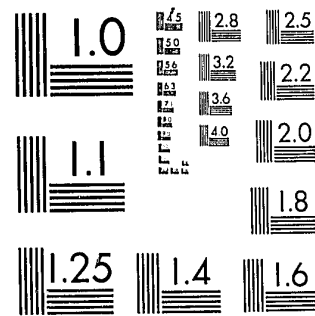


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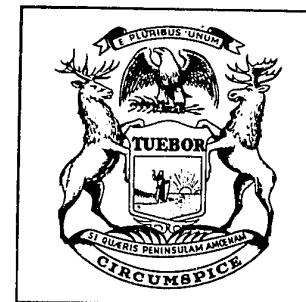

Foreword

This document is intended to provide researchers and other interested persons with complete and accurate statistics on the state's correctional system for calendar year 1978. Information on various institutions, programs and bureaus can be obtained by contacting the office of Public Information within the Michigan Department of Corrections.

What has formally been known as "Dimensions" is being redesigned and will be distributed at a later date.

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Looking Back

PRISON POPULATION GROWTH AND FLUX

In October, 1975, the department projected more crowding based on a new evaluation of the impact of Proposal B, longer sentences in general and the impact of the three-year-old gun law. The projection showed an ultimate population of 19,200 if current rates of prison intake are maintained.

An analysis of the first 687 cases sentenced under Proposal B was made to find out if judges would discount their sentences to allow for the loss of good time.

It was found that judges were reducing sentences in only about one-half the cases instead of the two-thirds the department had conjectured might be the case.

The research found that the average increase in sentence length of persons affected by the proposal is about 9.6 months, and 66.2 percent of all persons sent to prison are covered by the proposal.

With a continued prison intake of 6,000 cases a year and the same mix of crimes as experienced in 1979, the Department anticipated that Proposal B would eventually add 2,600 cases to prison. The department also predicted an additional 500 cases as a result of the felony firearm statute.

Persons with longer prison sentences in general also are being received, the department research report noted.

Ultimately, this was expected to result in a prison population in which nearly one-third of the persons incarcerated were serving terms of 11 years or more.

The department said it would take the addition of at least one prison every year for the next 10 years before the system's capacity could equal prisoner population.

PRISON SITE SELECTION

An effort was begun by the Legislature and department to standardize the process of finding and acquiring sites; to put selection on a rational basis; to make sure that the best interest of a community are served; to help ensure that prisons are placed in the communities from which prisoners come; to silence the criticism that the state is arbitrary in selecting sites; to actually help in acquiring sites for prisons.

HB 4106, introduced in 1979, required development of a comprehensive plan as part of the process in locating sites for correctional facilities.

In June, 1979, the Corrections Commission approved a long-range plan on the placement of regional prisons. It was based on the Commission's belief that prisons should be near communities from which offenders are sentenced.

It divided the state into nine geographical regions which were determined by examining the number of persons received by the department from each judicial circuit in a typical year. Five of the regions would be served by a single regional facility, three would be served by two prisons, and one would require 10 regional facilities or their equivalent.

The regions were designed so as to not cut across judicial circuits and to minimize travel distance from major population areas within the region. Each region has a prison population breakdown which at least approximates the size of a regional prison (550) or multiples of the population of such a prison.

It called for a total of 21 regional prisons, replacement of the Michigan Reformatory at Ionia with a 250-bed maximum security prison and one regional prison. In another phase, major portions of the State Prison of Southern Michigan would be eliminated.

Another bill introduced in 1979, attempted to legislate this plan. Eventually the two became tie-barred.

ACQUISITION OF SITES IN 1979

The department unsuccessfully attempted to acquire a nursing home near Battle Creek for a 224-bed women's prison. It tried for a site in southern Wayne County in the City of Rockwood but by the end of the year had not been successful in acquiring the site.

It bought a site adjacent to the women's division of DeHoCo. No money was appropriated for construction in 1979, however.

ACTUAL EXPANSION OF THE SYSTEM

A new Camp Cusino with 80 beds was opened in December, 1979. Work began on remodeling of DeHoCo for a 320-bed men's prison. A total of 340 halfway house beds were added to increase the daily bed count by 30 percent. On April 16, construction began on the new maximum security prison near Ypsilanti. The Department lost Camp Hoxey in April.

TRYING TO SOLVE THE CROWDING DILEMMA

The Department began discussions with the attorney for the Human Rights Party in 1979 in an effort to settle the lawsuit which had begun in 1976 on conditions of crowding. Rep. Bobby Crim, Speaker of the House, called for creation of a joint task force of the Legislature and Executive Office to come up with solutions to prison crowding.

MORE ABOUT PRISONS

An important revision of the state's Mental Health Code occurred in 1979. It removed some of the loopholes that kept the department from transferring mentally ill prisoners to the Department of Mental Health.

The Department continued to receive increasing numbers of mentally ill prisoners, but not enough resources could be developed to deal with them effectively. A revision of the law was a necessity.

The issue of equality in treatment of men and women prisoners was a major one in 1979. Judge John Feikens, a U.S. District Court Judge in Detroit, ordered the department to provide equal opportunities in education and vocational offerings for women. He said the state had not provided equal treatment in some areas for women prisoners and could not house women in the Kalamazoo County Jail.

In late 1979, the department began planning to develop a vocational counseling and testing program for the women prisoners, which was to be followed by a survey of prisoner interests, needs and abilities. From this information, the department was to design a vocational program.

In other institutional developments, some functions of the Cassidy Lake Technical School and the Camp Program were merged. Business office operations were consolidated at camp headquarters and education, administration, personnel and some other office functions for both were placed in Cassidy Lake.

The new combination academic-vocational school and leisure time activities building was opened at the Muskegon Correctional Facility.

During 1979, the department was told to trim \$7 million from its 1979-80 budget to help assure a balanced state budget. The cuts touched all sections of the department and froze all nonessential vacancies.

IN THE FIELD

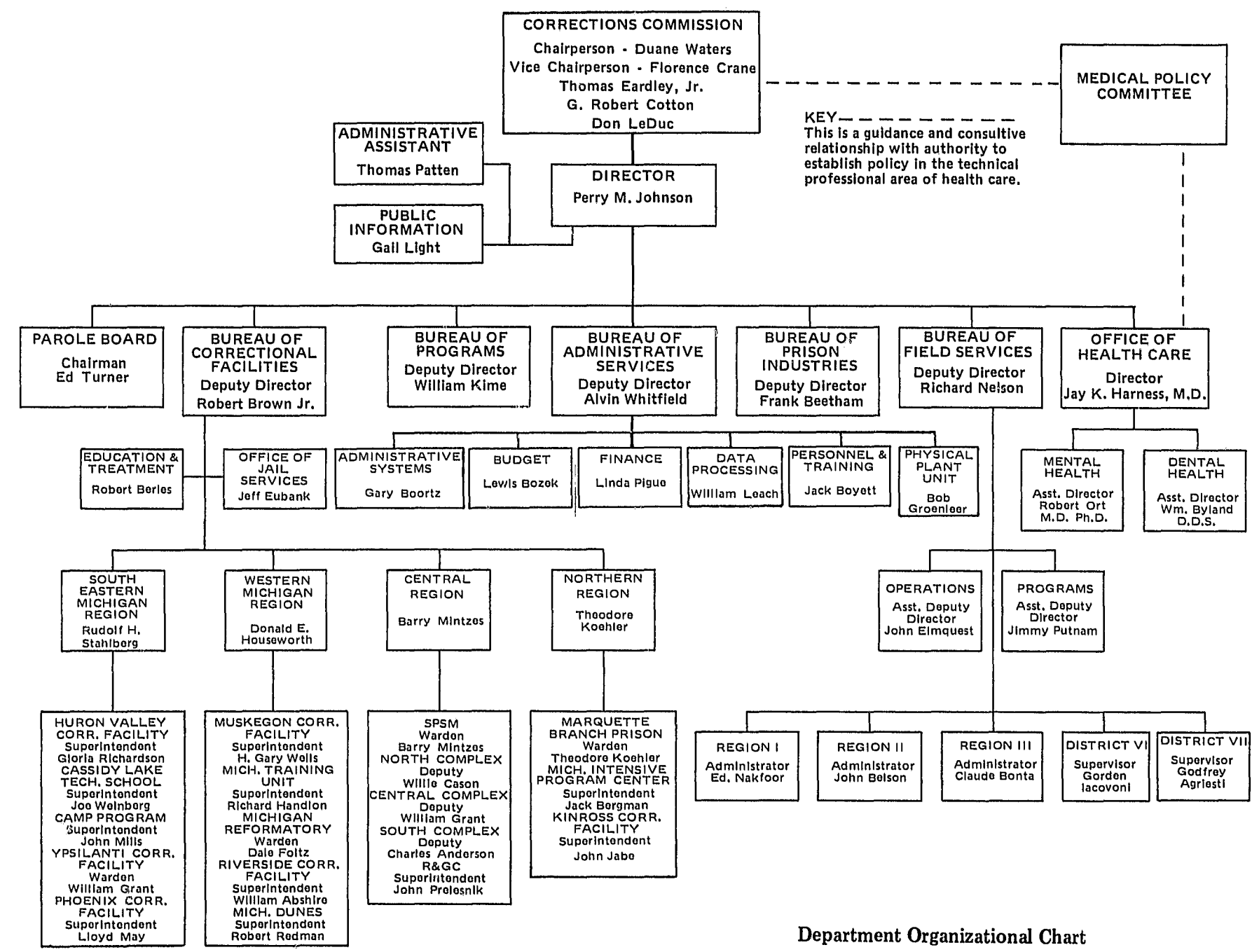
In the area of field services, bills were signed in 1979 to allow the state to take over financial responsibility for all probation services, but the funds weren't appropriated until 1980.

The department's probation halfway house program sponsored by the department and run by local citizens began growing late in 1979. An evaluation of the program was anticipated in 1980.

ANOTHER ISSUE

Citizens began in 1979 to again take focus on an important moral issue, that of capital punishment. A petition drive was begun to put the question of reinstating the death penalty on the ballot in November, 1981.

Director Perry M. Johnson took a position against it saying, "We should recognize that retribution is the prime emotion behind capital punishment. There is no sound evidence that it deters the potential offender from similar crimes any more than does a life sentence. In fact, there is a good indication that there is no correlation between capital punishment and capital crimes at all."

Court Dispositions

The tables that follow illustrate data supplied to the Michigan Department of Corrections by all Michigan Circuit Courts and the Detroit Recorder's Court. The charts and graphs cover all prisonable offences handled by the courts during calander year 1979.

Court Dispositions by District

A-1 gives the total number of cases handled by each court in 1979 and the disposition whether it was prison, probation or a jail sentence. The percentage columns show the percentages of dispositions that were prison sentences, probation or jail terms. The remaining columns provide a breakdown of the type of offender receiving the sentence.

