \$666 per offense. Sedgwick County lost \$1,781,753, an average of \$288 per offense. Seventy-four percent (73.8%) of the value of property stolen in burglaries in Johnson County was from residence burglaries. In Sedgwick County 54.7% of the value was from residence burglaries.

The value of property stolen in each type of burglary is proportional to the number of burglaries. The largest difference is only 1.7%, and occurs between the

number of residence burglaries at unknown times and the value of property stolen in those burglaries.

In 1978 there were 4,622 clearances of burglaries, an increase of 40.4% since 1969. The largest number of clearances was 6,464 in 1974. Clearances decreased each year since 1974 until 1978, when they increased by 65.

1978





FIGURE 17

Chapter 9

Larceny (Theft)

Kansas theft statute (K.S.A. 21-3701) defines theft as:

. . . any of the following acts done with intent to deprive the owner permanently of the possession, use, or benefit of the owner's property:

- (a) Obtaining or exerting unauthorized control over property; or
- (b) Obtaining by deception control over property; or
- (c) Obtaining by threat control over property; or
- (d) Obtaining control over stolen property knowing the property to have been stolen by another.

The FBI defines larceny as "the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another," (UCR Manual, p. 26) and includes within its meaning all such attempts. Larcenies under \$100 are misdemeanor offenses in Kansas, but nevertheless are counted as Class I offenses in UCR reports. The words "larceny" and "theft" are used interchangeably.

The incidence of larceny increased from 42,736 in 1969 to 61,720 in 1978, a net increase of 44.4%. The initial five years saw little change in the number of larcenies. Between 1973 and 1976, larcenies increased 52.6%, to the highest rate of the period, 66,491. The largest one-year increase, 24.8% occurred between 1973 and 1974. After the peak in 1976, larceny decreased by 5.8% in 1977 and by 1.5% in 1978 to approximately the same number as in 1975.


The average increase of larceny per year was by 2,798 offenses. Therefore the predicted number of thefts in 1979 is 68,166, and in 1980 is 70,964.

Twelve agencies with populations greater than 10,000 had more than 1,000 thefts. Wichita had 11,908 larcenies, 40.9% more than Kansas City, which had the second highest number of larcenies, 7,036. Wichita alone had 19.3% of the larcenies in Kansas. The greatest number of thefts in ten agencies with over 10,000 people and in the sum of the smaller agencies were in the \$50 to \$200

range; the greatest number of thefts in the remaining agencies were of less than \$50.

The total value of property stolen by larceny in 1978 was \$9,534,518. Fourteen percent (13.9%) of that figure, or \$1,328,434, was from Wichita. Sixteen agencies greater than 10,000 lost over \$1,000,000 to theft. The total loss to theft in the agencies with populations smaller than 10,000 was \$3,428,283, or 40.0% of the total monetary loss, whereas only 21.7% of the total larcenies occurred in

the smaller agencies.

Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee and Wyandotte counties together had 56.3% of the larcenies in Kansas. Sedgwick County had the largest number of larcenies under \$50 and the largest number of larcenies between \$50 and \$200. Shawnee County had 1,593 larcenies over \$200, and Johnson County had 1,592 larcenies over \$200.

The four metropolitan counties experienced 51.4% of the monetary loss due to theft. Sedgwick County lost \$87,752 in theft under \$50, an average of \$14 per theft. The average value of theft under \$50 in non-metropolitan areas was

\$18. Sedgwick County also lost more than the other metropolitan counties to larceny between \$50 and \$200, \$509,807. Johnson County experienced the greatest loss of the metropolitan counties to larceny over \$200. The loss of \$1,234,736 in Johnson County represented an average loss of \$776 per larceny over \$200. The largest average loss to larceny in the metropolitan areas was \$165 in Shawnee County and the smallest average loss was \$81 in Wyandotte County.

In 1978 larcenies over \$200 comprised 16.8% of all larcenies. However, the value of larcenies over \$200 represented 72.4% of the total value of property stolen by larceny. Theft under \$50 constituted 47.1% of the number of larcenies and 4.9% of the value of property stolen by larceny.

1978





FIGURE 20

Larceny took the form of theft of automobile parts and accessories 25.2% of the time. There were 15,524 thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, 3,805 of which occurred in Wichita. Theft from motor vehicles of property other than parts and accessories occurred 10,036 times, with 18.3% occurring in Wichita. There were 8,190 larcenies from buildings open to the public, 1,045 occurring in Kansas City. Shoplifting constituted 11.7% of all larcenies and bicycle theft constituted 9.4%.

