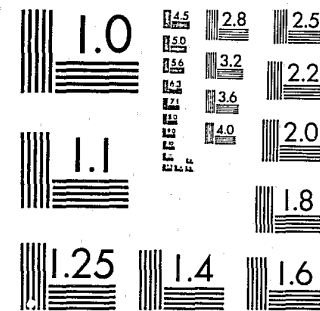

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I. OVERVIEW: COUNTY JAIL NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Historical Background

The 69th Iowa General Assembly enacted H.F. 806 which required that the Iowa Crime Commission complete a needs assessment of individual county jails. The complete text of H.F. 806 is as follows:

MORATORIUM ON JAIL STANDARDS.

The administrative rules adopted by the department of social services establishing minimum jail standards as provided in section 356.36 shall not be implemented or enforced until a needs assessment of the individual county jails has been completed by the Iowa crime commission.

This document, County Jail Needs Assessment, was prepared by the Iowa Crime Commission to meet the legislative mandate. Each county was assessed on the basis of the minimum jail standards proposed by the Department of Social Services as published in the March 4, 1981 issue of the Iowa Administrative Bulletin. The proposed minimum jail standards were developed pursuant to Section 356.36, Code of Iowa, 1981.

Methodology

The Crime Commission's first step in completing the needs assessment was to develop a survey that was based upon the requirements set forth in the proposed jail standards. A copy of the survey instrument is the appendix to this report.

The survey instrument was reviewed by members of the Iowa State Sheriffs' and Deputies' Association, Statistical Analysis Center, Department of Social Services Jail Inspection Unit, and the South Iowa Area Crime Commission. Additionally, the survey instrument was tested by Sheriff William Marten, Grundy County, and Sheriff Lynn Ford, Pottawattamie County. Following review and modification, the survey was mailed to sheriffs in all 99 counties. Ninety-six of the 99 sheriffs returned the survey in a timely manner.

The Crime Commission staff and the South Iowa Area Crime Commission made on-site visits to 41 counties throughout the State. A map on page 4 illustrates the county on-site visits and county surveys that were not returned.

Key questions were selected from the survey questionnaire to provide a statewide jail analysis. The statewide jail analysis is presented in Section II of this report. This section objectively presents the responses of the sheriffs in a statistical format.

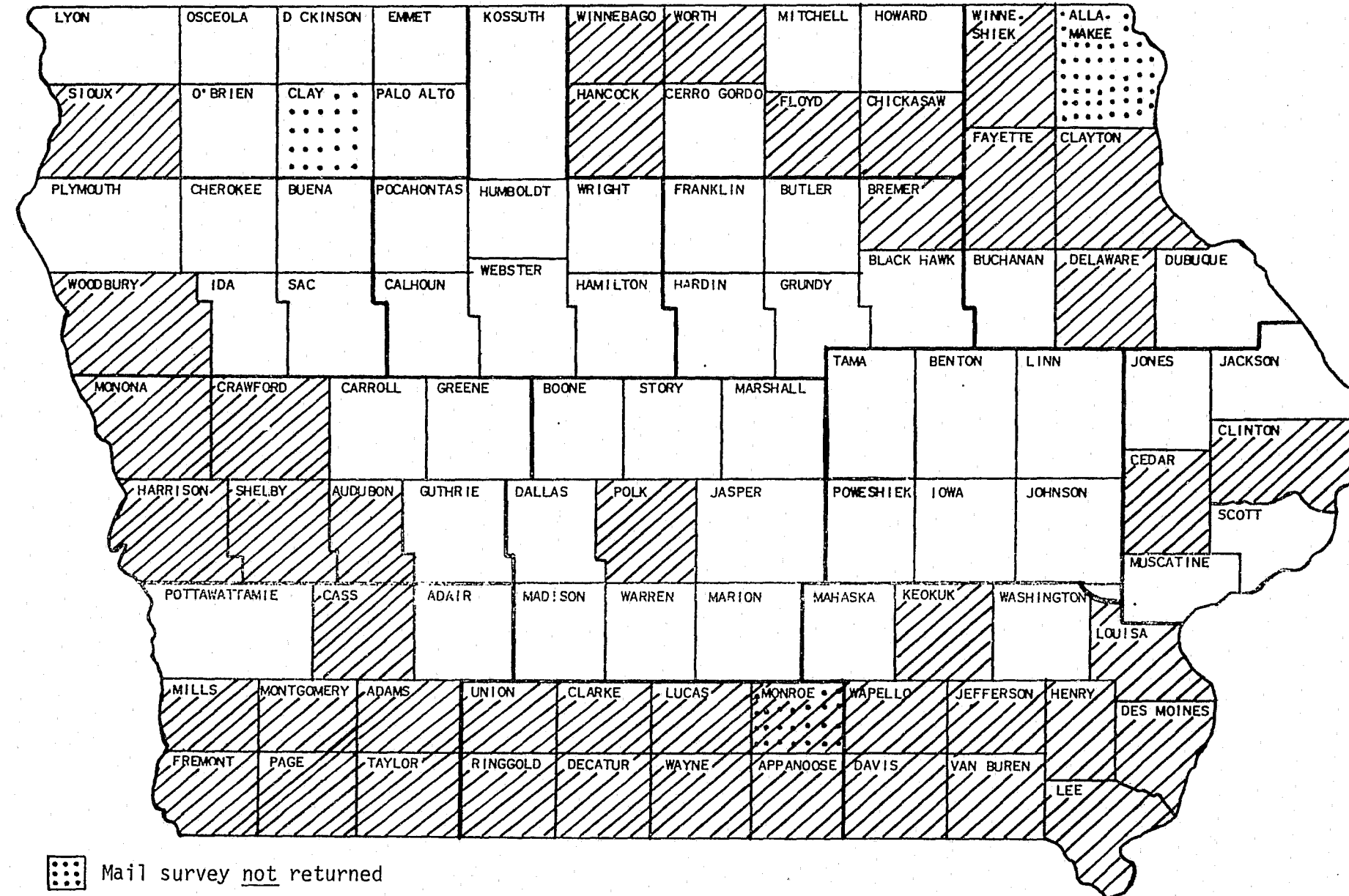
Section III is an assessment of each individual county jail in Iowa. Like Section II, the individual county analysis