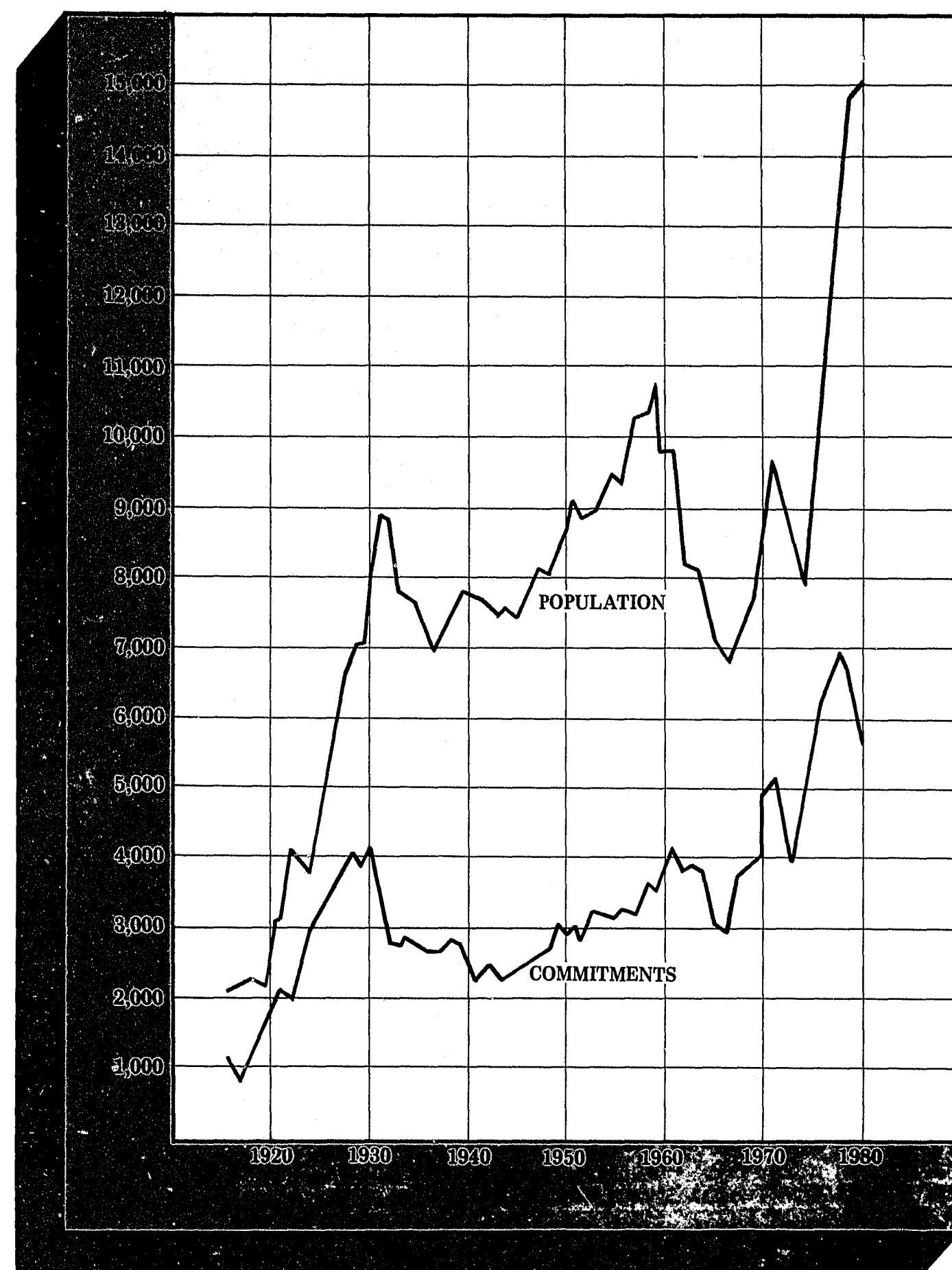

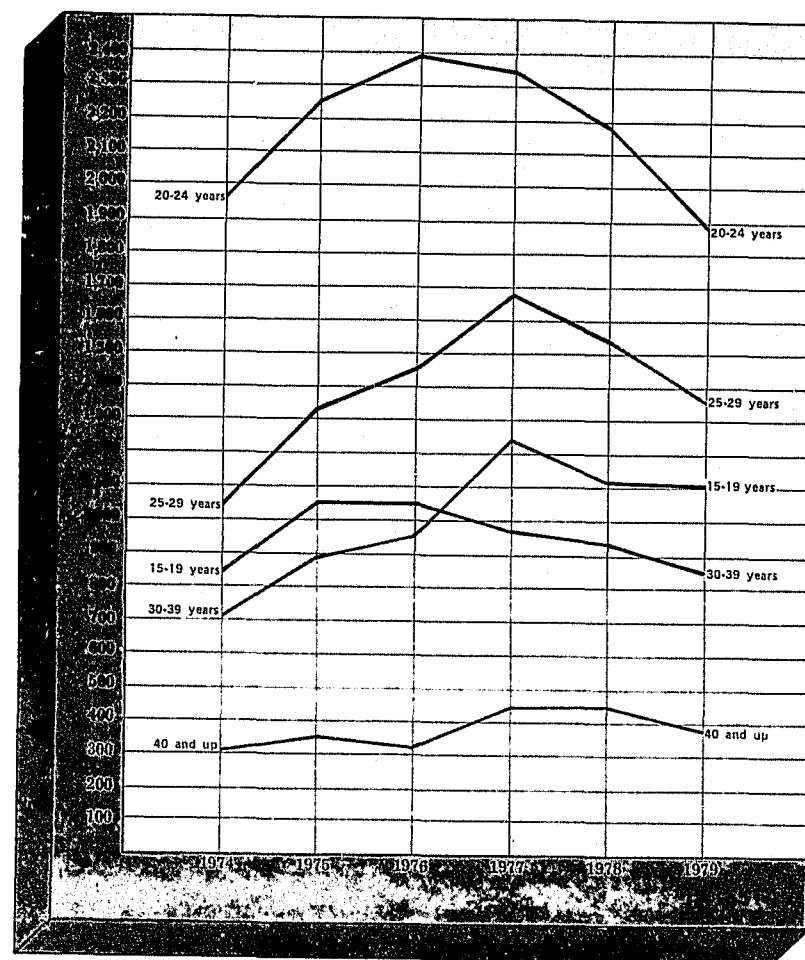

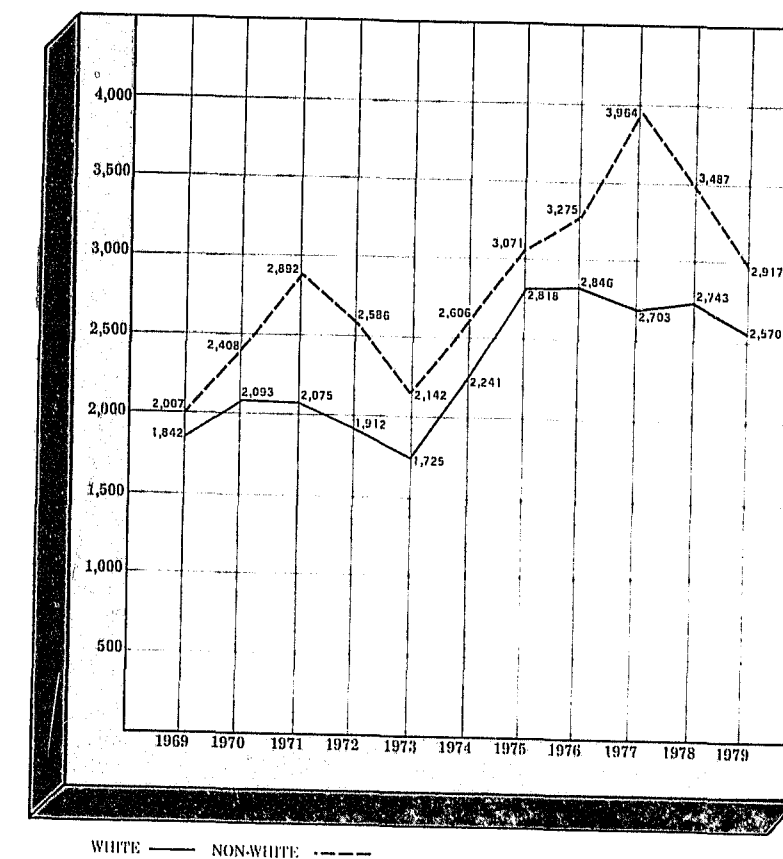

Commitments by Race for Men

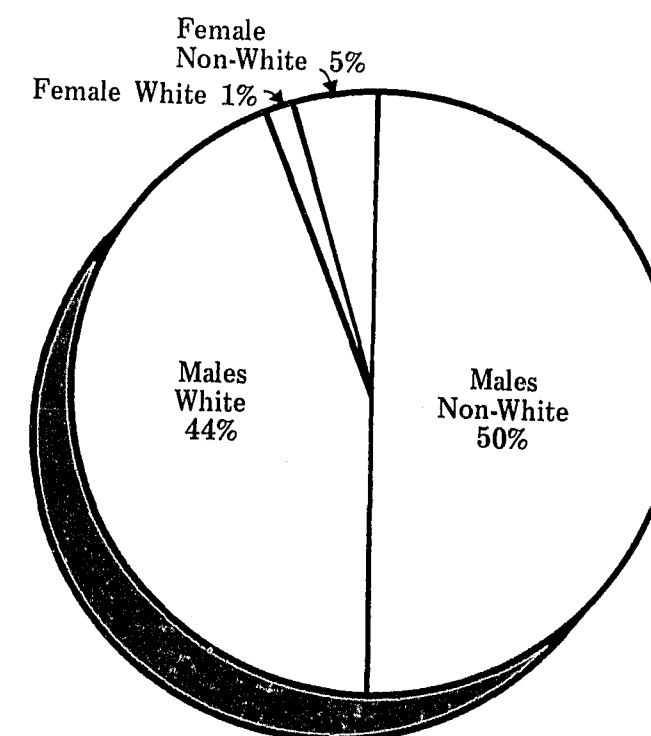
B-5a is an 11-year racial comparison of male commitments. The graph shows a continued decline in non-white commitments while the number of white commitments decreased slightly.