The largest monetary loss from a single source was \$1,788,640 from public

buildings. Kansas City experienced 8.6% of this loss, \$153,762. The value of theft from motor vehicles of property other than parts and accessories, \$1,783,916, did not differ substantially from the value of theft from buildings. Theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories totaled \$1,484,304, averaging \$96 per theft. Pocket picking averaged \$100 per offense, but constituted only 0.1% of the dollar loss to larceny.

Sedgwick County experienced 22.2% of all larcenies in Kansas; Wyandotte

County experienced 12.2%; Johnson County experienced 11.7%; and Shawnee County experienced 10.2%. The metropolitan counties together had over half of all types of larceny except pocket picking (32.2%), theft from a public building (46.5%), and theft from a coin-operated device or machine (46.8%).

The monetary loss to larceny in the four metropolitan counties, \$4,897,170, amounted to 51.4% of the loss in Kansas. Johnson County experienced the greatest loss of the four counties to pocket picking, theft from motor vehicles and theft from public buildings. Sedgwick County lost more than the other three counties to shoplifting, theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle theft, theft from a coin-operated device or machine, and from all other thefts not specifically mentioned. Wyandotte County lost the greatest amount to purse snatching.

The monetary loss to each of the types of larceny was not necessarily proportional to the frequency of occurrence of each type. Whereas shoplifting constituted 11.7% of all larceny offenses, the loss to shoplifting constituted only 2.6% of the total loss to larceny. Theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories constituted 25.2% of all theft; the value of such larceny constituted 15.6% of the total value. Larcenies not specifically itemized constituted 22.0% of all larcenies and 38.5% of the value of property stolen by theft. In the remaining categories the number of offenses was within 10% of the value of property stolen.





Chapter 10  
Motor Vehicle Theft

Motor vehicle theft in Kansas is included in the theft statute, K.S.A. 21-3701. Motor vehicles are defined as self-propelled vehicles which do not run on rails (UCR Manual, p. 30). Motor vehicle thefts are tabulated separately from larcenies of other types of property for the Uniform Crime Report because of the large number and value of motor vehicle thefts.

In 1978 there were 5,671 motor vehicle thefts, which contributed 5.4% to the total Crime Index. Between 1969 and 1978 motor vehicle theft increased 12.3%. In 1969 there were 5,052 vehicle thefts, the smallest number in the ten-year period. The largest number of motor vehicle thefts, 5,728 occurred in 1970. Motor vehicle thefts increased steadily since 1975. The net increase in motor vehicle theft was the smallest of all Crime Index offenses.


The average yearly increase of motor vehicle thefts was by 22.4 thefts. The predicted number of such thefts in 1979, based on the ten-year trend, is 5,484.6; it is 5,507 in 1980.

Of all motor vehicle thefts, 3,710, or 65.4%, were thefts of automobiles, vehicles used for transporting people. Theft of trucks used for transporting cargo and buses used for commercial transportation of people constituted 17.9% of motor vehicle theft. The remaining 16.7% of vehicle thefts were of other motorized vehicles, such as motorcycles and snowmobiles.

Wichita had 1,334 motor vehicle thefts, 23.6% of all such thefts in 1978. Kansas City had 1,256. Together Wichita and Kansas City had 55.7% of the motor vehicle thefts in the agencies with population greater than 10,000 and 45.7% of all motor vehicle thefts in Kansas. The metropolitan agencies experienced 64.1% of all motor vehicle thefts. Wyandotte and Johnson counties had a total of 1,802

motor vehicle thefts; Shawnee County had 385. Sedgwick County bore the largest number, 1,446. Supporting tables, table 4 and table 5, are on pages 31 and 32.

1969 - 1978




There were 1,478 clearances of motor vehicle thefts in 1978, an increase of 11.1% since 1969, when there were 1,330 clearances. The largest number of clearances was 2,008 in 1973. Clearances of motor vehicle thefts were relatively constant between 1977 and 1978, decreasing by 0.5%.

Chapter 11

Value of Property Stolen and Recovered

The value of property stolen in Kansas in 1978 was \$34,599,350. In the Uniform Crime Reporting system, when multiple offenses occur, only the most severe offense is recorded. For that reason occasionally a value for property stolen appears under the offenses of murder and non-negligent manslaughter and rape. Only 0.1% of the value of all property stolen in Kansas is associated with murder and rape. Monetary loss to motor vehicle theft, including the value of the stolen vehicles and the property contained therein, amounted to \$14,057,101, or 40.6% of the value of all stolen property.

