# South Australia

# 1 July-31 December 1981

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SUMMARY

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Between 1 July and 31 December 1981, almost 13,000 cases falling within the scope of the Office of Crime Statistics collection were dealt with in courts of summary jurisdiction in South Australia. Only local council and Corporate Affairs prosecutions, and minor traffic infringements, are excluded. However, figures on the most serious indictable offences such as murder or rape only related to preliminary hearings held to determine whether sufficient evidence existed to warrant a Supreme or District Court trial.

The 12,977 cases dealt with during the second half of 1981 represented a slight (1.5 percent) increase over the preceding six months, but most of the addition was in the miscellaneous category of other (minor) offences. Shop theft (up 8.8 percent) and offences against order (up 9.2 percent) were the only two offences to have shown increases. Several other categories - for example drug offences (down 4 percent), offences against the person (down 10 percent) and driving offences (down 8.7 percent) registered declines in numbers appearing.

Almost forty percent of defendants were unemployed, compared with only six percent of South Australia's adult population during the same period. Categories with the highest percentages included offensive behavior, vagrancy and liquor offences, breaking and entering, vehicle theft and other larceny. On an overall basis, however, the percentage of defendants in lower courts who were out of work has remained relatively constant during the past three years, even though the unemployment rate in South Australia has risen slightly.

On 15th October, 1981 the South Australian government introduced Random Breath Testing (RBT), and by the end of the year the impact already was evident in court figures. The number of defendants appearing on charges of driving with the prescribed content of alcohol during December 1981 was lower than in the previous year, and average blood alcohol levels were higher. Percentages of road accident victims found to have consumed alcohol also declined dramatically after the introduction of RBT - a fairly reliable sign that initially, at least, the new system acted as a deterrent.

The report highlighted significant differences between court proceedings in Adelaide and other regions. Less than two percent of cases in Adelaide courts were presided over by justices of the peace, whereas these honorary officials dealt with a third of all appearances outside the metropolitan area. Although justices mainly dealt with minor offences, they sentenced 54 defendants to gaol terms during the period under survey.

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Defendants outside Adelaide also were more likely to have been arrested rather than summonsed and to be remonded in custody before appearing. This was markedly the case for aboriginal people, who mainly appeared for minor offences such as drunkenness and vagrancy. Aboriginal defendants on these charges in courts outside Adelaide were two and a half times more likely to receive a gaol sentence and more than sixty percent had been remanded in custody before appearing.

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#### PREFACE

This is the sixth report by the Office of Crime Statistics on proceedings in Courts of Summary Jurisdiction in South Australia. These reports complement the Office's regular summaries of juvenile and higher court appearances and offences known to police, and a series of special publications focussing on aspects of the criminal justice system.

The Office implemented its system of data collection from Courts of Summary Jurisdiction in South Australia on 1st January 1979. For the first six months, coverage was limited to the largest Court of Summary Jurisdiction, the Adelaide Magistrate's Court. However, on 1st July, 1979, scope was extended to cases heard throughout the state.

A list of courts throughout South Australia contributing to the system is in Appendix C. Many courts deal with only a small number of cases each year. The majority of defendants are in the metropolitan area, courts in major country towns and regional centres where the court is managed by public servants or larger police-administered courts.

To complement the information in these six-monthly reports, the Office of Crime Statistics provides a specialised information service for members of the legal profession and approved researchers. Users of this system generally are charged a fee covering computing costs and labour. Details are available from the Statistician (telephone 227-0176).

It would not be possible to produce statistics from Courts of Summary Jurisdiction without the assistance of numerous individuals. Clerks of Court throughout the State have contributed their time and effort to the collection of data from cases heard in their Courts. In the case of Adelaide Magistrates' Court, this role has been ably performed by Barry Joyce, who also is responsible for day-to-day management of the total system. The South Australian Police Department contributes additional information on the background of defendants.

N.S. Koshnitsky, Statistician, Office of Crime Statistics, has assumed full responsibility for supervision of the system, and is responsible for the storage, retrieval, and analysis of data.

