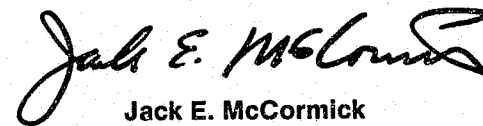
Foreword

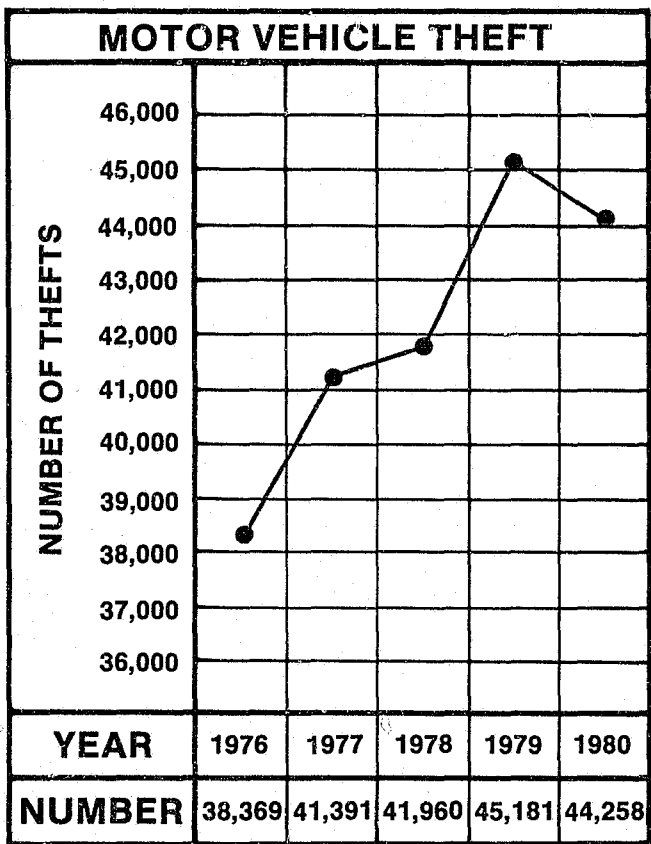
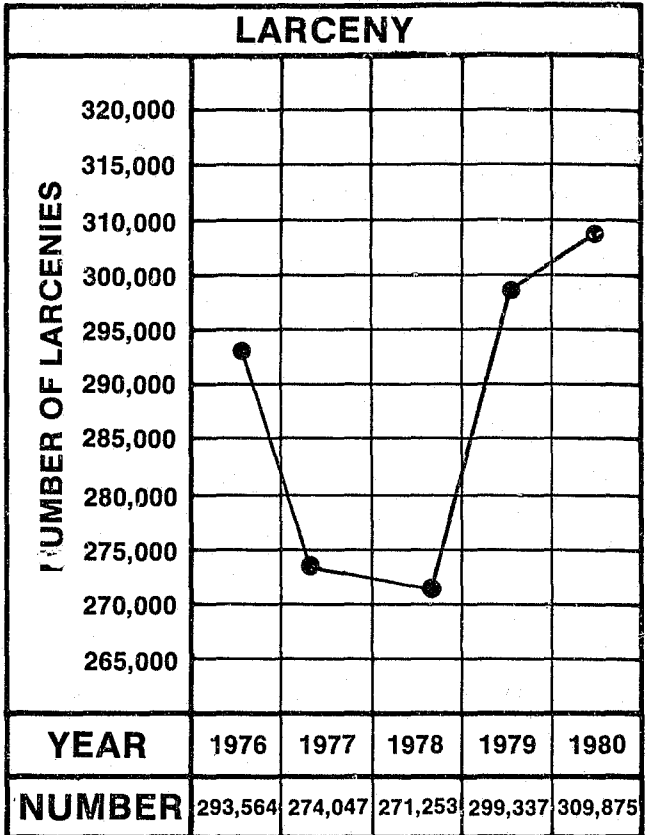
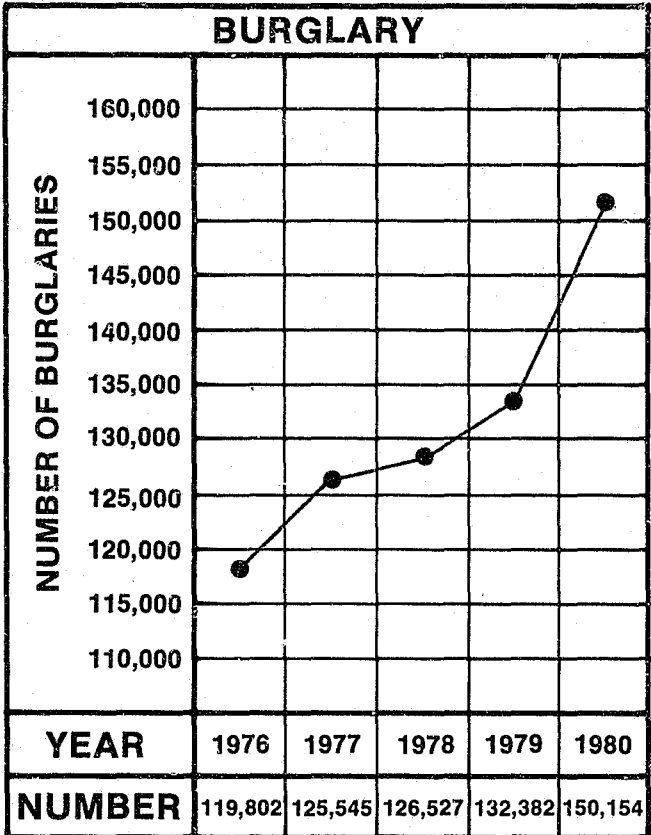

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

The Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting Section is gratefully recognized for their assistance in the state level collection of UCR data.

Donna J. Geniesse of the BCI/UCR staff is especially acknowledged for her professionalism and dedication to duty, which made this report possible.

History of Uniform Crime Reporting

Although the impetus for collecting nationwide crime information dates back to the 1890's, no ongoing program was initiated until the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) was established in 1927. This Committee's responsibility to provide management information to law enforcement agencies was eventually turned over to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) in 1930, when the FBI received a Congressional mandate to collect and disseminate national crime information. The IACP has continued to serve the Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR) in an advisory capacity, and has been joined in this responsibility by the Committee on Crime Records of the National Sheriffs' Association.

UCR receives crime information through voluntary reports submitted by over 15,000 individual law enforcement agencies across the country. In 1966, the FBI began coordinating UCR data collection through designated state level agencies which report state-wide information to the FBI each month. The Ohio Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation (BCI) is pleased to administer one of the 45 state level UCR programs.

Objectives of Ohio UCR

Because increasing attention has been focused on the problem of crime in our communities in recent years, many segments of our population need more complete information for a variety of reasons.

Ohio citizens are understandably concerned about the possibility of becoming victims of crime. Law enforcement professionals, managers and administrators who must focus on crime in their own jurisdictions, also need to know what is occurring in surrounding jurisdictions in order to deploy personnel and equipment most efficiently. Legislators need state-wide information about crime in order to pass laws that will increase the stability of our society. Researchers and planners need to know what is actually happening to predict trends and recommend changes.

The goal of *Crime in Ohio* is to identify the nature and extent of criminal activity in this state and present the information needed by each of these groups. This information will not in itself prevent crime, but it may encourage all segments of society, by understanding the problem, to work together with law enforcement agencies to reduce crime through more effective enforcement.

The objectives of *Crime in Ohio* are:

1. To identify the nature and extent of crime in our state;
2. To produce a reliable set of criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management;
3. To provide our citizens with the most complete indication of fluctuations in the level of crime in our society;
4. To provide legislators with the information necessary to formulate laws which address the crime problem; and
5. To provide sufficiently detailed data for researchers and planners.

Considerations for Interpretation

Statistics are a tool used to summarize information so that patterns or trends become clearer. All statistics must be interpreted with an understanding of just what it is that they can say. Too often information of the type in this report is used incorrectly to draw conclusions that the statistics simply do not support. In order to avoid this error, it is necessary to know what information is included and how it is reported.

To obtain accurate information and to provide nationwide uniformity in the reporting of data, the national UCR program had to adopt standardized definitions for collecting such information as the number of offenses, arrests, clearances, and value of stolen or recovered property. Because of variances in punishment for the same offenses in different state codes, there is no possibility in a program such as this to distinguish between felony and misdemeanor crimes. The methods of collecting and some resulting limitations are explained below.

Classification of Offenses

UCR divides offenses into two major classifications which are designated Part I and Part II offenses. This distinction is important to keep in mind because different information is collected for each. Part I offenses include 1) violent crimes: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault; and 2) property crimes: burglary, larceny (theft) and motor vehicle theft. Seven of these Part I offenses (excluding negligent manslaughter), because of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and likelihood of being reported to police, serve as a crime index and are used to calculate crime rates (see sections entitled Crime Index and Crime Rate).

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All other offenses are classified under Part II (see Definitions section, page 11).

All offenses are classified and reported monthly, on the basis of law enforcement officer investigation in accordance with UCR offense definitions (which will not necessarily be identical to State Code definitions). Because UCR identifies a police problem, offense classifications are not based on the findings of a court, coroner, jury or decision of a prosecutor.

Counting of Offenses

The number of offenses is collected only for Part I crimes and simple assault. Attempts to commit these crimes are also counted as offenses.

The number of offenses is not reported for Part II offenses. The only information collected for Part II crimes is arrest information.

The following are methods for counting the Part I crimes:

For murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, rape, aggravated assault and simple assault, one offense is counted for each victim, regardless of the number of offenders involved.

For robbery and larceny, one offense is counted for each distinct operation which is separate in time and place. The number of victims in any one operation does not determine the number of offenses. For example, if 20 people are robbed in a bar at the same time, only one offense is counted. However, if that robber then leaves the bar and holds up a passerby, a second offense has occurred.

For burglary, one offense is counted for each structure which is illegally entered. However, when the structure is an apartment house, or business or office building in which units are leased for a period of time, one offense is counted for each unit burglarized.

For motor vehicle theft, one offense is counted for each vehicle stolen.

For multiple offenses that occur in one crime incident, only the most serious offense is counted. Part I crimes are ranked according to seriousness and appear in order from most serious to least serious under "Classification of Offenses," pg. 7. Example: A robber takes a man's wallet and then beats him causing serious injury. Both a robbery and an aggravated assault have occurred, but because robbery is considered by UCR to be more serious, only the robbery is counted. From one perspective, this method of counting seriously understates the crime problem, but from another, it prevents undue inflation of crime statistics.

Clearances

An offense is considered cleared (solved) in one of two ways: (1) at least one person is arrested, charged, and turned over to the court for prosecution, even though several may have been involved; or (2) by exceptional means when some element beyond police control precludes the physical arrest of an offender. Examples of clearances by exceptional means would be when an offender: commits suicide; makes a dying declaration; confesses while in custody or serving time for another crime; is prosecuted in another jurisdiction for the same offense; is a juvenile who is handled by notifying the parents; or when the victim refuses to prosecute or another jurisdiction refuses to extradite the offender.

Clearances are broken down into the categories of "adult" and "juvenile". A "juvenile" clearance is counted only when juveniles are exclusively involved in the clearance of an offense. If the arrest of both adults and juveniles results in a clearance, it is counted as an "adult" clearance.

Note: Not all crimes are cleared within the calendar year in which the offense occurs.

Property Stolen and Recovered

The figures for value of property stolen and recovered are reported only for Part I offenses and do not include such Part II offenses as fraud, forgery or embezzlement.

Questions often arise in evaluating these figures. The values of property stolen and recovered reflect values reported by each agency for only those crimes occurring within each "home" jurisdiction. It does not matter who actually recovers the property or where it was recovered. If it was stolen from a particular jurisdiction, that agency reports the values of stolen and recovered property.

Oftentimes recovered property is in a condition different from what it was at the time of the theft. Although property can increase in value over time, it is more likely that stolen property will be recovered in a damaged condition. It is this market value at the time of recovery that is reported. Therefore, recovery value does not necessarily represent a "clearance rate" for stolen property, and one cannot use it to determine law enforcement effectiveness in recovering stolen goods. Because stolen and recovered property figures indicate thefts and recoveries in the current year, it is important to note that recovered property may have been stolen in a previous year.

Arrests

Arrest information is collected for all Part I and Part II offenses according to the age, sex and race of the offender. It is not possible, however, to correlate race with sex or specific ages because the information is collected independently, thus limiting analysis. Furthermore, arrest figures cannot be directly related to the number of crimes cleared because arrest totals refer to numbers of offenders arrested for each offense, while clearance totals refer to the number of offenses for which an arrest or arrests have occurred.

In the case of an arrest made on multiple charges, only the most serious violation is reported into UCR, as was the rule discussed in "Counting of Offenses".

Reporting Variations

During 1980 Ohio received Uniform Crime Reports from 466 law enforcement agencies. Because the number of reporting agencies is so large, one must be aware that unintentional variations from UCR guidelines may occur that would affect the validity of the data presented here.

Offense totals vary from the actual number of offenses that occur because UCR statistics are based on crimes that are reported to law enforcement agencies and many crimes are not reported. Also, it is possible that a law enforcement agency would submit fewer than the complete 12 months of offense reports. Offense counts listed in Table 24, pg. 96 are based on actual reported offenses and not estimation.

Information Grouping

The crime statistics reported by an individual agency indicate what is happening in one particular area, but to make rational comparisons among a number of jurisdictions, communities with similar characteristics need to be grouped together. It may be important to know how a city compares with cities of similar size, or how patterns of crime differ in various types of communities. Grouping agencies with similar characteristics allows these determinations to be made. Aside from being merely interesting, such comparative analysis provides the basic information for long-range criminal justice planning.

UCR groups jurisdictions on the basis of popula-

tion size and community type, both of which are necessary to view a jurisdiction in proper perspective. Grouping by population size considers only the population of the relevant area. It does not consider proximity to a major metropolitan area in spite of the fact that widely different crime patterns could be expected in a city of 20,000 which is a suburb of Cleveland or Cincinnati and one which is in a rural area. Grouping by community type does take into account the urban/rural character of the area, and includes a wider range of populations in each category. For use in interpreting this report, the UCR grouping systems are listed below.

Population Groupings

The population figures for cities and counties in Ohio used for this publication were provided by the Bureau of Census. They represent the final population counts as of April 1, 1980 and were released by the Bureau of Census in April, 1981.

The following is the breakdown of city and county populations into groupings by size and county type. These groupings are utilized in presenting various tables throughout this publication.

Community Types

One method of analyzing the statistics submitted into the UCR program is to consider the proximity of a jurisdiction to metropolitan areas.

A Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA), generally, is made up of a core city or cities with a combined population of 50,000 or more and the surrounding county or counties which share certain metropolitan characteristics. These "surrounding counties" are socially and economically integrated with the central county, which means that at least 15% of the workers living in the adjacent county work in the central county, or at least 25% of those working in the adjacent county live in the central county. For an area to have a "metropolitan character", at least 75% of the labor force is engaged in nonagricultural work.

A suburban city or county refers to any city or county that is within an SMSA. A rural city or county is made up of the unincorporated portions of counties outside urban places and SMSAs.

Crime Index

The crime index is a basic measure of crime which can be used for comparing the extent of crime among cities, counties and states of similar size. The index is simply the total number of certain offenses that occur in a given area in one calendar year. These offenses are murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft—all of the Part I offenses except negligent manslaughter.

These offenses were selected as indicators of the total amount of criminal activity because they are serious offenses that are the focus of widespread concern; they occur with sufficient frequency to reflect fluctuations in the overall level of criminal activity; they are most likely to be reported, and reported accurately, to law enforcement officers due to their seriousness; and, they are offenses that can be clearly and specifically defined.

Although a hierarchy principle is built into scoring index crimes, the varying severity of offenses is not taken into account in considering the total index, resulting in equal importance being given to shoplifting and rape in this total. Furthermore, the actual incidence of crime in a city may not be accurately depicted by the index if the majority of the city's crime involves nonindex offenses such as vandalism or narcotics.

The United States Congress, in October of 1978, passed legislation mandating that the crime of arson be reclassified as a Part I crime index offense in the UCR program. Ohio law enforcement agencies report available information on the crime of arson directly to the national FBI/UCR program.

Crime Rate

The crime rate is based on the crime index, but adjusts the index for variances in population by indicating the number of index offenses for each 100,000 persons. This means that comparisons may be made among several areas with different populations, or within one area with different populations over a period of time, without the information being biased by population differences¹. For most general comparisons, the crime rate is probably the most accurate figure to use. A degree of caution should be exercised, however, in making comparisons between the figures in this book and statistics in prior *Crime in Ohio* publications. Changes in the levels of crime from year to year may be due to many variables, such as improved reporting or record-keeping procedures, redefinition of reporting areas, or increased participation in the program.

To calculate the crime rate, first divide the population of the area by 100,000, and then divide the number of index offenses by that answer. For example, if a city has a population of 273,456 and a crime index total of 21,257, the calculations would be:

- 1) 273,456 divided by 100,000 = 2.73456
- 2) 21,257 divided by 2.73456 = 7773.5

Thus, although the city's crime index is 21,257, its crime rate is 7773.5 (the number of crimes for each 100,000 people).

For the same city a crime rate for each of the seven index crimes can be calculated. For example, 6,400 robberies were reported in this city of 273,456 population:

- 1) 273,456 divided by 100,000 = 2.73456
- 2) 6,400 divided by 2.73456 = 2340.4

The robbery crime rate is 2340.4 per 100,000 population.

The calculations are the same for a city with fewer than 100,000 inhabitants. A city has 45,321 population and a crime index of 1,588:

- 1) 45,321 divided by 100,000 = .45321
- 2) 1,588 divided by .45321 = 3503.9

The crime rate is higher than the index because it indicates the number of offenses that would have occurred if the city had 100,000 inhabitants.

Definitions

Part I Offenses

Violent Crimes

Criminal Homicide:

a. **The Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter** category, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, is the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. The classification of this offense, as in all other crime index offenses, is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Not included in the count for this offense classification are deaths caused by negligence, suicide, or accident; justifiable homicides, which are the killings of felons by law enforcement officers in the line of duty or by private citizens; and attempts to murder or assaults to murder, which are scored as aggravated assaults.

b. **Negligent Manslaughter** is the killing of one person through the gross negligence of another.

Rape, as defined in the Program, is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit forcible rape by force or threat of force are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are not included in this category.

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. The robbery category includes assault to rob, strong-armed robbery and armed robbery.

Aggravated Assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed. Attacks using personal weapons (part of the attacker's body) must result in serious personal injury to be classified as aggravated assault.

Property Crimes

Burglary is defined as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify an offense as burglary. Burglary is categorized into three subclassifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry.

Larceny is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. In the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, this crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is also excluded from this category for crime reporting purposes inasmuch as it is a separate crime index offense.

Motor Vehicle Theft is defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. This definition excludes the taking of a motor vehicle for temporary use by those persons having lawful access. The theft of motor boats, construction equipment, airplanes and farming equipment are considered larceny.

Arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning of property with or without the intent to defraud. This category includes attempted arson.

Part II Offenses

Other Assault is an unlawful attack or attempted attack on another person which does not result in serious injury to the victim and which does not involve the use of a dangerous weapon.

Forgery and Counterfeiting involves the making, altering, using or possession, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true. Attempts are included.

Fraud is defined as fraudulent conversion, and obtaining money or property by fraudulent means. Included are confidence games, larceny by bailee, and bad checks (except forged or counterfeit checks).

Embezzlement is misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

Definitions

Part II Offenses (continued)

Stolen Property Offenses involve the buying, receiving and possessing of stolen property, or the attempts to do so.

Vandalism is the willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of real or personal property without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control.

Weapons Offenses include all violations of regulations or statutes that control carrying, using, possessing, furnishing and manufacturing deadly weapons or silencers. Attempts are included.

Prostitution and Commercialized Vice consist of sex offenses and attempted sex offenses of a commercialized nature.

Sex Offenses include all offenses against common decency and morals. This category includes statutory rape and all other sex offenses or attempted sex offenses not previously defined.

Drug Law offenses consist of the unlawful possession, sale, use, growth or manufacture of controlled substances.

Gambling violations involve promoting, permitting or engaging in illegal gambling.

Offenses Against the Family and Children include the nonsupport, neglect, desertion or abuse of family and children.

Driving Under the Influence involves the operation of any motor vehicle or common carrier while under the influence of liquor or drugs.

Liquor Law violations are those violations of state or local regulatory liquor laws. They include sale to minors and drinking on a public conveyance. Excluded in this category are driving under the influence and drunkenness.

Drunkenness includes all offenses of intoxication except driving under the influence.

Disorderly Conduct consists of breaching the peace or attempting to do so.

Vagrancy violations include offenses such as begging and loitering (age 18 and over).

All Other Offenses refer to all violations of state or local laws except traffic violations and offenses defined above.

Suspicion involves an arrest for no specific offense and release without formal charges being filed. (Not an offense)

Curfew and Loitering Laws refers to juvenile violations of local curfew and loitering ordinances.

Runaway violations involve the unlawful truancy from a legal place of residence by a juvenile.

Other Definitions

Reported Crime refers to the number of crimes reported to BCI. These figures do not represent the total number of crimes that have occurred in Ohio during 1980. Actual crime figures are higher than the reported UCR crime figures because: not all crimes are reported by the victims, not all law enforcement agencies in Ohio contribute to the voluntary UCR Program, and of those agencies that did contribute, seventy-four did not submit a full twelve months of crime statistics.

Estimated Crime refers to the effort made in this publication to present a picture of what the crime rate and number of crimes may have been in 1980. FBI/UCR took statistics from agencies in Ohio that contributed less than twelve months but more than three and estimated the full twelve months crime statistics for those agencies. These estimates were added to the reported crime figures and a total estimate for Ohio was derived (see Table 24, pg. 126-27). The state-wide estimated crime may be lower than the actual amount of crime in Ohio because of the crimes not reported to law enforcement agencies. In addition, crimes could not be estimated for agencies that did not contribute to UCR or contributed less than four months.

Reported Value refers to the value of items stolen which is reported to BCI. The value of items stolen is not always reported to UCR, thus the values presented in this publication may be lower than the actual monetary loss in 1980. The reason for this incomplete statistic is the same as for reported crime above.

Section 2

Officers Assaulted and Killed

Officers Assaulted and Killed

Ohio suffered the loss of two law enforcement officers through felonious acts in 1980. Six officers were killed by felonious acts in 1979.

Two officers lost their lives by accidental means in 1980.

Assaults on officers during 1980 increased 2.8% from 1979; the number of officers assaulted in 1980 was 3,543 compared to 3,445 assaulted in 1979.

Officer assaults occurred at a rate of 23.6 for every 100 officers. Thirty-one per cent of these assaults involved officer injuries.

Three specific situations accounted for the majority of officer assaults. Responding to traffic situations remained the most frequent activity in which officers were assaulted (26.0%), followed by answering disturbance calls (21.2%), and the transporting of prisoners (13.4%). The traffic assault total includes the Ohio State Highway Patrol which had 738 officers assaulted. This agency's figure alone represents 80.2% of the traffic related officer assaults reported.

Personal weapons such as hands, fists, and feet were used in 86.3% of all officer assaults, and were responsible for 86.7% of all officer injuries. Other dangerous weapons followed, accounting for 7.7% of all assaults and 9.8% of all injuries sustained. Firearms were encountered in 4.5% of the total assaults and were responsible for 2.3% of all officer injuries.

