

COMMUNITY YOUTH OFFICER PROGRAM

In accordance with the provisions of Division of Criminal Justice Services Grant Award #D-2381, C-112368 entitled "Buffalo Police Department Community Youth Officer Program", I wish to submit the following Final Report.

Introduction

In early 1976, Mr. Grant Hanesworth, Director of the Buffalo Metro Planning Area and his staff made an in-depth analysis of serious crime committed within the City of Buffalo, especially juvenile crime, in order that some idea as to the frequency and geographic distribution of all crime and juvenile crime could be achieved. The information realized from this in-depth analysis was to be used to plan for a juvenile crime prevention program in cooperation with the Juvenile Bureau of the Buffalo Police Department. The analysis specifically identified the amount of crime reported to the Buffalo Police Department during the period 1973 through 1975. The analysis also identified the total number of juvenile offenders between the ages of 16 and 20 years and showed numbers of juvenile offenders taken into custody on various charges.

Using this data, it was felt that a new and innovative approach should be taken in combating juvenile crime. It

was readily realized that the Buffalo Police Department
Juvenile Bureau was woefully understaffed and could not cope
with the mounting number of juvenile offenders and offenses
coming to their attention. It was felt that the Department
should take a fresh approach in dealing with this problem
and hopefully the amount of juvenile offenders and offenses
committed by juveniles could be considerably reduced. It
was agreed that the only logical approach would be to
develop a program that would appreciably increase the
number of Officers involved in juvenile work and to direct
this program on a Precinct level rather than from a Headquarters level.

As a result of this study it was agreed to by the Police Commissioner and the Director of Buffalo Metro Planning Area to apply for a grant that would fund the salaries of approximately 60 Police Officers and their daily tasks would be devoted entirely to dealing with juveniles and juvenile problems.

Funding

The Buffalo Metro Planning Area submitted a grant request to the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for a Juvenile Youth Officer Program. The grant included a budget of \$1,302,777.00. This included a Federal contribution of \$300,000 or 23.03% and a local cash match of \$1,002,777.00

or 76.97% of the total budget. The budget was to cover the services of 60 Police Officers at \$13,000 per year each for a period of one (1) year. In addition, fringe benefits of 57.3% of the Officers' salaries were included in the budget request. The primary purpose of the Grant Award was to create racially mixed Police Community Youth Officer teams in each of the City's 14 Police Precincts. The teams were to concentrate all their efforts on the delivery of services to youth while, at the same time, remaining available for any emergency situation that might happen to arise. The actual grant period was to cover the period from December 27, 1976 through December 31, 1977.

Justification

During the year 1973, approximately 24,017 actual Index crimes were reported to the Police. During the year 1974, this number of crimes increased to 26,375 Index crimes and during the year 1975, 29,880 Index crimes were reported to the Buffalo Police Department. During the year 1976, 31,140 Index crimes were reported to the Police.

During 1973, the total number of juvenile offenders from the age 16 through 20 years increased from 3,269 in 1973 to 3,579 in 1974; an increase of 9.5%. The total number of youths in the 16 through 20 year age bracket involved in arrests increased by 8.3% during that period. In 1973, there were 2,532 youths involved in arrests while

in 1974, there were 2,741 youths arrested.

During the year 1973, the number of juvenile offenders in the 12 through 15 years of age bracket increased from 769 in 1973 to 1,690 in 1974. This represents an increase of 119.76%. This figure includes an increase of Arson of 333.33% from 1973 to 1974. During the same period, Assault increased over 170%, Burglary and Criminal Trespass increased 37%, Criminal Possession of Stolen Property over 2,000%, as did Disorderly Conduct, Drug-related offenses increased over 1,000%, Drunkenness increased 166% and Homicide decreased by 7.5% in 1974. Rape increased by 100% and Robbery increased 89%. Weapons increased over 71% during the same period. Another problem that surfaced during the period was the voluntary bussing program being undertaken by the Buffalo Board of Education. It was anticipated that with implementation of this program, many problems with juveniles of both races would ensue and it was hoped that a program of this type would resolve some of the problems that would be encountered. Even during normal school hours at the beginning of the term in early September, problems existed between the White and Black youths attending school and also persons not attending school who utilized the public transportation system in the City in the vicinity of the various High Schools.

