

# Crime and Justice in South Australia 1 July-31 December 1981

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# SUMMARY

- 1. During the 6 months 1 July to 31 December, 1981, offences reported in South Australia for three major categories sexual, robbery and extortion and driving offences showed a decrease from the preceding half-year. Reported sexual offences dropped from 721 to 635, robbery and extortion from 212 to 209, and driving offences from 3766 to 3224. For offences against the person (from 2817 to 3032) and property (43902 to 45548) there were increases in incidents reported or becoming known to police.
- 2. Researchers always are cautious about using short-term trends in official figures as a basis for discussing levels of offending. Nonetheless, the latest statistics make it clear that there is little basis for claims that crime rates are soaring. For serious offences such as murder, rape, break and enter and assault, Adelaide is well below U.S. cities of comparable size. At 2.0 per 100,000 population, the rate of murders and attempted murders reported in South Australia during the financial year 1980-81 was the lowest for a decade, and one of the lowest in the world.
- 3. Juvenile offenders appearing before courts and panels, and rates of imprisonment also decreased during July-December 1981, and more severe penalties were handed down by Supreme and District Courts for serious offences of violence. The proportion of defendants found guilty in these courts who were imprisoned was 25% higher than in the first half of the year.
- 4. The report highlighted problems which minority groups still experience with the criminal justice system. The Children's Aid Panel system, introduced in 1972 in order to help rehabilitate young offenders within the community, did not seem to be fully achieving this goal for young aboriginal defendants. In the adult system, although court statistics indicate that aboriginal defendants are mainly found guilty of minor offences such as drunkenness and vagrancy, imprisonment figures showed that one in three sentences commenced involved an aboriginal. Finally, non-payment of fines remained a significant cause of imprisonment. Almost one in five (17.7 percent) discharges from South Australian goals occurred because a fine had been paid.

#### INTRODUCTION

This report, encompassing the period 1 July - 31 December, 1981, is the twelfth comprehensive review of Crime and Justice in South Australia. Like the predecessors, it contains figures on selected crimes reported to police, all charges heard in Supreme and District courts, all prison, probation and parole admissions and discharges, and all court or aid panel cases involving juveniles. Although the court information has been coded and collated by the Office of Crime Statistics, other figures have been kindly supplied by the Police Department, the Courts Department, the Department of Corrective Services and the Department for Community Welfare. The major objective in bringing these figures together is to produce timely statistical information which will both improve public awareness of crime and punishment in this state and be of relevance for policy decisions.

In contrast to previous reports, the current publication encompasses six months rather than a quarter. The format also has been altered, to include a longer introductory section on trends and issues and comparisons of South Australian crime rates with other jurisdictions. Following this general discussion there are four sections of detailed statistical tables concerning the Police Department, Supreme and District Courts, Correctional Services and the juvenile justice activities of the Department of Community Welfare. It is anticipated that the general reader may concentrate on the Part 1 - Overview, whereas specialist researchers and administrators will find subsequent tabulations more useful. Readers requiring more extensive information than this report contains are referred to Appendix B: a complete list of sources of South Australian crime and justice data.

It should be emphasised that although this report encompasses four major areas of administration, it does not purport to give a comprehensive picture of crime and punishment. The section on Police Department Statistics, for example, shows only "selected" offences reported, and victim surveys have shown that even in these few categories, many incidents do not come to a police force's attention. Similarly, court data relate only to the Supreme and District Court jurisdictions. Cases heard in Criminal Courts of Summary Jurisdiction are subject to a separate Office of Crime Statistics publication (see Appendix C).

Readers also should be cautious about attempting to interpret tables in this report in terms of the flow of business through the justice system. A number of offences which came to the attention of South Australia's Police Department during the six months covered in this report may not yet have resulted in an apprehension or court proceedings. This report is analogous to a "snapshot" of the relevant operations of each department rather than to a "motion picture" of the processing of offences or defendants through the system.