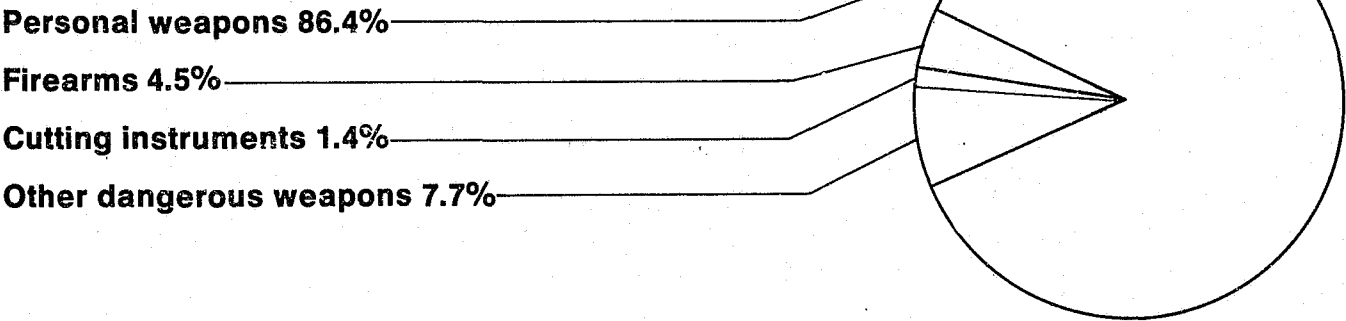
Officers assigned to one-man vehicles again sustained the largest number of assaults, 1,860 (52.5%). One-man units without assistance from fellow officers sustained 33.6% of all assaults; one-man units with assistance from another officer accounted for 18.9% of all assaults. Two-man vehicles were involved in 31.8% of all officer assaults.

The night hours of 10:00 P.M. to 4:00 A.M. reflected the highest rate of assaults (52.0%). The lowest rate of 7.1% occurred between 6:00 A.M. and 12 noon.

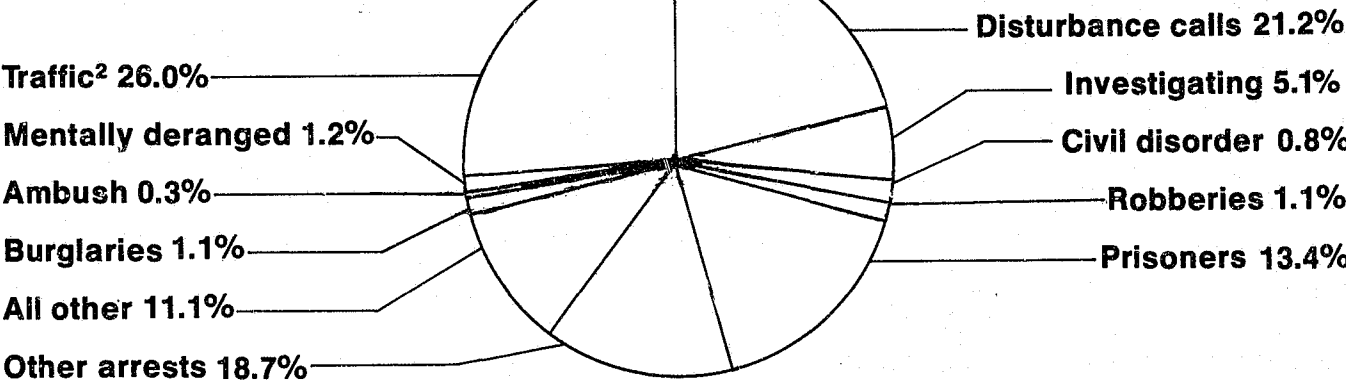
Approximately ninety-five per cent of the officer assaults were cleared.

June and August reflected the greatest number of officers assaulted per month; October had the lowest number. However, the largest rate of increase for any one month in the number of officers assaulted was March, 1980, in which assaults jumped from 255 in 1979 to 321 (25.9% increase) in 1980.

Assaults by Time of Day

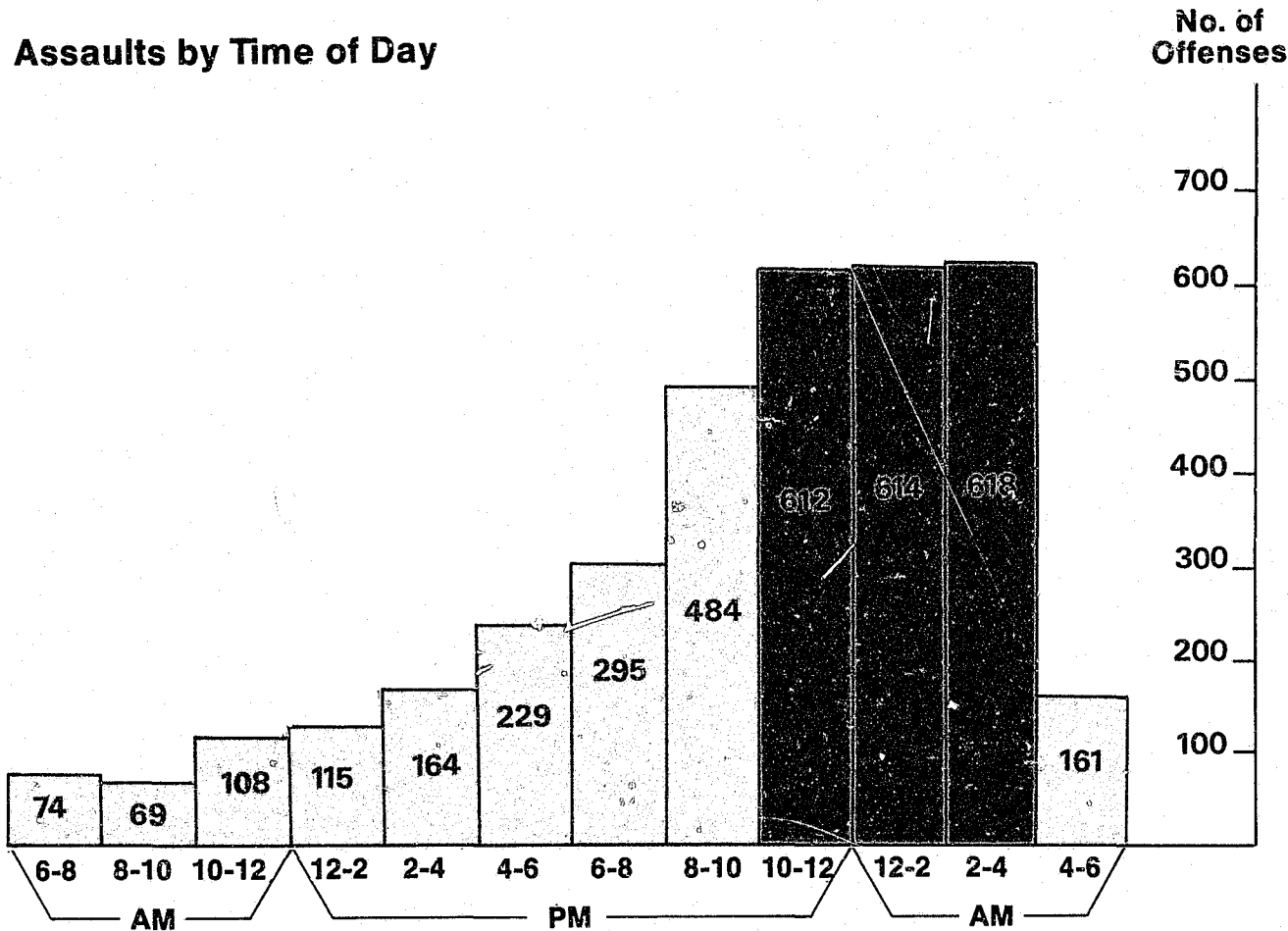
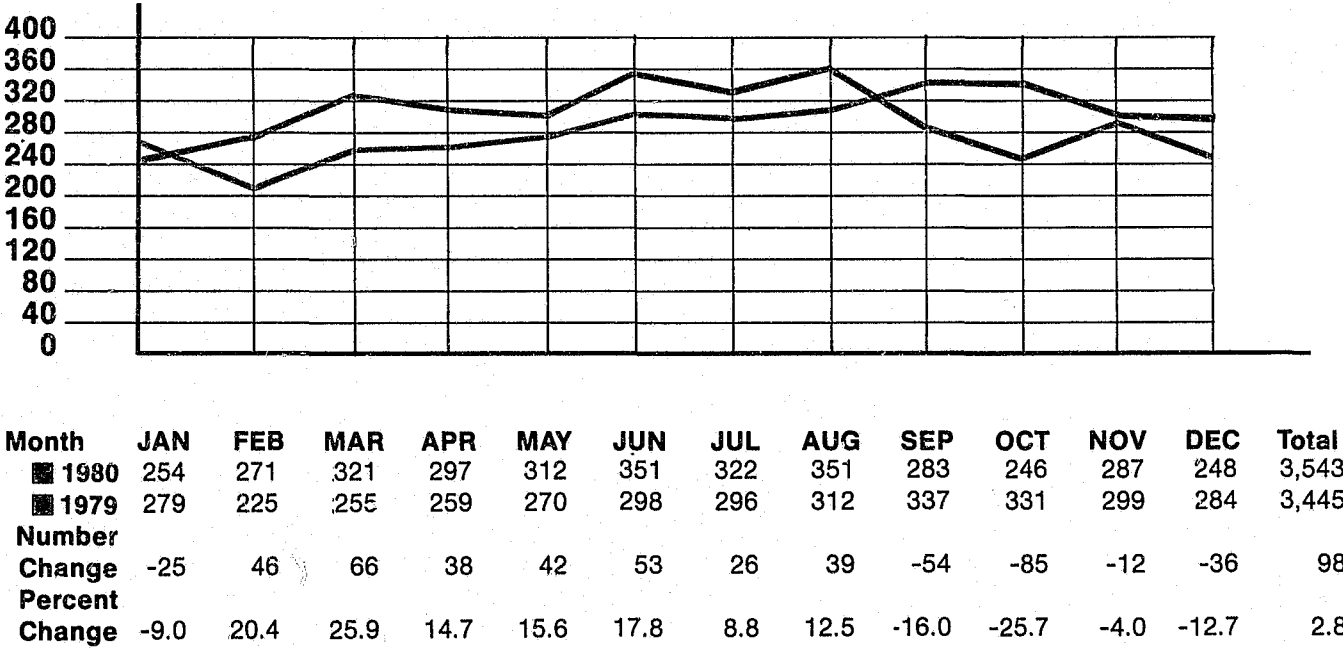

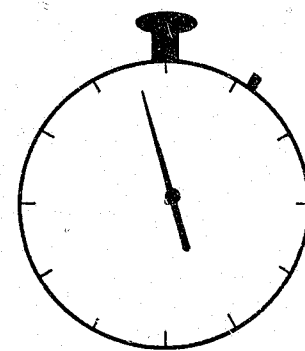

The Crime Clock should be viewed with care. Being the most aggregate representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the index offenses. This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of the Part I Offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

Section 3

Ohio Index Crime

Introduction

The information contained in the publication of *Crime in Ohio 1980* is presented in two parts: 1) an overview of index crime in Ohio for the year, and 2) individual reports for murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and stolen property. The overview provides a summary of Ohio index offenses in 1980, followed by individual offense reports utilizing charts and graphs to include more detail. In addition to the number of index offenses, stolen property is described, listing average losses for each type of offense and monthly loss by type of item stolen. The number of index offenses reported to law enforcement officers is the basic measure of yearly fluctuations and long-term trends in criminal activity. It is important to note that not all index offenses are reported to law enforcement agencies and the only victimization information included is in reference to murder offenses. Furthermore, since UCR is a voluntary program, not all law enforcement agencies report crime statistics.

The tables, graphs, and charts contained in this report reflect the actual number of reported offenses submitted by 466 law enforcement agencies participating in the Ohio UCR Program. Populations covered by these submitting agencies will give a more representative picture of crime in Ohio. Approximately 95.0% of the state population is covered in the reports. Many of the townships and smaller agencies submit through their county sheriff's office. The reported crime rates presented are based only on Ohio law enforcement agency statistics reported to UCR for the full twelve months of 1980. The actual crime figures reported by individual agencies are presented in Table 24, pages 96-127.

Ohio Overview

The reported crime index in 1980 was 556,249, an increase of 6.1% from 1979. Detailed information was not provided for 28,721 of these offenses. The violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault numbered 51,601, or 9.3% of the total index. The remaining 90.7 or 504,648 crimes were the property offenses of burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft for 1980. Violent crime increased 9.0% from 1979 and property crime increased 5.8%. The offense which showed the greatest percentage of increase since 1979 was robbery, which rose 15.0% in 1980. All of the index crime categories experienced an increase in 1980 from 1979, with the exception of motor vehicle theft which reflected a decrease of 2.0% since 1979.

The FBI/UCR annually prepares an estimate of index crime counts and crime rates for each state, projecting in their calculations what crime would be

for the total state population (including both reporting agencies and predictions for nonreporting agencies - See Table 17). In 1980, these FBI estimated crime rates indicated that index crime increased 4.6% from a 1979 estimate of 5193.7 index crimes per 100,000 people to a 1980 estimate of 5432.3 offenses per 100,000.

The reported crime rates calculated by BCI are based on the reports of all 12 month contributors (representing approximately 95.0% of the estimated state population). The BCI crime rate for the total index, as was true of the FBI's above, increased 8.8% from 5283.7 crimes per 100,000 people in 1979 to 5751.2 in 1980.

In 1980 there was a total of 358,480 arrests for Part I and Part II crimes, a 8.2% increase from 1979. Adult arrests accounted for 77.6% of these arrests, and juveniles the remaining 22.4%. The determining sex and race breakdown of those arrested, 83.4% were male arrests and 16.6% female. Seventy-five and nine tenth percent of the reported arrests were white, followed by 22.6% black, and all other races 1.5%. No race information was submitted for 4943 arrests, or 1.4% of the total arrests reported.

The following are the four most frequent groups of individuals reportedly arrested in 1980 by their age and race:

White/18 years and older 208,215 arrests or 58.1%
White/under 18 years 63,876 arrests or 17.8%
Black/18 years and older 65,682 arrests or 18.3%
Black/under 18 years 15,194 arrests or 4.2%

The index offenses which were cleared (solved) in 1980 numbered 107,306, an increase of 6.0% from 1979. However, since the number of offenses reported in 1980 also rose at the same time, the clearance rate remained the same in 1980.

Of the 1980 reported index offenses, 14.6% were cleared by the arrest of at least one adult offender and juveniles accounted for the remaining 4.7% of the cases cleared. Table 23, pages 94-95, reflected that 76.7% of the murders reported in 1980 were cleared. At the other extreme, only 14.2% of the reported burglaries were cleared. These percentages should be viewed with discretion, because the clearance information reported for 1980 does not necessarily correspond with those offenses reported for the year. An agency may report a case cleared in 1980 which was initially reported as an offense in a prior year and was solved in 1980.

The number of clearances reported in Table 23 will not correspond to the number of arrests reported in Table 18 and 19. Clearance information deals with the number of cases cleared or solved and is only reported on the top seven index crimes. Arrest information, on the other hand, is based on the number of individuals arrested and includes all twenty-seven (juvenile twenty-nine) Part I and Part II crime categories.

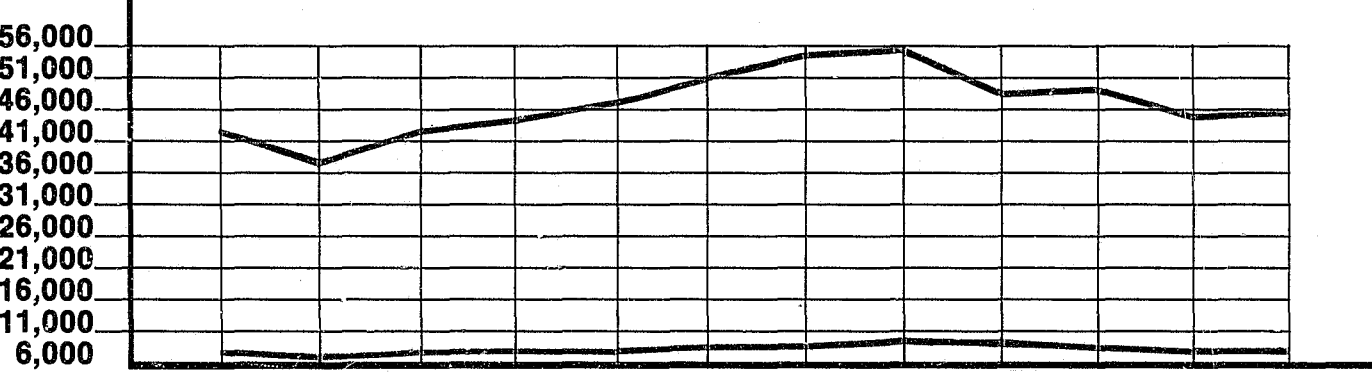
Index Offenses by Month

Percent Distribution of Index Offenses: 1980

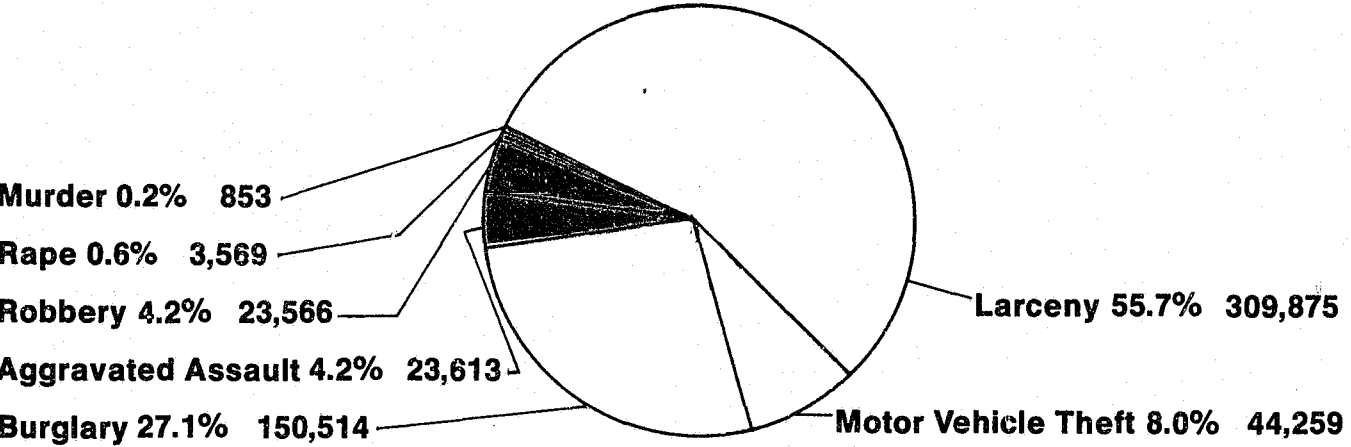
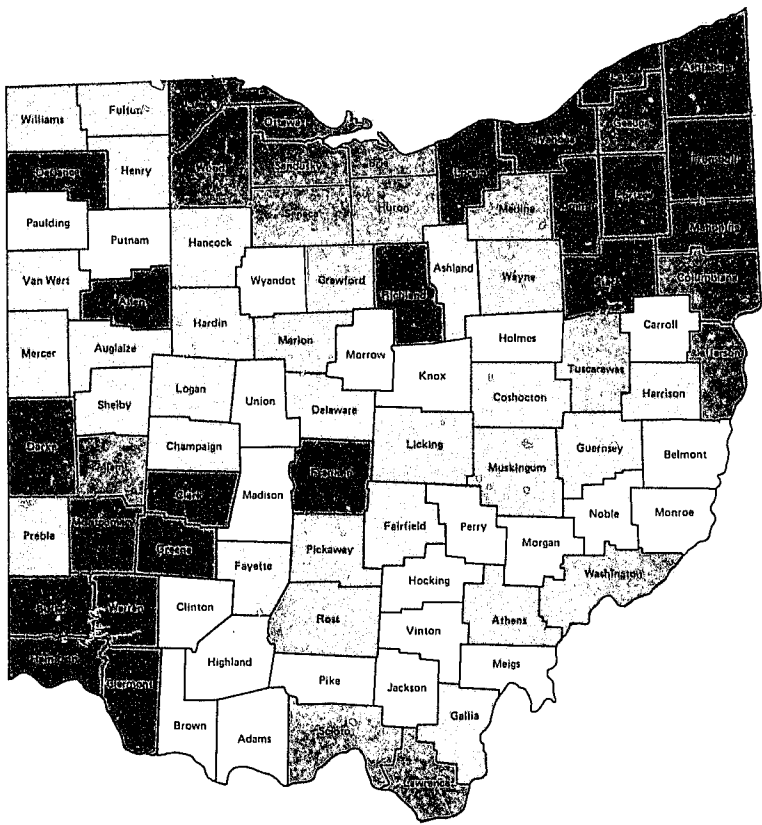

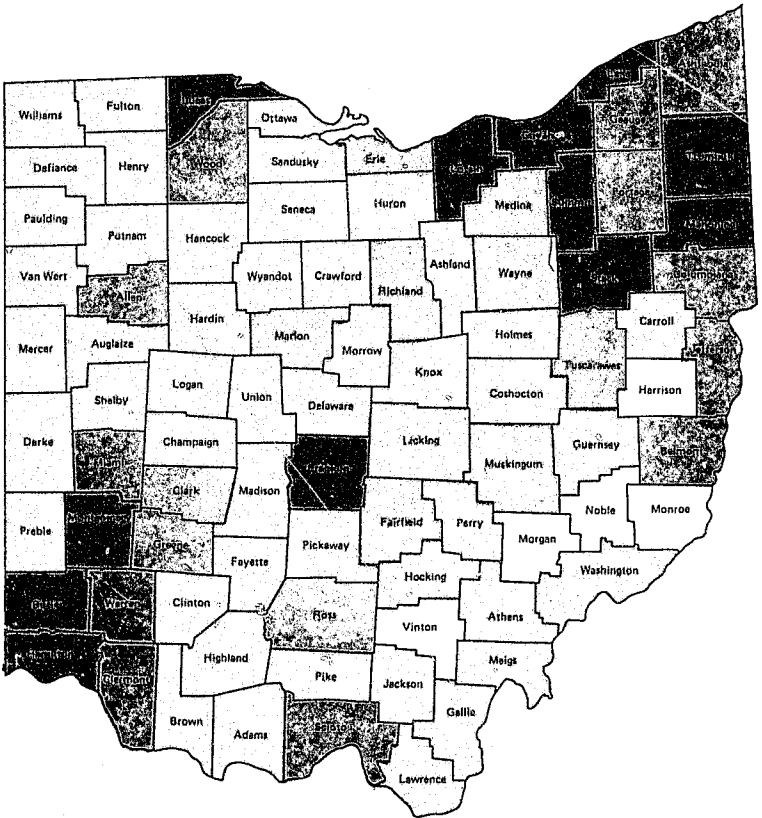
Number of Ohio Index Offenses by County

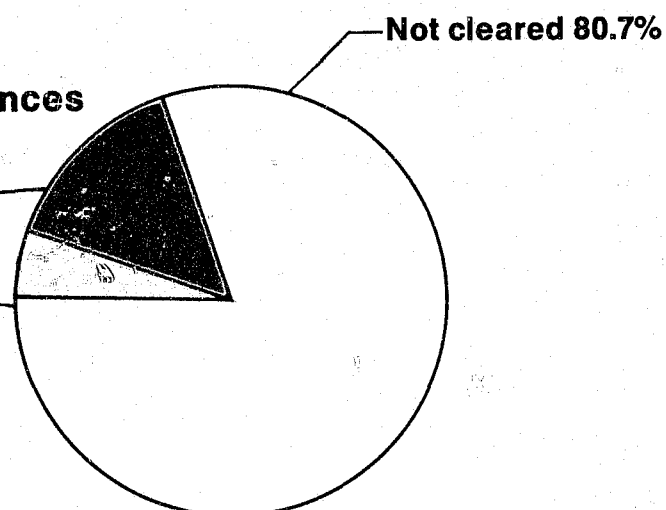

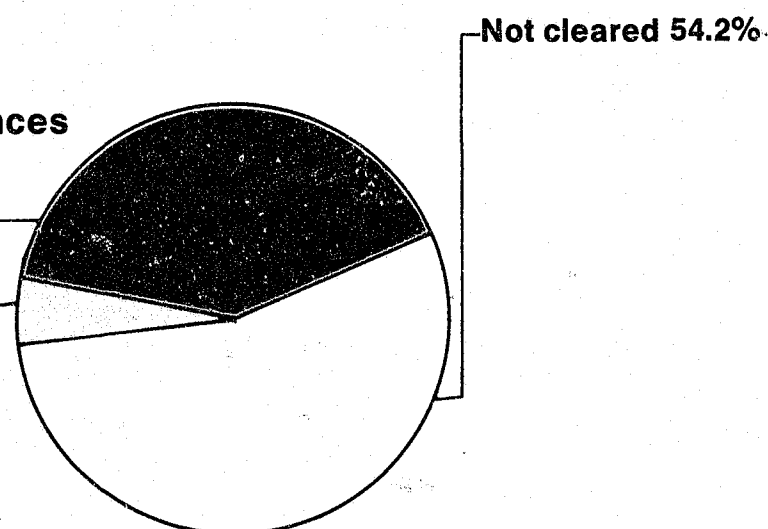


Violent Crime Clearances

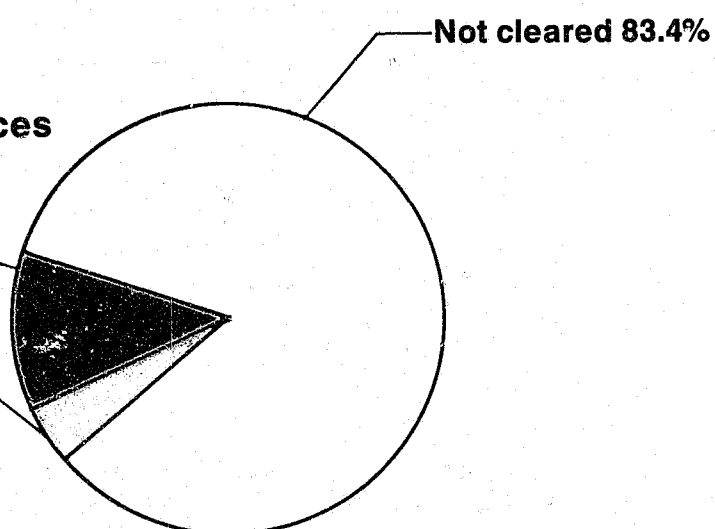


Property Crime Clearances

Murder

DEFINITION

The murder and nonnegligent manslaughter category, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, is the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. Excluded are attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides.

