

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

Dear Mr. Meiszer:

Reported index crimes handled by the Austin Police Department in 1981 increased by 3% over those reported in 1980. This is significant when compared to a rate of increase in 1980 of 10% over the year before. In Austin, the violent index crimes of Murder, Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault showed an overall decrease of 10.3%. The property crimes of Burglary, Theft and Auto Theft increased by 3.5%. Per capita crime declined in 1981 to 86.8 from 87.0 crimes per 1,000 population in 1980. This is the first reduction in per capita crime since 1977. Case clearances of property crimes decreased in 1981. There was an overall decrease in index crime clearances from 23% in 1980 to 20% in 1981. The drop in case clearances was due mainly to less clearance in the high volume property crimes.

The Police Information Network (P.I.N.) was implemented in February, 1981. The system computerized the department's record keeping process placing all information on line with computer terminals throughout the police department. In our efforts to reduce police response time to emergency calls the department will be implementing the emergency 9-1-1 System and new UHF radios in early 1982. The Personnel Utilization Committee continued to work on deployment of patrol officers in high crime areas throughout the city.

Improving the quality of police services has been actively pursued during the past year. The new Training Academy and Pistol Range opened in August. More stringent standards have been set for police officers' shooting skills. Management skills were the focus of retreat management training sessions held in October for all supervisors and key personnel. The products of these sessions, representing ideas from all departmental supervisors, have been implemented or placed in the department's goals and objectives. The City's Affirmative Action Plan has provided a guideline to enable us to improve our recruiting and promotional efforts.

In 1981 meetings were held with representatives of the press and community to enhance the public's understanding of the police functions. These meetings were instrumental in improving media relations and community understanding and involvement. Our Crime Prevention efforts were internationally acknowledged with the designation of our department as the 1981 Crime Prevention Agency of the Year for the State of Texas.

With the completion of the new police facility, the Austin Police Department will have a modern police building and training academy that will greatly improve the morale and productivity of this department. The City Council's past support is appreciated and I will be looking forward to working with you and the council in 1982.

Organizational Structure

The Chief of Police is appointed by and directly responsible to the City Manager for the efficient operation and conduct of the Austin Police Department.


The Assistant Chief of Police is responsible for the operation and conduct of the Austin Police Department in the absence of the Chief.

After the Chief and the Assistant Chief, the line of succession in the Austin Police Department is by rank and seniority in rank beginning with Major.

The Chief has divided the Austin Police Department into five major operations:


- I. **Staff Services** The Chief of Police, Assistant Chief, Bureau Commanders, Lieutenant in charge of Internal Affairs, Legal Advisor, 9-1-1 System, Community Liaison, Organized Crime Unit, Press Information Office, and their respective personnel, comprise the Staff Services program within the Austin Police Department. This program is responsible for establishing departmental policy, directing law enforcement activities, suppressing crime, apprehending offenders, recovering property, enforcing State and Federal laws as well as ordinances of the City.
- II. **Field Operations** The Assistant Chief of Police is directly responsible for the Field Operations. Under Field Operations is the Court Liaison and two of the department's major Bureaus: the Criminal Investigation Bureau (CIB) and Patrol Bureau commanded by majors.
- III. **Support Services Bureau** The Support Services Bureau under command of a major has among its responsibilities the direction of Data Processing, Research and Planning, Counseling Services, Jail Operations, Training Division, and Information Services that includes Data Entry, Communications, and Identification Division.
- IV. **Administrative Services** The Administrative Services Division, under a non-sworn director, is responsible for the functions of Administration and Personnel, Fiscal Affairs, Property Management and Building Services.
- V. **Special Investigations Bureau** The Special Investigations Bureau, under the command of a major, is responsible for the activities of Narcotics, Special Crimes, Special Missions, Criminal Intelligence, Community Relations, Crime Prevention, Crime Stoppers and Technical Services.


Crime Clock






