

Dear Mr. Davidson:

Our Annual Statistical Report for 1980 reflects a 10% increase in reported index crime. Unlike 1979, the increase was in crimes of violence. Homicide, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault climbed 15%. The largest increase in violent crimes was in robbery and aggravated assaults. The property crimes of burglary and motor vehicle theft showed a very encouraging decrease over the previous year. The largest increase in property crime was theft with 19%. Per capita crimes in Austin reached 85.4 index crimes per 1,000 population. Statewide for cities of 250,000 and over it was 95.3.

In our efforts to combat the continuing rise in index crimes, the department has added new programs that have had a significant impact. The Crime Stoppers Program has been invaluable providing assistance in solving some of the department's most complex offenses. A Tele-Serv Program allowing police officers to take reports over the telephone on certain offenses has resulted in less calls being dispatched to patrol officers thus providing more time for directed activities. The Crime Reduction Committee continues to coordinate activities directed towards crime prevention, case clearance, and crime reduction. The department cleared 23% of all index crimes reported during 1980. This was slightly less than the 24% cleared in 1979.

The improvement of police services has been actively pursued during the past year. The first phase of complete automation began April 1, 1980. A Criminal Investigations Bureau survey was started in October resulting in recommendations for managing criminal investigations that are being considered for implementation. The duties of the line Captain and Lieutenant were realigned to improve managerial functions. The City's Affirmative Action Plan was adopted and implemented.

The construction of the new Police Academy and Police Building are being completed on schedule.

I wish to extend my appreciation to you and the City Council for your continued support of the Police Department during 1980. I am looking forward to working with you in 1981.

Organizational Structure

The Chief of Police is appointed by and directly responsible to the City Manager for the efficient operation and conduct of the Austin Police Department.


The Assistant Chief of Police is responsible for the operation and conduct of the Austin Police Department in the absence of the Chief.

After the Chief and the Assistant Chief, the line of succession in the Austin Police Department is by rank and seniority in rank beginning with Major.

The Chief has divided the Austin Police Department into five major operations:


- I. Staff Services—The Chief of Police, Assistant Chief, Bureau Commanders, Lieutenant in charge of Internal Affairs, Legal Advisor, Community Liaison, Organized Crime Unit, Press Information Office, Inspections Division, and their respective personnel comprise the Staff Services program within the Austin Police Department. This program is responsible for establishing departmental policy, directing law enforcement activities, suppressing crime, apprehending offenders, recovering property, enforcing State and Federal laws as well as ordinances of the City.
- II. Field Operations—The Assistant Chief of Police is directly responsible for the Field Operations. Under Field Operations is the Court Liaison and two of the department's major Bureaus: the Criminal Investigation Bureau (CIB) and Patrol Bureau commanded by majors.
- III. Support Services Bureau—The Support Services Bureau under command of a major has among its responsibilities the direction of Data Processing Batch Reports and On-Line Development, Research and Planning, Counseling Services, Jail Operations, Training Division, and Information Services that includes Central Records, Communications, and Identification Division.
- IV. Administrative Services—The Administrative Services Division, under a civilian director, is responsible for the functions of Administration and Personnel, Fiscal Affairs, Property Management and Building Services.
- V. Special Investigations Bureau—The Special Investigations Bureau, under the command of a major, is responsible for the activities of Narcotics, Special Crimes, Special Missions, Criminal Intelligence, Community Relations, Crime Prevention, Crime Stoppers, and Crime Lab.







major collisions by month







I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all; maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of my Department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, animosities, or friendships to influence my decisions, with no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals. I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of the Police Service. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession — Law Enforcement.