Murder, the highest of the index offenses, rose 1.0% in 1980 from the previous year. Eight hundred and fifty-three individuals were murdered in Ohio in 1980. These murders represented 1.7% of all violent crimes (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault) reported, but remained less than 0.15% of the total index.

The reported crime rate for murder increased from 8.6 murders per 100,000 people across Ohio in 1979 to 8.9 murders in 1980.

The major population center of Cleveland accounted for the highest number of murders throughout the state, reporting 265 or 31.0% of all murders in 1980.

Murder is the only index crime in which detailed information is collected concerning victims, offenders, weapon used, and circumstances under which the offense took place. For 10 of the 853 murders reported in 1980 (1.2%), no detailed information was reported. Of the remaining 843 cases in which some form of detailed information was reported, adults 18 years and older accounted for 90% of the victims. Of the 843 detailed murders reported, 67.4% were committed by adults.

Males were reported as both the most frequent victims and offenders in murder cases, falling as victims in 76.4% of the detailed murders and comprising 60.4% of all reported offenders. Black victims were reported in 51.1% of the detailed murders, followed by white victims in 48.4% of these cases. These same two racial groups were reported as the most frequent murder offenders, with 42.7% of the 843 offenders being reported as black and 31.0% as white.

Weapons most frequently used in murder offenses were handguns, used in 54.2% of the detailed murders. Second were knife inflicted (or cutting instruments) deaths, reported in 13.5% of the murders.

The graph of murder by weapon on page 32 displays additional categories for 1980 not included in previous years. These new categories of drowning, asphyxiation, and strangulation were reported in 16 cases and accounted for 1.9% of the total murders committed.

The relationship between victims and offenders is also gathered for murder. "Acquaintance" was the single most frequent relationship reported, accounting for 28.2% of all murders committed. Family relationships existed between victims and offenders in 19.0% of the total murders, with 55 husbands being the most frequent family members murdered.

The situation most commonly reported in murder offenses was that in which there was a single victim, single offender (62.9% of the total murders).

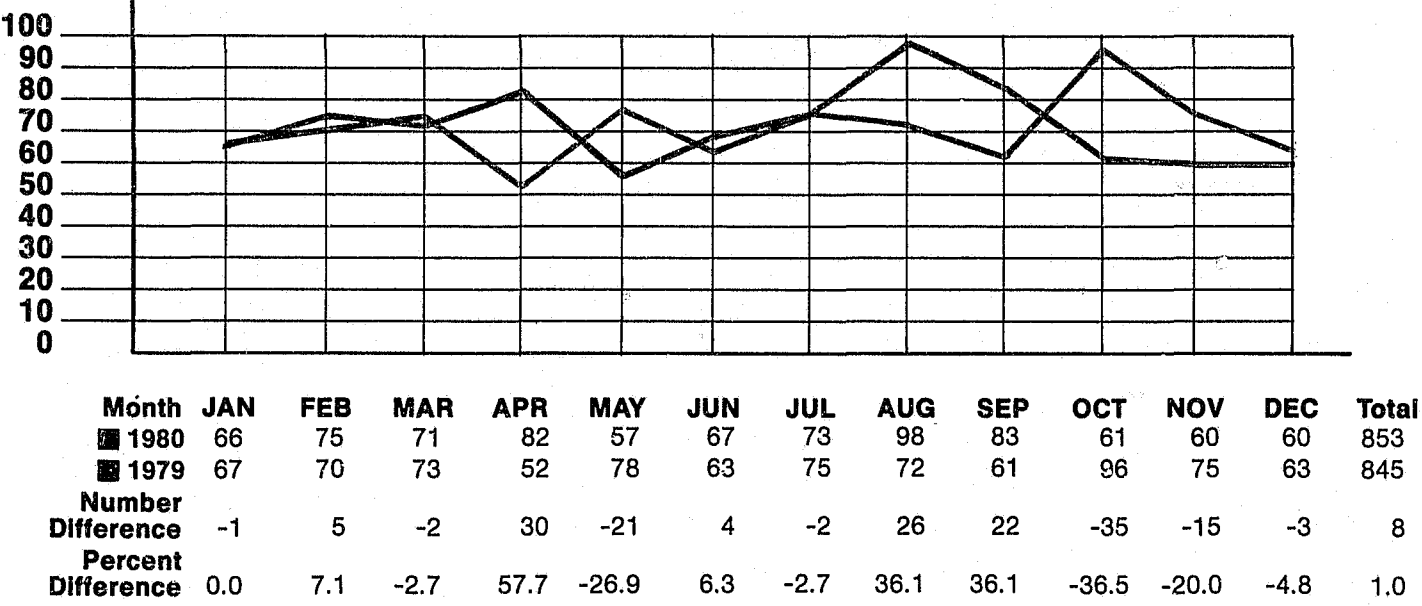
A comparison of murder clearance rates shows that, as in 1979, the percent of murder offenses cleared was higher than the rate for any other index crime. However, the murder clearance rate fell from 78.2% in 1979 to 76.7% of total murders cleared in 1980.

The number of arrests made for murder offenses in 1980 numbered 824, increasing 38 from 1979.

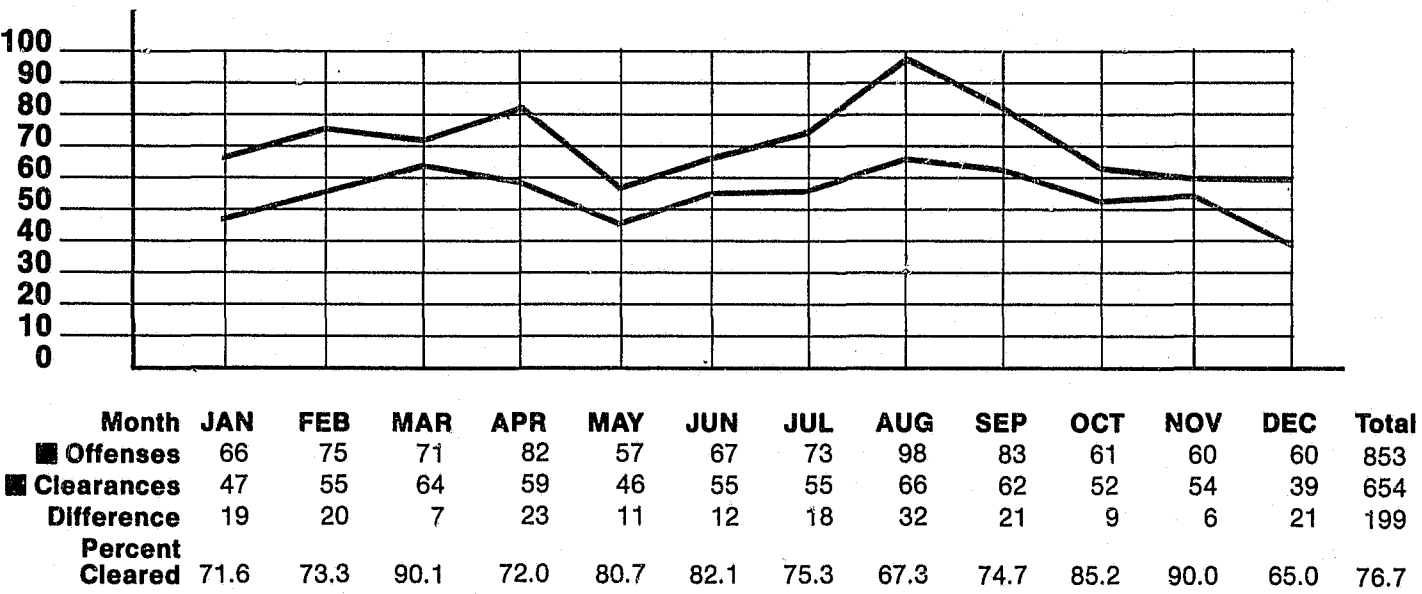

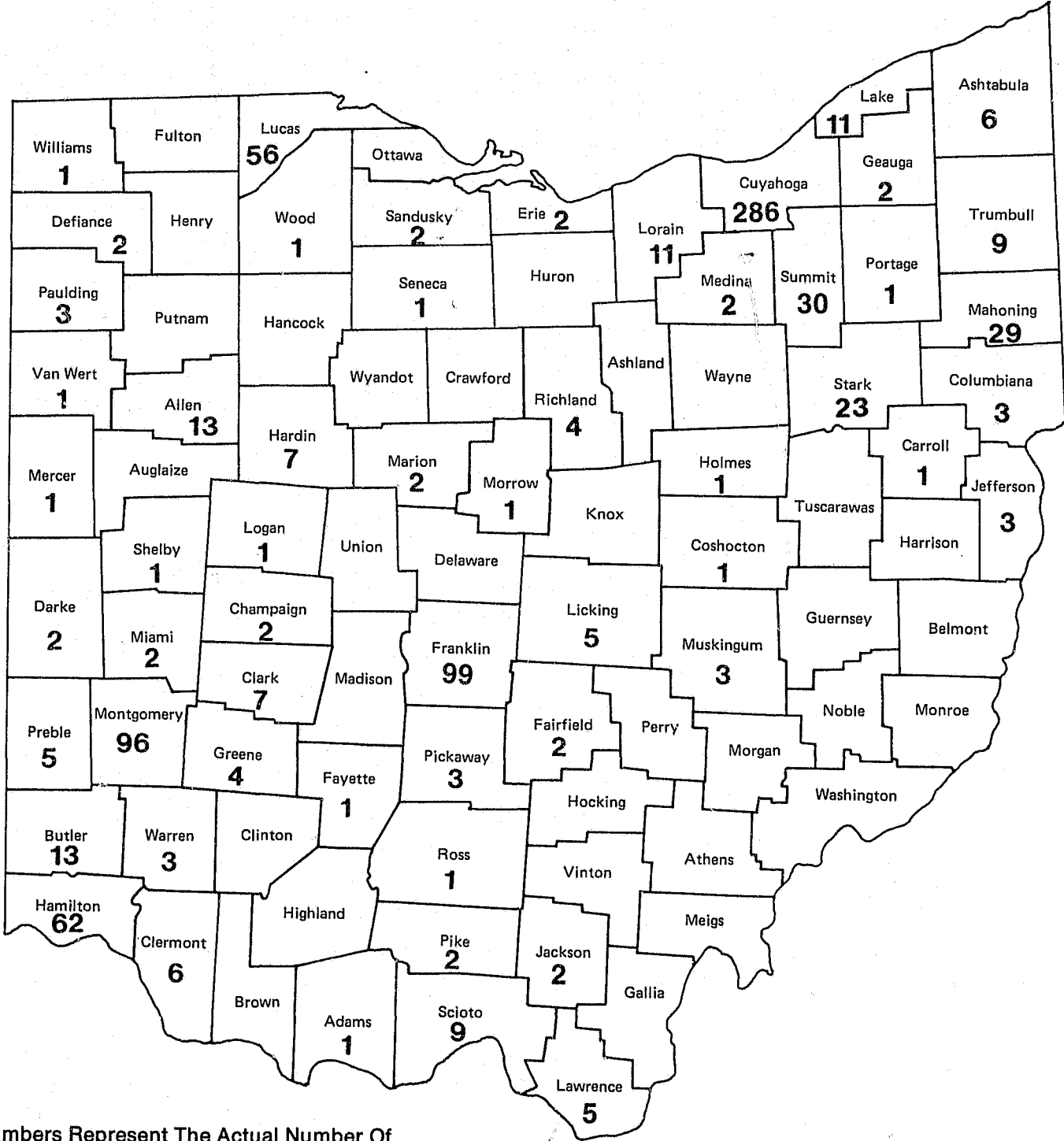
Murder by Month

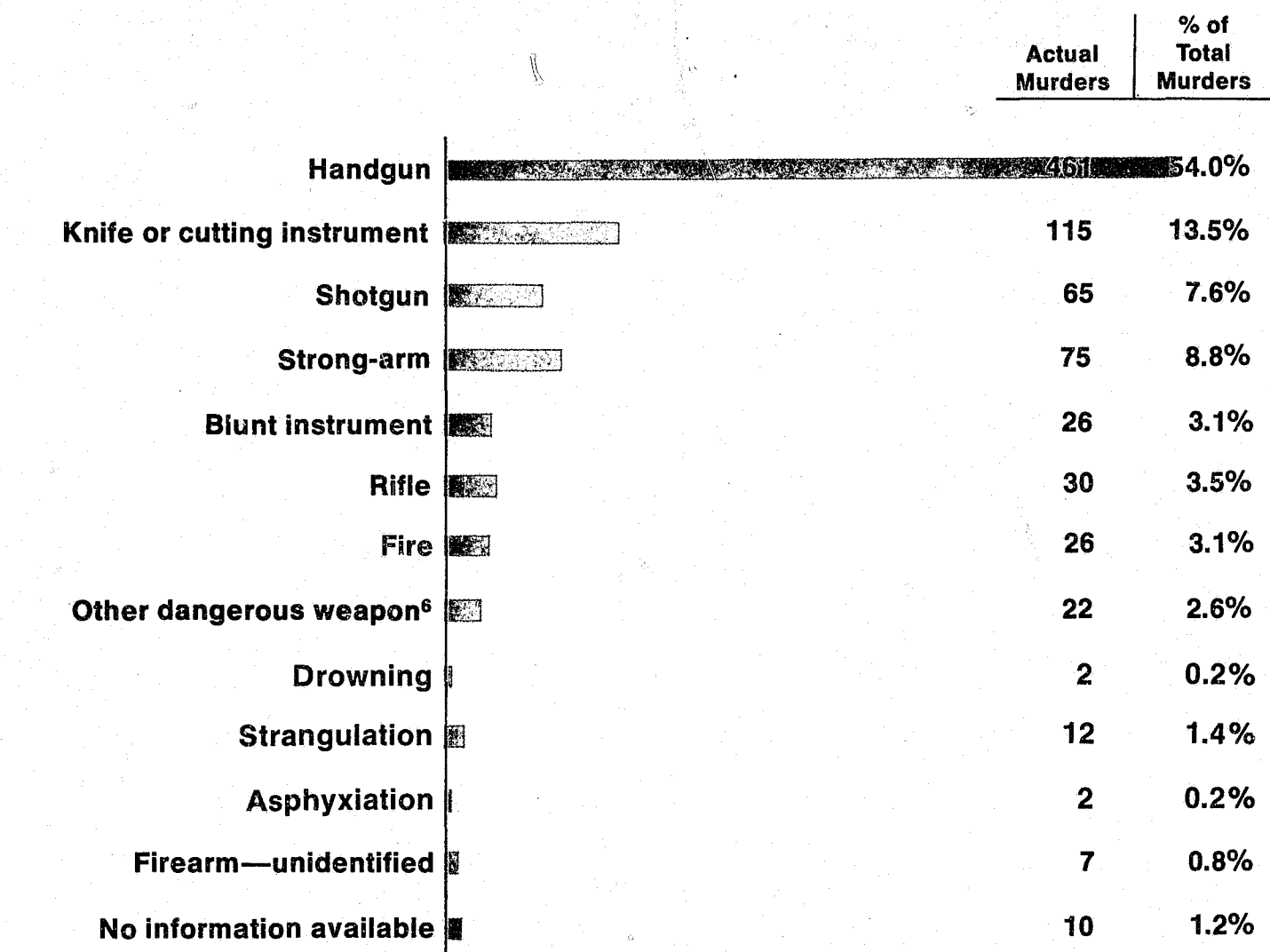

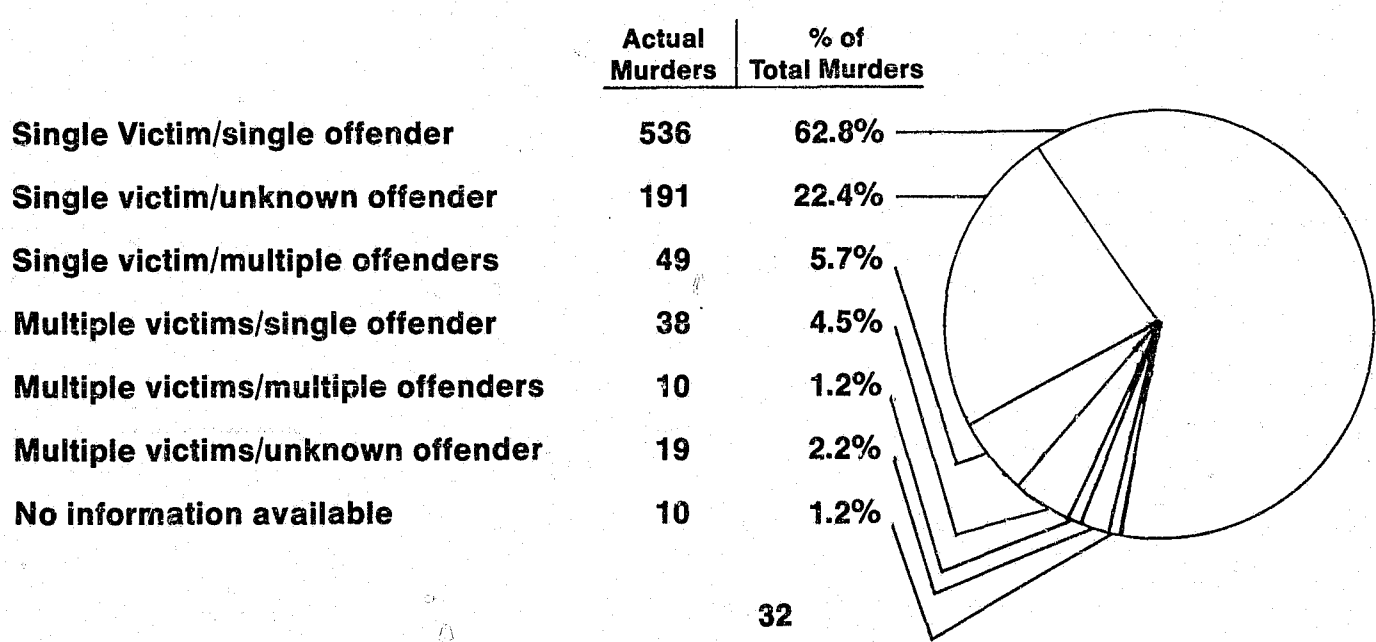

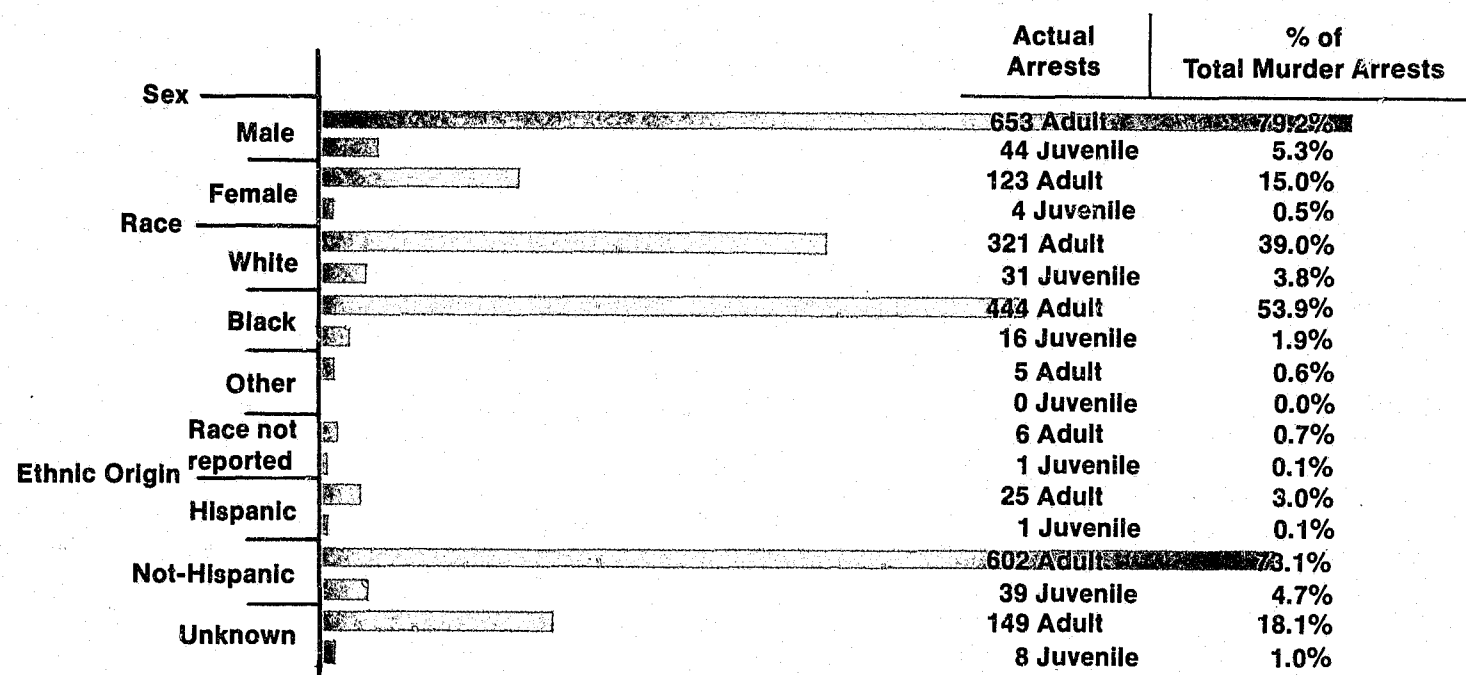
Murder by Type of Weapon



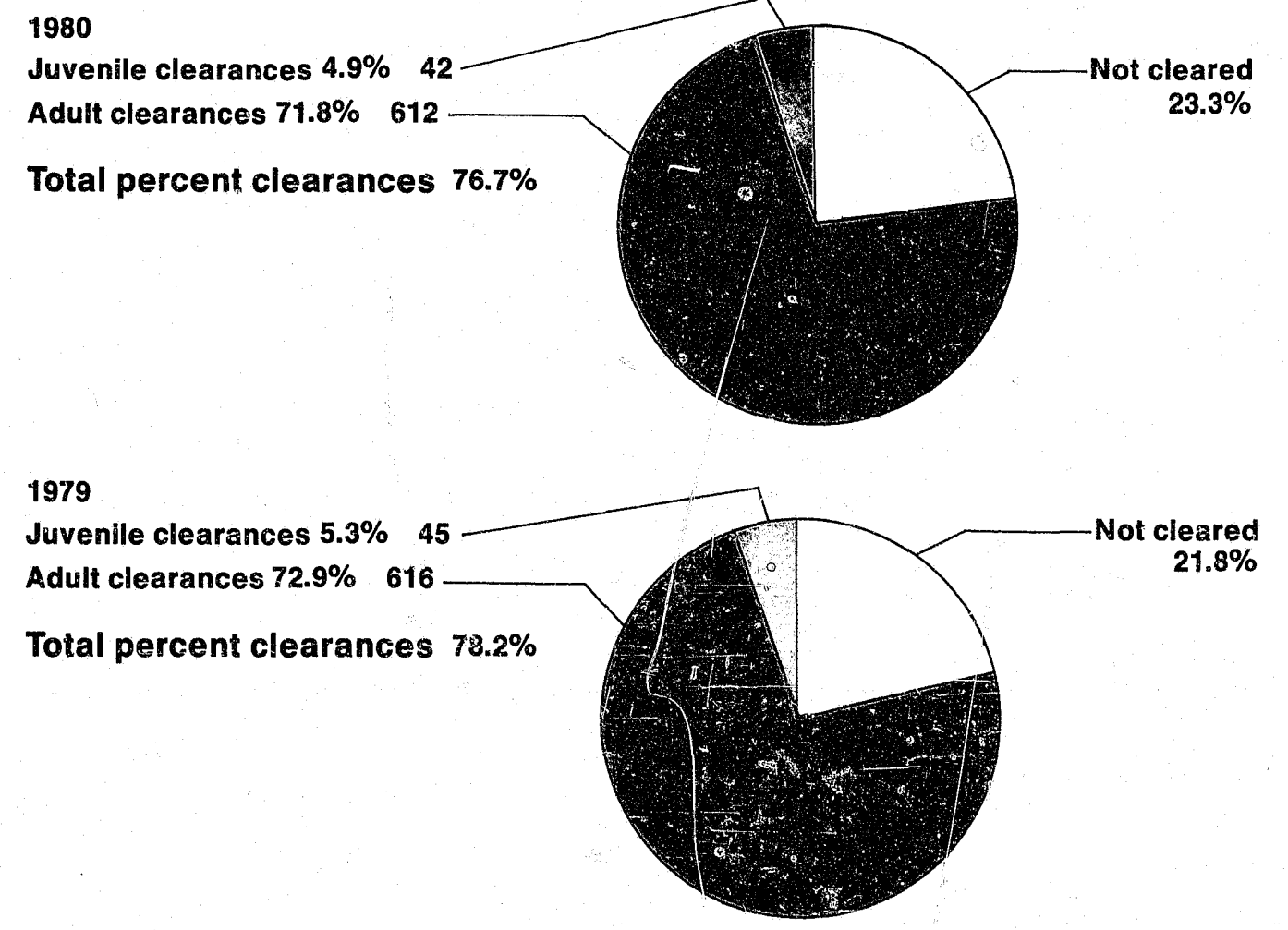
Murder by Situation

Rape

DEFINITION

Forcible rape, as defined in the Program, is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit forcible rape by force or threat of force are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are not included in this category.