Finally, counting differences between departments affect the statistics. For example, Police Department statistics on rapes (see Table 2.3) include attempts, whereas returns from Supreme and District Courts separate these two categories. Moreover, whereas police figures count offences - a number of which may have been committed by a single individual and even in a single incident - court statistics are based on defendants charged. Of course, a single defendant may have been responsible for many different offences reported to police. Readers should always consult the relevant section of Appendix A, on counting methods and definitions, before citing from tables in Parts 2-5 of this report.

#### PART 1 - OVERVIEW

### 1.1 POLICE STATISTICS

A major point to emerge from statistics for 1 January to 31 December, 1981, was that for most groups of "selected" offences - categories developed for national crime reporting by the Australian Bureau of Statistics working in conjunction with Police Departments in all states - there were decreases from the preceding six-month period. As Table 1 shows, there were 86 fewer sexual offences, 3 less robbery and extortion, and 542 fewer driving offences reported or detected. There were, however, increases in reported offences against the person (up 215) and property offences (up 1646 cases).

Among offences against the person, the main categories to show increases were minor assault (from 2493 to 2628) and assault occasioning actual bodily harm (from 202 to 270). For property offences, the major reported increase was in misappropriation (253 in the first half of 1981; 765 during second six months).

The decrease in a number of categories of reported offences during the last six months of 1981 was a continuation of a general decline in "official" major crime figures in South Australia during the 1980-81 financial year. As Table 2

shows, 1980-81 saw a drop both in the number and the rate of incidents reported in nine out of ten major crime categories. Although the number of murders and attempted murders reported has remained fairly steady, the rate of 2.0 per 100,000 population was the lowest the State has experienced for at least a decade.

Decreases in the rate of the serious crimes reported always seem heartening, but readers should be wary about attempting to relate such short-term fluctuations to changes in patterns of

offending within the community. Many surveys have shown that even for such major crimes as rape and breaking and entering, a high proportion (perhaps 70% for rape, 30% for break and enter) of incidents go unreported. Moreover, the magnitude of this "dark figure" of unreported crime may vary over time. Factors which can increase the likelihood of an offence's being reported include public confidence in the police, whether the offence was committed by a stranger, and the degree of physical injury or property loss inflicted. Because of the high proportion of unreported incidents, statements on crime rates can differ considerably, according to whether they are based on "official" police figures or victim surveys. One recent article (London Financial Times, June 1, 1982 has pointed out that according to the well-respected National Crime Survey, offences against the person in the U.S. between 1973 and 1979 rose by 3 percent, and offences against households by 8 percent. During the same period, official police reports showed an increase of 34 percent.

For some of the more minor offences, dramatic rises in incidents recorded can reflect no more than changes in enforcement procedures. This may well the case for the categories of smoke or possess marijuana, which in South Australia has increased more than four-fold over the past seven years.

Caution: about the meaning of short-term crime trends also should extend to comparisons between jurisdictions. Despite the pitfalls, however, generalisations are made, and sensational media treatment of relatively unusual offences can create

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considerable unease about levels of crime. To put these feelings in perspective, it is useful briefly to consider how South Australia's official figures compare with other communities.

Table 4 shows five major categories of offences reported to police in Adelaide during 1980. For each offence - homicide, robbery, assault, rape and break and enter - there are also figures of ru.S. cities of comparable size.

From Table 4 it is clear that by international standards Adelaide could hardly be designated a high crime, centre. On such offences as homicide, robbery, break and enter and assault, its rate was well below U.S. cities. Comparisons between South Australia and other Australian states also reveal lower figures for such offences as homicide, robbery and serious assault (see D. Biles and M. Johnson, The Size of the Crime Problem, Australian Institute of Criminology, 1982). Official figures on rape and break and enter offences appear high compared with the rest of Australia, but in light of the low rates of reporting for both offences this may well reflect greater levels of confidence in police. It should also be emphasised that legal definitions of rape in South Australia are far more comprehensive than most other states. Other factors which may help account for a higher incidence of reporting in this category include:

- more sensitive police investigation procedures including a specialised Rapes Enquiry Unit;
- special medical and crisis intervention services for \( \cdot\) rape victims;
- changes in court procedure which relieve most rape victims from having to testify at committal hearings; and
- . changing social attitudes toward rape victims.