Non-White=2,914



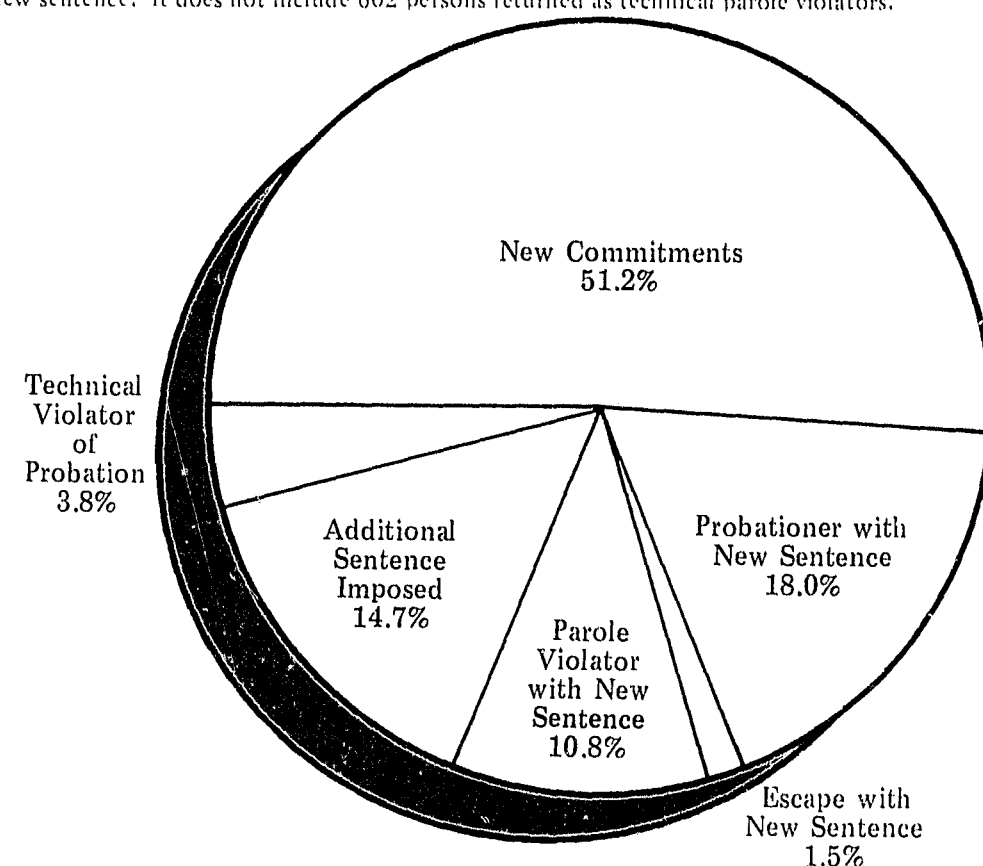

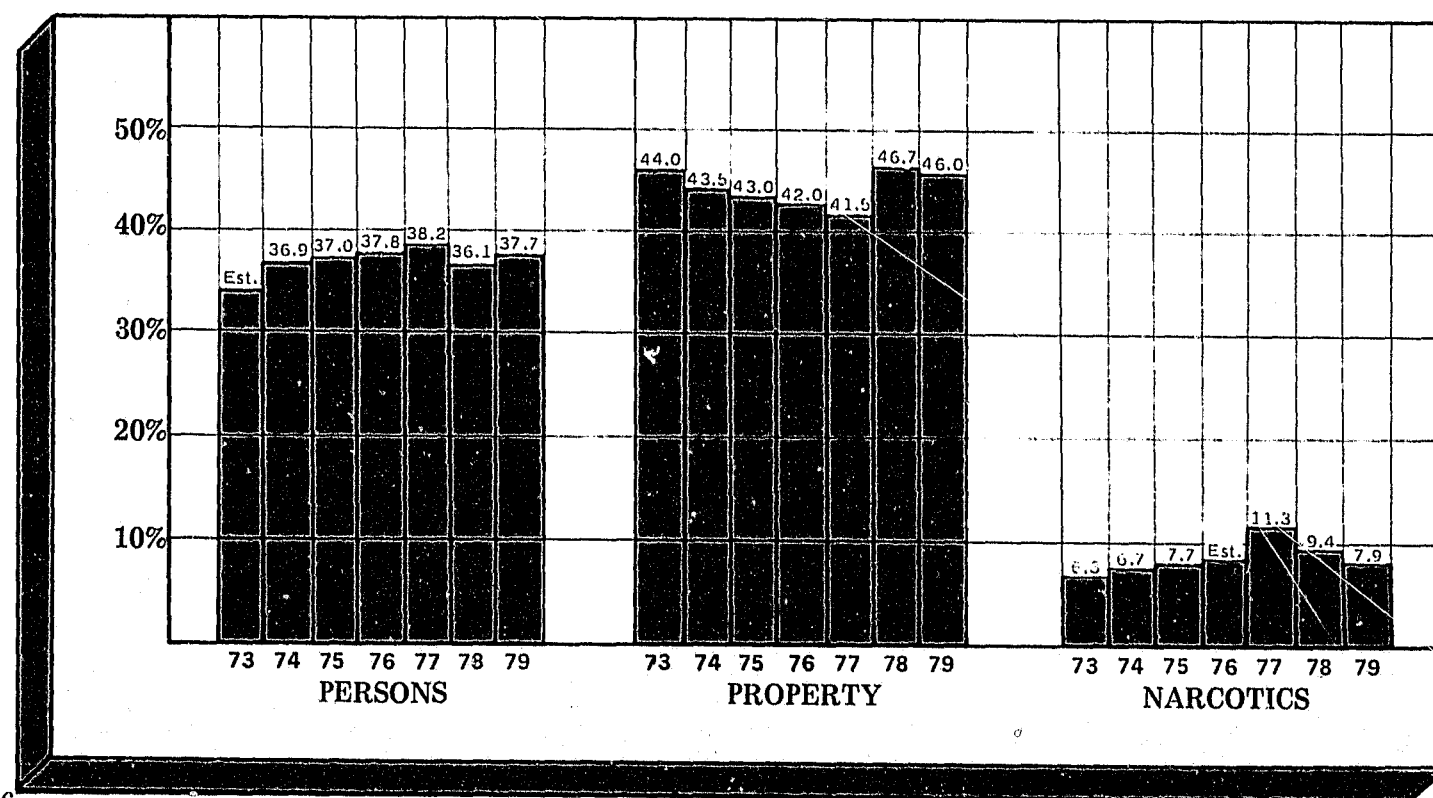

Among the data illustrated are the crimes for which inmates are incarcerated, the population growth in each prison, GED program testing results and critical incidents in each prison.

This section also contains statistics on Michigan State Industries and the Office of Health Care.

Michigan State Industries, operated by the Bureau of Prison Industries, employs about 900 inmates in a wide variety at manufacturing and service units at the State Prison of Southern Michigan, the Michigan Reformatory and Marquette Branch Prison. Industries also are planned for Huron Valley Women's Facility and the Kinross Correctional Facility.

The Office of Health Care directs all health care services for the department and operates a psychiatric hospital at the Riverside Correctional Facility in Ionia. These charts and tables illustrate use of medical and dental services by prisoners during 1979.