The index offense which is ranked second in seriousness in the UCR hierarchy is the crime of rape. In 1980, law enforcement agencies throughout the state became aware of and reported 3,569 rapes, an increase of 7.9% from those reported in 1979. This total represents 6.9% of the violent crime and 0.6% of the total index reported in 1980. The rape category includes both forcible rape as well as attempts, but is very specific in definition and does not include other sex offenses, such as those involving male victims. Forcible rapes accounted for 80.3% of all those reported, and the remaining 19.7% were attempts.

July remained the month highest in total reported rapes. It also had the highest total for forcible committed.

The month of May, 1980 reflected the largest percent of increase in rapes for any single month compared to the same month last year, rising 57% from 223 in 1979 to 350 in 1980.

The reported crime rate for rape state-wide was 37.1 rapes per 100,000 people, an increase from 33.7 in 1979.

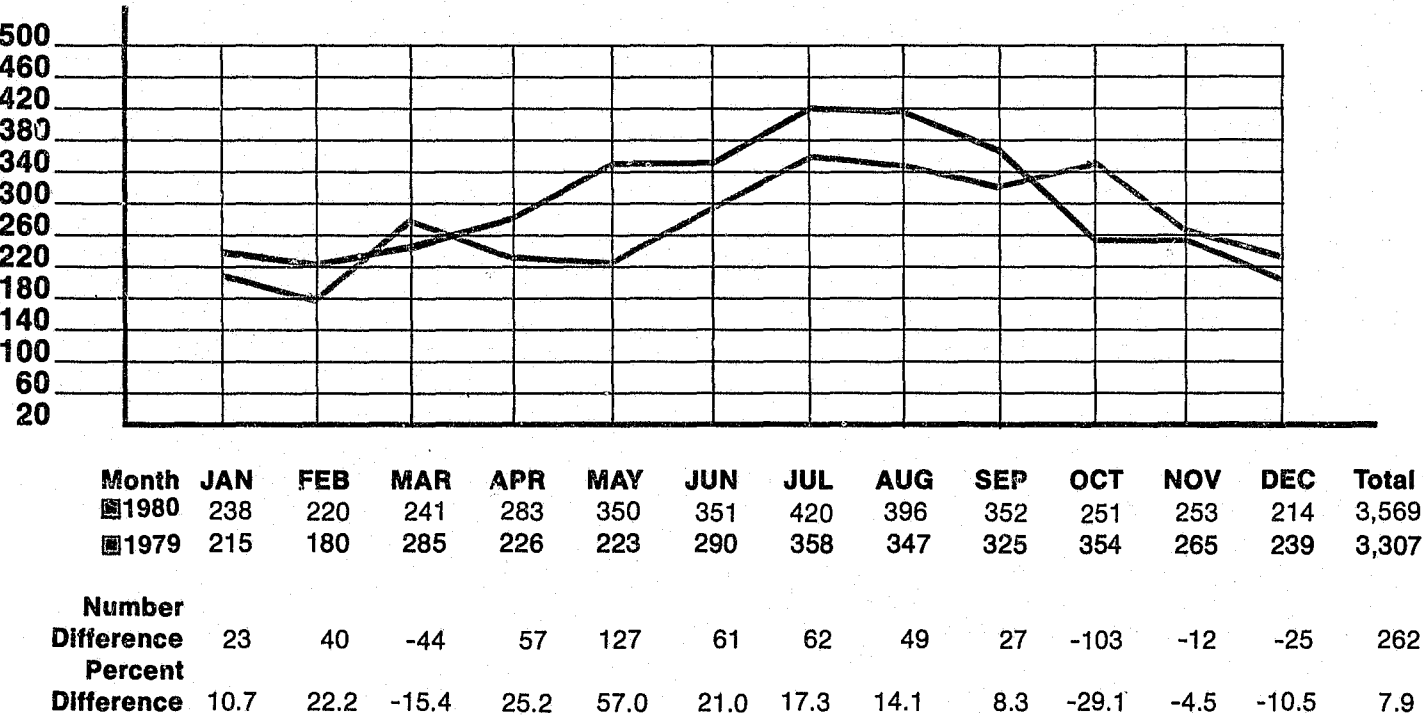
Percentage of clearance for reported rapes was 54.5%.

Arrests in 1980 for rape numbered 1,248, an increase of 20 from 1979. Adults accounted for the majority of these arrests, 82.2% (1,026).

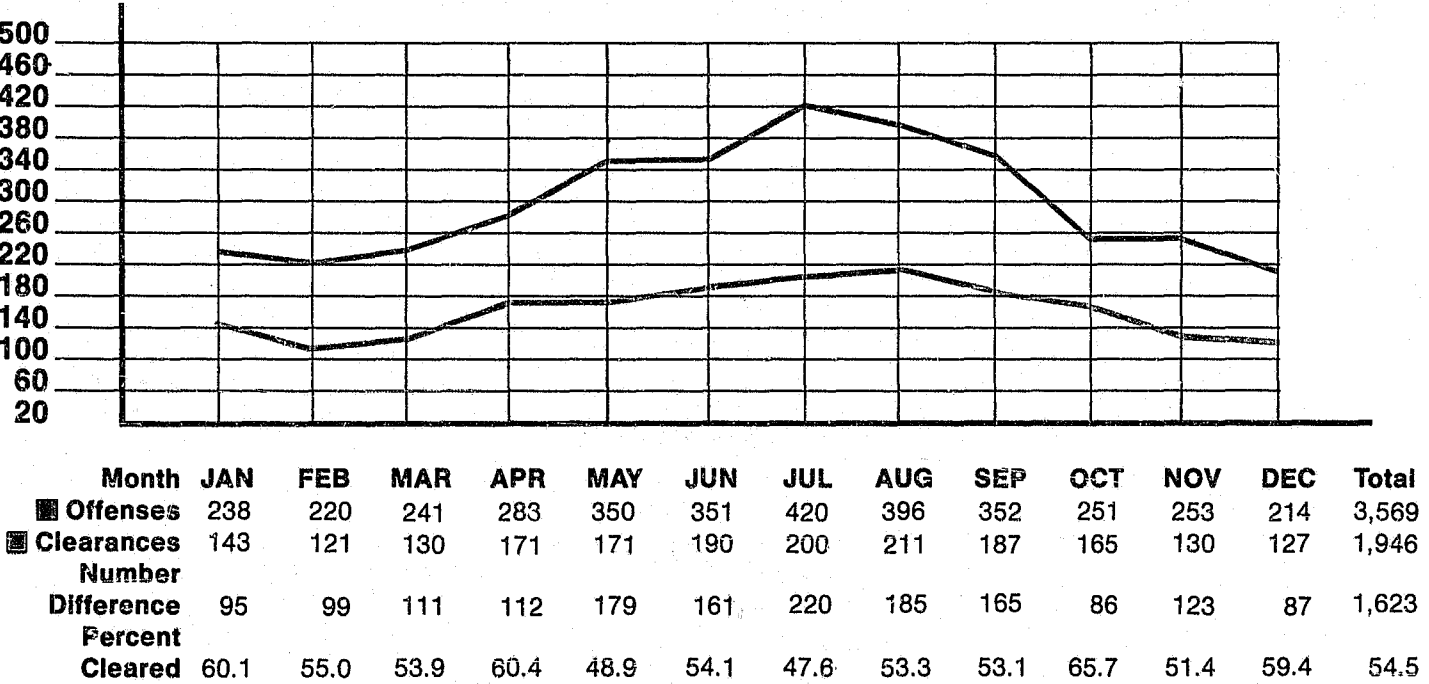

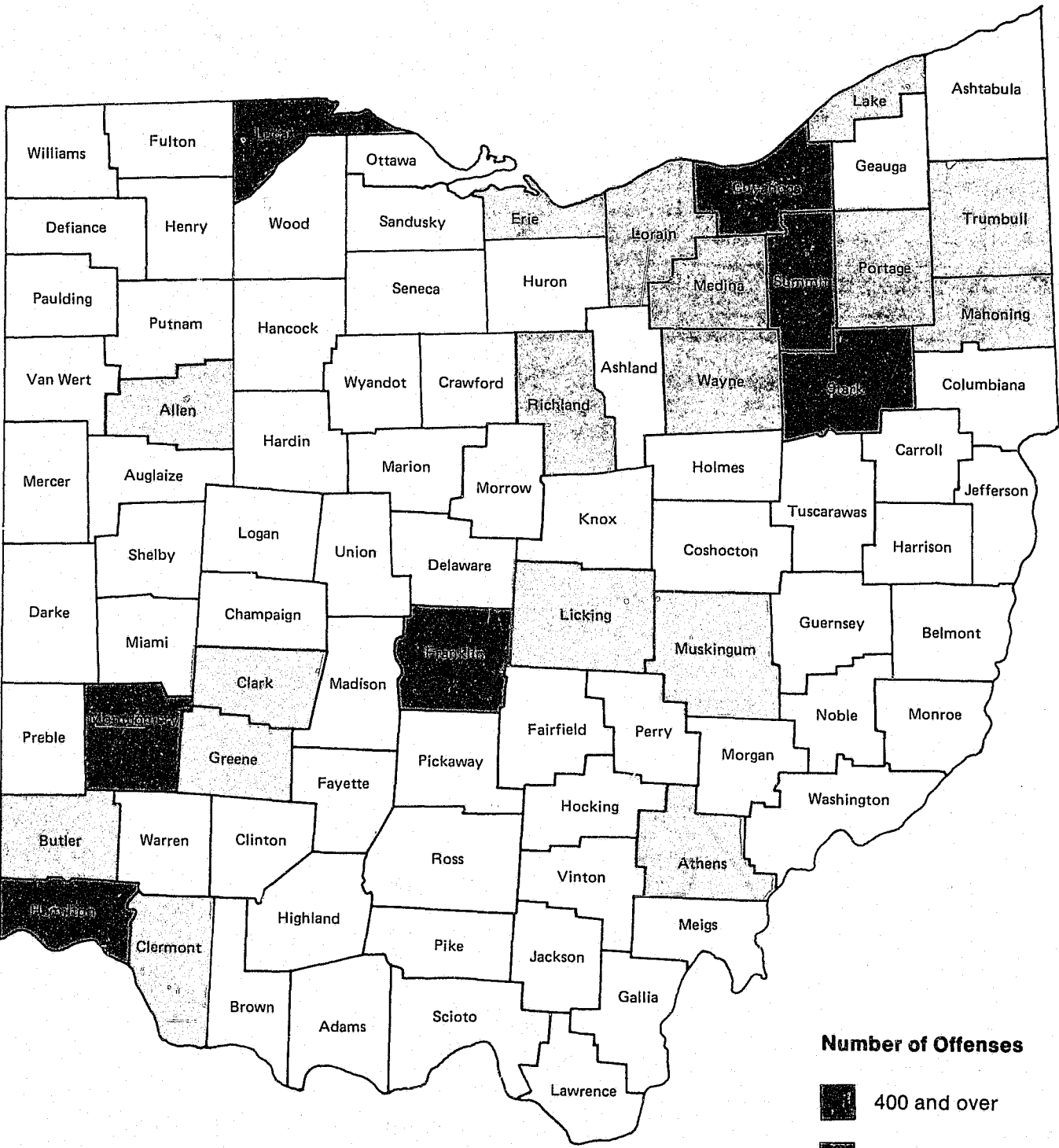
Rape by Month

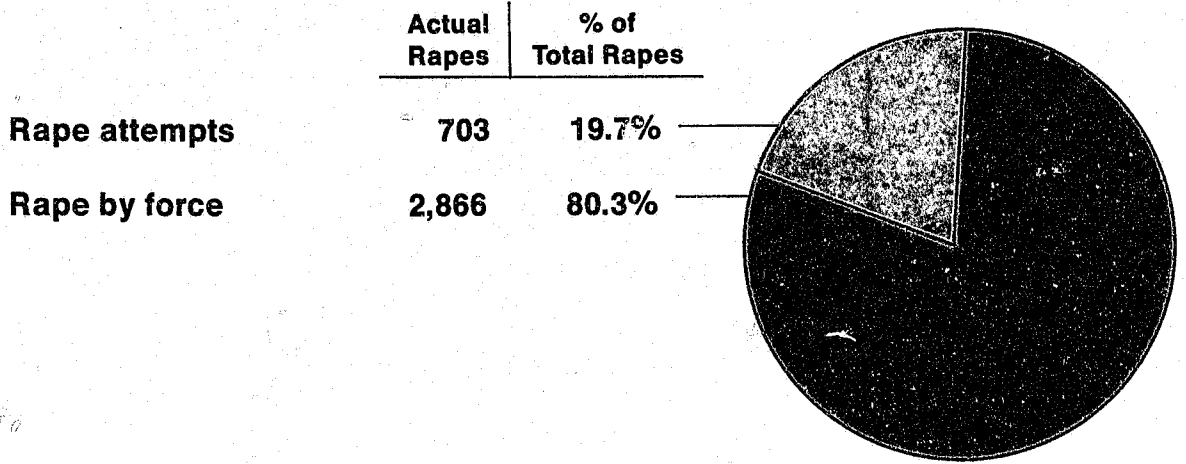

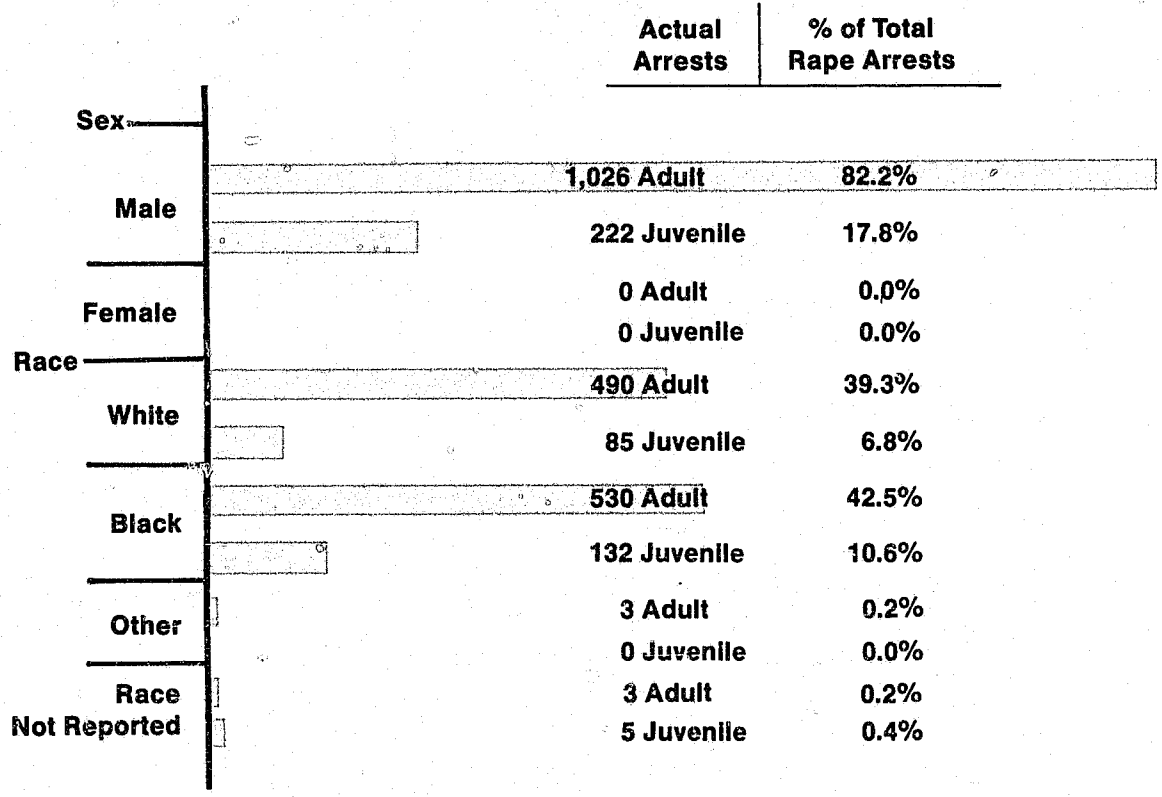

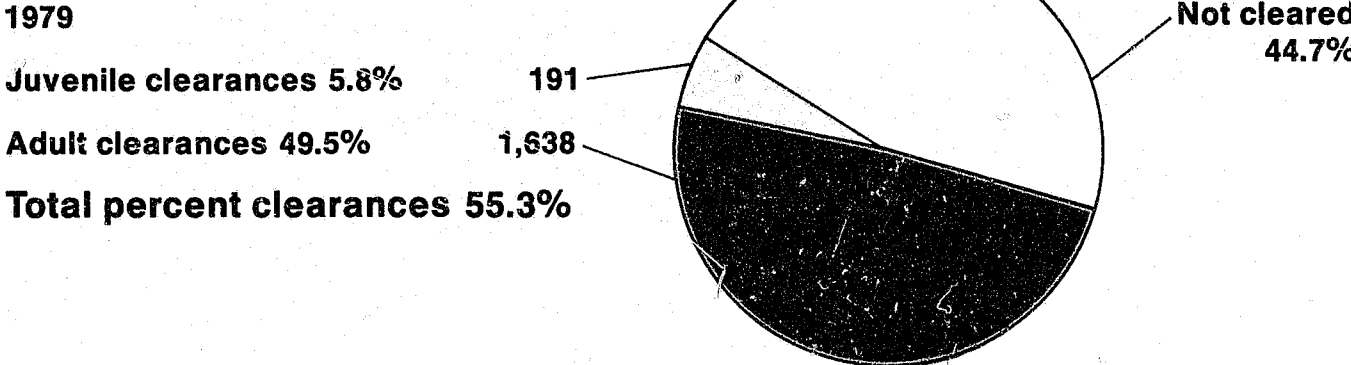
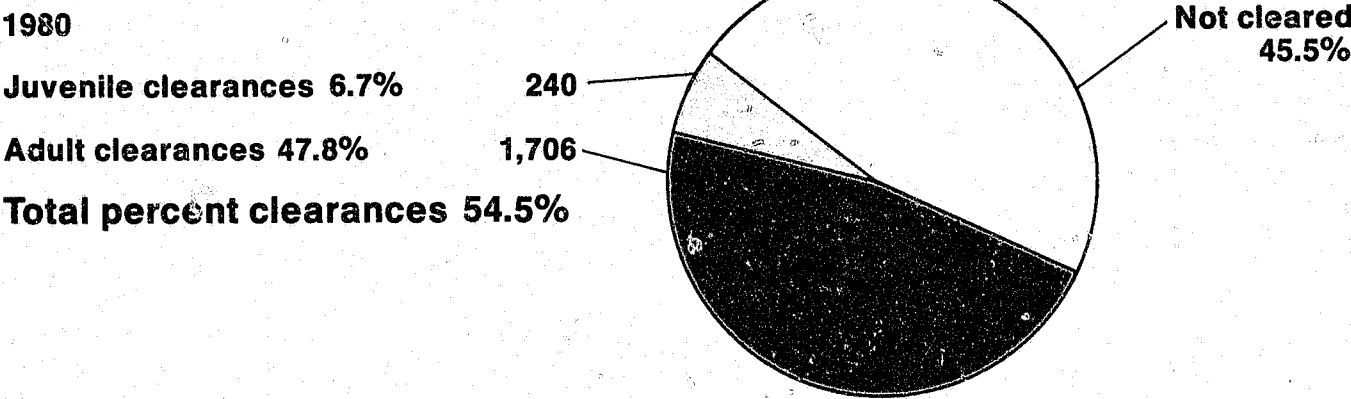
Forcible Rape as a Percent of Total

Robbery

DEFINITION

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Robbery is categorized as the third most serious violent crime in the reporting index. In 1980, there were 23,566 robberies reported in the State of Ohio. This total represents a 15.0% increase over robberies committed state-wide in 1979. These robbery offenses account for 45.7% of all violent crimes reported, and 4.2% of the total index.

Of the 23,566 robberies in 1980, detailed information was not submitted for 618 or 2.6%. For the remaining 22,948 robbery offenses in which detailed information was provided, a value of \$9.88 million was estimated in stolen property. This figure was 23.8% more than the \$7.98 million reported in 1979. The highest robbery loss (\$4,058,316) occurred on highways, streets, alleys, and sidewalks. The largest increase in stolen property values for the year occurred for robberies in banks (12.2%). Convenience stores and commercial establishments showed the only decrease in dollar amounts and they were 2.4% and 0.3% respectively.

Bank robberies lead in dollar loss per offense, but remain the location where fewest robberies occur. (see Table 8) The number of bank robberies increased in 1980 as did dollar loss of property.

The month of December, 1980, as in the previous

year, had the highest number of robberies (2,496) for any single month, with a 26.8% increase. July of 1980 was the month noted for the largest change in the number of robberies from the previous year, jumping 35.5% from 1,572 offenses in 1979 to 2,130 for the month in 1980.

The weapons most frequently used in robbery offenses were firearms, which were used in 46.5% of the crimes. Strong-arm robberies followed in 39.5% of the offenses.

The state-wide crime rates for robberies in 1980 increased from 210.3 robberies per 100,000 in 1979 to 247.1 per 100,000 population.

