
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

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MF INTRODUCTION

Crime and Delinquency in California is an annual publication of the Bureau of Criminal Statistics. It is a descriptive report containing information on the nature and extent of crime and delinquency in California and describes the manner in which criminal justice is administered in the state.

The information presented in this report is based largely upon data compiled from reports submitted to the Bureau on a regular basis by state and local criminal justice agencies. The major sections of the report are:

- Crimes
- Arrests
- Adult Felony Arrest Dispositions
- Adult Corrections
- Juvenile Justice System
- Criminal Justice Agency Expenditures and Personnel

The large index charts found at the beginning of most of these sections show two types of change. The number above each bar, or index number, expresses

change in rate (or number) as a percentage of the 1974 value, set at 100. The percent figure within each bar, calculated from index numbers, expresses change in rate (or number) from the previous year, starting with 1975.

IMPACT OF THE 1980 CENSUS ON CRIME AND ARREST RATES

Crime and arrest rates shown in this publication differ from those of previous reports. Rates were calculated from population estimates based on preliminary 1980 census data released by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. These estimates replace those used in previous publications, which were based on the 1970 census. Population estimates are obtained from the Population Research Unit of the California Department of Finance.

This logo, which appears in the report, will alert the reader to featured analyses or items of special interest.

It should be noted that racial/ethnic designations used in this report differ from those used in previous reports. Individuals reported as "white" are designated "white (not Hispanic)," those reported as "Mexican-American" are designated "Hispanic," and those reported as "Negro" are designated "black." This change represents the initial efforts of the Department of Justice to change its racial/ethnic designations to match those of the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

The Appendix contains a glossary of criminal justice terms, known data limitations, and arrest offense codes.

In addition to this report, a supplemental report series, Criminal Justice Profiles, is published annually in late October. Individual reports are prepared for the state and each of the 58 counties. They contain ten-year trend data for the state and individual counties as well as annual county and jurisdictional data for the report year. Criminal justice data collected by the Bureau not provided in either this report or the Profile series may be obtained on a special request basis.

HIGHLIGHTS



CRIMES

From 1979 to 1980, there was a:

- 10.1 percent rate increase in total crimes as measured by the Seven Major Offenses.
- 12.0 percent rate increase in crimes against persons.
- 9.8 percent rate increase in crimes against property.

ARRESTS

From 1979 to 1980, there was a:

- 6.7 percent increase in the number of total arrests.
- 4.0 percent increase in the number of felony arrests.
- 7.8 percent increase in the number of misdemeanor arrests.
- 2.3 percent decrease in the number of status offense arrests.

DISPOSITIONS OF ADULT FELONY ARRESTS

In 1980, of 189,303 adult felony arrestees who received a final disposition:

- 25.4 percent were released by law enforcement and prosecutors (complaint denied).
- 74.7 percent had complaints filed against them.
- 55.8 percent were convicted.

ADULT CORRECTIONS

From 1979 to 1980, there was a:

- 2.3 percent increase in the number of adults under supervision.
- 6.1 percent increase in the number of adults under state supervision.
- 1.5 percent increase in the number of adults under local supervision.

JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

From 1979 to 1980, there was a:

- 1.1 percent decrease in the number of initial referrals to probation departments.
- 1.5 percent increase in the number of juveniles on caseload status.
- 4.6 percent increase in the number of juveniles detained in secure facilities.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE AGENCY EXPENDITURES AND PERSONNEL

From 1979 to 1980, there was a:

- 23.2 percent increase in total criminal justice agency expenditures reported.
- 22.1 percent increase in expenditures by state and local correctional agencies.
- 4.4 percent increase in total criminal justice agency personnel.
- 6.9 percent increase in state and local correctional agency personnel.



The Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program is administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). It provides criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management. In California, this program is administered by the Bureau of Criminal Statistics (BCS).

As part of this program, law enforcement agencies throughout the state report information to BCS on "selected" offenses. This information is processed and forwarded to the FBI for use in its annual publication, Crime in the United States.

The seven offenses, selected because of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and likelihood of being reported to the police, are referred to as Crime Index offenses by the FBI and as the Seven Major Offenses by BCS. The two components of both these measures of crime are classified as crimes against persons and crimes against property. Crimes against persons are willful

homicide, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Crimes against property are burglary, theft, and motor vehicle theft.

In 1979, FBI Crime Index offenses were expanded to include the property offense of arson. However, in order to maintain comparability between 1980 data and that of previous years, crimes of arson have been subtracted from the FBI Crime Index total. Analysis of the crime of arson will require the systematic collection of pertinent data for several successive years.

Arson excluded, annual numerical totals of FBI Crime Index offenses and the Seven Major Offenses of BCS are presented in Table 1. Differences between these totals are found in the crime of theft. The FBI counts all thefts, regardless of dollar value, and BCS counts only thefts of \$200 and over in value.

The impact of these differential counts on the two comprehensive measures of crime is considerable.

For example, in 1980:


- Approximately 65 percent of FBI Crime Index offenses were felonies and 35 percent were misdemeanors. In comparison, all Seven Major Offenses were felonies.
- Theft accounted for 49.5 percent of all FBI Crime Index offenses, but only 22.2 percent of the Seven Major Offenses.

Differences related to dollar value are discussed more fully as a subject of special interest immediately following analysis of the crime of theft (\$200 and over).

Most of the data essential to this section of the report are presented in Table 1. BCS Crime Index charts pertaining to each crime or group of crimes were developed from information provided in this table.

THE SEVEN MAJOR OFFENSES, 1975–1980 BCS Crime Index (1974=100)





For any given BCS Crime Index chart, the index number above each bar represents the crime rate of the year indicated in terms of its relationship to the 1974 crime rate, set at 100. Because changes in index numbers represent changes in crime rates, the analytical narrative is expressed directly in terms of rate changes.

IMPACT OF THE 1980 CENSUS ON CRIME RATES

Crime rates shown in Table 1 differ from those presented in previous reports. This difference is the result of using separate sets of population estimates to calculate crime rates in those years between censuses (1971–1979). Estimates used in this report were based on the 1980 California population count by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Estimates used in previous reports were based on the 1970 census.

THE SEVEN MAJOR OFFENSES, 1975–1980

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 10.1 percent increase in the rate of the Seven Major Offenses reported.

From 1975 to 1980:


■ There was a 23.4 percent rate increase in the Seven Major Offenses.

In 1980, of 1,192,489 Seven Major Offenses reported:

- 17.6 percent (209,903) were crimes against persons.
- 82.4 percent (982,586) were crimes against property.

CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS, 1975–1980

Crimes against persons are willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.


From 1979 to 1980:

- There was a 12.0 percent increase in the rate of crimes against persons reported, the largest annual increase for any year shown.
- The crime against persons with the greatest increase in rate, 16.9 percent, was robbery.

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 37.6 percent rate increase in crimes against persons. Individual crime rate increases ranged from 37.0 percent for robbery to 41.0 percent for forcible rape.


In 1980, of 209,903 crimes against persons reported:

- 1.6 percent (3,405) were willful homicides.
- 6.5 percent (13,661) were forcible rapes.
- 43.0 percent (90,282) were robberies.
- 48.9 percent (102,555) were aggravated assaults.

WILLFUL HOMICIDE, 1975-1980

Willful Homicide - The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 13.5 percent increase in the rate of willful homicides reported.

From 1975 to 1980:

There was a 40.2 percent rate increase in willful homicides.

In 1980, of 3,405 willful homicides reported, the type of weapon used was known in 3,317 cases (97.4 percent). Of

- 60.6 percent (2,011) were attributed to firearms.
- 23.1 percent (765) were attributed to knives or cutting instruments.

■ 16.3 percent (541) were attributed to other weapons, such as blunt objects, personal weapons, and "other."

HOMICIDES INVOLVING PEACE OFFICERS, 1971-1980

Because of the relatively small numbers of both peace officers killed in the line of duty and justifiable homicides by peace officers each year, annual percent changes are unreliable in detecting meaningful trends. Consequently, these data have been analyzed over a ten-year period.

Peace officers killed in the line of duty


From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 41.7 percent decrease in the number of peace officers killed (12 to 7).



From 1971-1975 to 1976-1980:

■ There was a 13.8 percent decrease in the number of peace officers killed in the past five years compared to those killed in the previous five years (58 to 50, respectively).

Justifiable homicides by peace officers

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 9.8 percent decrease in the number of justifiable homicides by peace officers (102 to 92).

From 1971-1975 to 1976-1980:

■ There was a 16.8 percent increase in the number of justifiable homicides by peace officers in the past five years compared to those in the previous five years (404 and 472, respectively).

FORCIBLE RAPE, 1975–1980

Forcible Rape - The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. (Includes attempts to commit forcible rape.)

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 9.8 percent increase in the rate of forcible rapes reported.


From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 41.0 percent rate increase in forcible rapes.

In 1980, of 13,661 forcible rapes reported:


- 66.2 percent (9,042) were rapes by force.
- 33.8 percent (4,619) were attempts to commit forcible rape.

ROBBERY, 1975-1980

Robbery - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 16.9 percent increase in the rate of robberies reported.

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 37.0 percent rate increase in robberies.

In 1980, of 90,282 robberies reported:

- 64.0 percent (57,742) were armed robberies.
- 36.0 percent (32,540) were strong-arm robberies.

Of the 57,742 armed robberies reported,

- 67.2 percent (38.807) involved the use of firearms.
- 20.4 percent (11,778) involved the use of knives or cutting instruments.
- 12.4 percent (7,157) involved the use of other dangerous weapons.

In 1980, of all robberies reported:


- 49.1 percent (44,342) were highway robberies (streets, parks, parking lots,
- 29.4 percent (26,528), were commercial robberies.

- 9.4 percent (8,478) were residential robberies.
- 2,2 percent (2,026) were bank robberies.
- **9.9** percent (8,908) miscellaneous robberies.


On the basis of data presented in Table 13, it was calculated that,

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 147.7 percent increase in the number of bank robberies (from 818 to 2,026), compared to a 49.8 percent increase in the number of all other types of robberies combined.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT, 1975-1980

Aggravated Assault - The unlawful attack or attempted attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was an 8.1 percent increase in the rate of aggravated assaults reported.

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 37.4 percent rate increase in aggravated assaults.

In 1980, of 102,555 aggravated assaults reported:


- 24.7 percent (25,346) involved the use of firearms.
- 19.5 percent (19,975) involved the use of knives or cutting instruments.

- 29.6 percent (30,324) involved the use of other dangerous weapons.
- 26.2 percent (26,910) involved the use of hands, fists, feet, etc.




AGGRAVATED ASSAULT CRIMES, 1975-1980 BCS Crime Index (1974=100)

CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY, 1975–1980

Crimes against property are burglary, theft (\$^00 and over), and motor vehicle theft.


From 1979 to 1980:

- There was a 9.8 percent increase in the rate of crimes against property reported, the largest annual increase for any year shown.
- The crime against property with the greatest increase in rate, 20.5 percent, was theft (\$200 and over).

From 1975 to 1980:

- There was a 20.8 percent rate increase in crimes against property.
- The crime against property with the greatest increase in rate, 75.5 percent, was theft (\$200 and over).

CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY, 1975–1980 BCS Crime Index (1974=100)




In 1980, of 982,586 crimes against property reported:

- 55.3 percent (543,846) were burglaries.
- 26.9 percent (264,192) were thefts (\$200 and over).
- 17.8 percent (174,548) were motor vehicle thefts.

BURGLARY, 1975-1980

Burglary - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. (Includes attempted forcible entry.)

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 7.8 percent increase in the rate of burglaries reported.

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 5.3 percent rate increase in burglaries. Of the Seven Major Offenses, this crime had the smallest rate increase during this period.

In 1980, of 543,846 burglaries reported:

■ 71.6 percent (389,394) involved entry or attempted entry of a structure by force.


■ 28.4 percent (154,452) involved entry of a structure without force (unlawful entry).

And,


- 67.5 percent (367,136) were residential.
- 32.5 percent (176,710) were nonresidential (commercial establishments, public buildings, etc.).

- 39.1 percent (212,503) occurred during the day.
- 34.5 percent (187,502) occurred during the night.
- 26.4 percent (143,841) occurred during an unknown hour.

THEFT (\$200 AND OVER), 1975-1980

Theft (\$200 and over) - The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property with a value of \$200 or more from the possession or constructive possession of another. (Except embezzlement, fraud, forgery, and worthless checks.)

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 20.5 percent increase in the rate of thefts (\$200 and over) reported. Of the Seven Major Offenses, From 1979 to 1980: this crime had the largest rate increase.

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 75.5 percent rate increase in thefts (\$200 and over). Of the Seven Major Offenses, this crime had the largest rate increase during this period.

The chart at the lower right pertains to thefts by dollar-value categories, as shown in the pie chart. However, the size of the index

chart precludes showing index numbers and percent change figures. They are presented in the indicated source tables.