#### INTRODUCTION

#### Scope of Collection

This report is a statistical summary of criminal cases in Courts of Summary Jurisdiction throughout South Australia during the final six months of 1981. Only council proceedings and minor traffic violations have been excluded (a summary of charges not in the collection is in Appendix D). For the vast majority of these prosecutions, a magistrate or justices of the peace dealt with the matter summarily - that is, they alone decided whether the defendant was auilty and what penalty should be imposed. In the remainder, the court's role was to conduct a preliminary hearing to determine whether the prosecution had amassed sufficient "prima facie" evidence to warrant a higher court trial. Offences which can be tried by a judge and jury are termed "indictable" - and generally are more serious than matters dealt with summarily by a magistrate. However, the Justices Act allows defendants on some minor indictable offences to waive the right to a higher court hearing. This means that for all but the gravest charges - for example, murder, rape, armed robbery - both case-outcome and sentence generally are determined summarily in a Magistrate's Court.

#### **Understanding Court Statistics**

A key to understanding court statistics is being aware of the distinction between court and police figures, and of the phenomenon of unreported crime. Basically, court figures - such as those in this report - count numbers of appearances by allead offenders who have been arrested or summonsed to answer some charge. Police figures, on the other hand, count the actual number of incidents reported or which they themselves have detected. It is generally accepted that police figures do not always accurately reflect the incidence of crime. For a variety of reasons - for example the fact that offender and victim were close relatives or friends, or the crime itself was considered trivial, or there was no obvious victim - many crimes do not come to the attention of police. Court figures are even less likely to reflect crime rates because not all offences are cleared up (e.g. an arrest results), or if a defendant does appear he or she may be dealt with simultaneously for several offences. In addition, times elapsed between the commission of an offence and the final court appearance by a defendant are rarely consistent, so it is not possible to argue that court appearances relate to crimes committed during

one specific period. Rather than being used as evidence of crime rates, therefore, court statistics should be seen as indicators of the way the criminal justice system functions and the penalties being imposed for various types of offences.

#### Note on Data Items

Although every effort is made to ensure that the courts of summary jurisdiction collection is accurate and complete, caution should be exercised in interpreting some data items in particular those relating to the backgrounds of individuals appearing. These are based on items in Police Department's apprehension reports and criminal history files. It is possible that on occasions, persons arrested may give misleading information. Moreover, where the South Australian Police Department did not lay the initial complaint, or where there was no finding of guilt, data on the characteristics of the defendant could not always be recorded. Readers also should be aware that this report does not relate to the entire population of offenders. It does not encompass appearances by juveniles (i.e. alleged offenders under 18)\* and, as mentioned earlier, not all criminal offences result in court appearances. Some segments of society, because of their lifestyle and lack of resources, are more vulnerable to prosecution for their offences.

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For information on juvenile appearances see Crime and Justice in South Australia (Office of Crime Statistics, August, 1982).

### PART I - OVERVIEW

#### SUMMARY OF CASES DEALT WITH

#### Number of Appearances

Between 1 July and 31 December, 1981 there were 12,977 appearances by defendants facing charges which fell within the scope of the Office's collection. This was a slight (1.5 percent) increase over the preceding six months, and was significantly (13.3 percent) higher than corresponding months in 1980. Most of the increase was in the miscellaneous category of "other (minor) offences".

Almost one in four appearances related to minor "street" offences such as offensive behavior, drunkenness and vagrancy, with driving offences accounting for a similar percentage. Shop-theft and offences against order are the only categories which have shown consistent increases over the past few years, while several offences (for example drugs, driving) decreased when compared with the preceding period. As pointed out earlier, readers should be wary of interpreting any short term fluctuation on court figures as a sign of changed patterns of offending in the community. The following brief notes detail offences included in some major categories.

Two out of three appearances for offences against the person involved minor assault - and in almost a third of these, charges eventually were withdrawn or dismissed. One reason for the comparatively low rate of convictions may be that many minor assault charges related to domestic incidents, where alleged victims eventually indicated they could no longer cooperate with a prosecution. Recent amendments to the Justices Act (effective from 3 June 1982), allow the Police Department to apply for restraint orders and initiate independent prosecutions when these are breached. This may make it easier for courts to act against domestic violence.

Other major offences against the person were assault police (169 cases) and major assault (102 appearances). Most assault police charges resulted in findings of guilt, with 25 defendants imprisoned. Major assault cases were mainly preliminary hearings : 65 resulted in committal to a Higher Court for trial or sentence.

#### Drug Offences (793 appearances)

Cannabis, or a cannabis derivative, was the major substance in 94% of appearances before Courts of Summary Jurisdiction during the last six months of 1981. Almost three quarters of drug appearances were for possession of marijuana, less than 12 percent were for cultivating, importing or selling. One defendant faced charges of importing heroin, two with importing marijuana.

In light of these statistics, it is unlikely that the slight (4%) decrease apparent when figures are compared with the first six months of 1981 reflects significant changes in patterns of drug offending.

