


The cooperation of the many colleges and universities in Virginia and the support and encouragement of prominent Virginia professionals in public safety management is gratefully acknowledged.

PUBLIC SAFETY CAREERS IN MANAGEMENT

Public Safety Management covers a broad area of endeavor that is largely concentrated in governmental operations; although many functions of a public safety manager require the same skills that are required in the management of any large enterprise.

Positions in public safety management are normally filled by promotion within or from a public safety agency. Appointments to the higher positions in public safety work are frequently made by a governor at the State level, and by the President at the national level, but between these top positions and the entry-level positions there are many administrative and management positions that can provide satisfying and rewarding careers for those who have the ability and personal commitment to prepare themselves for them.

Public safety is a relatively new concept that groups many functions, operations, and agencies concerned with the protection of the individual and property for comprehensive attention and direction.

In Virginia, the Governor has created an Office of Public Safety which is headed by a Secretary of Public Safety. Under the Office of Public Safety are three of the larger State Agencies: the Department of State Police; the Department of Corrections; and the Alcoholic Beverage Commission. Additionally, the Commonwealth Attorney's Services and Training Council, the Criminal Justice Services Commission, the Capitol Police, the Fire Services Commission, the Office of Fire Service Training, the Rehabilitative School Authority, the Parole Board, and the Division of Justice and Crime Prevention are included under the Office of Public Safety.

Public safety actually extends beyond the functions of those agencies that are under the Office of Public Safety and include a number of other operations that are the responsibility of agencies that are assigned to other Secretaries in Virginia State Government. To name just a few: the Division of Motor Vehicles performs many functions that are closely allied to public safety; so also does the Department of Military Affairs, the Department of Transportation Safety and the Department of Emergency and Energy Services. Under the Office of Human Resources are a host of agencies that have strong influence on public safety and the Office of Commerce and Resources includes a number of agencies with direct association with law enforcement as well as public safety regulatory functions.

The judiciary, which though separate from the executive branch of government, has a major impact on public safety in many ways through its adjudication and disposition of criminal and civil cases.

The legislative branch of government, with its numerous commissions and supporting offices is the source of all laws and resolutions within which both the executive and judiciary perform their public safety functions.

Finally, there are the largely autonomous governmental bodies that exercise regulatory and review authority, much of which is directly associated with public safety. Most prominent of these groups are the Office of the Attorney General, the State Corporation Commission, the Auditor of Public Accounts, and the Industrial Commission.

All of these agencies, commissions, and courts employ many people in roles that are directly identified with public safety. Careers in public safety may be found within a single employer-agency and to a growing extent involve movement from one agency to another, and from one branch of government to another. The need in management is for people who can function successfully in a number of disciplines and who can fully appreciate the many divergent influences on their particular responsibilities.

The milieu of public safety at the State level is found also at city, town, and county levels in Virginia, and again in the national government.

As an individual moves up to administrative, supervisory, and management level in public safety the new and expanding responsibilities of each position will generally remove him/her further and further from the special skills required for performance at entry levels. The police officer who is promoted to sergeant finds that his responsibilities no longer emphasize performance of the duties of a police officer, but how to direct police officers. The Captain of Police or Corrections does not act as a super officer, but rather he organizes and delegates to lieutenants, while exercising command at the operational level, and management in his administrative role.

One does not need to progress very far up a career ladder before the skills of police work or of a prosecutor are of reduced significance in comparison to the new roles in supervising, administration, and management. The awareness of basic skills remains from past training and experience, but the need is to use available resources, manpower, physical, and fiscal, in the most effective way; and that is public safety management.

The listing of public safety positions which follows provides some indication of the many opportunities which exist for the individual who is interested in making public safety his/her career. The positions listed are substantially above the entry level. The pay range expressed by Salary Grade for State positions can be determined by an inquiry to any personnel office of a State agency. Educational requirements for many of the positions may permit the substitution of appropriate experience for college work. In the final analysis, however, it is the person who has received a sound college education who will be most able to qualify for a variety of new work experiences. The college graduate has important additional advantages since he/she has generally also acquired a strong sense of self-worth and confidence during college years through exposure to a broader perspective of the problems that will be encountered in positions of leadership.

