



Nebraska Uniform Crime Reporting Program

Introduction

The Nebraska Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program involves the collection, compilation and analysis of crime statistics reported by law enforcement agencies in the State in accordance with guides and regulations prescribed by law.

The Statute creating the Nebraska UCR Program is incorporated into the same statute which created the Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice, hereafter referred to as the Commission. The portion of the statute relating to UCR is as follows:

Nebraska Revised Statutes

Chapter 81-1425

"(6) collect, develop and maintain statistical information, records, and reports as the Commission may determine relevant to its functions."

Chapter 81-1426

"Public officers and agencies, information, records, reports; furnish to the Commission:

"(1) The Commission may obtain from all public officers or agencies whose functions include the control, apprehension, trial, or correction of criminal offenders in this state, such information, records, and reports as the Commission may determine relevant to its functions." "(2) It shall be the duty of all public officers and agencies whose functions include the control, apprehension, trial, or correction of criminal offenders to provide such information, records, and reports as the Commission shall reasonably require."

Historical Background

The counterpart of the Nebraska UCR Program is the National UCR Program under the direction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The National Program was the result of a need for nation-wide and uniform compilation of law enforcement statistics. Uniform Crime Reports were first collected in 1930 after being developed by a committee of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). Today, the IACP continues to serve in an advisory capacity to the FBI in its operation of the Program. In 1966 the National Sheriffs' Association (NSA) established a Committee on Uniform Crime Records to serve in an advisory capacity to the National UCR Program while actively encouraging sheriffs throughout the nation to participate in the UCR Program.

In recent years, the FBI has actively assisted individual states in the development of state UCR Programs which are compatible with the national Program. Nebraska was one of the first states to develop a state UCR Program. After a three-month evaluation, the Nebraska UCR Pro-

gram became operational on January 1, 1971. Commencing on that date all crime statistics flow through one central agency, this Commission, before submission to the National IJCR Program. The State Patrol, all sheriffs' departments and all police departments of municipalities of 1,000 population and over are required to submit Uniform Crime Reports by the seventh day after the end of the month. During 1979, a total of 204 law enforcement agencies were required to submit UCR's. All UCR's are verified and all mathematical computations are checked. Any errors or questionable data are corrected by telephone contact with the agency in question. After verification and processing of data, a magnetic tape is built and submitted to the National UCR Program.

This Commission publishes quarterly and annual reports based upon data submitted. These reports would not be possible without the excellent cooperation from the law enforcement agencies. We sincerely appreciate the efforts of those agencies who voluntarily participate in the Program.

Uniform Crime Classifications

Uniformity of reporting depends upon the proper classification of offenses by the law enforcement agencies. The basic guidelines for classifying offenses are formulated by the Uniform Crime Reporting Section of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. It must be emphasized that the following classifications are not meant to be legal definitions as they are written in the Nebraska Penal Code. The purpose of these classifications is to establish a uniform national system for classifying similar offenses even though their legal definitions may vary considerably from state to state.

Part I Offenses

- (1) Homicide-
- (a) Murder—any unlawful killing of a human being in which the element of malice aforethought was present in the murder. Manslaughter—any unlawful killing of a human being without the element of malice aforethought.
- (b) Death by Negligence—any death that occurs because of the negligence of some person other than the victim and that is not in the commission of an unlawful act.
- (2) Rape-
 - (a) Rape by Force—the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will, but excluding statutory rape and other sex offenses.
 - (b) Assault to Rape—all assaults and attempts to rape.