#### Offences Against the Person (849 appearances)

#### Fraud and Deception (591 appearances)

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Major offence types in this category were false pretences (291 cases - 35.8 percent), "other fraud" (268 cases - 43.8 percent), forge and utter (66 cases, 10.7 percent) and embezzlement by an employee (41 appearances, 6.7 percent). Offences against the Companies Act are not included in the Office's collection.

With the exception of shoplifting, fraud defendants were older than other alleged property offenders (average age 29 years, as opposed to 23.8 years for other property offences), and there was a higher proportion of women (32 percent as opposed to 15 percent in the general population of offenders). Almost three guarters of fraud defendants were found quilty, although in thirteen percent of these cases the magistrate did not proceed to record a conviction. A further 7 percent of fraud appearances resulted in committal for trial or sentence in a higher court.

#### Break and Enter (359 appearances)

Most break and enter cases were preliminary hearings, with more than 7 out of 10 resulting in a committal for trial or sentence. For about sixty percent of defendants the major charge was breaking and entering commercial premises. most of the remainder faced charges relating to theft from dwellings.

Defendants on break and enter charges generally were younger than others who appeared : their average age was only 24, compared with 30 for all offences. Despite their relative youth, only twenty five percent of those whose records were known had no prior appearances. A high proportion (almost seven out of ten) of break and enter defendants had been unemployed at the time of arrest.

#### Unlawful Use, Theft of Vehicle (302 appearances)

Most appearances in this category were for unlawful use of a motor vehicle - 246 cases or 81.5 percent. Other offences were larceny of a motor vehicle, interfere with a motor vehicle and other vehicle theft.

Of the 227 defendants convicted, 84 (or 37 percent) were imprisoned - the average being 16 weeks. A further 22 received suspended sentences, 57 were placed on bonds, and 260 were fined. As with break and enter appearances, young, single males were predominant : the average age was 22 years and more than eighty percent were single.

#### Shop Theft (1323 appearances)

Both court and figures (Figure A) indicate increased numbers of defendants apprehended for shop theft in recent years.



However, from background information available on those defendants, it is clear that they are mainly first offenders, and in terms of age and sex, come close to being a broad cross-section of the general community. Office of Crime Statistics Research Bulletin No. 1 (September 1982) discusses some innovations, such as aid panels for adult offenders, which may help the system deal more efficiently with these offenders without detracting from individual deterrence.

#### Driving Offences (2799 appearances)

The main offences in this category are driving with the prescribed content of alcohol (PCA - 1673 appearances), driving while under the influence (DUI - 500 appearances) and drive while disqualified (244 appearances). PCA figures are of particular interest, since on 15th October random breath testing (RBT) became effective. The RBT legislation, which will operate for a trial period of three years, enables officers from the Police Department to stop motorists on a random basis and test for excessive levels of blood-alcohol. Its primary purpose is not to detect larger number of offenders but to dissuade drinkers from driving, by convincing them there is a higher risk of detection.

Implementation of RBT followed recommendations by a bi-partisan Select Committee of the South Australian Legislative Council. By the end of 1981, 17,520 motorists had been subjected to Random Testing. Of these, 14,731 were stopped during the period 10 November to 4 January 1982, and sixty were found to have excessive levels of blood alcohol.

Since RBT involved the testing of a wider cross-section than merely suspected drink/drivers, some commentators anticipated that its introduction may result in lower numbers of offenders actually apprehended. Table 2, which compares court appearances for July-December 1980 and 1981, bears out this assumption. In December 1981, a month after the introduction of RBT , court appearances were considerably less than in November 1981 and December 1980. Average (mean) blood alcohol levels, however, had increased suggesting. perhaps, that drivers consuming relatively lower amounts of alcohol may have been deterred from drinking and driving.

It must be acknowledged, however, that court and apprehension statistics are very uncertain indicators of the extent of drink/ driving within the community. More reliable is the percentage of accident victims who were found to have positive blood alcohol readings. As figure B shows, this proportion decreased significantly between October and 31 December, when compared with trends in the previous two years - a fairly reliable sign that RBT initially acted as a deterrent. These trends, however, do not appear to have been sustained in 1982.



