THE JUDICIAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED STATES, 28 U.S.C. 331

§ 331. JUDICIAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED STATES

The Chief Justice of the United States shall summon annually the chief judge of each judicial circuit, the chief judge of the Court of Claims, the chief judge of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals, and a district judge from each judicial circuit to a conference at such time and place in the United States as he may designate. He shall preside at such conference which shall be known as the Judicial Conference of the United States. Special sessions of the conference may be called by the Chief Justice at such times and places as he may designate.

The district judge to be summoned from each judicial circuit shall be chosen by the circuit and district judges of the circuit at the annual judicial conference of the circuit held pursuant to section 333 of this title and shall serve as a member of the conference for three successive years, except that in the year following the enactment of this amended section the judges in the first, fourth, seventh, and tenth circuits shall choose a district judge to serve for one year, the judges in the second, fifth, and eighth circuits shall choose a district judge to serve for two years and the judges in the third, sixth, ninth, and District of Columbia circuits shall choose a district judge to serve for three years.

If the chief judge of any circuit or the district judge chosen by the judges of the circuit is unable to attend, the Chief Justice may summon any other circuit or district judge from such circuit. If the chief judge of the Court of Claims or the chief judge of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals is unable to attend, the Chief Justice may summon an associate judge of such court. Every judge summoned shall attend and, unless excused by the Chief Justice, shall remain throughout the sessions of the conference and advise as to the needs of his circuit or court and as to any matters in respect of which the administration of justice in the courts of the United States may be improved.

The conference shall make a comprehensive survey of the condition of business in the courts of the United States and prepare plans for assignment of judges to or from circuits or districts where necessary, and shall submit suggestions to the various courts, in the interest of uniformity and expedition of business.

The conference shall also carry on a continuous study of the operation and effect of the general rules of practice and procedure now or hereafter in use as prescribed by the Supreme Court for the other courts of the United States pursuant to law. Such changes in and additions to those rules as the conference may deem desirable to promote simplicity in procedure, fairness in administration, the just determination of litigation, and the elimination of unjustifiable expense and delay shall be recommended by the conference from time to time to the Supreme Court for its consideration and adoption, modification or rejection, in accordance with law.

The Attorney General shall, upon request of the Chief Justice, report to such conference on matters relating to the business of the several courts of the United States, with particular reference to cases to which the United States is a party.

The Chief Justice shall submit to Congress an annual report of the proceedings of the Judicial Conference and its recommendations for legislation.

Report of the Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States

March 7-9, 1979

The Judicial Conference of the United States convened on March 7, 1979, pursuant to the call of the Chief Justice of the United States, issued under 28 U.S.C. 331, and continued in session on March 8 and 9. The Chief Justice presided and the following members of the Conference were present:

The Attorney General of the United States, Honorable Griffin B. Bell, accompanied by the Solicitor General, Honorable Wade H. McCree, attended the morning session of the first day of the Conference and addressed the Conference briefly on matters of mutual interest to the Department of Justice and the Conference.

William E. Foley, Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts; Joseph F. Spaniol, Jr., Deputy Director; James E. Macklin, Jr., Assistant Director; and Mark W. Cannon, Administrative Assistant to the Chief Justice, attended all sessions of the Conference.

The Director of the Federal Judicial Center, A. Leo Levin, reported on the activities of the Center since the last session of the Conference.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES COURTS

The Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, Mr. William E. Foley, submitted to the Conference a brief report on the caseloads of the United States courts during the calendar year 1978. Mr. Foley reported that

appeals docketed in the courts of appeals increased from 18,948 in 1977 to 19,471 in 1978, an increase of 2.8 percent. Appeals were terminated at a slightly higher rate (.8 percent) than the previous year, but were less than filings. As a result, appeals pending on the dockets of the courts of appeals climbed to an all-time high of 17,771 on December 31, 1978, an increase of 8.2 percent.

During the calendar year 1978 there were 144,212 new civil cases docketed in the United States district courts, a 6.6 percent increase over the previous year. Civil cases disposed of climbed 10.5 percent to a record 134,248 cases, but dispositions were almost 10,000 cases less than the number filed. As a result the pending civil caseload in the district courts grew 6.1 percent to a record 173,827 cases pending on December 31, 1978.

During 1978 there were 33,573 criminal cases docketed in the district courts, 4,702 cases fewer than the previous year. Criminal cases disposed of in the district courts during the year declined 19.1 percent, but exceeded new filings by four cases. On December 31, 1978 there were 16,123 criminal cases pending on the dockets of the district courts.

In 1978 there were 208,278 new bankruptcy cases filed in the district courts, compared with 208,433 filed in 1977. There were 209,082 bankruptcy cases closed, and the pending caseload declined slightly to 244,753 on December 31, 1978.

REPORT OF THE FEDERAL JUDICIAL CENTER

The Director of the Federal Judicial Center, A. Leo Levin, reported to the Conference that the Center has developed plans to conduct seminars for the new judges to be appointed under the Omnibus Judgeship Act. The Center is also planning to send various informative materials to all new judges at the time of their appointment and in advance of the seminars. Director Levin also reported that the Center is progressing with the COURTRAN system of record keeping in the district courts and is expanding the system to include applications in the courts of appeals.

JUDICIAL PANEL ON MULTIDISTRICT LITIGATION

The report submitted on behalf of the Judicial Panel on Multidistrict Litigation indicated that the Panel had conducted four hearings during the six-month period ending December 31, 1978 and had issued 33 main orders, most of which were accompanied by opinions of the Panel. The Panel has acted on 14 new groups of multidistrict litigation cases in the last six months and has ordered transfers in eight groups encompassing 60 civil actions. Of these, 24 actions were transferred for purposes of pretrial procedure and 36 were actions originally filed in the transferee districts. The Panel denied transfers in six groups of cases consisting of 24 actions. In addition, 202 other cases were transferred by the Panel as tag-along cases for inclusion in on-going proceedings. Since the establishment of the Panel in 1968 there have been 6,738 civil actions centralized in pretrial proceedings under 28 U.S.C. 1407.

COMMITTEE ON COURT ADMINISTRATION

Judge Elmo B. Hunter, Chairman of the Committee on Court Administration, presented the Committee report.

JUDICIAL TENURE

The Conference in September 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 50) directed the Committee to conduct a study to determine whether legislation is necessary to clarify the powers of the Judicial Councils of the Circuits to adopt procedures for the examination of judicial conduct in cases where it is warranted and to take appropriate action with respect to such instances. Judge Hunter submitted for Conference consideration amendments to 28 U.S.C. 332, drafted by the Committee, to provide for circuit council consideration of complaints involving judicial misconduct.

After full discussion the Conference agreed that the Judicial Councils of the Circuits should be involved in the examination of complaints relating to judicial conduct and that the

procedure should be formalized. The Conference thereupon adopted the following resolution:

1. The Judicial Conference of the United States expresses its approval of the following principles to be reflected in any legislation dealing with procedures for inquiries into the conduct of Federal judges:

(a) Removal of an Article III judge from office by any method other than impeachment as provided in Article I of the Constitution would raise grave constitutional questions which should be avoided.

(b) The primary responsibility for dealing with a complaint against a United States judge should rest initially with the chief judge of the circuit as presiding judge of the Judicial Council, who may dismiss the complaint if it is frivolous or relates to the merits of a decision or procedural ruling, or may close the complaint after assuring himself that appropriate corrective action has been taken.

(c) Any complaint not dismissed or closed by the presiding judge should be referred to a committee appointed by the presiding judge, consisting of an equal number of circuit and district judges and the presiding judge.

(d) The joint committee should report its findings and recommendations to the Judicial Council, which should take such action as is appropriate to assure the effective and expeditious administration of the business of the courts within the circuit.

(e) The Judicial Council may, in its discretion, refer a complaint and the Council's recommended action to the Judicial Conference of the United States.

(f) If the Judicial Council concludes that grounds for impeachment may exist, it should transmit the record upon which its conclusion is based to the Judicial Conference of the United States; the Judicial Conference shall then determine whether, in all the circumstances, the matter should be referred to the House of Representatives.

2. The Judicial Conference recommends that the Judicial Councils of the several circuits, at their earliest opportunity, consider the formulation and promulgation of rules of procedure for the receipt and processing of complaints against judges in accordance with the principles expressed in paragraph 1; such rules and regulations should be announced in such manner as to assure that the public and the bar will be informed.

3. The Chairman of the Court Administration Committee and the members of the Executive Committee of the Conference are directed (1) to review and revise, in accordance with the principles stated in paragraph 1, the Court Administration Committee's proposed amendments to 28 U.S.C. §332, and (2) to transmit the revised proposed amendments to all members of the Conference for their approval. Following approval by the Conference, the Chairman of the Court Administration Committee, if called upon by the Congress to testify upon pending legislation, is authorized to inform the Congress that, if legislative action is to be taken, the Conference recommends amendments to 28 U.S.C. §332 as approved by the Conference in accordance with this paragraph.

4. All previous Judicial Conference resolutions or comments upon legislation dealing with the conduct of Federal judges are superseded by this resolution.

MEMBERSHIP OF DISTRICT JUDGES ON CIRCUIT COUNCILS

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that the Committee, in considering proposed amendments to 28 U.S.C. 332, had made provision for the inclusion of district judges as members of the Judicial Councils of the Circuits. The Conference, after full discussion, concluded that district judges should be represented on the Judicial Councils of the Circuits and adopted the following resolution:

The Judicial Conference of the United States expresses its approval of the following principles to be reflected in any legislation dealing with the membership of the Judicial Councils of the Circuits:

1. Any Judicial Council having less than six circuit judges as members shall have, as members, not less than two district judges in regular active service.
2. Any Circuit Council having six or more circuit judges as members shall have, as members, not less than three district judges in regular active service.
3. The number of district judge members of a Judicial Council, fixed in accordance with the above principles, shall be fixed by majority vote of the active circuit judges of the Council.
4. District judges shall serve as members of a Judicial Council in the order of their seniority, for terms of three years.
5. No more than one district judge from any one district

shall serve simultaneously on the Circuit Council, unless there is already a representative on the Council from each district in the circuit.

UNIFORM RULES OF DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

At its session in September 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 42) the Conference approved model rules of disciplinary enforcement and authorized their distribution to all circuit and district courts with a recommendation that they be adopted by these courts on an optional basis. Recently, concern has been expressed about the provisions of Rules XI and XII requiring every attorney practicing in a Federal court to pay an annual fee into a fund to be administered centrally by the Administrative Office of the United States Courts. Some courts have already adopted the recommended rules without including any provision for the payment of an annual attorney's fee.

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that the Committee is now of the view that the collection of fees should be left to the discretion of each court and that any fees collected should be retained in a fund to be administered locally by each court. Upon recommendation of the Committee the Conference approved the following notes to be shown under the present headings for Rules XI and XII in lieu of the original text.

Rule XI

Periodic Assessment of Attorneys: Registration Statements

Note: Each Court shall make such provisions as it deems advisable for the assessment and registration of attorneys. Any fees collected should be maintained in a separate fund held by the Clerk of Court, as trustee, for the payment, pursuant to Rule XII, of expenditures incurred, and not on behalf of the United States.

Rule XII

Payment of Fees and Costs

Note: Each Court may make such provision as it deems advisable for the payment of fees and costs incurred in the course of a disciplinary investigation or prosecution.

LIBRARIES

The report of the Board of the Federal Judicial Center for improving libraries and research services in the Federal

courts recommended the creation of the position of Director of Federal Court Libraries in the Administrative Office. The position has been created and was recently filled by a professional law librarian who for several months has been studying Federal court libraries and consulting with court personnel. In order to assist the Director of Libraries in working toward better central library facilities and to improve the list of law books regularly furnished to new judges, as approved by the Conference in September 1964 (Conf. Rept., p. 5), the Conference, upon recommendation of the Committee, adopted the following resolution:

In furtherance of prior policy statements regarding the furnishing of adequate library facilities for Federal judges, the Judicial Conference authorizes the Director of the Administrative Office to take such action as necessary to provide judges and other court personnel with all legal research material and services necessary to fulfill their functions. In so doing, he shall endeavor to establish and maintain well-organized, adequate and professionally administered central libraries when such would facilitate essential sharing of materials and ensure the efficient use of appropriated funds. He shall provide lawbooks, other legal research materials and services for chambers libraries after having given due consideration to the availability of central library facilities and after having allowed flexibility and latitude to the end that the lawbook requirements of chambers libraries may be satisfied.

The Judicial Conference further authorizes the Chairman of the Committee on Court Administration to designate three judges of that Committee to constitute an ad hoc group with which the Director of the Administrative Office may consult informally to resolve, on a continuing basis, policy matters related to the creation, maintenance and administration of libraries.

ASSOCIATIONS OF DISTRICT JUDGES

Judge Hunter advised the Conference that the Ninth Circuit District Judges Association had adopted a resolution calling for the statutory recognition of associations of district judges and an authorization for the payment of expenses to attend association meetings. The Committee reported that it could find no justification for such legislation, particularly in

view of the number of associations representing other categories of members of the court family which would also call for recognition. Upon recommendation of the Committee the Conference disapproved the proposal.

SCHEDULE OF FEES IN FEDERAL COURTS

The Conference, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 1913 and 1914(b), is authorized to prescribe the fees and costs to be charged and collected in each United States court of appeals, and the fees, in addition to statutory filing fees, to be charged and collected in each United States district court. The fee schedules prescribed by the Conference have not been reviewed since September 1973 (Conf. Rept., p. 44). In addition, the new Bankruptcy Act requires the Conference to prescribe the miscellaneous fees to be charged in bankruptcy courts pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 1930.

Judge Hunter submitted to the Conference revised schedules of fees to be charged and collected in the courts of appeals and district courts, and a new miscellaneous fee schedule for bankruptcy courts. Upon the recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved the following fee schedules to become effective October 1, 1979:

Judicial Conference Schedule of Fees for United States Courts of Appeals

Fees to be paid to clerks of courts of appeals (except that no fees are to be charged for services rendered on behalf of the United States).

1. For docketing a case on appeal or review, or docketing any other proceeding—\$65.00. A separate fee shall be paid by each party filing a notice of appeal in the district court, but parties filing a joint notice of appeal in the district court are required to pay only one fee. A docketing fee shall not be charged for the docketing of an application for the allowance of an interlocutory appeal under 28 U.S.C. 1292(b), unless the appeal is allowed.
2. For every search of the records of the court and certifying the results thereof, \$2.00.
3. For certifying any document, or paper, whether the cer-

- tification is made directly on the document, or by separate instrument, \$2.00.
4. For reproducing any record or paper, 50 cents per page. This fee does not include certification.
 5. For comparing with the original thereof any copy of any transcript of record, entry, record or paper, when such copy is furnished by any person requesting certification, \$2.00 per page or fraction thereof. This fee is in addition to the fee for certification.
 6. For reproduction of magnetic tape audio recordings, either cassette or reel-to-reel, \$2.00 plus the cost of materials, minimum charge \$5.00.
 7. For reproduction of the record in any appeal in which the requirement of an appendix is dispensed with by any court of appeals pursuant to Rule 30(f), Federal Rules of Appellate Procedure, a flat fee of \$25.00.
 8. Fees to be charged and collected for copies of opinions shall be fixed, from time to time, by each court, commensurate with the cost of printing.

No other fees for miscellaneous services than those prescribed by the Judicial Conference of the United States shall be charged or collected by any clerk of court.

*Judicial Conference Schedule of Additional
Fees for the United States District Courts*

Fees to be charged for services performed by clerks of the district courts (except that no fees are to be charged for services rendered on behalf of the United States).

1. For filing or indexing any paper not in a case or proceeding for which a case filing fee has been paid, \$3.00. This fee is applicable to the filing of a petition to perpetuate testimony, Rule 27(a), Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, the filing of papers by trustees under 28 U.S.C. 754, and the filing of letters rogatory or letters of request, except that the fee for registering a judgment from another district pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 1963 shall be \$10.00.
2. For filing a requisition for and certifying the results of a search of the records of the court for judgments, decrees, other instruments, suits pending, and bankruptcy proceedings, \$2.00 for each name searched.
3. For certifying any document or paper, whether the certification is made directly on the document or by separate instrument, \$2.00.

4. For reproducing any record or paper, 50 cents per page. This fee does not include certification.
5. For comparing with the original thereof any copy of any transcript of record, entry, record or paper, when such copy is furnished by any person requesting certification, \$2.00 per page or fraction thereof. This fee is in addition to the fee for certification.
6. For reproduction of magnetic tape audio recordings, either cassette or reel-to-reel, \$2.00 plus the cost of materials, minimum charge \$5.00.
7. For admission of attorneys to practice, \$15.00 each, including a certificate of admission. For a duplicate certificate of admission or certificate of good standing, \$3.00.

No other fees for miscellaneous services than those prescribed by the Judicial Conference of the United States shall be charged or collected by any clerk of court.

*Judicial Conference Schedule of Additional Fees
for United States Bankruptcy Courts*

Services to be performed by clerks of the bankruptcy courts (except that no fees are to be charged for services rendered on behalf of the United States).

1. For reproducing any record or paper 50 cents per page. This fee does not include certification.
2. For certifying any document or paper, whether the certification is made directly on the document or by separate instrument, \$2.00.
2. For comparing with the original thereof any copy of any transcript of record, entry, record or paper, when such copy is furnished by any person requesting certification, \$2.00 per page or fraction thereof. This fee is in addition to the fee for certification.
4. For reproduction of magnetic tape audio recordings, either cassette or reel-to-reel; \$2.00 plus the cost of materials, minimum charge \$5.00.
5. For amendments to a debtor's schedules or lists of creditors after notice to creditors, \$10.00 for each amendment, provided the bankruptcy judge may, for good cause, waive the charge in any case.
6. For every search of the records of the bankruptcy court conducted by the clerk of the bankruptcy court or one of his deputies, \$2.00 per name or item searched.

7. For instituting any civil action, suit or proceeding in a controversy over which the bankruptcy court does not have exclusive jurisdiction, whether by original process, removal or otherwise, \$60.00; for filing a complaint in a controversy over which the court has exclusive jurisdiction, \$15.00.

If the United States, other than the United States Trustee acting as trustee in a case under Title II, is the plaintiff, no fee is required.

If the trustee in a case under Title II is the plaintiff, the fee shall be payable only from the estate and to the extent there is any estate.

8. For filing or indexing any paper not in a case or proceeding for which a filing fee has been paid, \$3.00, except that the fee for registering a judgment from another district shall be \$10.00.

OTHER FEES

At its April 1973 session (Conf. Rept., p. 4) the Conference approved in principle legislation which would place the fixing of fees in all proceedings in the courts of the United States under the control of the Judicial Conference in order to permit frequent review and greater flexibility. The Conference reaffirmed its approval in principle of this legislation and authorized the Director of the Administrative Office to prepare appropriate legislation to be transmitted to the Congress.

COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCES FOR JUDICIAL OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES SERVING OUTSIDE THE CONTINENTAL UNITED STATES OR IN ALASKA

S. 3008, 95th Congress, would authorize an allowance based upon living costs for judicial officers and employees serving outside the continental United States or in Alaska. The bill would provide a non-taxable allowance to officers and employees serving in these courts similar to allowances given to officers and employees in the Executive Branch of Government. Judicial employees now receive a cost-of-living allowance which is taxable, but judicial officers do not receive any allowance.

The Committee recommended that, as a matter of equity, officers and employees in the Judicial Branch of Government should receive the same cost-of-living allowances provided in the Executive Branch to officers and employees serving outside the continental United States or in Alaska. This recommendation was approved by the Conference.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION OF THE SUPREME COURT

S. 3100, 95th Congress, would eliminate direct appeals to the Supreme Court from decisions of Federal courts invalidating Acts of Congress [28 U.S.C. 1252]; appeals from decisions of courts of appeals invalidating state statutes [28 U.S.C. 1254(a)]; appeals from decisions of state courts invalidating treaties or statutes of the United States [28 U.S.C. 1257(1)], or sustaining the validity of state statutes challenged on Federal constitutional or statutory grounds [28 U.S.C. 1257(2)]; and appeals from the Supreme Court of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico [28 U.S.C. 1258]. The bill would also eliminate appeals under three other statutes: the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, [2 U.S.C. 437h]; Indian Claims, [28 U.S.C. 652]; and the Trans-Alaska Pipeline Authorization Act [43 U.S.C. 1652(d)]. Jurisdiction of these matters would continue in the Supreme Court on a writ of certiorari. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved the bill.

AIR DISASTER LITIGATION

The Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee had requested the views of the Conference on H.R. 10917, 95th Congress, a bill to create a uniform body of law governing liability for "injury to or loss of property or any personal injury or death" arising out of aviation activity and to improve procedures for litigating controversies arising out of airline disasters.

The bill would require a common carrier to exercise "the highest degree of care for the safety of its passengers"; adopt the rule of comparative fault; provide a right of contribution; specify the rights of surviving spouses, children, parents, or

dependent relatives; permit the awarding of damages for pecuniary losses including "loss of care, comfort, and society sustained by those for whose benefit the right of action exists," but not "pain, suffering or disfigurement"; and require that actions arising under the bill be brought generally within a period of two years. The district courts would be given jurisdiction, concurrent with state courts, of civil actions involving "large," "high-performance," "public," or "common carrier aircraft," involving the United States, or resulting in the deaths of five or more persons. State courts would be given exclusive jurisdiction over all other actions involving aviation activity.

It was the view of the Committee that it is inappropriate for the judiciary to comment on the provisions of the bill relating to the duty of care to be imposed upon common carriers, the measure of damages and the appropriate statute of limitations. The Committee did note various provisions of the bill which concerned the Committee and others which require re-drafting.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee the Conference endorsed the two principal objectives of the bill to create a coherent body of aviation law and to provide a less cumbersome means of litigating cases arising out of a common airline disaster, but disapproved the provision of the bill authorizing the Judicial Panel on Multidistrict Litigation to transfer cases for trial purposes. The Committee was authorized to communicate its views regarding particular provisions of the bill to the appropriate Committees of the Congress and to work with Congressional Committees on the bill.

VIRGIN ISLANDS FEDERAL RELATIONS ACT

Anticipating a favorable vote on a new Constitution for the Peoples of the Virgin Islands, the Committee recommended that any bill defining the relationship between the local courts of the Virgin Islands and the federal courts include these provisions: (1) that the District Court of the Virgin Islands specifically be given jurisdiction in diversity of citizenship cases, as well as Federal question cases; (2) that its name be changed from the "District Court of the Virgin Islands" to the "United States District Court for the Virgin

Islands"; and (3) that decisions of the Supreme Court of the Virgin Islands be reviewed by the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit rather than by the Supreme Court of the United States. The Conference approved the recommendations of the Committee.

TRANSFER OF CASES TO OTHER COURTS

In March 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 11) the Conference approved a recommendation of the Committee that provision be made by statute for the transfer of a case from one Federal court to another, in the event the case was not properly filed in the first court, and authorized the Director of the Administrative Office to draft a suitable bill for transmittal to the Congress. Subsequently, H.R. 11276 was introduced in the 95th Congress which would provide only for the transfer of cases between a court of appeals and a district court. The Conference approved the Committee's recommendation that this proposal be amended to provide that a case improperly filed in any Federal court shall, in the interest of justice, be transferred to any other Federal court in which it could have been filed and that the case proceed in that court as though it had originally been filed there.

SALARY LIMITATIONS ON A JUDGE'S PERSONAL STAFF

The Committee submitted two resolutions pertaining to the statutorily imposed monetary limitation on the aggregate salaries of a judge's personal staff. The first resolution would limit the use of these funds to the purposes for which they were provided, and the second resolution would increase the limitation to permit an increase in salary for the second secretary to a chief judge of a district court having five or more judgeships. Both resolutions were returned to the Committee for further study in consultation with the Committee on the Budget and in the light of the discussions in the Conference.

REEMPLOYED ANNUITANTS

The Conference in March 1959 (Conf. Rept., p. 295) approved a policy generally limiting the appointment of a re-

employed annuitant to a period not to exceed one year. This limitation was later increased to a period of 18 months. It was brought to the attention of the Conference that this policy of imposing an administratively determined limitation on the hiring of reemployed annuitants may conflict with the Age Discrimination in Employment Act Amendments of 1978 which eliminated mandatory retirement at age 70 for all government employees. The Conference thereupon adopted the following resolution submitted by the Committee:

In view of the elimination of mandatory retirement at age 70 for Federal employees, the Conference resolves that all restrictions on the term of appointments of reemployed annuitants, except for employees covered under hazardous duty retirement, are removed and made consistent with prevailing laws and practices.

COURT REPORTERS

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that two provisions relating to qualification criteria for salary adjustments for court reporters appear too restrictive, since they recognize for purposes of salary adjustments only a certificate from the National Shorthand Reporters Association. In order to broaden the qualification criteria for salary adjustments, Judge Hunter recommended, and the Conference approved, the following amendments to the first two paragraphs of the criteria approved by the Conference in September 1977 (Conf. Rept., p. 55):

(a) An applicant for appointment, hereafter, as an official court reporter in a United States district court shall possess as a minimum requirement at least four years of prime court reporting experience in the free lance field of service or in other courts or a combination thereof, and have qualified by testing for listing on the registry of professional reporters of the National Shorthand Reporters Association or passed an equivalent qualifying examination.

(2) All official court reporters who have satisfactorily met the qualification requirements outlined in (1) above who, in addition, possess a Certificate of Merit from the National Shorthand Reporters Association or have passed an equivalent examination shall receive as a salary a starting salary for court

reporters set by the Judicial Conference, plus a five percent meritorious increase over that starting salary.

COMMITTEE ON THE BUDGET

The report of the Committee on the Budget was submitted by the Chairman of the Committee, Chief Judge Robert E. Maxwell.

SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1979

Judge Maxwell informed the Conference that requests for supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year 1979 to cover the general salary increase of 5.5 percent granted last October, and to cover increased costs resulting from new legislation, had been submitted to the Congress. The supplemental requests totalled \$44,385,000. The Congressional committees have been advised that if there is a delay in the appointment of judges under the Omnibus Judgeship Act, a reduction in the request for supplemental appropriations would be appropriate.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1980

Judge Maxwell also informed the Conference that the budget estimates for the fiscal year 1980, approved by the Conference last September, had been amended to take into account the impact of new legislation. Upon the recommendation of the Committee, the Director of the Administrative Office was authorized to submit to the Congress either a budget amendment or a request for supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year 1980 required for the implementation of any action taken by the Conference, for any new legislation, or for any other reason he considers necessary and appropriate.

LIMITATIONS ON SALARIES OF A JUDGE'S PERSONAL STAFF

The budget request for the fiscal year 1980 included funds for the appointment of a third law clerk and a second secre-

tary by a circuit judge, the appointment of a second law clerk by a district judge in lieu of a crier or crier-law clerk, and the reclassification of a law clerk from grade JSP-12 to grade JSP-13, if qualification standards are met. As a result, changes will be required in the language of the Appropriations Act increasing the amount of the limitation on the aggregate salaries paid to the personal staff of a judge.

Judge Maxwell reported that these limitations were discussed at the recent congressional hearings and that the Committee had suggested that the limitation language be stricken from the Appropriations Act, since it applies only to circuit and district judges and not to other judges and judicial officers. If the limitation is removed, the Conference would prescribe the criteria and exercise control over the number of secretaries and law clerks to be employed by circuit and district judges, in addition to controlling classification and qualification standards.

The Conference endorsed the action taken by the Budget Committee in requesting deletion of the limitation language and authorized the Subcommittee on Supporting Personnel to consider the criteria for determining the number of law clerks and secretaries that may be employed by circuit and district judges, in addition to determining the classification and qualification standards to be applied under the Judiciary Salary Plan.

SPACE AND FACILITIES

At the request of Judge Maxwell, the Conference authorized the Budget Committee to take such action as may be appropriate to preclude the imposition of any moratorium or restriction on the acquisition of space for the courts, particularly with regard to the requirements of new judges, by the Office of Management and Budget or by the General Services Administration, on the basis that such control over expenditures by the Executive Branch of the Government constitutes a violation of the separation of powers doctrine.

PRINTING OF OPINIONS

The Director of the Administrative Office, upon recommendation of the Committee, was authorized to study and ex-

plore the feasibility and desirability of printing opinions for the courts of appeals under contract with less costly facilities within or outside the geographical boundaries of a court, if the printing and distribution of opinions can be accomplished on a timely basis.

JUDICIAL ETHICS COMMITTEE

Judge Edward A. Tamm, Chairman of the Judicial Ethics Committee, presented the report of the Committee.

APPOINTMENT OF THE COMMITTEE

The Ethics in Government Act of 1971, Public Law 95-521, approved October 26, 1978, established a government-wide financial disclosure reporting system applicable to officers and high-ranking executives serving in the Legislative, Executive and Judicial Branches of Government. The Act requires the appointment of a Judicial Ethics Committee in the Judicial Branch of Government to receive and review the financial disclosure reports required to be submitted under the Act and to perform other prescribed duties. Judge Tamm informed the Conference that subsequent to the passage of the Act, the Chief Justice, with Conference approval, had named the members of the former Review Committee of the Judicial Conference to serve initially as the new Judicial Ethics Committee.

The Act requires each justice and judge of the United States to file an annual financial disclosure report with the Judicial Ethics Committee and with the clerk of court. A similar report is required to be filed by "any employee of the Judicial Branch of Government who is authorized to perform adjudicatory functions with respect to the judicial branch or who receives compensation at a rate at or in excess of the minimum rate prescribed for grade 16 of the General Schedule . . ." The annual report must be filed on or before May 15th of each year by an individual who served 60 days or more during the preceding calendar year. In addition to the annual report, a nominee to a judgeship position must file a report within five days of nomination, and a judicial employee must file a

report within 30 days of assuming a position that requires reporting. A report is also required to be filed within 30 days after termination of employment.

Each reporting individual is also required to include as part of his report certain financial information pertaining to the spouse and dependent children.

REPORTING FORM AND INSTRUCTIONS, RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Committee submitted to the Conference a draft Financial Disclosure Form and the Instructions, Rules and Regulations, devised by the Committee, for the annual report due on May 15th. Judge Tamm informed the Conference that in view of a perceived need for reporting individuals to have these materials available at an early date, the Committee had requested the Administrative Office to print and distribute the Committee-approved form and the Instructions, Rules and Regulations as soon as possible. The Conference ratified the action taken by the Committee and approved the reporting form and the accompanying Instructions, Rules and Regulations, with the understanding that a reporting individual may indicate a business address on the reporting form, rather than a home address.

FILING REGULATIONS

The Act requires that the original of the financial disclosure report be filed with the Judicial Ethics Committee and that a copy thereof be filed with the clerk of court in which the reporting individual serves. The reports are public documents. For administrative purposes the Committee is requiring that the original and one copy be filed with the Committee. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference took the following action with respect to other filing requirements:

- (A) That officers and employees of the Administrative Office and the Federal Judicial Center file their reports only with the Committee and not with any clerk of court;
- (B) That bankruptcy judges file two copies of their reports with the Committee and one copy with the clerk of the district courts, until such time as clerks of bankruptcy

- courts are appointed under the new Bankruptcy Act; and
- (C) That part-time bankruptcy judges and part-time United States magistrates, who do not work in excess of 60 days, in the reporting calendar year and so certify in writing to the Committee, not be required to file financial disclosure reports.

METHODS OF VALUATION

The Act requires the Committee, with the approval of the Judicial Conference, to "promulgate a regulation establishing a method or methods for readily determining, without the necessity of expert appraisal, the fair market value of assets required to be disclosed . . ." Judge Tamm informed the Conference that the instructions for executing the reporting form set forth eight alternate methods of determining valuation. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved these options as the regulations of the Committee for determining valuation.

EXTENSIONS OF TIME FOR FILING REPORTS

The Act provides that "reasonable extensions of time for filing any report may be granted under procedures prescribed by the Judicial Ethics Committee . . . but the total of such extensions shall not exceed 90 days." The Committee recommended that in circumstances other than extreme emergencies a request for an extension of time to file a report must be submitted at least 30 days prior to the date on which the report is due and that the request be submitted in writing addressed to the Chairman of the Judicial Ethics Committee. This procedure was approved by the Conference.

GIFTS OF BOOKS AND PERIODICALS

The Conference approved the recommendation of the Committee that gifts of books and periodicals received by judicial officers and judicial employees for official use, and so used for official purposes, not be reported as gifts.

INSPECTION OF REPORTS

The Act provides that a copy of the financial disclosure report filed with the clerk of court is a "public document." Judge Tamm informed the Conference that the Committee believes that each court should decide on its own how these reports are to be filed in the clerk's office and the manner in which they should be made available to the public for inspection and copying.

The Act also requires the Committee, within 15 days after any report is received, to "permit inspection by or furnish a copy of such report to any person requesting such inspection or copy." Judge Tamm reported that the Committee has developed an orderly procedure for handling requests to inspect or copy reports which involves the use of a request form. As a matter of policy the Committee will not notify a reporting individual that a request has been made to inspect his report unless requested to do so by the reporting individual and only with respect to requests previously made. At the request of the Committee these procedures were approved by the Conference.

The Conference also approved a fee of 25 cents per page to be charged by the Ethics Committee for furnishing a copy of a document. The discretion given to the Committee to waive the copy fee will be exercised by the Chairman.

RESOLUTIONS PERTAINING TO THE REVIEW COMMITTEE

Since the Conference-approved program of financial reporting and disclosure, adopted in March 1970, has now been superseded by the new Act, the Conference rescinded the following resolutions pertaining exclusively to the Review Committee:

1. The March 1970 resolution requiring financial reporting by all federal judges (Conf. Rept., p. 6).
2. The March 1971 resolution establishing a procedure for reporting the names of judges who failed to report (Conf. Rept., p. 24).
3. The October 1971 resolution authorizing the Review Committee to suggest to a reporting judge that he make inquiry to the Advisory Committee (Conf. Rept., p. 68).

4. The October 1972 resolution extending the reporting requirement to full-time magistrates and full-time referees in bankruptcy (Conf. Rept., p. 42).
5. The March 1977 resolution extending the reporting requirement to certain other officers and employees of the Federal Judiciary (Conf. Rept., p. 12).
6. The September 1977 resolution extending the reporting requirement to certain public defenders (Conf. Rept., p. 59).
7. The March 1978 resolution directing that the reasons for non-filing not be included in public reports (Conf. Rept. p. 14).

APPLICABILITY OF THE CODE OF JUDICIAL CONDUCT

The Committee perceived that situations may arise in which the provisions of the *Code of Judicial Conduct for United States Judges* may appear to vary from the standards established under the new Ethics in Government Act. The Conference agreed with the recommendation of the Committee, that, if this should occur, the stricter standard, whether in the Code or in the Act, should apply.

NOMINEES TO JUDICIAL OFFICE

To avoid the necessity of prescribing a separate form to be filed by judicial nominees, the Conference approved the use of the form prescribed by the Office of Government Ethics for nominees to positions in the Executive Branch of Government for the reports required of judicial nominees.

ADVISORY PANEL

The Conference authorized the Chief Justice to appoint an Advisory Panel of the Conference to respond to requests from reporting individuals for advice and assistance on problems relating to reporting under the Ethics in Government Act of 1978, so as to insure, insofar as possible, uniformity in reporting under the Act. The Director of the Administrative Office was authorized to provide support for the Advisory Panel and to incur obligations for this purpose.

Judge Tamm informed the Conference that the Judicial Ethics Committee would consider granting extensions of time, up to 90 days, to individuals who request such extensions pending action by the Advisory Panel on any request for an opinion or advice.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON THE CODE OF JUDICIAL CONDUCT

The report of the Joint Committee on the Code of Judicial Conduct, chaired by Judges Edward A. Tamm and William B. Jones, was presented by Judge Tamm.

INVESTITIVE, CEREMONIAL AND NATURALIZATION PROCEEDINGS

The Conference in September 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 55) returned to the Committee for further study a proposal to amend Canon 3A(7) of the *Code of Judicial Conduct for United States Judges* to permit the "taking of still photographs" in connection with naturalization and other ceremonial proceedings in the circuit and district courts. Judge Tamm reported that the Committee had concluded that the Canon should continue to prohibit the broadcasting, televising, recording, or taking of photographs in the courtroom and areas immediately adjacent thereto during sessions of court or recesses between sessions, but that an exception should be authorized with respect to investitive, ceremonial, and naturalization proceedings. The Conference accordingly approved the recommendation of the Committee that Canon 3A(7) of the *Code of Judicial Conduct for United States Judges* be amended to read as follows:

7. A judge should prohibit broadcasting, televising, recording, or taking photographs in the courtroom and areas immediately adjacent thereto during sessions of court or recesses between sessions except that a judge may authorize:
 - (a) the use of electronic or photographic means for the presentation of evidence, or for the perpetuation of a record; and
 - (b) the broadcasting, televising, recording, or photographing of investitive, ceremonial, or naturalization proceedings.

Upon recommendation of the Committee the Conference also amended the March 1962 resolution pertaining to courtroom photographs to read as follows:

RESOLVED, That the Judicial Conference of the United States condemns the taking of photographs in the courtroom or its environs in connection with any judicial proceedings, and the broadcasting of judicial proceedings by radio, television, or other means, and considers such practices to be inconsistent with fair judicial procedure and that they ought not be permitted in any federal court. A judge may, however, permit the broadcasting, televising, recording, or photographing of investitive, ceremonial, or naturalization proceedings.

CODES OF CONDUCT FOR CLERKS OF COURT AND PROBATION OFFICERS

The Conference in September 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 54) authorized the Advisory Committee on Judicial Activities to render advisory opinions concerning the application and interpretation of the codes of conduct for clerks of court and probation officers only when requested by the chief judge of a circuit court, a chief judge of a district court, or by the Review Committee. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference also authorized the Advisory Committee on Judicial Activities to render advisory opinions on the Code of Conduct for Clerks of Court when requested by the Chief Judge of the Court of Claims or the Chief Judge of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals.

PARTICIPATION IN BUSINESS CORPORATIONS

The Conference in September 1963 (Conf. Rept., p. 62) adopted a resolution prohibiting a justice or judge from serving in the capacity of an officer, director, or employee of a corporation organized for profit. The Committee pointed out that the prohibition against a judicial officer serving in a business enterprise is now more comprehensively covered in Canon 5C(2) of the *Code of Judicial Conduct for United States Judges*. The Conference approved the Committee's suggestion that the 1963 resolution be rescinded as being obsolete in view of the provisions of the Code.

REMITTAL OF DISQUALIFICATION

The *Code of Judicial Conduct for United States Judges* does not authorize a waiver or remittal of disqualification in any situation, although a remittal of disqualification is authorized in certain situations by the disqualification statute, 28 U.S.C. 455, and by the Code of Judicial Conduct approved by the American Bar Association. Judge Tamm informed the Conference that the Committee was of the opinion that Canon 3 of the *Code of Judicial Conduct for United States Judges* should be made consistent with the disqualification statute. Accordingly, the Conference approved a recommendation that Canon 3 of the Code be amended by including therein a new Canon 3D to read as follows:

D. Remittal of Disqualification

A judge disqualified by the terms of Canon 3C(1), except in the circumstances specifically set out in subsections (a) through (e), may, instead of withdrawing from the proceeding, disclose on the record the basis of his disqualification. If, based on such disclosure, the parties and lawyers, independently of the Judge's participation, all agree in writing that the Judge's disqualification should be waived, the judge is no longer disqualified and may participate in the proceeding. The agreement, signed by all parties and lawyers, shall be incorporated in the record of the proceeding.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON JUDICIAL ACTIVITIES

The report of the Advisory Committee on Judicial Activities, chaired by Judge William B. Jones, was made by Chief Judge Frank M. Coffin, a member of the Committee.

Judge Coffin reported that in the last six months 15 new inquiries were received by the Committee compared with 22 inquiries received during the previous six-month period and that the Committee had issued the following formal opinions:

Advisory Opinion No. 57—Disqualification in a case when a controlled subsidiary of a corporation in which a judge owns stock is a party.

Advisory Opinion No. 58—Disqualification in a case in which in which a relative is employed by a participating law firm.

In addition, the Committee is preparing three other formal opinions and is revising its Advisory Opinion No. 54 pertaining to the propriety of a judge writing a letter of approbation or recommendation to an appointing officer.

COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE FEDERAL MAGISTRATES SYSTEM

The Report of the Committee on the Administration of the Federal Magistrates System was presented by the Chairman, Judge Charles M. Metzner.

CHANGES IN MAGISTRATE POSITIONS

After consideration of the report of the Committee and the recommendations of the Director of the Administrative Office, the district courts and the judicial councils of the circuits, the Conference approved the following changes in salaries and arrangements for full-time and part-time magistrates. Unless otherwise indicated, these changes are to become effective when appropriated funds are available. The salaries for full-time magistrate positions are to be determined in accordance with the Judicial Conference Salary Plan.

FIRST CIRCUIT

District of Massachusetts

- (1) Authorized a fourth full-time magistrate position at Boston.

District of Rhode Island

- (1) Authorized the payment of additional compensation to the clerk of court at Providence for services performed as a magistrate in an aggregate amount equivalent to the salary of a clerk of a large district court.

District of Puerto Rico

- (1) Authorized a third full-time magistrate position at San Juan.
- (2) Discontinued the combination clerk-magistrate position at San Juan, effective upon the appointment of the third full-time magistrate.

SECOND CIRCUIT

District of Connecticut

- (1) Converted the part-time magistrate position at Bridgeport to full-time status.

Southern District of New York

- (1) Continued the two full-time magistrate positions at New York City, which are due to expire on May 16, 1979, for additional eight-year terms.
- (2) Authorized a seventh full-time magistrate position at New York City.
- (3) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Poughkeepsie for an additional four-year term at the currently authorized salary of \$7,650 per annum.

FOURTH CIRCUIT

Eastern District of North Carolina

- (1) Converted the part-time magistrate position at New Bern to full-time status.
- (2) Increased the salary for the part-time magistrate position at Wilmington from \$3,400 to \$4,250 per annum.

Western District of Virginia

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate positions at Shenandoah National Park, Lynchburg, and Danville for additional four-year terms at the currently authorized salaries of \$5,950, \$4,250, and \$2,550 per annum, respectively.
- (2) Discontinued the part-time magistrate position at Staunton upon the expiration of the incumbent's current term of office.

Southern District of West Virginia

- (1) Continued the full-time magistrate position at Charleston for an additional eight-year term of office.
- (2) Continued the part-time magistrate positions at Logan and Lewisburg for additional four-year terms at the currently authorized salaries of \$1,700 and \$850 per annum, respectively.

FIFTH CIRCUIT

Northern District of Alabama

- (1) Authorized a third full-time magistrate position at Birmingham.

- (2) Discontinued the part-time magistrate positions at "Huntsville or Decatur" and Florence effective upon the appointment of the new full-time magistrate.
- (3) Authorized a new part-time magistrate position at "Decatur or Huntsville" at a salary of \$4,250 per annum.

Northern District of Florida

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Tallahassee for an additional four-year term at the currently authorized salary of \$5,950 per annum.
- (2) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Panama City for an additional four-year term.
- (3) Increased the salary of the part-time magistrate position at Panama City from \$1,700 to \$4,250 per annum.

Middle District of Georgia

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Columbus for an additional four-year term at the currently authorized salary of \$14,450 per annum.

SIXTH CIRCUIT

Eastern District of Kentucky

- (1) Continued the full-time magistrate position at Lexington for an additional eight-year term.
- (2) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Covington for an additional four-year term at the currently authorized salary of \$5,950 per annum.

Western District of Kentucky

- (1) Converted the part-time magistrate position at Paducah to full-time status.
- (2) Authorized the chief deputy clerk at Louisville to perform the duties of a part-time magistrate without additional compensation.

Northern District of Ohio

- (1) Continued the full-time magistrate position at Cleveland, which is due to expire on July 14, 1979.

SEVENTH CIRCUIT

Central District of Illinois

- (1) Designated the existing full-time magistrate position at Spring-

field, the part-time magistrate position at Rock Island, the part-time magistrate position at Peoria, the combination clerk-magistrate position at Peoria, and the combination referee-magistrate position at Danville, to serve in the new Central District of Illinois.

Southern District of Illinois

- (1) Designated the existing full-time magistrate position at Benton and the part-time magistrate position at Belleville to serve in the new Southern District of Illinois.

Eastern District of Wisconsin

- (1) Authorized the clerk of court at Milwaukee to perform the duties of a part-time magistrate for an additional four-year term without additional compensation.

EIGHTH CIRCUIT

Western District of Arkansas

- (1) Converted the part-time magistrate position at Fort Smith to full-time status.

District of North Dakota

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Fargo for an additional four-year term at the currently authorized salary of \$4,250 per annum.
- (2) Increased the salary of the part-time magistrate position at Bismarck from \$2,550 to \$5,950 per annum.
- (3) Increased the salary of the part-time magistrate position at "Devils Lake or Minnewaukan" from \$1,700 to \$2,550 per annum.

District of South Dakota

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate positions at Pierre and Aberdeen for additional four-year terms at the currently authorized salaries of \$12,750 and \$1,700 per annum, respectively.
- (2) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Rapid City for an additional four-year term.
- (3) Increased the salary for the part-time magistrate position at Rapid City from \$9,350 to \$12,750 per annum.
- (4) Discontinued the part-time magistrate positions at Mobridge and Winner.

NINTH CIRCUIT

District of Arizona

- (1) Authorized a third full-time magistrate position at Phoenix.

Central District of California

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Twentynine Palms for an additional four-year term at the currently authorized salary of \$4,250 per annum.

Southern District of California

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at El Centro for an additional four-year term at the currently authorized salary of \$24,200 per annum.

District of Idaho

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Boise for an additional four-year term.
- (2) Increased the salary for the part-time magistrate position at Boise from \$3,400 to \$14,450 per annum.

Eastern District of Washington

- (1) Increased the salary of the part-time magistrate position at Yakima from \$7,650 to \$14,450 per annum.

TENTH CIRCUIT

District of New Mexico

- (1) Increased the salary for the part-time magistrate position at Albuquerque from \$14,450 to \$24,200 per annum.

District of Wyoming

- (1) Authorized a part-time magistrate position at Rawlins at a salary of \$850 per annum.

COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE BANKRUPTCY SYSTEM

The report of the Committee on the Administration of the Bankruptcy System was presented by the Chairman, Judge Edward Weinfeld.

SALARIES AND ARRANGEMENTS FOR REFEREES

The Conference considered the Committee report, together with the recommendations of the Director of the Administrative Office, the judicial councils of the circuits, and the district courts concerned, and took the following action relating to referee positions and changes in salaries and arrangements. The Conference directed that, subject to the availability of funds, these actions become effective on April 1, 1979, unless otherwise indicated.

SECOND CIRCUIT

Northern and Southern Districts of New York

- (1) Authorized the full-time referee at Poughkeepsie in the Southern District of New York to exercise concurrent jurisdiction with the referees of the Northern District of New York in the Counties of Columbia, Greene, and Ulster.
- (2) Designated Kingston as a regular place of holding bankruptcy court for the referee at Poughkeepsie.
- (3) Directed that the above changes become effective 180 days following the date of enactment of Public Law 95-408.

SEVENTH CIRCUIT

Northern, Central and Southern Districts of Illinois

- (1) Designated the part-time referee position at Danville in the former Eastern District of Illinois as a part-time referee position for the new Central District of Illinois, provided that during the period from April 1 through April 30, 1979 the part-time referee at Danville shall have jurisdiction over bankruptcy cases in Kankakee County.
- (2) Designated the full-time referee position at Peoria as a full-time position for the new Central District of Illinois.
- (3) Designated the full-time referee position at Springfield as a full-time referee position for the new Central District of Illinois.
- (4) Authorized concurrent district-wide jurisdiction for all referees in the new Central District of Illinois; designated Peoria, Springfield, Danville, Quincy, Decatur, Bloomington, Galesburg, Rock Island, Kankakee, and Mattoon as places of holding bankruptcy court for the new Central District of Illinois; and directed that headquarters offices of referees remain as at present.

- (5) Designated the full-time referee position at East St. Louis as a full-time position for the new Southern District of Illinois with East St. Louis, Cairo, Benton, and Alton as designated places of holding bankruptcy court with the headquarters office to remain as at present.
- (6) Directed that these changes become effective on April 1, 1979.

EIGHTH CIRCUIT

District of South Dakota

- (1) Converted the part-time referee position at Sioux Falls to full-time status as soon as appropriated funds are available to pay the increased salary authorized by the Congress for a full-time referee.
- (2) Designated Sioux Falls, Pierre, Aberdeen, Deadwood, and Rapid City as places of holding bankruptcy court for the full-time referee and authorized district-wide jurisdiction for the full-time position.

NINTH CIRCUIT

District of Oregon

- (1) Designated Salem and Lincoln City as places of holding bankruptcy court for the referees in the district in addition to Portland, Eugene, Pendleton, Roseburg, Medford, Klamath Falls, Bend, Astoria, Tillamook, The Dalles, Coos Bay, and La Grande.

REPORTING OF PROCEEDINGS IN THE BANKRUPTCY COURT

The Act to establish a uniform law on the subject of bankruptcies, Public Law 95-598, amended the Judicial Code, 28 U.S.C. 773, to require that a record be made in bankruptcy court, whenever practicable, of all proceedings conducted in open court. The Judicial Conference has been authorized to prescribe whether the record is to be made by electronic sound recording, by a court reporter appointed or employed by the bankruptcy court to take a verbatim record by shorthand or mechanical means, or by an employee of the court designated by the court to take a verbatim record.

The Conference, upon recommendation of the Committee, approved a general policy that (1) electronic sound recording equipment be used to record the first meeting of creditors;

(2) that live reporters be used for all judicial proceedings; and (3) that when the volume of business does not warrant the services of a full-time court reporter, contract reporters be used. The Conference directed the Administrative Office not to authorize full-time court reporters until the need for their services is fully justified, and further directed that, until such need is established, contract reporters be authorized.

COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROBATION SYSTEM

The report of the Committee on the Administration of the Probation System was presented by the Chairman, Judge Gerald B. Tjoflat.

SENTENCING INSTITUTES

The Committee had previously submitted to the Conference a plan for a Joint Institute on Sentencing for the judges of the First, Fourth, and District of Columbia Circuits to be held at Raleigh, North Carolina, April 19-21, 1979 (Conf. Rept., Sept. 1978, p. 73). Judge Tjoflat informed the Conference that the tentative agenda for the institute, previously approved by the Conference, has been amended in the light of the experience gained at institutes on sentencing for the judges of the Ninth, and the Eighth and Tenth Circuits held in the fall of 1978. A revised agenda for this institute was submitted for the information of the Conference.

The Committee also submitted a plan for an Institute on Sentencing for the judges of the Fifth Circuit to be held at Dallas, Texas, October 3-5, 1979. The program would include one day at a nearby Federal correctional institution. The Conference upon the Committee's recommendation approved the time, place, participants and tentative agenda for this sentencing institute.

PROTECTION OF PROBATION OFFICERS

The Conference on several occasions has recommended legislation to amend Section 1114 of Title 18, United States

Code, to make it a Federal crime to kill a United States probation officer while engaged in the performance of his official duties. See Conf. Repts. Mar. 1970, p. 28; Mar. 1971, p. 48; and Sept. 1974, p. 64. The Committee pointed out that the shooting of two probation officers while in the performance of their duties—one in Memphis in May 1973 and the other in the District of Columbia in June 1974—previously demonstrated the need for the legislation. Last December a probation officer in Laredo, Texas, was killed from ambush as he approached the Federal building. The Committee asked that the Conference resolution be renewed.