The clearance rate for robbery offenses decreased by 0.5% in 1980, from 27.7% of reported robberies solved in 1979 to 27.2% in 1980. The actual percentage of robbery clearances reported in 1980 remained much the same as comparable figures in 1979. Adult clearances continued to surpass juvenile clearances at a rate of about five to one. The clearances of robberies involving adults increased from 21.9% to 22.9% of the reported offenses, while those cases cleared which involved only juveniles dropped from 5.8% to 4.3% of all reported robberies.

Total arrests for robbery offenses in 1980 numbered 5,086, an increase of 505 (11.0%) over 1979.

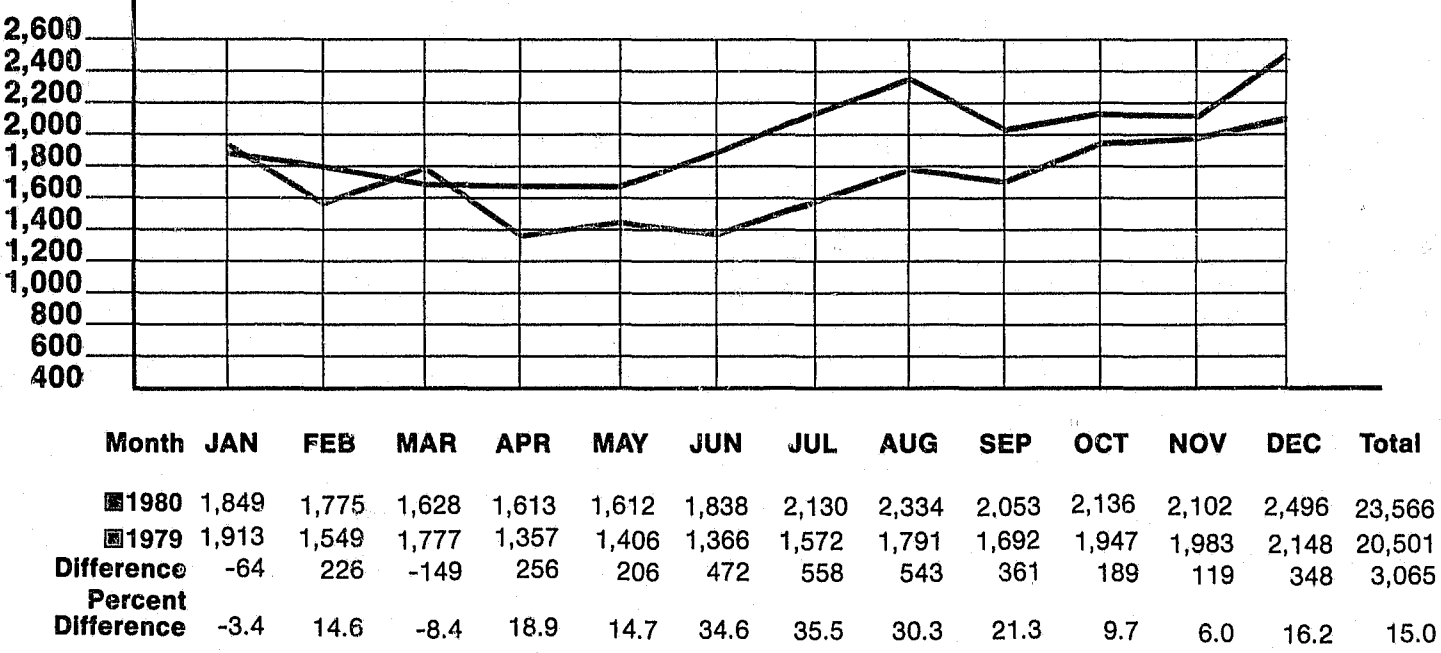

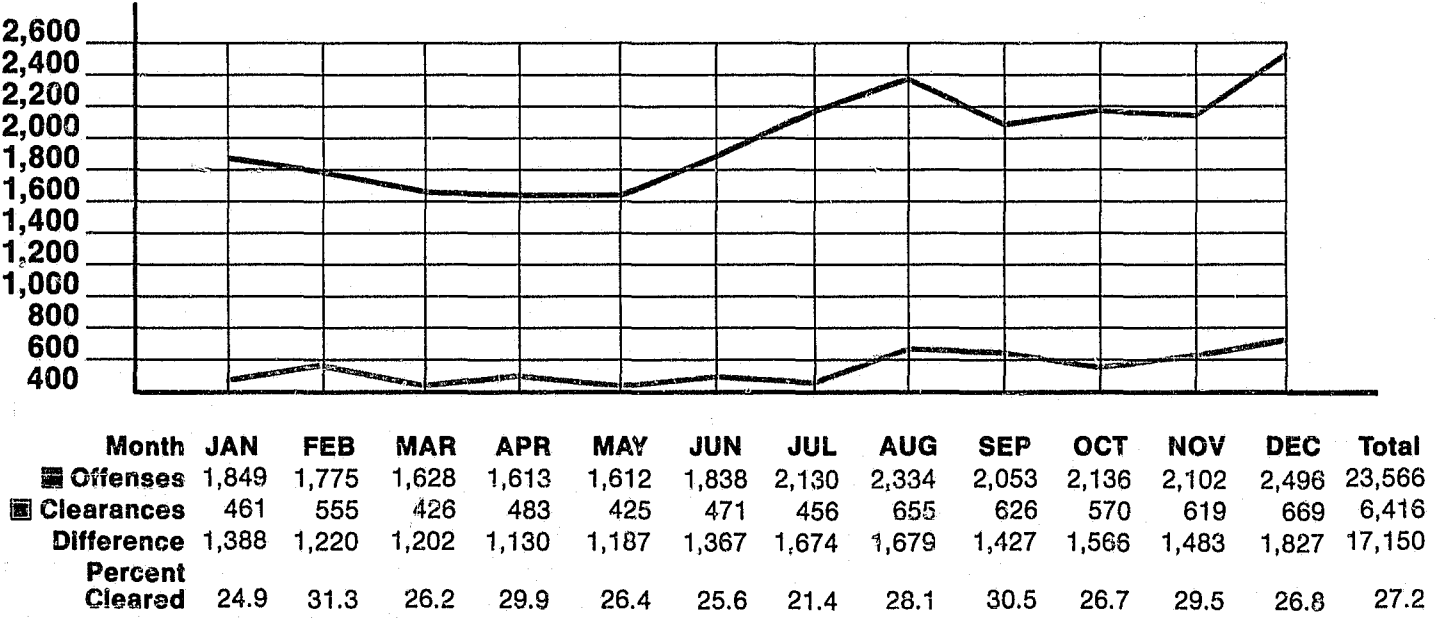

Robbery by Month

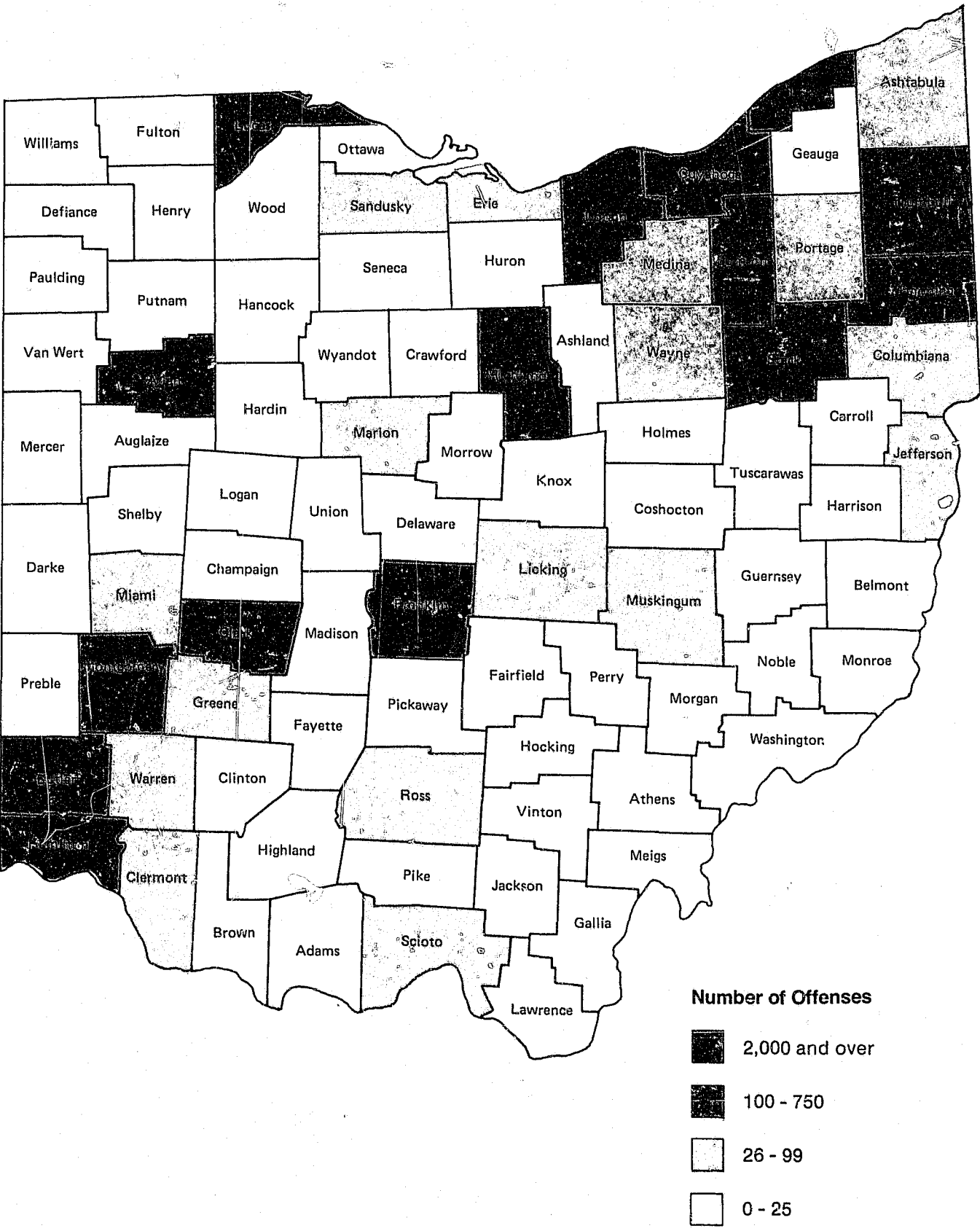
1980 vs. 1979

Robbery Comparison by County

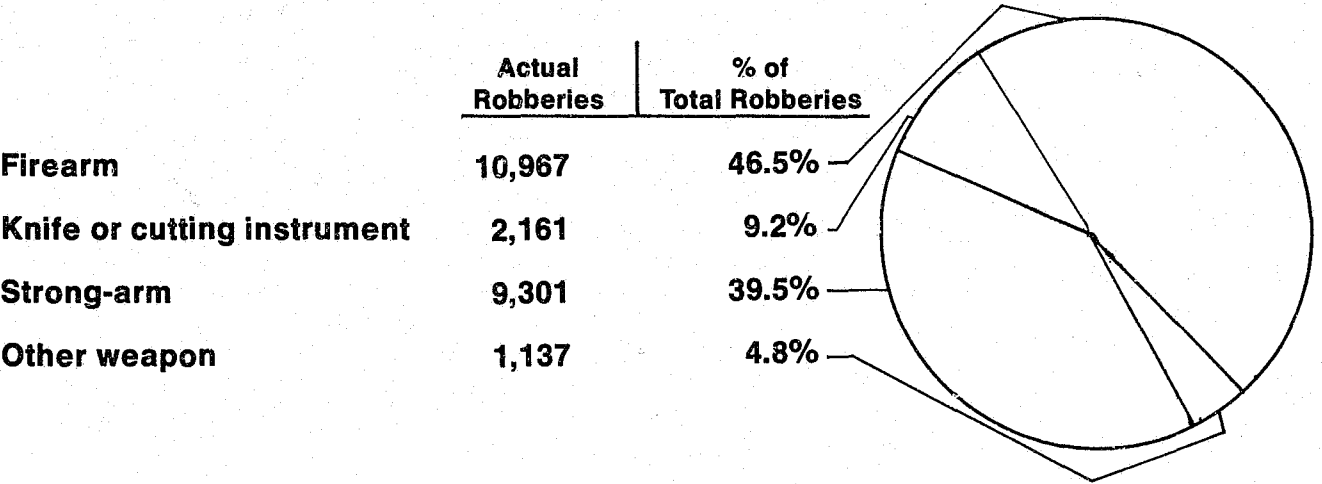

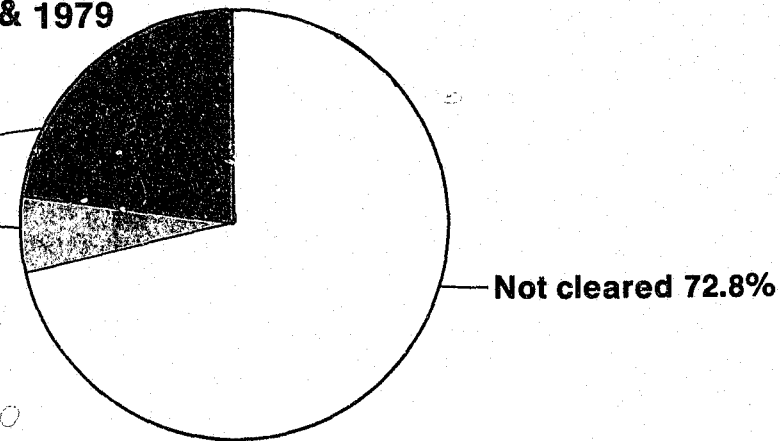

Aggravated Assault

DEFINITION

Aggravated assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Aggravated assault is ranked fourth on the index crime hierarchy, and is the final category of violent crime to be presented in this report.

Total assaults in Ohio, including both simple and aggravated numbered 77,905 in 1980. This represented a 6.0% increase over the total reported in 1979. Of these total assaults, aggravated offenses rose 4.2% from 22,671 assaults in 1979 to 23,613 in 1980. The simple assaults rose 6.9% from 50,794 to 54,292 in 1980. Simple assaults accounted for 69.7% of all assaults committed in 1980, and aggravated assaults were indicated in the remaining 30.3% reported.

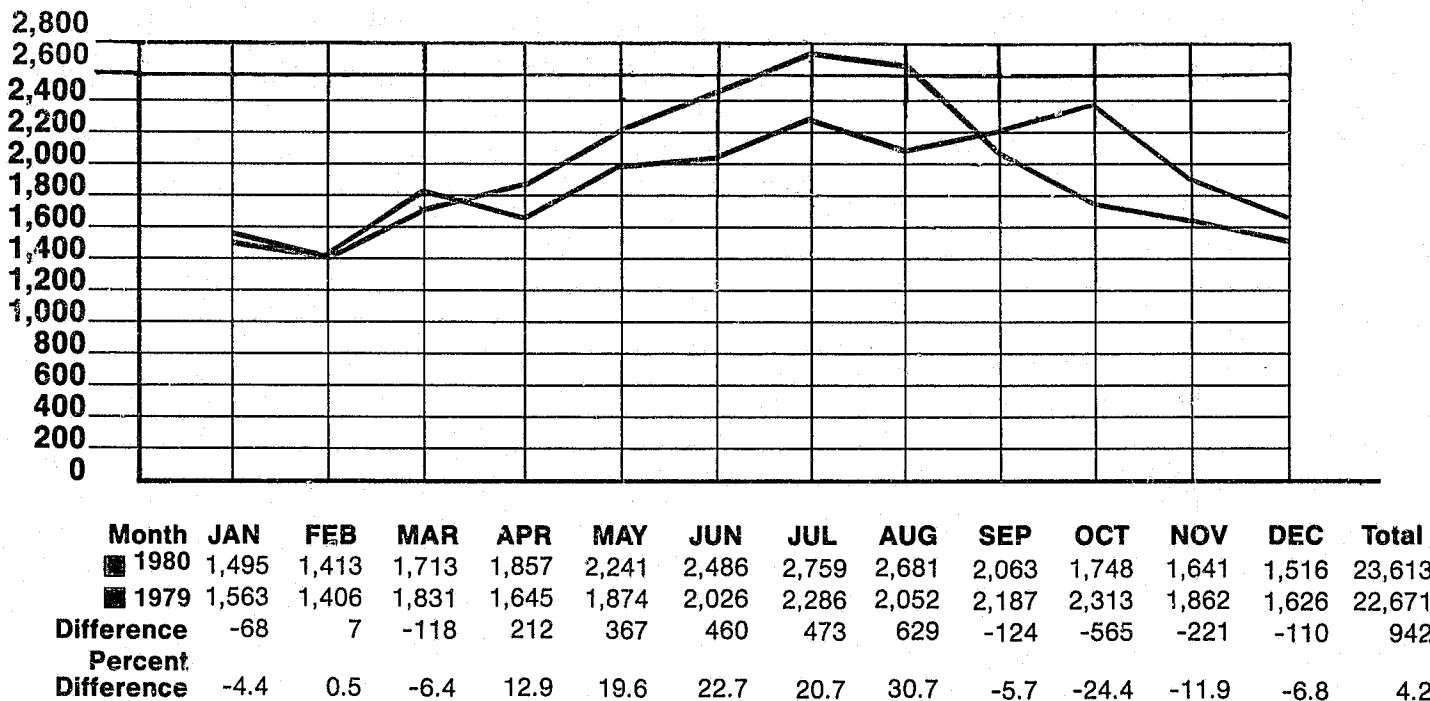
Simple assaults are primarily differentiated from aggravated assault in that simple assaults do not involve the use of a dangerous weapon and do not result in serious injury. Simple assaults are excluded and only the more serious crime of aggravated assault is included in the UCR crime index. Aggravated assaults in 1980 represented 45.8% of violent crime and 4.2% of all reported index crime.

The largest number of aggravated assaults for one month occurred during July, 1980, and numbered 2,759. This month accounted for the highest monthly figures reported in two out of four of the weapons categories, with 729 firearm assaults and 977 assaults with a personal weapon.

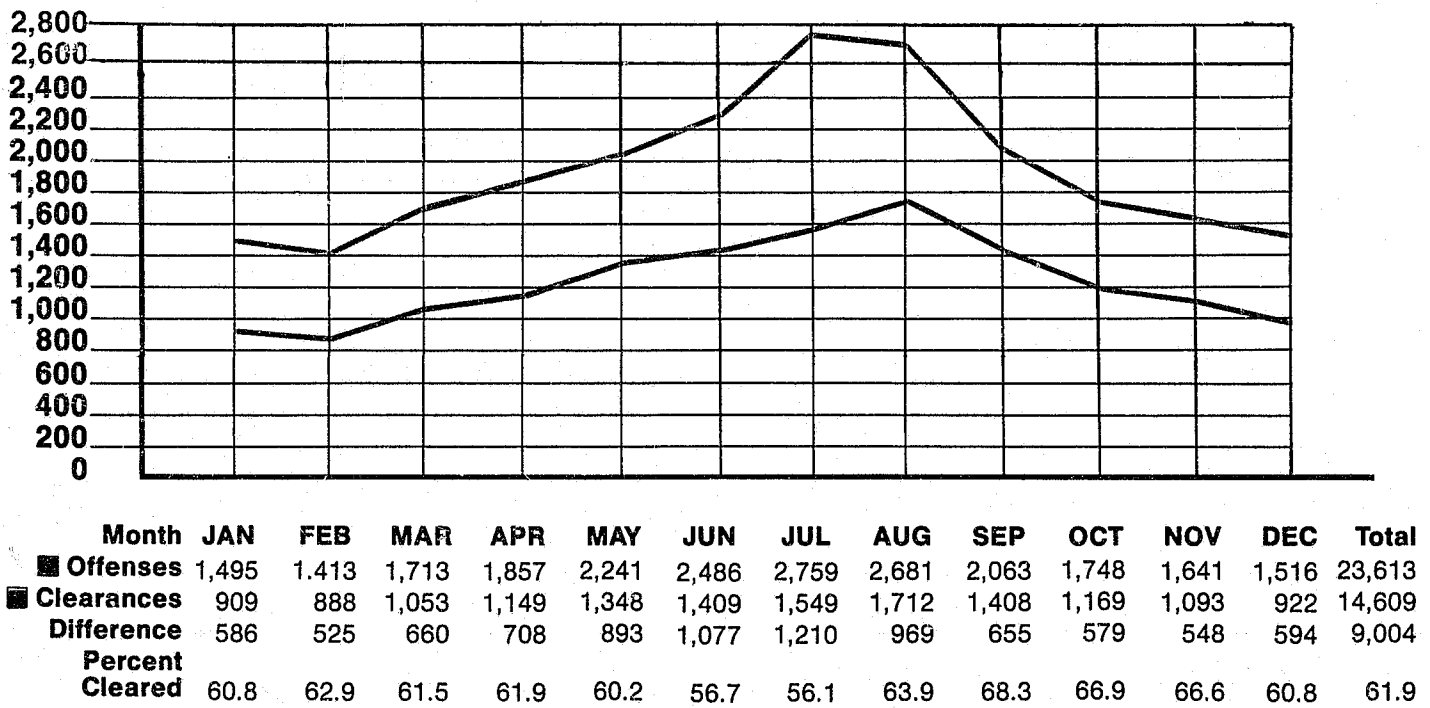

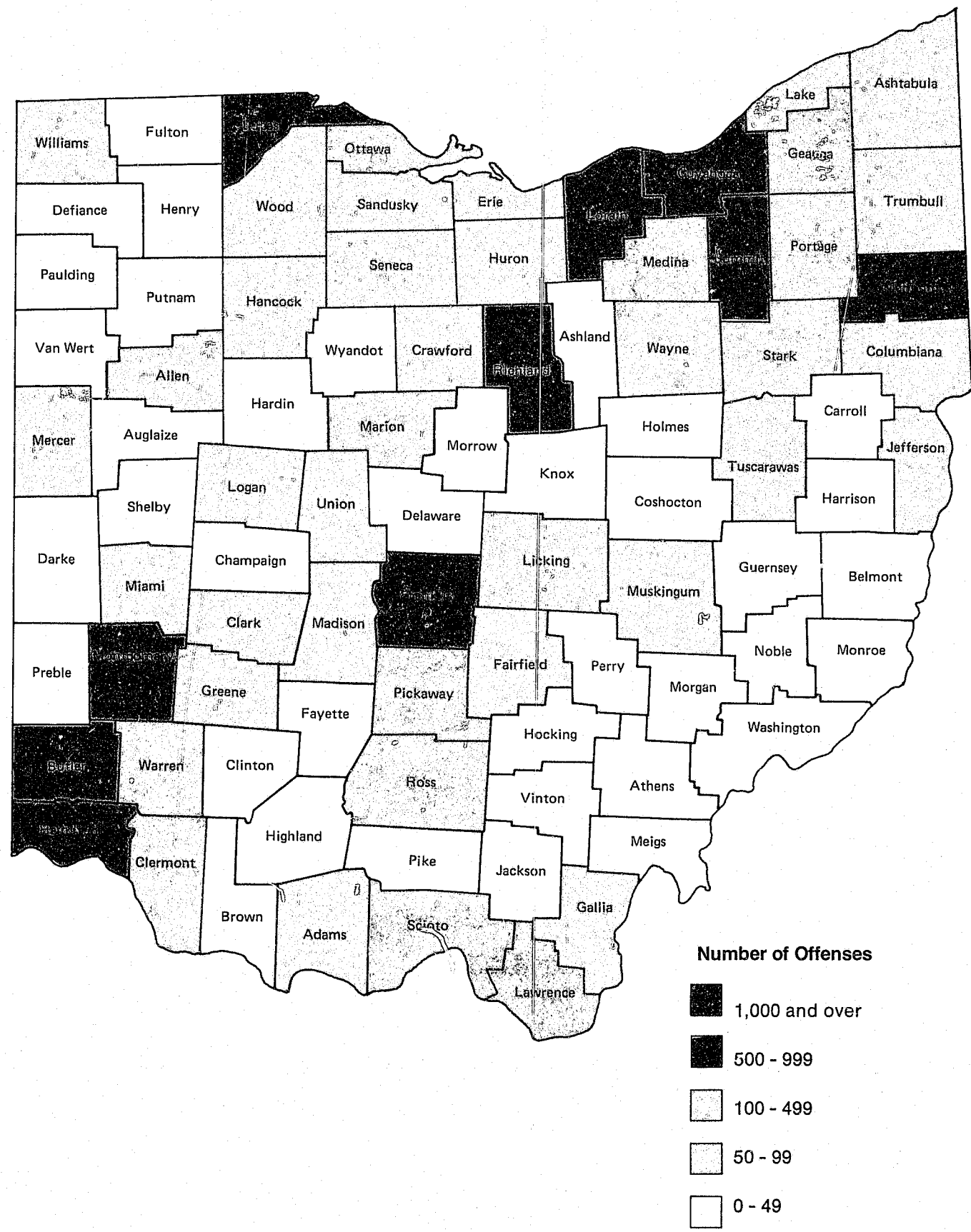
Aggravated Assault by Month 1980 vs. 1979