#### Offensive Behavior, Drunkenness, Vagrancy and Liquor Offences (3104 appearances)

Included in these 'street' offences are drunkenness (1583 appearances - 51.2 percent of total), disorderly and other offensive behavior (845 appearances - 27.2 percent) and indecent language (503 appearances - 16.2 percent). More than nine out of ten appearances resulted in convictions : a fine was the penalty most commonly imposed, although 64 cases resulted in direct imprisonment. Previous reports have suggested that aboriginal people are more vulnerable to being charged for these minor offences than the non-aboriginal counterparts, and current data confirm this impression. Almost one in three defendants in this category was an aboriginal, and more than 37 percent appeared before courts in country areas.

#### CHARACTERISTICS OF HEARINGS

#### Pleas Entered

Of defendants whose cases were finalised in courts of summary jurisdiction, almost nine out of ten (88.8 percent) pleaded guilty. This was slightly higher than the percentage admitting to charges during the preceding six months, and there was a corresponding decrease in defendants not required to enter a plea because their case had been withdrawn by the prosecution. Most (74.7%) defendants committed to higher courts had entered no plea at the preliminary hearing stage.

\* The Justices Act allows some offenders summonsed to appear to enter a plea of guilty - and his or her version of the facts - in writing without appearing at court in person.

#### Legal Representation

Defendants facing criminal charges in South Australia can either hire a private solicitor, obtain legal aid, or appear without representation. Legal aid organisations include the South Australian Legal Services Commission and the Aboriginal Legal Rights Movement. Both retain salaried officers and also reimburse private practitioners who appear on behalf of clients. In addition, the Law Society of South Australia maintains a duty solicitor scheme, whereby private lawyers are rostered to attend selected courts and appear for defendants who request assistance. During the final six months of 1981, more than half (54.8%) of defendants in the scope of the Office's collection were legally represented - a percentage similar to the first half of the year. Categories for which defendants were more likely to be represented were drink drive (65.4% represented), offences against the person (81.5% represented) and break and enter (92.2% represented). Less than one in four charged with drunkenness, offensive behavior, vagrancy and other minor offences appeared with a solicitor. Office of Crime Statistics reports on cases determined after 1 July 1982 will give a more detailed breakdown of types of representation obtained.

#### Outcomes of Cases

In light of the high percentages admitting the charges, it is not surprising that the overwhelming majority (87.9%) of persons appearing either were found guilty or were committed for trial. In just under 6.3 percent of cases, however, the justice or magistrate did not proceed to record a conviction, because of an exemplary record or some other extenuating circumstance. Offences with the highest rates of conviction were drunkenness (93.4%), offensive language (91.1%) and driving with the prescribed content of alcohol. Offences with lower rates included shop theft (45.7% not convicted) and common assault (38.3% not convicted, 4.2% withdrawn).

#### Penalties and Orders

Courts of summary jurisdiction can impose a wide range of sanctions including fines, outright or suspended imprisonment, recognizance and suspension or disqualification of driving licences. Offenders also can be required to pay court costs or make restitution. Table 4 shows penalties imposed during the second six months of 1981. The most frequent penalty was a fine (57.7% of all penalties imposed), followed by suspension of driving licence (17.5%) and imposition of an order (7.2%), bonds (5.6%), suspended imprisonment (2.0%) and imprisonment (4.0%). The maximum prison sentence which can be imposed in a court of summary jurisdiction is two years. There was a significant decrease in the number of prison sentences imposed, 927 in the first half of 1981 and 582 in the second half of the year.

The vast majority (88.9%) of persons appearing before Courts of Summary Jurisdiction during the final six months of 1981 had been allowed at large or granted some type of bail. However, one in thirteen were remanded in custody. A lower proportion (about 88%) of defendants on charges of offensive behavior or language, vagrancy, drunkerness and other liquor charges were granted bail or allowed at large than individuals charged with offences against the person (91.6% on bail/allowed at large).

#### CHARACTERISTICS OF PERSONS CHARGED

#### Age, Sex and Marital Status

As in preceding years, the largest category of defendants (about 43.0 percent) was males aged 18-24. However, for some offences - fraud and deception, shop theft, driving offences and offensive behavior, language or liquor offences - there were considerable proportions in older age groups. Offences for which higher percentages of women appeared were fraud and deception (32.3% women), shop-theft (53.5%) and offensive behavior/language etc. (13.1% women). Females who appeared were older than males, the average age for females being 33 and males 29.

As might be anticipated from statistics on ages, many (about two thirds - 64%) who appeared in courts of summary jurisdiction were single and had never married. A further eight percent were permanently separated, widowed or divorced. Shop theft (50.1% married) and fraud (46.6%) were the only major categories where a relatively high proportion of defendants were married or in defacto relationships.