It was the view of the Conference, however, that bankruptcy judges and United States magistrates were equally in need of any protection that may be offered by their inclusion in this statute. The Conference thereupon approved the draft legislation submitted by the Committee with an amendment to include bankruptcy judges and United States magistrates.

PRETRIAL SERVICES AGENCIES

The Pretrial Services Agencies, established by the Director of the Administrative Office on a demonstration basis in ten representative district courts pursuant to Title II of the Speedy Trial Act of 1974, have now been in operation an average of 34 months. During this period the Administrative Office has been compiling statistical information on the operation of these agencies and is now preparing to submit to the Congress a comprehensive report containing the Director's views and recommendations pertaining to the administration and operation of the pretrial services agencies established pursuant to the Act. The report is due on or before July 1, 1979.

Judge Tjoflat informed the Conference that the Committee had reviewed a preliminary draft of a report based on the statistical information collected to date. Further examination of the data is necessary before final conclusions can be drawn and recommendations presented. Since the Conference is not expected to meet again before the due date of the report, the Conference authorized the Committee to exercise continued oversight of the completion of the Director's report, approve the final recommendations to be included in the report, and

authorize, on behalf of the Conference, the release of the Director's report to the Congress.

MANDATORY RETIREMENT

In September 1977 (Conf. Rept., p. 73) the Conference, on recommendation of the Committee, approved guidelines to assist the Director of the Administrative Office in exercising his authority to exempt a probation officer from the mandatory separation required by law. Judge Tjoflat informed the Conference that the Committee has been contacted by several chief judges who have expressed their concern that the Director has denied exemptions despite their recommendations. The District Judges Association of the Fourth Circuit has asked the Conference to amend the guidelines to authorize an exemption "if the district judges of the district are unanimous in the desire for the exemption."

Judge Tjoflat reported that the Committee had reviewed the first year's experience under the mandatory separation provisions of the Civil Service Retirement Act and had reviewed a memorandum from the Civil Service Commission concerning the appointment of a mandatorily separated law enforcement officer as a reemployed annuitant and an opinion of the General Counsel of the Administrative Office holding that the Director is the "head of the agency" when implementing the national retirement program. Based on its review the Committee concluded that the Director of the Administrative Office has properly discharged his responsibilities under the law and that there is no need for an amendment of the Conference-approved guidelines. The Conference agreed with the Committee's conclusion.

COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE CRIMINAL LAW

The report of the Committee on the Administration of the Criminal Law was presented by the Chairman, Judge Alexander Harvey II.

USE OF THE SPANISH LANGUAGE IN THE UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT FOR THE DISTRICT OF PUERTO RICO

H.R. 13950, 95th Congress, would authorize the use of the Spanish language as the official language for the conduct of proceedings in criminal cases in the District Court for the District of Puerto Rico. The Committee recommended that the Conference oppose the enactment of this legislation in the form proposed by H.R. 13950. After full discussion the Conference adopted the following resolution:

RESOLVED: The Conference takes no position concerning the policy implications of proposed legislation which would authorize the use of Spanish in the United States District Court for the District of Puerto Rico. However, the Conference opposes the enactment by Congress of a bill similar to H.R. 13950, introduced in the 95th Congress, unless proper consideration is given to the following practical effects of this legislation which would have an adverse impact on the administration of justice, both as to trials in the United States District Court of Puerto Rico and as to appeals from such court to the First Circuit:

1. The problem of adapting an English-speaking Federal court system based on interpretations of cases and statutes written in the English language to cases involving Spanish-speaking defendants;
2. Greatly increased expenses, including costs required for additional equipment, space and personnel;
3. Delays in both trials and appeals;
4. Difficulties in obtaining Spanish-speaking reporters, translators and other necessary personnel; and
5. Difficulties arising from delays in the immediate review by the court of appeals of stays and emergency orders.

TRANSPORTATION EXPENSES FOR DEFENDANTS IN CRIMINAL CASES

A recent amendment to the Criminal Code authorizes the payment of the transportation expenses of a defendant in a criminal proceeding to the place of holding court without the necessity of traveling in the custody of a law enforcement officer. Payment of transportation expenses may be made in the discretion of the district court.

It was brought to the attention of the Committee, however, that the new legislation provides only for the transportation expenses of a defendant to the place of holding court for the purpose of participating in a proceeding, but does not provide for the payment of return transportation expenses. The Conference, upon recommendation of the Committee, approved a proposal to amend the statute to authorize the payment of the travel expenses of a defendant for the return of the individual from the place of holding court to the place of arrest, or the defendant's home, whichever is closest to the place of release. The Director of the Administrative Office was authorized to draft suitable legislation and to transmit it to the Congress for its consideration.

COMMITTEE TO IMPLEMENT THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACT

The report of the Committee to Implement the Criminal Justice Act was presented by a member of the Committee, Judge Oliver Gasch, in the absence of the Chairman, Judge Dudley B. Bonsal.

APPOINTMENTS AND PAYMENTS

The Conference authorized the Director of the Administrative Office to distribute copies of the report on appointments and payments under the Criminal Justice Act for the fiscal year 1978 to all chief judges, all federal defender organizations and to others who may request copies. The report indicated that the sum of \$24,000,000 was appropriated by Congress for the administration of the Act during the fiscal year 1978, including \$350,000 for the liquidation of obligations carried forward from the previous year. During the year approximately 45,000 persons were represented under the Act, a decrease of about 2.3 percent from the fiscal year 1977, but an increase of about 1.8 percent over the comparable period in 1976. Federal public defenders represented 13,725 persons during the year and the community defenders represented 6,396 persons. Collectively, these offices accounted for 45 percent of all representations.

The average cost of representation under the Criminal Justice Act, including appeal, was \$454 per case for private panel attorneys, \$464 per case for community defender organizations, and \$524 per case for Federal public defender offices.

GRANT REQUESTS—COMMUNITY DEFENDER ORGANIZATIONS

The Conference considered grant requests from seven community defender organizations and approved sustaining grants for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1980 as follows:

COMMUNITY DEFENDERS—CONDITIONS OF A GRANT

In September 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 83) the Conference was informed that the Administrative Office had been directed to draft an agreement to be executed annually by community defender organizations and forwarded with each request for a grant. A draft of a proposed agreement was circulated to all community defender organizations for comment, and then considered by the Committee.

After study the Committee determined to recommend that each sustaining grant to a community defender organization, approved by the Conference, be made subject to certain terms and conditions. The Committee submitted a draft of "conditions of grant" and recommended that each year, commencing with grants for the fiscal year 1980, each community defender organization be required to accept these conditions

prior to the receipt of any payments under the grant. The recommendation of the Committee was approved by the Conference.

AMENDMENTS TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACT GUIDELINES

Judge Gasch, on behalf of the Committee, submitted proposed amendments to the Guidelines for the Administration of the Criminal Justice Act to accomplish the following:

1. Permit all defender organizations to incur expenses for investigative, expert and other services without reference to limitations contained in 18 U.S.C. 3006A(e)(2) and (3), provided that the total expenditures for these services do not exceed the budget or grant authorizations for these categories of expenses;
2. Provide for interim payments of compensation to counsel and others when considered necessary in a special case;
3. Clarify the guidelines pertaining to the allocation between the Department of Justice and the Administrative Office of the costs and fees for the services of psychiatrists and other experts;
4. Clarify the guidelines relating to the payment by the Department of Justice of fees and expenses of fact witnesses in habeas corpus actions brought in the Federal courts; and
5. Clarify the types of items and services of a personal nature which are not reimbursable under the Criminal Justice Act.

The amendments to the guidelines were approved by the Conference as submitted.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACT

The Conference in September 1977 (Conf. Rept., p. 88) authorized the transmission to Congress of proposed amendments to the Criminal Justice Act which would conform the Act to the provisions of the Juvenile Delinquency Act and the Parole Commission and Reform Act, provide counsel for grand jury witnesses who are putative defendants, and authorize expert services necessary for adequate representation. At the request of Judge Gasch, the Conference reaffirmed its previous action and authorized the resubmission to the Congress of these proposed amendments to the Criminal Justice Act.

ASSISTANT FEDERAL PUBLIC DEFENDERS—NAME CHECKS

The Committee recommended that the Conference rescind its requirement that prospective assistant Federal public defenders be subject to name checks by the Federal Bureau of Investigation prior to their appointment (Mar. 1976 Conf. Rept., p. 24), leaving the question of background investigations and name checks to the discretion of the public defenders. Employees of community defender organizations are not subject to the name check requirement. Recently, Federal public defenders have been experiencing difficulty in recruiting qualified assistants in view of the delay being encountered in obtaining name checks. The recommendation was approved by the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON THE OPERATION OF THE JURY SYSTEM

Chief Judge C. Clyde Atkins, Chairman of the Committee on the Operation of the Jury System, presented the report of the Committee.

PUBLIC DRAWING OF JUROR NAMES

Judge Atkins informed the Conference that the Jury System Improvements Act of 1978, 28 U.S.C. 1869(k), authorizes the Judicial Conference to adopt regulations governing the manner of drawing juror names from the jury wheels when such drawing is made by electronic data processing. To implement this provision of law, the Committee submitted the following resolution which was adopted by the Conference:

The Judicial Conference of the United States adopts this regulation under the authority vested in it by section 1869(k) of title 28, United States Code, in respect to the public drawing of juror names from the master and qualified jury wheels as required by 28 U.S.C. 1864 and 1866.

1. The term "reasonable public notice" shall mean the posting of a written announcement as to the scheduled drawing on a bulletin board or at another public place within the courthouse at the place of holding court at which jurors being selected in the drawing will serve. Other methods of communica-

tion may also be employed at the discretion of each United States district court. This posting or other announcement shall take place at such reasonable time in advance of the drawing as the district court shall in its discretion determine.

2. In those judicial districts utilizing automated data processing equipment in their jury selection processes, the public drawing requirement shall apply only to the selection of a starting number and interval ("quotient") which shall govern the selection of juror names from the original source lists. It shall not be deemed to require any public observance of the actual computer operations.

3. In order to ensure the exercise of proper supervision and management over the automated aspects of jury selection and its accordance with statutory requirements, the district courts described in paragraph 2 shall comply with the following procedures:

A. The court shall issue to the operator of the computer facilities written instructions describing the operations which shall be performed by the computer equipment. Such instructions for random selection of grand and petit jurors by data processing methods may be referred to in the district court's plan for random selection of grand and petit jurors and shall be available for inspection by the public.

B. Upon the completion of the data processing work required of the computer facilities, the court shall require the execution of an affidavit by the agency providing the computer service. Such affidavit shall state under penalty of perjury that the procedures set down by the court governing the selection of its jurors have been fully met in the automated phase of the selection process.

C. The clerk or jury commission shall then receive into the permanent records of the court the selection instructions to the computer facility and the affidavit by the representative of the computer facility certifying compliance with the same.

APPOINTMENT OF COUNSEL FOR JURORS

The Jury System Improvements Act of 1978, 28 U.S.C. 1875, imposes a duty upon employers to refrain from interfering with the performance of Federal jury service by a permanent employee and subjects the employer to civil liability for violating this duty. The Act also authorizes a district court to appoint counsel to represent an aggrieved juror in any court action necessary to the resolution of a juror's claim

against the employer and authorizes the payment of compensation and necessary expenses to the extent provided under the Criminal Justice Act. The scope of the district court's discretion in appointing counsel is not defined nor is it stated whether an appointment must be contingent upon the juror's inability to afford retained counsel.

The Committee submitted a draft of a bill amending the Jury System Improvements Act of 1978 to provide that a juror's attorney fees may be taxed as costs against an employer if such fees have been expended from government funds, as well as when the juror has retained and paid for his own counsel. The Conference approved the draft bill and authorized its submission to the Congress.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee, the Conference also adopted the following guideline:

In authorizing the appointment of counsel to represent a juror claiming the violation by his employer of his right to perform jury service, 28 U.S.C. 1875(d), does not require a showing by the juror of financial need as a prerequisite to such appointment or to the compensation of appointed counsel from appropriated funds available to the courts. It is recommended, however, that a district court confronted with a request by a juror for the appointment of counsel first advise the juror that he may retain counsel and be awarded attorney's fees as costs if he prevails in the action.

JURIES IN BANKRUPTCY CASES

The new Bankruptcy Act, Public Law 95-598, is expected to increase the number of jury trials conducted by bankruptcy judges when it becomes effective on October 1, 1979. It was the view of the Committee that the selection of juries for bankruptcy cases should be governed by chapter 121 of title 28, United States Code, which sets forth the manner of jury selection in the district courts. The Committee also believes it advisable for the bankruptcy court to select its juries under the same jury selection plan and from the same master and qualified jury wheels which are employed by the district court for that judicial district. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference adopted the following policy for application in the impaneling of juries by the bankruptcy courts:

1. All courts of the United States conducting jury trials shall adhere to the policies prescribed for Federal jury selection by the Congress in the Jury Selection and Service Act of 1968, as amended, 28 U.S.C. 1861 *et seq.*

2. The plans for random selection of grand and petit jurors adopted by each United States district court with the approval of its reviewing panel under 28 U.S.C. 1863 shall be deemed to govern jury selection by the bankruptcy court for that judicial district as well.

3. The clerk or jury commission of each United States district court shall upon request by the clerk of the bankruptcy court for that district supply to the bankruptcy court a sufficient number of jurors for use in its scheduled jury trials. Such jurors may continue to be utilized by the district court if not selected or when not serving in the bankruptcy court.

4. Each bankruptcy court shall cooperate with the district court clerk in the implementation of those jury utilization techniques which are employed by the district court in the interest of efficient and economical usage of jurors, including jury pooling, multiple voir dire, staggered trial starts, and any other procedures regularly followed by the clerk or jury commission of the district court at the direction of its judges.

JUROR QUALIFICATION FORM

Judge Atkins called attention to a situation in the Eastern District of Pennsylvania in which a new trial was required because a juror who had served in the case was later found to be disqualified from jury service on account of a prior conviction for a state crime. Upon investigation it was discovered that the juror had given an incorrect answer to the question on the qualification form regarding prior criminal records because of a misunderstanding as to its meaning. The Conference thereupon approved a change in the wording of this question on the form to clarify that the statutory disqualification from federal jury service applies to persons convicted, upon their guilty plea or at trial, of a crime which may be punished by imprisonment for more than one year, regardless of the fact that a lesser penalty may have actually been imposed.

INJURIES TO JURORS

The Conference in March 1974 (Conf. Rept., p. 20) approved a draft bill to bring Federal grand and petit jurors within the coverage of the Federal Employees Compensation Act by adding a new section to chapter 81 of title 5, United States Code. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference again approved a draft of a similar bill and authorized its resubmission to the Congress.

COMMITTEE ON INTERCIRCUIT ASSIGNMENTS

The written report of the Committee on Intercircuit Assignments, submitted by the Chairman, Judge George L. Hart, Jr., was received by the Conference.

The report indicated that during the period from August 16, 1978 through February 15, 1979, the Committee had recommended 71 intercircuit assignments to be undertaken by 51 judges. Of this number, five were senior circuit judges, three were active circuit judges, 13 were district judges in active status and 25 were senior district judges. Fourteen assignments involved one active judge of the Court of Claims, two active judges of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals, and two active judges of the Customs Court.

Five senior circuit judges and 13 senior district judges carried out 22 of the 34 assignments to the courts of appeals which were recommended during this period. Three active circuit judges, one active district judge, two active judges of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals and one active judge of the Customs Court participated in the other 12 assignments to the courts of appeals.

Of the 37 assignments to the district courts, 15 senior district judges participated in 15 assignments and the remaining 22 assignments were carried out by 12 active district judges, one active judge of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals and two active judges of the Customs Court.

AD HOC COMMITTEE ON THE DISPOSITION OF COURT RECORDS

The report of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Disposition of Court Records, chaired by Judge Walter J. Cummings, was presented by Judge Robert L. Kunzig, a member of the Committee.

Judge Kunzig reported that the Committee had approved a draft schedule for the disposition of the records of the United States district courts, including territorial district courts. The draft schedules limit the types of district court records which are to be maintained permanently to indices, judgment and order books, certain recorded documents, domestic relations records, certain sealed records, and docket sheets, except those of United States commissioners and magistrates in petty offense cases which are to be retained for five years only. All other records are to be considered temporary. The draft schedule assigns retention periods up to 23 years for criminal case files.

At the request of Judge Kunzig the Conference authorized the circulation of the Committee's report, including the draft disposition schedule and program, to judges and other interested officers in the district courts with the request that comments thereon be submitted to the Committee.

Judge Kunzig informed the Conference that, upon completion of its work on the records of the district courts, the Committee would consider disposition schedules for the records of the courts of appeals and other federal courts.

MEMORIAL RESOLUTIONS

Noting the recent death of Judge Carl A. Weinman, a former member of the Conference and Chairman of the Budget Committee, the Conference adopted the following resolution:

HONORABLE CARL A. WEINMAN

With deep sorrow, the Judicial Conference of the United States pays tribute to a respected colleague, Carl A. Weinman, who died on February 5, 1979.

After serving as a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas with Jefferson County, Ohio, for twelve years, Judge Weinman was appointed a United States District Judge for the Southern District of Ohio on September 8, 1959, becoming Chief Judge in 1961 and taking senior status on March 1, 1973.

Throughout his years on the federal bench he provided invaluable service to the Judicial Conference, both as a Conference member from 1969 to 1972, and as a Committee member. He began his tour with the Committee on the Budget in 1960, and continued with that Committee until 1978, serving as Chairman from 1971 to 1978. But for his able assistance and his ability to present explanations of the needs of the judiciary, while maintaining his sense of responsibility to the Congress and the public, we would be without many of the great strides which have been made over the past years in the improvement of justice.

In the words of Judge Carl B. Rubin, who succeeded him on the District Court, "The passing of Judge Carl A. Weinman brings to an end almost twenty years of dedicated judicial service for this community. His unerring understanding of human nature, together with his stature as a legal scholar, combined to provide a jurist of rare ability and talent. We were richer for his presence. We are poorer for his loss."

The Judicial Conference mourns his passing and directs that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to his widow.

Noting also the recent death of Warren Olney III, a former distinguished Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, the Conference adopted the following resolution:

WARREN OLNEY III

The Judicial Conference of the United States sadly notes the passing of Warren Olney III, former Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, on December 20, 1978.

Warren Olney's illustrious career in public service spanned a period of almost forty years, beginning in California as a County Deputy District Attorney. Between periods of private practice he served the State of California as Assistant Attorney General in charge of the Criminal Division, and as Chief Counsel to the Special Crime Study Commission on Organized Crime in California. His reputation for and dedication to excellence

next led to an appointment as Assistant Attorney General of the United States in the Criminal Division, Department of Justice, under Attorney General Herbert Brownell.

In 1958, less than a year after leaving the Department of Justice, at the urging of Chief Justice Warren, he accepted the challenge of succeeding Henry P. Chandler, the first Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, upon whose shoulders had fallen the responsibility for the initial development of the organization established by the Administrative Office Act of 1939.

Over the next ten years, Warren Olney was responsible for a wide range of new concepts in judicial administration. To him must go much of the credit for the creation of the Federal Judicial Center, recognizing that the function of research and development should be separated from that of operations.

As a man of great legal ability and professional integrity, he was dedicated to excellence in all that he did, a dedication which, through the years, earned the deep respect and admiration of us all.

The Judicial Conference mourns his passing and directs that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to his widow.

ELECTIONS

The Conference, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 621(a)(2), elected Circuit Judge William H. Mulligan of the Second Circuit to membership on the Board of the Federal Judicial Center for a term of four years, succeeding Circuit Judge Ruggero J. Aldisert whose term expires on March 28, 1979. The Conference also elected Chief Judge Otto R. Skopil, Jr., of the District of Oregon to membership on the Board of the Federal Judicial Center for a term of four years, succeeding District Judge Robert N. Schnacke whose term of office also expires on March 28, 1979.

The Conference, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 332(f), reelected Chief Judge Howard T. Markey of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals to an additional three year term as a member of the Board of Certification for Circuit Executives. Judge Markey's current term expires on July 1, 1979.

PRETERMISSION OF TERMS OF THE COURTS OF APPEALS

The Conference, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 48, approved the pretermision of a June 1979 term of the United States Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit at Asheville, North Carolina, and approved the pretermision of terms of the Courts of Appeals for the Fifth, Eighth and Tenth Circuits during the calendar year 1979 as follows: in the Fifth Circuit, at all places except New Orleans, in the Eighth Circuit, at all places except St. Louis and St. Paul; and in the Tenth Circuit, at all places except Denver.

RELEASE OF CONFERENCE ACTION

The Conference authorized the immediate release of matters considered at this session where necessary for legislative or administrative action.

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Report of the Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States

September 19-20, 1979

The Judicial Conference of the United States convened on September 19, 1979, pursuant to the call of the Chief Justice of the United States, issued under 28 U.S.C. 331, and continued in session on September 20. The Chief Justice presided and the following members of the Conference were present.

The Attorney General of the United States, Honorable Benjamin R. Civiletti, and the Solicitor General, Honorable Wade H. McCree, addressed the Conference briefly on matters of mutual interest to the Department of Justice and the Conference.

William E. Foley, Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts; Joseph F. Spaniol, Jr., Deputy Director; James E. Macklin, Jr., Assistant Director; and Mark W. Cannon, Administrative Assistant to the Chief Justice, attended all sessions of the Conference. The Director of the Federal Judicial Center, A. Leo Levin, reported on the activities of the Center since the last session of the Conference.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES COURTS

The Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, Mr. William E. Foley, submitted to the Conference the Annual Report of the Director for the year ended June 30, 1979. The Conference authorized the Director to release the annual report immediately in preliminary form and to revise and supplement the final printed edition.

JUDICIAL BUSINESS OF THE COURTS

Mr. Foley reported that appeals docketed in the United States courts of appeals in the year ending June 30, 1979, climbed almost 7 percent to a record 20,219 new appeals. During the year the courts of appeals terminated a record 18,928 appeals, 1,291 fewer than the number filed, and the number of appeals pending on June 30, 1979 increased to a record 17,939 cases. Appeals from decisions of administrative agencies increased almost 23 percent. The number of appeals from decisions of district courts in criminal cases declined almost 9 percent during the year.

Civil cases filed in the United States district courts in the year ending June 30, 1979, were 154,666, an increase of 11.5 percent over the 138,770 civil cases filed during the previous year. During the year there were 143,323 civil cases terminated, compared with 125,914 terminated during the previous year. On June 30, 1979, there were 177,805 civil actions pending on the dockets of the district courts, compared with 166,462 pending a year earlier.

Criminal cases filed in the United States district courts in 1979 again declined to 32,688, a decrease of 9.2 percent compared with the 35,983 criminal cases filed during the previous year. There were 33,442 criminal cases terminated, a 10.3 percent decrease from the previous year, but 754 more than the number filed. As a result the number of criminal cases pending on June 30, 1979 fell to a ten-year low of 15,124.

Bankruptcy cases commenced in the United States district courts during the year ending June 30, 1979, were 226,476, an 11.6 percent increase over the number of bankruptcy cases filed during the previous year. This increase reverses

a three-year downward trend in the filing of bankruptcy cases. During the year there were 209,316 bankruptcy cases closed, and on June 30, 1979, there were 258,168 bankruptcy cases pending on the dockets.

REPORT OF THE FEDERAL JUDICIAL CENTER

The Director of the Federal Judicial Center, Professor A. Leo Levin, reported that during 1979 the Center has been engaged in the task of providing orientation to new judges appointed under the 1978 Omnibus Judgeship Act and to supporting personnel who have entered on duty in the judiciary as a consequence of the increase in judgeship positions. The Center is continuing its development of COURTRAN and has made available to a number of district courts programs to assist them in meeting the requirements of the Speedy Trial Act of 1974. The Center has also been working on problems of complex civil litigation, aspects of the jury system and services needed by probationers.

JUDICIAL PANEL ON MULTIDISTRICT LITIGATION

A report submitted on behalf of the Judicial Panel on Multidistrict Litigation indicated that during the year ending June 30, 1979 the Panel had acted upon 1,064 civil actions pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 1407 and that 936 civil actions were centralized for coordinated pretrial proceedings. The Panel denied transfer of 128 actions. Since the creation of the Panel in 1968 over 7,700 civil actions have been centralized in pretrial proceedings in carrying out the Panel's responsibilities. As of June 30, 1979, almost 5,000 of those actions had been remanded for trial or terminated by settlement or dismissal in the transferee courts.

COMMITTEE ON COURT ADMINISTRATION

Judge Elmo B. Hunter, Chairman of the Committee on Court Administration, presented the Committee report.

JUDICIAL TENURE

The Conference in March 1979 (Conf. Rept., p. 4) after reviewing a draft of proposed amendments to 28 U.S.C. 332 to clarify the powers of the judicial councils of the circuits to adopt procedures for the examination of judicial conduct in cases where it is warranted and to take appropriate action in such instances, adopted a resolution setting forth the principles to be embodied in any proposed amendment to the statute. The Chairman of the Committee on Court Administration and the members of the Executive Committee were directed to revise the proposal in accordance with the principles stated in the resolution and to submit a revised draft for Conference approval.

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that a new draft bill to amend 28 U.S.C. 372 rather than 28 U.S.C. 332 had been prepared and approved by the Executive Committee. After full discussion, the Conference, consistent with its previous resolution, voted to recommend that, if legislative action is to be taken, the proposed amendment to 28 U.S.C. 372, set out in the draft bill submitted by the Committee, be enacted into law.

TRIAL OF PROTRACTED CASES

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that the Committee had considered a suggestion for the creation of a special panel of judges to be available to undertake the trial of protracted cases on special assignment. Judge Hunter pointed out that in a small district the assignment of a local judge to a lengthy trial can completely disrupt the entire calendar of the court.