HIGHER EDUCATION FOR MANAGEMENT CAREERS IN PUBLIC SAFETY

This booklet has been prepared to assist a person in selecting an appropriate college program as an educational base for a management career in public safety. The prospective student may be one who has recently graduated from high school and is thinking about a career in public safety, or a person who is already a part of the public safety system and is interested in preparing to move ahead into management and administrative positions. Such a person should realize that the skills that are needed in managing the many elements of the public safety system are not dissimilar from the skills that are needed in business, industry, and other branches of government, and may be acquired in a variety of programs available in many institutions.

A college education has been generally recognized as a strong base upon which a successful career can be built. While many other considerations enter into success in any field, an appropriate educational background provides significant advantages to the person who is motivated to move ahead into positions of responsibility.

1. Availability of Appropriate Education

The higher education opportunities for public safety management careers are available in almost all colleges and universities in Virginia. The variety of curricula from which the student can choose includes programs in management and administration; the social, physical, and behavioral sciences; humanities, general education, and special skills in the use of computer technology. In general, the program a student chooses will be a blend of all or most of these programs in a variety of concentrations. The particular mix and concentration that is best for any student should be a reflection of the individual student's aptitudes, motivation, and interests. Absolute measure of value or excellence of any curriculum must be viewed from the standpoint of each student.

Numerous studies have identified paths in higher education that can be generally categorized as traditional, professional, and technological. While each of these paths can be further subdivided and defined they can be viewed broadly as programs which emphasize learning to comprehend, compared to learning to operate. Essentially, all of the programs discussed in this booklet represent a blend of these two extremes: the abstract and the concrete; the aesthetic and the pragmatic; the theoretical and the applied. The student has almost limitless choices from which to select a program best suited to his interests.

The academic policy and commitment of each college or university will generally be reflected in the substance of the programs recommended for public safety management careers. At the same time, individual schools or colleges within a university may have differing views on appropriate education for public safety management or on education in general.

2. Student Diversity - System Needs

Students who are interested in public safety management careers are a diverse group. They probably range in age from 18 to over 50 years, in experience in public safety from entry level to over 20 years, and in positions from trainee level, administrative, and mid-management, to supervisory and executive levels. This diversity of students would seem to indicate that a broad range of curricula is appropriate if not necessary.

Coupled with the above considerations, the public safety system has need for managers and supervisors who are equipped with a variety of skills and aptitudes. Although each element within the system (courts, corrections, police, etc.) may have numerous differences in objectives and operational characteristics, all find a common denominator in the management skills required in their leaders. Colleges and universities attempt to meet these needs in their curricula, and to the extent that the prospective student can define his goals, counselors attempt to design appropriate educational programs.

3. Scope of Programs and Institutions

This booklet contains sample undergraduate programs available at almost all senior institutions of higher education in Virginia. Both private and public colleges and universities are represented. An attempt has been made to select the most appropriate curricula at each institution for inclusion in this booklet. At the same time, it is recognized that the needs of an individual may be better served by a program which differs substantially from the program that has been included.

Many institutions include an ROTC program in their academic offerings. The sample programs contain several suggested "ROTC Options", but a number of colleges may have ROTC available although it has not been specifically mentioned as an option.

The sample programs are intended to represent appropriate education for a student aspiring to a management career in public safety and entering college soon after graduation from high school. At the same time, the sample programs are applicable to older students who attend college classes in the evening or on less than a full-time basis.

Each college has been given the opportunity to either prepare a sample program or to comment on a program assembled from the current college catalog, often adjusted to incorporate suggestions by the college faculty or academic dean. Regardless, it is expected that the sample programs will serve only as a point of reference from which individual programs will develop as modifications which reflect the needs of individual students. Where institutions have only a single program shown, it is not intended to imply that this is the only available appropriate program in the college. Some colleges may have only a business administration program shown, and others a sociology or political science program, but many colleges are able to offer all of these as well as other appropriate programs.