## 1.2 SUPREME AND DISTRICT CRIMINAL COURTS

Between 1 July and 31 December, 1981, the Supreme and District Criminal Courts disposed of 838 cases, 184 in the Supreme and 654 in the District jurisdictions. Offences have been grouped into seven major categories as follows:

The Supreme Court deals mainly with the more serious offences such as murder, attempted murder, manslaughter, armed robbery and rape. Nearly half the cases heard in the District Court concerned assault and break and enter offences.

# Plea and Outcome

Three out of every four defendants appearing in a Higher Criminal Court during the last six months of 1981 pleaded guilty.

However, the proportion of defendants entering this plea has been gradually decreasing over the past 3 half-year periods, and the proportion of not guilties and no pleas (Crown enters nolle prosequi) has been gradually increasing.

For break and enter offences, 93% plead guilty and since these offences make up a third of all offences heard, the overall proportion of guilty pleas is highly skewed. For offences against the person only 42% plead guilty and for sexual offences 51%.

Almost nine out of ten defendants were found guilty as charged or guilty of a lesser offence. Of those going to trial, nearly twice as many were found guilty than were acquitted. The number of cases withdrawn by the Crown entering a nolle prosequi has increased over the past year.

For the offence of rape, 15 out of 20 defendants tried were found guilty as charged. The following tables shows the outcome for the more serious criminal offences.

From comparing the outcomes of these more serious cases with all charges heard in the higher courts, it is clear that for the more

serious offences, more defendants dispute the charges laid and are found guilty of lesser offences or acquitted. For sexual offences, such as rape, the Crown also seems to withdraw charges, by entering a nolle prosequi, more frequently.

# Penalties Imposed

Of the 738 defendants convicted, 41% were imprisoned and 46% received suspended sentences. The proportion sent to prison increased by one quarter over the previous half year.

The average duration of prison sentences handed down in higher courts has nearly doubled in comparison with the preceding 6-month period. This dramatic increase in prison sentences mainly involved more serious offences, relating to crimes of violence. The following table shows the trend for homicides, assaults, robbery and sexual offences.

It would seem that although the Government increased penalties for major offences in February 1982, this increased severity had already been anticipated by the judiciary.

# Time to Decide the Case

The two major factors which determine the duration of a case in the higher court are the plea and the seriousness of the offence reflected in whether the case is heard in Supreme or District Court.

If a defendant disputes the charges and pleads not guilty, it takes an average 8½ months from first appearance in a lower court to case finalisation in the Supreme Court; and 7½ months if heard in the District Court. However, the actual time spent in the Supreme Court is only 2 months and 1 month in the District. If the defendant pleads guilty, then these times generally are reduced by a half.

# Bail Status at Committal

Four out of five defendants received bail at the committal hearing. However, for robbery and extortion offences about half were remanded in custody. For drug offences and fraud and deception offences the vast majority (95%) receive bail.

# Characteristics of Persons Charged

In discussing the backgrounds of individuals charged, caution must be exercised. These details are based on items in Police Antecedent Reports and Police Criminal Record files. It is possible that on occasions, persons arrested may deliberately give misleading information. Moreover, where the person was acquitted or the case dismissed, no data at all on the background characteristics of defendants could be recorded. Readers also should be wary of attempting to generalise from these tables to the total population of offenders. This report does not encompass appearances by juveniles (i.e. alleged offenders under 18) and not all offences result in criminal charges and court appearances. Some segments of society, because of their lifestyle and lack of resources, are far more vulnerable to prosecution for their offences than others.

# Sex, Age and Employment

More than nine out of ten defendants appearing in the higher criminal courts were males. Women appeared more for drug charges, fraud and deception than for other offences.

The ages of those convicted varied markedly for different types of offences. Whereas sexual offenders were evenly distributed from juveniles to over 60's, 20-30 year olds predominated for offences against the person, drugs, and fraud and deception. Eighteen to twenty-four year olds comprised 60% of those found guilty of robbery and extortion and break and enter.

