

THE NEVADA UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

Introduction

The primary function of the Uniform Crime Reporting program is to provide reliable data to help define the extent of the crime problem in Nevada. This data is then used by state and local officials and the public in assessing the crime problem in the state and developing programs to combat crime.

Statistics are provided by local law enforcement agencies and compiled according to UCR guidelines. The accuracy of the program depends upon the accuracy of the reports submitted.

One of the main limitations of the program is the question of just how much crime is being reported. Many crimes go unreported by citizens because they feel the crime is of little consequence or out of fear of retaliation from perpetrators of crime who end up in the criminal justice system.

Another limitation of the program is the fact that the UCR statistics are not as complete as they could be and do not break down crimes as attempts, successful crime, or secondary crimes perpetrated during commission of a primary or Part I crime.

Despite these limitations, the collection of information for the UCR program relates the most accurate assessment available of the crime situation in Nevada.

National UCR Program

Uniform crime reporting originated in 1929 with the standardization of crime data collection set by the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

In 1930 Congress authorized the Federal Bureau of Investigation to collect and compile nationwide crime data. Since that time the FBI has acted as a clearinghouse for crime report information.

The national crime statistics collected through UCR are published annually by the FBI in its report of "Crime in the United States." Data collected from numerous law enforcement agencies provides the backbone of the information.

UCR Requirements

The Uniform Crime Report program incorporates three basic elements of statistical reporting: crime trends through reported offenses; arrest patterns; and offense characteristics.

Statistical information derived from arrest reports is presented with other UCR information and exhibits because they are of primary interest to law enforcement agencies.

Offense characteristics help describe criminal events in detail and thus are beneficial in planning crime prevention programs. This information is used to analyze crimes according to weapon used, day of the week, time of day or night, victim relationship, victim age, offender age, offender relationship, etc. The same analysis can be made using this information for any of the Part I crimes in Nevada.

The monthly data collection forms include reported offenses, supplemental information about actual offenses and characteristics of persons arrested.

Part I Offenses

The "index crimes" or Part I crimes used in data collection were chosen because of their seriousness and frequency of occurrence as indicators of crime in the United States.

The index or Part I crimes were established in the following categories because they are believed to be the crimes which are most likely to be reported and which occur with enough frequency to provide an adequate basis for comparison:

1. Criminal homicide (murder)
2. Forcible rape (sexual assault)
3. Robbery
4. Aggravated assault
5. Burglary (breaking and entering)
6. Larceny-theft
7. Motor vehicle theft
8. Arson

Each of these offenses has been specifically defined for UCR purposes. The crime index offenses are all of the Part I offenses with the exception of manslaughter by negligence and simple assault. Part 2 offenses are all other offenses not listed as Part I.

Nevada UCR Program

The Nevada Uniform Crime Report system involves collection, classification and analysis of crime statistics provided by law enforcement agencies throughout the state on a cooperating basis.

The Nevada system is organized on parallel lines to that of the federal UCR system so that Nevada crime data can be quickly entered into the national UCR system.

Nevada law enforcement agencies monthly submit information on index crimes to the Department of Law Enforcement Assistance. The research section records the information on a master tally and makes cumulative counts.

The Uniform Crime Report system does not consider the many facets of organized crime such as extortion, loan sharking, gambling, narcotics trafficking and other activities. White collar crimes such as embezzlement, tax evasion, and consumer fraud are also not considered, as well as regulatory violations such as safety standards, building codes, etc.

UCR crimes are reported using a hierarchy rule which deletes some crimes from the reporting process and records the most serious crime even if multiple offenses are known to have been committed during the same criminal offense.

Purpose and Objectives

The Uniform Crime Report system is designed to provide a continuing look at the extent of crime in Nevada. The resulting crime analysis is used as a planning tool for local, state and national criminal justice agencies in their efforts to combat crime.

The basic objectives of the Nevada UCR program are to:

1. Inform the Governor, Legislature, other governmental officials and the public as to the nature of the crime problem in Nevada, its magnitude and trends.
2. Provide law enforcement administrators with criminal analysis for administrative and operational use.
3. Provide a profile of those committing criminal acts according to age, sex, whether resident or non-resident, and other social attributes in order to determine the proper focus for crime prevention and enforcement activities.
4. Provide information that will aid in measuring the effectiveness of Nevada's criminal justice system.
5. Provide continuing research to help improve the efficiency, effectiveness and performance of criminal justice agencies in Nevada.
6. Provide the FBI with UCR guideline data to be included in the annual national crime report and analysis.