#### **Employment Status**

Previous reports have suggested that economically disadvantaged groups, such as the unemployed, are over-represented as defendants in criminal courts. Data for the final six months of 1981 reaffirm this conclusion. Almost four out of ten defendants appearing in courts of summary jurisdiction were unemployed - compared with only 6 percent of the general adult population. On an overall basis, however, the proportion of defendants who are unemployed has remained steady over recent years, even though unemployment rates in the general population have risen slightly.

Categories for which relatively high percentages of unemployed persons appeared included offensive behavior, drunkenness, vagrancy and liquor offences (47.4% unemployed), breaking and entering (68.4%), theft of a vehicle (65.3%) and 'other larceny' (51.4%).

#### Previous Criminal Record

Three out of every five defendants in summary courts already had appeared at least once before a court of criminal jurisdiction, and just under a quarter (23.4%) had previously been imprisoned. Recidivism rates were particularly high for the very minor offences, such as offensive behavior, vagrancy, drunkenness and other violations of liquor laws (77.3% at least one previous appearance, 42.3% previously imprisoned, 13% both previously imprisoned and more than 99 prior convictions) - suggesting that many of these defendants are caught in an endless cycle of arrests and court hearings. By contrast, more than seven out of ten (71%) shop theft defendants were making first appearances.

#### Geographical Variations in Types of Appearances

As with previous periods, there were marked differences between the types of cases and defendants appearing in Adelaide and other parts of South Australia. As Table 7 shows, Adelaide was over-represented for drugs, fraud and deception and shop-theft cases, but courts outside the state capital heard disproportionate numbers of drunkenness and other minor offences.

Four courts - Ceduna, Coober Pedy, Oodnadatta and Port Augusta accounted for almost two thirds (63.7%) of minor offences heard in the "rest of state", suggesting that these localities may be more intensively policed than other communities. As Table 8 shows, many of these cases were presided over by justices : under the Justices Act, two or more justices of the peace can hear summary charges (i.e. charges for which there is no entitlement to a higher court trial). Generally, justices imposed no penalty (7.5% of cases) or fined (84.9%) those who appeared, however 54 defendants were imprisoned (average sentence 3 weeks). Defendants appearing outside Adelaide were also more likely to have been arrested rather than summonsed, and to have been remanded in custody before appearing.

#### Aboriginal Defendants

Earlier reports have discussed the interaction between the criminal justice system and some minority groups, such as aboriginal people. Returns for July-December 1981 again highlight this issue. Although aboriginal defendants comprised about 12 percent of defendants, most were charged with minor offences such as drunkenness and vagrancy - 29.3 percent appearing in Courts outside Adelaide. As in the first half of the year, aboriginal defendants seemed less likely to receive bail or to be allowed at liberty for minor offences - where bail status was recorded, 5 times as many aboriginal defendants in country areas had been remanded in custody.

Although relatively few defendants received gaol sentences for minor 'offensive behavior' offences, those from aboriginal backgrounds were nearly two and a half times more likely to receive this penalty. From corrections statistics\* it is also clear that disproportionate numbers of aboriginal defendants also are gaoled because they are unable (or unwilling) to pay fines.

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#### APPENDIX A : EXPLANATORY NOTES ON TABLES

#### A. Definitions

#### (i) Offence Categories

Offence categories are based on definitions in the Police Uniform Crime Code (UCC). Detailed lists of offences in each category can be obtained from the Office of Crime Statistics.

#### (ii) Major Offence

Basically, the major offence is the most serious offence with which the defendant was charged. Thus:

> . if the defendant was not found guilty of any offence, the major offence is the charge for which the highest statutory penalty is prescribed;

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- . if the defendant was found not guilty of a higher offence but guilty of a lesser offence, the major offence is the higher offence initially charged;
- . otherwise when a defendant is found guilty of any offence, the major offence is the offence for which the highest penalty was handed down.

(iii) Offence Type

To enable broad comparisons, offences have been grouped into twenty major types. The following is a list of the offence types and the comparable offences.

#### Offences Against the Person

Murder; Attempted Murder; Cause Death by Driving; Major Assault; Cause Injury by Driving; Minor Assault; Assault Police; Assault (Nature Unspecified); Endanger Life; Kidnap; Abduction.

#### Robbery and Extortion

Robbery with Major Assault; Robbery with Minor Assault.

Sexual Offences

Rape of Female; Attempted Rape of Female; Incest,-Carnal Knowledge of Female; Indecent Assault on Female; Indecent Interference on Female; Indecent Assault on Male.



#### Drug Offences