Just under fifty percent of defendants found guilty in the higher courts were unemployed, although the proportions in this category varied for each type of offence. For example, two-thirds of property offenders were unemployed, as opposed to one-third of those guilty of fraud and deception.

# Previous Criminal History

Of all defendants found guilty in South Australia's Higher Criminal Courts, eighty percent had a prior criminal history. This is higher than in the Courts of Summary Jurisdiction where only sixty percent had a prior criminal history. The average number of previous court appearances per person was ten, the highest occurring for property offences, robbery and extortion (thirteen) and break and enter offences (twelve). Less criminally active offenders were appearing for drug offences (six) and fraud and deception (seven).

Another possible indicator of a person's rate of previous offending is the time elapsed since their last conviction. The highest average time since last conviction occurred for sexual offences (29 months) and drug offences (28 months). The lowest occurred for break and enter (13 months). The average for robbery and extortion offences was 15 months. However, this only takes into account the time since the last conviction was handed down and not the time since release from prison for the previous conviction.

# 1.3 CORRECTIONAL SERVICES \*

Between 1 July and 31 December, 1981, there was a total of 2465 new admissions – i.e. admissions of people from outside the system – into South Australia's gaols. When new sentences or periods on remand commenced by existing prisoners also were included the figure increased to 3666. Of these 3666 "total admissions" 989 – or 27 percent – related to periods on remand. Among the remainder – the sentences – minor offences such as drunkenness and offensive behaviour accounted for almost a quarter. Other major categories were breach of recognizance, driving and related offences, assault, theft and break and enter. Among unsentenced prisoners, a high proportion were charged with theft or break and enter (42.8 percent) and assault (21.8 percent).

When reviewing Corrections Statistics, it is important to realise that there may be very little correlation between imprisonment figures and crime rates in various jurisdictions. Legal and administrative policies have very dramatic effects for prison populations. A recent comparison between Victoria, N.S.W. and the Netherlands\*, for example, indicates that Victoria's policy of allowing prisoners to earn remission on their non-parole date rather than merely the total sentence may be the key to its comparatively low rates of imprisonment. South Australia conforms to the N.S.W. policy of allowing remissions only on head sentence.

Of all the sentenced prisoners discharged from South Australian gaols during the last six months of 1981, almost one in five (17.7 percent) was released because a fine had been paid. Clearly, although imprisonment is a "last resort", its effects continued to be felt most heavily in those sectors of the community which lack the financial resources to make other types of restitution. Aboriginal offenders, whom court data indicate are mainly arrested for minor offences, accounted for 513 out of 1476 sentenced prisoners received (see Table 4.6), and eighty percent of all sentenced prisoners were unemployed at time of arrest. The problem of imprisonment becoming the penalty not so much for offending as for inability to pay a fine may be alleviated by the Community Service Order Scheme introduced in 1982.

### 1.4 JUVENILE OFFENDERS

During the six months July to December, 1981, there was a total of 3827 appearances by juvenile defendants before courts or panels in South Australia. This was a 17.3 decrease from the 4627 recorded in the preceding six-month period. As with Police Department figures, however, one should be cautious about interpreting such fluctuations in terms of decreased rates of delinquency. The change is reported to be, in fact, an artifact of the data recording procedures (December quarter only).

As Table 14 shows, most appearances by juveniles (55.4 percent) in South Australia were for relatively minor property offences, and a further one in six was for breaking and entering. Less than four percent were for offences against the person, and only 2.2 percent for drug offences.

Most juvenile appearances (62.9 percent) in South Australia are before Children's Aid Panels. Under the Children's Protection and Young Offenders Act, 1979, this option is available to any offender under the age of 18 who admits the offence and who satisfies the requirements of a screening panel. Charges of homicide and offences by children over 16 against the Motor Vehicles Act or the Road Traffic Act, however, must be heard by an adult court. In addition, if the

Attorney-General considers an offence to have been particularly severe, or if a child has previously been found guilty of more than one serious offence, the Attorney-General may apply for the case to be heard in the Supreme Court.

Both screening and aid panels comprise a member of the Police Force and an Officer from the Department of Community Welfare. Their objective is to allow cases to be dealt with flexibly, and to develop programs which will allow the child to be rehabilitated within the community.