1978



Wichita had the largest value of property stolen by all Crime Index Offenses, \$5,618,216. Forty-nine percent (49.1%) of the value of property stolen in Wichita and 67.6% of the value of property stolen in Kansas City was from property stolen in motor vehicle thefts. Kansas City experienced the largest value of property loss by motor vehicle theft, \$3,376,835. One-fourth (24.0%) of the value of property stolen in motor vehicle thefts occurred in Kansas City.


Fifty-nine percent (58.9%) of the value of property stolen by offense was in the metropolitan counties. Johnson County experienced the largest monetary loss

to burglary, \$2,100,486. The largest loss due to motor vehicle theft, \$3,427,011, occurred in Wyandotte County. The value of property stolen by all other Class I offenses was largest in Sedgwick County.

The metropolitan counties had 64.1% of all motor vehicle thefts. Sedgwick County had the largest number of stolen vehicles, 1,446. Wyandotte County had 1,276, Johnson County had 526, and Shawnee County had 385 stolen motor vehicles. The value of stolen vehicles was highest in Wyandotte County, \$3,427,011, and

lowest in Shawnee County, \$624,001. The average value of motor vehicles stolen was highest in Johnson County, \$3,825, and lowest in Shawnee County, \$1,620.

The total value of stolen property recorded by offense in 1978 does not agree with the total value of stolen property recorded by type of property. The difference in the two totals is \$29,546, which amounts to an insignificant 0.09% difference. The UCR Program accepts a difference of up to 10%. Therefore, although the values differ, the figures are nevertheless acceptable for the Uniform Crime Report.

The value of stolen property, as reported by the type of property, is \$34,628,896. Stolen currency amounted to \$2,536,252, or 7.3% of stolen property. The value of stolen motor vehicles was \$14,689,633, or 42.4% of the total value of stolen property. The largest losses of currency, jewelry, clothing, consumable goods, and miscellaneous property occurred in Wichita; the largest losses of office equipment, televisions, stereos, and radios, and firearms occurred in Topeka; the largest loss of motor vehicles occurred in Kansas City; the largest loss of household goods occurred in Overland Park; and the largest loss of livestock occurred in Manhattan.

Sedgwick County experienced the largest loss of stolen property, \$6,734,221. Johnson County and Wyandotte County together had \$10,943,259 of property stolen. Shawnee County lost \$2,706,349 in stolen property.

There were 1,478 total clearances of motor vehicle thefts. Sixty-seven percent (67.1%) of the clearances were of automobile thefts; 17.1% were of truck or bus thefts, and the remaining 233 (15.8%) were of thefts of other motor vehicles.

The value of recovered property in 1978 was \$13,066,883. Value of recovered property is attributed to the agency from which the property was stolen and not to the agency which recovered it. Kansas City recovered \$2,666,354 of stolen property, 98.3% in motor vehicles. Seventy-three percent (72.7%) of recovered losses occurred in agencies with over 10,000 people.

The four metropolitan counties recovered \$7,587,043 in stolen property, 58.1% of the recovered value in Kansas. Together they recovered \$6,646,089 in motor vehicles. The largest recoveries of currency, jewelry, clothing, office equipment, and household goods occurred in Johnson County; the largest recoveries of firearms, consumable goods, livestock, and miscellaneous property occurred in Sedgwick County; the largest recovery of televisions, stereos, and radios occurred in Shawnee County; the largest recovery of motor vehicles occurred in Wyandotte County.

Property recovered in 1978 was worth 37.7% of the value of property stolen in 1978. Recovery of motor vehicles amounted to 82.1% of recovered property losses. Vehicles recovered in 1978 were worth 73.0% of the value of vehicles stolen in 1978. Recovered household goods were worth only 6.3% of the value of stolen household goods. Whereas clothing and furs stolen in 1978 were worth 39.3% of the value of jewelry and precious metals stolen in 1978, clothing and furs recovered in 1978 were worth 111.9% of the value of jewelry and precious metals recovered in 1978.



The value of motor vehicles recovered in 1978 was almost three-fourths the value of vehicles stolen in 1978. The value of all other types of property recovered in 1978 was less than one-third the value of all other types of property stolen in 1978. The value of motor vehicles recovered surpassed even the values

of other types of property stolen.