Aggravated Assault Comparison by County

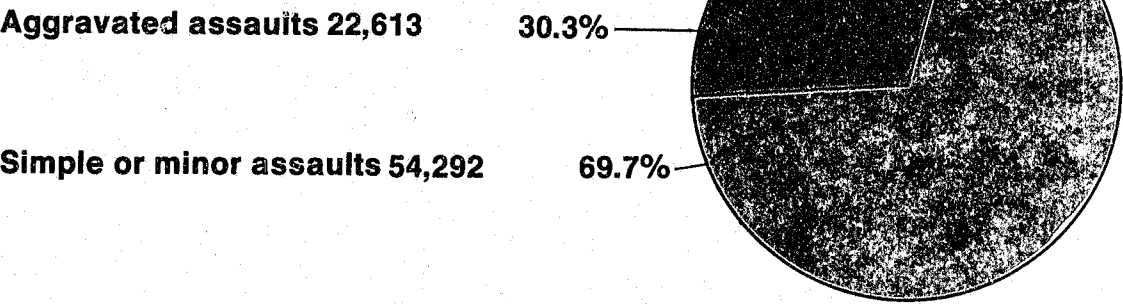

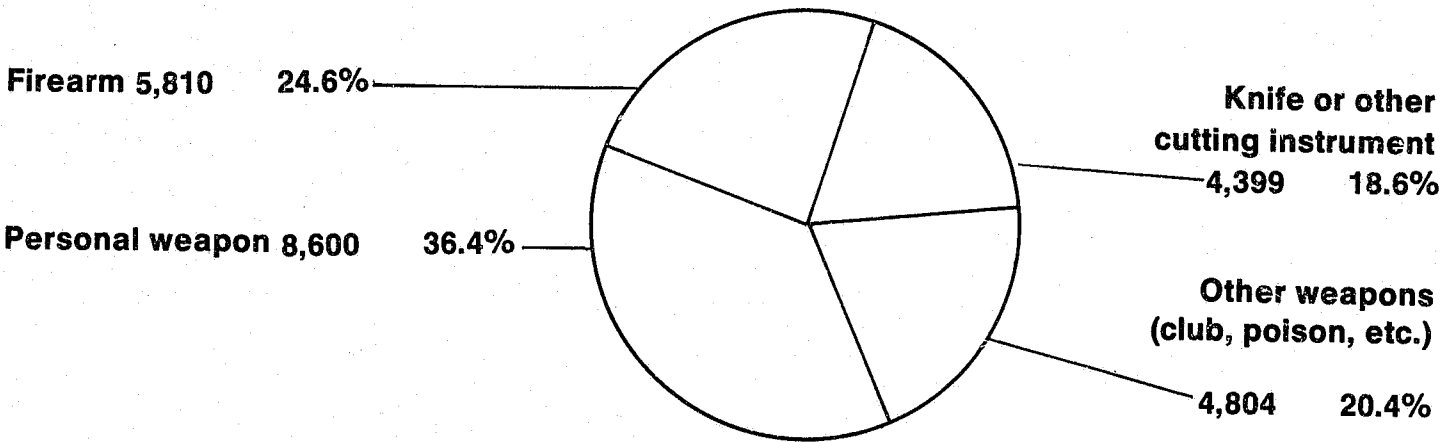

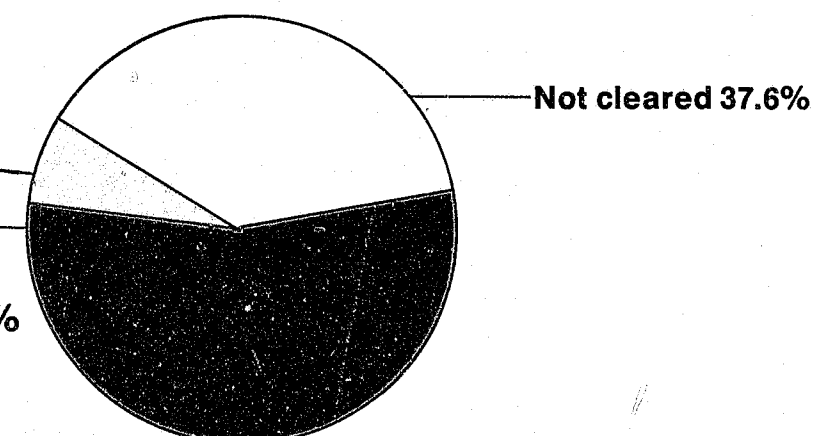

Burglary

DEFINITION

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program defines burglary as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify an offense as burglary. Burglary in this Program is categorized into three subclassifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry.

Burglary is ranked as the fifth crime in the UCR index, and is the first of the property crimes to be presented in this report. Total burglaries in Ohio in 1980 numbered 150,514, an increase of 13.7% since 1979. This figure represents 29.8% of all reported property crimes and 27.0% of all index crimes.

Each month of 1980 reflected an increase in burglaries over the same comparable month of 1979. The greatest number of burglaries occurred in August (14,824), while the fewest were reported in February (10,521). The month which showed the greatest percent of increase over the same month last year was February 1980, in which burglaries jumped 23.3%.

Forcible entry burglaries accounted for 76.8% of all burglaries reported, followed by 16.4% in which no force was used, and the remaining 6.8% in which only attempts were made to burglarize. August had the highest burglary total for any single month, and also took the lead in the number of forcible entry burglaries reported during the year.

Of the total 150,514 burglaries in 1980, detailed information was not submitted in 8,967 offenses or 6.0%. Of the remaining 141,547 offenses in which additional information was provided, residential burglaries accounted for 67.2% of the total, a slight increase of 2.8% since 1979. Of the 95,120 residential burglaries in which detailed information was provided, 42.7% occurred at night. In the 46,427 detailed non-residential burglaries reported, an even higher percentage occurred at night (63.8%).

A value loss of \$86 million was reported for stolen property in 1980 resulting from the 141,547 total

detailed burglaries. This figure is \$27 million more than the total stolen property value from burglaries reported in 1979 (\$59 million). It should be noted, however, that a portion of this apparent value increase in 1980 may be due to the submission of detailed information on 1,561 more burglaries in 1980 than were submitted in 1979. The largest dollar loss from burglaries in 1980 resulted from residential burglaries, and in particular, those residential burglaries occurring at night. The average dollar loss per burglary offense rose from \$485 in 1979 to \$606 in 1980.

The state-wide crime rate for burglaries per 100,000 people rose from 1337.6 burglaries in 1979, to 1554.7 burglaries per 100,000 in 1980. Decreases in the burglary rate per 100,000 were noted in 1980 for one population group: suburban populations of under 2,500 people decreased by 19.4 offenses per 100,000 and rural populations of under 2,500 people decreased by 125.9 offenses. The greatest rise in crime rates for burglary occurred in rural populations of 25,000-50,000 people, increasing 38.2% from 1589.6 burglaries per 100,000 persons in 1979 to 2196.1 burglaries in 1980.

Burglaries in 1980 were cleared in 14.2% of those offenses reported, a decrease of 1.3% since 1979. The clearances of burglaries involving adult offenders comprised 9.7% of the burglaries cleared, and clearances involving only juveniles made up the remaining 4.5%.

Burglary arrests in 1980 numbered 16,188, which was 1,410 more than arrests reported for burglary in 1979.

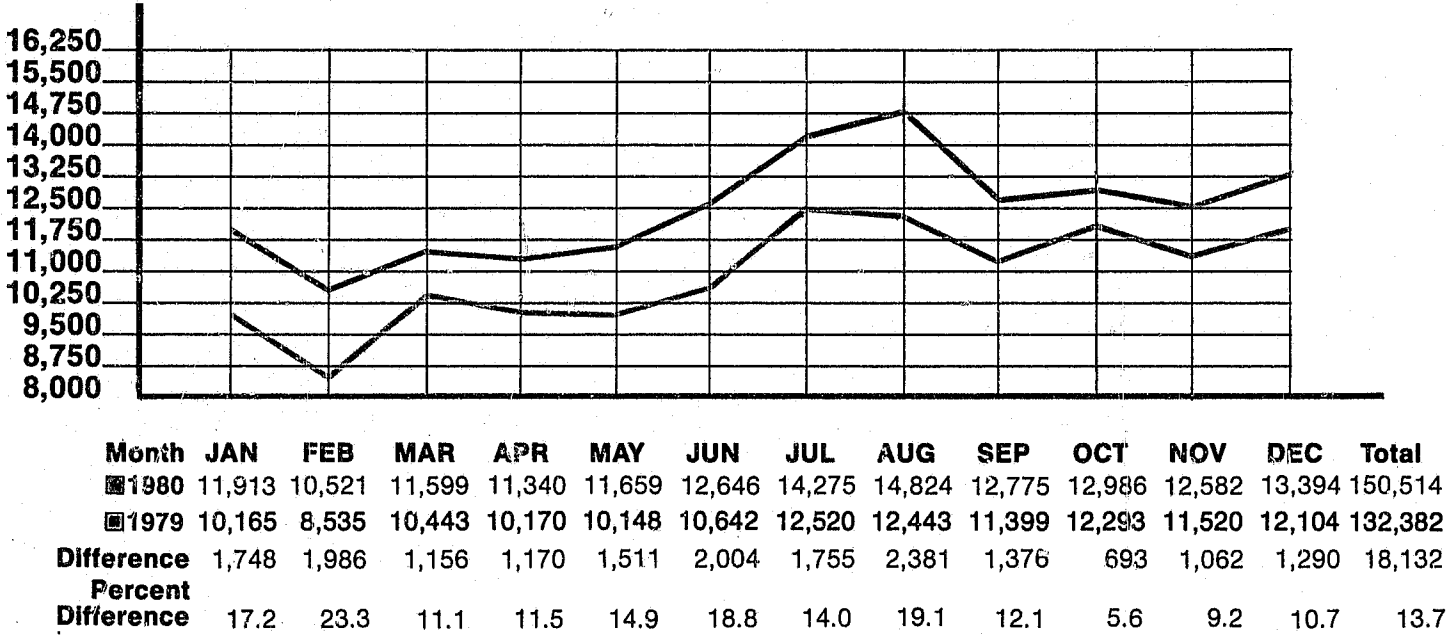

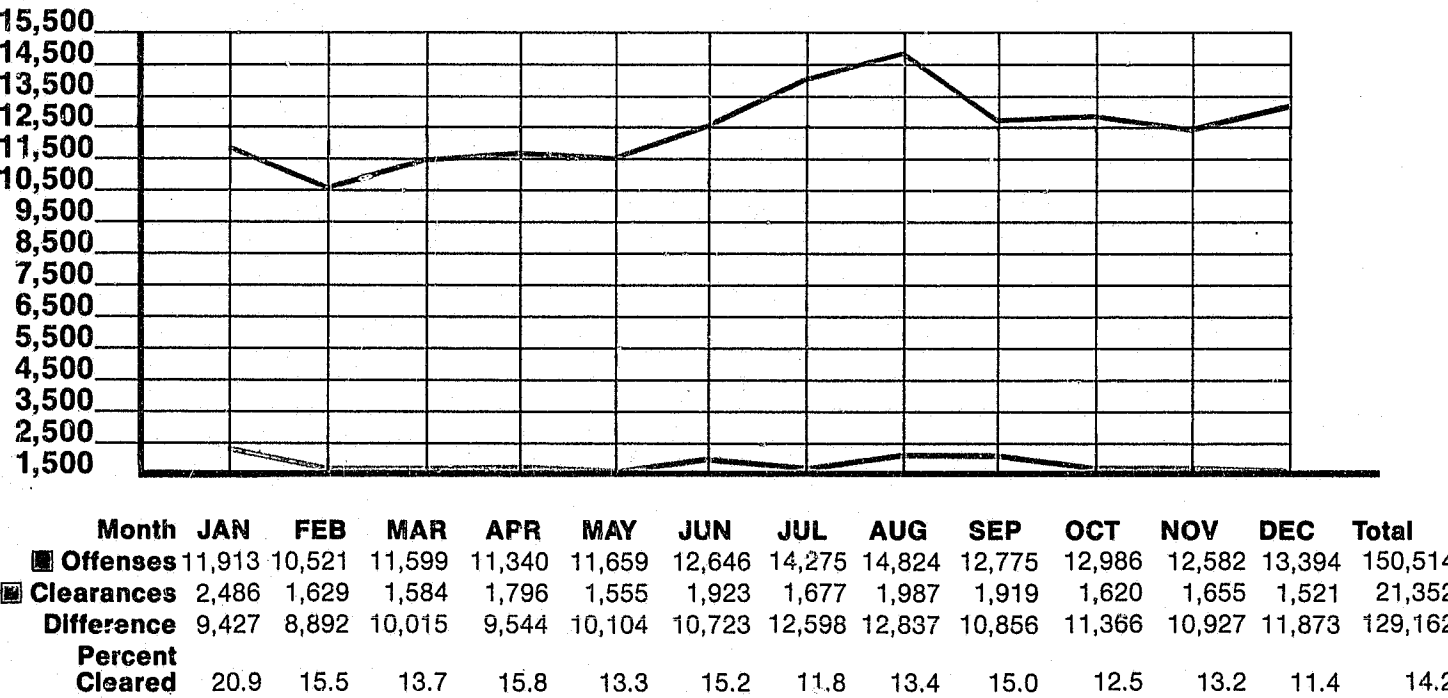

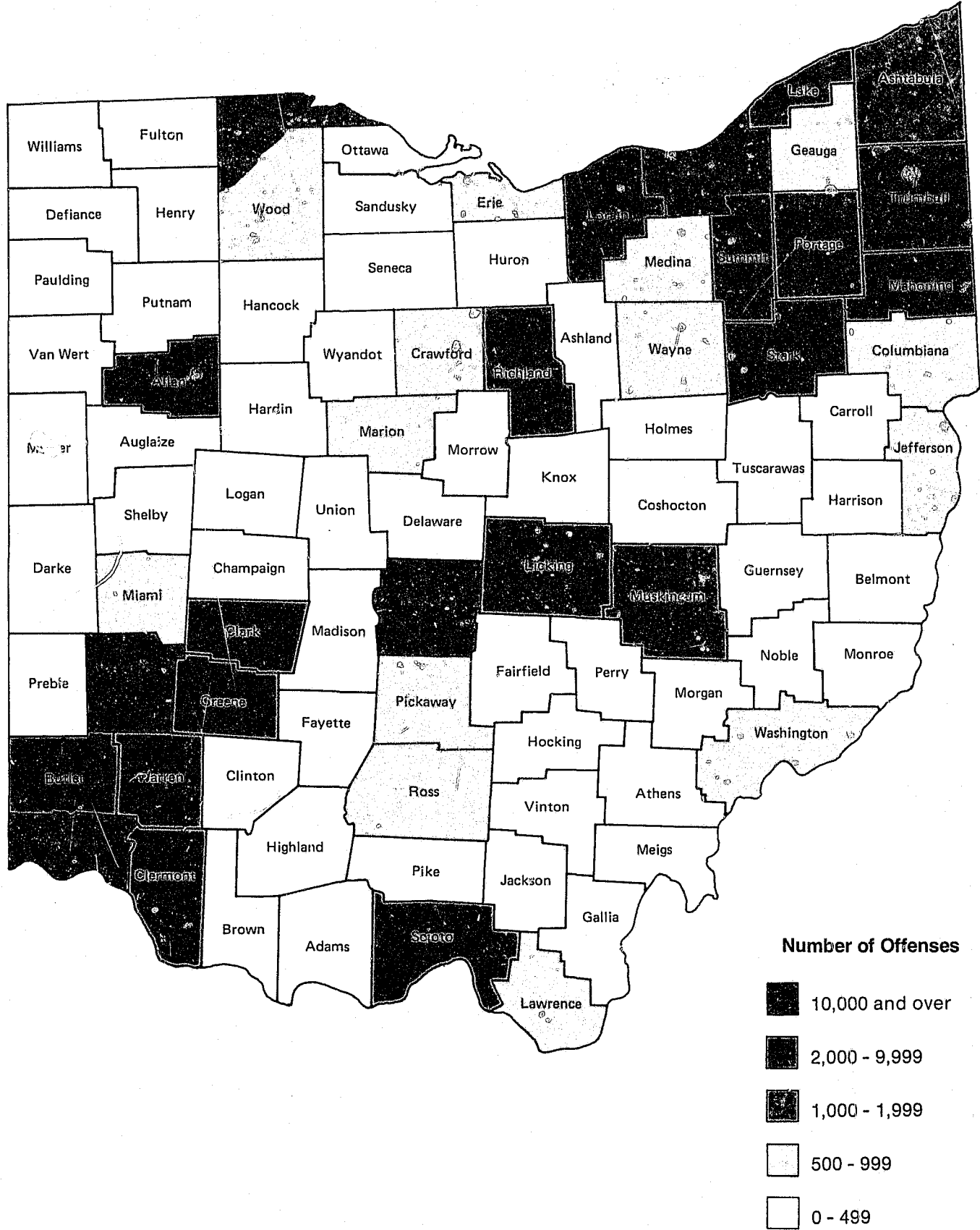
Burglary by Month

Burglary Comparison by County

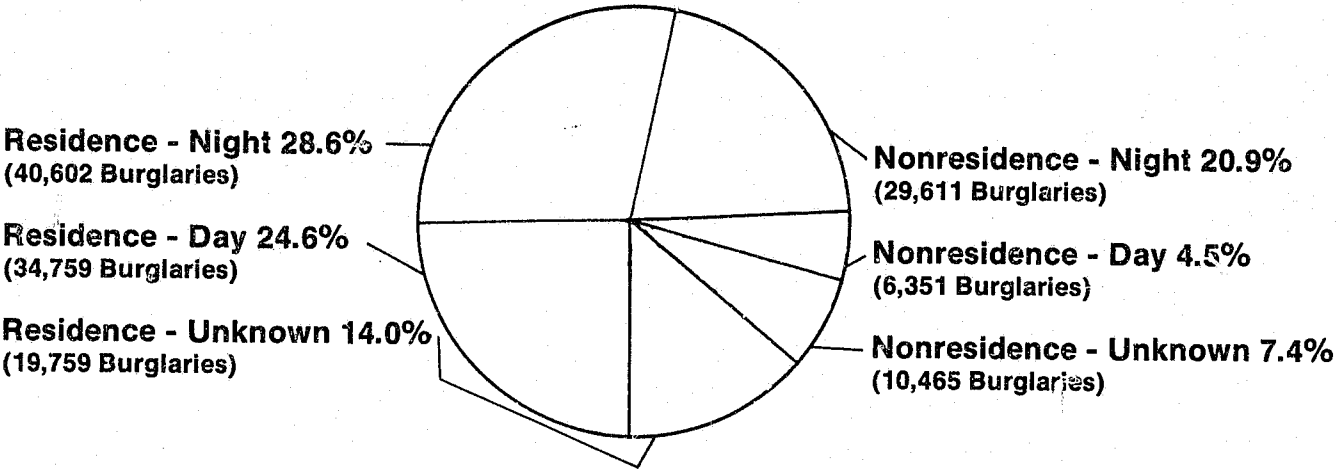

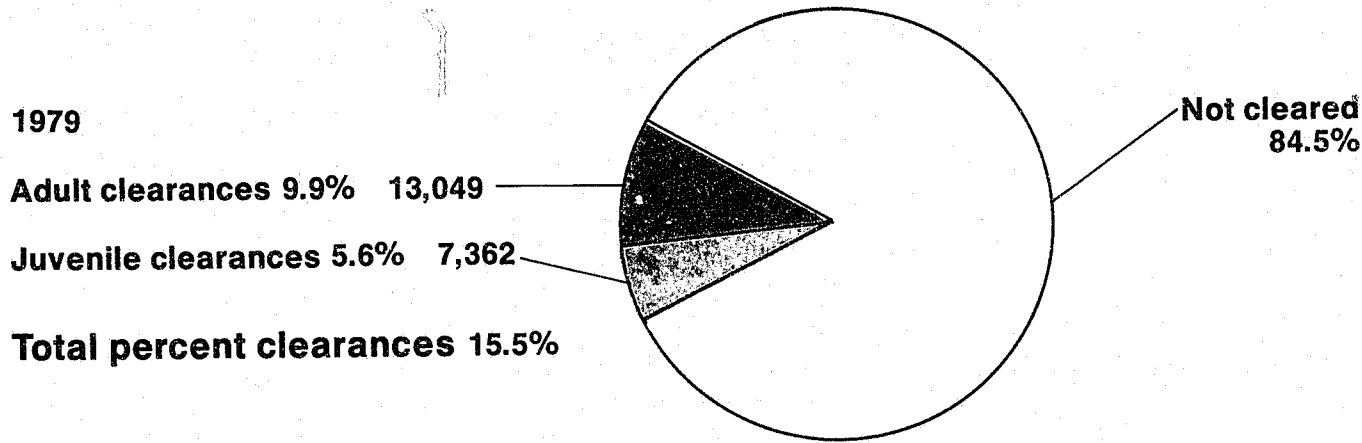
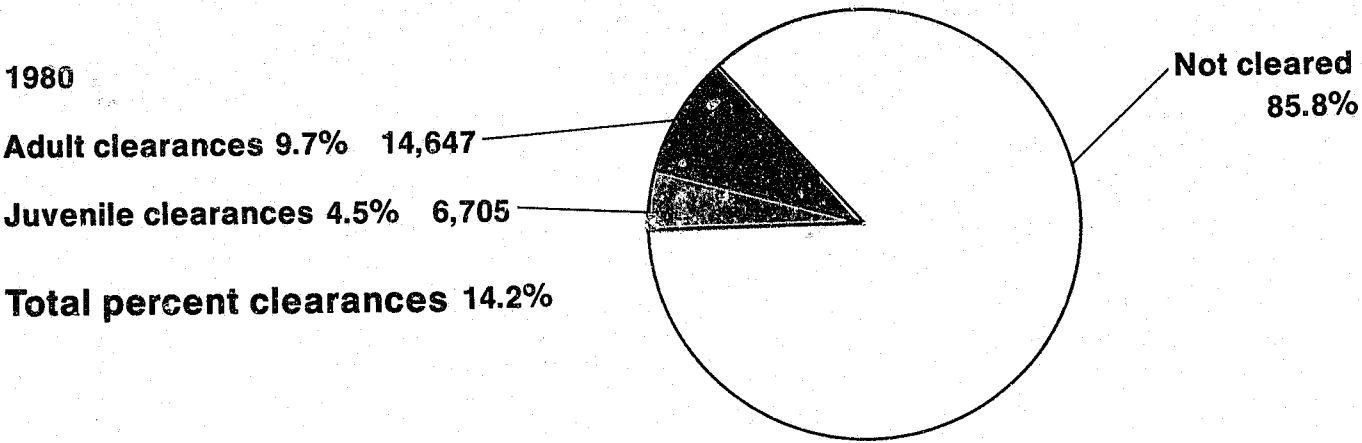
Burglary by Location and Time

Larceny

DEFINITION

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. In the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, this crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks.

Larceny, which remains the largest component of the index crimes, is ranked as the sixth offense in the UCR hierarchy. The number of larcenies reported in 1980 was 309,875, a 3.5% increase over larcenies reported in 1979. The 1980 larceny total accounted for 61.4% of all property crime and 55.7% of all index crime.