The Committee recommended that the Chief Justice be requested to designate such a panel, to include highly experienced senior judges. The chief judge of a district court would request the chief judge of the circuit to arrange the assignment of one of the panel judges if an intercircuit assignment were involved. This recommendation was approved by the Conference.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

On June 5, 1979, a "Petition Seeking the Adoption of Equal Employment Opportunity Plans by the Federal Judiciary" was filed with the Judicial Conference on behalf of twelve organizations representing minorities. The petition, based upon a survey by the Southern Regional Council, states that "equal employment opportunity has been and continues to be denied to both women and blacks by federal courts in the South. There is every reason to believe that those discriminatory patterns exist in federal courts in other areas of our nation." Without conceding that there has been discrimination, the Committee unanimously recommended, and the Conference adopted, the following resolution:

The Judicial Conference of the United States reaffirms its resolution of 1966, endorsing a national policy of a positive program for equal opportunity of employment. In furtherance of that endorsement, the Committee on Court Administration, with the assistance of the Administrative Office, is directed to prepare a model affirmative action plan, for adoption by each federal court, with regard to the selection and promotion of employees, and is further directed to present that model plan to the Conference for approval at the March 1980 session. Upon such approval, each federal court shall adopt and implement a plan based thereon. Any modification of the model plan by a court must first be approved in its circuit by the Circuit Council thereof. A copy of each plan and any subsequent modifications shall be filed with the Administrative Office. Each court shall annually submit a report on the implementation of its affirmative action plan to the Administrative Office for inclusion in the Director's Annual Report to the Judicial Conference.

RENTAL OF SPACE AND FACILITIES

The annual Appropriation Act for the Federal Judiciary contains an item for "Space and Facilities" which is available for the rental of space required for the operation of the courts. Appropriated funds are paid over to the Administrator of General Services for the space occupied by the Judicial Branch and these funds are, in turn, deposited by the Administrator into the Federal Buildings Fund. The Fund is used to

cover the expenses of operating federally-owned buildings and the cost of renting space in privately-owned buildings.

The Fund, however, is not a revolving account. Congress must appropriate the money to be spent from the Fund and usually imposes limits on the amount the Administrator can obligate and disburse for the rental of space. The Office of Management and Budget apportions the limitation of expenditures among all government agencies on a quarterly basis. Even though there is adequate funding to pay for all space required by the Federal Judiciary, the Administrator of General Services may be unable to provide space because of a "freeze" on the availability of funds to rent space in privately-owned buildings.

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that in an attempt to obtain relief from any limitation imposed on the Judiciary by the Executive Branch of the Government, the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts had requested the Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee for the Treasury, Postal Service and General Government to include a statement in the 1980 appropriations bill that the Judicial Branch shall be provided space and facilities to the extent of funds appropriated for that purpose in Judiciary Appropriation Acts. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference endorsed the action taken by the Director and authorized him to continue to seek this legislation.

SPACE UTILIZATION

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that the House Appropriations Subcommittee for the Treasury, Postal Service and General Government had expressed concern over the utilization of space by the Judiciary and that the House Subcommittee on Appropriations for the Judiciary had also stated its belief that bankruptcy judges and magistrates do not require facilities comparable to those being provided to circuit and district judges. In this regard the Committee had reviewed space guidelines for bankruptcy judges and magistrates prepared by the Administrative Office in coordination with the General Services Administration and the Director's Advisory Committee of Bankruptcy Judges. Although the guide-

lines called for less space for both bankruptcy judges and magistrates than for circuit and district judges, it was the view of the Committee that experience under the new Bankruptcy Code and the new Magistrates Act may require changes in the guidelines. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved the guidelines as interim guidelines, subject to later evaluation.

ADDITIONAL JUDGESHIPS

The Omnibus Judgeship Act of 1978, P.L. 95-486, created only two of the three additional judgeships recommended by the Judicial Conference for the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. Since the recommendation for three additional judgeships was originally made, the caseload of the court has increased and has grown more complex. The Conference thereupon recommended the creation of one additional judgeship for the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit.

NATIONAL BUREAU OF JUSTICE STATISTICS

H.R. 2061 and H.R. 2108, 96th Congress, are bills to establish a National Bureau of Justice Statistics. It was the view of the Committee that the statistical programs operated by the Administrative Office adequately serve the needs of the Federal Judiciary and that the Administrative Office is the appropriate agency to collect information on the operation of the courts. Statistical information compiled in the Administrative Office is readily available to the Department of Justice, to the Congress and to any Government agency. The Committee therefore recommended disapproval of any legislation which would duplicate in another governmental unit the statistical authority now assigned to the Administrative Office under Title 28, United States Code. The Committee further recommended that in the event a Bureau of Justice Statistics is established, the Bureau's board include a member of the Judicial Branch of the Government, either a Federal judge or a representative of the Administrative Office. These recommendations were approved by the Conference.

FEDERAL COURTS IMPROVEMENT ACT OF 1979

S. 1477, 96th Congress, is a bill to provide for improvements in the structure and administration of the Federal courts and for other purposes. It has been favorably reported by the Senate Judiciary Committee. Judge Hunter informed the Conference that the bill contains several titles and subparts which the Committee had separately considered.

A. *Selection and Tenure of Chief Judges:* Part A of Title I of S. 1477 would provide that the judge who is senior in commission, age 64 or under, and who has served one year or more on the court shall be the chief judge. A chief judge would serve for a term of seven years or until attaining 70 years of age. The Committee recommended and the Conference approved these provisions of the bill.

B. *Appellate Panels:* Part B of Title I of S. 1477 would amend Sections 45(b) and 46(b) and (c) of Title 28, United States Code. The amendment to Section 45(b) would give active judges precedence over senior circuit judges. The amendment to Section 46(b) would require at least three judges on an appellate panel, two of whom must be judges of the court, unless such judges are disqualified. The amendment does not distinguish between active and senior judges of the court. The amendment to Section 46(c) also requires a panel of at least three judges.

The Committee perceived a potential problem arising in the event of illness, death, or vacancy, or in a situation in which the caseload is so heavy as to prevent active circuit judges from handling appeals in timely fashion. This is especially pertinent in a court of appeals with a small number of judges, such as the First Circuit, which may not be able to sit because of the availability of only one active circuit judge. Otherwise, the Committee saw no objection to these proposals and they were approved by the Conference.

C. *Membership of Judicial Councils:* Part C of Title I of S. 1477 would restructure the judicial councils of the circuits and provide for district judge membership. The circuit council would consist of the chief judge of the circuit, a number of circuit judges to be fixed by majority vote of all active circuit judges of the circuit, and a number of district judges also to be fixed by majority vote of all active circuit judges. Terms of

members of the council would be established by majority vote of all active judges of the circuit. The circuit council would be authorized to conduct hearings, take sworn testimony and issue subpoenas. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the provisions of Part C of Title I were approved by the Conference.

D. Retirement and Resignation: Part D of Title I of S. 1477 would amend 28 U.S.C. 371 to permit a judge who resigns his office at age 65 with 15 years of service to continue to receive an annuity equal to the salary which he was receiving when he resigned. This provision of the bill was approved by the Conference. The Conference also reaffirmed its approval of a proposal to permit a judge to retain his office but retire from regular active service whenever the combination of his age and years of service as a judge equal eighty.

E. Assignments of Judges to Managerial Positions: Part E of title I of S. 1477 would authorize the temporary assignment of an Article III judge to a limited number of managerial positions in the Judicial Branch of the Government. Upon recommendation of the Committee this provision was approved by the Conference.

F. Interlocutory Appeals: Part A of Title II of S. 1477 would amend 28 U.S.C. 1292(b) to permit an appeal from a decision of a district court, not otherwise appealable, "if the court of appeals determines in its discretion that an appeal is required in the interests of justice and because of the extraordinary importance of the case." In these circumstances the certificate of a district judge would not be required.

It was the view of the Committee that this provision was quite unnecessary. The Committee knew of no case in which the interests of justice were irreparably damaged because a district court has refused to certify an interlocutory order or appeal. To add this language to the statute would encourage lawyers to seek leave from the court of appeals for review of interlocutory orders when the district court has refused a Section 1292(b) certificate. This proposal was disapproved by the Conference.

G. Transfer to Cure Want of Jurisdiction: Part B of Title II of S. 1477 would add a new Section 1631 to Title 28, United States Code, to authorize the transfer of an improperly filed case from one court to another. A similar proposal had pre-

viously been approved by the Conference (Conf. Rept., Mar. 1978, p. 11). Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference reaffirmed its approval of this proposal.

H. Interest on Judgements and Prejudgement Interest: Part C of Title II of S. 1477 would amend 28 U.S.C. 1961 with respect to interest on civil money judgements. First, the interest rate would be "the rate established pursuant to Section 6621 of the Internal Revenue Code" rather than the "rate allowed by State law." Secondly, the court would be authorized to award interest measured "from the time that the party against whom damages have been awarded became aware of his potential liability or from the time that he should have become aware of such liability, but, in any case, not to exceed a period of five years." The Conference approved these provisions of the bill, except the provision that would link the interest rate to Section 6621 of the Internal Revenue Code. The Committee was directed to consider other possible methods of fixing interest rates and to report thereon to the Conference.

I. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit and the United States Claims Court: Title III of S. 1477 would merge the United States Court of Claims and the United States Court of Customs and Patent Appeals into a new court to be named the "United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit." Jurisdiction of the new court would be substantially the same as that of the two courts to be merged, except that the new court would not have any jurisdiction in tax cases. In addition, the new court would have jurisdiction of all appeals from decisions of district courts in patent cases, jurisdiction to review decisions of the district courts under the Tucker Act (except tax cases), and jurisdiction of any appeal from a final order or decision of the Merit Systems Protection Board and of agency boards of contract appeals.

The trial division of the existing United States Court of Claims would be converted into a new Article I court to be named the "United States Claims Court." This new court would have the same jurisdiction as the existing Court of Claims, except that it would no longer have jurisdiction of civil tax refund or Federal Tort Claims Act cases. The new United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit would have appellate jurisdiction over decisions of the United States Claims Court.

Judge Hunter reported that the Committee favorably views certain aspects of the proposal including the centralization of appellate jurisdiction over patent cases and Tucker Act cases in one court. The Committee, however, expressed no view on the appellate court structure.

Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved the general purposes of the proposals contained in Title III of S. 1477, but expressed no view on court structure. J. *United States Court of Tax Appeals*: Title IV of S. 1477 would create a new "United States Court of Tax Appeals" having jurisdiction over appeals from the United States Tax Court and the United States district courts. The new court would consist of eleven judges designated by the Chief Justice from the existing United States courts of appeals. Initially, the judges so designated would serve staggered terms up to three years and vacancies would be filled by the designation of additional judges for terms of three years. Terms or sessions of the court would be held at least once per year in each circuit and at such other times and places as the court may direct. The court would sit in panels of three judges, or might sit in panels of more than three judges. Its decisions would be reviewable by the Supreme Court on writ of *certiorari*.

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that the Committee believes that the concept of a separate court of tax appeals is sound, but questions whether the assignment of judges from the courts of appeals to serve on the court is practical. The Committee believes that consideration should be given to a separate court having an appropriate number of full-time judges. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved in principle the creation of a separate court of tax appeals, but voted to advise the Congress of its view that the regular mandatory assignment of circuit or district judges as members of the court is impractical.

AIR DISASTER LITIGATION

H.R. 231, 96th Congress, is a bill to amend title 28, United States Code, to establish a federal cause of action for and federal court procedures with respect to aviation activities and for other purposes. The Judicial Conference in March 1979 (Conf. Rept., p. 13) endorsed the two principal objectives of a

similar bill, H. R. 10917, 95th Congress, and authorized the Committee to communicate its views regarding particular provisions of the bill to the appropriate committees of the Congress and to work with Congressional committees on the bill.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee, the Conference reaffirmed its previous action with respect to those proposals now contained in H. R. 231, 96th Congress.

ATTORNEYS' FEES

S. 265, 96th Congress, entitled the "Equal Access to Justice Act," would provide for an award of attorneys' fees to prevailing parties in proceedings before administrative agencies that are subject to section 554 of Title 5, United States Code, and would provide for an award of costs and attorneys' fees to the "prevailing party in any civil action brought by or against the United States" in any court having jurisdiction of such action. In awarding attorneys' fees and other expenses to a "prevailing party in any action for judicial review of any agency adjudication . . . the court shall include in that award the fees and other expenses for services performed during the agency adjudication unless the court finds that during such adjudication the position of the United States was substantially justified, or that special circumstances made an award unjust." The bill would also require the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts to include in his annual report "the amount of fees and other expenses awarded during the preceding fiscal year" and "describe the number, nature, and amount of awards, the claims involved in the controversy and any other relevant information which may aid the Congress in evaluating the scope and impact of such awards."

In March 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 8) the Conference considered similar bills which would provide for an award of reasonable attorneys' fees. At that time the Committee reported that it continued to be of the view that the question of awarding attorneys' fees in agency and court proceedings is a matter of public policy for the determination of the Congress, but pointed out that a piecemeal approach to this issue is eroding the "prevailing American Rule" requiring parties in civil litigation to pay their own attorneys' fees, without

thorough study of the potential consequences. The Conference, at that time approved the Committee's suggestion that before any new authority to award attorneys' fees is enacted, the Congress be requested to conduct general hearings on the desirability of further modifying the "prevailing American Rule" so that the views of the bar and the public generally can be elicited.

Judge Hunter reported that the Committee is also concerned about the provisions of the bill requiring the Director of the Administrative Office to report on fee awards to be paid by other agencies of the Federal Government. It seemed to the Committee that the duty of reporting such information to the Congress should be placed on agencies familiar with the proceedings who will be required to pay any fees that are awarded.

Upon recommendation of the Committee the Conference reaffirmed its action of March 1978 with respect to the question of awarding attorneys' fees and voted to recommend to the Congress that those government agencies paying attorneys' fees be required to report those payments to Congress on their own, rather than requiring the Director of the Administrative Office to do so.

DIVERSITY JURISDICTION

S. 679 and H.R. 2202, 96th Congress, are bills to eliminate the amount in controversy requirement for federal question jurisdiction and to abolish diversity of citizenship as a basis of jurisdiction in the United States district courts. These bills are virtually identical to H.R. 9622, 95th Congress, which was approved by the Conference in March 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 7). Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference reaffirmed its approval of this legislation.

JUDICIAL REVIEW OF VETERANS' CLAIMS

S. 330, 96th Congress, would establish procedures for the adjudication of claims for benefits administered by the Veterans Administration; make the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act applicable to the rulemaking procedures of the Veterans Administration; provide for the

judicial review of decisions of the Administrator of Veterans Affairs; and provide for the payment of reasonable attorneys' fees to individuals claiming veterans' benefits. The Conference had previously expressed the view (Conf. Repts., Mar. 1963, p. 18 and Mar. 1978, p. 9) that the question of whether judicial review of the denial of veterans' claims should be accorded as a matter of public policy for decision by the Congress but stated that if Congress should decide to grant such review, a review by a Court of Veterans Appeals, with local hearings by commissioners of the court, would provide a more suitable form of review than by the district courts, the courts of appeals, or the Court of Claims.

Judge Hunter reported that the Committee had been informed of a current proposal to limit the judicial review of decisions of the Social Security Administration to questions of law, thus making agency factual determinations final. Whether or not this concept is adopted for social security cases, the Committee believed that it should be applied to the judicial review of veterans' claims. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference modified its previous resolution to provide that if Congress decides that judicial review of veterans' claims in the district courts is appropriate, these courts should be authorized to review only constitutional issues involving substantive and procedural due process and questions of statutory interpretation. The Conference also recommended that an administrative tribunal, modeled after the Tax Court, be established in the Veterans Administration.

COURT OF LABOR-MANAGEMENT RELATIONS

H. R. 2353, 96th Congress, would provide for the establishment of a Court of Labor-Management Relations having jurisdiction over certain labor disputes in industries substantially affecting commerce. The Conference in September 1977 (Conf. Rept., p. 52) voted to recommend against the enactment of a similar bill, stating that the disputes which are the subject of the pending legislation can be adequately handled through the existing Federal court structure. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference reaffirmed its disapproval of this legislation.

CLASS ACTIONS

The Office for Improvements in the Administration of Justice of the Department of Justice had submitted to the Committee a draft bill to repeal Rule 23(b)(3), Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, and to add a new chapter 176 to Title 28, United States Code, to create two new types of action—a “public action” and a “class compensatory action.”

The “public action” is intended to embrace small claims for damages as a result of a violation of an Act of Congress relating to commercial conduct. In order for the action to be brought, at least 200 persons must be alleged to have sustained injury not exceeding \$300 each and the aggregate of the claims must exceed \$60,000. The injury must arise out of the same transaction and the action must present a substantial question of law or fact common to the injured persons. The action may be brought directly by the Attorney General; by a State attorney general pursuant to Section 4C of the Clayton Act, as amended; or may be brought in the name of the United States by an injured person referred to as a “relator.” Damages could be determined on a sampling basis and the money recovered would be placed in a “public recovery fund” to be administered by the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, or, if the court so directs, by the clerk of the district court. Those persons sustaining injuries of \$300 or less would file claims with the Administrative Office, or the clerk of court, and receive payment. An earlier version of the bill provided that claims under \$15 would not be paid because of the costs of administration. Claims exceeding \$300 would be paid only after all smaller claims were paid and any person receiving payment exceeding \$300 would be required to execute a release of any further rights arising out of the same transaction. Money remaining in the fund would be paid to the United States to offset the costs of administration. Special discovery procedures would apply. Parties would initially be limited to 30 interrogatories and the taking of depositions of 10 persons, or 10 deposition days. The “opt out” provision of Rule 23(b)(3) would not apply in a public action.

The “class compensatory action” is designed to provide relief to persons sustaining damages in excess of \$300 each for violation of any federal law. It would require a “class” of at

considered an identical bill, H. R. 9913, 95th Congress, and took the following action:

While the bill embodies a matter of policy for Congressional determination, the Committee doubted that Section 2 of Article III of the Constitution supports this type of grant of jurisdiction to a federal court. Further, the bill is unclear on questions of venue, what law is to be applied, and the nature of relief that may be granted. The Conference took no position on the merits of the bill, but authorized the communication of the Committee’s reservations to the Congress.

Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference reaffirmed its previous action with respect to the proposals contained in these bills.

STANDING TO SUE

S. 680 and H. R. 1047, 96th Congress, would alter certain recent decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States relating to standing to sue. The bills provide, in general, that in actions against the United States or any state or local government, its agencies or its officials, alleging violations of the Federal Constitution or Federal law, standing to sue shall not be denied on any of four grounds:

1. That the suit raises a generalized grievance shared by all or a large class of persons;
2. That causation is not shown since the defendant’s conduct may not be the primary cause of the plaintiff’s injury;
3. That the remedy would be ineffective because a judgment for the plaintiff is unlikely to cure the plaintiff’s injury; and
4. That the alleged injury is not within the zone of interest to be protected or regulated by the applicable statutes or constitutional provision.

The bill would not affect the lack of standing of persons to sue as taxpayers nor the lack of standing of persons to challenge agency action which affects the liability or status of another person under the revenue laws.

Judge Hunter stated that the doctrine of standing under Supreme Court decisions “has become a blend of constitutional requirements and policy considerations.” The constitutional requirements arise out of the Article III mandate that the federal courts decide only cases and controversies. Some of the rules of standing, usually termed the “prudential”

least 40 persons, one of whom must be a representative party who adequately represents the class interest. It is similar in many respects to the procedure under Rule 23(b)(3), Federal Rules of Civil Procedure.

The Committee was of the view that the provisions of the draft bill would simplify the work of the trial judge in both the "public action" and the "compensatory class action." The Committee, however, recommended disapproval of the compensation provisions of the "public action" through a public recovery fund, as inappropriate for administration by any public agency, including the Administrative Office of the United States Courts or the office of the clerk of a district court. As an alternative the Committee suggested that a penalty provision, depriving a person of the fruits of unlawful conduct, may be an appropriate deterrent to illegal activity. Alternatively the Committee believed that consideration should be given to the use of a "fluid recovery" as an alternative to the payment of damages. The Committee also recommended that claims of less than \$15 not be paid because of the costs of administration. The Conference endorsed the views of the Committee and authorized their transmission to the Department of Justice.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION OF THE SUPREME COURT

S. 450 and H. R. 2700, 96th Congress, are bills to eliminate direct appeals to the Supreme Court, except in three-judge district court cases. These bills, as introduced, are similar to S. 3100, 95th Congress, which was approved by the Conference in March 1979 (Conf. Rept., p. 13). Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference reaffirmed its endorsement of the provisions in these bills as originally introduced.

ENFORCEMENT OF STATE CUSTODY ORDERS

H. R. 325 and H. R. 772, 96th Congress, would amend 28 U.S.C. 1332 to grant jurisdiction to a district court to enforce any custody order of a state court against a parent who, in contravention of such order, takes a child to another state. The Judicial Conference in March 1978 (Conf. Rept., p. 11)

limitations, are not constitutionally based. "Congress can, of course, resolve the question, one way or the other, save as the requirements of Article III dictate otherwise." The matter is complicated because a prudential limitation is not "always clearly distinguished from the constitutional limitation."

It appears that the sponsors of the bill believe that it would affect only "prudential limitations" on standing and that Congress is free to make changes in these rules and that the only constitutional requirement is "a personal stake in the outcome." In the recent case of *Duke Power Company v. Carolina Environmental Study Group, Inc.*, 98 S. Ct. 2620, 2630-2631 (1978), the Supreme Court said that the constitutional requirement of a "personal stake" means not only "a distinct and palpable injury to the plaintiff," but also "a 'fairly traceable' causal connection between the claimed injury and the challenged conduct," and that the causal connection element can be put otherwise as meaning "that the exercise of the Court's remedial powers would redress the claimed injuries."

Judge Hunter informed the Conference that the Committee believes the bill will have to be amended in the light of the *Duke Power* case and two other recent Supreme Court cases: *Orr v. Orr*, 99 S. Ct. 1102, 1107-1108 (1979); and *Gladstone Realtors v. Village of Bellwood*, 47 L. Wk. 4377 (April 17, 1979).

Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference voted to inform the Congress that it:

1. Opposes enactment of S. 680 in its present form;
2. Notes that there are questions as to the constitutionality of several provisions;
3. In any event, recommends that the bill be reconsidered in light of recent Supreme Court decisions;
4. Believes that prudential standing rules should not be treated in an "omnibus" approach such as S. 680, but individual problems should be resolved by amendments to individual statutes or by incorporating standing provisions in the enactment of new substantive statutes; and
5. Believes that complete elimination of prudential rules could require courts to decide questions which could be more appropriately decided in a constitutional democracy by the national legislature.

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DECLARATORY JUDGMENT IN CASES INVOLVING PUBLIC UTILITIES

H. R. 229, 96th Congress, would amend the Judicial Code to permit any Federal court to issue a declaratory judgment in a case of actual controversy between a utility and either the Secretary of the Treasury or a rate-making body with respect to certain provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954. The purpose of the legislation is to provide more timely judicial resolution of tax issues. Under present law, United States district courts do not have jurisdiction to issue declaratory judgments with respect to tax disputes.

As now drafted, the bill would permit regulatory agencies to place new utility rates into effect without waiting for the court to issue a declaratory judgment. The issuance of a stay by a Federal court pending conclusion of a declaratory judgment action would result in a violation of the established policy against federal interference in state proceedings, as contained in the Johnson Act, 28 U.S.C. 1342.

Judge Hunter reported that the Committee is opposed as a matter of principle to any unwarranted extension of federal jurisdiction over matters which traditionally have been left to the states and does not believe that the policy against federal intervention in local rate cases, as expressed in the Johnson Act, should be changed. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved the transmission of the Committee's conclusions to the Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee who had requested the views of the Conference on this bill.

JUDICIAL SURVIVORS ANNUITY ACT

H. R. 2974, 96th Congress, would amend the Judicial Survivors Annuity Act to provide that an annuity under the Act would not terminate by remarriage of an annuitant after attaining age sixty. The Committee, upon recommendation of the Conference, approved the bill.

The Conference further authorized the appointment of an ad hoc committee to give consideration to the adequacy of annuities payable to the survivors of judges who have served on the bench for a comparatively short period of time.

RETIREMENT OF TERRITORIAL JUDGES

H. R. 3452, 96th Congress would amend 28 U.S.C. 373 to provide a minimum level for retirement salaries of territorial judges. Similar legislation has been disapproved by the Judicial Conference in the past on the basis that the matter should more properly be the subject of a private relief bill. The Conference reaffirmed its disapproval of this legislation.

TENURE OF CHIEF JUDGES OF CIRCUIT AND DISTRICT COURTS

S. 862, 96th Congress, would permit the chief judges of circuit and district courts to serve beyond 70 years of age. Since the bill is inconsistent with the recommendation of the Conference with regard to Part A of Title I of S. 1477, 96th Congress, as shown above, the Conference disapproved the bill.

DELAY OF PROCEEDINGS BY ATTORNEYS

H. R. 4047, 96th Congress, would require any attorney admitted to practice in the Federal Courts personally to satisfy the costs, expenses, and attorneys' fees related to any case unnecessarily or primarily delayed by that attorney's personal conduct. It was the view of the Committee that a judge already has sufficient power to control attorneys in situations such as this and that no additional sanctions are needed. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference disapproved this legislation.

COST-OF-LIVING ALLOWANCES FOR JUDICIAL OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES SERVING OUTSIDE THE CONTINENTAL UNITED STATES OR IN ALASKA

At its March 1979 session (Conf. Rept., p. 12) the Conference recommended that, as a matter of equity, officers and employees in the Judicial Branch of Government should receive the same cost-of-living allowances provided in the Executive Branch to officers and employees serving outside the continental United States or in Alaska. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference reaffirmed its resolution of March 1979.