As Table 14 illustrates, offence charged may be the major factor determining where a defendant will be referred. Two out of every three young offenders appearing before panels had been charged with "other property" offences - mainly shop-lifting. By contrast, only thirty-six percent of offenders before children's courts were in this category. The other important factor is previous appearances. Table 15 analyses court and panel appearances for the financial year 1980/81 according to the young defendant's previous history. Almost ninety percent of panel cases involving juveniles with no prior appearances. By contrast, 78 percent of defendants with two or more court appearances went to a court hearing.

There were marked contrasts between the outcomes of panel and court proceedings. Generally, panels put more emphasis on warning and counselling the juvenile, whereas by law children's courts were required to rely more on the traditional penalties of fines, bonds and in some instances detention. Community Service Orders for juvenile offenders have only been recently introduced.

It is now more than a decade since the panel system was initiated in South Australia. At the time of its inception fears were expressed that a less punitive approach may encourage higher rates of juvenile recidivism. Statistics do not bear out this apprehension. A recent study has indicated that of all the young offenders appearing before aid panels or juvenile courts in South Australia from 1972 to 1977, only 21 percent had committed a further offence. Only 4 percent had reappeared more than three times. These figures are well in line with juvenile recidivism in other states.

Comprehensive and detailed studies will be required before it can be conclusively stated that juvenile justice in South Australia is achieving all its objectives, but the data available do seem to confirm that the system is even-handed and progressive. With all systems, however, it is important to consider the problems, as well as the successes. One such problem is interaction with young aboriginal defendants.

Table 17 explores this aspect and indicates that young offenders from aboriginal backgrounds were far less likely to appear before panels than their non-aboriginal counterparts.

From Table 18, covering appearances during the financial year 1980-81, it is clear that a large part of the apparent anomaly may be explained by the types of offences for which each group is appearing, and the number of previous appearances. A high proportion (about 50 percent) of first offenders from non-aboriginal backgrounds appear for shoplifting.

Nonetheless, it seems that despite the introduction of aid panels, the criminal justice system in South Australia may be less successful in attempting to rehabilitate the young aboriginal offender than it has been with the remainder of the community. Such a finding also is consistent with the high proportion of young aboriginal defendants appearing in courts after being arrested, rather than summonsed, and the numbers still being remanded in custody before a court hearing (see Tables 5.8 and 5.9). Clearly, further research on this issue is needed.

#### APPENDIX A : EXPLANATORY NOTES ON TABLES

#### POLICE STATISTICS

Tables 2.1 - 2.5 Statistics of Selected Crimes Reported or Becoming Known to Police.

One offence is counted for each individual or premises victimised, or for each distinct criminal act. Attempts are counted as offences, except in the case of attempted murder, which is counted separately.

Specific definitions and counting procedures are contained in the publication A Revised Statistical Collection of Offences Reported or Becoming Known to The Police (Canberra: Australian Bureau of Statistics, July 1980).

Blank entries in the tables denote that statistics were not collected for an offence during the year in question. A dash indicates that although statistics were collected, no offences were reported or became known to police during the relevant period.

Tables 2.6 - 2.13 Age and Sex of Alleged Offenders.

The term "alleged offender" describes persons apprehended by the Police and involved in offences cleared in the second half of 1981. Not all of these people would subsequently have been found guilty of the offence in court.

#### SUPREME AND DISTRICT CRIMINAL COURTS

#### A. Definitions

#### (i) Offence Categories

Offence categories are based on the Act and Section under which the defendant was charged (see page 112 for a detailed list). In previous reports offence categories reflected broader groupings, e.g. major assault could include a number of different sections of an act. Breaches of recognizance heard in Supreme or District courts are not included in this collection.

#### (ii) Major Offence

Basically, the major offence is the <u>most serious</u> offence with which the defendant was charged. Thus:

. if the defendant was not found guilty of any offence, the major offence is the charge for which the highest statutory penalty is prescribed;

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- if the defendant was found not guilty of a higher offence but guilty of a lesser offence, the major offence is the higher offence initially charged;
- . otherwise when a defendant is found guilty of any offence, the major offence is the offence for which the highest penalty was handed down.