- (3) Robbery—the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another against his will by violence or by putting him in fear. Robbery differs from larceny in that it is aggravated by the element of force.
 - (a) Armed Robbery-Any Weapon—when any object is so employed as to constitute force or the threat of force, it will be considered a weapon. This would include firearms, knives, clubs, brass knuckles, blackjacks, broken bottles, acid, explosives, etc. Cases involving possible pretended weapons or cases involving weapons not seen by the victim but which the robber claims to have with him are counted in this category.
 - (b) Strong Arm-No Weapon—includes muggings and similar offenses when no weapon is used but strong-arm tactics are employed to deprive the victim of his property. This is limited to hands, arms, fists, feet, etc. As in armed robbery, all attempts are included.
- (4) Assault—an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another. General Rule—all assaults will be classified in the following categories, excluding assaults with intent to rob or rape.
 - (a) Gun—all assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of any type of firearm. This includes revolvers, automatic pistols, shotguns, zip guns, rifles, pellet guns, etc.
 - (b) Knife or Cutting Instrument—all assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of cutting or stabbing objects such as knives, razors, hatchets, axes, cleavers, scissors, glass, broken bottles, daggers, ice picks, etc.
 - (c) Other Dangerous Weapons—assaults or attempted assaults when any object other than a gun, knife, or cutting instrument is used. This includes clubs, bricks, jack handles, bottles, explosives, acid, lye, poison, scalding water and cases of attempted drownings, burnings, etc.
 - (d) Hands, Fists, Feet, Etc. (Felony)—any assaults with hands, fists, feet, etc. which could result in a felony conviction. In order to be classified as a felony, the victim must suffer great bodily harm.
- (5) Burglary—any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, burglary with larceny is classified and scored only as burglary; the larceny is excluded. Breaking and entering of a motor vehicle is classified as larceny.
 - (a) Forcible Entry—All offenses where force of any kind is used to unlawfully enter a locked structure to commit a felony or with intent to steal something. This includes entry by use of a master key, celluloid or other device that leaves no outward mark but is used to open a lock. Concealment inside a building followed by breaking out of the structure is scored here.
 - (b) Unlawful Entry-No Force—any unlawful entry when you fail to discover any evidence of forcible entry.
 - (c) Attempted Forcible Entry—when determined that forcible entry has been attempted.

- (6) Larceny-Theft (Except Auto Theft)—the unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. This involves all larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket picking, purse snatching, shoplifting, larceny from auto, larceny of auto parts and accessories, bicycle theft, larceny from buildings and larceny from any coin-operated machines. Any theft that is not a robbery or any theft that does not result from a breaking and entering is scored here. Embezzlements, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are excluded.
- (7) Motor Vehicle Theft—larceny or attempted larceny of automobiles. All thefts and attempted thefts of motor vehicles are included. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. Those incidents in which the alleged offender had unlawful access to the vehicle as in a family situation or the unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle such as chauffeur, employee, etc. are excluded.

Part II Offenses

- (8) Other Assaults (Misdemeanor)—consists of all assaults and attempted assaults which are simple or minor in nature.
- (9) Arson—includes all arrests for violations of state law and municipal ordinances relating to arson and attempted arson.
- (10) Forgery and Counterfeiting—all offenses dealing with the making, altering, uttering or possessing with intent to defraud anything false in the semblance of that which is true.
- (11) **Fraud**—Fradulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretense. Includes bad checks, confidence games, etc.
- (12) Embezzlement—the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.
- (13) Stolen Property—all offenses of buying, receiving, possessing or concealing stolen property as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.
- (14) Vandalism-Destruction of Property—all willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth or any other such means as may be specified by law or ordinance.
- (15) Weapons—includes violations of weapons laws such as manufacture, sale or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons, and all attempts to commit any of the above offenses.
- (16) Prostitution and Commercialized Vice—includes the sex offenses of a commercialized nature such as prostitution; keeping bawdy house, disorderly house or

