
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

AMBUAL REPORT

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THE ROYAL VIRGIN ISLANDS POLICE FORCE

FOR THE YEAR 1980

IMPRODUCTION

General Report

1. There was an overall decrease in reported crime in comparison with the previous year. This decrease could reflect the effects of the arrests in July and December, 1979 of escaped convicts and other armed criminals who may have been responsible for an unsurge in criminal offences in that year. There was no External Security threat and likewise no Internal Security threat to criminal offences in the Territory during the year.

Visits + Distinguished Visitors

2. Courtesy visits were made by vessels of the Royal Havy and the French and American Havies. Force Headquarters received the following distinguished visitors:-

Inspection of the Force

3. Mr. R.G.W. Lemb, Acting Inspector General of Colonial and Dependent Territories Police, inspected the Force between 29th March and 4th April, 1980.

Buildings

4. There was little in the way of maintenance work carried out on Police Buildings despite deterioration of appearance in exteriors and interiors. A recreation room was built at Police Headquarters on a "salf help" basis.

Establishment/Strength

5. There was no change in the authorised establishment of 62 all ranks. Four recruits of British Virgin Islands origin were appointed on the Permanent and Pensionable Establishment whilst five expatriate recruits were appointed on a contract basis.

By the end of the year, the establishment of 62 was up to strength, with twenty five (25) members being of "belonger" status.

ORGANIZATION

6. The Royal Virgin Islands Police Force was established on 26th February, 1967 following Constitutional changes in the Leewards Islands. The Police Act Cap 142, Laws of the Virgin Islands, provides for the establishment of the Force and sets out the main duties of the Force as being "the prevention and detection of crime and the repression of internal disturbance", and "defending the Territory in the event of external aggression". The Police Act is, in general, very out dated and in need of urgent revision.

Command

7. The Force was organized as follows to discharge these and other Statutory duties:-

(a) Command

The Force was under the command of Mr. P.M. Grant, O.B.E. LL. B.

(b) Force Headquarters Division

Located in Road Town Police Station and consisting of:-

- (i) Administration and Finance Section
- (ii) Transport Section
- (iii) Marine Section
- iv) Quartermaster Section
- (v) Traffic Section

(c) Criminal Investigation Division

Located in Road Town Police Station consisting of:

- (i) Investigation Section
- (ii) Criminal Records Section
- (iii) Special Branch

(d) Western Division

Divisional Headquarters located at Road Town Police Station with East End Sub-division at Long Look Police Station and West End Sub-division at West End Station.

(e) Eastern Division

Divisional Headquarters located at Valley Police Station Virgin Gorda.

CRIME

Statistics

20. The total number of crime reports investigated during 1980 amounted to 467 of which 395 were accepted as true. This shows a satisfying overall decrease of 21.2% against the 1979 figure of 593. Comparisons under the various categories with the 1979 statistics are as follows:-

Fingerprint Bureau

30. One detective corporal and one detective constable carry out basic classifications. The Force maintains its own Bureau and scenes of crime section. Lack of sophisticated fingerprint equipment hampered the progress of this important section in the past but the position has improved considerally as excellent equipment has been taken on charge. There are 510 sets of fingerprints filed.

Photographic Section

31. The photographic section is now fully operational and is being used for criminal investigations and other assignments.

The darkroom is in regular use but studio facilities have had to be converted to other uses.

Modus Operandi Index

32. No such index is maintained or considered necessary at the present time, but plans are in hand to establish one in the future.

Criminal Records Office

33. A centralised system of traffic and criminal statistics is now in emistence.

Forensic Aids

34. No facilities are available in the Territory for chemical analysis or other forensic science examinations. However, the United States Virgin Islands has allowed the Force to make use of their Crime Laboratory on payment of fees and it is proper once again to record our appreciation of the assistance given by the Director, John A. Richards Jr. Appreciation is also due to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and to the St. Thomas Police Department Detective Division.

Courts

- 35. The West Indies Associated States Court sat at Road Town in its criminal and civil jurisdiction in March and October, 1980.
- 36. The Territory's only subordinate court is that of the Magistrate and, in the police view, the powers of the magistrate are still grossly inadequate.