#### (iii) Offence Type

To enable broad comparisons, offences have been grouped into seven major types (see Table 3.1). Tables 3.2 to 3.7 show which specific offences are contained in each of these broader offence type categories.

#### (iv) Court Outcome

A case is disposed of in the Supreme and District Criminal Courts when

- the defendant pleads guilty and a sentence is handed down;
- the defendant pleads not guilty, goes to trial, is found guilty and sentence is handed down;
- the defendant is found not guilty of a major offence (e.g. murder) but guilty of a lesser offence (e.g. manslaughter) and sentence handed down;
- the defendant pleads not guilty, goes to trial and is acquitted;
- the crown enters a nalle prosequi and the case is dismissed;
- . the defendant dies:
- . the defendant is found not guilty on grounds of insanity;
- . no verdict is taken;
- . the defendant is found unfit to plead; <
- . a juvenile defendant is referred to Juvenile Court.

#### (v) Plea

A defendant can plead

- guilty, in which case he or she appears in a Higher Court for sentence;
- . not guilty trials takes place;
- . no plea if the Crown enters nolle prosequi.

#### (vi) Penalty

Once a defendant has been found guilty, the following penalties - listed in order of severity - can be imposed:

- . immediate imprisonment;
- suspended imprisonment;
- . bond with supervision;
- . bond without supervision;
- . sentenced to the rising of the court;
- . monetary fine;
- . order;
- . suspension of driving licence.

Defendants can also be referred to Juvenile Court for sentencing.

(vii) Major Penalty

The major penalty is the most severe penalty handed down.

(viii) Total Penalties

Total penalties are all penalties given. Note that if the defendant is given a suspended imprisonment, they are also automatically placed on bond, which if broken reverts to a prison sentence.

#### (ix) Total Sentence

The total sentence is the overall period of inprisonment imposed on the defendant for all the charges convicted. Prison sentences can be both cumulative (i.e. one commences when the other expires) and concurrent (i.e. two or more served at the same time).

#### (x) Non-Parole Period

When a prison sentence is given, the judge may also specify a period the prisoner must serve before eligible for parole. Generally, this is one-third of the total sentence.

(xi) Lower Court

Refers to the Courts of Summary Jurisdiction.

(xii) Higher Court

Refers to the Supreme and District Criminal Courts.

#### B. Offence Categories

Offence categories in the Supreme and District Criminal Court section are based on the actual sections of acts of parliament where offences have been defined and penalties prescribed. Below are listed all the acts and sections referred to in the tables, plus the offence descriptions used. The following abbreviations are used for various acts:

#### C. Tables

Tables 3.1 - 3.8 Court Outcome for Major Offence.

For each court appearance which was finalised during the sixmonth period 1 July - 31 December 1981 only the outcome for the major offence is recorded (see earlier definition of major offence).

Each table refers to appearances by individual defendants. For example, if four co-defendants were tried and convicted jointly of an offence which they committed together, each would be recorded separately in the case outcome and sentencing tables. An individual tried or sentenced on two separate occasions within the same reporting period would be recorded twice.

Table 3.1 is a summary and tables 3.2 - 3.8 give a breakdown for each offence type.

Nables 3.9 - 3.34 - Major Penalty and Total Penalties for Major Offence.

These tables show the penalties handed down for the major (i.e. most serious - see earlier definition) offence for which the defendant was found guilty. For each offence category or group there are two separate tables which show:

the major (i.e. most serious) single penalty handed down (tables 3.9 and 3.11 are examples). If, for example, received a six-month suspended sentence and was placed on a two-year bond and received a fine for his major offence, the major penalty would be the suspended sentence and only this penalty would be counted in the table.