- house of ill repute; pandering, procuring, transporting or detaining women for immoral purposes, etc. and all attempts to commit any of the above.
- (17) Sex Offenses—includes all sex offenses other than forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. This encompasses offenses against chastity, common decency, morals and the like such as adultery and fornication, buggery, incest, indecent exposure, sodomy, carnal abuse (no force) and all attempts to commit any of the above.
- (18) Drug Abuse Violations—statistics for these arrests are requested on the basis of the narcotics used. This includes all arrests for the violation of state and local ordinances, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing and making of narcotic drugs. Four divisions of narcotic drugs are recognized. These are:
 - (a) opium and cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine),
 - (b) marijuana,
 - (c) synthetic narcotics which can cause true addiction (demerol, methadones) and
 - (d) other dangerous non-narcotic drugs, (barbituates, benzedrine).
- (19) Gambling—includes all charges relating to promoting, permitting or engaging in gambling. This classification is broken into three divisions:
 - (a) bookmaking (horse and sport book),
 - (b) numbers and lottery and
 - (c) all other gambling.
- (20) Offenses Against Family and Children—includes all charges of nonsupport, neglect or abuse of family and children such as desertion, abandonment or nonsupport, neglect or abuse of child, or nonpayment of alimony.
- (21) **Driving Under the Influence—**limited to driving or operating any vehicle while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotic drugs.
- (22) Liquor Laws—with the exception of drunkenness and driving under the influence, all state or local liquor law violations are placed in this class. Federal violations are not included. Include manufacturing, selling, transporting, furnishing as in maintaining unlawful drinking places, bootlegging, operating a still, furnishing liquor to a minor and using vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor.
- (23) **Drunkenness-Intoxication**—includes all offenses of drunkenness or intoxication with the exception of driving under the influence. This generally encompasses drunk and disorderly behavior and public intoxication. (Not reported in Nebraska).
- (24) Disorderly Conduct-Disturbing the Peace—includes all disorderly persons who can not be classified under offenses 1 through 23 or under offense 25.
- (25) Vagrancy—includes arrests for failure of an individual to give a good account of himself, begging, loitering, etc.
- (26) All Other Offenses—includes all violations of state and local laws not otherwise classified.

- (27) Suspicion—limited to suspicion arrests when the persons arrested are released by the police.
- (28) Curfew and Loitering Law Violations—(Juveniles) all arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.
- (29) Runaways—(Juveniles) limited to juveniles taken into custody who have run away from the reporting jurisdiction.

Crime Index

The extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in the State is measured by the crime index. The crime index is composed of the following offenses: murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, felony assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft. Many categories of crime are not of sufficient importance to be included in the index; some serious crimes, such as kidnapping, do not occur with enough regularity to be meaningful in the index. With these considerations in mind, the above offenses were selected as a group to serve as a measure of crime.

Clearances

For UCR purposes, an offense can be cleared by arrest or by exceptional means. An offense can be cleared by arrest when the offender is identified, there is enough evidence to charge him and he is actually taken into custody. The arrest of one person can clear several offenses and several persons may clear one offense. When some element beyond police control precludes formal charges against the offender, such as the victim's refusal to prosecute or death of the offender, an offense can be cleared by exceptional means. There is no distinction made between cleared by arrest and cleared by exceptional means in this publication. A distinction is made between total clearances and those involving only persons under 18 years of age (juveniles). A juvenile clearance is counted only when juveniles are exclusively involved in the clearance of an offense.

Crime Rates

Crime rates relate the incidence of crime to population. Estimates of current permanent population are used in computing crime rates. Crime rates allow for comparisons between several areas with different populations over a period of time without the information being biased by population differences. To compute a crime rate, first divide the population of the area by 100,000 and then divide the crime index by that answer. Throughout this report a crime rate per 1,000 population is used to be more meaningful for the State.

Crime Factors

Statistics gathered under the UCR Program are law enforcement statistics. The agencies report the offense and arrest data according to the standard offense classifications and not according to state statutes or local ordinances. Offenses are related to municipality and county in which they occur, rather than to the agency which may investigate, arrest or otherwise dispose of the case. The clearance is attributed to the municipality or county in

which the offense occurred, even though the arresting agency may not be the department originally reporting the offense.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon many characteristics of the community, and therefore, when attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and the factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community. Below are some of the conditions which will by type and volume affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.

Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.

Economic status of the population.

Relative stability of population, include commuters, seasonal and other transient types.

Climate, including seasonal weather changes.

Educational, recreational and religious characteristics.

Standards governing appointments to the police force.

Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.

Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems. The administrative and investigative efficiency of the

line administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of

adherence to crime reporting standards.

Caution should always be used when using the crime statistics presented herein, however, it should also be kept in mind that the data presented is the most accurate currently available. The law enforcement personnel who provide the date are to be commended for their efforts to provide accurate data. Without their sincere cooperation, this publication would not be possible. Crime is a social problem and therefore, should be a concern of the entire community.