TRANSFER OF THE UNITED STATES PAROLE COMMISSION TO THE JUDICIAL BRANCH OF GOVERNMENT

Last June the Director of the Administrative Office received an urgent request from the Office of Management and Budget for the views of the Judiciary on a draft bill, proposed by the Attorney General, to transfer the United States Parole Commission to the Judicial Branch of Government. The Director expressed opposition to the proposal pointing out that this was a matter that should be addressed by the Judicial Conference and that he could not speak for the Judiciary. These views were subsequently confirmed in a letter to the Office of Management and Budget in which it was pointed out that the functions of the Parole Commission were executive in nature, not judicial; that it would be inappropriate to make such a transfer if the Commission is to be abolished—a proposition supported by the Administration with regard to the proposed revision of the Federal Criminal Code; and that the bill would create many problems for employees of the Commission, such as civil service status.

The bill would establish the Parole Commission as an independent and separate agency within the Judiciary not subject to the control of the Judicial Conference of the United States, but apparently intended to be supported administratively by the Administrative Office of the United States Courts.

The Committee recommended that the Judicial Conference strongly disapprove this proposed legislation and endorse the comments of the Director of the Administrative Office contained in his letter to the Office of Management and Budget. This recommendation was approved by the Conference.

LIBRARIES

Judge Hunter reported that the Committee had reviewed a report, prepared in the Administrative Office, recommending the creation of a national court library system based on the existing circuit central libraries. Satellite or branch libraries with professional staff would be located in those cities with a demonstrated need for such service where a circuit judge is also in residence. Eventually this library system would be expanded by establishing satellite libraries with professional

staff in courts where there is no resident circuit judge. Since there is statutory authority for the appointment of librarians only by the courts of appeals, it is necessary to seek legislative authority for the appointment of librarians at places where there is no resident circuit judge.

The central library in each circuit would be the center of legal research and services having primary responsibility to all judicial officers within its circuit and secondary responsibility to the entire Federal Judiciary. It will exchange materials with other circuit libraries and other sources outside the Federal judicial system. Satellite libraries would have the advantage of the services and facilities of the parent library, the services of the circuit head librarian, and the services of a unified, national library system.

Judge Hunter pointed out that this concept will place some limitation on the size of chambers libraries, but that the resultant monetary savings and increase in professional services had caused the Committee to conclude unanimously that the concept as presented in the report of the Administrative Office should be adopted. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved the concept of a central court library system and authorized the transmittal to Congress of the draft legislation recommended by the Committee to authorize the establishment of such a library system.

LIMITATIONS ON SALARIES OF A JUDGE'S PERSONAL STAFF

At the Conference session in March 1979 (Conf. Rept., p. 18), the Budget Committee reported that the limitation on the aggregate salaries payable to the personal staff of a circuit or district judge had been discussed at recent Congressional hearings and that the Budget Committee had suggested that the limitation language be stricken from the Appropriations Act. In this event, the Conference would prescribe the criteria and exercise control over the number of secretaries and law clerks to be employed by circuit and district judges, in addition to controlling classification and qualification standards. The Conference thereupon authorized the Subcommittee on Supporting Personnel to consider the criteria governing the number of law clerks and secretaries that may be employed

by circuit and district judges in addition to determining the classification and qualification standards to be applied under the Judiciary Salary Plan.

Subsequently, the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives, in commenting on the proposal, stated that "while the Committee feels that the ceilings would be more appropriately imposed by the Judicial Conference, it is reluctant to delete the language without a specific plan for imposing limits on these items. The matter will be reconsidered by the Committee upon submission of a plan and specific rules or regulations to be adopted by the Judicial Conference of the United States which should govern the number of secretaries and law clerks to be appointed by district judges, as well as the rates of compensation to be paid."

Judge Hunter reported that the Committee had developed the following plan which, upon recommendation of the Committee, was approved by the Conference.

Guidelines for the Employment of Secretaries
and Law Clerks by Circuit Judges, District Judges,
and Bankruptcy Judges

1. A district judge may employ a secretary and two law clerks, or a secretary, a law clerk and a crier, subject to the JSP grade levels and qualification standards adopted by the Judicial Conference.
2. A circuit judge may employ a secretary, an assistant secretary, and three law clerks, subject to the JSP grade levels and qualification standards adopted by the Judicial Conference.
3. The chief judge of each circuit and the chief judge of each district court having five or more district judges may employ an additional secretary or law clerk subject to the JSP grade level and qualification standards adopted by the Judicial Conference.
4. A bankruptcy judge may employ a secretary and a law clerk subject to the JSP grade levels and qualification standards adopted by the Judicial Conference.
5. With the proviso that no incumbent will be separated or reduced in grade, the maximum grade levels authorized by the Judicial Conference for law clerks, secretaries and criers are as follows:

Law Clerk, JSP-12*
Secretary, JSP-10**
Assistant Secretary, JSP-9
Crier, JSP-6

- * A law clerk who has served a Federal judge for five years or more will be eligible for JSP-13.
 - ** A secretary who has served a Federal judge for eight years or more, seven years at the JSP-10 level, will be eligible for grade JSP-11.
6. The Director of the Administrative Office may approve overlapping appointments of secretaries and law clerks of up to 30 days where the turnover of personnel would hinder the continuity of staff support for the judge.

COMMITTEE ON THE BUDGET

The report of the Committee on the Budget was submitted by the Chairman of the Committee, Chief Judge Robert E. Maxwell.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 1980

Judge Maxwell reported that the budget estimates submitted to the Congress for the fiscal year 1980 (exclusive of the Supreme Court) were initially in the amount of \$606,354,000. The budget was subsequently amended to include an additional \$1,008,000 for additional full-time magistrates and staff authorized by the Conference in March 1979. The sum of \$578,899,000 was approved by Congress (P.L. 96-68—Sept. 24, 1979), which was \$28,463,000 less than the amount requested, but an increase of \$75,719,000 over appropriations for the fiscal year 1979.

With respect to the bankruptcy courts, the House Appropriations Committee approved \$57,000,000, an increase of \$20,342,000 over the amount appropriated for 1979 but \$10,818,000 less than the amount requested. Subsequently, the Senate Appropriations Committee restored \$3,000,000. In a conference between the House and the Senate the increase was reduced to \$1,500,000, for a total appropriation of \$58,500,000.

The Appropriations Committees reduced the "Space and Facilities" appropriation by \$7,000,000 with the under-

standing that the United States Marshals Service would assume responsibility for court security in the fiscal year 1980. The Committees also denied requests for increases in the central legal staffs in the courts of appeals and requested that a study be made to determine the need for such central staffs.

The Conference authorized the Director of the Administrative Office to submit to Congress requests for supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year 1980 for "pay costs," and for the implementation of new legislation and actions of the Conference, and for any other reason he considers necessary and appropriate.

BUDGET ESTIMATES FOR FISCAL YEAR 1981

The Conference approved the budget estimates for the fiscal year 1981, which (exclusive of the Supreme Court, the Customs Court, and the Federal Judicial Center) aggregated \$618,734,000, an increase of approximately \$28,163,000 over appropriations for the fiscal year 1980. The Conference also approved proposed changes in the text of the Appropriation Act and authorized the Director of the Administrative Office to amend the budget estimates because of new legislation, actions of the Judicial Conference, or for any other reason the Director considers necessary and appropriate.

JUDICIAL ETHICS COMMITTEE

Judge Edward A. Tamm, Chairman of the Judicial Ethics Committee, presented the report of the Committee.

Judge Tamm informed the Conference that as of July 31, 1979 the Judicial Ethics Committee had received 1,541 reports from judges and judicial employees that were filed pursuant to the financial disclosure provisions of the Ethics in Government Act of 1978. As of that date reports had not been received from 28 individuals who, according to the records of the Committee, were required to file reports. In addition, four individuals had received extensions of time to file their reports.

Judge Tamm reported that most of the reports filed with the Committee have been reviewed by individual Committee members. Errors appearing in the reports have resulted in the writing of 364 letters to judicial officers and employees requesting additional information. In addition the Committee has sent 140 letters to individuals who failed to file reports as of May 15th. These letters have resulted in most cases in the filing of the disclosure forms. Letters requesting extensions of time have been received from 87 judicial officers and employees. Extensions were granted where the record disclosed a substantial and meaningful basis for the request. Judge Tamm also indicated that 8 inquiries concerning the interpretation of the statute had been referred to the Advisory Panel on Financial Disclosure Reports and Judicial Activities.

The Committee has also received, reviewed, and acknowledged the receipt of financial disclosure reports from 108 Presidential nominees for Federal judgeship positions.

Judge Tamm informed the Conference that on May 15th he was advised that a United States district judge in New Orleans had enjoined the public disclosure of financial disclosure forms. Because of this action the Committee has not made any financial disclosure statement available to the public since receiving notice of the order, nor has the Committee referred to the Attorney General any case involving the nonfiling of a financial disclosure report. Further action by the Committee awaits the final disposition of the civil proceedings instituted in New Orleans.

Because of the restraints imposed on the Committee's operation, and in the interest of efficiency, Judge Tamm stated that the Committee has not yet held a meeting to appraise and make appropriate recommendations to the Conference. A number of problems have already appeared that will require changes in the form, instructions, policies and programs of the Committee. A January meeting of the Committee is planned to consider these matters. At the same time the Committee will meet jointly with the Advisory Panel to consider problems affecting both Committees.

The report of the Committee was accepted by the Conference and the Committee was commended for its discharge of a difficult responsibility.

ADVISORY PANEL ON FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE REPORTS AND JUDICIAL ACTIVITIES

Judge Markey informed the Conference that the Advisory Panel was organized in April 1979. In June 1979, pursuant to a mail vote of the Conference, the Panel was assigned the responsibility of rendering advisory opinions on the various codes of conduct, a function previously performed by the predecessor Committee on Judicial Activities. At its initial meeting the Panel adopted the following methods for considering inquiries pertaining to financial disclosure reports:

- (a) The Panel will consider only written financial disclosure inquiries and will tender its advice only in writing. The Chairman is authorized informal discussions with callers concerning potential inquiries.
- (b) Disclosure inquiries are numbered (Inquiry No. 79-1, 79-2, etc.).
- (c) To speed its work, the Panel divided into Division A and Division B, each now composed of 6 judges. The Chairman is not assigned to a division.
- (d) On receipt of a disclosure inquiry, the Chairman assigns its number, prepares a proposed response, and forwards the inquiry and proposed response to all judges of a division. Odd-numbered inquiries are sent to Division A, even-numbered to Division B.
- (e) Division members communicate their views to the Chairman. If there be differences, a conference call is arranged by the Chairman.
- (f) If the division is unanimous, its advice is forwarded to the inquirer by the Chairman without comment.
- (g) If a division be divided, the inquiry file is sent to the other division. The advice approved by the majority of the Panel is forwarded to the inquirer. If the Panel divides evenly, then and only then does the Chairman vote.

The Panel has modified its procedure to the extent of using docket numbers in place of inquiry numbers and is considering a new procedure for handling inquiries pertaining to the various codes of conduct.

As of the date of its report the Panel had considered and responded to inquiries concerning financial disclosure reports submitted by 33 persons and had 5 inquiries under consideration. The Panel has also considered and responded to

inquiries pertaining to the codes of conduct from 5 persons and had inquiries from 7 persons under consideration.

CODES OF CONDUCT FOR STAFF ATTORNEYS, CIRCUIT EXECUTIVES AND PUBLIC DEFENDERS

The Panel submitted for Conference consideration proposed Codes of Conduct for Staff Attorneys, Circuit Executives and Public Defenders. All three codes prohibit the private practice of law, with the exception that a staff attorney would be permitted, within limitations, to perform "routine legal work necessary to the management of the personal affairs of the staff attorney or a member of his family."

It was the view of the Conference that the provisions of the Code with respect to the practice of law should be consistent and that the exception provided in the code of conduct for staff attorneys should also be included in the codes of conduct for circuit executives and public defenders. With these amendments the codes were approved by the Conference.

The Conference also directed the Panel to review the provisions pertaining to the practice of law in the codes of conduct for clerks of court, probation officers, and officers and employees in the Administrative Office of the United States Courts and the Federal Judicial Center and to report any changes necessary in these codes.

COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE FEDERAL MAGISTRATES SYSTEM

The report of the Committee on the Administration of the Federal Magistrates System was presented by the Chairman, Senior Judge Charles M. Metzner.

QUALIFICATION STANDARDS AND SELECTION PROCEDURES

Judge Metzner reported that the amendments to the Federal Magistrates act contained in S. 237, 96th Congress, would require the Conference at its first meeting following enactment of the legislation to issue binding regulations governing the appointment and reappointment of United States magistrates by the district courts. Anticipating passage of the Act before the current session of the Conference, the Committee had

prepared draft regulations setting forth standards and procedures for the appointment of magistrates. Since legislative action on the bill had not been completed, Judge Metzner stated that the Committee would give further consideration to these regulations and report to the Conference thereon at its next session.

SALARIES OF FULL-TIME MAGISTRATES

The salary schedule for full-time magistrates, approved by the Conference in September 1977 (Conf. Rept., p. 63) provided a two-tier salary structure. With the approval of the appointing court a full-time magistrate admitted to the bar for 10 years or more may be paid a salary of \$48,500 per annum, except the full-time magistrate at Yosemite National Park. Other full-time magistrates are paid salaries of \$42,500 per annum. After review of the current salary plan and in view of the qualification standards and selection procedures required by the currently pending amendments to the Federal Magistrates Act, the Committee recommended that there be a single salary level of \$48,500 per annum for full-time magistrates who have been members of the bar of the highest court of a state for a period of five years or more, except the full-time magistrate at Yosemite National Park. This recommendation was approved by the Conference.

SALARIES OF PART-TIME MAGISTRATES

The Conference had previously established a system of 15 salary levels for part-time magistrates. The part-time magistrates, however, do not automatically receive comparability pay adjustments applicable to federal employees generally.

Judge Metzner informed the Conference that the Committee had reviewed the current salary levels, which have not been changed since May 1977, and concluded that the schedule should be adjusted to grant salary increases of approximately 7 percent to all part-time magistrates. Upon recommendation of the Committee the Conference adopted the following salary levels for part-time magistrates effective October 1, 1979, subject to the availability of funds:

CHANGES IN MAGISTRATE POSITIONS

After consideration of the report of the Committee and the recommendations of the Director of the Administrative Office, the district courts and the judicial councils of the circuits, the Conference approved the following changes in salaries and arrangements for full-time and part-time magistrates. Unless otherwise indicated these changes are to become effective when appropriated funds are available. The salaries for full-time magistrates are to be determined in accordance with the salary plan previously adopted by the Conference.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA CIRCUIT

District of Columbia

- (1) Continued the full-time magistrate position at Washington, D.C., which is due to expire on June 21, 1980, for an additional eight-year term.

FOURTH CIRCUIT

North Carolina, Western

- (1) Continued the deputy clerk-magistrate position at Charlotte for an additional four-year term.
- (2) Increased the salary of the magistrate portion of the deputy clerk-magistrate combination position at Charlotte from \$12,240 to \$13,600 per annum in order to fit the salary of the position into one of the standard salary levels for part-time magistrates.

South Carolina

- (1) Authorized a new part-time magistrate position at Columbia at a salary of \$11,800 per annum.

*The maximum salary to be paid a part-time magistrate is one half of the \$48,500 salary of a full-time magistrate.

Virginia, Eastern

- (1) Continued the full-time magistrate position at Alexandria, which is due to expire on December 31, 1979, for an additional eight-year term.

FIFTH CIRCUIT

Florida, Northern

- (1) Increased the salary of the part-time magistrate position at Tallahassee from \$5,950 to \$17,900 per annum.

Florida, Middle

- (1) Authorized a second full-time magistrate position to be located at Jacksonville.

Georgia, Southern

- (1) Converted the part-time magistrate position at Savannah to full-time status.

Texas, Western

- (1) Discontinued the part-time magistrate positions at Marfa and Kerrville.
- (2) Increased the salary of the part-time magistrate position at Pecos from \$16,750 to \$24,250 per annum.
- (3) Increased the salary of the part-time magistrate position at Midland/Odessa from \$3,400 to \$6,400 per annum.
- (4) Continued the part-time magistrate position at El Paso for an additional four-year term at the currently authorized salary of \$24,250.

SIXTH CIRCUIT

Michigan, Western

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Marquette for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$900 per annum.

SEVENTH CIRCUIT

Illinois, Northern

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Rockford/Freeport for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$24,250 per annum.

Illinois, Southern

- (1) Converted the part-time magistrate position at Belleville to full-time status at East Saint Louis.

Indiana, Southern

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Evansville for an additional four-year term.
- (2) Increased the salary of the part-time magistrate position at Evansville from \$2,550 to \$4,500 per annum.

EIGHTH CIRCUIT

Iowa, Northern

- (1) Converted the deputy clerk-magistrate position at Cedar Rapids to full-time status.
- (2) Discontinued the part-time magistrate positions at Waterloo and Fort Dodge, effective upon the appointment of a full-time magistrate at Cedar Rapids.
- (3) Redesignated the deputy clerk-magistrate position at Cedar Rapids as a "deputy clerk-magistrate or clerk-magistrate" position until the appointment of a full-time magistrate at Cedar Rapids.

Iowa, Southern

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Burlington for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$2,700 per annum.
- (2) Discontinued the part-time magistrate position at Davenport at the expiration of the current term.

NINTH CIRCUIT

Montana

- (1) Increased the salaries of the part-time magistrate positions at Billings and Great Falls from \$2,550 to \$15,500 per annum each.
- (2) Discontinued the part-time magistrate position at Hardin.

Nevada

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Reno for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$24,250 per annum.
- (2) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Elko for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$900 per annum.

Oregon

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Pendleton for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$900 per annum.
- (2) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Coquille for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$900 per annum.

TENTH CIRCUIT

Oklahoma, Eastern

- (1) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Muskogee for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$20,300 per annum.
- (2) Continued the part-time magistrate position at McAlester for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$1,800 per annum.
- (3) Continued the part-time magistrate position at Sulphur for an additional four-year term at a salary of \$3,600 per annum.

Colorado

- (1) Authorized a third full-time magistrate position at Denver.

The Conference also ratified the action taken by the Executive Committee of the Conference to continue the part-time magistrate position at Albany in the Middle District of Georgia, which would have expired on June 30, 1979, at a salary of \$4,250 per annum. The position was continued for a new four-year term and the salary will be \$4,500 per annum under the new salary structure.

LEGAL MANUAL FOR UNITED STATES MAGISTRATES

Judge Metzner informed the Conference that a new *Legal Manual for United States Magistrates* had been published and distributed to all magistrates and district judges. The manual, prepared in the Magistrates Division of the Administrative Office, was reviewed prior to publication by experienced magistrates and by members of the Committee. It currently includes six chapters covering the jurisdiction of magistrates and the conduct of preliminary proceedings in criminal cases.

Additional chapters are being prepared so that the manual, when completed, will cover the full range of duties performed by United States magistrates for the district courts.

STUDY OF THE MAGISTRATES SYSTEM

Judge Metzner also informed the Conference that the pending amendments to the Federal Magistrates Act would require the Judicial Conference to undertake a two-year study "concerning the future of the magistrate system, the precise scope of such study to be suggested by the Chairmen of the Judiciary Committees of each House of Congress." The Committee is planning to undertake such a study.

COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE
BANKRUPTCY SYSTEM

The report of the Committee on the Administration of the Bankruptcy System was presented by the Chairman, Judge Edward Weinfeld.

SALARIES AND ARRANGEMENTS FOR BANKRUPTCY JUDGES

The Conference considered the Committee's report, together with the recommendations of the Director of the Administrative Office, the judicial councils of the circuits, and the district courts concerned, and took the following action relating to bankruptcy judge positions and changes in salaries and arrangements. The Conference directed that, subject to the availability of funds, these actions become effective on October 1, 1979:

FIFTH CIRCUIT

Mississippi, Southern

- (1) Established a second full-time bankruptcy judge position with headquarters at Biloxi at the salary authorized by Congress for a full-time bankruptcy judge.
- (2) Authorized concurrent district-wide jurisdiction for the two full-time bankruptcy judges in the district.

- (3) Designated Natches and Hattiesburg in addition to Jackson, Biloxi, Meridian and Vicksburg as places of holding court for the two full-time bankruptcy judges.

SEVENTH CIRCUIT

Wisconsin, Western

- (1) Established concurrent district-wide jurisdiction for the full-time bankruptcy judge at Madison and the part-time bankruptcy judge at Eau Claire with designated places of holding court at Madison, Eau Claire, Wausau, Superior, and LaCrosse.

COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROBATION SYSTEM

The report of the Committee on the Administration of the Probation System was presented by the Chairman, Judge Gerald B. Tjoflat.

SENTENCING INSTITUTES

The Committee submitted to the Conference a plan for a joint institute on sentencing for the judges of the Third and Sixth Circuits to be held at Lexington, Kentucky in May 1980, with one day at a nearby correctional institution. The agenda for the sentencing institute is similar to the agenda for the joint sentencing institute for the judges of the First, Fourth, and District of Columbia Circuits held in April 1979. The Conference approved the time, place, participants and agenda for this sentencing institute.

Judge Tjoflat informed the Conference that the Chief Judge of the Fifth Circuit had approved the attendance of two faculty members of the Yale Law School at the forthcoming sentencing institute for the judges of the Fifth Circuit to be held in Dallas, Texas on October 3-5, 1979 on an experimental basis. The Yale faculty is presently planning workshops on federal sentencing, parole, and federal prisoners.

DISPARITY IN SENTENCES

Judge Tjoflat reported that the Committee had reviewed the recent Comptroller General's report to the Congress entitled *Reducing Federal Judicial Sentencing and Prosecuting Disparities: A System-wide Approach Needed*. The report recommended that the Judicial Conference (1) in cooperation with the Attorney General, undertake a comprehensive assessment of the nature and extent of undesirable sentencing disparity in the federal criminal justice system; (2) establish appropriate policy guidance for judges to use, at their discretion, in sentencing decisions; (3) establish a reporting and review mechanism to collect sentencing data and periodically study the adequacy of sentencing decisions; and (4) request from the Congress any legislative, statutory, or rule changes needed to improve the sentencing process.

The Committee noted that the probation system is currently cooperating with two major studies on sentencing, one conducted by the Institute for Law and Social Research and the other by Yale University, both of which are being funded by Department of Justice programs. The Committee further noted that with respect to establishing a reporting and review mechanism to collect sentencing data, the Probation Information Management System, reported below, is a long range answer to that problem. With respect to the recommendation that the Judicial Conference establish policy guidance for judges to use discretionarily in sentencing decisions, there presently is no statutory framework for the Conference to set recommended guidelines.

Upon recommendation of the Committee the Conference adopted the following policy statement:

The Committee has reviewed the report of the General Accounting Office and its recommendations. The Committee has also reviewed the several pieces of legislation pending before Congress that would establish within the judicial branch or elsewhere special bodies to develop procedures and mechanisms to guide the exercise of discretion in sentencing.

The GAO report recommends the collection and maintenance of more complete data on the sentencing process to facilitate the formulation of policy to guide judicial discretion in sentencing. The Committee agrees with that recommendation and notes that steps to accomplish it have already been initiated by the Committee, working with the Administrative Office and the Federal Judicial Center. Development

of the Probation Information Management System (PIMS), recommended by the Committee will go a long way toward providing the data suggested by the report.

Three additional recommendations call upon the Judicial Conference to (1) "establish policy guidance for judges," (2) "periodically study the adequacy of sentencing decisions," and (3) "request from the Congress" any authority needed to assure that "sentencing of criminals is consistent and fair among and within districts."

As to these three recommendations, the Committee believes that it would be inappropriate for the Judicial Conference to initiate a program to reduce undesirable sentencing disparity in district courts until Congress resolves certain fundamental issues relating to the sentencing function. Pending bills set forth varying and sometimes conflicting objectives and criteria for reducing disparity in sentencing. The Committee notes that some critical decisions, including the role of parole in the corrections process, are beyond the reach of any determination that might be made by the Judicial Conference.

The Committee shares the general concern that sentencing should operate fairly and equitably for all offenders. We believe that at this time the Judicial Conference should not attempt to establish guidelines to eliminate undesirable disparity until the disposition of the legislative proposals now pending before Congress. Federal judges possess vast experience in sentencing and bear the responsibility for carrying out sentencing policy established by Congress. The Judicial Conference through the Probation Committee should continue to address the problem of undesirable sentencing disparity. If Congress should fail to adopt new measures relating to sentencing, the Judicial Conference should consider recommending guidelines for use at the discretion of district judges to reduce undesirable disparity in sentencing.

PROBATION INFORMATION MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

The Judicial Conference in September 1977 (Conf. Rept., p. 74) endorsed the concept of a new probation information management system that would meet the needs of the users in the field; the judge in his day-to-day sentencing problems; the needs of a national system for budget, planning, and management control purposes; and the needs of researchers seeking to improve understanding of the treatment of offenders.

Judge Tjoflat informed the Conference that the first phase of the program is now complete and that the Administrative Office is now engaged in developing user requirements for a model information system. This effort will require the participation of eight district courts and the staffs of the Administrative Office and the Federal Judicial Center. The Board of the Center has endorsed the project as well as the Center's participation.

PRETRIAL SERVICES AGENCIES

Title II of the Speedy Trial Act of 1974 required the Director of the Administrative office to file a comprehensive report with the Congress on or before July 1, 1979 regarding the administration and operation of pretrial services agencies in the ten demonstration districts. In March 1979 (Conf. Rept., p. 35) the Conference authorized the Committee to exercise continued oversight of the completion on the Director's report, and authorize on behalf of the Conference the release of the Director's report to the Congress.

Judge Tjoflat informed the Conference that the Committee had cleared the Director's report and recommendations for transmission to Congress. A copy of the report had previously been provided to the members of the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE CRIMINAL LAW

The report of the Committee on the Administration of the Criminal Law was presented by the Chairman, Judge Alexander Harvey II.