the total penalties imposed for the major offence convicted (tables 3.10 and 3.12 are examples). These tables show the whole range of penalties imposed for a particular offence. For very serious penalties, such as immediate imprisonment or a suspended sentence, the number will be equal to the number in the major penalty table. However, for lesser penalties, such as bonds and fines, the number in the total penalties table will generally exceed the major penalty entry. This is because fines and bonds can be imposed in association with more severe punishments. Thus when a defendant receives a suspended sentence there is nearly always an associated bond, and so two entries are made in the total penalties table. In addition to raw numbers, the total penalties tables also show average (mean) amounts and durations of fines and bonds, suspended and immediate gaol sentences. In imposing a prison sentence, a judge may also stipulate a non-parole period which is the minimum time the prisoner must serve before becoming eligible for parole. The usual non-parole period is about one-third (33.3%) of the total sentence - total sentence being the overall period of imprisonment imposed on the defendant for all the charges convicted (see definition page N1). The last column of the total penalty tables gives this percentage which is an indicator of the severity of the prison sentence.

Tables 3.9, 3.10 are summary tables, and tables 3.11 - 3.24 give a detailed breakdown for each offence type.

Tables 3.25 - 3.30 Sex, Race, Age, Occupation, Marital Status and Country of Birth of Defendant.

For each defendant only one entry is made in each of these tables. There is a category of unknowns for defendants who were not found guilty. All background information is extracted from antecedent reports which are only available for defendants found guilty.

The age, occupation, and marital status of the defendant relate to the time he or she committed the offence. For birthplace, a high percentage is in the category Australia unspecified. This denotes that the defendant is born in Australia, but that the particular state was not recorded.

Tables 3.31 - 3.33 Bail Status, Legal Representation and Plea of Defendant.

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These three tables describe significant aspects of court proceedings and are based on one entry for each defendant. The bail status at committal stage is given since this is the most clearly and accurately recorded entry on bail in Higher Court files. Legal representation relates to the initial Higher Court appearance. The plea of the defendant was the initial plea entered at a Higher Court appearance, but if the defendant changed plea from not guilty to guilty during the proceedings, then this also is noted. The 'other' category refers to all other pleas changed during the proceedings.

Table 3.34 Prior Convictions for Defendants Found Guilty.

For each defendant found guilty a summary is given of the type and number of previous convictions, the average time since the last court appearance and the number who have previously been imprisoned. The type of previous conviction is divided into adult and juvenile, or the combination of both. Readers should be wary of using time since last conviction as an indicator of recidivism since it does not take into account times the defendant may have spent in prison following the last conviction.

Tables 3.35 - 3.36 Month of Court Disposition for the Supreme Court and the District Court.

The month of court disposition is the month in which the case was disposed of i.e. the defendant sentenced, acquitted, etc. The disposition month is not necessarily the court session month since most defendants are remanded for sentence after being found quilty generally for more than a month. The totals for each month are also broken down according to the plea entered.

#### Tables 3.37 - 3.40 Duration of Proceedings

These four tables describe the average duration of each stage of court proceedings: two analyse cases involving quilty pleas in the Supreme Court and the District Court, and two show cases involving not guilty pleas. The time spent for committal hearings in Courts of Summary Jurisdiction is given by 'First Lower Court Appearance to Committal for Trial'. When a case is committed to a Higher Court it always is listed for the next session of that court. However, due to non-availability of witnesses, court timetables, etc. it may be deferred (made a "remanet") to the next session. The time elapsed from the committal day until the defendant's first actual appearance in the Higher Court is covered by the entry 'Committed for Trial to First Higher Court Appearance'.

Tables 3.39 and 3.40 give summaries for cases involving not quilty pleas which went to trial. The length of the trial is based on the calendar difference between the date the trial began and the date it ended. This duration does not always equal the actual number of days of the trial, because trials can adjourn over weekends, etc. Another trial statistic - 'If Guilty - Trial Ends to Sentence Imposed' shows the time the defendants found guilty spent awaiting sentence while presentence reports, psychiatric reports, etc. were being prepared and submitted to the judge.

Two further durations are given. 'First Higher Court Appearance to Case Finalised' gives the total time spent in the higher court, a d 'Lower Court Appearance to Case Finalised' gives the total time spent in the judicial system from the defendant's first appearance in the Lower Court until the case was finalised in a Higher Court.