Police Supervision

37. There were 2 cases requiring police supervision during 1980.

Law Enforcement Organization - U.S. Virgin Islands

- 38. The Law Enforcement Organization of the Virgin Islands, an organization which fosters co-operation between the police, customs and other regulatory bodies was active during 1980.
- 39. Meetings were held at St. Thomas, U.S.V.I. and Tortola and Virgin Gorda, B.V.I. The fact that L.E.O. was again functioning is encouraging news and augurs well for local co-operation between B.V.I. and U.S.V.I. and now Puerto Rico.

TRAFFIC

40. Registration and Licensing of Motor Vehicles

At the end of 1980 a total of 2735 motor vehicles were registered and licensed for use on the public roads of the Territory. This showed an increase of 455 on the 1980 figure. Figures for 1976-1980 are as follows:-

Examination of Motor Vehicles

- The police specialist corporal examines motor vehicles to ensure roadworthiness. This examination is done annually at the time the vehicles are re-licensed.
- However, due to the number of vehicles and other duty commitments of the Corporal, these examinations were often carried out by untrained traffic policemen and, consequently, the standard of vehicles on the road has deteriorated.
- 49. Plans to establish a completely new licensing section have been submitted to the Government.

OTHER SPECIALISED BRANCHES

Fire Brigade

The Force has continued to be responsible for fire fighting throughout the Territory with the exception of the Beef IslandsAirport Fire appliances are stationed at Road Town and Virgin Gorda. One other appliance is under repair and will be allocated to East End.

At the end of 1980 police had the following operational fire appliances:-

In 1980 the Fire Brigade answered a total of 31 calls out of which eight were false. There were no deaths and no injuries as a result of the fires.

Special Branch

A small Special Branch and registry is maintained in Police Headquarters.

Emergency Response Unit

- A unit of an inspector and six men was formed in August of the year to deal with two dangerous criminals who were at large. Most of these men were trained during the two Regional Field Training Courses.
- The Unit proved its value by apprehending the criminals concerned, but the small size of this Force prohibits the maintenance of a permanent unit. It is preferable to have all personnel trained in these duties.

Women Police

56. One Women Police Corporal and three women Palice Constables were on strength at the end of 1980. The Corporal is in charge of the Juvenile and Female Welfare Section of the C.I.D., and three constables did general duties.

Auxiliary Forces

- 57. At the end of 1980 there were 17 local Constables in the Territory. During the year four of them appeared at one training parade, but otherwise they were not involved in any police activity.
- During the year, a number of Special Constables were attested or resttested. These men are enthusiastic but untrained. They supplied much needed man power during the Festival and in two emergency situations. They have been issued with uniform and have done some basic training. At the end of the year there were ten Special Constables in the Force.

Telecommunications

- H.F. Transreceivers were located at Police Headquarters and on the launch. However, the launch set has been so damaged by salt water that it is unlikely that it will ever be used again.
- The H.F. Eastern Caribbean Police Network is now practically defunct. Some signals were sent and received during Hurricane David, but otherwise the network has not been used again.

Equipment for an internal FM/VHF system was made available by Cable and Wireless (W.I.) Ltd. Tests have been carried out on an internal police boat wireless system using U.H.F. Walkie Talkies sets, and these were very successful. Approval in principle has been obtained from the Government to establish the system.

One jeep was damaged beyond repair in an accident, and one Land Rover became beyond local repair. In replacement the Force was supplied with two Gurgels.

Welfare and Recreation

Police Cantean

The Police Canteen and Recreation Room continued to be popular. The Annual Police Ball in December was attended by H.E. The Governor, the Chief Minister and other distinguished guests. It was a great success being regarded as the social event of the year. It was held at Police Headquarters.

Police Welfare Association

The Police Welfare Association was not active during the year. No one was willing to accept office in the organization. Police Welfare matters were dealt with by the Chief of Police.

Sport and Games

The Police Football and Cricket teams participated in local league contests with great success. The Football Team won the B.V.I. Football Shield for the third year in succession. The Cricket Team also performed well, but the league ended prematurely.

The Chief of Police is an ex-Officio member of the Board of Film Censors appointed by the Governor under the provisions of Section 4 of the Cinematography Ordinance Cap 211, and is a member of the Public Transport Commission under the provisions of Section 3 (1) vehicles and Road Traffic Ordinance Cap 198.

Control of Firearms

Permits to keep and carry firearms are issued by the Police, after approval by the Governor. At the end of 1980 the firearms licensed in the Territory were as follows:-