HABEAS CORPUS

H. R. 2201, 96th Congress, would amend sections 2254 and 2255 of Title 28, United States Code, to require a district court to entertain a habeas corpus application from a state prisoner without regard to whether the State court had afforded the applicant an opportunity for a full and fair litigation of the constitutional claim upon which the application was based. The bill would overrule the decision of the Supreme Court in *Stone v. Powell*, 428 U.S. 465 (1976), which held that

where a State court has afforded an opportunity for the full and fair litigation of a Fourth Amendment claim, a petitioner in a Federal court may not be granted Federal habeas corpus relief on the ground that evidence obtained in an unconstitutional search or seizure had been introduced at his trial. While the bill as drafted might appear to eliminate the well-established requirement that a prisoner must exhaust remedies in State courts before seeking Federal habeas corpus relief, the Committee was advised that the sole purpose of the legislation is to overrule *Stone v. Powell* and not to eliminate the exhaustion requirement.

It was the view of the Committee that the desirability or necessity for this legislation is for the Congress to decide and that the Conference should take no position on the policy question involved. The Committee recommended, however, that subsection (2) of section 1 of the bill be modified, as shown below, to reflect more precisely the intent of the drafters.

- (2) by inserting before the period of subsection (a) a comma and the following: "without regard to whether a full and fair litigation of such claim has already been had in state court, so long as such person has fully exhausted his available state remedies concerning the question presented."

The Committee also noted that the passage of the bill would undoubtedly impact on the Federal courts by increasing the caseload. The recommendation was approved by the Conference.

FEES AND EXPENSES OF ATTORNEYS REPRESENTING INDIGENT PERSONS IN CIVIL RIGHTS ACTIONS

Judge Harvey stated that the Committee had considered the problem of paying the fees and expenses of attorneys appointed by district courts to represent indigent persons in civil rights actions. Since this subject is not within the jurisdiction of the Criminal law Committee, the Conference directed that it be referred to another standing committee of the Conference, or to a special committee, for study and report.

IN CAMERA SCREENING OF CLASSIFIED INFORMATION

S. 1482, 96th Congress, is a bill to establish a procedure for the *in camera* screening of classified information by a judge before such information may be introduced in a Federal criminal proceeding. The bill would permit a party to move for a pretrial conference to consider matters relating to classified information expected to arise in the course of a criminal trial. To prevent the release of classified information the court would be authorized to issue protective orders, delete specified items of information, or order substitution of summaries of information contained in classified documents. The bill would also require a defendant who expects to disclose classified information to give advance notice thereof to the Government.

Judge Harvey informed the Conference that while the Committee is not entirely persuaded of the necessity for the legislation, it is not opposed to the bill. He pointed out, however, that the bill would require the Chief Justice of the United States, in consultation with the Attorney General, the Director of Central Intelligence, and the Secretary of Defense to prescribe security procedures for protection against the release of classified information submitted to Federal courts. It was the view of the Committee that the promulgation of security procedures should be made the responsibility of the Judicial Conference rather than that of the Chief Justice. The bill also provides for the preservation by "the United States" of the sealed record of undisclosed classified information. It was the view of the Committee that such information should be preserved by the courts.

Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved the legislation with the modifications suggested.

COMMITTEE ON THE OPERATION OF THE JURY SYSTEM

Chief Judge C. Clyde Atkins, Chairman of the Committee on the Operation of the Jury System, presented the report of the Committee.

USE OF VOTER REGISTRATION LISTS

At its session in April 1976 (Conf. Rept., p. 9) the Conference endorsed legislation authorizing the use of voter registration lists as a presumptively sufficient sole source for the names of prospective Federal jurors. The legislation recommended by the Conference would have established a statutory presumption that juries chosen from voter registration lists or lists of actual voters represent a fair cross-section of the community and would have required an affirmative finding by the district court that this presumption had been rebutted before the court could prescribe other sources of juror names in addition to the voter lists. This proposal was submitted to the 94th Congress and the 95th Congress, but was not included in the enactment of the Jury System Improvements Act of 1978.

It was the view of the Committee that this proposed legislation would be helpful in establishing greater certainty in the jury trial process, thus reducing the number of legal challenges to jury selection. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved a new draft bill which would effect this amendment and authorized its transmission to the Congress.

CHILD CARE EXCUSE OF JURORS

The jury selection statute, 28 U.S.C. 1863(b)(5), authorizes district courts to specify in their jury selection plans those groups of persons or occupational classes whose members shall be entitled to be excused from jury service upon individual request to the court. One such category commonly found in the selection plans adopted by the district courts consists of those persons who are needed to care for children under a particular age.

In the recent case of *Duren v. Missouri*, 439 U.S. 357 (1979) the Supreme Court held that a state's automatic exemption of women from jury service upon request denied a criminal defendant's constitutional right to trial by a jury drawn from a fair cross-section of the community. The Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice has examined the excuse provisions contained in the jury selection plans of the district courts and has noted that many plans authorize the excuse

only of women who have custody of children. The Civil Rights Division has recommended that these provisions should be reworded so as to provide for the excuse of all persons having the daily responsibility of child care, not just women or mothers, and to ensure that they do not have the overbroad effect of excusing parents not actually needed for the care of young children during the business day.

The jury selection plan adopted by the Northern District of Alabama contains a provision making eligible for excuse from jury service

Persons having active care and custody of a child or children under 10 years of age whose health and/or safety would be jeopardized by their absence for jury service; or a person who is essential to the care of aged or infirm persons.

While each court should be encouraged to arrive at an individual decision on the appropriate maximum age of children that should entitle a parent or guardian to be excused from jury service on account of child care responsibilities, the Committee recommended that the Conference authorize a communication to district courts urging those courts to review the child-care excuse provisions of their jury selection plans in light of the Supreme Court decision, the views of the Civil Rights Division, and the above example in the jury plan of the Northern District of Alabama, which was cited as a model. This recommendation was approved by the Conference.

EMERGENCY ENERGY SHORTAGE PROCEDURES

Judge Atkins reported that the Committee had considered the prospective impact of a severe or prolonged gasoline shortage on the judicial process, particularly the need to insure the presence of a sufficient number of jurors. The Committee believed that each district court should have a contingency plan setting forth the means available to obtain emergency gasoline supplies for the use of the court, its personnel, and jurors. Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference took the following action:

1. Requested that each United States district court devise a contingency plan governing its operation in the event of an emergency shortage of gasoline adversely affecting the availability of transportation within that judicial district. Such plan should aim to minimize any disruption of

scheduled trials by implementing all available means to expedite the transportation of judges, court personnel, and jurors.

2. Recommended that any district court which might be faced with a local energy shortage of emergency dimensions should consider making application to the judicial council of its circuit for an emergency suspension of the Speedy Trial Act time limitations, in accordance with 18 U.S.C. 3174.
3. Authorized appointment of an ad hoc committee to monitor the nationwide implications of the energy problem upon the Judiciary and to develop, with the assistance of the Administrative Office, a national plan to assist individual federal courts in gaining access to auxiliary supplies of gasoline in the event of an emergency.
4. Directed the Administrative Office to investigate the feasibility of procuring emergency stocks of gasoline for allocation by affected courts to their personnel and jurors and to obtain from the Department of Energy any necessary allocation authority for this purpose. To this end, the Administrative Office is authorized to establish a pilot district or districts in order to aid the development of such a gasoline supply mechanism and to investigate any alternative means to afford jurors a priority right to purchase gasoline required for their transportation to court.

ORIENTATION FILM FOR GRAND JURORS

The Committee suggested that it would be useful to have available an orientation film for Federal grand jurors, similar to the orientation film for petit jurors which was produced by Wayne State University under a grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration and the Michigan Bar Foundation. At present no private organization has undertaken to finance the production of such a grand jury orientation film. The Conference thereupon approved a request of the Committee that it be authorized to investigate sources of private funding for the development of such a film.

COMMITTEE ON INTERCIRCUIT ASSIGNMENTS

The written report of the Committee on Intercircuit Assignments submitted by the Chairman, Judge George L. Hart, Jr., was received by the Conference.

The report indicated that during the period from February 16, 1979 through August 15, 1979, the Committee had recommended 41 intercircuit assignments to be undertaken by 32 judges. Of this number, five were senior circuit judges, one was an active circuit judge, five were district judges in active status and 14 were senior district judges. Eight assignments involved three active judges and two senior judges of the Court of Claims, one active judge of the Customs Court and one active judge of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals.

Four senior circuit judges, nine senior district judges and two senior judges from the Court of Claims carried out 19 of the 24 assignments to the courts of appeals. One active circuit judge, one active judge of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals and three active judges of the Court of Claims participated in the other five assignments to the courts of appeals.

Of the 15 assignments to the district courts, seven senior district judges participated in one assignment each, the remaining eight being carried out by four active district judges, one senior circuit judge and one active judge of the Customs Court.

Of the two assignments to the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals, one was carried out by an active district judge and the other by an active circuit judge.

In addition to the above, an interchange of assignments between the active judges of the United States Court of Claims and the active judges of the United States Court of Customs and Patent Appeals has been approved to cover any emergency which may arise from April 1, 1979 to March 31, 1980. Similarly, the active judges of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit have been assigned to the Temporary Emergency Court of Appeals from March 20, 1979 to March 20, 1980.

COMMITTEE TO IMPLEMENT THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACT

Senior Judge Dudley B. Bonsal, Chairman of the Committee to Implement the Criminal Justice Act, presented the Committee's report.

APPOINTMENTS AND PAYMENTS

The Conference authorized the Director of the Administrative Office to distribute copies of a report on appointments and payments under the Criminal Justice Act for the first half of the fiscal year 1979 to all chief judges, all federal defender organizations and to others who may request copies. The report indicated that the sum of \$24,800,000 was appropriated by Congress for the administration of the Act during the fiscal year 1979 and that projected obligations during the year are \$23,973,000. During the first half of the fiscal year approximately 19,084 persons were represented under the Criminal Justice Act compared to 20,328 during the first half of the fiscal year 1978, a decrease of 6.1 percent. Federal public defenders represented 6,618 persons during the first half of the fiscal year 1979 and community defender organizations represented 3,583 persons. Collectively, these offices accounted for 53.5 percent of all representations.

The Committee estimated that the average cost of representation under the Criminal Justice Act during the fiscal year 1979, including appeal, will be \$469 per case for private panel attorneys, \$464 per case for Community Defender Organizations, and \$574 per case for Federal Public Defender offices.

BUDGET REQUESTS—FEDERAL PUBLIC DEFENDERS

The Criminal Justice Act, as amended, requires each Federal Public Defender Organization, established pursuant to 18 U.S.C. 3006A(h)(2)(a), to submit a proposed budget to be approved by the Judicial Conference in accordance with Section 605 of Title 28, United States Code. The Conference approved the following budgetary requests for these offices:

COMMUNITY DEFENDER—CONDITIONS OF GRANT

In March 1979 (Conf. Rept., p. 39) the Conference adopted terms and conditions governing sustaining grants to Community Defender Organizations commencing with the fiscal year 1980. Clause 6 of the grant conditions, dealing with the submission of annual reports by Community Defender Organizations, was written to apply to the prior practice of the Committee of considering grant requests annually at its January meeting. Judge Bonsal reported that the Committee has resolved to consolidate the consideration of all fiscal matters and funding requests for both Federal Public and Community Defender Organizations annually at its June meeting. In order to conform the grant conditions to the new Committee practice, the Conference, upon recommendation of the Committee, amended Clause 6 of the grant conditions to read as follows:

6. ANNUAL REPORTS: As required by subsection (h)(2)(B) of the CJA, the Grantee must submit an annual report setting forth its activities, financial position and the anticipated caseload and expenses for the coming year. Instructions for completing the annual report and its date of submission will be provided to the Grantee by the Administrative Office at least thirty (30) days prior to the submission date.

AMENDMENTS TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACT GUIDELINES

The Conference, upon recommendation of the Committee, approved the following amendments to the Guidelines for the Administration of the Criminal Justice Act:

1. An amendment to paragraph 3.03 of the Guidelines to require *ex parte* applications for services other than counsel under subsection (e) to be heard *in camera*.
2. An amendment to paragraph 2.12 of the Guidelines with regard to the appointment of counsel in cases transferred from one judicial district to another to make reference to Rule 20 as well as Rules 40 and 41, Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure.
3. An amendment to paragraph 2.27(C) to make it clear that interim reimbursement procedures are available for the expenses of counsel and to limit the circumstances of interim reimbursement to cases in which expenses are extraordinary and substantial. The existing paragraph 2.27(C) is to become paragraph 2.27(D).
4. Amend paragraph 2.31 to provide guidance and uniformity in the use of and payments to law students and legal interns assisting counsel appointed under the Act.
5. Amend paragraph 4.02(B) of the Guidelines to make clear that the receipt and use of grant funds is subject to the conditions of grant approved by the Conference and replace Appendix D with the conditions of grant so approved.

COMMITTEE ON RULES OF PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE

The report of the Committee on Rules of Practice and Procedure was submitted by the Chairman, Senior Judge Roszel C. Thomsen.

CIVIL RULES

Upon recommendation of the Committee, the Conference approved for transmittal to the Supreme Court of the United States a series of proposed amendments to Rules 4, 5, 26, 28, 30, 32, 33, 34, 37, and 45, Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. Judge Thomsen stated that the proposed rules had twice been circulated to the bench and bar for comment, that public hearings had been held in Washington, D.C. and Los

Angeles, California and that the Advisory Committee had fully considered the many comments received. The proposed amendments were designed primarily to enable the district courts to control abuses in the discovery process, which, in recent years, had been the subject of public criticism. The Conference also authorized the transmission of the Advisory Committee's report to the Supreme Court together with the proposed amendments and the Advisory Committee notes.

BANKRUPTCY RULES

Judge Thomsen advised the Conference that the Chief Justice has appointed a new Advisory Committee on Bankruptcy Rules to consider amendments to the rules of bankruptcy procedure required by the new Bankruptcy Code, which became effective on October 1, 1979. To assist the bankruptcy courts in applying the existing bankruptcy rules to bankruptcy cases commenced under the new Bankruptcy Code, the Advisory Committee recently distributed interim rules or guidelines with the suggestion that they be adopted as local bankruptcy rules pending promulgation of binding amendments to the bankruptcy rules. Copies of the interim rules were made available to the members of the Conference for their information.

APPELLATE RULES

Judge Thomsen stated that the Advisory Committee on Appellate Rules has not met since the last session of the Conference, but that the reporter to the Committee has been preparing materials for Committee consideration, concentrating on problems relating to the use of a printed record on appeal. A meeting of the Advisory Committee will be scheduled as soon as this material is available.

The amendments to the Appellate Rules, approved by the Conference last September, were approved by the Supreme Court and were submitted by the Chief Justice to the Congress on April 30th and became effective August 1st.

CRIMINAL RULES

The amendments to the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure, approved by the Conference in September 1978, (Conf. Rept., p. 84) were also approved by the Supreme Court and transmitted to the Congress by the Chief Justice on April 30th. The order of the Supreme Court approving the amended rules would have made them effective on August 1, 1979. Congress, however, decided to postpone the effective date of several amendments until December 1980, thus giving the Congress an opportunity to consider those amendments during the second session of the 96th Congress.

The Advisory Committee is presently considering proposed amendments to "Rules for the Trial of Misdemeanors Before United States Magistrates" in the event jurisdiction in misdemeanor cases is given to magistrates by the proposed amendments to the Federal Magistrates Act. The Advisory Committee is also considering other suggested amendments to the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure.

COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER STANDARDS FOR ADMISSION TO PRACTICE IN THE FEDERAL COURTS

Chief Judge Edward J. Devitt, Chairman of the Committee to Consider Standards for Admission to Practice in the Federal Courts, presented the final report of the Committee. Judge Devitt informed the Conference that its final report represents the culmination of three years work during which time the Committee investigated the issue thoroughly, held numerous hearings and meetings throughout the country, made tentative recommendations to the Conference, and solicited and received substantial comment from the bench, bar, and public concerning its recommendations. The Committee was aided in its work by surveys conducted by the Federal Judicial Center which have established that there is a substantial problem relating to the adequacy of trial advocacy in the Federal trial courts.

After full discussion the Conference adopted the following resolution:

RESOLVED: 1(a). That the Judicial Conference create a special committee of the Conference to oversee and monitor,

on a pilot basis, an examination on federal practice subjects, a trial experience requirement and a peer review procedure, in a selected number of district courts that indicate a desire to cooperate in any or all of the above programs.

1(b). The Conference makes no recommendations at this time on any of the above noted admission standards to any districts other than those participating in the pilot programs.

1(c). The following guidelines, shall, without excluding others that the implementing committee may adopt, constitute a basis for planning, carrying out and assessing the pilot programs:

1. Combinations and permutations of the different remedies should be adopted in different localities so that the relative merits of different proposals might be judged. For example, one district might adopt all of the Committee's proposed requirements, while another might adopt just the trial experience requirement and peer review.

2. Local districts should be able to modify the proposals to meet special needs of their practice. For example, a district with a great number of sole practitioners might establish, with the cooperation of the local bar, a seminar and mock trial program that would satisfy the experience requirement. Another might mandate that the experience requirement could be met by supervision of the fledgling lawyer at his first federal court trial or two by an experienced volunteer litigator. A district could also limit examination to those subjects not tested on the state or multi-state bar exams.

3. The operation of the requirements must be carefully observed to see whether any are effective in raising the quality of trial advocacy and whether any burdens imposed on the bar are compensated by improved lawyering.

4. Because there is so much yet to know about the quality of trial advocacy, it is imperative that sufficient time, money and expertise be available for studying the pilot programs. The knowledge gained may be more valuable than any improvement in trial skills. Experience with the pilot programs should help improve understanding of the general state of lawyering skills, help to formulate workable standards for evaluating courtroom performance, and facilitate prediction of what means are most appropriate for addressing specific failings of advocacy.

5. Finally, as a general proposition, attitudes toward the pilot programs should be inquisitive, empirical and flexible.

2. That the Judicial Conference recommend to the district courts generally that:

a. They adopt a student practice rule;

b. They support continuing legal education programs on trial advocacy and federal practice subjects and encourage the practicing bar to attend.

3. That the Judicial Conference recommend to the American Bar Association that it consider amending its law school accreditation standards to require that all schools provide courses in trial advocacy, including student participation in actual or simulated trials taught by instructors having litigation experience, and that the bench and bar be encouraged to support the law schools in achieving the goal of providing quality trial advocacy training to all students who want it.

AD HOC COMMITTEE ON THE DISPOSITION OF COURT RECORDS

The report of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Disposition of Court Records was presented by the Chairman, Judge Walter J. Cummings.

RECORDS OF DISTRICT COURTS AND BANKRUPTCY COURTS

In March 1979 (Conf. Rept., p. 46) the Conference authorized the circulation of a draft "Records Disposition Program and Schedule" for the disposition of the records of the United States district courts and bankruptcy courts to all district judges and other interested officers in the district courts with a request that comments thereon be submitted to the Committee. Judge Cummings informed the Conference that the Committee had received comments from a number of district judges, bankruptcy judges, clerks of district courts, probation officers, the Administrative Office, the Federal Judicial Center, and the Immigration and Naturalization Service. In addition the Committee had considered the comments of the National Archives and Records Service. As a result the periods for the retention of certain court records, originally proposed, were increased.

Upon recommendation of the Committee the Conference approved the Records Disposition Program and Schedule submitted by the Committee with one amendment increasing the

retention period for bankruptcy case files from 10 to 20 years. The Committee was authorized to make further changes in the disposition schedule that might be called for as a result of an appraisal of the schedule by the National Archives and Records Service.

PRESERVATION OF RECORDS HAVING HISTORICAL VALUE

Judge Cummings stated that several judges and others who commented on the original draft schedule expressed concern that steps be taken to assure the preservation of those records of the district courts and bankruptcy courts having historical value. He stated that the Committee had been assured by the National Archives and Records Service that procedures for making this determination will be developed. The National Archives and Records Service has been requested to submit a plan to determine which temporary court records have such archival value as to warrant permanent retention by the National Archives. In addition the Committee is proposing the creation of an "Archives-History Committee" in each circuit to identify those records having potential historical value, so that they may be segregated at the time they are retired to a records center.

OTHER RECORDS

Judge Cummings informed the Conference that the Committee would consider disposition schedules for the records of the courts of appeals and other courts in the Federal judicial system and will report thereon to the Conference at a future session.

MEMORIAL RESOLUTIONS

Noting the recent death of Judge John Biggs, Jr., a former member of the Conference and former Chairman of several Conference committees, the Conference adopted the following resolution:

HONORABLE JOHN BIGGS, JR.

The Judicial Conference notes with sorrow the death of Judge John Biggs, Jr., on April 15, 1979. Judge Biggs joined the Conference in April 1939 when he became Senior Circuit

Judge of the Third Circuit, later denominated Chief Judge, and served on the Conference for more than 26 years until October 1965. Throughout this period Judge Biggs was a stalwart leader in the work of the Conference, serving as the chairman or member of numerous Conference committees. In 1955 he organized the Committee on Court Administration and served as its chairman for 14 years. He was chairman of the Committee on Supporting Personnel from 1940 to 1969, chairman of the Subcommittee on Judicial Salaries, Annuities and Tenure of the Committee on Court Administration from 1969 to 1970, and a member of the Committee on Judicial Statistics from 1957 to 1969. During his service on the Judicial Conference he also served on numerous ad hoc Conference committees.

His dedication to the work of the Conference brought him to Washington frequently to meet with representatives of the Judiciary Committees of the Congress and to testify before Congress on behalf of the Conference on legislative matters affecting the Judiciary, including the annual Judiciary budget. His voice before the Congress and the Conference was strong and influential. Few judges in the history of the Federal Judiciary have contributed as much to the development of the Federal Judiciary as did Judge John Biggs, Jr.

The members of the Conference mourn the passing of this distinguished and dedicated jurist and colleague.

Noting also the recent death of Judge William B. Jones, a former member of the Conference and Chairman of the Committee on Judicial Activities, the Conference adopted the following resolution:

HONORABLE WILLIAM B. JONES

The Judicial Conference of the United States takes note with deep sorrow of the death of Judge William Blakely Jones on July 31, 1979, in Washington, D.C.

Born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, on March 20, 1907, Judge Jones spent his boyhood in Denison and Sioux City, Iowa; and then attended the University of Notre Dame for both his undergraduate and legal training. Judge Jones starred as a football player under the fabled Knute Rockne, served as coach of the freshman football team under Rockne while attending Notre Dame Law School, and was a highly successful football coach at Carroll College in Helena, Montana.

After a successful period in private practice in Montana, Judge Jones became a Washington lawyer in the Lands Division

of the Justice Department, served in the Office of Price Administration, and was Secretary of the Joint British-American Patent Interchange Committee during World War II.

Entering private practice in Washington in 1946, he quickly established a brilliant reputation as a lawyer of exceptional ability.

Judge Jones gave up an outstanding law practice to begin his service as a United States district judge on May 14, 1962, and quickly became recognized as one of the nation's most distinguished jurists because of his ability, zeal, and hard work. Judge Jones served as Chief Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Columbia from July 14, 1975, until March 20, 1977 when he accepted senior status.

Despite the great burdens which Judge Jones carried as a judge and chief judge in the District of Columbia, he was active and vigorous in a substantial number of legal associations and organizations. Judge Jones served as Chairman of the Board of the National Institute of Trial Advocacy and as Chairman of the Judicial Conference Advisory Committee on Judicial Activities. He also served as Chairman of the Judicial Administration Division of the American Bar Association, and was a Judicial Fellow in the American College of Trial Lawyers and a member of the American Bar Foundation.

Judge Jones' life was one of challenge, hard work, and the successful pursuit of excellence in all that he did. In every role he won the respect and affection of everyone with whom he worked and was revered as a leader, counselor, and friend. The Judicial Conference of the United States adopts this resolution in memory and appreciation of his life and service. The sympathy of all Conference members is extended to Mrs. Alice Jones and his daughter Barbara.

ELECTIONS

The Conference, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 621(a)(2), elected Judge Donald S. Voorhees of the United States District Court for the Western District of Washington to membership on the Board of the Federal Judicial Center to fill the unexpired term of Chief Judge Otto R. Skopil, Jr., of the District of Oregon, who has been elevated to the position of circuit judge on the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit.

The Conference also elected Bankruptcy Judge Lloyd D. George of the District of Nevada to the Board of the Federal Judicial Center for a term of four years, pursuant to

Section 228 of the Act to establish a uniform law on the subject of bankruptcies, Public Law 95-598, approved November 6, 1978.

PRETERMISSION OF TERMS OF THE COURTS OF APPEALS

The Conference, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 48, approved the pretermission of terms of the courts of appeals for the Fifth, Eighth and Tenth Circuits during the calendar year 1980 as follows: in the Fifth Circuit at all places except New Orleans; in the Eighth Circuit at Omaha, Nebraska; and in the Tenth Circuit, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and Wichita, Kansas.

RELEASE OF CONFERENCE ACTION

The Conference authorized the immediate release of matters considered at this session where necessary for legislative or administrative action.

Pursuant to provisions of section 604(a)(3) Title 28, United States Code, I have the honor to report herewith on the activities of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts and the business of the courts for the twelve-month period ending June 30, 1979.

With this annual report, the Administrative Office completes virtually forty years of activity. The Administrative Office of the United States Courts was created by the Act of August 7, 1939 (53 Stat. 1223; U.S. Code, Title 28 Sections 444-450). The Act took effect by its terms on November 6, 1939, and the first Director, Henry Chandler, qualified and took office on December 1, 1939.

This fortieth annual report provides a summary statement on the growth of the workload in the courts of appeals and the district courts for the years 1940-1979 with amplified discussion regarding statistics for 1979.

After the summary on the judicial workload, significant developments in the field of judicial administration are discussed, such as the Omnibus Judgeship Bill of 1978, the Bankruptcy Reform Act of 1978, and other legislation.

The purpose of these annual reports goes beyond carrying out a statutory obligation. They are designed to inform, highlight, and provide a record for the judiciary and for students of the courts. These annual reports, because of their continuity as well as their detailed statistics, provide a written account of the stewardship of the workload of the courts upon which far-reaching policy decisions can be made not only within the judiciary but by the Congress and the Executive agencies.