Nebraska Crime Trends, 1975-1979

Crime and Population

After decreases in crime in 1976, 1977 and 1978, crime in 1979 increased 12 percent over 1975. Nebraska's population has increased two percent since 1975 while the crime rate (per 1,000 population) has increased 10 percent.

An analysis of crime trends by population groups revealed that cities over 250,000 population (the City of Omaha) had a two percent increase over 1975. Cities of 100,000 to 250,000 population (the City of Lincoln) had a four percent increase over 1975.

Cities of 5,000 to 100,000 population had a 33 percent increase and cities under 5,000 population had a 46 percent increase over 1975.

Counties, which include the rural area and cities under 1,000 population reflected a 13 percent increase over 1975. The State agencies which report offenses occurring on State property (the State Patrol and the University of Nebraska—Lincoln) had a 22 percent increase over 1975.

Crime Index Offenses

The index offenses have shown the following changes over 1975: murder, manslaughter increased two percent, forcible rape increased 14 percent, robbery decreased 17 percent, felony assault decreased 11 percent, burglary increased nine percent, larceny-theft increased 15 percent and motor vehicle theft increased 20 percent.

Murder, manslaughter has increased in cities over 250,000 population and cities 5,000 to 100,000 population. Rape has increased in all areas of the State and robbery has increased in cities under 250,000 population.

Felony assault has increased in cities under 250,000 population. Burglary has increased in all areas of the State except in cities over 250,000 population. Larceny-theft has increased in all areas of the State and motor vehicle theft has increased in cities over 250,000 population, cities under 100,000 population and in the counties.

by Population Groups, 1975-1979













Crime Index Offenses—1979

Volume

A total of 61,964 index offenses were reported or known to law enforcement agencies in 1979. The violent crimes of murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and felony assault accounted for 5.7 percent of the total index offenses. The property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft accounted for 94.3 percent of the total offenses.

Felony assault accounted for 55.8 percent of the violent crimes and larceny-theft accounted for 71.2 percent of the crimes against property. Larceny-theft was the most frequently reported of all crimes, accounting for 67.2 percent of the total index.

Crime Rates

Based on an estimated population of 1,574,000, the crime rate was 39.4 in 1979. The crime rate for violent crimes was 2.2 per 1,000 population. The crime rate for crimes against property was 37.1. There were 26.4 larceny-thefts per 1,000 population in 1979.

Clearances

A total of 13,640 index offenses were reported cleared during 1979, a clearance rate of 22 percent. Murder, manslaughter had the greatest clearance rate, 85.9 percent. Violent crimes had a clearance rate of 59.9 percent and crimes against property had a clearance rate of 19.7 percent.

The difference between the clearance rate for crimes of violence and crimes against property can be attributed to the fact that there are more property crimes to be solved and investigations of violent crimes are usually more intense. The element of confrontation between the victim and the perpetrator, as well as witness identification of the perpetrator, contributes to the higher rate of clearance.

Murder, Manslaughter

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being in which the element of malice aforethought was present. Manslaughter is defined as any unlawful killing of a human being without the element of malice aforethought. Suicides, accidental deaths and justifiable or excusable homicides are excluded.

Volume and Rate

During 1979, a total of 64 murder, manslaughters were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Murder, mansiaughter accounted for 1.8 percent of all violent crimes (murder-manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and felony assault) and one-tenth of one percent of all index offenses. In 1979 there were .04 murders per 1,000 population.

Murder, Manslaughter Analysis

In all cases of murder, manslaughter reported under the UCR Program, a supplementary report is submitted by the reporting agency. The supplementary report provides the age, sex and race of the victim(s) and offender(s), weapon used to commit the offense, relationship of the victim to the offender, and circumstances or motive leading to the

The frequency of murder during 1979 was highest in the months of April and November when 8 murders occurred in

In 1979, male victims accounted for 67 percent of the total murder victims, with 46.5 percent of those being in the age group of 18-29. Female victims accounted for 33 percent of the total murder victims. Victim analysis by race disclosed that 64 percent were White, 31.3 percent were Negro, and 4.7 percent were Indian.