Detailed information was not submitted on 6.2% or 19,126 larcenies. For the remaining 290,749 larcenies for which detailed information was submitted, the most frequent type of larceny was the theft of motor vehicle parts, which accounted for 25.3% of the detailed larceny offenses reported. This type of offense, along with thefts from motor vehicles, accounted for 40.3% of all larceny offenses. Pickpocketing and coin-operated machine larcenies were the least frequented types of larcenies reported, as well as representing the lowest property losses of all nine types of larcenies in Table 13.

August of 1980 reflected the greatest number of larceny offenses (30,958) in any one month, while February had the fewest (19,625). February gained the largest number of offenses, increasing 12.3% from 17,468 offenses in 1979 to 19,625 in 1980.

In evaluating dollar losses resulting from larceny offenses, an increase of \$11 million or 19.4% was reported in 1980. Although the greatest number of

larceny offenses (109,768) involved property valued at less than \$50, the greatest property loss (\$56 million, or 80.1%) occurred in larcenies of property over \$200.

Larcenies from buildings, as well as being one of the most frequent types of larcenies, held the highest average dollar loss per offense (\$366/offense). Thefts from buildings also reflected the largest property loss of any other single type of larceny (\$18 million, or 25.4%) in 1980.

The larceny dollar loss of \$70 million in 1980 accounted for 22.6% of the total \$310 million lost in all index offenses reported in 1980.

The state-wide crime rate for larceny increased 6.4%, from 3008.1 offenses per 100,000 people in 1979 to 3201.5 larcenies in 1980. The greatest crime rate changes in 1980 took place in populations of 100,000-250,000 in which the suburban larceny crime rate increased by 14.8% while the rural crime rate under 2,500 decreased 24.9% since 1979.

The state-wide larceny clearance rate increased 1.0% in 1980. Of the 17.9% of larcenies that were solved in 1980, 13.0% involved adults, while the remaining 4.9% of larcenies cleared involved juveniles only.

Arrests for larcenies in 1980 number 43,560, an increase of 10.1% from 1979.

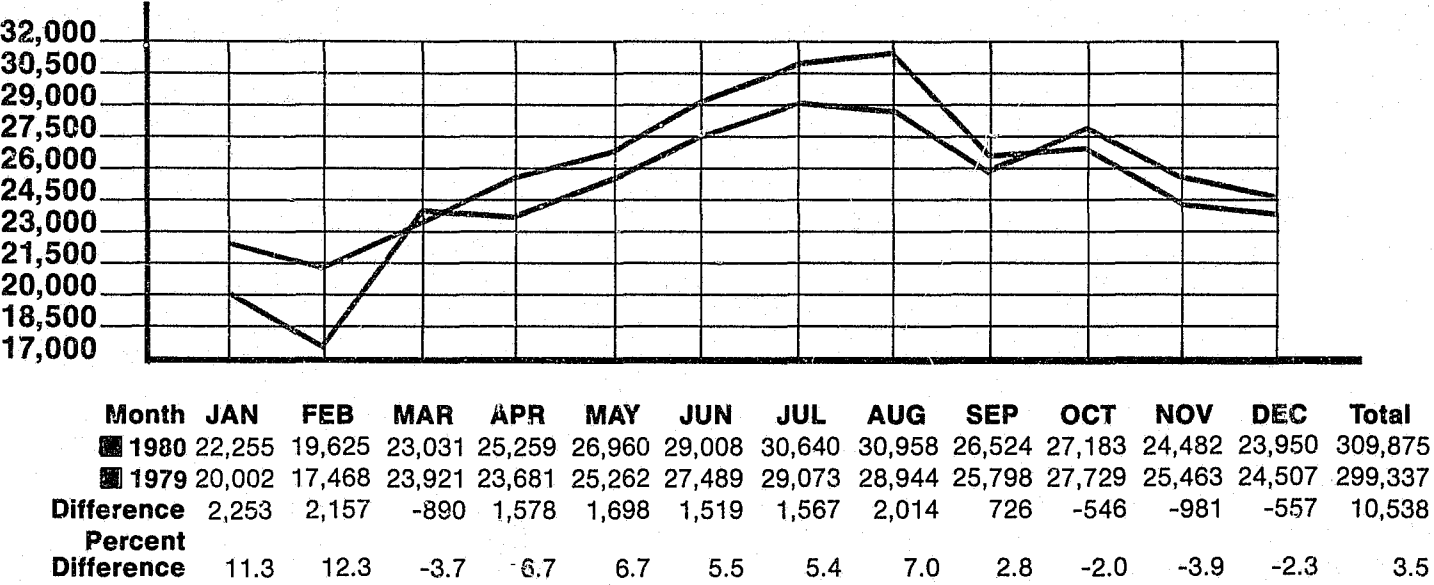

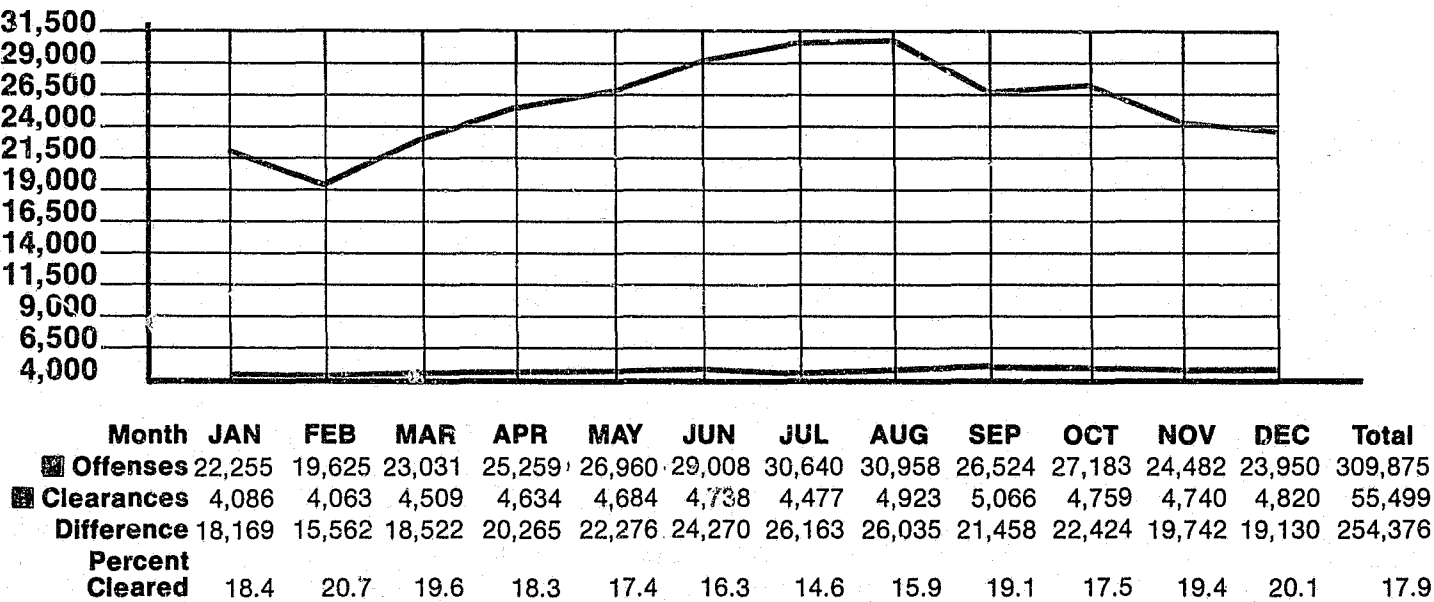

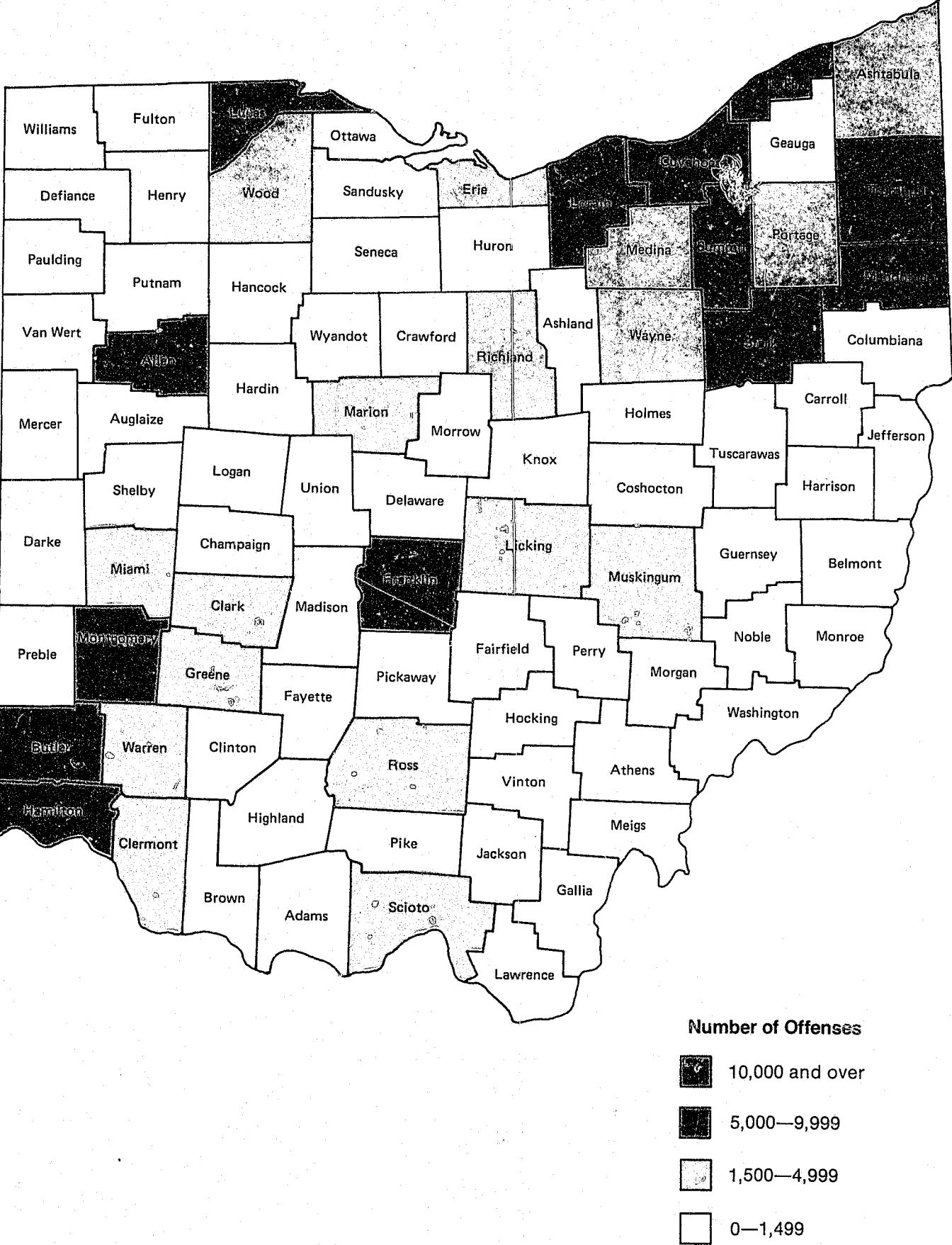
Larceny by Month 1980 vs. 1979

Larceny Area Comparison by County

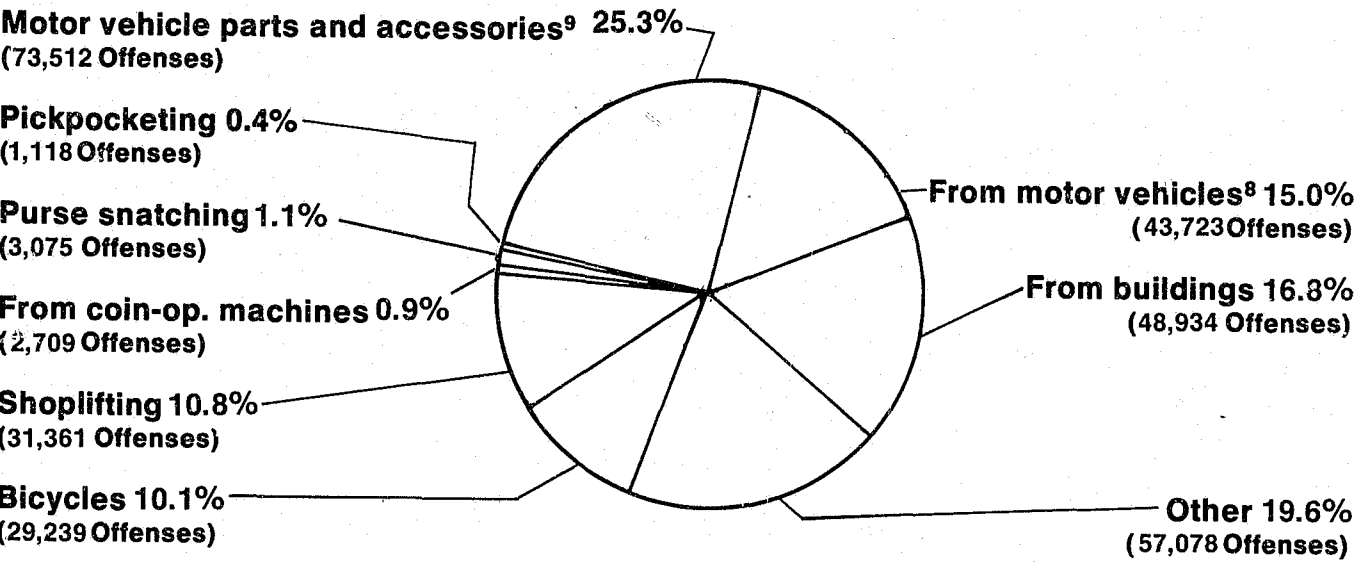

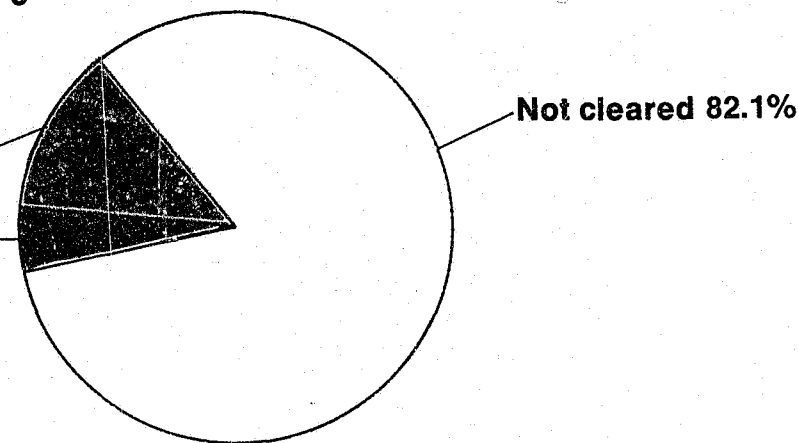

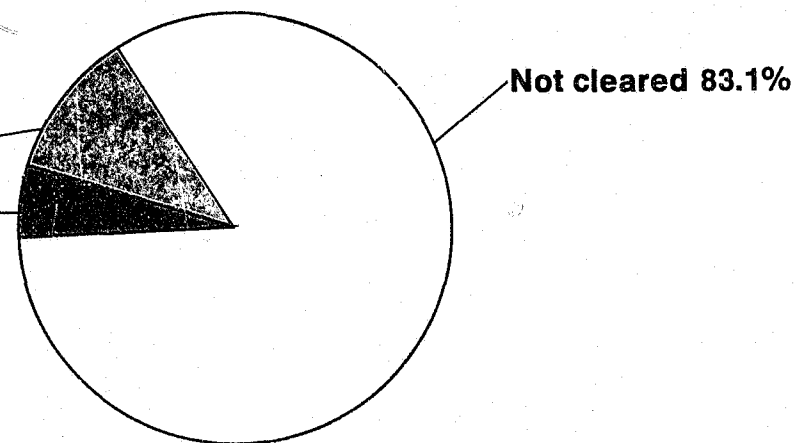

Motor Vehicle Theft

DEFINITION

Motor vehicle theft is defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. This definition excludes the taking of a motor vehicle for temporary use by those persons having lawful access. Also excluded are thefts of motor boats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.

Motor vehicle theft is considered a special type of larceny which, because of the frequency with which it occurs, is considered a separate index crime. This offense falls seventh in the crime hierarchy. The number of motor vehicle thefts reported in 1980 fell 2.0% from 45,181 in 1979 to 44,259 in 1980. Thefts of vehicles accounted for 8.8% of all property crime and 8.0% of the total index crime.

The month of August had the largest number of motor vehicle thefts reported (4,231), while the fewest thefts were reported in February (2,997). The largest increase for any one month compared to the same month of the previous year appeared in August, with a 6.9% increase in thefts.

Of those motor vehicles stolen in 1980, 73.3% or 32,425 vehicles were recovered, an increase from the 65.8% recovered in 1979.

Thefts of automobiles accounted for 78.1% of all motor vehicle thefts. Thefts of trucks and buses were involved in 12.3% of all vehicle offenses reported, and other vehicles such as motorcycles, scooters, mopeds, and snowmobiles comprised the remaining 9.6%.

In the 44,259 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1980, a dollar loss of \$137,750,382 was estimated. For the 32,425 vehicles recovered, a total of \$78,743,682 was reported as the dollar value recovered. It should be stressed that the recovered amount which is listed reflects the value of vehi-

cles in the condition in which they were recovered, including deductions for damage or missing parts. This would partially explain why the recovered values appear to be much lower than the stolen values of motor vehicle thefts.

The state-wide crime rate for motor vehicle theft per 100,000 population rose from 457.0 offenses in 1979 to 460.0 in 1980. In individual population groups, the greatest increase in crime rate for motor vehicle theft per 100,000 people occurred in suburban populations 2,500-10,000, an increase of 15.9%, even though the actual increase in number of offenses was only nine. The greatest decrease in crime rate for motor vehicle thefts per 100,000 people occurred in rural populations of under 2,500, a decrease of 37.2%.

Motor vehicle theft clearances decreased by 2.1% dropping from 17.5% in 1979 to 15.4% motor vehicle thefts solved in 1980. Offenses involving adults comprised 11.8% of the vehicle thefts which were cleared, and the remaining 3.6% of the cases cleared involved only juveniles.

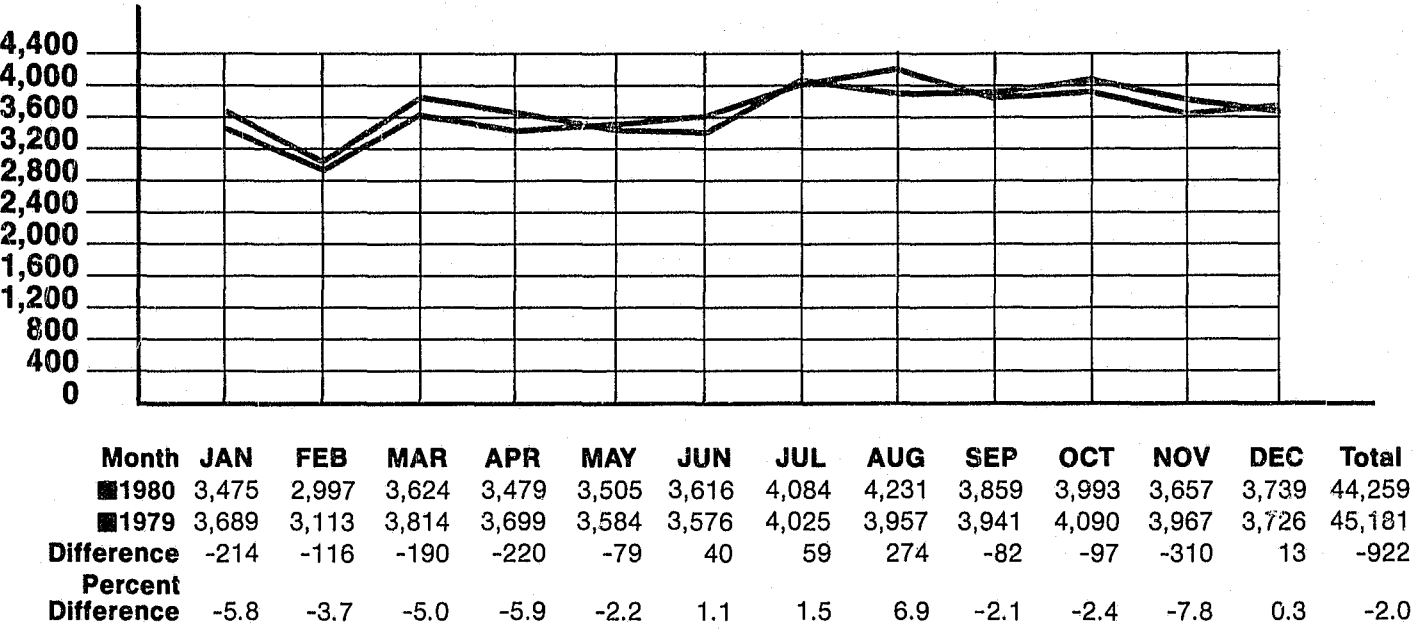
A total of 3,361 persons were arrested for motor vehicle theft in 1980. This is 353 fewer arrests than the 3,714 reported in 1979. The motor vehicle theft category was the only index offense in which juvenile arrests exceeded adult arrest, by 0.3%.