In addition to this annual report, several other reports have been issued in the past year in response to an ever-increasing requirement for better management information.

Thus, three reports which summarized twelve months of workload information were published for September 30, 1978, December 31, 1978, and March 31, 1979. In each of these reports, entitled *Federal Judicial Workload Statistics*, highlights are provided ranging from civil rights and prisoner petitions to the downturn in criminal filings in the district courts. These reports assured that any change in workload could be easily identified, however subtle. Further, they give information to various users such as agencies of the federal government and state court administrators, which could be identified in any one of the twelve-months reports. Thus, this year a "rolling" twelve-months report was introduced which essentially adds three months of data and drops the first three months of statistics each time it is published.

Two other reports of special significance to the judiciary are *Court Management Statistics* and *Juror Utilization* both of which were first published in 1971.

Court Management Statistics was initiated, as a separate publication, upon the recommendation of the Judicial Conference Subcommittee on Judicial Statistics which determined what facts about court workload best reflected docket conditions and judgeship needs. While continuing to assist the judiciary in identifying judgeship needs, this publication has found wide usage by persons concerned with the workload of the federal courts. In addition to case filings and termination data, median time intervals are shown for disposition of cases, and national and circuit rankings on several indices are provided.

The report on juror utilization has served a larger purpose as the district courts continue to find the best method for utilizing citizens called to the court to serve on either a grand or petit jury. This report was first published in 1971 in response to the institution of a juror utilization reporting system pursuant to a resolution of the Judicial Conference in 1970. In 1974, grand juror utilization statistics were added and in the coming year ending June 30, 1980, statistics will be provided on petit juror utilization by U.S. bankruptcy judges in jury trials rising out of or related to bankruptcy proceedings.

Obviously, the sum total of all data collected by the Administrative Office from circuit and district judges, bankruptcy judges, magistrates, federal public and community

defenders, probation officers and clerks of court cannot appear in this report. A vast statistical collection system with instructions for completing each of thirty statistical forms, prescribed either by Judicial Conference resolution or by statute, generate considerable information, much of which is retained on magnetic tape on computerized systems operated by the Division of Information Systems.

Indeed, this year we have initiated direct access to the mainframe computer starting with the bankruptcy reporting system. As equipment and funds permit, all programs will be linked directly to the main computer thus saving many hours of computer processing and further improving the quality and timeliness of judicial workload statistics.

JUDICIAL BUSINESS

Courts of Appeals

After a slight decline of 1.0 percent in 1978 over 1977, the filings of cases in the courts of appeals rose sizeably in 1979, up 6.9 percent over 1978. Comparing the number of filings in 1940, the first year of the Administrative Office, to 1979, the increase in filings was 487 percent while the number of authorized judgeships increased 132 percent. These data, in addition to disposition and pending statistics, can be seen in the accompanying Table 1.

Dispositions by the courts of appeals rose to 18,928 or 6.9 percent above last year; however, the increase in filings offset this record, resulting in another record high number of 17,939 cases pending in the courts of appeals. This was 7.8 percent greater than the 16,648 cases pending a year ago.

Most of the numerical increase in filings, comparing 1979 to 1978, were cases rising from the criminal and civil decisions of the district courts. However, there was a sizeable upsurge of appeals from administrative agency decisions. These rose from 2,382 in 1978 to 2,922 in 1979, an increase of 22.7 percent.

None of the 35 new court of appeals judgeships were filled as of June 30, 1979. These, plus vacancies under the prior authorizations, resulted in 38 vacancies overall on June

30, 1979. The status of courts of appeals judgeships as of June 30, 1974 - 1979, is shown in Table 2.

District Courts

A development to be noted is the change in two districts in Illinois with the implementation of the Federal District Court Organization Act of 1978 (P.L. 95-409) beginning April 1, 1979. The counties in the former Southern and Eastern Districts of Illinois have been reorganized as of April 1, 1979, into the Central District, with court authorized to be held at Danville, Peoria, Quincy, Rock Island and Springfield, and the new Southern District with court authorized to be held at Alton, Benton, Cairo and East St. Louis.

The Omnibus Judgeship Act of 1978 added 117 new judgeships to the district courts raising the total authorized to 516 district judgeships. Overall there were 119 vacancies on June 30, 1979. Nineteen vacancies existed from former authorized judgeships and 100 vacancies existed in connection with the new positions provided in the 1978 Omnibus Judgeship Act.

Civil Cases

Overall the volume of civil litigation filed in district courts rose by 15,896 cases or 11.5 percent over 1978. These 154,666 filings, the largest number on record, were 77.1 percent greater than in 1970 and 160.9 percent higher than in 1960 with an average yearly growth of 8.0 percent in the 20-year period. Compared to 1940, civil filings rose by more than 345 percent.

The substantial improvement in civil cases closed during the year did not offset the increase in filings, resulting in another record pending caseload of 177,805.

The increase in the authorized judgeships reduced the filing caseload per judgeship to 300, the first drop since 1970, the year of the previous Omnibus Judgeship Act. During each succeeding year the per-judgeship caseload has increased.

As first noted last year, the federal government continued to increase its litigation as the plaintiff. In 1979 there were 31,003 civil suits commenced by the federal government, 37.6 percent greater than a year ago and 90.0 percent greater than in 1977. The number of cases with the federal government as a defendant was almost unchanged, up 2.3 percent. In 1979, civil suits, where the basis of jurisdiction was diversity, climbed by 9.1 percent. These cases comprise 22.3 percent of all civil cases filed. Cases filed under federal question jurisdiction rose 6.7 percent.

Leading the increase in civil filings were the 9,254 suits for recovery of over-payments and enforcement of judgments. In 1978, there were only 1,856 such filings and 865 in 1977. Most of the cases were instituted by the federal government to recover loans to students.

Other increases noted were:

- Foreclosures increased to 4,711 compared to 4,159 in 1978.
- Filings involving personal injury rose to 23,956 compared to 21,946 in 1978.
- Personal property damage suits were up to 4,945, or 11.7 percent more than 4,429 such cases in 1978.
- Suits brought under provisions of the Labor Management Relations Act rose to 4,119 or by 8.0 percent compared to 3,812 in 1978. Other labor litigation rose to 2,097 compared to 1,643 in 1978 and 1,436 in 1977. Some of these were age discrimination suits which, pursuant to Section 2 of the President's Reorganization Plan No. 1 and Executive Order 12144 of June 22, 1979, will be transferred to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and in the future will be statistically recorded as "Civil Rights Employment Discrimination" cases.
- Tax suits rose to 3,519 filings, 31.8 percent over 2,669 such filings in 1978.

Three types of civil suits which in 1979 comprised 30.8 percent of all filings and 27.5 percent of all pending civil cases continue to rise. These are prisoner petitions, civil rights and social security cases.

Criminal Cases

The district courts experienced a continued decline in criminal cases filed. The decrease may undoubtedly be attributed in large measure to the policy announced by the Attorney General in November 1977, directing the federal crime program primarily to organized crime, narcotics, public corruption, and white-collar crime. Further, the reduction of prosecutions of bank robbers by turning offenders over to state authorities, along with the diversion of juveniles to the states, has contributed to the substantial decline in the criminal caseload. Filings in 1979 were 65 percent higher, however, than in 1940, the first reporting year.

Implementation of provisions of the Speedy Trial Act of 1974 resulted in an increased rate of dispositions. At the close of the year the number of pending criminal cases dropped to 15,124 or 4.7 percent less than the 15,878 pending criminal cases recorded last year and the lowest number in the decade of the 1970's. A discussion of the statistical impact of the Speedy Trial Act for the interim years 1976, 1977 and 1978 is the subject of a separate report to Congress.

Proceedings commenced by indictment have declined by about 4,000 over last year, whereas proceedings begun by an information remained almost constant. Proceedings under the

Federal Juvenile Delinquency Act numbered only 78 compared to 120 last year and 1,000 in the early 1970's. Defendants choosing to be tried by a magistrate dropped slightly to 1,114 cases compared to 1,396 in 1978.

The prosecution of white-collar crime began to show with a modest 0.7 percent increase in embezzlement and fraud cases. New case filings for violation of extortion and racketeering statutes increased by 19.0 percent to 376 in 1979 from 316 in 1978. Other offenses showing an increase in prosecutions in 1979 were income tax violations up by 6.1 percent; postal fraud, up 29.7 percent; and immigration violations, up 7.8 percent.

Offenses with substantial declines in filings include auto theft, down 50.7 percent, thus continuing the policy of the Department of Justice of prosecuting vehicle theft where it

is connected to organized criminal activity and diverting the joy-rider to state authorities.

To some extent the reduction of narcotic drug violations represents the effort of the Department of Justice to reach the main manufacturer and distributor of illicit drugs with somewhat less emphasis on the small street operator. Also, the long campaign by both state and federal authorities in reducing drug traffic reached its pinnacle in the early 1970's with a substantial number of violators receiving long prison sentences. Thus, drug law violators in Bureau of Prisons institutions in 1970 numbered 16 out of 100 prisoners, whereas in 1979 there were 25 prisoners serving terms for drug related offenses out of each 100 incarcerated.

Other offenses with declines in filings were weapons and firearms, down 60.7 percent or 1,209 filings compared to 3,076 in 1978; prosecutions for forgery declined by 28.7 percent to 2,418 compared to 3,393 a year ago; and bank robbery cases filed in district courts dropped 17.6 percent to 1,066 compared to 1,293 bank robberies filed in 1978.

Juror Utilization in the U.S. District Courts — Petit Jury

The topic of efficient juror management has been of continuing interest to the Judicial Conference. At its September 1941 meeting the Judicial Conference established a committee of five district judges to investigate the need to improve methods of jury selection in United States courts and further, it authorized the recently established Administrative Office to conduct a study of the jury system especially in regard to economy in the selection and service of jurors.

Since that time the Administrative Office has intermittently published figures on the participation of jurors and the cost of juries in the federal courts.

From 1953 through 1963 the Administrative Office collected statistics on the number of petit jurors available for service on jury selection days and the number of jurors reporting for trials which had started on previous days. The collection of this information on the JS-11 reporting form was discontinued in 1964.

For several years there was no collection of juror usage statistics. As the cost of the jury system increased, the need for this information was particularly critical. In March 1970

the Judicial Conference approved the recommendation of the Committee on the Operation of the Jury System to reinstate petit juror reporting on a revised JS-11 form. The first statistics collected on the new form were published in the 1971 *Annual Report of the Director* and in a new annual publication, *Juror Utilization in United States Courts*.

The table, "National Petit Juror Usage," provides the breakdown of total available prospective jurors for all districts for the twelve-month periods ended June 30, 1971 through 1979. Total available jurors increased 10.4 percent from 512,553 in 1971 to 565,617 in 1979. In 1979 the percentage of prospective jurors who were selected for or served on jury trials decreased for the first time in the nine years of data collected on the revised JS-11 form. The percentage of jurors who were challenged for cause or peremptorily by counsel rose to 16.2 percent, considerably higher than the 1971 figure of 12.9 percent. Jurors falling into the category of not selected, serving, or challenged include jurors who live at great distances from the courthouse and must travel to the place of holding court on the days before and after jury service. The percentage of jurors in the category of not selected, serving or challenged increased to 24.6 percent in 1979 up from 24.0 percent in 1978.

This table also shows the number of jury trial days rose 31.2 percent from 21,990 in 1971 to 28,851 in 1979, an increase of 6,861 days. When 1979 is compared with other years, however, the number of jury trial days has declined steadily for the past three years from the 1976 level of 30,032 days. The percentage of criminal trial days continues to decline from a high of 59.3 percent in 1976 to the 1979 level of 52.6 percent.

Finally, the Juror Usage Index (J.U.I.) for the last nine years is provided in Table 8. The J.U.I. is the average number of jurors on hand for each jury trial day and is calculated by dividing the total available jurors by the total number of jury trial days. The nationwide J.U.I. recorded in 1979 was 19.60. This is a slight increase over the 1978 J.U.I. of 19.51, but is significantly lower than the 1971 J.U.I. of 23.31.

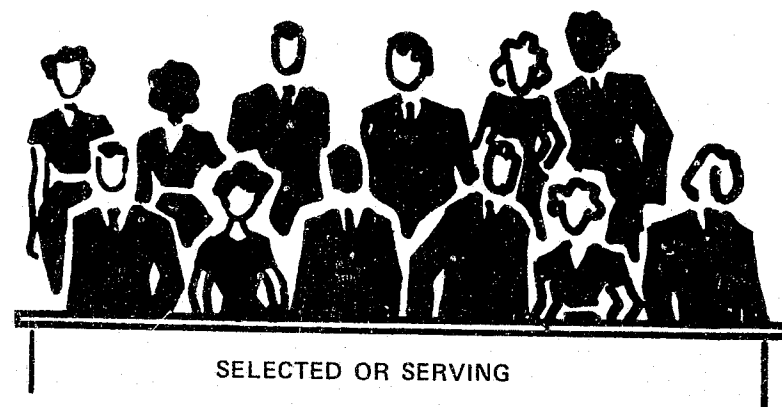
Grand Jury

As the result of a continuing concern for improving juror management, the Judicial Conference in April 1973 recog-

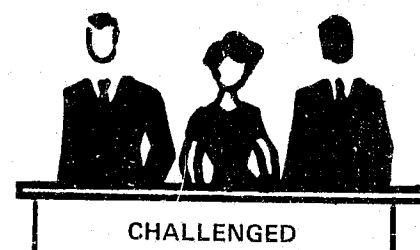
UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURTS

nized that the Administrative Office did not maintain adequate statistical records to determine whether or not grand jurors were being utilized efficiently. The Judicial Conference then adopted the policy that the clerk of each district court maintain statistical records on grand juries within the district to determine if utilization characteristics for the federal grand jury system could be developed. As a result of this action, the Grand Jury Reporting System for the district courts was instituted in January 1974 by the Committee on the Operation of the Jury System, a committee of the Judicial Conference. The testing of this program was conducted in all district courts from January through June 1974, with full implementation occurring on July 1, 1974. The results of the first full year of collection of statistical data on all federal grand juries were presented in the 1975 *Annual Report of the Director* and the 1975 *Juror Utilization Report*. The data collected through this reporting program has provided substantial information on the characteristics of federal grand juries and the utilization of persons called for grand jury duty.

Grand jury activity in the district courts, as measured by the number of grand jury sessions convened, has increased steadily in the past five years. The accompanying table, "Grand Juror Statistics," summarizes national trends in juror utilization for the years ended June 30, 1975 through 1979. The total number of grand jury sessions rose a substantial 24.8 percent from 7,846 in 1975 to 9,791 in 1979. Correspondingly, the number of jurors in session climbed from 156,167 in 1975 to 194,168 in 1979, and the number of hours in session increased by 9,475 or 22.9 percent. These increases are partially attributable to efforts to meet the mandates of the Speedy Trial Act of 1974 which require that a defendant be indicted within certain time limits, and the increase in the calling of special grand juries pursuant to 18 U.S.C. 3331.

The total number of grand juries in existence rose 18.2 percent from 570 in 1975 to 674 in 1979. The 1979 figure is the highest for the five years of this reporting program. The number of grand juries impaneled in 1979 remained high at 311. For the second year in a row, there was a decrease in the number of grand juries discharged, indicating that the lifetime of a grand jury is on the increase.

The table also shows the average number of jurors for each session convened, as well as the average number of

hours for each session. In order to conduct a session of the grand jury there must be between 16 and 23 grand jurors present. Nationally, the average number of grand jurors per session ranged from 19.9 in 1975 to 19.8 in 1979. The average number of hours per session has varied only slightly over the five-year period and stood at 5.2 hours in 1979.

UNITED STATES MAGISTRATES

The tenth anniversary of the signing of the Federal Magistrates Act of 1968 occurred on October 17, 1978. During the year ended June 30, 1979, United States magistrates continued to provide increasing assistance to the district courts under that legislation. Although the total number of matters handled by magistrates declined slightly from 297,561 last year to 292,179 this year, a drop of 1.8 percent, magistrates are performing an increasing number of the more time consuming "additional duties" under 28 U.S.C. 636(b). The changing volume and nature of services rendered by magistrates during the last four years, and since the first full year of nationwide operation of the system, is reflected in Table 10.

United States magistrates now assist the district judges in expediting civil and criminal litigation in the great majority of the 92 district courts covered by the Federal Magistrates Act. During the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979, for example, magistrates in 74 districts filed written reports and recommendations for disposition of 12,062 prisoner petitions. Magistrates conducted 24,231 civil pretrial

conferences for the judges in 77 district courts. In 77 districts they reviewed 34,311 motions in civil cases, of which 4,361 were dispositive matters in which magistrates submitted full reports and recommended decisions under 28 U.S.C. 636(b)(1)(B). In addition, magistrates filed reports and recommendations on a total of 4,074 social security appeals in 68 districts.

In criminal cases, magistrates in 84 districts conducted 19,329 arraignments following indictment under Rule 10 of the *Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure*. There were 950

final hearings on probation revocation conducted by magistrates in 65 districts, and 1,914 separate sessions in which grand juries returned indictments to magistrates in 72 districts. Magistrates also conducted 3,784 pretrial conferences or omnibus hearings in 49 districts and reviewed 11,185 motions in 75 districts, of which 1,604 were dispositive matters in which magistrates submitted a full report and recommended resolution under 28 U.S.C. 636(b)(1)(B).

The 1976 jurisdictional amendments to the Federal Magistrates Act (Public Law 95-577) broadened and clarified the jurisdiction of magistrates. In particular, that law authorizes magistrates to conduct evidentiary hearings on criminal and civil pretrial matters and prisoner petitions. The Act also encourages the designation of magistrates to serve as special masters and to try civil cases on the consent of the parties.

A new table, M-5, reflecting the initial implementation of the 1976 amendments has been included in Appendix I of this report. The 3,006 trials and other evidentiary proceedings conducted by magistrates in 78 districts during the year ended June 30, 1979 provided significant assistance to the district judges. These proceedings, moreover, are in addition to other evidentiary matters, such as minor and petty offenses and preliminary proceedings in felony cases, which magistrates also heard.

PROBATION

In 1979 the number of persons received for supervision by the Federal Probation System decreased by 969 or 2.8 percent from the previous year. For persons under supervision at the end of the year there were decreases of 5.2 percent in probationers from courts and 2.2 percent from magistrates. Parole cases were up 8.0 percent; pretrial diversion, up 4.6 percent; and mandatory release, up 5.8 percent. Special parole cases increased 13.6 percent.

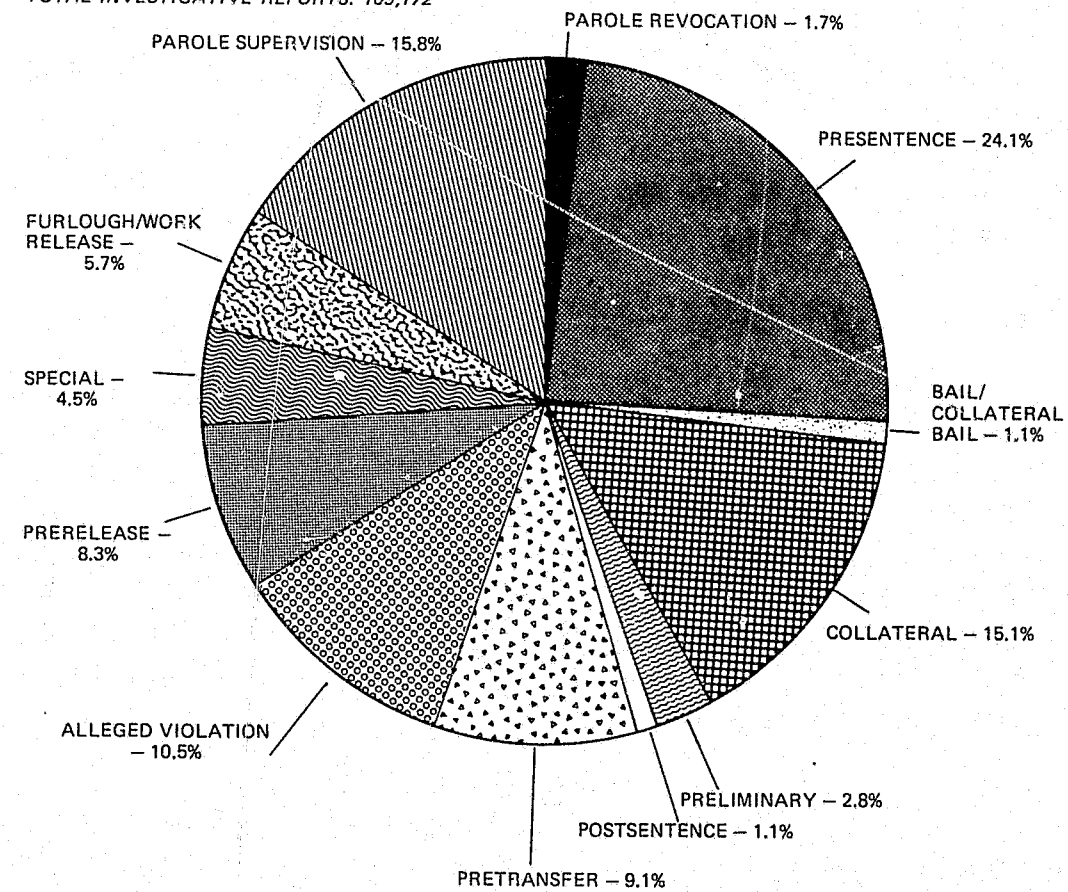
The probation system also prepared 109,172 investigative reports in 1979. Of this number, 26,338 were presentence investigation reports ordered by the court. This represents a substantial reduction from the preceding year.

12 MONTHS ENDED JUNE 30, 1979

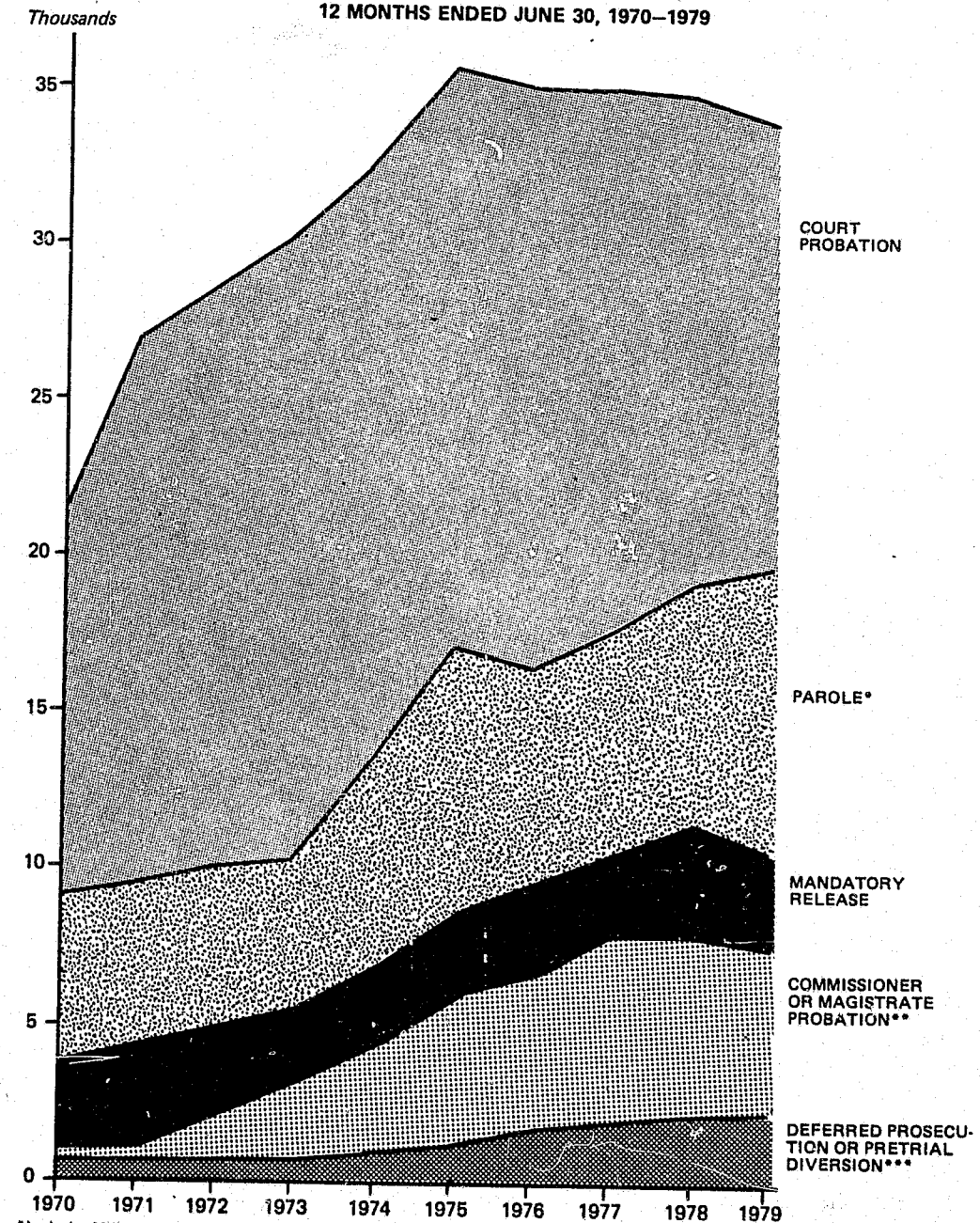
TOTAL INVESTIGATIVE REPORTS: 109,172

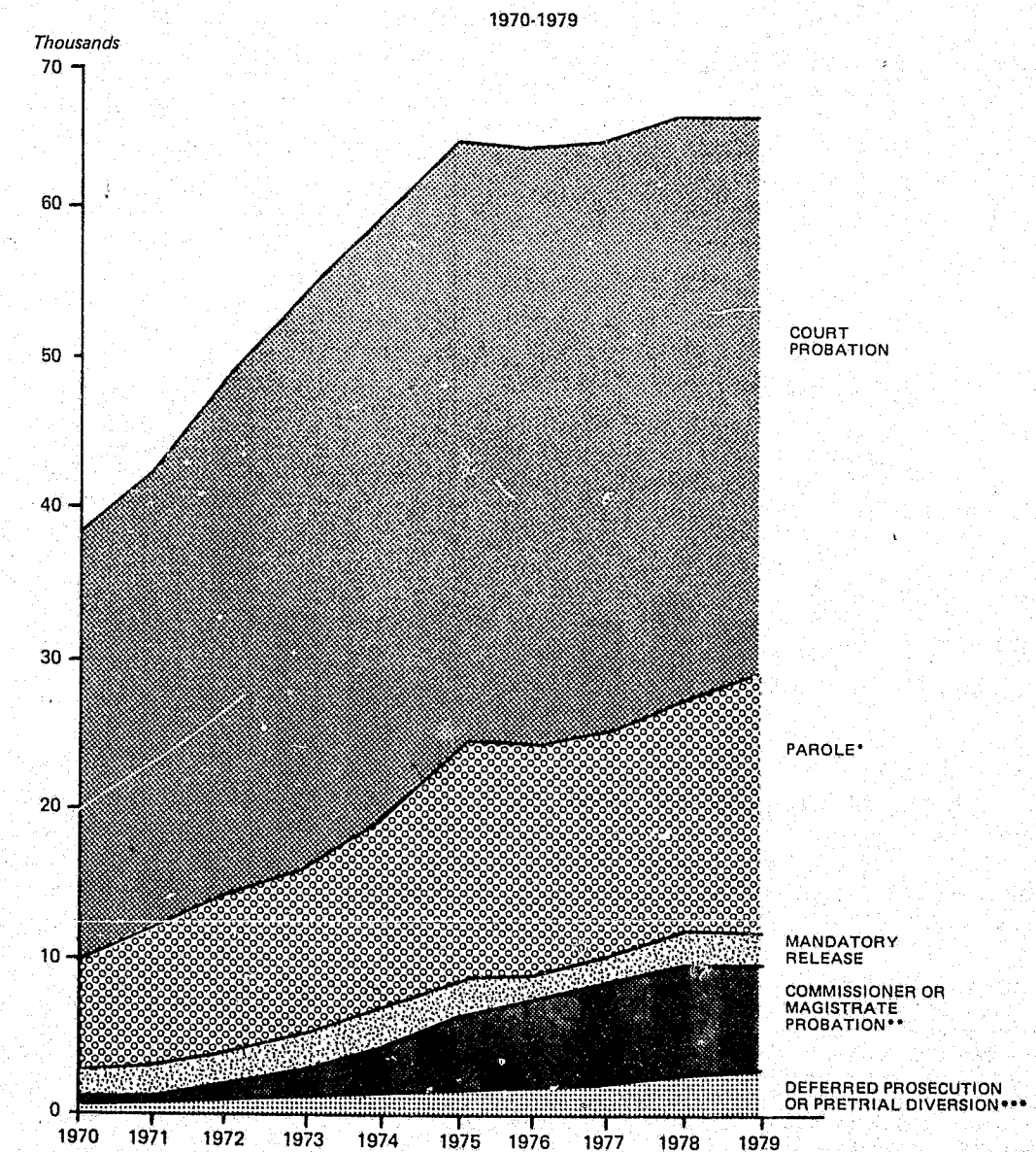

BANKRUPTCY WORKLOAD

In the twelve months ending June 30, 1979, a total of 226,476 bankruptcy cases of all types was filed. This is a

numerical increase of 23,525 cases and a percentage increase of 11.6 percent from the 1978 total. The number represents the fourth largest yearly increase in bankruptcy filings.