Of the 69 known perpetrators, males accounted for 87 percent and 58.3 percent of those were in the age group of 18-29. Female perpetrators accounted for 13 percent and all of these were between 18 and 39 years of age. White perpetrators accounted for 71 percent of the perpetrators, Negroes accounted for 26.1 percent and Indians accounted for 2.9 percent.

Most murders, 61 percent, were committed by a relative or acquaintance of the victim. A further breakdown indicated that 27 percent were committed by a relative; 34 percent were committed by an aquaintance; 20 percent were committed by strangers and in 19 percent of the cases the perpetrator(s) was unknown.

55 murder, manslaughters were cleared in 1979. Juvenile clearances accounted for 1.8 percent of the total clearances.

Handguns were used in 53.1 percent of the murders and a knife or other cutting instrument was used in 9.4 percent of the incidents.

Murder, Manslaughter by Month





Forcible Rape

Forcible rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly, and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted. Carnal abuse, without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

Volume and Rate

During 1979, law enforcement agencies in Nebraska reported a total of 333 forcible rapes. Forcible rape accounted for 9.5 percent of all violent crimes (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, felony assault) and 0.5 percent of all index offenses. In 1979, there were 0.2 rapes per 1,000 population.

Analysis of Forcible Rape

Rape by force accounted for 70.6 percent of all forcible rapes and 29.4 percent were attempts to rape.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for forcible rape, 21.9 percent, occurred within the 25-29 age group. Juvenile arrests accounted for 20.1 percent of all persons arrested for forcible rape.

Of all persons arrested for forcible rape, 60.4 percent were White, 33.1 percent were Negro, 4.1 percent were Indian and 2.4 percent were of other races. A total of 210 forcible rapes, 63.1 percent, were cleared during 1979.

Rape Circumstances

Law enforcement agencies are asked to submit a supplementary report on the circumstances surrounding any rape by force and attempt to rape. Supplementary reports were received on 134 cases; the Omaha P.D. did not submit any supplementary reports. Victims under the age of 25 accounted for 78.4 percent of the total victims. Of those victims under 25, 62.9 percent were between 18 and 24 and 17.1 percent were between 11 and 15. The victim was most likely to be attacked in her own home. In 44.8 percent of the incidents the perpetrator was a stranger. In 20.1 percent of the incidents a weapon was used and it was most likely to be a knife. The victim was attacked by more than one offender in 13 incidents. Interracial rapes accounted for 18.7 percent of the incidents.



Analysis of Forcible Rape by Type



Robbery

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. Robbery takes place in the presence of the victim. The victim, who usually is the owner or person having custody of the property is directly confronted by the perpetrator and is threatened with force or fear that force will be used. Robberies are reported in the following categories: firearm, knife or cutting instrument, other dangerous weapon, and strong arm—no weapon.

Volume and Rate

During 1979, a total of 1,155 robberies were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Robbery accounted for 32.9 percent of all violent crimes and 1.9 percent of all index offenses. In 1979, there were 0.7 robberies per 1,000 population.

Analysis of Robbery

A firearm was used in 45 percent of all robberies, a knife or other cutting instrument was used in 11.4 percent, other dangerous weapons were used in 4.6 percent and strong arm tactics were used in 39 percent of all robberies.

Robberies occurring on streets, highways, alleys, etc., accounted for 46.1 percent of all robberies. Robbery of a commercial house accounted for 22.2 percent and the robbery of a convenience store accounted for 9 percent. In 134 robberies, the victim was robbed in his residence.

The age group of 25-29 accounted for the highest percentage, 17.8 percent, of all persons arrested for robbery. The arrest of males accounted for 93.1 percent of all arrests for robbery.

Of all persons arrested for robbery, 46.3 percent were White, 47.6 percent were Negro, 5.7 percent were Indian and 0.4 percent were of other races.

A total of 415 robberies, 35.9 percent, were cleared by law enforcement agencies in 1979.