When major dollar-value categories of theft were indexed to 1974 and analyzed from 1975 through 1980, pronounced differences were found.


- There was a 13.4 percent rate decrease in thefts of under \$50 in value.
- There was a 3.2 percent rate decrease in thefts of \$50-\$199 in value.
- There was a 75.5 percent rate increase in thefts of \$200 and over in value.

Differences in the rate changes of these categories of theft are attributed primarily to inflation.


In 1980, of 910,120 thefts reported:

- 41.4 percent (377,140) were under \$50 in value
- 29.5 percent (268,788) were \$50-\$199 in value.
- 29.0 percent (264,192) were \$200 and over in value.

THEFT CRIMES, 1980 Value of Loss






MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT, 1975-1980

Motor Vehicle Theft - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

From 1979 to 1980:

There was a 2.3 percent increase in the rate of motor vehicle thefts reported.

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 19.1 percent rate increase in motor vehicle thefts.

In 1980, of 174,548 motor vehicle thefts reported:

- 69.0 percent (120,473) were autos.
- 15.9 percent (27,679) were trucks and buses. (Included in this category are motor homes.)
- 15.1 percent (26,396) were "other" vehicles. (Included in this category are motorcycles, snowmobiles, motor scooters, and trail bikes.)

And, when reported motor vehicle thefts were analyzed by type of vehicle stolen (Table 18), it was found that:

- There was a .7 percent increase in the number of autos stolen.
- There was a 25.7 percent increase in the number of trucks and buses stolen.
- There was a 3.2 percent increase in the number of "other" vehicles stolen.


From 1975 to 1980:

- There was a 15.1 percent increase in the theft of autos.
- There was a 129.9 percent increase in the theft of trucks and buses.
- There was a 62.7 percent increase in the theft of "other" vehicles.



STOLEN AND RECOVERED PROPERTY, 1979-1980

Law enforcement agencies submit monthly reports to the Bureau of Criminal Statistics of the estimated dollar value of property stolen and property recovered. In these reports, type of property is categorized in a uniform manner, However, agencies do not report these data consistently and frequently vary in their methods of estimating the dollar value of stolen property. Furthermore, property stolen and property recovered in any given time period are not identical. For these reasons, dollar values of such property must be viewed as rough approximations.

From 1979 to 1980, it was found that:

■ There was a 40.1 percent increase in the dollar value of all property reported stolen.

- There was a 13.9 percent increase in the dollar value of motor vehicles reported stolen.
- There was a 51.9 percent increase in the dollar value of other property reported stolen.

- There was a 13.1 percent increase in the dollar value of all property reported recovered.
- There was an 11.1 percent increase in the dollar value of stolen motor vehicles reported recovered.
- There was a 19.2 percent increase in the dollar value of other stolen property reported recovered.

In 1980, of the total dollar value of all property reported stolen:

- 25.2 percent was that of stolen motor vehicles.
- 74.8 percent was that of other property.

And, of the total dollar value of property reported recovered,

- 73.2 percent was that of stolen motor vehicles.
- 26.8 percent was that of other property.

When the dollar value of property recovered in 1980 was related to that of property stolen in 1980, it was found that:


- The recovery ratio of all property stolen was 23.1 percent.
- The recovery ratio of stolen motor vehicles was 67.2 percent.
- The recovery ratio of other property stolen was 8.3 percent.


Despite the limitations of law enforcement agency data discussed earlier, the recovery ratios of 1980 were similar to those of 1979.

Arrests occur when persons are taken into custody because they are believed to have violated the law. Not all arrests result in persons being placed in jail. If not released by the arresting agency, many arrestees either post bail or are released on their own recognizance to appear in court at a later date. Others are issued citations, much like traffic tickets, which direct them to appear in court at a later date. Both arrests and citations are reported to the Bureau of Criminal Statistics (BCS).

In 1980, all California law enforcement agencies reported arrest and citation information to BCS on the "Monthly Arrest and Citation Register," which lists each arrestee; includes information on age, sex, and race/ethnic group; and specifies the "most serious" arrest offense and law enforcement disposition. Both arrest and citation information are included in BCS arrest statistics.

Arrests are divided into two major groups: adult arrests (18 years of age and older) and juvenile arrests. Adults and juveniles may be arrested for either felony or misdemeanor level offenses. A felony level offense can result in a sentence to state prison or death if the offender is convicted as an adult. A misdemeanor level offense can result in a fine or a sentence of up to one year in a county jail.

Juveniles may also be arrested for status offenses, which are acts of delinquency, such as incorrigibility, truancy, or runaway.

Most data basic to this section of the report are presented in Table 4. Arrest index charts pertaining to arrests at a particular level (felony or misdemeanor), arrests for status offenses, or arrests for a specific crime or group of crimes were developed from information provided in this table.

For any given arrest index chart in this 1980 report, the index number above each bar represents the number of arrests for the year indicated in terms of its relationship to the number of arrests in 1974, the base year set at 100. Similarly, percent change from year to year was measured in terms of number of arrests. The use of number of arrests as the basis of analysis in this report, rather than the arrest rates per 100,000 population used in the 1979 report, was a departure necessitated by the 1980 census (see below).


IMPACT OF THE 1980 CENSUS ON ARREST RATES AND THE BCS ARREST INDEX

Arrest rates shown in Table 4 differ from those presented in previous reports. This difference is the result of using separate sets of population estimates to calculate arrest rates in those years between censuses (1971-1979). Estimates used in this report were based on the 1980 California population count by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Estimates used in previous reports were based on the 1970 census.


Also, it will be noted that there are no arrest rates entered in the adult and juvenile columns of Table 4. This omission was necessitated by the unavailability of population estimates by age at the time of publication. For this reason, this year's index charts were constructed on the basis of the actual number of arrests for adults and juveniles rather than arrest rates per 100,000 population. As a result, the arrest index charts of this report, which were based on number of arrests, differ substantially from the BCS Arrest Index charts in last year's report, which were based on arrest

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TOTAL ARRESTS, 1980 Level of Arrest




Type of Arrest

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 4.0 percent increase in the number of felony arrests reported, a 7.8 percent increase in the number of misdemeanor arrests reported, and a 2.3 percent decrease in the number of status offense arrests reported.

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was a 5.4 percent decrease in felony arrests, a 23.8 percent increase in misdemeanor arrests, and a 62.8 percent decrease in arrests for status offenses.

On January 1, 1976, the law was changed to stipulate that the possession of not more than one ounce of unconcentrated marijuana was a misdemeanor rather than a felony offense.