Reporting Procedure

Each agency is responsible for compiling its own crime reports and submitting them to the Nevada UCR on a cooperating basis. A UCR guide book is furnished to each agency to guarantee uniformity and to provide a guide for scoring and classifying offenses.

Each month the index or Part I offenses are reported by the cooperating law enforcement agencies. The tally of offenses is taken from the records of complaints and incidents received by law enforcement agencies from victims, witnesses, other sources, or discovered by agencies during their own investigations. Complaints determined by follow-up investigations to be unfounded are eliminated from the count.

The resulting number of offenses known to law enforcement is reported without regard to whether there has been an arrest, property recovered, local prosecutive policy or other consideration. Monthly reports on persons arrested provide a profile through information about age, sex, and race. All of the information is collected by the Department of Law Enforcement Assistance and is submitted to the FBI. Information retained by the state is used for state-wide analysis and summary of crime activities.

CRIME INDEX, CLASSIFICATION AND DEFINITIONS

Maintenance of uniform and consistent data from the many submitting agencies is obtained through standard definitions applied to state and federal UCR system reports.

The basic definitions are:

Part I Offenses

- 1a. Murder - The willful or non-negligent killing of a human being
- 1b. Manslaughter - The killing of a human being by the act, procurement or culpable negligence of another
2. Rape (sexual assault) - The carnal knowledge of a person forcibly and against their will
3. Robbery - The felonious and forcible taking of the property of another against his will by violence or putting him in fear
4. Aggravated assault - An attempt or offer with unlawful force or violence to do physical injury to another
5. Burglary - An unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny
6. Larceny-theft - The unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to permanently deprive him of ownership
7. Arson - The unlawful burning of the property of another
8. Motor vehicle theft - The larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle

CRIME FACTORS

There are many factors which can affect the type and volume of criminal activity in a given area. These factors result in crime trends varying from place to place, though they may be in a common geographic area.

Influences on crime activity include:

Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.

Composition of the population, specifically by age, sex and race.

Economic status and mores of the population.

Relative stability of the population including commuters, seasonal workers and transients.

Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.

Educational, recreational and religious characteristics.

Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.

Standards governing appointments to the police force.

Attitudes and policies of the courts and prosecuting officials.

Relationships and attitudes of law enforcement and the community.

The administrative and investigative emphasis of law enforcement agencies, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

Citizen/community attitudes.

Organization and cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police jurisdictions.

The current methods of gathering and reporting offense and arrest data are influenced by many variables and thus provide a less than complete picture of criminality in society. Despite these shortcomings, there is no system currently available that more adequately provides the desired information.

Crime is reported to police by victims, witnesses, citizens who suspect criminal activity and by police. An increase in the crime index may mean that there are more offenses known to the police this year than last, and does not mean that the police are not doing their job well. It does indicate specific areas of concern for activities aimed at prevention, deterrence, increased law enforcement, prosecution, courts, corrections, probation, parole and legislative activity.

Government is responsible for providing the laws and means for implementing programs aimed at reducing crime. Government is part of society and therefore each person in society is responsible for acting in his own way to reduce crime.

POPULATION FACTORS

Although population cannot be considered a cause of crime, a higher incidence of crime occurs in heavily populated areas than in regions with sparse population. This may be due to the fact that a large population yields a high potential for victims, that a large population contains more criminals and potential criminals than those with smaller populations, or because people residing in urban communities report crimes more readily than those in rural areas.

Because it is a tourist mecca, Nevada's population can vary from the current population of 799,184* to millions on holidays and weekends. Nevada attracts approximately 35 million visitors each year. With new expansions in mining ventures, tourism and most recently, MX activities, Nevada will continue to grow.

GEOGRAPHY AND ENVIRONMENT

Nevada covers 110,540 square miles, making it the seventh largest state in the nation. Approximately 86% of this area is owned and administered by the federal government. Nevada is bordered by Oregon, Idaho, Arizona, Utah, and California.

The climate is semi-arid with an average annual precipitation of approximately nine inches. Temperatures vary from extremely hot to mountain coolness depending on the location.




There were 534 offenses reported which represents .8% of the total crime index; 39% were cleared and 243 persons were arrested.

Rape differs from other violent crimes in that the victim, in many instances, is hesitant in reporting the offense to the police. The rigor of court procedure, embarrassment and fear of accompanying stigma have a deterrent effect on the victim's willingness to make the crime known to police.



AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

There were 2,868 offenses reported which represents 4% of the total crime index; 50% were cleared and 1,019 persons were arrested.

For further analysis, this offense is divided into five categories: firearms; knife or cutting instrument; strong-arm (hands, fists, feet, etc.); and other dangerous weapons. Other assaults which are not aggravated are classified as simple assaults. Any assault which does not result in serious injury to the victim is classified in the latter category.

BURGLARY

In 1980, there were 23,016 burglaries reported which represents 33% of the total crime index; 9% were cleared and 2,682 persons were arrested.

Burglary is generally a crime of stealth and opportunity. In 1980, 62% of the burglaries involved forcible entry, 32% were unlawful entries, and 6% were found to be attempted forcible entries. Economically, the offense of burglary represents a loss of \$30,986,625. The average dollar loss per burglary was \$1,346.

ARSON

Arson was reclassified as a Part I crime in 1978. The first year for compilation of figures on arson incidents in Nevada was 1979 when 285 known arson incidents were reported by Nevada law enforcement agencies. In 1980, 739 offenses were reported.

Arson is a difficult crime to determine; therefore, many incidents are not reported as arson. Further, many jurisdictions are unable to determine cause of fire and, as a result, many incidents which are probable arson are not reported.

ARREST DATA AND ANALYSIS

The number of persons arrested for all violations except traffic violations is compiled from monthly returns submitted by the contributing agencies.

The age, sex and race of these persons is recorded, and data collected for juveniles and adults to compute arrest trends and volume.

The collection form used in compiling arrest information is used to collect data on the number of persons arrested and not the number of persons charged. The same person may be arrested many times during a month for a similar or several different violations within a given area.

A P P E N D I X

The following are definitions of Part I and Part II offenses as defined by the UCR Program, which do not always conform to the State of Nevada Revised Statutes.

PART I OFFENSES

Criminal homicide - a) Murder and non-negligent manslaughter: the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded. Justifiable homicides are limited to: (1) the killing of a felon by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and (2) the killing of a felon by a private citizen. b) Manslaughter by negligence: the killing of another person through gross negligence, excluding traffic fatalities. While manslaughter by negligence is a Part I crime, it is not included in the Crime Index.

Forcible rape (sexual assault) - The carnal knowledge of a person against their will. Included are rapes by force and attempts to rape. Statutory offenses (no force used--victim under age of consent) are excluded.

Robbery - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated assault - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.

Burglary--breaking or entering - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony and/or theft. Attempts to commit burglary are included.

Larceny-theft (except motor vehicle theft) - The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles or automobile accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article which is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, worthless checks, etc., are excluded.

Motor vehicle theft - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. Excluded from this category are motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.

Arson - Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft or personal property of another.

PART II OFFENSES

Other assaults (simple) - Assaults or attempted assaults where no weapon was used and did not result in serious injury to the victim.

Forgery and counterfeiting - Making, altering, uttering, or possession of documents with intent to defraud. Attempts are included.

Fraud - Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Included are larceny by bailee and bad checks except forgeries and counterfeiting.

Embezzlement - Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

Stolen property; buying, receiving, possessing - Buying, receiving or possession of stolen property, including attempts.

Vandalism - Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacing of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control.

Weapons; carrying, possessing, etc. - All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers. Included are attempts.

Prostitution and vice - Sex offenses of a commercial nature, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring, or transporting women for immoral purposes. Attempts are included.

Sex offenses (except forcible rape, prostitution and vice) - Statutory rape and offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Attempts are included.

Drug abuse violations (sale and possession) - State and local offenses relating to narcotic drugs, such as unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, and manufacturing of narcotic drugs.

Gambling (bookmaking, numbers, lottery, all other gambling) - Promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

Offenses against family and children - Nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

Driving under the influence - Driving or operating any vehicle or common carrier while intoxicated or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

Liquor laws - State or local liquor law violations, except "drunkenness" and "driving under the influence." Federal violations are excluded.

Disorderly conduct - Breach of the peace.

Vagrancy - Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

All other offenses (except traffic) - All violations of state or local laws, except traffic offenses.

Suspicion - Not applicable in Nevada.

Curfew and loitering laws - Offenses relating to violation of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

Runaways - Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes.

Civil protective custody - At the discretion of a peace officer, a person who is found in a public place under the influence of alcohol, in such a condition that he is unable to exercise care for his own health or safety, can be placed under civil protective custody pursuant to state statute.

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