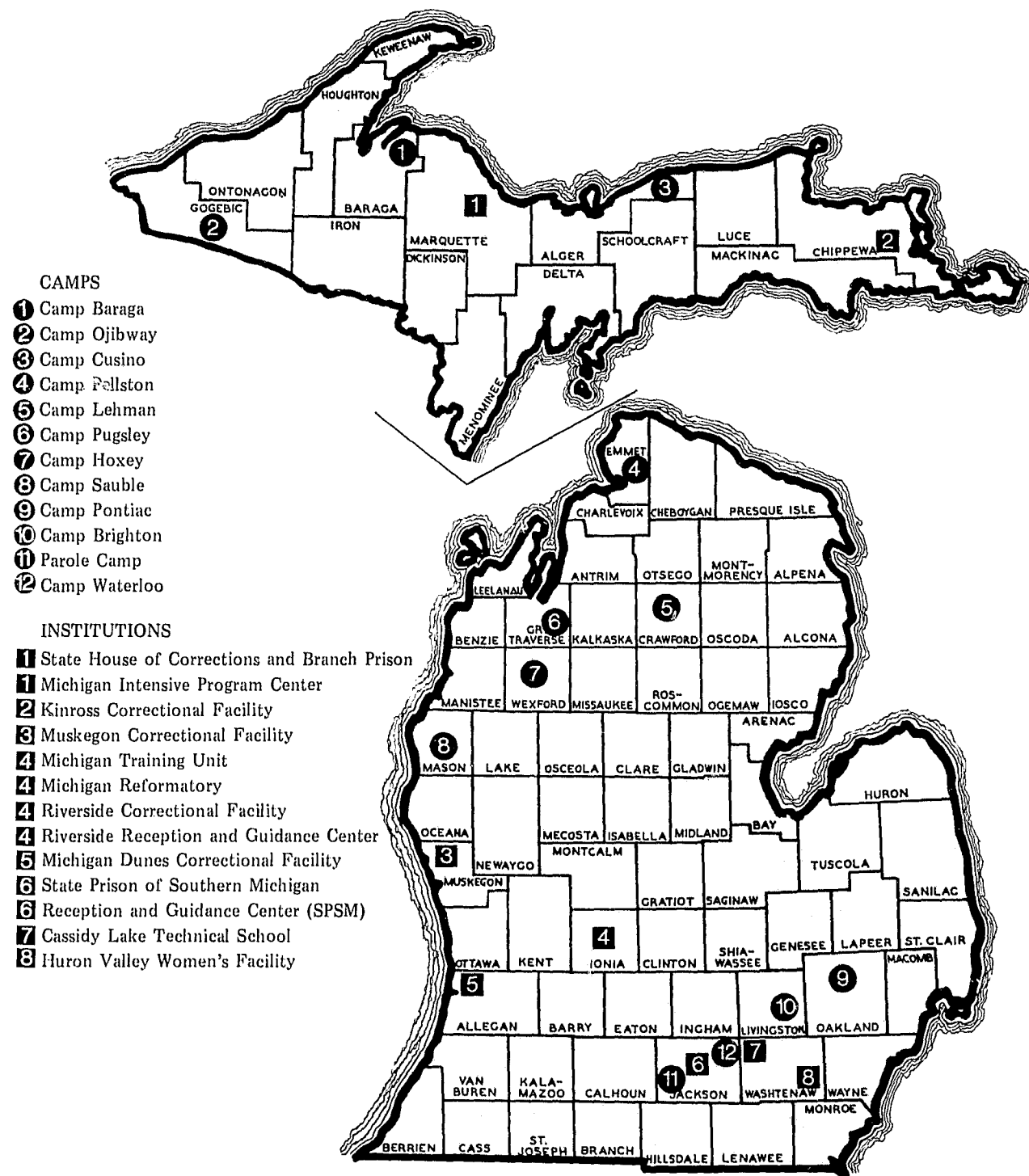

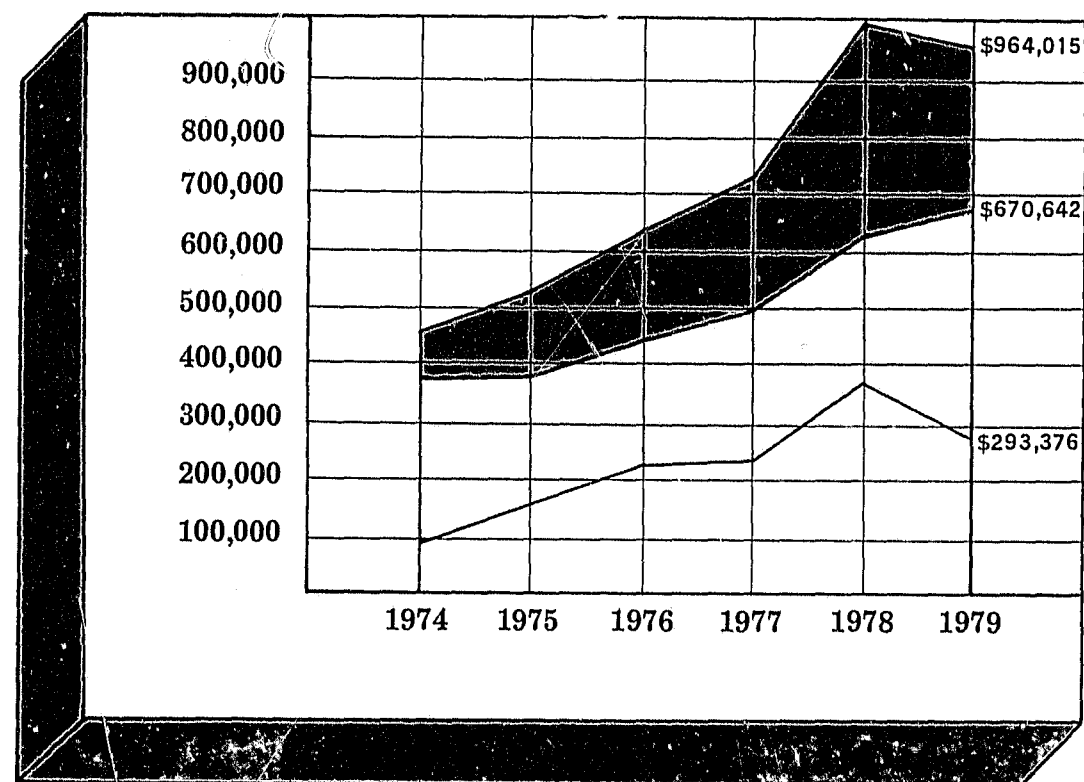

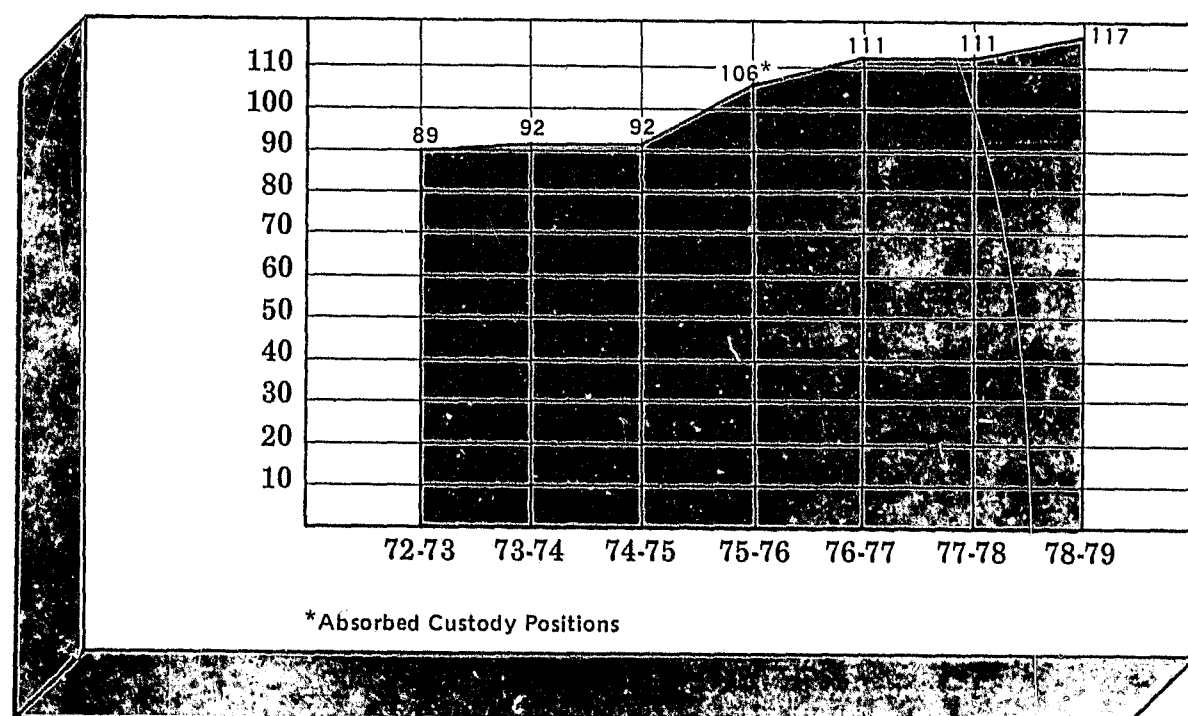
MICHIGAN STATE INDUSTRIES - Total Inmate Wages

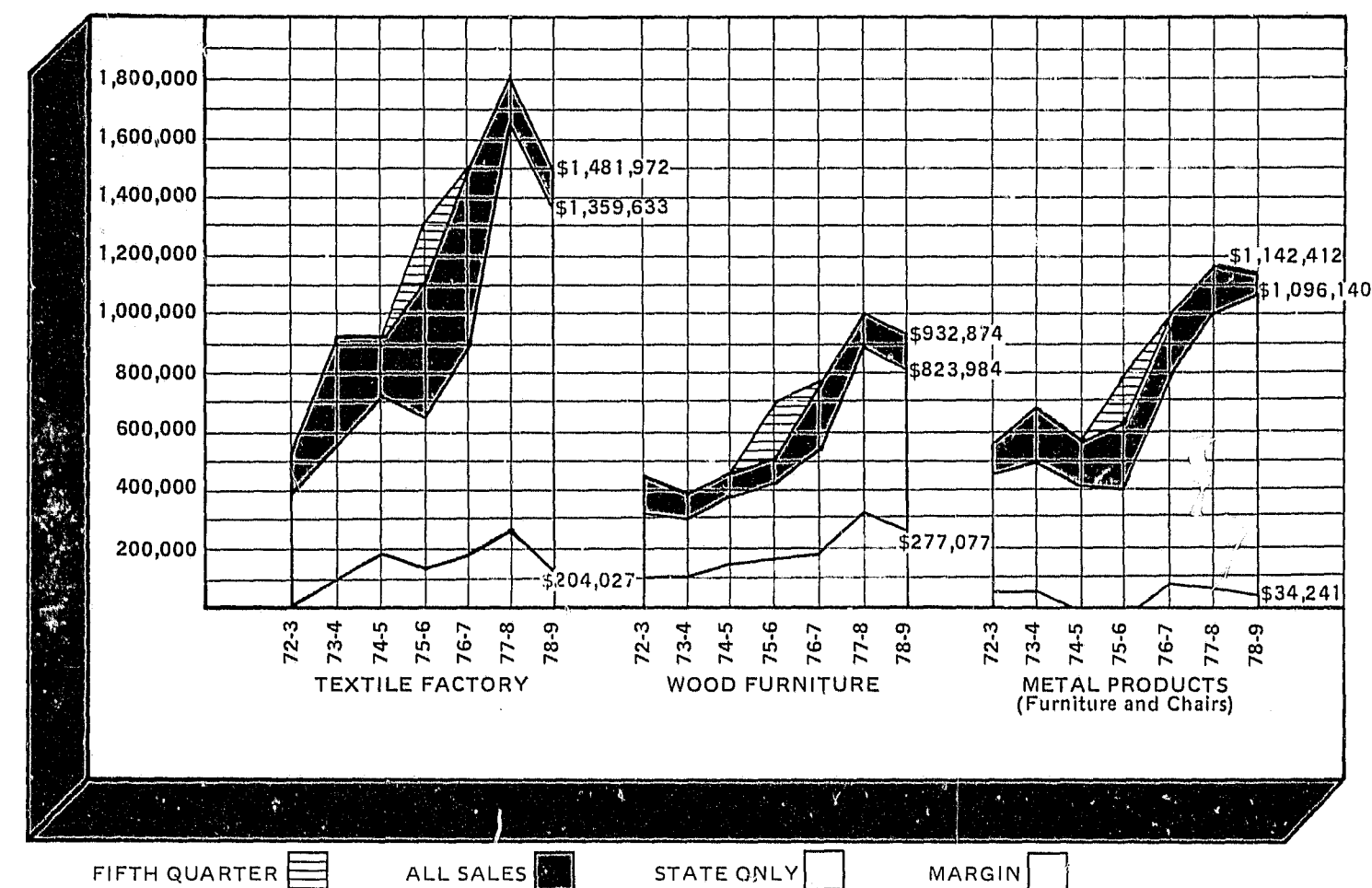

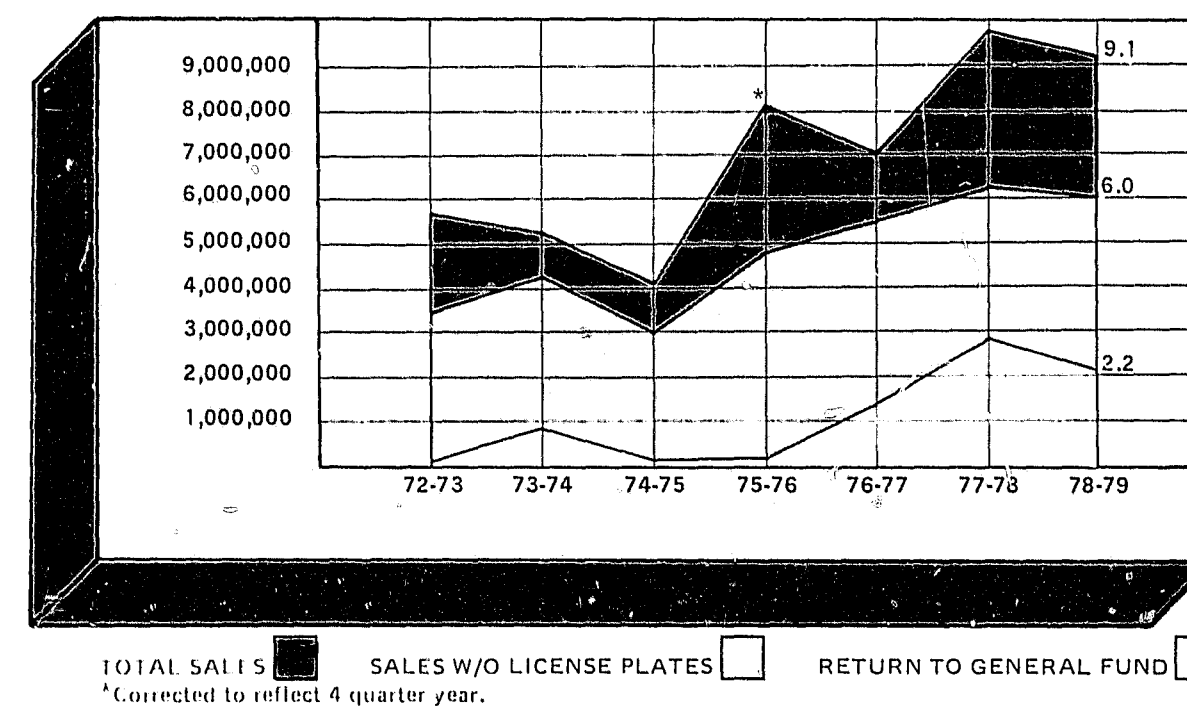
M.S.I. Sales History - Three Largest Factories