The impact of the marijuana law was seen immediately in 1976 in the 16.4 point drop in the arrest index for felony arrests (from 97.8 to 81.4) and in the 8.1 point rise in the arrest index for misdemeanor arrests (from 98.2 to 106.3). Consequently, the law had no apparent overall effect on the number of total arrests.


In addition, in the early 1970s, federal monies were made available to establish programs that would divert status offenders from the juvenile justice system. Although this philosophy of "treatment by diversion" was not codified into law until 1977, it has had a considerable impact on arrest statistics beginning in 1974¹.

The effects of diverting status offenders from the juvenile justice system were first noted in 1975. In that year, the arrest index for status offense arrests dropped 20.2 points, followed by a 4.9 point drop in 1976. Then, in 1977, when diversion increased as a result of the 1977 law which supported this practice, the index dropped an additional 34.4 points, followed by a 9.8 point drop in 1978. Thus, from 1974 to 1978, the arrest index for status offenses decreased 69.3 points. Since 1979, changes in the index have been minimal, indicating that the major impact of diversion on the number of status offender arrests has, in all probability, been experienced.























From 1975 to 1980:

- There was a 41.7 percent increase in total arrests.
- There was a 49.3 percent increase in adult arrests and a 17.4 percent increase in juvenile arrests.

In 1980, of 45,363 arrests for all other offenses:

- 80.0 percent (36,300) were adult arrests.











The increase in both adult and juvenile arrests during this period is attributed largely to the 1976 marijuana law discussed at length on page 24. The impact of this law on misdemeanor drug law violation arrests in 1976 was dramatic. Since 1976, the number of adult arrests has remained relatively stable while the number of juvenile arrests has consistently declined.



The increase in misdemeanor arrests can be attributed directly to more adults being arrested in virtually all crime categories. The largest numerical and percentage increase (18.2 percent) occurred in the All Other category. This category includes a myriad of offenses, usually traffic offenses such as reckless driving or exhibition of speed, or violations of city/county ordinances such as loitering or selling without a permit. The second largest numerical and percentage increase was in arrests for drunk-driving. Almost 25,000 more arrests, representing a 9.0 percent increase, occurred in 1980 than in 1979.



MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS, 1980


ADULT AND JUVENILE ARRESTS BY OFFENSE






ADULT FELONY ARREST DISPOSITIONS IN 1980

The Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS) system in California describes the aggregate experience of adults arrested for felony offenses from their arrest through final disposition. Data pertain specifically to the 189,303 reported adult felony arrests reaching final dispositions in 1980. Because of underreporting, this number represents approximately 70 percent of all adult felony arrests receiving final dispositions in 1980.

Varying degrees of underreporting also occurred in previous years. As a result, this report omits trend analysis of adult felony arrest dispositions. However, for statewide data, proportions at the disposition levels have been essentially the same each year. The Data Limitations

DISPOSITIONS OF ADULT FELONY ARRESTS, 1980






Section of this report contains additional underreporting information. Despite underreporting, those arrest dispositions which were received generally describe the annual statewide processing of adult felony arrestees through California's criminal justice system.

The flow chart below displays the felony arrest dispositions reported for 1980. After arrest, the subject is released by the arresting agency or referred to the prosecutor, who determines if enough evidence is available to justify filing a complaint. The prosecutor releases or refers the arrestee to court for adjudication. Either dismissal, acquittal, or conviction occurs at the court level.

A more detailed report on 1980 adult felony arrest dispositions will be published in early September 1981.



Of the 189,303 adult felony arrest dispositions reported;

- 25.4 percent (47,982) were releases.
- 10.6 percent (20,057) of these releases were by law enforcement.
- 14.8 percent (27,925) of these releases were by the prosecutor (complaints denied).
- 74.7 percent (141,321) were complaints filed.
 - 18.9 percent (35,766) of these resulted in dismissals or acquittals.
- 55.8 percent (105,555) of these resulted in convictions in either lower or superior court.

Of all offenses shown:

- Burglary and homicide had the highest conviction rates (66.5 and 59.1 percent, respectively). Motor vehicle theft and forcible rape had the lowest conviction rates (45.4 and 43.8 percent, respectively).
- Forcible rape and drug law violations showed the highest rates of complaints denied (20.7 and 20.2 percent, respectively), while burglary and homicide showed the lowest rates (8.9 and 8.8 percent, respectively).
- Drug law violations and forcible rape had the highest court dismissal/ acquittal rates (24.3 and 21.0 percent, respectively), while motor vehicle theft and burglary had the lowest rates (14.5 and 14.4 percent, respectively).


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






- 70.9 percent of those convicted of robbery were sentenced to state institutions (2,767 of 3,905).
- Sentences to state institutions for other crimes ranged from 22.3 percent of those convicted of burglary (2,916 of 13,057) to 6.0 percent of those convicted of theft (1,267 of 21,273).

PRIOR CRIMINAL RECORD

Analysis of the known prior record of adult felons convicted in superior court revealed that offenders with no prior criminal record were less likely to receive sentences to state institutions, and were more likely to receive probation and probation with jail sentences.

More specifically, of 37,876 convicted adult felons whose prior criminal record and type of sentence were known:1

- 21.8 percent (8,275) had no prior criminal record. Of these.
- 15.7 percent (1,301) were sentenced to state institutions.
- 63.6 percent (5,260) were sentenced to probation with jail.









ADULT CORRECTIONS, 1975–1980

Adults convicted in California courts are usually placed under the jurisdiction of either the state correctional system or a correctional system operated by local government. The state correctional system provides both confinement and rehabilitative services through the California Department of Corrections (CDC), the California Youth Authority (CYA), the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC), and the California Department of Mental Health (CDMH). In addition, CDC carries out the death penalty when it is required to do so by the courts. Local correctional agencies provide confinement and rehabilitative services for those sentenced to their care and also house persons awaiting trial or sentencing.















The rise in commitments to state institutions over the last five years is most likely due to changes in sentencing practices. In 1977, the determinate sentence law was passed, which required that a specific sentence be issued. In addition, several new laws have been passed requiring that those convicted of certain crimes must be sentenced to prison. An example would be using a gun in the commission of a crime.


JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

The juvenile justice system in California is different from the adult system in both the type of offenders received and in the manner in which it processes them.

The juvenile justice system receives and processes persons under 18 years of age who have either violated criminal statutes or have committed "status offenses." Status offenses are those acts which are offenses only when committed by a juvenile, such as incorrigibility, truancy, and runaway.