Of all motor vehicles stolen in Kansas, 4,495 were recovered. Eighty-two percent (81.8%) were recovered in the same agency as the one from which they were stolen. Of these vehicles three-fourths (76.8%) were stolen and recovered in agencies with over 10,000 people. Ninety-one percent (90.9%) of the locally recovered vehicles which were not locally stolen were recovered in agencies with population less than 10,000.

Sixty-two percent (62.2%) of locally stolen and recovered vehicles were stolen and recovered in the metropolitan counties. Of the 816 locally stolen vehicles that were recovered elsewhere, 52.0% were stolen from the metropolitan counties. Of the vehicles stolen in Wyandotte County, 93.2% were recovered in Wyandotte County, whereas of the vehicles stolen in Johnson County, only 54.9% were recovered in Johnson County.

1978



1978





FIGURE 30

Chapter 12

Age and Sex of Persons Arrested

Arrests for Crime Index offenses increased by 40.1%, from 12,618 in 1969 to 17,680 in 1978. The largest number of arrests in the ten-year period was 19,261 in 1974, following a 31.5% increase over the number of arrests in 1973. In 1977 a lesser peak of 18,534 arrests was reached, followed by a 4.6% decrease in 1978. Arrests for Class I offenses in 1978 equalled 17.0% of the total Class I offenses in 1978.

There were 70,063 total arrests in 1978, 25.2% of which were for Crime Index offenses. Arrests for violent crimes totaled 2,697, and for property crimes, 14,983. Wichita had 4,222 arrests for Crime Index offenses, nearly twice as many as Kansas City, which had 2,308 arrests for Index offenses. Nevertheless Kansas City had 2,084 more total arrests than Wichita, having 84.6% more arrests for Class II offenses, all offenses other than the Crime Index offenses, than Wichita had.

Fifty-eight percent (57.9%) of the arrests for Crime Index offenses and 48.2% of the arrests for Class II offenses occurred in the four metropolitan counties.

In Wyandotte County and Johnson County together there were 21,157 total arrests, 30.2% of all arrests in Kansas. In Shawnee County there were 1,370 arrests for Crime Index offenses and 2,550 arrests for Class II offenses.

There were 56,199 males and 13,864 females arrested in 1978. Females were arrested 24.7% as often as males. There were 21,365 juveniles and 48,698 adults arrested in 1978; juveniles were arrested 43.9% as often as adults. Seventy-two percent (71.6%) of juveniles arrested were male and 84.0% of adults arrested were male. Of the arrests for violent crimes, 91.4% were of males and 0.7% were of

juveniles. Of those arrested for property crimes 79.5% were males and 47.3% were juveniles.

Nine juvenile males were arrested for murder and 23 juvenile males were arrested for rape in 1978. There were 22 arrests of boys under age eleven for violent offenses. Sixteen and seventeen year-olds constituted 44.4% of the juvenile males arrested and 19.4% of all males arrested for Crime Index offenses. Eighteen-year-olds constituted 15.6% of the adult males arrested and 8.8% of all

males arrested for Crime Index offenses. There were at least 1,000 arrests of males for each age from 15 through 18 inclusive for Class I offenses. Over half of arrested males (52.4%) were age 18 or younger. Whereas 43.6% of the males arrested for Crime Index offenses and 27.2% of all males arrested were juveniles, half of the arrests for burglary, 50.5%, and over half of the arrests for motor vehicle theft, 59.8%, were of juvenile males.

The youngest female arrested for murder in 1978 was age 19; the oldest was between 50 and 54. Four girls under age eleven were arrested for violent crimes, two for robbery and two for aggravated assault. Four percent (3.6%) of arrests of juvenile females and 7.8% of arrests of adult females were for violent crimes. Less than half of females arrested for Crime Index offenses, 40.2%, were juveniles. There were 348 arrests of sixteen-year-old females, more than of females of any other age. Four females, two juveniles and two adults are tabulated as arrested for rape. This may be an error in recording since rape is a crime committed by men against women; however, women may be charged with aiding and abetting in the commission of rape (K.S.A. 21-3205) or with conspiracy to commit rape (K.S.A. 21-3302). Forty percent (40.2%) of females arrested for Index offenses and 43.7% of all females arrested were juveniles. However, over half of females arrested for burglary, 54.5%, and almost three-fourths of females arrested for motor vehicle theft, 74.0%, were juveniles.