Goals

The primary goals of this Program were to provide the

Buffalo Police Department with a highly trained Juvenile Youth Officer Cadre composed of approximately 60 members. This group would be developed at the Precinct level rather than at the Headquarters level and would deal primarily with juvenile problems that existed in a particular Precinct. Also, problems that would transcend Precinct boundaries would also be addressed in addition to problem areas brought to the attention of the juvenile group by the Headquarters Juvenile Bureau. These Officers would deal with not only the prevention and control of juvenile crime and anti-social behavior, but they would also address the concerns of the various groups within a community who might possibly be the victims of juvenile offenders.

Program Tasks

Prior to the onset of the Program, 60 Civilian Report
Technicians in the Buffalo Police Department were returned
to their prior status as Police Officers. Then 60 Police
Officer volunteers were solicited for re-assignment to the
new Community Youth Officer Program. For the most part,
Officers had to meet certain criteria before they would
pass the screening process, i.e., academic achievements,
demonstrated services, ability to relate to various
community interests and the ability to act as a counselor
and advisor to the juvenile population in his particular

precinct. A C.Y.O. Daily Activity Report was devised which included among other things, the number of juvenile arrests effected by the Precinct C.Y.O. team, the juveniles who were referred to the Juvenile Bureau or referral to some other non-judicial agency such as the Buffalo Division for Youth, crimes investigated by the C.Y.O. team in which juveniles were either the offenders or the victims, all adult arrests effected by the team, juvenile contacts in which no arrest was made, meetings and seminars attended by the C.Y.O. team which would include school meetings and Precinct Community Council meetings and special problems that were investigated by the C.Y.O. team. The Daily Activity Report also included the total calls responded to by the team, both emergency and youth-related and the mileage accumulated each tour of duty along with the particular tour worked, the vehicle number and the radio call number. The Activity Report also included space for additional information that the C.Y.O. Officers received during the course of their tour of duty and the special investigations that were conducted by them. The Community Youth Officers also maintained at their Precinct Station House a profile book in which they entered and identified current crime problems, problem locations, agenda for Citizen and Precinct Community Council meetings and other information that would be pertinent to their program. The

C.Y.O. teams also met monthly with each other to discuss current problems, to review their operations, to assist other teams in analysis and solution of their problems and to pool information that they had accumulated on criminal activities which might possibly be helpful to other C.Y.O. teams in the City. Where possible, C.Y.O. teams were selected that would include a minority and a non-minority Police Officer. In some instances this was impossible because many minority Officers were satisfied with their current assignments and did not wish to relinquish them for transfer to this temporary program. All of the C.Y.O. teams were excused from answering calls other than emergencytype calls within their Precinct and were instructed to devote the major part of their work day to Police/Community/Youth activities. The calls that they were to respond to were clearly defined and random checks were made of their Radio Logs and Activity Reports to indicate to their superiors that these instructions were being followed. A one-week in-service training course was devised by the Project Director and Police Academy personnel, which included among other topics, classes on delinquency; causes and prevention, delinquency control, the psychology of juvenile delinquency, juvenile rights, the Law relative to abused and neglected children, Family Court procedures relative to juveniles, alcoholism amongst juveniles, proper police procedures when dealing with juveniles, availability of

outreach services for juveniles, investigative techniques when encountering juvenile victims of sex crimes, race relations amongst juveniles, liaison with the Board of Education Attendance Officers, New York State Stop and Frisk Law with special emphasis on juvenile encounters, methods of intervention with juveniles and finally, a critique and assessment of curriculum content.

In addition to the regular in-service training that the Officers received prior to working in the Program, all of the Officers attended a juvenile training session at the Highland Training Institute, Highland, New York, which was sponsored by the New York State Executive Department, Division for Youth. This three-day training seminar included classes on youth program development, community youth problem solving, youth counseling techniques and communication skills developed for youth work. Most of the Officers who attended this training seminar felt that it was most beneficial to them and they felt that much of the success of the C.Y.O. Program was due in no small part to the Officers having attended this seminar.