objectively reports the responses of the sheriffs to the survey. However, the cost analysis information contained in this section sets forth both the sheriffs' estimate and the Crime Commission's cost estimate. These estimates are based upon the Crime Commission's experience in awarding grants to counties for jail improvement and may differ from the sheriffs' cost estimate.

A statewide cost analysis is presented in Section IV. The statewide cost analysis is a compilation of individual county cost estimates.

Further study and analysis may be made of the entire data that was collected in the survey.

The following key should be used if interpretive difficulties arise.

UK or \$UK

UK means that there was no survey response to the question and that the answer, or requested dollar amount, was unknown when this report was produced.

For example:

"The 1980 jail budget was \$UK" means that the necessary information was not provided in the survey response and the Commission staff does not know what the budget figure is.

"Inmates are UK provided written regulations and procedures" means that the particular response was not answered and the Commission staff does not know if written regulations are provided.

Or

"Visual inspection is UK made hourly" means that the Commission staff does not know if such inspection is made hourly.

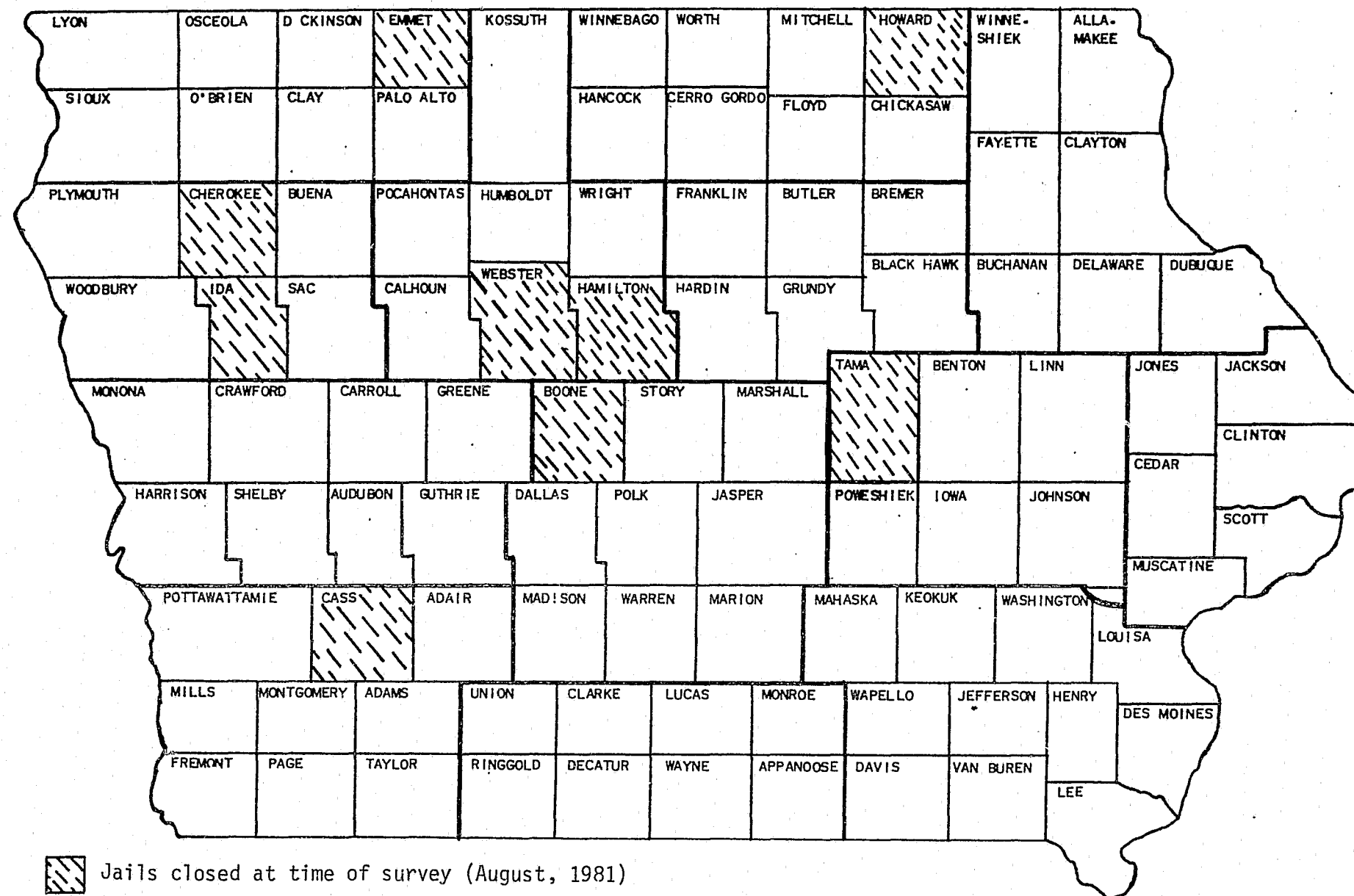

and equipment are estimated as one time costs.

Minor facility renovation and equipment cost estimates are based on averages taken from Crime Commission grants in counties that have made jail improvements. The Crime Commission has awarded \$1.6 million in grants to 67 counties and state agencies during the period 1977-1981.

The Crime Commission's estimate for facility and equipment costs does not include major structural changes (i.e. cell space renovation) or new construction. A projected cost was not developed for these items. However, some sheriffs did report a cost estimate for cell size renovation or new construction, and these estimates are included in the reported estimated costs from the survey. For example, Polk County reported \$10,600,000 (cost of the new jail) as the estimated costs for cell size renovation.