Robbery by Month




Felony Assault

Felony assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. Felony assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily injury.

Volume and Rate

During 1979, there were 1,962 felony assaults reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Felony assaults accounted for 55.8 percent of all violent crimes and 3.2 percent of all index offenses. In 1979, there were 1.2 felony assaults per 1,000 population. A total of 1,424 felony assaults, 72.6 percent, was cleared.

Analysis of Felony Assault

A firearm was used in 26.5 percent of all felony assaults and hands, fists, and feet were used in 29.2 percent. The use of a knife accounted for 21 percent and the use of other dangerous weapons accounted for 23.4 percent of all felony assaults.

The age group of 25-29 accounted for the highest percentage of persons arrested for felony assaults, 17.9 percent. Arrests of males accounted for 85.4 percent of all arrests for felony assault.

Of all arrests for felony assault, 66.3 percent were White, 26 percent were Negro, 6.9 percent were Indian and 0.7 percent were of other races.

During 1979, agencies provided victim/offender relationships on each assault reported, including misdemeanor assault. The assault is categorized as either relationship established or stranger-to-stranger. Victim/offender relationships were received on 3,458 assaults. The victim of an assault knew the perpetrator in 62.6 percent of the incidents and did not know the perpetrator in 37.4 percent of the incidents.




Burglary

Burglary is defined as any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or theft. Burglary is divided into three categories: forcible entry, unlawful entry—no force, and attempted forcible entry.

Volume and Rate

During 1979, a total of 12,566 burglaries were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Burglary accounted for 21.5 percent of all property crimes (burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) and 20.3 percent of all index offenses. In 1979, there were 8.0 burglaries per 1,000 population. A total of 2,074 burglaries, 16.5 percent, were cleared.

Analysis of Burglary

Of all burglaries, 58.5 percent involved residences and 41.5 percent involved non-residences. Of the residential burglaries, 29.2 percent, occurred during the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., 33.7 percent occurred between 6:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., and in 37.1 percent the time of entry was unknown. Non-residential burglaries occurred most frequently during the night, 67.1 percent. Burglaries during the day accounted for 4.2 percent and in 28.7 percent the time of entry was unknown.

The age group of 17 accounted for the highest percentage of persons arrested for burglary, 13.8 percent. Male arrests accounted for 93.7 percent of all arrests for burglary and juveniles accounted for 48.4 percent.

Of all persons arrested for burglary, 80.6 percent were White, 16 percent were Negro, 3.2 percent were Indian and 0.3 percent were of other races.



Larceny-Theft

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking of the property of another with the intent of depriving him of ownership. Larceny-theft as an index offense includes larcenies under \$50 in value.

Volume and Rate

During 1979, a total of 41,625 larceny-thefts were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Larceny-theft accounted for 71.2 percent of all crimes against property and 67.2 percent of all index offenses. In 1979, there were 26.4 larceny-thefts per 1,000 population. A total of 8,426 larceny-thefts, 20.2 percent, was cleared.

Analysis of Larceny-Theft

Of the total larcenies reported, 38.0 percent were under \$50 in value, 38.8 percent were \$50-\$200 in value and 23.2 percent were over \$200 in value. The theft of items from motor vehicles accounted for 18.2 percent of the total number of thefts. Thefts from buildings accounted for 17.6 percent and the theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories accounted for 17.4 percent of all thefts.

The age group of 13-14 accounted for the highest percentage of persons arrested for larceny-theft, 11.1 percent. Male arrests accounted for 66.8 percent of all arrests for larceny-theft and juveniles accounted for 44.9 percent.

Of all persons arrested for larceny-theft, 79.1 percent were White, 17.8 percent were Negro, 2.5 percent were Indian and 0.7 percent were of other races.



Motor Vehicle Theft

Motor vehicle theft is defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. Thefts of farm equipment, bulldozers, airplanes and construction equipment are not included in the definition of a motor vehicle. Motor vehicle theft is divided into the following categories: autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles,

Volume and Rate

During 1979, 4,259 motor vehicle thefts were reported by law enforcement agencies in Nebraska. Motor vehicle theft accounted for 7.3 percent of all crimes against property and 6.9 percent of all index offenses. In 1979, there were 2.7 motor vehicle thefts per 1,000 population. A total of 1,036, 24.3 percent, motor vehicle thefts were cleared in 1979.