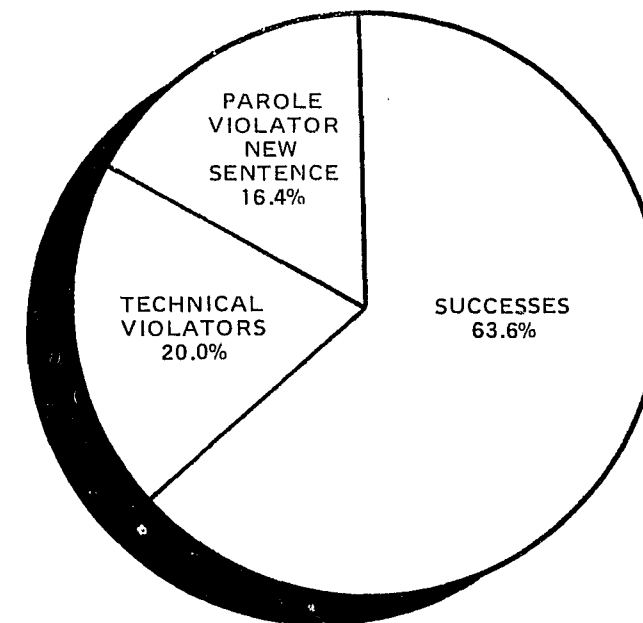

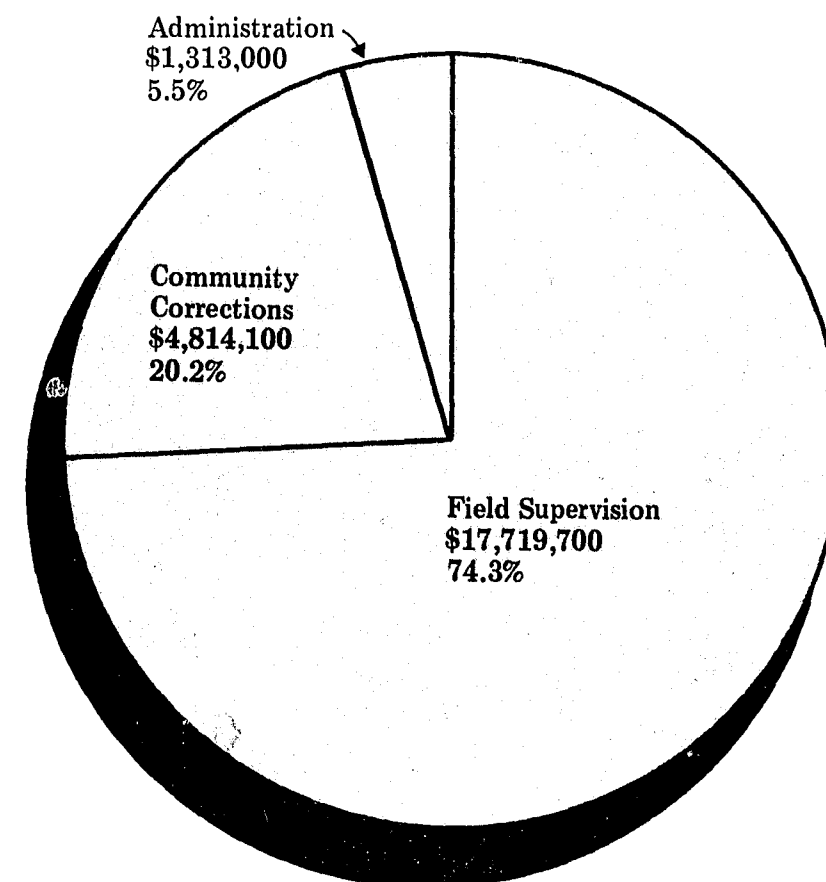
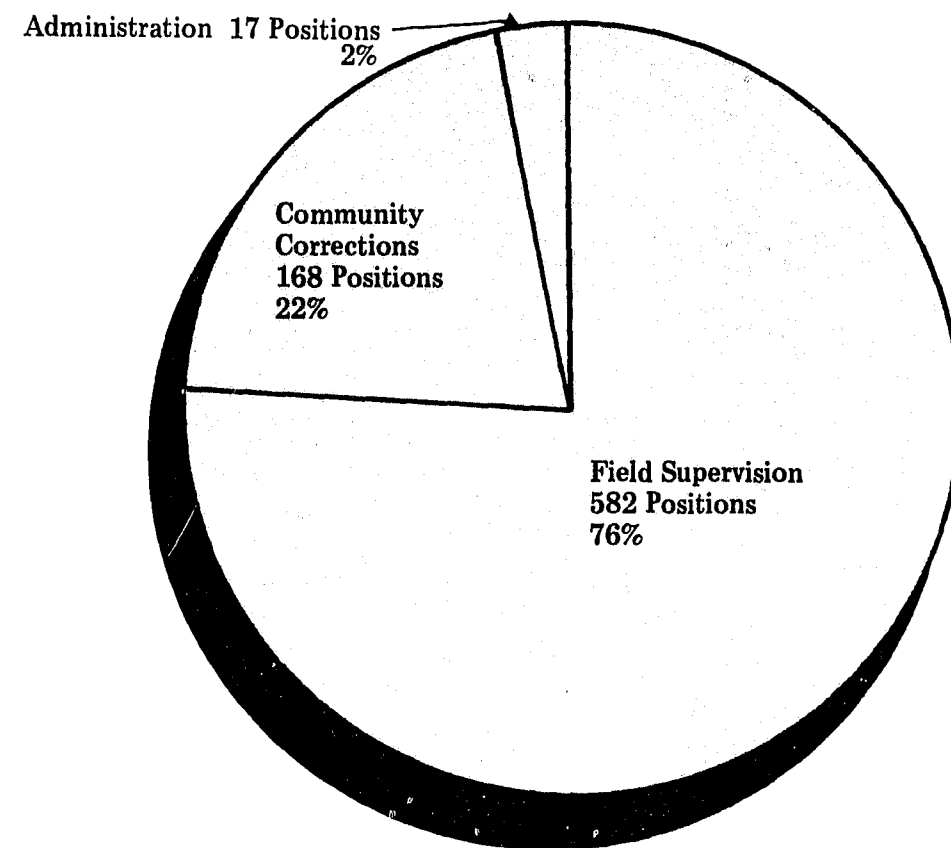


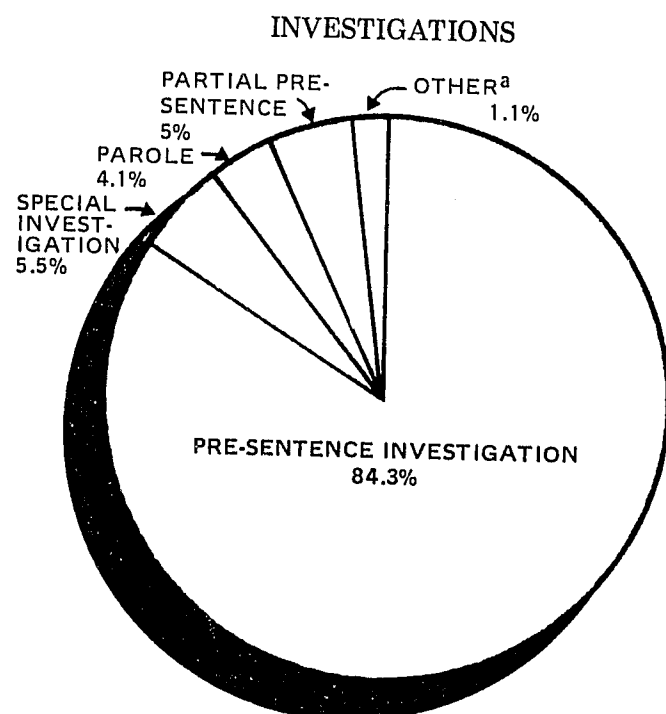
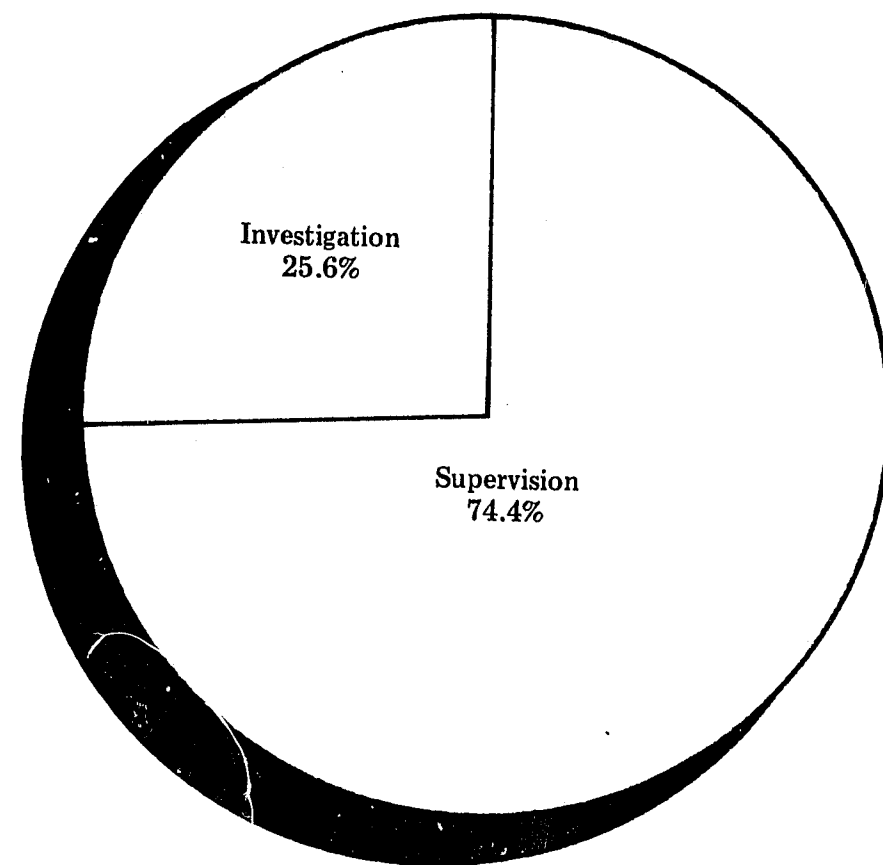
Field Supervision

All parolees and all felons placed on probation in Michigan are supervised by employees of the Bureau of Field Services. However, in some counties probation officers are employees of the county. Charts on restitution were not available at the time of publication. Statistics on probation terminations also were not available.