The data shown in this report cover only a portion of the referrals to the juvenile justice system; that is, just the initial or

a Sources from which delinquent juveniles were initially referred to California probation departments.




new referrals. Not included are rereferrals which occur while the juvenile is currently on informal, non-ward, or formal probation. These referrals are the result of new crimes being alleged while the juvenile is on probation status. Generally, rereferrals receive harsher sentences than new or initial referrals. Although the total number of rereferrals is not known, subsequent petitions were filed on approximately 27,500 rereferrals who were adjudicated in juvenile court.

In 1980, the new juvenile justice reporting program was expanded to 54 counties. The program requires all delinquency referrals be reported, for both new and active cases. However, four large counties were still reporting in the

old format that compiles information only on initial referrals and some select rereferrals of active cases. While rereferrals comprise a large part of the system's overall activities, initial referral data are the only fully compatible elements contained within both old and new formats, limiting statewide information to such data until all 58 counties are using the new reporting program.

System processes are shown in the flow chart below. Initial referrals of law violators and status offenders are made to county probation departments by law enforcement agencies, schools, parents, and "other" sources.

INITIAL REFERRALS

Initial referrals are made when juveniles are not on probation or parole at the time of the referral. The term, initial referral, does not imply that the juvenile has not previously been in trouble with the law.

From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was a 1.1 percent decrease in the number of initial referrals.

From 1975 to 1980:

■ There was an 11.8 percent decrease in the number of initial referrals.

In 1980, of 144,268 initial referrals to probation departments:

- 92.2 percent (133,019) were made by law enforcement agencies.
- .9 percent (1,265) were made by schools.

- .4 percent (649) were made by parents.
- 6.5 percent (9,335) were made by "other and unknown" sources.

And,

- 78.7 percent (113,529) of the referrals were male.
- 21.3 percent (30,739) of the referrals were female.


On January 1, 1977, a major revision to the juvenile court law went into effect. The change did essentially two things. It encouraged the


essentially two things. It encouraged the diversion of status offenders from the system and it made certain law violators more responsible for their acts.

JUVENILE JUSTICE

First, the new law encouraged the diversion of status offenders to community programs which, in many cases, were outside the established juvenile justice system. The law change also stipulated that a status offender could not become a law violator solely because the juvenile failed to obey an order of the court.

Second, the new law stipulated that juveniles 16 and 17 years old, charged with specific felony law violations (murder, arson, armed robbery, forcible rape, kidnapping for ransom, aggravated assault, and certain violations involving discharge of firearms), must be adjudicated in adult court unless it was determined they were amenable to treatment available through the juvenile court. Prior to this change, "unfitness" for juvenile court had to be determined.


One major effect of these changes in the juvenile court law thus far has been to reduce status offender referrals to probation, as shown in the chart below.

Since 1979, changes in the index have been minimal, indicating that the major impact of diversion on the number of arrests of status offenders has probably been experienced.







JUVENILE DETENTION

County level detention facilities are used to house juveniles prior to a petition hearing and to provide treatment facilities after court or probation department determinations. These facilities are classified as "secure" and "nonsecure." Secure facilities, such as juvenile halls, camps, and ranches, are to be used solely for law violators. Status offenders may be held in a secure facility, prior to a hearing, for strictly limited time periods and under certain circumstances, such as locating and notifying parents, checking for warrants, or when the juvenile is a danger to himself or society. Nonsecure facilities, such as shelter care or crisis resolution homes, can be used for both law violators and status offenders.

As shown in Table 56. From 1979 to 1980:

■ There was an 8.3 percent increase in the number of juveniles in county probation detention facilities.

■ There was a 16.1 percent increase in the number of juveniles detained in nonsecure facilities, and a 4.6 percent increase in those detained in secure facilities.



CRIMINAL JUSTICE AGENCY EXPENDITURES AND PERSONNEL, 1975—1980

Expenditure and personnel data were collected by the Bureau and grouped into the following criminal justice agency categories: law enforcement, prosecution, public defense, courts, and corrections.

Criminal justice agency expenditures are fiscal year data obtained from the Governor's Budget and publications by the State Controller's Office. These data include salaries and employee benefits, services, and supplies. They do not include monies derived from federal and state grants or expended for building construction.

Personnel data were obtained from annual one-day counts of all authorized full-time employees.

EXPENDITURES, FISCAL YEARS 1974-75 – 1979-80

As shown in Table 57,

From Fiscal Year 1978-79 to Fiscal Year 1979-80:

■ There was a 23.2 percent increase in total criminal justice agency expenditures reported.

- There was a 23.9 percent increase in law enforcement agency expenditures. The largest increase in this criminal justice agency category was the sheriffs' departments expenditures (28.0 percent).
- There was a 24.0 percent increase in prosecution agency expenditures.
- There was a 33.9 percent increase in public defense agency expenditures, the largest percent increase in any criminal justice agency category.
- There was a 19.3 percent increase in court expenditures. Superior courts showed the largest increase (21.9 percent).
- There was a 24.1 percent increase in courtrelated expenditures.
- There was a 22.1 percent increase in expenditures by state and local correctional agencies, with the Youth Authority showing the largest percent increase (30.2 percent).


From Fiscal Year 1974-75 to Fiscal Year 1979-80:

■ There was a 79.2 percent increase in total criminal justice agency expenditures reported.

- There was a 77.4 percent increase in law enforcement agency expenditures. These expenditures accounted for over half of each year's total criminal justice agency expenditures.
- There was a 169.0 percent increase in prosecution agency expenditures, the largest percent increase of any criminal justice agency category.
- There was a 116.9 percent increase in public defense agency expenditures.
- There was a 61.1 percent increase in court expenditures.
- There was a 79.9 percent increase in courtrelated expenditures.
- There was a 73.7 percent increase in expenditures by state and local correctional agencies.

As noted, expenditures for categories of prosecution and public defense showed the largest percent increases. However, these agencies combined accounted for less than eight percent of each year's total criminal justice agency expenditures.

In Fiscal Year 1979-80, of \$3.8 billion expenditures reported by criminal justice agencies:

- 54.4 percent (\$2.1 billion) was spent by law enforcement agencies.
- 5.4 percent (\$205.6 million) was spent by prosecution agencies.
- 2.0 percent (\$74.9 million) was spent by public defense agencies.
- 9.3 percent (\$351.3 million) was spent by courts and court-related agencies. Courts spent \$236.6 million, and court-related agencies spent \$114.7 million.
- 28.9 percent (\$1,094.2 million) was spent by state and local correctional agencies.