In order that this Program might function optimally, it was believed that a tight structuring would be necessary to insure that the Officers and their superiors would follow the guidelines as set forth in the contract from

the Division of Criminal Justice Services.

The Community Youth Officer Program was placed within the organizational structure of the Buffalo Police Department directly under control of the Commanding Officer of the Division of Patrol.

In December of 1976, the Commissioner of Police ordered all Captains and Inspectors to attend a meeting in his office in order that the guidelines and objectives and goals of the Program could be explained. The goals of the Program were described to the Precinct Captains; namely, to establish better rapport between the Police Officer and the youth in the community, to enhance the quality of juvenile justice by diverting juvenile offenders to community agencies including, but not restricted to, the Buffalo Division for Youth as an alternative for Family Court action where there was no threat to the Community or the juveniles themselves, to reduce the amount of criminal mischief occurring in schools and public transportation conveyances, to minimize and stabilize conflicts and tensions between Black and White students in integrated junior high schools in particular, to reduce the number of crimes committed by juveniles against elderly persons; especially crimes against the person, to establish bridges of communication between the youth in the community and the other residents which would be accomplished

by periodic meetings between the Youth Officers, Community Leaders and representatives of the Precinct/Community Councils and to attempt the reduction of all crimes committed by juveniles in the under 16 age group. The Precinct Commanders were advised that the Community Youth Officer teams in each precinct would be supervised directly by the Lieutenant whose platoon was on duty at the time. The hours of operation of the Program would be seven days a week between 8:00 A.M. and 12:00 Midnight. One team would work during the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 4:00 P.M. and the other team would work from 4:00 P.M. to 12:00 Midnight. These hours could be changed periodically to respond to special occasions or changes in juvenile crime patterns or community needs and would be subject to the approval of the Precinct Captain and the Program Director. Each Precinct was directed to have one (1) Community Youth Officer team mobile unit on duty each day from 4:00 P.M. to 12:00 Midnight. Certain precincts; namely, Precinct #3, 4, 6, 10, 12 and 16 were also directed to operate a C.Y.O. mobile unit from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. to handle special problems which would be particular to those precincts. The duties of the C.Y.O. teams were explained and included the following:

a) Community Youth Officer Units were responsible for the apprehension, questioning and processing of all juvenile offenders subject to the provisions of Chapter 3/18 of our Manual of Procedures.

- b) C.Y.O. Units were directed to make every effort to attend Precinct Community Council meetings within their respective precincts and report thereon to their Commanding Officers any recommendations that they might have for the solution of problems or complaints brought to their attention at the various meetings.
- c) C.Y.O. teams were directed to develop seminars in the high schools and junior high schools in their respective precincts explaining the role of the Police in the community and how important that role was to the youth in the precinct.
- d) When Community Youth Officers were called upon by school authorities for assistance, they were directed to promptly investigate any juvenile crime, violence, disorder or other incident occurring on school property in accordance with existing departmental policy.
- e) The C.Y.O. teams were directed to maintain a close liaison with the members of the Security Division of the Buffalo Board of Education.

The Captains were also advised that the Community
Youth Officer Units should maintain Radio contact at
all times with the Radio Dispatcher and that they would
be subject to all of the Radio Discipline and Procedures
as enumerated in our Manual of Procedures.

The Commanding Officers were advised of their responsibilities, which would include the following:

- a) Each Precinct Commander was to be held strictly responsible for seeing that this detail was filled each tour of duty as called for in the Temporary Order of Procedure.
- b) Each Precinct Commander was to check the Community Youth Officer team at intervals to insure that the team was performing the duties as specified in this Order.
- c) Each Precinct Commander was directed to forward to the Precinct Director each Monday morning a report on the form provided, showing the deployment of Community Youth Officer Units for the previous week.
- d) Each Precinct Commander was directed to assign a specific marked vehicle for the permanent use of the Community Youth Officer Unit in his precinct.
- e) The Precinct Commander was also directed to forward each week to the Project Director, a report listing the activities of each C.Y.O. team for the previous week.