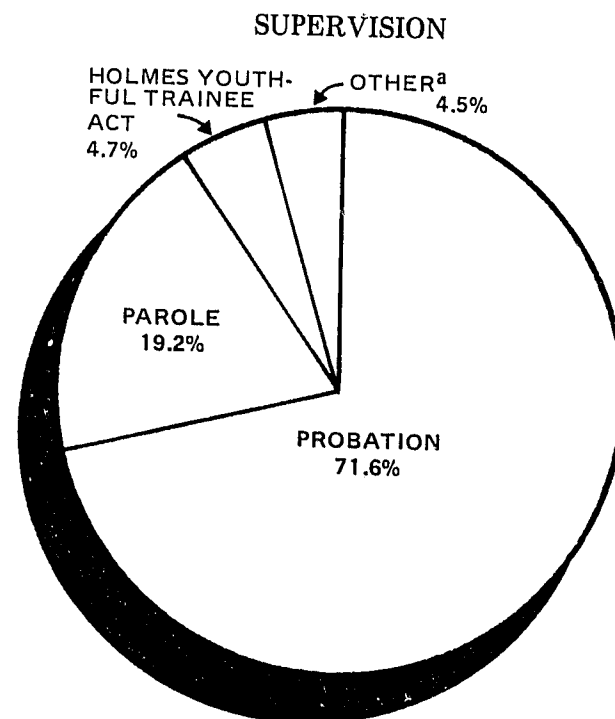


E-1 illustrates the Bureau of Field Service's personnel and funding distributions for fiscal 1979.



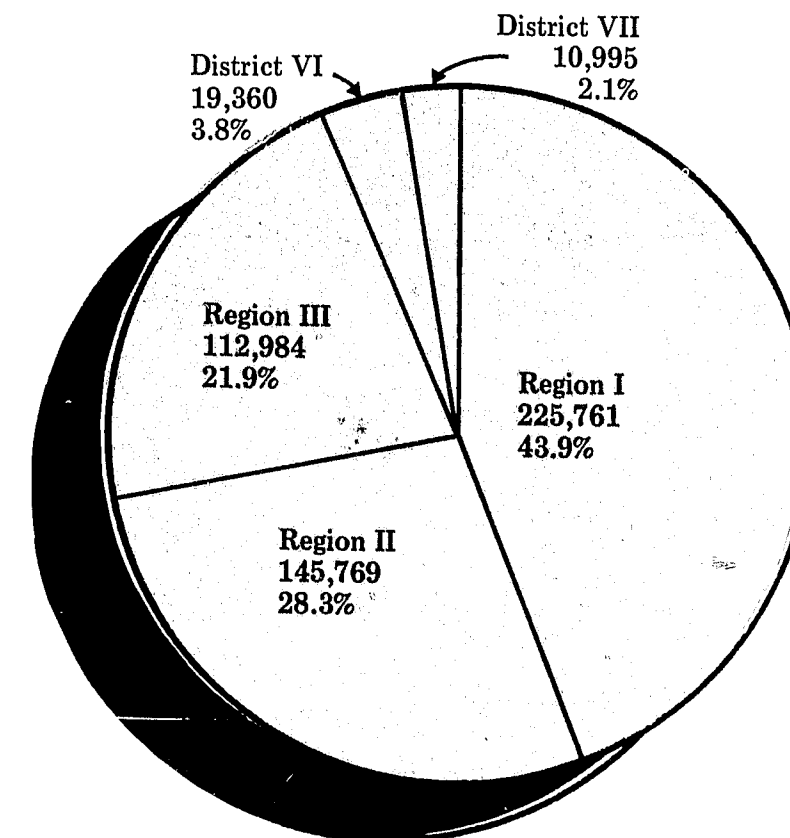


^aResident Home, Furloughs

It can be seen that most of the Bureau's time is spent in supervising parolees and probationers. In the area of supervision, 71 per cent of the time is spent on probationers and 19 per cent on parolees. In the area of investigation, 84 per cent of the Bureau's time goes into pre-sentence investigations.



The Bureau measures workloads by assigning unit values to the various tasks. As an example, each completed pre-sentence investigation equals 5 units and each client supervised is counted as one unit.

The pie-graph represents the total amount of parole and probation work units done during 1979 by state and county parole and probation agents.

In most Michigan counties parole and probation agents each have about 75 work units. Several counties have 50 for experimental purposes.

Community Programs

Community Programs is a unit within the Bureau of Field Services. It is responsible for the operation of the department's community-based corrections program. The statistical charts and graphs illustrate the unit's activities and growth in 1979.

Program Movement **F-1**

F-1 shows while program expansion continued, the +11.4% change in intake was only about a third of the 1978 rate (+32.9%). If this rate remains low or decreases further during 1980, it will indicate a trend toward leveling off of the count.