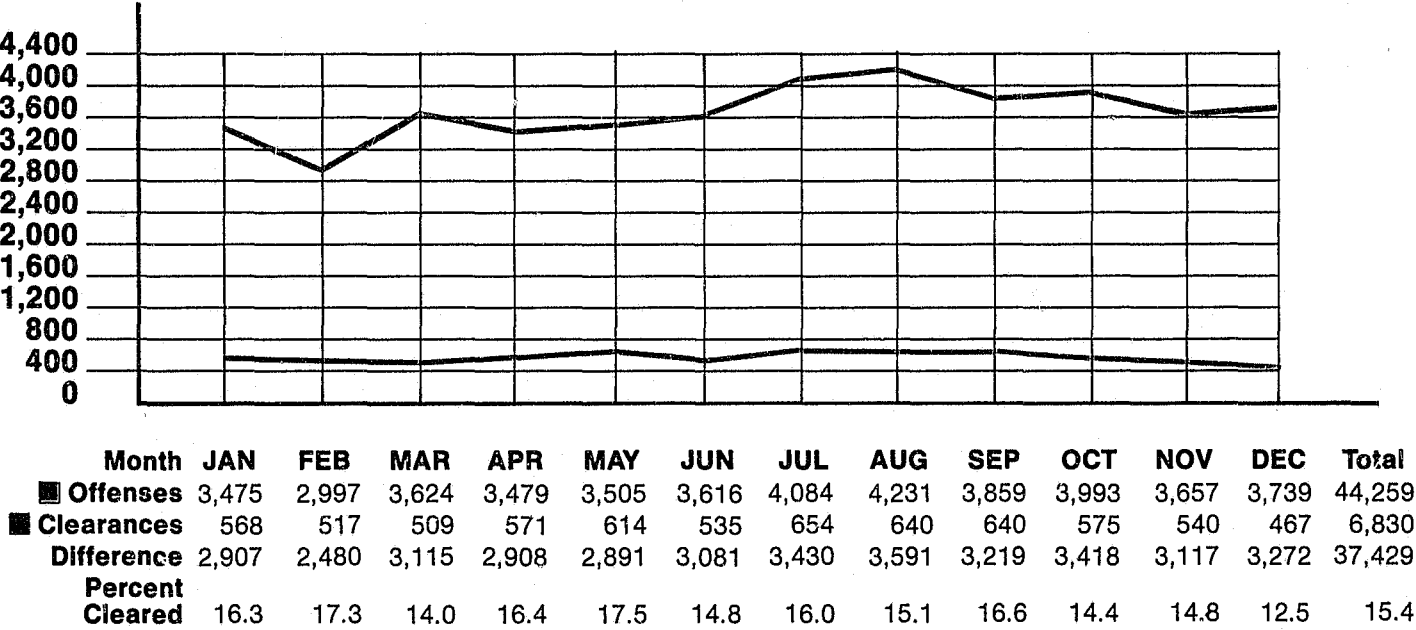

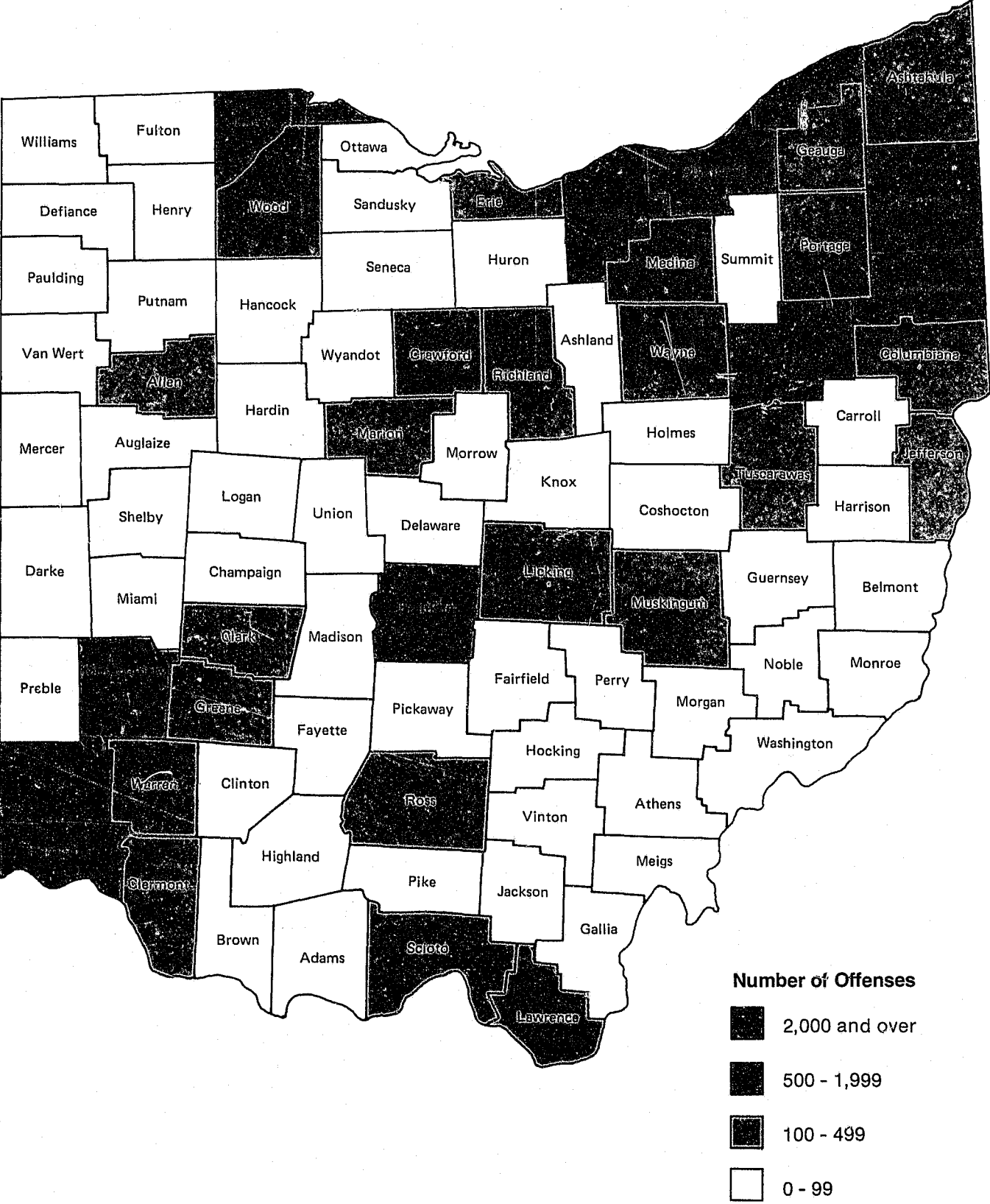
Motor Vehicle Theft by Month

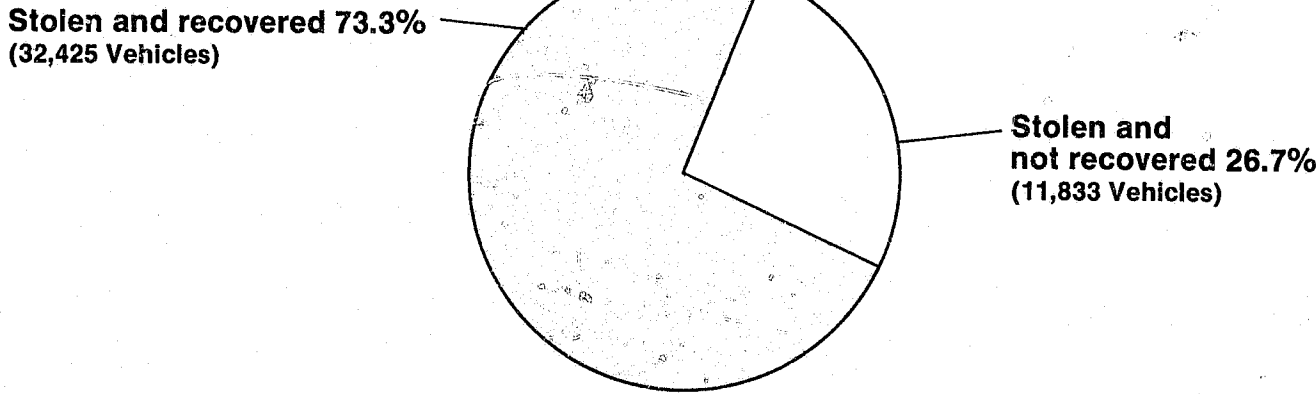

Motor Vehicle Thefts by Type of Vehicle Stolen

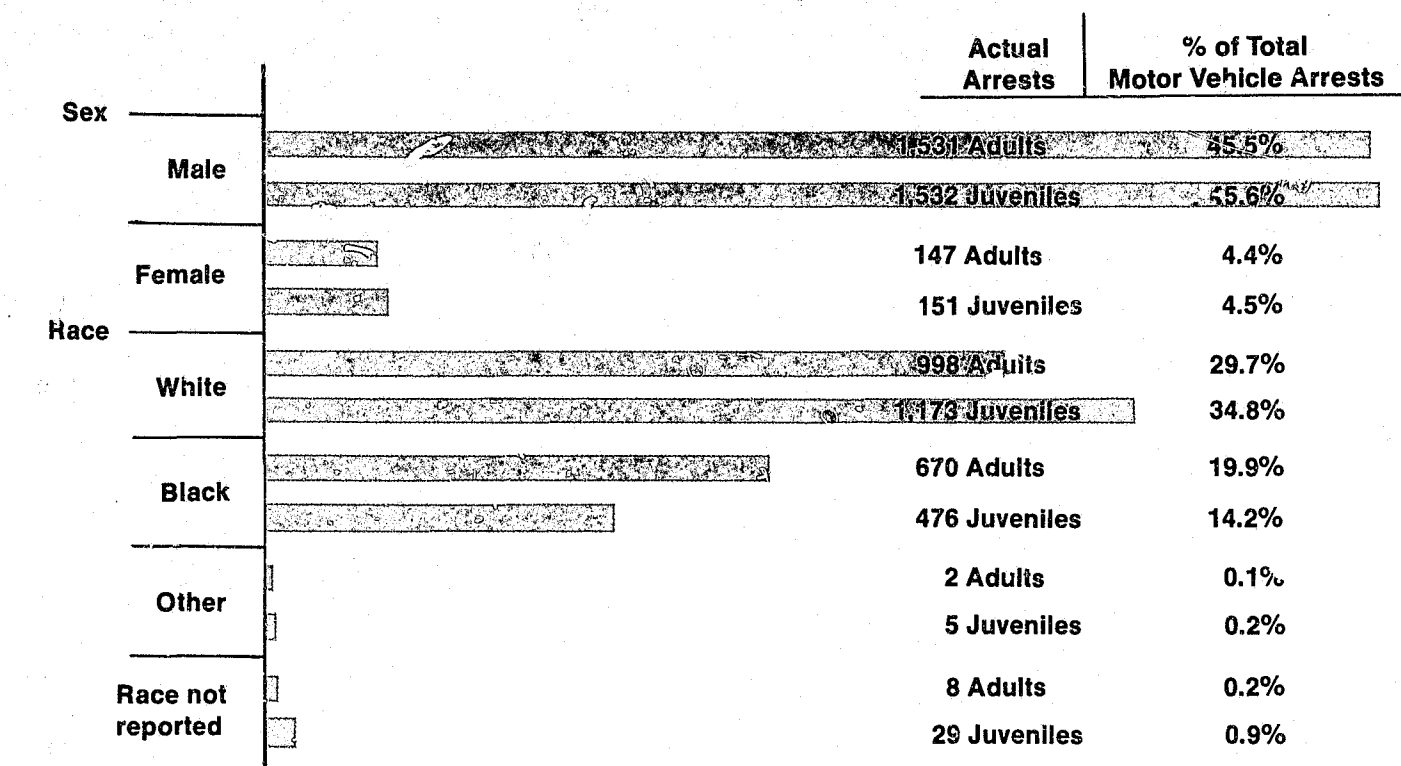

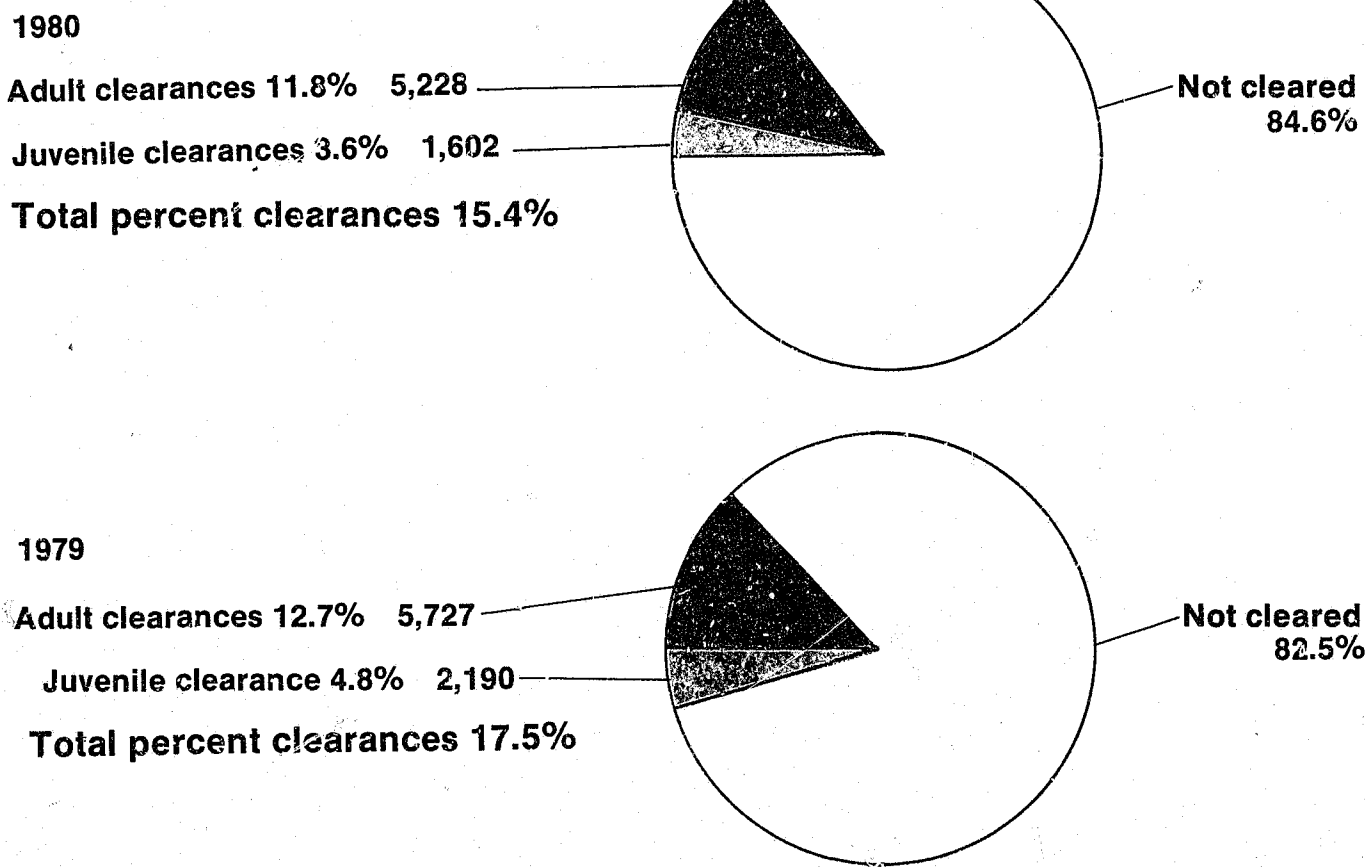
Percent of Vehicles Recovered

Reported Value of Property
Stolen and Recovered

Property valued at \$310 million was reported stolen state-wide in 1980. Property was reportedly recovered at a value of \$102 million, or 32.9% of the value of stolen goods.

The highest dollar amount of stolen property was once again in the motor vehicle theft category, accounting for 44.4% of the total property value stolen in 1980. Motor vehicle theft also reflected the highest value of property recovered, 77.1% of all property recovered. The lowest stolen and recovered property amounts were reported in the livestock category.

The value of stolen and recovered property increased from 1979 to 1980 with the exception of recovered consumable and tv's, etc., which decreased \$166,899 and \$97,319 respectively in 1980. September of 1980 was the month reflecting the largest value of stolen property and was also estimated to have the largest value in property recovered.

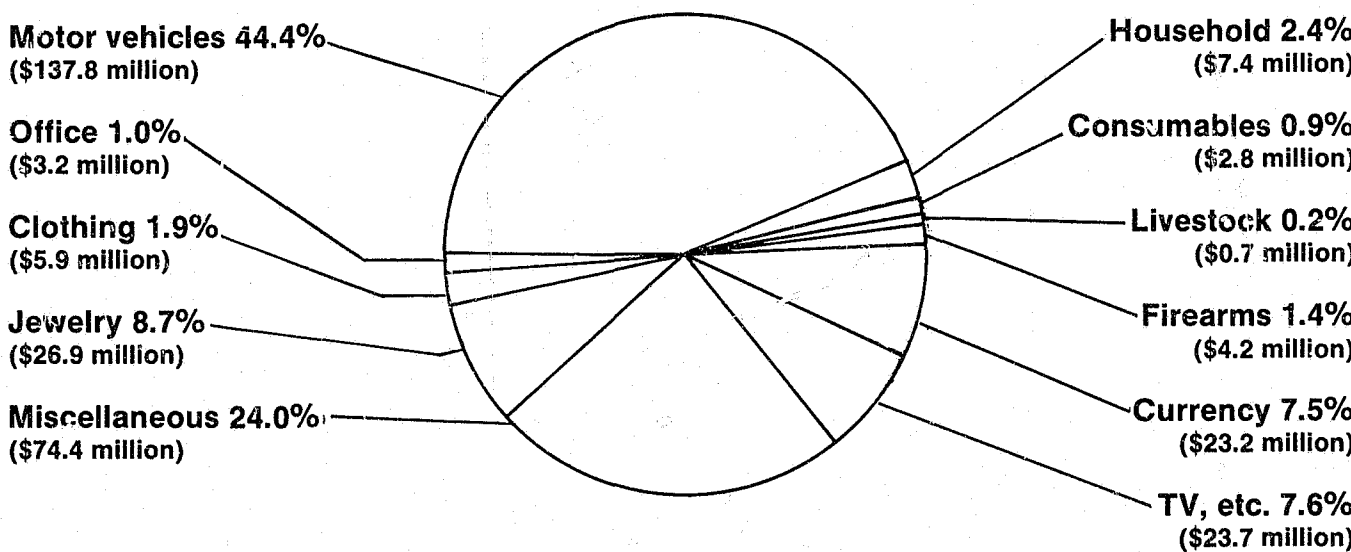
The lowest value of stolen property was reported in February, while June reflected the lowest value of

property recovered throughout the year. September, 1980, sustained the largest increase in both the value of property stolen and recovered since 1979, jumping 67.5% in the stolen property value of 151.7% in recovered property.

The value of stolen property, listed by category in Table 16, reflects the property loss resulting from the four index crimes of: motor vehicle theft \$137.8 million, burglary \$85.7 million, larceny \$70.4 million, and robbery \$9.9 million. An additional \$6.3 million in property was stolen when the offenses of murder and rape were committed.

Caution should be used in making any comparisons between the value of property stolen and that recovered. Recovered property value indicates the value of the property at the time it is recovered whether it is damaged or in its original condition. From the figures available, there is no way to determine the original value of stolen property which has been cleared by recovery.

Average Property Loss by Index Offense and Sub-type

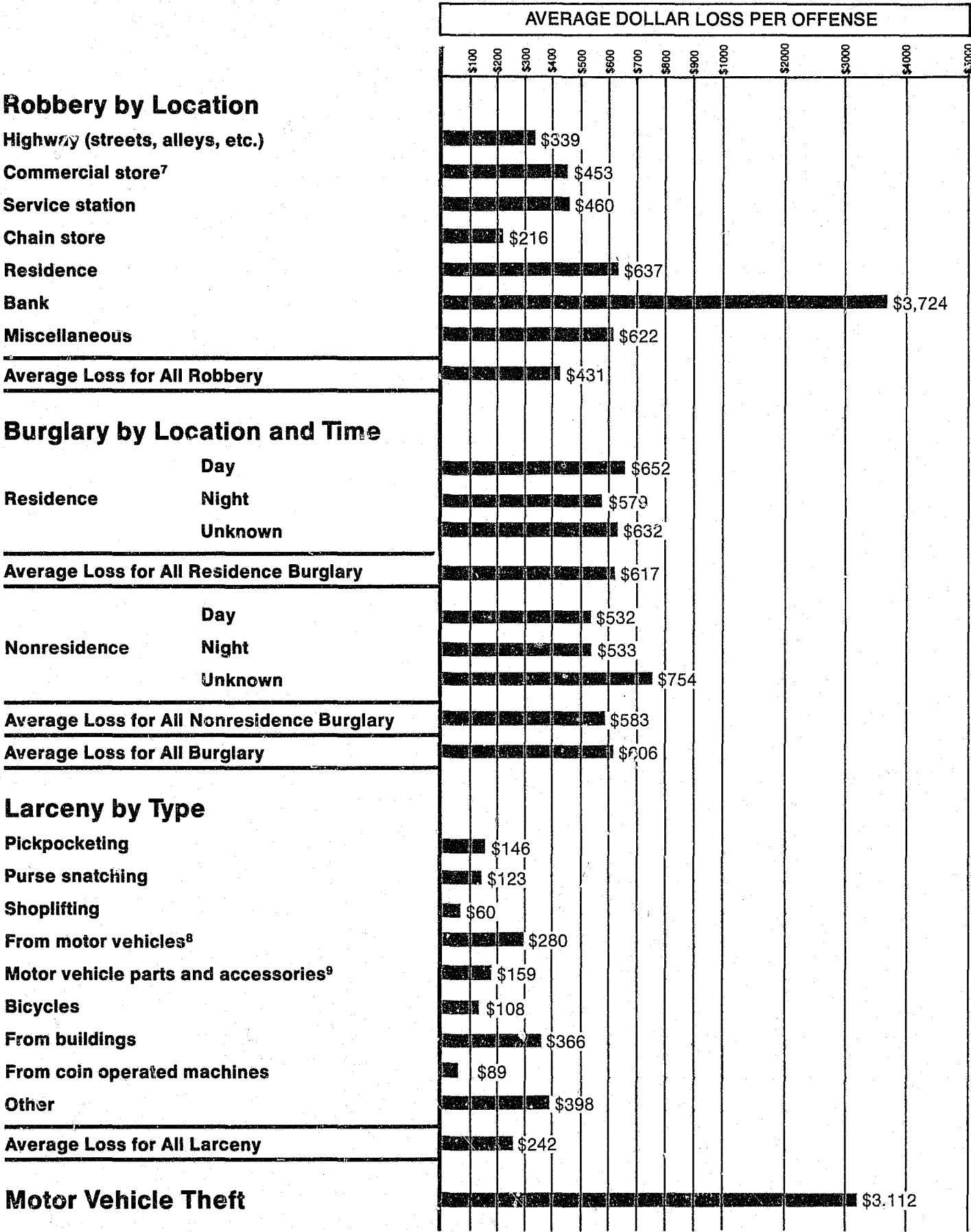

The Ohio Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program is a voluntary program, therefore not every law enforcement agency in Ohio participates. In 1980, there was a total of 465 agencies who participated. Of these contributors, 72 of the agencies did not contribute a complete year's data. For this reason, (see Estimated Crime, pg. 12), an accurate figure for the total number of crimes that occurred in Ohio is not possible.

The figures below are an estimate taken from the FBI/UCR statistics projecting the total crime in

Ohio.

These estimated crime rates and totals are calculated by estimating the crime rate for those agencies reporting less than twelve months and adding that estimate to the actual figures submitted by full twelve-month UCR contributors. This 1980 statewide FBI/UCR estimate of crime is also reproduced in Table 24, (pgs. 126-127). It is used for comparison with the actual state totals of contributing agencies (which represent approximately 95% of the state population).

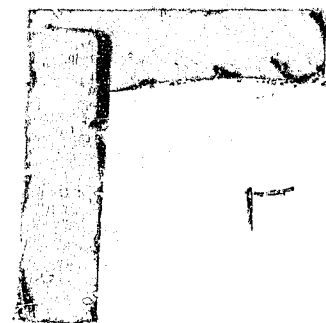
Appendix

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Footnotes

1. Factors other than population that also influence crime rates include level of economic activity and unemployment; the cultural, religious, racial and age mix of the population; the time of day, day of the week, or the season of the year; local standards and enforcement policies; proximity to a metropolitan area; and, transience of the population, among others.
2. Table I figures include Ohio State Highway Patrol reported officers assaulted. Officer assaults and the number of Patrol employees (page 139) are the only statistics submitted by OSHP. All offense or arrest statistics involving OSHP are submitted by the individual police jurisdictions where the offense occurred.
3. Violent crime includes the offenses of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
4. Property crime includes the offenses of burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft.
5. The bar graphs of this type throughout this publication indicate the crime rates of offenses per 100,000 population, crime percentage information for populations, and the actual number of offenses reported by all 12 month contributors. Crime rates are calculated on the basis of actual offenses submitted by 12 month contributors only, and for this reason the numbers of offenses listed are lower than those actually submitted by both "12 month" and "less than 12 month" contributors.
6. "Other dangerous weapons" that were reported in 1980 to be responsible for murders included narcotics, and miscellaneous guns.
7. Commercial establishments include such businesses as drug stores, theaters, grocery stores, and finance companies. Excluded are service stations, chain stores, and banks which are listed as separate robbery categories.
8. The type of larceny "from motor vehicle" refers to theft of items being transported in a motor vehicle, and not automobile accessories or attachments.
9. Motor vehicle parts and accessories are those items which are attached to and/or are necessary to the operation of the vehicle.
10. The Stolen/Recovered portion of this table contains supplementary information which is not always reported.
11. Sources for 1968-1980 information in Table 17 are **Crime in the U.S., 1979**, and preliminary estimates for **Crime in the U.S. - 1980**, from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D.C. The number of offenses are estimated on the basis of 100% of state population, all contributing a full 12 months.
12. Clearance figures published in this table contain information of Part I offenses. Also, a single clearance of a case may consist of multiple arrests or clearance by some means other than arrest.
13. Population figures are Bureau of Census counts of 1980 Ohio population. All county sheriffs office figures reflect only the population covered by the sheriff's jurisdiction. Individual population figures for contributors lying within the geographical area of each county are listed as separate entries throughout Table 24.
14. Ohio State University statistics includes the main campus in Columbus and the branch campuses at Mansfield, Newark, and Wooster.
15. County population figures in this table are calculated with data provided by the Bureau of Census and are based on a total of population covered by the county sheriffs office plus all populations lying within the geographical area of the county. They represent the Bureau of Census count of 1980 and, therefore, include population of non-contributors.

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