The Police Commissioner advised all Precinct

Commanders that they would be held strictly responsible

for the proper operation of this Program in their

respective precincts. He also elaborated upon the

institution of this Program in the Department and was confident that with the cooperation of the Precinct Captain and the Community Youth Officers, that all of the goals and objectives of the Program would be achieved.

Findings

Recapitulation of the Community Youth Officer Program
Activity Reports indicate that members of the Unit made
432 juvenile arrests, they referred 563 juveniles to the
various Courts and Social Agencies, they investigated
1,143 crimes in which juveniles were involved either as
victims or perpetrators, they effected 1,091 adult arrests
and made 2,997 juvenile contacts. The Units assigned to
the various precincts also attended 2,202 meetings and
seminars relative to juveniles, they investigated 1,545
special problems involving juveniles, they responded to
14,127 emergency-type calls and 13,871 youth-related calls.
They also conducted 386 investigations in which juveniles
were involved. During the Program period, Officers drove
in excess of 255,101 miles.

A listing of the juvenile arrests for 1977 as compared to 1976, the year previous to the Grant Award, indicated the following: Arrest for Arson went from 12 in 1976 to 4 in 1977, a reduction of 66.7%; arrests for Assault in 1977 were 54 as compared to 55 the previous year, a decrease

of 1.8%; arrests for Burglary and Criminal Trespass in 1977 amounted to 214 as compared to 245 the previous year, a reduction of 12.6%; arrests for Criminal Possession of Stolen Property in 1977 amounted to 52 as compared to 64 the previous year, a reduction of 18.8%; arrests for Disorderly Conduct in 1977 amounted 52 as compared to 62 the previous year, a decrease of 16.1%; arrests for Drugs during the year 1977 totalled 28 as compared to 44 the previous year, a reduction of 36.3%; there were no arrests in 1977 for Public Intoxication as compared to 3 for the previous year, a reduction of 100%; there were 86 arrests for violations of the Family Court Act during 1977 as compared to 152 the previous year, a reduction of 43.4%; during 1977 there were no Homicide arrests for juveniles as compared to 2 arrests the previous year, a reduction of 100%. During the year 1977, there were 264 juvenile arrests for Larceny as compared to 172 arrests the previous year, a decrease of 34.8%; arrests for Prostitution during 1977 amounted to 7 as compared to 6 during the previous year, an increase of 14.3%; in 1977 there were 4 arrests for Rape as compared to 5 the previous year, a reduction of 20%; there were 50 arrests for Robbery during 1977 as compared to 77 the previous year, a reduction of 35.1%; during 1977 there were 121 Runaways as compared to 133 the previous year, a reduction of 9%.

During 1977 there were 7 arrests for Sex Offenses as compared to 9 arrests the previous year, a reduction of 22.2%; arrests for Unauthorized Use of Vehicles during the year 1977 totalled 121 as compared to 108 the previous year, an increase of 10.7%; there were 90 arrests during 1977 for Criminal Mischief as compared to 80 the previous year, an increase of 11.1%; there were 16 arrests during 1977 for various Weapons charges as compared to 23 the previous year, a reduction of 30.4%; and there were 28 arrests for other offenses during 1977 as compared to 61 the previous year, a reduction of 54.1%. During the entire year 1977, the total offenses for which juvenile arrests were made amounted to 1,219 as compared to 1,358 the previous year, a decrease of 10.2%. Of the 19 Offenses that were categorized and compared for the years 1976 and 1977, there were 16 crimes for which juvenile arrests decreased and there were only 3 categories of crimes which showed any increase.

A report entitled "Age, Sex and Race of Persons Arrested Under 18 Years of Age" reveals that in 1977 there were 49 arrests of persons under 11 years of age as compared to 53 such persons during 1976; there were 80 juveniles in the 11-12 year age group arrested during 1977 as compared to 128 during 1976; during 1977 there were 94 juveniles arrested in the 13 years of age grouping as compared to 113 for the previous year; the report also discloses

that there were 198 juveniles arrested in the 14 years of age group during 1977 as compared to 186 juveniles arrested in that same age group the previous year. During the year 1977, there were 287 juveniles arrested who were in the age 15 group as compared to 323 juveniles who were arrested during the year 1976.