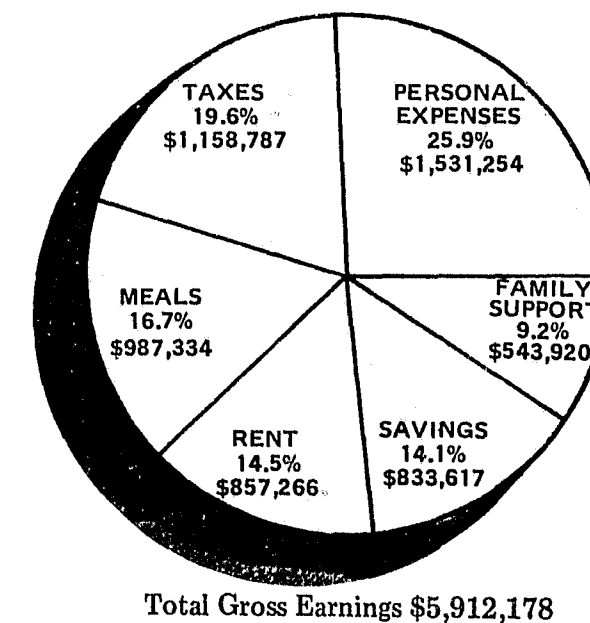

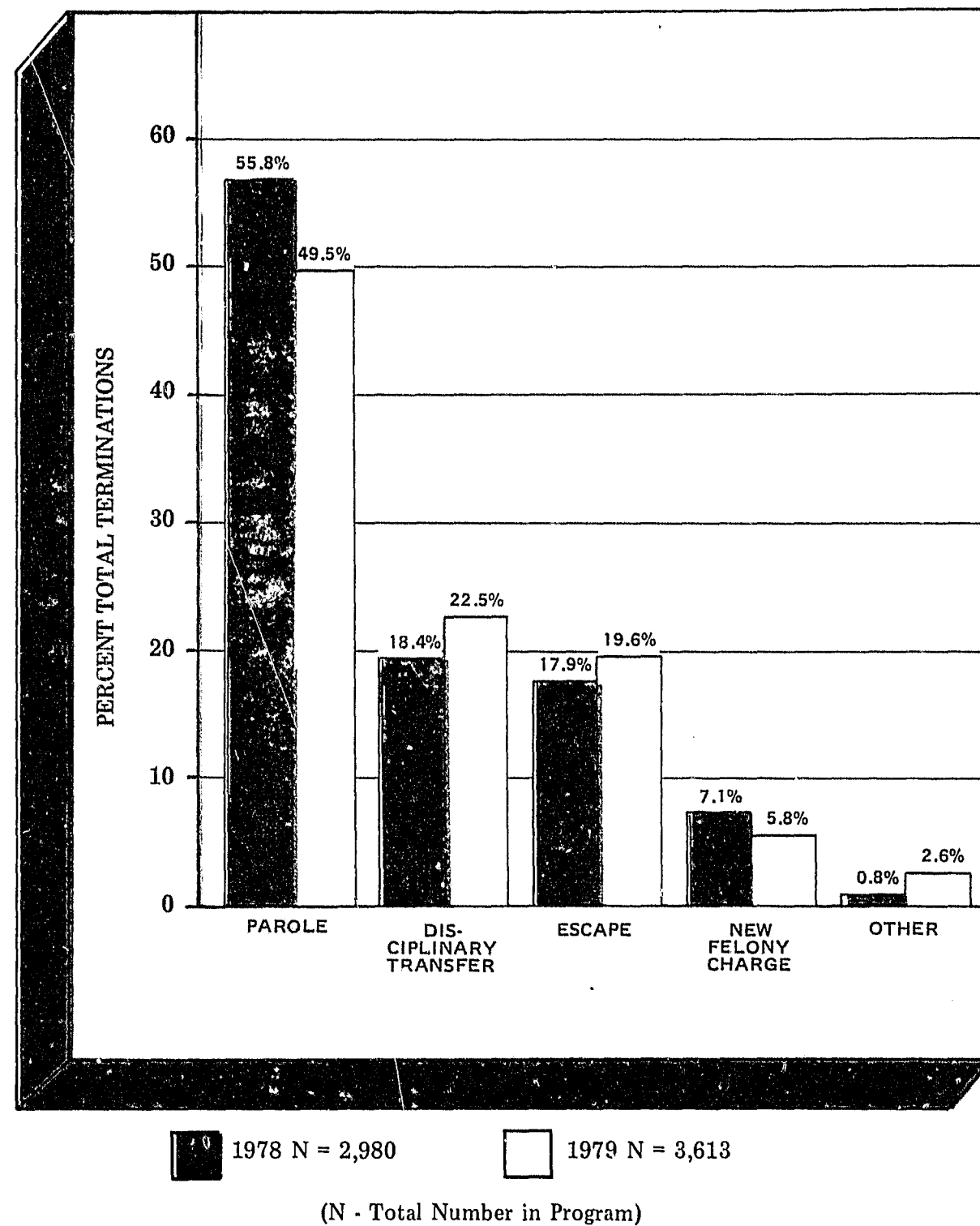
Resident Income **F-3**

F-4a Total Terminations; 1978 - 1979 Comparison

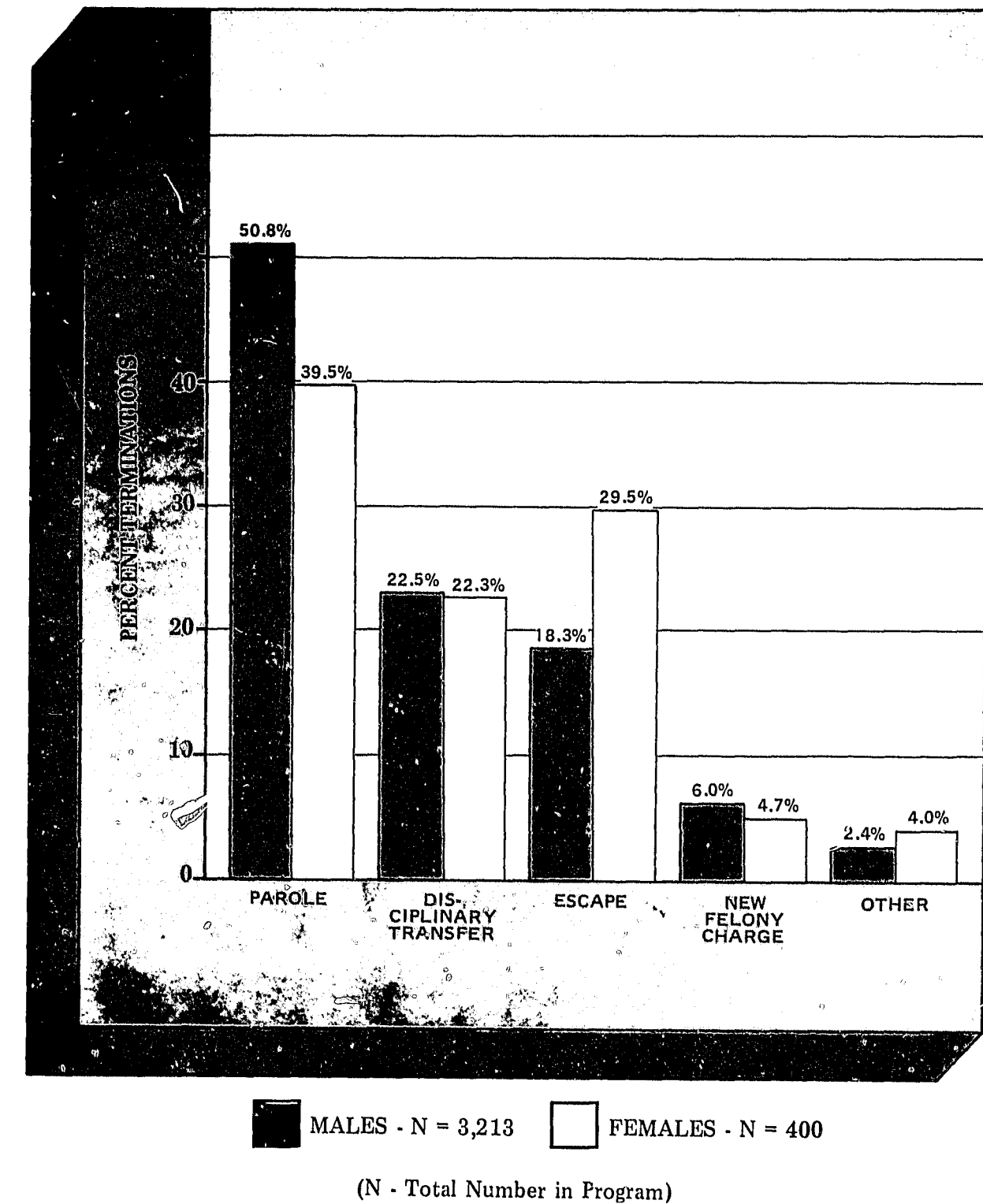

Male - Female Termination Comparison