From 1979 to 1980:

 There was a 4.4 percent increase in total criminal justice agency authorized full-time personnel reported.

- There was a 3.4 percent increase in law enforcement agency personnel.
- There was a 5.2 percent increase in prosecution agency personnel.
- There was an 8.2 percent increase in public defense agency personnel.
- There was a 3.8 percent increase in court personnel. Superior courts showed the largest increase in this category (7.0 percent).
- There was a 6.9 percent increase in state and local correctional agencies personnel.

From 1975 to 1980:

- There was a 7.5 percent increase in total criminal justice agency authorized full-time personnel reported,
- There was a 4.9 percent increase in law enforcement agency personnel.
- There was a 49.4 percent increase in prosecution agency personnel.
- There was a 21.3 percent increase in public defense agency personnel.

PERSONNE

- There was a 6.8 percent increase in court personnel.
- There was a 4.9 percent increase in state and local correctional agencies personnel.

Prosecution and public defense agencies reported the largest percent increases in personnel. However, these agencies combined accounted for approximately nine percent or less of each year's total criminal justice agency authorized full-time personnel.




TOTAL CRIMINAL JUSTICE AGENCY

CRIMES

Uniform Crime Reporting

■ Oakland Police Department theft (\$200 and over) crimes are underreported, and theft (under \$50) crimes are overreported for January through May.

ARRESTS

Arrest and Citation Register

Newport Beach Police Department misdemeanor arrest citations were not reported.

ADULT FELONY ARREST DISPOSITIONS

Offender-Based Transaction Statistics System

Characteristics and Data Limitations

between arrests compiled through the Bureau of Criminal Statistics (BCS) arrest reporting system and Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS) data on the dispositions of adult felony arrests. Arrest data, as reported on the Monthly Arrest and Citation Register, are based on the year the arrest occurred. OBTS data pertain to the year of final disposition regardless of when the felony arrest occurred, and may be reported a year or more after the actual arrest was made.

- OBTS data do not reflect the total number of adult felony arrests or the total number of dispositions at any particular level of the criminal justice system during a given disposition year. It is estimated that, in 1980, OBTS reports were received by BCS for approximately 70 percent of the total adult felony arrests which received a final disposition during the calendar year. Despite underreporting, those arrest dispositions which were received generally describe the annual statewide processing of adult felony arrestees through California's criminal justice system. However, county and local data should be used with caution since the extent of underreporting may vary between jurisdictions and from year to year.
- In cases where an individual is arrested and charged with multiple offenses, the OBTS system records only the most serious offense at both the time of arrest and the point of conviction. The seriousness of the offense is based on the severity of possible punishment. This and underreporting account for the differences between OBTS counts and statistics generated by the Administrative Office of the Courts, which counts individual acts.
- OBTS data on commitments to state institutions from lower and superior courts may vary from data compiled and reported by other state agencies because of differences in the data

collection systems. For example, the California Department of Corrections (CDC) counts the number of defendants actually received by CDC institutions (e.g., prison) even though some may have been committed from one or more counties. The OBTS system, on the other hand, counts each commitment.

ADULT CORRECTIONS

Characteristics and Data Limitations

- The data include only those adults placed on supervised probation.
- Data are limited to original grants of probation and do not include subsequent grants of probation to persons already under probation supervision in the same county.
- Persons on probation in more than one county or under the jurisdiction of both superior and lower courts are counted more than one time.
- Data were obtained from summary reports (containing counts only) provided by all county probation departments except one. The Alameda County Probation Department provided computer tape records of individual reports on each probationer.

JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

Characteristics and Data Limitations

- Because of variability in reporting by the Los Angeles County Probation Department, some underreporting occurred in the latter part of 1978, 1979, and 1980. By agreement with the agency, estimates were developed that more fully represent the number of initial referrals, initial petitions, and case removals handled by the department. Statewide data for these three types of transactions reflect Los Angeles County adjustments, However, data on offense distributions were not available at the time of publication and the Los Angeles County Probation data are not shown in Table 51 and the corresponding chart. Therefore, they contain data for only 57 counties. This was also true for last year's data.
- The number of Los Angeles County juvenile arrests referred to probation was used as a base to determine the approximate number of initial referrals, initial petitions, and removals during the year. For the first seven months of 1980, Los Angeles County initial referrals, initial petitions, and removals were proportionally consistent with juvenile arrests referred to the probation department. The last five months of initial referrals, petitions,

- and removals were estimated to retain that level of consistency. These annual estimates for Los Angeles County were added to data for the other 57 counties to produce statewide figures.
- In cases where a juvenile has multiple petitions filed for more than one offense, only the petition with the most serious offense is recorded. This accounts for the differences between Bureau of Criminal Statistics counts and the statistics generated by the Administrative Office of the Courts, which counts the number of petitions processed.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE GLOSSARY¹

ABSCOND: to leave the judicial jurisdiction without consent.

ACQUITTAL: a judgment of a court, based either on the verdict of a jury or a judicial officer, that the defendant is not guilty of the offense(s) for which he was tried.

ADULT: a person 18 years of age or older.

APPEAL: a petition initiated by a defendant for a rehearing in an appellate court of a previous sentence or motion.

ARREST: "... taking a person into custody, in a case and in the manner authorized by law. An arrest may be made by a peace officer or by a private person." (P.C. 834)

ARREST INDEX: this index expresses the number of arrests for each year from 1975–1980 in terms of its relationship to the 1974 number of arrests, which is set at 100. The difference between the index number of any given year and 100, whether positive or negative, represents percent change in the number of arrests relative to 1974.

ARREST RATE: the number of arrests per 100,000 population.

BCS CRIME INDEX: this is a number which expresses the crime rate of each year from 1975—1980 in terms of its relationship to the 1974 crime rate, which is set at 100. The difference between the index number of any given year and 100, whether positive or negative, represents percent change in the crime rate relative to 1974.

CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (CDC): the state agency which has jurisdiction over the California Rehabilitation Center and the California prison system.

CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER (CRC): an institution operated by the California Department of Corrections which is designated for the treatment of persons addicted to narcotics or in imminent danger of addiction. Commitment to the facility is by civil procedure only.

CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY (CYA): the state agency which has jurisdiction over and maintains institutions as correctional schools for the reception of wards of the juvenile

the reception of wards of the juvenile court and other persons committed from justice, municipal, and superior courts.

CAMPS, RANCHES, HOMES, AND SCHOOLS: county-level juvenile correctional facilities for post-court treatment of juvenile offenders. These facilities are maintained by county probation departments.

CHARGE: a formal allegation that a specific person has committed a specific offense.

