#### GENERAL ASSESSMENT

The use of electronic surveillance assisted the police to successfully conclude complex investigations and bring to justice persons who may not have been apprehended without this method of investigation.

The majority of authorizations and interceptions under Part IV.1 of the Criminal Code are for conspiracy to commit under Section 423 of the Criminal Code and for drug related offences under the Narcotic Control Act and Food & Drug Act. In most instances the targets are habitual criminals connected with organized crime.

The following examples of individual cases are illustrative of this.

#### Example 1

In Montreal, investigation indicated that an individual headed a large, well structured and powerful organization that was actively involved in drug importing (cocaine), armed robbery, extortion, loansharking and contract killing. The organization was based in Montreal with connections in Peru, Curacao, Mexico, and the United States.

The drug deals amounted to the importation of 20 to 30 kilograms of pure cocaine a year from Peru. It was further indicated that the drug deals were increasing and that there was a major drug deal completed every two months.

At this point, it would have been possible to apprehend the drug couriers and seize the cocaine they were carrying. This, however, would have done little to eliminate the organization. It was obvious that the only means to obtain evidence on the principals of the organization would be through the interception of their private communications. Judicial authorizations were obtained for the following offences: importation of drugs, section 5(1) Narcotic Control Act; conspiracy to import drugs, section 423(1)(d) C.C.; drug trafficking, section 4(1) N.C.A.; and conspiracy to traffic in drugs, section 423(1)(d) C.C. The electronic surveillance involved six different installations and was carried out over a period of nine months.

As a direct result of the interceptions, the head of the organization was arrested and charged. Due to the mass of evidence against him in the form of intercept recordings, he entered a guilty plea and was sentenced to nine years. Others in the organization also pleaded guilty and received sentences ranging from seven to nine years. Two members of the organization were sentenced in Curacao to three years each.

Evidence of other criminal activity perpetrated by the organization was also obtained through the interception of private communications. Subsequently, the main figure decided to cooperate with the police and he provided information in the following cases:

- Seventy-six murders;
- Fifteen armed robberies, each netting a minimum of \$100,000.00;
- The involvement of two lawyers in criminal activities;
- 4. The bribing of a police officer;
- 5. The capture of an escapee; and
- 6. Various cases of corruption.

#### Example 2

Interception of private communications played a vital role in the arrest of fourteen people for conspiracy to traffic in a controlled drug and the seizure of six and one half tons of methaqualone valued at \$200 million dollars.

Information was received that the methaqualone was to be shipped from its source in Linz, Austria to Canada in 135 100 kilogram bags and placed in the middle of a shipment of soda ash. The bags were off loaded at Montreal and through electronic surveillance the movement of the methaqualone was monitored from Montreal to Toronto where the seizure and arrests were effected.

Three authorizations were obtained in this investigation and eleven installations were made. The subjects of these authorizations were major drug traffickers who had connections with organized crime in the United States. The investigation was international in scope, conducted in Austria, Germany, the Netherlands, the Bahamas, United States and Canada.

In addition to the arrests and drug seizures, this investigation resulted in the breaking of one branch of a large illegal drug distribution organization. Information received from this investigation initiated several other investigations and additional branches of this organization may be uncovered.

#### Example 3

In British Columbia, an authorization was obtained to aid in an investigation for the importation of narcotics. This investigation was local, interprovincial and international in scope. It involved the sending of high grade heroin in first class letters from Sri Lanka through Europe to Montreal and to Vancouver and Victoria and also the United States. A total of thirteen installations were employed over a period of eighteen months.

As a result of this electronic surveillance, members of a local heroin importing and trafficking group were charged. Also, members of a group in England were charged along with a courier; four ounces of heroin were seized. In Canada, 173.13 grams of heroin were seized and in Sri Lanka 245,000 grams of heroin were seized. The charges consisted of; two persons in England charged with possession of heroin for exporting, eight persons charged in Victoria with conspiracy to import and conspiracy to traffic and two persons charged with possession of a narcotic for the purposes of trafficking.

The interception of private communications identified a previously unknown and unsuspected heroin courier who was identified as a 64 year old grandmother. She was arrested in London carrying three ounces of heroin.

With their courier arrested, the principals reverted to importation via first class mail. Again, using intercept information, investigators identified the method used and the people in the post office in Victoria who were actively involved in the organization. This evidence contributed to the arrest of members of an entire organization actively involved in importing heroin into British Columbia.

The arrest/conviction ratio is not significant for 1980 and 1981 as many of the cases have not yet been heard by the courts.

The cumulative nature of the figures can be clearly demonstrated by using 1977 as an example year.