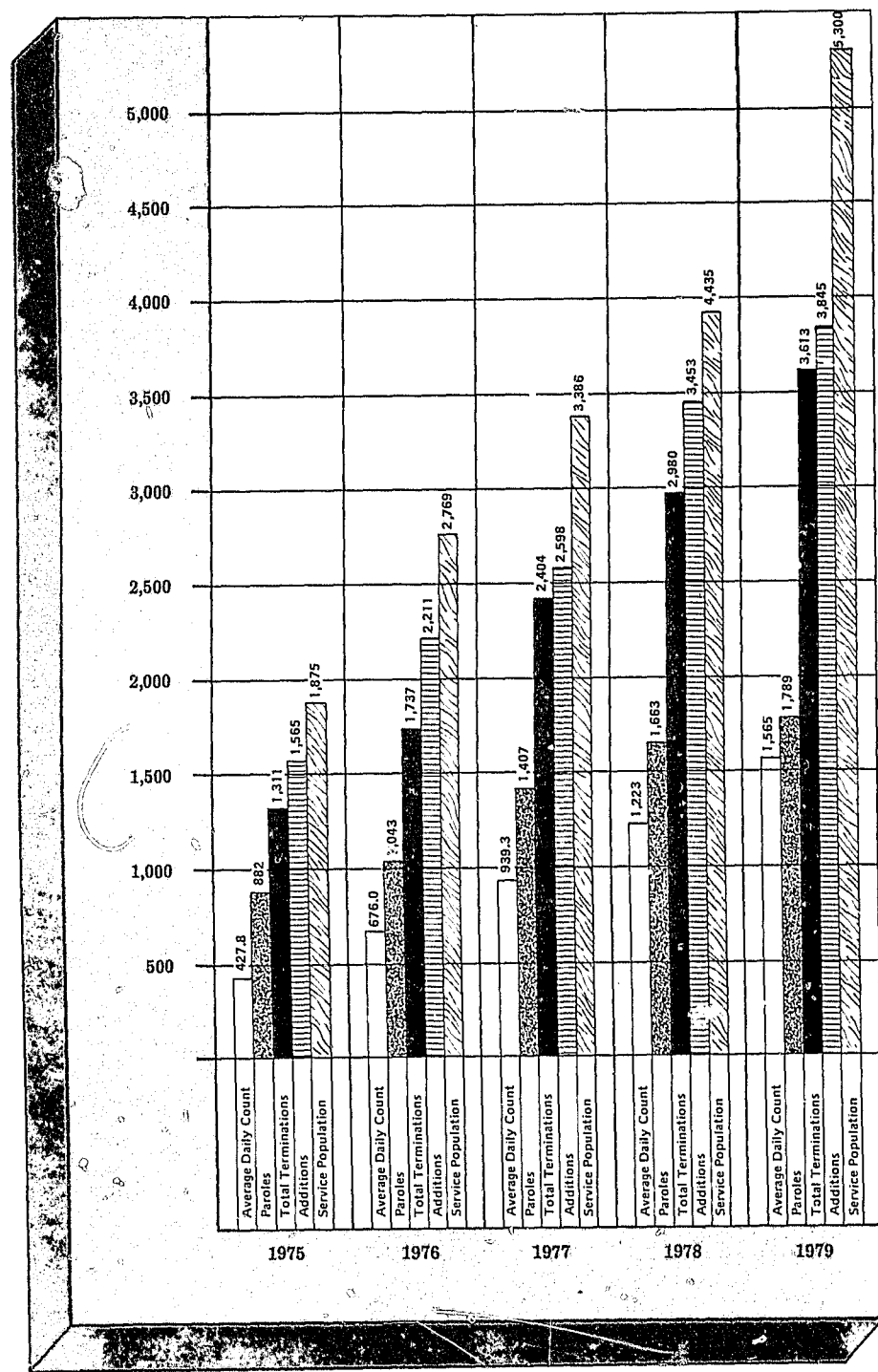

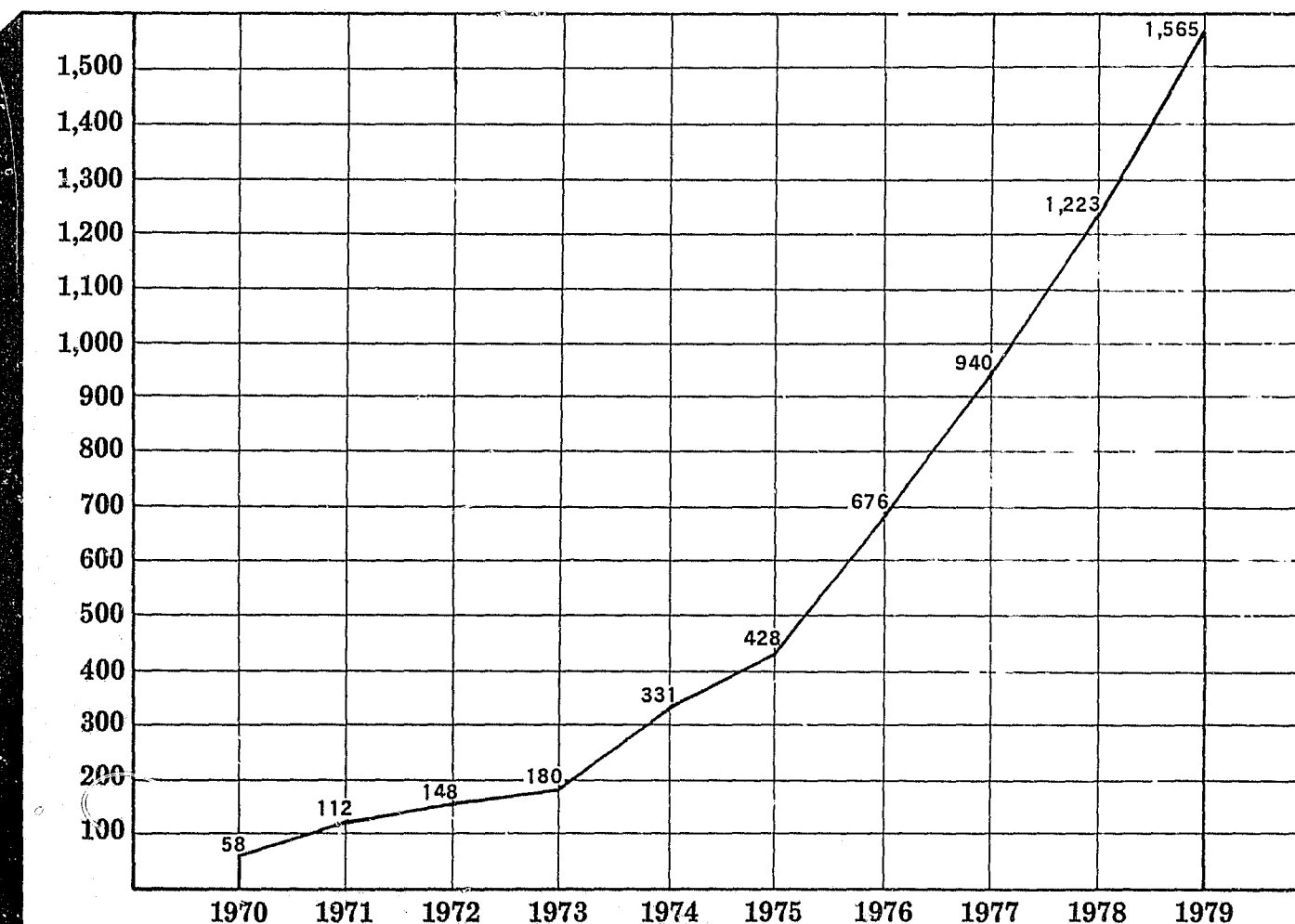

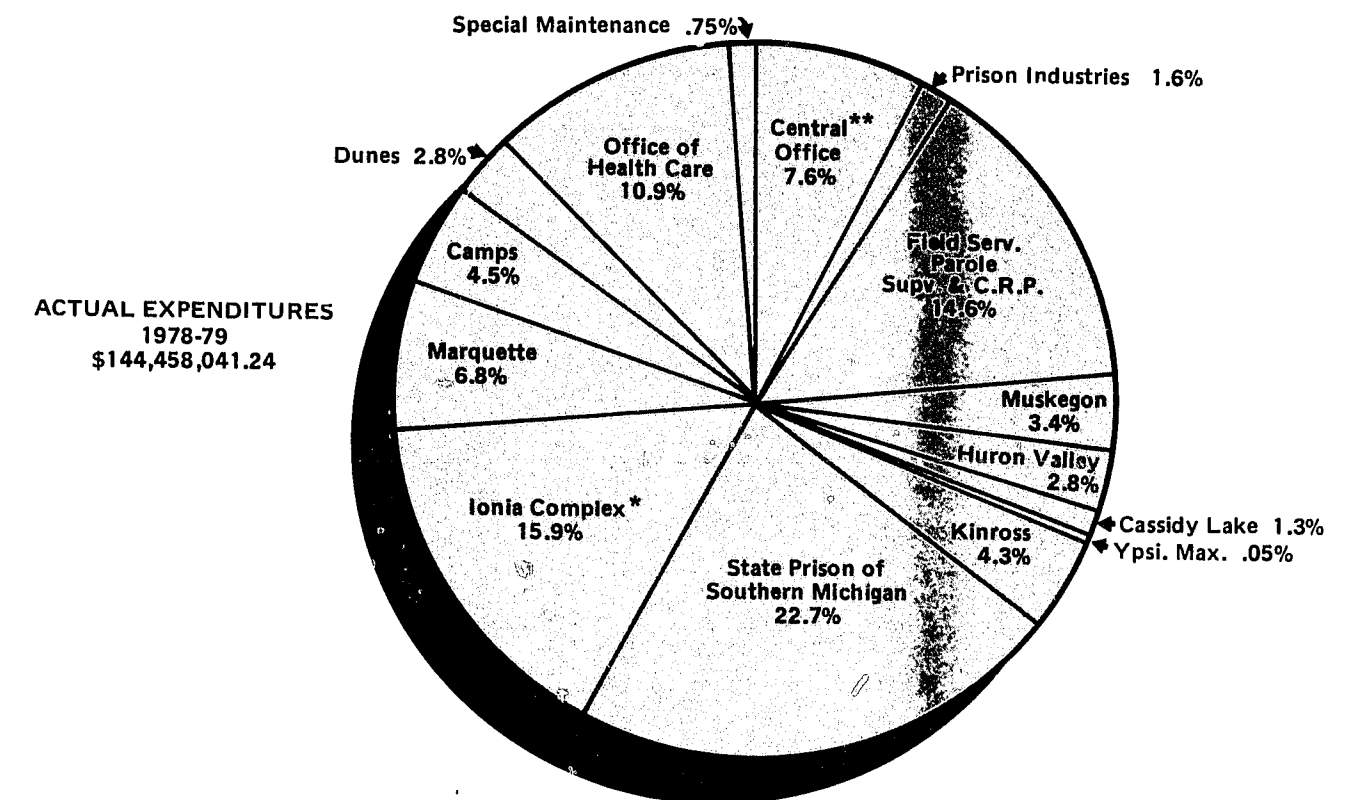

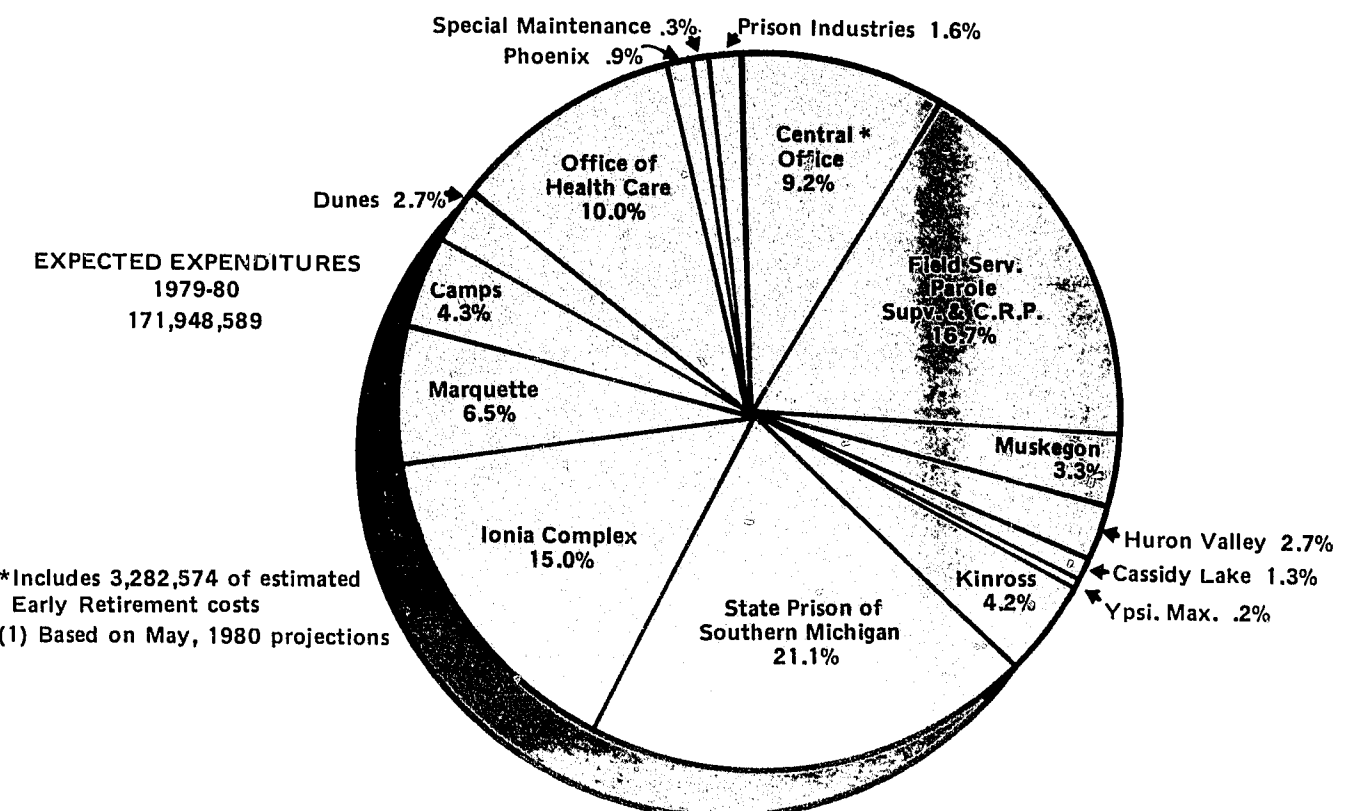

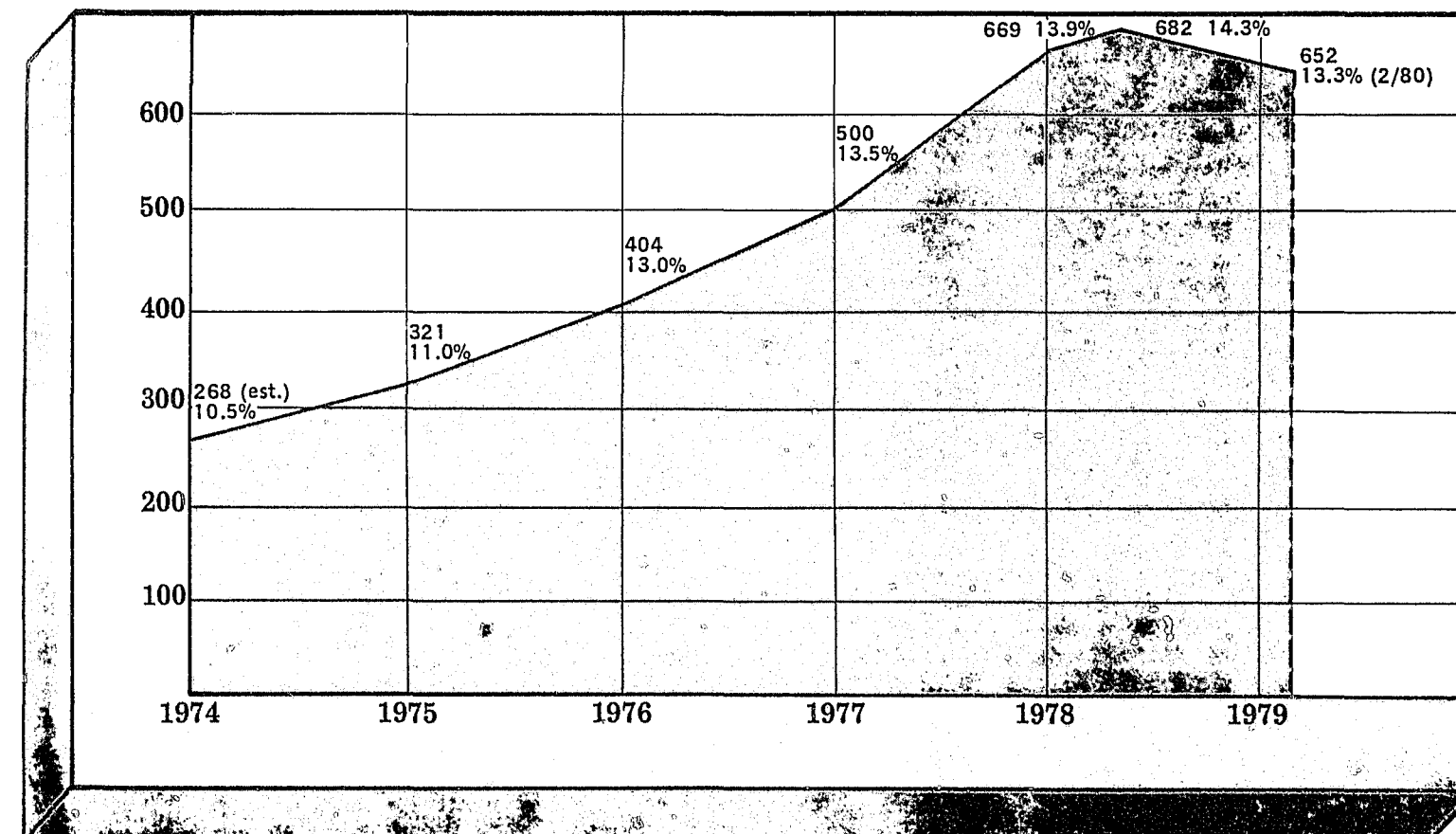