The same report revealed that there were 489 arrests of persons 16 years of age during 1977 as compared to 625 the previous year; during 1977 there were 569 arrests of persons 17 years of age as compared to 676 the previous year. During the year 1977, there were 1,766 persons under 18 years of age as compared to 2,104 persons who were arrested during the previous year in the inder 18 age group.

During the year 1977, there was a total of 26,350 Index Crimes reported to the Buffalo Police Department as compared to 25,942 during the previous year. During the year 1977, there were 22,255 Non-Index Crimes reported to the Department as compared to 28,465 the previous year.

As a condition of the Community Youth Officer Grant

Award, our Department was required to develop a questionnaire
which would hopefully assist us in evaluating the Program.

We distributed a limited number of these questionnaires to
those organizations that have had more than a casual contact
with the Community Youth Officer Program and its members.

Since many of the Officers spoke before student groups,

School Administrators, P.T.A. groups, Precinct Community
Councils and other organizations, questionnaires were
sent to these groups with the hope that they would give
us some idea as to the effectiveness of this Program and
more important, the responses would give us some direction
as to whether or not the Program should be continued in
the future. The response to our questionnaires was minimal,
but those who did respond were very pleased with the
operation of the Program and most felt that it should be
continued even on a limited basis. Some of the comments
received from the various organizations that came in
contact with the Community Youth Officers and their
Program were as follows:

Major Gordon A. Spicer, Divisional Secretary of the Salvation Army, stated "I think the Program had to have a positive effect on the youth; they saw the Officers as friends and not enemies".

Mrs. Wieder, Supervisor of the John F. Kennedy Center, stated "The students here at J.F.K. seem to display a better attitude toward the Police Officers than before, with respect and acceptance".

Mrs. Joanne Langhier, Program Director of School #44 at 1344 Broadway, in response to a question as to whether there was better rapport between the Police Officers and the students as a direct result of this Program, stated, "Yes; to a certain extent, there is a better understanding on the part of our youths as to the basic responsibilities

of the Police. This direct contact has made the difference in that they see the Officers as people, not just cops".

The Principal of the Martin Luther King Community School, in response to a question asking whether these Officers created a positive image for the Buffalo Police Department on their assignment as C.Y.O. members, stated, "Yes; due to answers to questions answered by Officers in small informal settings in classrooms, this Program did much to break down the psychological distance between youth and Police Officers. We are very high on this Program at the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Community School".

Reverend Harold Nuwer, Pastor of St. Nicholas Church and School on East Utica and Welker Streets, in response to a question asking, While this Program was in effect, was there any noticeable reduction in crime committed by the under 16 age group in your community, responded, "There was, in fact, a reduction in crime though I cannot say what this was directly attributed to; if only one was deterred from a life of crime it was beneficial, I really would not expect a remedy to our total crime problem through this one Program alone and I would highly recommend continuing this Program and that is why I am taking the time to fill this questionnaire. It is vital, however, who is assigned to the Program; they must be personable, interested and dedicated men".

The Principal of Public School #22, when asked if the Police Officers who were assigned to this Program bridged the communication gap between the youth in the community and the Police Officers, stated, "Yes; simply because they talked, mingled and became personally known among the youths in our community. In my opinion, it has helped tremendously".

Summary

We feel that the Community Youth Officer Program has achieved most of the goals that it set out to at its implementation. Although it is very difficult to accurately measure some achievements, it was felt that many of the results realized could be attested to by the attitudes and feelings of the recipients of the services that were delivered during a given period.

As mentioned previously, members of the Community
Youth Officer Program attended 2,202 meetings and seminars
during the Program period. This included visits to schools,
youth organizations, and some senior citizen groups. It was
felt that as a result of these meetings, a much better
rapport between the Police Officer and the youth in the
community was established. Another goal of the Program
was to enhance the quality of juvenile justice by diversion
of juvenile offenders to community agencies, including but
not restricted to, the Buffalo Youth Board as an alternative
to Family Court action where there was no threat to the Community