CIVIL COMMITMENT: a type of commitment in which criminal proceedings are suspended while a defendant undergoes treatment at the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) as a narcotic addict; or in a state hospital under the Department of Mental Health as a mentally disordered sex offender or as a person declared insane.

by the probation department at the time the juvenile is referred to the department, following an investigation of the juvenile's circumstances and nature of the alleged offense. No further action is taken.

complaint: a verified written accusation, filed by a prosecuting attorney with a local criminal court, which charges one or more persons with the commission of one or more offenses.

drug, substance, or immediate precursor which is included in Schedules I through V inclusive, as set forth in Health and Safety Code Sections 11054 through 11058. These would include heroin, marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates, and psychedelics.

conviction: a judgment, based either on the verdict of a jury or a judicial officer or on the guilty plea of the defendant, that the defendant is guilty.

CORRECTIONS: see California Department of Corrections.

court an agency of the judicial branch of government, authorized or established by statute or constitution, having one or more judicial officers on its staff. A court has the authority to decide upon controversies in law and disputed matters of fact brought before it.

CRC: see California Rehabilitation Center.

CRIME: "... an act committed or omitted in violation of a law forbidding or commanding it" (P.C. 15)

CRIME RATE: the number of crimes per 100,000 general population.

CRIMINAL COMMITMENT: a type of commitment which results when a defendant is sentenced to prison or the California Youth Authority.

CYA: see California Youth Authority.

DEFENDANT: a person against whom a criminal proceeding is pending.

¹The following glossary terms are intended for this specific publication.

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DETERMINATE SENTENCING: sentencing which, by law, requires imposition of a term of imprisonment proportionate to the seriousness of the crime, with sentences uniform for like crimes.

DELINQUENT ACTS: those acts described under Welfare and Institutions Code Section 602 which involve violations by a juvenile of any law or ordinance defining crime, or the violation of a court order of the juvenile court.

DELINQUENT TENDENCIES: see Status Offense.

DISMISSAL: a decision by a judicial officer to terminate a case without a determination of guilt or innocence.

DISPOSITION — COURT: an action taken as the result of an appearance in court by a defendant. Examples would be: adults — dismissed, acquitted, or convicted and sentenced; juveniles — dismissed, transferred, remanded to adult court, placed on probation, or sentenced to the California Youth Authority.

DISPOSITION - POLICE: an action taken as the result of an arrest, Police dispositions include actions taken by prosecutors and account for a defendant's entry into lower or superior court or the juvenile justice system. Examples of a police disposition are: adults - released by law enforcement, referred to another jurisdiction, or a misdemeanor or felony complaint filed; juveniles handled within the department, referred to another agency, or referred to the probation department or juvenile court. (Uniform Crime Reports)

DISPOSITION - PROSECUTOR: an action taken as the result of complaints which were requested by

the arresting agency. Dispositions include granting a misdemeanor or a felony complaint, or denying a complaint for such reasons as lack of corpus, lack of probable cause, interest of justice, victim declines to prosecute, witness unavailable, illegal search and seizure, combined with other counts, etc.

DRUGS: see Controlled Substance.

EXISTING CRIMINAL STATUS: the type of correctional supervision at the time of the arrest which led to the disposition of the defendant in superior court. Categories include:

NONE: not under commitment.

FROBATION: at liberty in the community subject to meeting certain conditions and requirements of the disposition rendered at the time of conviction.

PAROLE: under supervision in the community after early release from an institution.

INSTITUTION: confined in California, federal, or other state penal institution.

FELONY: "...a crime which is punishable with death or by imprisonment in the state prison..."
(P.C. 17)

FILING: a document filed with the municipal court clerk or county clerk by a prosecuting attorney alleging that a person committed or attempted to commit a crime.

FINE: the penalty imposed upon a convicted person by a court requiring that he pay a specified sum of money.

GRANT: the act of placing an adult on probation.

GUILTY PLEA: a defendant's formal answer in open court to the charge(s) in a complaint, indictment, or information, stating that the charge(s) is true and that he has committed the offense(s) as charged.

INITIAL PETITION: a petition filed in juvenile court for a minor, who is currently not under active probation supervision or on parole from CYA, alleging that the minor has committed a delinquent act.

INITIAL REFERRAL: a juvenile who is not actively being supervised or on CYA parole is brought to the attention of the probation department for alleged behavior under Welfare and Institutions Code Sections 601 or 602.

INTAKE DETERMINATION: the probation department disposition of an initial referral; these are usually "closed or transferred," "informal probation," or "petition filed."

JAIL: a county or city facility for incarceration of sentenced and unsentenced persons.

JUVENILE: a person under the age of 18.

JUVENILE COURT: the court responsible for adjudicating juvenile offenders.

JUVENILF, HALL: a county-operated facility used for temporary detention of juvenile offenders pending their court appearance, and in some instances, for short-term (up to 180 days) post-adjudication rehabilitative purposes.

LAW VIOLATIONS: those acts described under Welfare and Institutions Code Section 602 which involve violations by a juvenile of any law or ordinance defined as a crime.

LOWER COURT: municipal or justice court.

MANDATORY SENTENCING: sentencing mandated by law which limits judicial discretion for specific convicted offenders.

MDSO – MENTALLY DISORDERED SEX OFFENDER: "... any person who, by reason of mental defect, disease, or disorder, is predisposed to the commission of sexual offenses to such a degree that he is dangerous to the health and safety of others" (Welfare and Institutions Code Section 6300)

MISDEMEANOR: a crime punishable by imprisonment in a county jail, by a fine, or by both. Under certain conditions defined by Section 17 of the Penal Code, a felony crime can be treated as a misdemeanor.

MONTHLY ARREST AND CITATION REGISTER: a reporting system used to collect information on adult and juvenile arrests. The Arrest Register reports details which identify age, sex, and race characteristics of offenders and creates a link to subsequent court activity.

MUNICIPAL OR JUSTICE COURT: the court of original or trial jurisdiction for the prosecution of persons accused of misdemeanor or certain felony offenses. Also, municipal and justice courts conduct preliminary hearings to determine probable cause in the case of felony offenders who are subject to jurisdiction of superior courts — the felony trial court.

NONSECURE FACILITY: shelter care, crisis resolution home, or counseling and educational centers.

OFFENDER-BASED TRANSACTION STATISTICS (OBTS): a system designed to collect statistical information on the various processes within the criminal justice system that occur between the point of arrest and the point of final disposition.