There were 42,321 males arrested for Class II offenses; 21.9% were juveniles. Arrests for runaway, 1,663, and vandalism, 1,530, comprised 34.5% of the arrests of juvenile males. Almost half of the arrests of boys younger than eleven, 46.7%, were for vandalism, whereas only 11.3% of the arrests of seventeen-year-old males were for vandalism. There were 234 sixteen-year-old-males arrested for drug violations, of whom 214 were arrested for possession of marijuana. More eighteen-year-olds were arrested for possession of drugs, 344, and nineteen-year-olds for sale

of drugs, 45, than males of any other age were arrested for those offenses. Over three-fourths (76.4%) of arrests of males for drug violations were for possession of marijuana. Twenty-four percent (24.0%) of adult male arrests, 7,927, were for driving while intoxicated. There were 3,128 adult males arrested for simple assault.

There were 10,062 females arrested for Class II offenses, 23.8% as many as males. Over half of the arrests of juvenile females, 2,493, were for runaway. Two hundred seventy-one (271) juvenile females were arrested for liquor violations, second in frequency to runaway. Twelve percent (12.4%) of the arrests of girls younger than eleven were for vandalism. Fifty-one (51) girls age thirteen to fourteen were arrested for drug violations, including 1 for sale of narcotics and 2 for sale of marijuana. Over one-fourth (27.2%) of juvenile females arrested were age thirteen to fourteen. There were 769 females arrested for driving while intoxicated; 95.8% were adults. Disorderly conduct and fraud were the second and third most common offenses for which adult females were arrested. Twenty-three percent (23.0%) of all females arrested were thirteen to fifteen years of age.

Of all agencies with population greater than 10,000, only Dodge City had no juvenile male arrests. Wichita had more juvenile male arrests than any other agency and Kansas City had more adult male arrests than any other agency. Almost three-fourths (73.5%) of juvenile male arrests occurred in agencies with populations greater than 10,000. Two-thirds (66.6%) of adult male arrests occurred in the large agencies.

As with males Dodge City was the only agency with population greater than 10,000 which had no juvenile female arrests. The largest number of juvenile female arrests, 1,407, was in Wichita and the largest number of adult female arrests, 1,439, was in Kansas City. Over three-fourths (78.1%) of juvenile female arrest and 74.9% of adult female arrests occurred in agencies with

populations greater than 10,000.

Over one-fourth (28.5%) of the arrests of boys under 11 occurred in Sedgwick County. There were 4,054 juvenile males arrested in the metropolitan Kansas City, Kansas counties. Arrests of juvenile males comprised 42.9% of all arrests of males in Sedgwick County and 18.5% of the arrests of males in Wyandotte County. There were 811 juvenile males and 3,125 adult males arrested in Shawnee County.

The largest number of juvenile females arrested in Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte counties were thirteen- and fourteen-year-olds. In Johnson County the largest number of juvenile females arrested were sixteen-year-olds. There were 1,564 juvenile females arrested in Sedgwick County, 1,739 in the metropolitan Kansas City counties, and 319 in Shawnee County. In Johnson, Sedgwick, and Shawnee counties, most adult females arrested were age eighteen. In Wyandotte County most adult females arrested were nineteen.

Chapter 13

Race of Persons Arrested

Of the 7,584 juveniles arrested for Crime Index offenses in 1978, 79.3% were white, 19.2% were black, 0.6% were Indian, and 0.9% were "other" races. Five percent (5.4%) of juvenile white arrests were for violent crimes. Almost three-fourths, 74.4%, of juvenile arrests for aggravated assault were of whites. Over half (51.3%) of juveniles arrested for robbery were black. Sixteen percent (16.3%) of arrests of juvenile Indians were for motor vehicle theft.

There were 7,319 white adults arrested for Crime Index offenses, 72.5% of all adult arrests. One-fourth (25.2%) of adults arrested for Class I offenses were black. Twenty-one percent (21.1%) of arrests of adult whites and 14.6% of arrests of adult blacks were for burglary. Almost two-thirds (63.8%) of arrests for violent crimes were of whites and three-fourths (74.9%) of arrests for property crimes were of whites.

Ninety percent (90.5%) of the 13,678 juveniles arrested for Class II offenses in 1978 were white. Runaway comprised 29.8% of the arrests of juvenile whites, 33.5% of the arrests of juvenile blacks, and 32.2% of the arrests of juvenile

Indians. Ninety-five percent (94.6%) of juveniles arrested for drug violations were white. Sixty-nine (69) out of 71 juveniles arrested for drug sale were white. All four juveniles arrested for gambling were black.