or the juveniles themselves. We feel that this goal has been achieved and this would appear to be verified by the considerable decrease in juvenile arrests during the year 1977 as compared to the previous year, 1976. I might also add that during the year following the Program period, i.e., 1978, there was a sharp increase in the number of juvenile arrests and that could be due, in part, to the termination of the Program and the departments addressing this problem on a very limited basis. Another goal of the Program was to reduce the amount of vandalism to schools and public transportation conveyances. In our Summary of Non-Index Crimes for the year 1977, there is a listing of 8,099 Criminal Mischief offenses reported to the police, which is a decrease over the previous year which listed a total of 8,140 similar offenses. Although this is not a significant decrease, it shows a reversal which more or less coincides with the trend for that year since a total of 22,255 Non-Index Crimes were reported to the police during 1977 as compared to 28,465 Non-Index Crimes reported in the previous year, 1976. During the year 1977, there were a total of 26,350 Index Crimes reported to our Department as compared to 25,942 for the previous year. Although this figure represents an increase of Index Crime for 1977, much of this increase can be attributed to individual increases in the crimes of Burglary and Auto Theft. Another goal of the Program was to minimize

and stabilize the conflict and tensions between Black and White students in recently integrated schools, especially at the Junior High School and High School level. Since there were few racial incidents reported to the Department as a result of the implementation of the Board of Education's Bussing Program, it is only fair to assume that much of this credit could be attributed to the existence of the Community Youth Officer Program. In many instances, where trouble on school buses was anticipated, Community Youth Officers responded to the problem and in all cases the problem was resolved or ameliorated. Also, when racial problems were encountered in the various integrated schools, on many occasions, the Community Youth Officer Units were called upon by School Authorities to lend their expertise in resolving the problem. It is our opinion that in many instances these Officers were able to diffuse what might have been very sensitive situations.

At the termination of this Program in December of 1977, the Commissioner of Police, because of budgetary constraints imposed upon him, was unable to institutionalize this Program into the organizational structure of the Department. However, he was convinced that the work performed by these Officers was critical and he decided to assign one (1) Officer in each Precinct to carry on with the duties and the responsibilities that had been assigned to members of this Unit. This, although limited, has been very

successful to date, and I am sure that it has proven its worth both to the Police Department and the Community. Historically, the Juvenile Bureau had the primary responsibility in dealing with juveniles who came in contact in any way with the Buffalo Police Department. Through the years, as juvenile crimes and problems increased meteorically, the Juvenile Bureau was unable to cope with this problem. They were unable to perform any significant number of sincere follow-up actions and, for the most part, because of limited staff, could only perform the actual processing of juveniles for Family Court and other Social Agencies. With the youth representative in each Precinct, it was felt that more attention could be paid to the various juvenile problems at the Precinct level and this would give the Precinct Officers a better opportunity to improve their rapport with the juvenile population in their respective precincts. We are most confident that this was the basis of any success that this Program has achieved.

We are deeply indebted to the Buffalo Metro Planning
Area, the New York State Division of Criminal Justice
Services and the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration
for giving our Department the opportunity to implement this
most innovative project, and I sincerely hope that this
Department has cooperated by giving its wholehearted
assistance to the implementation and operation of this Program.

TEMPORARY ORDER OF PROCEDURE

SUBJECT:

Guidelines and Procedures for the Operation of

the Community Youth Officer Program.

1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this temporary Order of Procedure is to establish a Community Youth Officer Program (Temporary) within the organizational structure of the Buffalo Police Department under the direction of the Commanding Officer, Division of Patrol.

2. GENERAL

The goals of this program are:

36594

- a) To establish a better rapport between the Police Officer and the youth in the community.
- b) To enhance the quality of juvenile justice by diversion of juvenile of fenders to community agencies including but not restricted to the Buffalo Youth Board as an alternative to Family Court action where there is no threat to the Community or the juveniles themselves.
- c) To reduce the amount of vandalism to schools and public transportation conveyances.
- d) To minimize and stabilize the conflict and tensions between black and white students in recently integrated schools especially at the Junior High School and High School level.
- e) To reduce the number of crimes committed by juveniles against elderly persons, expecially crimes against the person.

- f) To establish bridges of communication between the youth in the community and the other residents. This can be accomplished by periodic meetings between the Youth Officers, Youth Leaders in the community and representatives of the Precinct/Community Councils.
- by juveniles in the under 16 age group.