The estimated costs take into consideration items requested by counties for grants to comply with proposed standards. For example, video surveillance cameras are not specifically required. However, at least 40 counties have requested and received Crime Commission grants that included video cameras as one means of complying with standard requirements. Therefore, for those counties that reportedly do not have video cameras, a cost estimate is included for such equipment. Video cameras may not be necessary depending on the physical arrangement of the facility, staff availability and general administration.

Staffing cost estimates were determined by multiplying the number of staff needed as reported in the survey by a statewide average deputy salary. The average deputy salary was extrapolated from the report "Results of the 1979-80 Technical Data Survey of Iowa's County Sheriffs' Departments," Statistical Analysis Center, (May, 1980).

Training cost estimates were based on projections for a 40 hour training program (tuition, meals and lodging) and materials only for first aid and CPR training.

No cost was estimated by the Crime Commission for development or updating of written policy and procedure manuals, records or forms. However, some sheriffs included cost estimates for these items in their estimates. No costs were estimated for written operations manuals or forms because either an in-house or outside resource capability exists to develop and implement the procedures or plans to satisfy requirements. The Crime Commission has received a grant from the National Institute of Corrections and through the Jail Assistance and Training Committee can provide technical assistance to counties. Such assistance includes a small jail resource manual and a sample policy and procedure manual.

The cost analysis presented here is based on the proposed state jail standards. It is not meant to be a definitive cost

projection. At best, the cost analyses reflect a range of estimated costs of compliance with the proposed standards and should be used by decision makers as a policy planning tool and as a cost estimate guideline.