There were 32,415 white adults arrested for Part II offenses, comprising 83.9% of all adult arrests for such crimes. The most common charge for which both whites and Indians were arrested was driving while intoxicated. Twenty-four percent (24.4%) of arrests of adult whites and 29.6% of arrests of adult Indians were for DWI. There were 1,166 adult blacks arrested for disorderly conduct, 21.3% of adult blacks arrested. There are 9 adult whites tabulated as arrested for runaway, which is an offense only of juveniles. Since no adults are entered for runaway in the age and sex categories, most likely this is an error in data entry.

There were 13,355 arrests of juvenile whites and 2,379 arrests of juvenile blacks in the agencies with population greater than 10,000. Wichita, Kansas City, and Topeka had 73.1% of the arrests of juvenile blacks and 35.5% of all arrests of juveniles in 1978. Nine percent (8.8%) of arrests of juvenile Indians occurred in Lawrence.

Whites comprised 81.6% of adult arrests; blacks comprised 16.5% of adult

arrests. There were 12 Chinese adults, 3 Japanese adults, and 413 "other" adults arrested in 1978, together contributing 0.9% to the total of adults arrested. More than twice as many adult Indians, 150, were arrested in Lawrence than in any other agency with jurisdiction of over 10,000 people. Salina had 1,089 adult whites arrested out of 1,296 adult arrests.

Over half (52.2%) of the arrests of juvenile whites, over three-fourths (78.3%) of the arrests of juvenile blacks, and 54.5% of the arrests of juvenile members of all other races occurred in the four metropolitan counties. Ninety-

eight percent (97.8%) of juvenile arrests in Johnson County were of whites. In Wyandotte County 68.2% of the juveniles arrested were white. Almost half (44.9%) of the arrests of juvenile Indians occurred in Sedgwick County.

The distribution of adult arrests does not match the distribution of juvenile arrests. Of the adults arrested, 44.4% of the whites, 72.8% of the blacks, and 22.2% of all other races were arrested in the metropolitan counties. Shawnee

County had 2,151 white adult arrests, constituting of 77.1% of all arrests in Shawnee County and 5.4% of all white adult arrests in Kansas. Arrests of black adults in Sedgwick County comprised 25.7% of all arrests in the county. In Wyandotte County there were 3,477 blacks arrested, amounting to 43.3% of all arrests of blacks in Kansas.

Chapter 14

Law Enforcement Employees

Kansas has 241 law enforcement agencies which submitted 1978 employee data for the Uniform Crime Report. These consist of 105 county sheriff's offices, 130 police and park departments, and six university security offices.

As of October 31, 1978, there were 4,792 full-time law enforcement personnel employed within these agencies. Of this number 3,775 were sworn officers and 1,017 were civilians. Sworn officers comprised 78.8% of all full-time law enforcement personnel. There were on the average 1.6 sworn officers and 0.4 civilian employees per 1,000 persons. However, some agencies require that all personnel be sworn, whereas others do not require that certain employees, such as clerical staff and mechanics, be sworn.

Of all law enforcement employees, 3,780 or 78.9% were male. There were 1,012 female employees, 21.1% of the total. Of the 3,775 sworn officers 3,471 were male and 304 were female, 91.1% and 8.1% respectively of total sworn officers. There were 309 male and 708 female civilian employees. Females represented 69.9% of full-time civilian staff.

Of the 3,383 personnel employed in 130 police and park departments, 2,646 were sworn officers and 737 were civilian staff. Civilian employees comprised 21.8% of police department personnel. There were 2,771 male and 612 female employees of local departments, 78.2% and 21.8% respectively of the total.

In the 105 county sheriff's offices, there were 1,409 full-time law enforcement employees, 29.4% of all law enforcement personnel in Kansas. Of that number 1,129, or 80.1%, were sworn officers and 280 were civilian personnel. Sheriff's offices employed 1,009 males, 71.6% of all sheriff's office employees, and 400 females, 28.4% of all sheriff's office employees.

In 1978 there were 1,001 assaults on law enforcement officers. Statewide

an average of 26.5 assaults occurred per 100 sworn officers.