3. SUPERVISION

The Community Youth Officer in each Precinct will be supervised by the Lieutenant whose platoon is on duty at the time under the direction of the Precinct Captain and the Inspector so designated as Director of the program by the Commissioner of Police.

4. HOURS OF OPERATION

This program will operate seven days a week between 8 AM and 12 Midnight. One platoon shall work between 8:00 AM and 4:00 PM and the other platoon shall work from 4:00 PM to 12 Mdt. These hours may be changed from time to time to respond to special occasions or changes in juvenile crime patterns or community needs subject to the approval of the Precinct Captain and the Program Director.

5. DISTRIBUTION OF UNITS

Each Precinct will have one Community Youth Officer Mobile Unit on duty each day from 4:00 PM to 12 Mdt. Precincts 3-4-6-10-12 and 16 will also operate one Mobile Unit from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM to handle special problems that are particular to those precincts.

6. DUTIES

a) The Community Youth Officers units in each precinct shall have the primary responsibility during their tour of duty for the apprehension, questioning and processing of all juvenile offenders subject to the restrictions and procedures delineated in Chapter 3/18 M/P.

- b) The Community Youth Officer units will make every effort to attend Precinct/Community Council meetings relating to youth problems within their respective precincts. They shall report thereon to their Commanding Officers problem areas within their precincts and any recommendations that they might have for the solution of these problems.
- c) The Community Youth Officer Unit in each precinct shall attempt to develop seminars in the High Schools and Junior High Schools in their respective precincts explaining the role of the police in the community and how important this role is to the youth in the precinct.
- d) The Community Youth Officers, when called upon by the school authorities, shall promptly investigate any juvenile crime, violence, disorder, or other incident occurring on school property, in accordance with existing departmental policy.
- e) The Community Youth Officers shall cooperate with and maintain a close liaison with the members of the Security Division of the Buffalo Board of Education.

7. RADIO PROCEDURES

- a) Each Community Youth Officer Unit shall maintain radio contact at all times with the Radio Dispatcher. If out of their assigned mobile unit for any reason, they shall use the portable radio unit, if available, to maintain radio contact with the Dispatcher. (See 10/6.24 MP)
- b) The radio call number of each Community Youth Officer Mobile Unit shall be the letter 'Y' preceded by the number of the precinct to which they are assigned, e.g., 3Y (Precinct 3), 12Y (Precinct 12), etc.
- The Community Youth Officer Unit shall be excused from responding to other than emergency calls and shall devote the major portion of their tour of duty to police/community youth activities. In addition to responding only to emergency type calls, Community Youth Officer Mobile Units shall respond to those calls requiring the services of the Youth Officers such as Juvenile gangs, Juvenile disturbances, incorrigible juveniles or any crime in which a juvenile is apparently the perpetrator or the victim. (See Appendix 'A')

8. COMMANDING OFFICERS RESPONSIBILITY

- a) Each Commanding Officer shall see to it that this detail is filled each tour of duty as called for in this Temporary Order of Procedure.
- b) Each Commanding Officer shall ensure that each Community Youth Officer mobile unit performs the duties as specified in this Temporary Order of Procedure.
- c) Each Commanding Officer shall forward to the Project Director on Monday AM, each week a report on the form provided showing the deployment of Community Youth Officer units for the previous week ending on Saturday at 12 Mdt.
- d) Each Commanding Officer shall assign a specific vehicle for the permanent use of the Community Youth Officer Unit in his precinct. When not being used by the Community Youth Officer unit, this vehicle may be used by other precinct personnel.

9. REPORTS

a) On Monday morning of each week each Community Youth Officer Unit shall forward to the Project Director on forms provided a report listing its activities for the previous week ending at 12 Mdt. on Saturday. The report shall among other things list all juvenile contacts made during the week, meetings attended, school contacts, number and type of youth related calls responded to, mileage of mobile unit, special problems encountered, etc.

10. <u>VEHICLES</u>

Vehicles assigned to the Community Youth Officer unit shall be maintained as directed by Chapter 9/8.45 MP.

11. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Temporary Order of Procedure shall be effective 12:01AM Monday, December 13, 1976.