OFFENSE: the charged offense is the offense for which the defendant was arrested or filed on by the district attorney. The convicted offense is the offense for which the defendant was convicted of or pled guilty to in court. The sustained offense is the offense for which the juvenile court sustains a petition.

PAROLE: the supervision of an offender in the community after early release from a county jail or a state institution.

PETITION: the formal presentation to the juvenile court of information surrounding the alleged offense by a juvenile; similar to a criminal complaint for an adult.

PRIOR CRIMINAL RECORD (OBTS SYSTEM): the criminal record prior to the arrest which led to the disposition of the defendant in superior court. Categories include:

NONE: no arrests.

MISCELLANEOUS: any number of arrests or convictions with a sentence(s) of less severity than state prison.

PRISON: any number of state prison commitments.

PRISON: a state correctional facility where persons are confined following conviction of a felony offense.

PROBATION: a judicial requirement that a person fulfill certain conditions of behavior in lieu of a sentence to confinement but sometimes including a jail sentence.

PROBATION WITH JAIL: a type of disposition rendered upon conviction which imposes a jail term as a condition of probation status.

PROBATION — **FORMAL**: a probation grant in which the minor is declared a ward of the juvenile court and placed on formal probation.

PROBATION — INFORMAL: supervision of a minor, in lieu of filing a petition, for a period not to exceed six months. The supervision is based on a contractual agreement between the probation officer and the minor's parents or guardian provided for under Welfare and Institutions Code Section 654.

PROBATION — NON-WARD: a probation grant without wardship from juvenile court for a specific time not to exceed six months as described under Welfare and Institutions Code Section 725a.

PROSECUTOR: an attorney employed by a governmental agency whose official duty is to initiate and maintain criminal proceedings on behalf of the government against a person accused of committing criminal offenses.

PUNISHMENT: a minimum sentence for a felony conviction is six months in state prison, maximum is death. Misdemeanor convictions are punishable by imprisonment in the county jail for one day to one year, or by a fine, or both.

REMAND TO ADULT COURT: a juvenile at least 16 years of age is referred to adult court under provisions of Welfare and Institutions Code Section 707 because he is not "amenable" to the treatment available through the juvenile court.

REMOVAL: a case removed from the active caseload and no longer under the supervision of the probation department, or a case not removed but escalated to a more advanced level of supervision.

REREFERRALS CLOSED AT INTAKE: an intake disposition other than a petition filing made for a juvenile already on probation or parole at the time of referral to a probation department for a new arrest.

REVOCATION: cancellation or suspension of parole or probation.

REVOKE: withdraw, repeal, or cancel probation or parole for an adult.

SARB (SCHOOL ATTENDANCE REVIEW BOARD): a school system board which provides a review process outside of and prior to the probation department referral system for juveniles.

SECONDARY GRANT: a subsequent grant of probation in the same court for an adult still on probation for the initial grant. That is, a probation sentence following conviction in a given court on a subsequent offense when the sentence in the same court for the first offense was also probation.

SECURE FACILITY: a facility in which a juvenile is held behind a locked door, gate or fence, or in which some person is responsibile for physically preventing the juvenile's escape or departure from the facility.

SENTENCE: the penalty imposed by a court upon a convicted person.

STATE INSTITUTION: a facility for housing defendants that are under the jurisdiction of the state correctional or treatment programs.

STATUS OFFENDER: a juvenile who has been adjudicated by a judicial officer of a juvenile court, as having committed a status offense, which is an act or conduct which is an offense only when committed or engaged in by a juvenile.

STATUS OFFENSE: an act or conduct, described by Welfare and Institutions Code Section 601, which is declared by statute to be an offense, but only when committed or engaged in by a juvenile, and which can be adjudicated only by a juvenile court.

STRAIGHT PROBATION: probation granted to adults with no condition or stipulation that the defendant serve time in jail as a condition of probation.

SUBSEQUENT DISPOSITION: a judicial decision or sentence given at the time of a court return.

SUBSEQUENT GRANT: see Secondary Grant.

SUBSEQUENT PETITION: a petition filed on behalf of a juvenile who is already under the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.

SUMMARY SYSTEM: a data collection method based on gross counts as differentiated from one based on an individual incident count.

SUPERIOR COURT: the court of original or trial jurisdiction for felony cases and all juvenile hearings. Also, the first court of appeals for municipal or justice court cases.

TERMINATED: completed specified term of probation.

TRANSFER: a disposition which transfers a juvenile to another agency within the county such as a welfare department, a health department, a legal aid society, etc. or referral to any agency outside the county including the probation departments of other counties.

TRIAL: a determination of guilt or innocence by a judge, jury, or by the court on the basis of testimony contained in a transcript. There are three types of trials:

COURT: the decision is rendered by the judge.

JURY: the decision is rendered by a panel of the defendant's peers.

TRANSCRIPT: the decision is rendered by the court on a basis of the testimony contained in the transcript of the preliminary hearing held in lower court.

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTS (UCR):

a federal reporting system which provides data on crime based on police statistics submitted by law enforcement agencies in the nation. The Bureau of Criminal Statistics administers and forwards the data for California to the federal program.

VIOLATION: breach or infringement of the terms or conditions of probation.

YA - YOUTH AUTHORITY: see California Youth Authority.

OFFENSE DEFINITIONS CRIMES REPORTED LEVEL

FBI CRIME INDEX OFFENSES: seven offenses, because of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and likelihood of being reported to the police, were initially selected to serve as an Index for evaluating fluctuations in the volume of crime. These crimes, known as the Crime Index offenses, were murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larcenytheft, and motor vehicle theft. By congressional mandate, arson was added as the eighth Index offense in late 1978. (This definition was taken from "Crime in the United States, 1979.")

NONAGGRAVATED ASSAULT: an assault which did not involve the use of a firearm, knife, or cutting instrument, or other dangerous weapon, and there was no serious injury or aggravated injury to the victim.

SEVEN MAJOR OFFENSES: offenses most likely to be reported to the police by the public. These offenses are willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft (\$200 and over), and motor vehicle theft, and are reported according to definitions taken from the F.B.I. Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook.

Crimes Against Persons

Willful Homicide — the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. (Includes murder and nonnegligent manslaughter.)

Forcible Rape — the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. (Includes attempts to commit forcible rape.)

Robbery — the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by instilling fear.

Aggravated Assault — the unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon and/or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

Crimes Against Property

Burglary — the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. (Includes attempted forcible entry.)

Theft (\$200 and Over) — the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another with a value of \$200 or more. (Except embezzlement, fraud, forgery, worthless checks.)

Motor Vehicle Theft – the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.