Sworn officers in the agencies with population greater than 10,000 were subject to 821 assaults, 82.1% of all assaults on sworn officers in Kansas in 1978. There were 41.1 assaults per 100 officers in the urban agencies, compared to 26.5 assaults per 100 officers statewide. Wichita accounted for 10.5% of the sworn officers and 38.8% of the total assaults on sworn officers. Kansas City had 8.1% of the sworn officers and 16.1% of the assaults on officers.

The four metropolitan counties, Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte, accounted for 40.7% of the state's population in 1978 and 47.3% of the state's sworn officers. These four counties employed 2,260 full-time law enforcement personnel: 1,784 sworn officers and 476 civilians.

Females made up 3.6% of the sworn officers in Johnson County, 8.9% in Sedgwick County, 3.2% in Shawnee County, and 6.7% in Wyandotte County. Statewide female sworn officers comprised 8.1% of total sworn officers. Males constituted 24.1% of the full-time civilian law enforcement employees in Johnson County, 30.0% in Sedgwick County, 43.5% in Shawnee County, and 39.1% in Wyandotte County. Together the four metropolitan counties employed a higher percentage of males in both sworn and civilian positions than did all other law enforcement agencies combined. There were 186 sworn officers per 1,000 residents of the metropolitan counties compared to 142 sworn officers per 1,000 residents of the remaining 101 counties.

The 738 assaults on law enforcement officers in the metropolitan counties constituted 73.7% of all assaults on officers in Kansas. Sedgwick County averaged 70.5 assaults on officers per 100 sworn officers, compared to 12.9 assaults per 100 officers in Johnson County and 41.4 assaults per 100 officers in the metropolitan counties.

SECTION IV  
LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED OR ASSAULTED

Chapter 15

Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted

Law enforcement agencies provide data on officers killed or assaulted in the line of duty each month in which such an event transpires. Data on officers killed includes deaths resulting from felonies as well as from accidents or negligence. Agencies report "all assaults on sworn officers who have full arrest powers in which the officer sustained serious injury or in which a weapon was used which could have caused serious injury or death." The reports include non-injurious assaults, "provided the assault was more than verbal abuse or minor resistance to arrest," (UCR Manual, p. 67).

In 1978 there were 1,001 assaults upon Kansas law enforcement officers, 95.3% of which were cleared. Almost half of the assaults, 40.1% were upon officers responding to disturbances. Second to the 401 assaults on officers intervening in disturbances were 171 assaults on officers attempting arrests other than for disturbances or burglaries or robberies in progress. All four ambushes of officers, attacks without warning, and all six assaults by mentally deranged persons were cleared. Law enforcement personnel cleared 96.0% of assaults on officers responding to disturbances and 98.2% of assaults on officers attempting "other" arrests.

Most assailants of officers did not use weapons. Eighty-two percent (82.1%) used personal weapons: hands, fists, feet, etc. Assailants used firearms twice as often as knives. Other weapons, such as blackjacks, clubs, bricks, or tire irons, were used in 6.2% of the assaults on sworn officers.

Fewer officers assaulted with firearms received injuries than those subjected to any other type of assault. One-sixth, (14.5%), of assaults with firearms resulted in personal injuries. Knives were used in 31 assaults, 29.1% of which

caused injuries. Almost half (48.8%) of attacks with other weapons resulted in injury to an officer.

The 317 assaults with hands, fists, feet, etc. on officers responding to disturbances accounted for 31.7% of all assaults on officers. Officers were more likely to be assaulted with a firearm when responding to a robbery in progress or when ambushed with no warning than when involved with other activities. Over half of the knife assaults on officers (54.8%) occurred as officers responded to disturbances.

Three-fourths (77.4%) of officers assaulted were assigned to a one-person vehicle. Of the 775 officers assaulted in one-person vehicles, 80.4% received assistance. Assaults on detectives represented 3.2% of the assaults on officers; assaults on off-duty officers, foot patrols, and other officers accounted for 7.4% of all assaults on officers. A large percentage of the officers assaulted, 82.2%, either were assigned to two-person vehicles or received assistance.

Over three-fourths (79.8%) of the officers responding to a disturbance who were assaulted were in a one-person vehicle and received assistance. Ninety-seven (97) officers, 56.7% of those assaulted while attempting arrests other than in response to a disturbance or burglary or robbery in progress, were in

an assisted one-person vehicle. All eight officers assaulted while intervening in a burglary in progress were on vehicular assignment. No officers assigned to vehicles were ambushed.