Analysis of Motor Vehicle Theft

During 1979, law enforcement agencies provided additional information regarding types of vehicles stolen. The agencies reported 2,507 autos, 866 trucks and buses and 886 other vehicles stolen.

During 1979, there were 3,498 motor vehicles recovered; 80.5 percent were recovered within the same jurisdiction where they were stolen and 19.5 percent were recovered in another jurisdiction.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 15.1 percent, occurred in the age group 17. Male arrests acounted for 90.8 percent of all motor vehicle theft arrests. Juveniles accounted for 51.7 percent of all arrests for motor vehicle theft

Of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 72.8 percent were White, 20.3 percent were Negro, 6.8 percent were Indian and 0.1 percent were of other races.



Arson

Arson is any willful or malicious burning or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. The reporting of arson offenses began with January, 1979. Arson offenses are reported to this Commission by the State Fire Marshal. Since arson did not become a crime index offense until 1980, it is not presented as a part of the index offenses in this report.

Volume and Rate

During 1979, there were 864 offenses of arson reported by the State Fire Marshal. This represents 0.5 arsons per 1,000 population. A total of 213 arsons, 24.7 percent, were cleared. Clearances involving only persons under 18 years of age accounted for 35.7 percent of the total clearances.

Analysis of Arson

The total estimated value of damage to property as a result of arson, amounted to \$6,310,255 for 1979. A further analysis reveals that the property damage for 528 structures was \$5,809,843, for 172 mobiles (motor vehicles and mobile property—trailers, recreational vehicles, airplanes) the damage value was \$441,410 and for 165 other arson types it was \$59,002.

Of the 528 structures, 319 were residential structures, 60.4 percent. Of the residential structures, 26 percent were uninhabited, abandoned or normally not in use at the time of the arson. Structures other than residential were abandoned in 7.7 percent of the incidents.



Arrest Data

Under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, an arrest is counted each time a person is taken into custody, summoned, notified or cited. When a person under 18 years of age commits an offense and the circumstances are such that if the offender were an adult an arrest would be made, the offender is counted as an arrest by the reporting agency.

For reporting purposes, one arrest is counted each time a person is taken into custody, regardless of the number of charges placed against him. If an individual is arrested more than once during the year, an arrest is counted each time. When several persons are arrested in connection with the same offense, each is counted as an arrest.

It should be kept in mind that arrest practices and emphasis on certain crimes vary from place to place. Each reporting agency is responsible ior reporting arrests made by the State Patrol in its jurisdiction.

As of January 1, 1979, under the Nebraska criminal code, a person could no longer be arrested for being intoxicated. This should be kept in mind when comparing 1979 arrests with any previous years.

Volume and Rate

Law enforcement agencies in Nebraska reported 50,989 arrests in 1979 for Part I and Part II offenses. This represents a decrease of seven percent over 1978. There were 32.4 arrests per 1,000 persons in Nebraska in 1979 as compard with 34.9 arrests per 1,000 persons in 1978.

Arrests for Part I offenses accounted for 23.5 percent of the total arrests. Of the arrests for Part I offenses, larcenytheft accounted for the greatest portion of the arrests, 66.6 percent. The greatest percentage of arrests for Part II offenses was for all other offenses.

During 1979, arrests for crimes of violence (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and felony assault) accounted for 11.7 percent of all arrests for Part I offenses and 2.7 percent of the total arrests.

Arrests for crimes against property (burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) accounted for 88.2 percent of all arrests for Part I offenses and 20.7 percent of the total arrests.

Arrests for Part I offenses increased eight percent over the number reported during 1978. Arrests for murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, felony assault and larceny-theft all showed increases over 1978.

Arrests for Part II offenses decreased 10 percent over 1978. Arrests for prostitution and commercialized vice increased 278 percent over 1978.