4. Education for Versatility and Choice

Essentially, the suggested programs are intended as guides leading to the development of an educated individual. The educational content of programs varies, but their overall scope is such that the applications of the earned degree are not limited to a narrow field of work. Hence, the individual completing a program is not bound to working within a particular agency, branch of the justice system, or even government. At the same time, the graduate of any of the programs will have the educational base for performing in a variety of managerial, administrative, or technical capacities.

These are programs of higher education with emphasis on academics, and that learning which has been traditionally the province of the college campus. None of the programs are intended to provide the total skills, necessary to function as a manager or supervisor of a public safety operation without additional experience and/or training in the functions and practices of the agency. Where specific training is required either before or upon entry into a position, and is normally provided by attendance at a training academy, that training has generally not been included or repeated in the suggested academic programs.

5. Characteristics of a Professional Manager

These curricula are demanding and broadly based. The emphasis is on the development of the characteristics of a professional manager. The curricula are intended to equip a graduate to:

- a. Have a solid understanding of financial accounting and reporting.
- b. Be comfortable with using statistics in decision-making.
- c. Be aware of the basic law of the nation and functions of government.
- d. Recognize the importance of relations with the general public and the potential for support or opposition that exists in the way that public perceives both him and his organization.
- e. Have sound knowledge of human motivation and behavior and be aware of predictable responses to his decisions and actions.
- f. Be able to project understanding of individual responses to group pressures and influences.
- g. Understand logic but not permit this understanding to obscure reality.
- h. Recognize value systems differing from his own, while maintaining sound personal ethics.

- i. Maintain a broad perspective, accept adversity as inevitable, and see compromise as essential and even desirable.
- j. Understand the capabilities of management information and communications systems.
- k. Appreciate the dynamic nature of life and be comfortable with it.

6. Curricula For Public Safety Management

The curricula which evolve from a consideration of the requirements for professional management have a strong liberal arts base with emphasis on management and administration. They are programs that have broad scope and demanding subject matter. The programs challenge the intellect and provide the educational base for successfully handling major executive and managerial responsibilities.

The Bachelor's degree was selected as the objective of these programs since the attainment of the above characteristics would seem to require a four-year curriculum. At the same time, this emphasis on the Bachelor's degree is not intended to limit the involvement on community or junior colleges in the first two years of college work, nor is there an intention to imply that a two-year degree may not be appropriate for many students. Although it is beyond the scope of this booklet; graduate studies may logically follow any of the suggested curricula. The consensus appears to strongly support programs leading to Master's degrees in Business or Public Administration as most valuable in furthering the capabilities of public safety managers.

Such programs of higher education are not going to appeal to everyone. Just as management careers are neither aspired to nor within the potential of everyone. The smaller public safety agencies may have little need to employ professional managers, but larger agencies have numerous positions that can profit from the application of professional management skills.

7. Cost of a College Education

No one who has the intellectual curiosity to aspire to a college education will be surprised to realize that a four-year degree is a costly credential to acquire. Further, there is a general awareness that the cost of attending college has been mounting steadily as inflation has been felt in both the public and private colleges and universities. A review of college catalogs will show that there is a substantial difference in the costs of tuition and fees in the educational institutions in Virginia. Differences exist also in the cost of board and room and in the social life of the institution. While the individual student can control some of these expenses, the basic costs of tuition and fees are outside of the individuals control.

Regardless of the considerable differences in the costs at various institutions, a student should not be dissuaded from applying to the college or university of his/her choice solely on the basis of cost. Many of the private institutions with the highest costs are able to assist worthy students through

scholarship awards that can defray a major part of the total cost. Tuition assistance in various forms is available at all institutions in the form of outright grants or scholarships, or as student loans that usually carry low interest rates and extended repayment plans. Scholarships and loans are frequently renewable for each year of attendance, usually depending on the student's successful achievement and on a continuing need for financial assistance.