Cases involving defendants who estreated bail have been excluded from these tables. Their inclusion would give unrealistically high durations for segments of the court proceedings.

#### Tables 3.41 - 3.46 Appeals

Appeals against conviction, sentences and orders in the higher courts and lower courts are given in these six tables. In previous reports only the total numbers lodged and the outcomes have been given, but in these tables the offence for which the appeal was lodged also is shown. The tables show both when an appeal was lodged and the outcome. Table 3.43 shows appeals lodged by the Crown against sentences which it considered too low.

#### CORRECTIONAL SERVICES

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Table 4.1 Persons Received into Custody.

Only new admission to prison from outside the system by remand or sentenced prisoners are recorded. It does not include change of status admissions or new sentences commenced by currently serving prisoners.

Table 4.2 Daily Averages in Custody.

This table gives a snapshot of the total prison population for each day, averaged over two three-month periods. The daily averages are rounded to the nearest whole number.

Table 4.3 Persons in Custody at End of Period.

A snapshot of the total prison population is shown for two particular days, the end of the two quarter periods.

Table 4.4 Persons Discharged from Custody by Form of Discharge.

The reasons for a prisoner being released from prison are tabulated, however, the table does not distinguish discharges of prisoners on remand from discharges of prisoners under sentence. Transfers to other prisons within the state are not counted as discharges.

Table 4.5 Persons Received into Custody by Offence Charged.

This table is based on all new episodes on remand or under sentence commenced in South Australian gaols. It includes both new admissions and further sentences commenced by prisoners whose current sentence has expired. In the case of sentenced persons with multiple offences, only the most serious offence category is shown.

Tables 4.6 - 4.8 Persons Received into Custody by Race, Age and Employment Status.

Includes only new admissions to prison, that is, from court or other external places. The age of the prisoner is at the time of admission.

Tables 4.9 - 4.10 Persons Placed Under Supervision During Period and at End of Period.

Probation refers to defendants who have been placed on bonds by the courts, say from a suspended imprisonment. Parole is the probationary release of a prisoner prior to the termination of sentence. The first table shows the number of persons placed on probationary bonds as well as prisoners paroled during the period. The second table gives the total number of people on probation or paroled at the end of the period.

Table 4.11 Probation and Parole Cases Completed by Type of Case Completion.

The reason for probation and parole being completed is shown. Expired is when the period of probation or parole is over. If a person estreats or breaks a condition of the probation or parole, he or she goes to court where the probation or parole may be revoked.

#### JUVENILE OFFENDERS

Table 5.1 Courts and Panels, Type of Offence and Where Appeared.

A summary of number of juveniles appearing before the Children's Court or Children's Aid Panel and the major offence charged. The numbers in the tables represent enumerations of appearances, not individuals: some individuals may have appeared on more than one occasion. They are limited to appearances for specific offences. Appearances for charges of neglect, truancy, breach of bond, and applications are no longer included in the tables.

Tables 5.2 - 5.3 Children's Court and Panel: Appearance by Offence and Outcome.

A separate table is given for Courts and Panels which shows the case outcome or major penalty for offences.

Tables 5.4 - 5.7 Sex, Age, Employment Status, Race for Courts and Panels.

The employment status is at the time of offence. The classification "Aboriginal" has been assigned by social workers, and not by individuals themselves.

Table 5.8 Type of Apprehension by Race.

The mode of apprehension - by arrest or summons - is given for aboriginals and non-aboriginals appearing in the children's court.

Table 5.9 Children's Courts: Appearance by secure care, race and D.C.W. Region.

For each D.C.W. regional office an analysis is given of the proportions of juveniles remanded in custody and those involving detention orders.

Tables 5.10 - 5.11 Aid Panel and Court Appearances by District of Residence.

The number of court and panel appearances are given for each district where the child normally resides. The number of appearances where the major charge was a serious crime of violence is also given.

"Serious crimes of violence" include the following:

murder
attempted murder
manslaughter
cause death by negligent driving
malicious wounding
inflict grievous bodily harm
assault occasioning actual bodily harm
rape
attempted rape
robbery
assault with intent to rob
demand money with menaces.