Arrests by Age

The number of persons under the age of 18 (juveniles) arrested during 1979 decreased two hundredths of one percent over 1978. Arrests of juveniles for Part I offenses increased one percent over 1978. The arrest of persons

age 18 and over (adults) decreased nine percent over 1978. Adult arrests for Part I offenses increased 14 percent over 1978.

Of the arrests for the index offenses (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, felony assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) persons under the age of 25 accounted for 76.7 percent and persons under the age of 18 accounted for 55.5 of those under 25. The age group of 13-14 accounted for the greatest number of arrests in any age group for the index offenses.

The arrests of persons under the age of 25 accounted for the following percentages of the total arrests for each index offense: murder, manslaughter (53.2); forcible rape (55.6); robbery (71.3); felony assault (50.4); burglary (88.3); larceny-theft (76.2); and motor vehicle theft (88.8).

Of those persons under the age of 25 arrested for index offenses, persons under the age of 18 accounted for 36.4 percent for murder, manslaughter; 36.2 percent for forcible rape; 35.9 percent for robbery; 19.2 percent for felony assault; 54.9 percent for burglary; 59.0 percent for larcenytheft and 58.3 percent for motor vehicle theft.

Arrests by Sex

In 1979, males accounted for 81.6 percent of all arrests. Males accounted for 75.2 percent of the arrests for Part I offenses and 83.6 percent of all arrests for Part II offenses. Total male arrests decreased eight percent over 1978 and female arrests decreased 9 percent. Females were arrested for larceny-theft more times than for any other offense. The greatest number of male arrests were recorded for driving under the influence.

Arrests by Race

A distribution analysis of total arrests by race for 1979 indicated 84.2 percent were White, 11.6 percent were Negro, 3.7 percent were Indian and 0.5 percent were of other races. The arrest involvement by race for the index offenses revealed that 76.5 percent were White, 19.6 percent were Negro, 3.3 percent were Indian and 0.6 percent were of other races.

An analysis of arrests by race for crimes of violence (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and felony assault) revealed that 58.9 percent were White, 34.3 percent were Negro, 6.0 percent were Indian and 0.8 were of other races.

An analysis of arrests by race for crimes against property (burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) revealed that 78.9 percent were White, 17.6 percent were Negro, 2.9 percent were Indian and 0.6 percent were of other races.

An analysis of arrests by race for Part II offenses revealed that 86.6 percent were White, 9.2 percent were Negro, 3.8 percent were Indian and 0.5 percent were of other races.

Officers Killed and Assaulted

The killing or assault of a law enforcement officer is an increasingly serious problem faced by the law enforcement administrator and should be of the gravest concern to the public at large. Such acts directly affect the functioning of proper law enforcement operations and thus reduce the ability of our law enforcement agencies to combat crime and maintain law and order. The ambitious young man who today considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the risk of being killed or assaulted by a member of the society he is sworn to protect.

Assaults on Law Enforcement Officers

During 1979, there were a total of 299 assaults on state, county and municipal law enforcement officers. This represents a 44 percent over 1978. While every assault does not result in personal injury to the officer involved, many of them do result in physical harm to the officer and loss of duty time. During 1979, personal injury was involved in 43 percent of the assaults compared with 42 percent in 1978. A total of 2,110 duty hours were lost due to the assaults.

Most of the assaults occurred while responding to disturbance calls and most of these assaults were inflicted with personal weapons such as hands, fists or feet. There were no law enforcement officers killed during 1979.

Law Enforcement Employee Data

The Nebraska Uniform Crime Reporting Program surveys law enforcement agencies each year concerning employee data. At the end of October, 1979, there were 3,417 persons employed full-time in 198 law enforcement agencies.

Of the 3,417 employees, 2,500 were sworn personnel and 917 were civilian employees. Based upon an estimated population of 1,574,000 there were 1.6 sworn officers per 1,000 persons in the State. The rate of law enforcement officers per 1,000 population for any given agency in the State is influenced by many factors. The determination of law enforcement strength for a certain area is based on such factors as population density, size and character of the community, geographic location and other conditions which exist in the area.

Females accounted for three percent of the sworn personnel and 70 percent of the civilian personnel.
