

Gentlemen:

I hereby submit to your honorable body my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1980, giving the number of arrests made, a list of various violations, crimes and offenses committed, social conditions of prisoners, accident investigation summary, report of stolen property, miscellaneous work, department expenditures for the year, and other summaries.

The total number of arrests made and citations issued for the year was 24,201 for the following crimes and offenses which represents a decrease of 499 arrests compared to 1979.

In Memoriam

On December 31, 1980, Officer Randall Blank was shot and mortally wounded while attempting to apprehend a subject who he believed was a possible strong arm robbery suspect. Officer Blank succumbed to his injuries on December 31, 1980 and was laid to rest January 3, 1981. No greater sacrifice can be made for his community and his fellow man than for a police officer to lay down his life in the line of duty.



During the year 1980 the Communications Division supporting the Rockford Police Department was under the Administrative control of the Governing Board of the Public Safety Building and operational control of the Chief of Police. As a joint function it is known as the Winnebago Public Safety Communications Center.

Their figures supplied to the Rockford Police Department show there were a total of 118,915 calls for service initiated by citizens or officer activity.

Note: During 1980 we adjusted our system of counting calls for service. For comparison sake the actual calls for service in 1979 was 117,345.

YOUTH AND COMMUNITY SERVICES BUREAU

The Youth and Community Services Bureau of the Rockford Police Department is commanded by a Captain and is staffed with 3 Sergeants, 19 Detectives, 3 Victim/Witness Caseworkers, and 3 Clerk Typists. The personnel of this bureau are dedicated to establishing and maintaining communication and cooperation between the Police Department and the people of Rockford toward a common goal of prevention of criminal acts.

During 1980, officers of the bureau investigated 2,465 assigned complaints and were able to successfully resolve 2,022 which represents a clearance rate of 82.0% of cases assigned. This is in comparison with a rate of 77.7% clearance in 1979.

During 1980, 315 juveniles were counseled and released to the custody of their parents or guardians, and 229 were referred to other agencies. Also 986 juveniles were charged as delinquent children and 132 adults were arrested in juvenile connected cases. Cases referred to the Youth Bureau reflected a property loss of \$9,582.63, and officers of this Bureau were instrumental in the recovery of property valued at \$38,562.29 during their investigations.

Two officers of this Bureau are assigned to work in elementary schools of the City. They instruct the children in the duties of the police officer, pedestrian safety, bicycle safety, safety patrol activities, child molesting, and drug education. During 1980 these officers made visits to 1618 classrooms and appeared before 40,639 students. This represents an increase of 21,001 students over 1979.

One officer is assigned on a fulltime basis to Police Community Relations. The duties of this officer included meeting with and coordinating the efforts of various people and groups in the City to promote a better relationship between the public and the police.

During the year 1980, the Victim/Witness Assistance Unit has provided assistance and/or follow-up in one thousand one hundred and twenty-seven (1,127) cases involving families, individuals

and organizations. Of this number, four (4) are cases which began in 1977, thirty-three (33) are cases which began in 1978, and sixty-four (64) are cases which began in 1979. Entry into these cases came as a result of referrals from within the department, referrals from outside agencies, requests for assistance from citizens, and reading of police reports by Victim/Witness Assistance staff members.

Listed below are the highlights of 1980

Raids and arrests with stolen auto ring, January 29, 1980. Rockford Police Department received a grant from the Sears Foundation for the "Officer Friendly" Program.

Working with the Rockford Clergy Association regarding juvenile prostitutes.

Working on Legislation Committee from Chamber of Commerce with Anti-Bad Check Program, "Quick Touch", operational November 7, 1980.

Development of the "Crime Stopper" Program for operation in 1981.

Dignitary protection for political aspirants during the 1980 election year.

TRAINING & PERSONNEL DIVISION

The authorized strength of the Rockford Police Department was 268 at the start of 1980. We started the year with 259 and ended the year with 252. During the year we had 9 resignations and 10 retirements.

The basic goal of the Training & Personnel Division is to provide all police personnel through formal training, with the appropriate skills, knowledge and attitudes to effectively carry out the police mission of enforcing the law, maintaining order, preventing crime and providing for the safety and security of all our citizens. "A Trained Officer Is An Effective Officer."

The Auxiliary Police Unit which is supervised and trained by this division volunteered slightly over 4000 hours in both training and work type situations.

This division also conducted training sessions and special programs for other police agencies, civic groups, etc.. The division has been involved with the F.B.I. Training Committee, Police Training Institute Curriculum Committee, Rock Valley College Advisory Board, Rockford Board of Education, Northern Illinois Law Enforcement Commission, Illinois Local Governmental Law Enforcement Officers Training Board and the 1980 White House Commission on Youth.

This division has also been involved in recruiting, testing and monitoring tests administered by the Fire and Police Commission and participated in the entrance and promotional tests for other agencies.

EXPENDITURES FOR 1980

In 1980 \$9,222,006.00* was appropriates for the Police Department Budget. At the end of the year \$8,916,811.48 had been spent and \$20,338.97 was encumbered. The budget was under spent in the amount of \$284,855.55.