Officers in the agencies with populations greater than 10,000 were victims of 82.0% of the assaults on Kansas officers in 1978. There were 388 assaults on officers in Wichita, 16.8% of which resulted in injury. In Kansas City there were 161 assaults on officers, 65.8% of which resulted in injury. Kansas City is the only agency in which over half the assaults on officers resulted in injury.

In Overland Park 29.4% of the 17 total assaults were with knives or other weapons such as blackjacks and clubs, whereas statewide 11.7% of the 1,001 total assaults on law enforcement officers were with knives or other weapons. Topeka also had a higher rate of assault with other weapons, 13.3%, compared with 8.6% statewide. Overland Park and Topeka had proportionally fewer assaults with hands, fist, feet, etc. on officers than the state average.

Of the eight assaults on officers in Lawrence, 37.5% were on officers assigned to two-person vehicles, whereas 12.0% of the assaults on officers statewide were on officers in two-person vehicles. Ninety-eight percent (97.9%) of the assaults on officers in Wichita and 76.0% of the assaults on officers in Topeka were on officers assigned to one-person vehicles. In Wichita 97.4% and in Topeka 80.7% of the officers in one-person vehicles who were assaulted received assistance. In Kansas City, however, only 48.7% of the officers in one-person vehicles who were assaulted received assistance.

Almost three-fourths (73.8%) of the assaults on officers in Kansas occurred in the four metropolitan counties. Wyandotte County had 164 assaults on officers, 65.2% of which resulted in injury. Almost half of the assaults on officers, 437, or 43.7%, occurred in Sedgwick County, 18.5% of which caused injury.

In Shawnee County firearms were used in 13.3% of the 83 assaults on officers, whereas statewide firearms were used in 6.2% of the assaults on officers. Knives were used in 9.3% of the 54 assaults on officers in Johnson County, three times

the percent of statewide assaults with knives on officers. Twenty-nine (29) of the assaults on officers in Wyandotte County, 17.7%, were with other weapons.

## GLOSSARY

## GLOSSARY

**ACTUAL OFFENSE:** An offense which law enforcement personnel confirm to have happened.

**ARREST:** The act of taking a person into custody by authority of law, to charge him or her with a criminal offense or to initiate juvenile proceedings.

**CLASS I:** Classification of offenses including the Crime Index and negligent manslaughter. In this publication, however, the terms "Class I offenses" "Part I offenses", and "Crime Index offenses" are used interchangeably.

**CLASS II:** Classification encompassing all crimes not included in Class I. However, for purposes of this publication negligent manslaughter is included with the Class II offenses. Definitions of individual Class II offenses are available in the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook, United States Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation, pp. 89-92.

**CLEARANCE:** An offense for which at least one person is arrested, charged, and turned over to the court for adjudication; or for which said procedure would be completed were it not for reasons preventing law enforcement officers from proceeding. Such reasons include death of the offender, confession by an offender already in custody or serving a sentence, prosecution of offender for another offense under different jurisdiction, denial of extradition, refusal of victim to cooperate, prosecution of offender for a lesser charge, and policy regarding handling of juveniles.

**CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS:** Subcategory of the Crime Index which encompasses murder and non-negligent manslaughter, rape, and aggravated assault.

**CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY:** Subcategory of the Crime Index which encompasses robbery, burglary, larceny (theft), and motor vehicle theft.

**CRIME INDEX:** Classification of seven crimes selected for their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and likelihood of being reported. Includes murder and non-negligent manslaughter, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny (theft), and motor vehicle theft, all of which share the feature of criminal intent. Definitions of the individual Crime Index offenses are available in the text.

**JUVENILE:** Person under the age of eighteen.

**JUVENILE CLEARANCE:** Clearance involving only offenders under eighteen years of age.

**METROPOLITAN COUNTIES:** Classification comprised of the four counties with substantially larger populations than the remaining 101 counties: Johnson County, Sedgwick County, Shawnee County, Wyandotte County. Adopted at the suggestion of the Kansas Bureau of Investigation.

**PART I:** See Class I.

**PART II:** See Class II.

PROPERTY CRIMES: Subcategory of the Crime Index comprised of burglary, larceny, (theft), and motor vehicle theft.

REPORTED OFFENSE: An act which comes to the attention of law enforcement authorities as a possible offense.

UNFOUNDED OFFENSE: An act reported to law enforcement authorities which upon investigation proves to be not an offense.

VIOLENT CRIMES: Subcategory of the Crime Index comprised of murder and non-negligent manslaughter, rape, robbery and aggravated assault.