The following Table 15 shows bankruptcy cases filed since 1948, the first year under the Referees' Salary Act and illustrates the cyclical nature of bankruptcy filings which has occurred since 1967.

All circuits except the First and Second registered increases in filings. The greatest numerical increase was in the Ninth Circuit which increased by 6,202 cases with the Sixth Circuit following with an increase of 6,112 cases. The Sixth Circuit had a twenty percent increase in filings which was the largest percentage increase of any circuit.

Business bankruptcies declined in 1979 from 30,528 in 1978 to 29,500 in 1979, a drop of 1,028 cases. The number filed in 1979 represents the fifth largest number of business bankruptcy cases ever filed. The ratio of business bankruptcies to total filings dropped to 13 percent, while the non-business filings increased to 87.0 percent.

Table 17 shows that the highest percentages of business cases relative to total workload occurred in the First, Second and Third circuits. The Ninth Circuit has by far the greatest number of business cases, with the Fifth Circuit second.

In 1979, there was an increase in voluntary straight bankruptcy cases of 8.7 percent. There were, however, decreases in all of the special relief chapters, viz. IX, X, XI and Section 77 (railroad reorganizations), except for Chapter XII which increased from 650 to 669 cases and Chapter XIII which had a 30.7 percent increase or a numerical increase of 9,257 cases.

YEARS 1967-1979

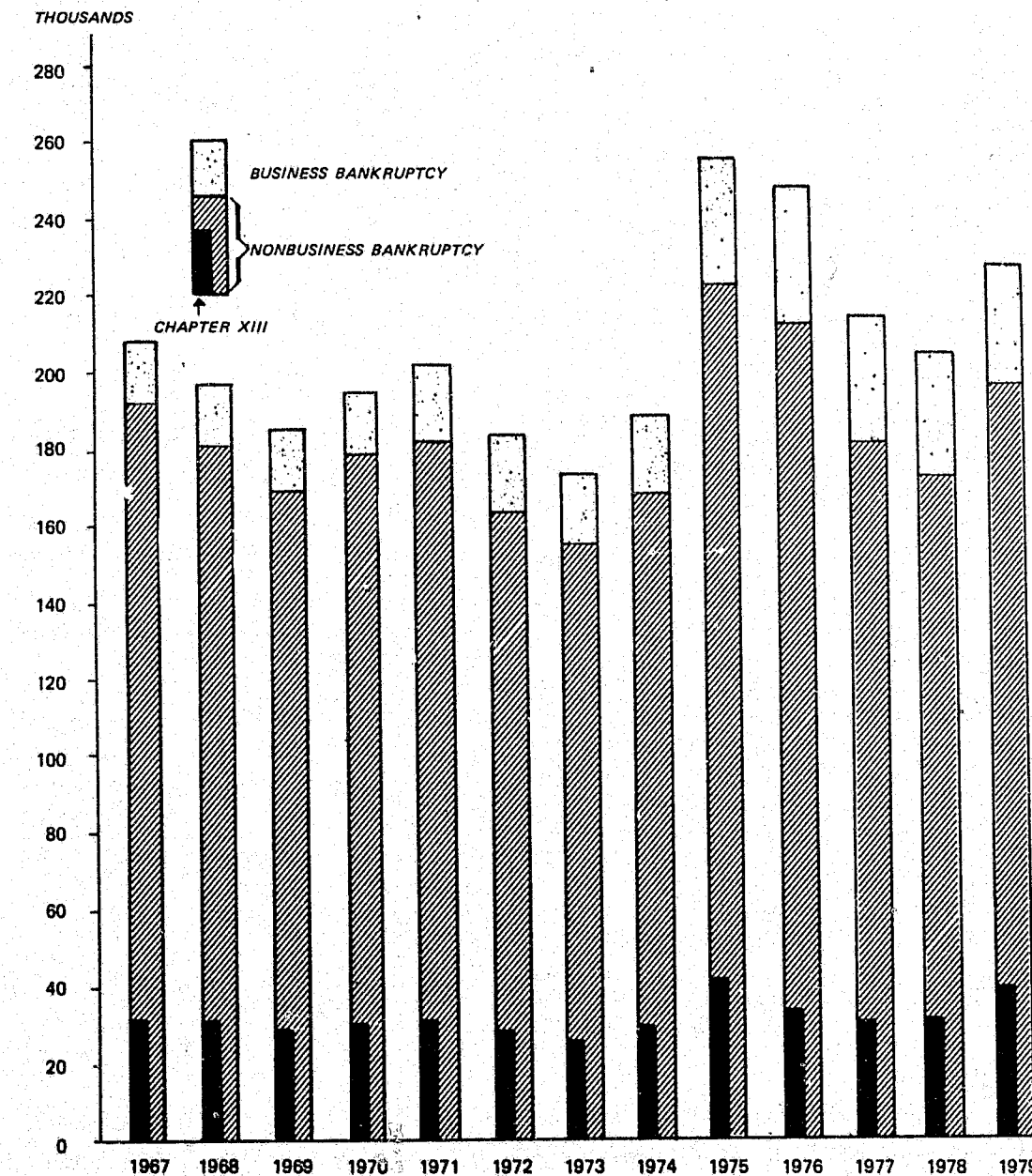

Filings by chapter of the Bankruptcy Act for the past ten years, and increases or decreases in 1979 from the prior year are shown below in Table 19.

A total of 209,316 cases was closed in 1979. This is a decrease of 7,417 from 1978 and left 258,168 cases pending on June 30, 1979, an increase of 18,021 from the number pending a year earlier.

JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislation

Several new laws impacted upon the federal judiciary during the year: the Omnibus Judgeship Bill, the Bankruptcy Deconsolidation Act, the Civil Service Reform Act, the Ethics in Government Act, the Bankruptcy Reform Act, the Federal Pay Comparability Adjustment and the Court Interpreters Act.

In connection with the Ethics in Government Act of 1978, the Division of Personnel established regulations and procedures for providing the Ethics Committee of the Judicial Conference with monthly reports on judicial officers and judicial employees affected by the Act; developed procedures for assuring that each newly appointed individual affected by the Act is provided with the necessary forms to be filled out and returned to the Ethics Committee; generated procedures for furnishing forms and information to individuals promoted into a pay category requiring filings; and formulated procedures for furnishing forms and information on a timely basis to individuals covered by the Act who leave the employ of the Judicial Branch.

In October 1978, the Congress passed the 1978 Omnibus Judgeship Bill creating the largest number of additional judgeships ever in a single bill. The new Act, Public Law 95-486, signed by the President on October 20, 1978, authorized 117 additional judgeships for the district courts (including four to be appointed on a temporary basis) and 35 additional judgeships for the courts of appeals.

The provisions of Public Law 95-486 relating to additional judgeships for the courts of appeals followed the March 1977 recommendations of the Judicial Conference except that one judgeship recommended for the District of Columbia Circuit was not approved and eleven judgeships not recommended by the Conference were approved for the Fifth Circuit. The accompanying table shows the number of additional courts of appeals judgeships created by Public Law 95-486 and the number created in the three previous judgeship acts. The 1978 Act increased the authorized judgeships on the courts of appeals to 132 compared to 97 prior to the Act.

The district judgeship provisions of the new Act followed the September 1976 recommendations of the Judicial Conference except that one temporary judgeship recommended for the Southern District of Florida was not approved and eleven judgeships were added which were not recommended by the Judicial Conference. These included: one judgeship in Maine, one in New Jersey, one in the Western District of North Carolina, one temporary in the Southern District of West Virginia, one in the Eastern District of Kentucky, one temporary in the Northern District of Ohio, one in the Northern District of Illinois, one in the Eastern District of Wisconsin, one temporary in Minnesota, and one in Utah.

Table 21 shows the number of district judgeships created by Public Law 95-486 and the number created by the three previous judgeship acts of 1970, 1966 and 1961. The 1978 Act increased the authorized judgeships in the district courts to 516 compared to 399 previously authorized.

The Omnibus Judgeship Act also contains two sections of importance to judicial administration. It provides fifteen

positions at grades 16, 17 and 18 in the Administrative Office. Taken in context with other legislation, this provides the Administrative Office with its own supergrade positions unrelated to the program established for the Executive Branch. This program was implemented in April 1979.

The Act also provides that any court of appeals having more than fifteen active judges may constitute itself into administrative units complete with such facilities and staff as may be prescribed by the Administrative Office of the United States Courts and may perform its *en banc* function by such number of members of its *en banc* courts as may be prescribed by rule of the courts of appeals. This section had not been implemented as of June 30, 1979.

Personnel

In addition to the manifold tasks created for it by the Omnibus Judgeship Act, the legislation affecting the bankruptcy system impacted heavily on the Division of Personnel during the year in deconsolidating clerks' offices, changing criteria for classification of personnel, and computing annuities.

During 1979, the Division of Personnel began its second phase of the Judiciary Salary Plan review. Almost half of the initially targeted representative district and circuit courts have been visited and an interim report has been assembled for review by program divisions.

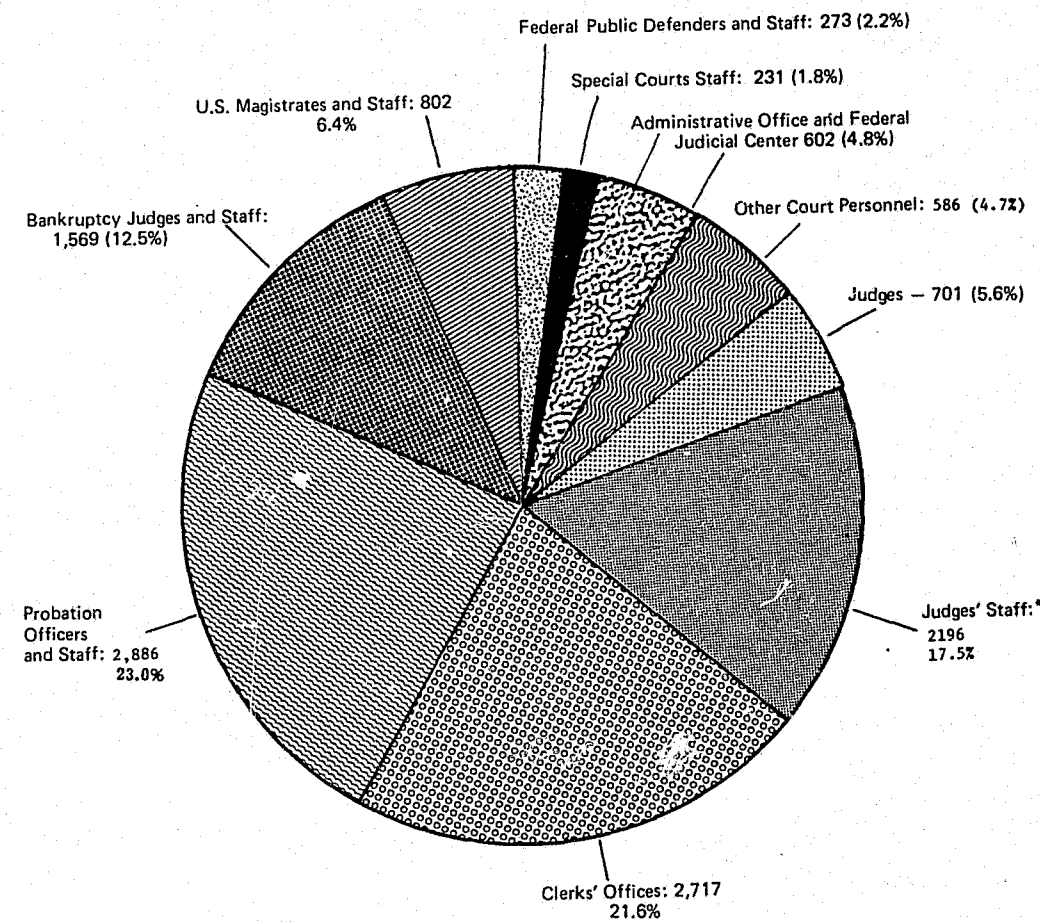
In connection with the Civil Service Reform Act, interim procedures for reduction in grade or removal for unacceptable performance, and a proposal for the allocation of some positions to be used for part-time career employment have been completed; and many meetings and seminars for educational purposes have been attended. Activities still in progress include: the training and orientation of employees in the Administrative Office and the Federal Judicial Center who are subject to the Reform Act; revision of the Grievance Plan to reflect changes under the Reform Act; implementation of the Merit Pay System; and developing new adverse action procedures concerning suspensions, reduction in grade or pay, removal and furlough. It is anticipated that all or most of these activities will continue in fiscal year 1980, since the Civil Service Reform Act has changed the basic requirements for pay and performance ratings as well as the actual pay scale for certain positions.

The Division of Personnel completed the personnel workshops in conjunction with the Federal Judicial Center, and began efforts to develop and maintain an accurate personnel manual for use in the federal courts. Although no personnel workshops are planned for fiscal year 1980, work on the personnel manual will continue throughout the coming year.

Table 22 shows the total number of personnel on board in the federal judiciary as of June 30, 1979.

Judicial Survivors' Annuities Fund

An actuarial valuation of the Judicial Survivors' Annuities System has been requested at the close of calendar year 1979, after the new judges authorized by Public Law 95-486 have entered on duty and their service records have been established.

The number of judges and other judicial officers on the roll and eligible to participate in the system increased during the year from 690 to 709. On June 30, 1979, there were 613 participants compared with 608 on June 30, 1978. As of June 30, 1979, there were 192 surviving spouse annuitants and nine dependent children. Payments to annuitants during the year aggregated \$1,973,893 an increase of \$157,432 over the previous year. The average spouse's annuity increased \$322 from \$10,046 to \$10,368. Tables 23 and 24 show judicial participation, the number of, and amounts paid to annuitants, and the financial status of the fund during the preceding ten years. Table 25 shows the amount invested in Treasury notes and bonds.

BANKRUPTCY ADMINISTRATION

Impact of Legislation

The enactment of the Bankruptcy Reform Act of 1978, Public Law 95-598, 92 Stat. 2549-2688, on November 6, 1978, placed substantial additional duties and responsibilities on the Bankruptcy Division during the year ending June 30, 1979.

The principal responsibility of the Division under the Bankruptcy Reform Act will be to conduct studies during the transition period leading to recommendations for adoption by Congress of the number of bankruptcy judges that will be needed for the bankruptcy courts as of April 1, 1984. This has necessitated the development and implementation of a new statistical system to reflect the activities of bankruptcy judges starting October 1, 1979, when the substantive law changes become effective. As pending cases continue to be administered under the Bankruptcy Act of 1898, the existing statistical system must also be retained for several years. The new system has been developed and should be ready for implementation on October 1, 1979. With the cooperation of the Statistical Analysis and Reports Division, the necessary forms have been designed and are being printed. Other bankruptcy forms for use in the courts under the new law have

also been designed to the extent possible. These are dependent in part on the procedures established by the Advisory Committee on Bankruptcy Rules.

A second major responsibility has been to establish panels of qualified persons (who are not government employees) as trustees for each bankruptcy court to serve in all liquidation cases in all of the judicial districts except in the eighteen districts which are part of the pilot experiment. There, private trustees will be under the supervision of United States Trustees in the Department of Justice. This has involved not only establishing qualifications to serve as trustee but determining appropriate sizes of panels for each bankruptcy court and requesting some 3,000 prospective trustees to submit applications to be screened. A monitoring system is to be established to fulfill the responsibility of determining when to remove a trustee from the panel. The panel trustee system will become operative October 1, 1979.

Another important responsibility is to provide a smooth transition from a system of separate bankruptcy offices within each district to a system of centralized administrative responsibility. A major aspect of this includes the transfer of certain functions now performed by the clerk of the United States district court for the bankruptcy offices to the office of the bankruptcy clerks of court such as: receiving bankruptcy petitions and schedules; collecting and accounting for the filing fees, budgeting for the bankruptcy courts, procurement of equipment, furniture and supplies, and serving as liaison with the General Services Administration for space for the bankruptcy courts. The objective of a functionally independent court will not be fully achieved by October 1, 1979. The transfer of functions will take place as rapidly as possible consistent with an orderly transfer.

Pursuant to section 407(a) of Title IV of Public Law 95-598, a committee of seven bankruptcy judges was appointed to advise the Director of the Administrative Office with respect to matters that arise during the transition period or that are related to the purposes of the transition period. This committee met at various times during the year and its recommendations have been of substantial benefit to the Administrative Office in planning for the beginning of the transition period of the Bankruptcy Reform Act of 1978.

Minimum technical amendments to the Bankruptcy Reform Act, which were incorporated in a technical revision bill now pending before Congress, were prepared in the Bankruptcy Division.

Notices to Creditors

The project for developing a computer software program for preparation of notices to creditors to be issued in bankruptcy cases and the handling of claims filed was commenced in fiscal year 1978. It is now in the final development stage, and the contract for the computer software was awarded during the year. The program has been written and is ready for a two-week testing period in July at the bankruptcy court in Trenton, New Jersey. If testing is successful, contracts will be sought to install the program in several pilot courts next year.

Forecasting

The Bankruptcy Division commenced a program to determine whether published economic indicators could be used to forecast bankruptcy case filings with sufficient accuracy to be used in our budget requests. Early experiments disclosed a correlation between certain economic variables and annual bankruptcy filings. By using a standard variable evaluation computer program, it was determined that several of the variables have high prediction value with respect to total filings. The further development of the program is now under consideration. A sound, reliable formula which will accurately forecast bankruptcy filings two years in advance appears to be a possibility.

Bankruptcy — Referees' Salary and Expense Fund

The table shown below shows the status of the Referees' Salary and Expense Fund for the eleven-year period ending June 30, 1979 and the current status of the fund.

The costs of the system have exceeded receipts into the fund every year since 1965 in spite of the fact that the receipts to the fund have increased each year.

MAGISTRATES

Several bills affecting the work of the U.S. magistrates were enacted in the past year. The impact of these can be summarized as follows:

- Omnibus Judgeship Act (P.L. 95-486). This law has generated a need to prepare fully revised statistical data, especially per-judge-ship caseload data, for the Judicial Conference Committee on the Administration of the Magistrates System, for its consideration in revising requests for changes in magistrate positions. Moreover, the law has generated several requests for additional magistrates to serve the new judges.
- District Court Reorganization Acts (P.L. 95-408 and P.L. 96-4). These laws have required a recalculation of the general profile data. The redistricting of Illinois presented particular problems, resulting in the expenditure of considerable staff time in recalculating the data on the new districts, and also in generating an additional full-time request.
- Bankruptcy Reform Act (P.L. 95-598). This law has not had as significant an impact

after passage as did the extensive staff work performed before passage. Nonetheless, some expenditure of time has been required to coordinate the changes made by the Act, especially as they relate to magistrate salaries and combination bankruptcy judge/magistrate positions. The new bankruptcy law has also generated requests from magistrates for new support services equal to those of the bankruptcy judges.

- Court Interpreters Act (P.L. 95-593). The Magistrates Division has been heavily involved in setting up guidelines for the implementation of this law. Interpreters must be provided at the initial appearance of a defendant.
- Marshal's Transportation (P.L. 95-503). This law required an amendment of the Jurisdictional Checklist and preparation of a proposal to modify the law slightly.
- Prisoner Exchanges (P.L. 95-144). The continuing program of transferring prisoners internationally has required time on the part of one of the staff attorneys and several magistrates.
- Records Disposition (P.L. 95-444). This law has generated a need to revamp the records schedules for the courts, including the records of magistrates.

During the year ending June 30, 1979 the Magistrates Division completed several projects:

- An entirely new *Legal Manual for United States Magistrates*, containing the first six chapters and appendices.
- Publication of a law review article on magistrate jurisdiction and constitutional considerations in the next issue of the *Harvard Journal on Legislation*.

- Completion of the first annual revisions to the magistrate portion of the *Guide to Judiciary Policies and Procedures*. The magistrate manual was completed early in 1978 and is found as Volume IX of the multi-volume guide.
- Preparation of regulations on the use of court reporters for magistrates. The regulations are being used *de facto* with success, although they have not yet been officially distributed to the field.
- Submission of 97 full survey reports, dealing with 265 magistrate positions, to the district courts, circuit councils, and Magistrates Committee. Twenty new full-time positions were authorized by the Congress, and funding has been requested for October 1. This brings the number of full-time magistrate positions to 196. Also submitted for the July meeting of the Magistrates Committee were 19 reports dealing with 32 positions and five full-time requests.

PROBATION

Pretrial Services

This year marked the end of the four and one-half year demonstration phase of the pretrial services program. In the second annual report to Congress on the Speedy Trial Act, it was noted that if the funds authorized were not sufficient to carry out the program through the demonstration phase, a request would be made to Congress for additional funds. The Congress authorized and appropriated an additional \$5,000,000 to continue the program through 1979, the final reporting year, and to provide sufficient funds to continue until the Congress could make a determination regarding the future of the program. The fourth annual report on the implementation of Title II of the Speedy Trial Act was submitted to the Congress on June 29, 1979.

Drug Aftercare Services

In an effort to combine fiscal and supervisory responsibility for drug abusing federal offenders in one branch of Government, Congress enacted Public Law 95-537, the Con-

tract Services for Drug Dependent Federal Offenders Act of 1978. Effective in fiscal year 1980, this legislation transfers authority to contract for the supervisory aftercare and treatment of drug dependent or addicted federal offenders from the Federal Bureau of Prisons to the Administrative Office. Congress appropriated \$3,500,000 for the first of three years with \$3,645,000 and \$3,750,000 appropriated for the second and third years of the program.

A task force was formed within the Administrative Office to plan for and implement the provisions of this legislation. Composed of representatives of the Procurement and Property Management Branch, Financial Management Division, the Office of the General Counsel, and the Probation Division, the task force prepared operational and contracting procedures for drug aftercare.

Assistance was received from over 40 probation officers who reviewed the drafts and offered comment as to the feasibility of the procedures. Further assistance was obtained from the Federal Bureau of Prisons, United States Marshals Service, the National Institute on Drug Abuse, and the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, Georgia.

While authority to award, modify, and terminate contracts rests with the Director of the Administrative Office, chief probation officers will act as authorized representatives of the Director in aftercare contracting matters. Chief probation officers will identify available community resources and any need to provide aftercare treatment. After identifying this need, the probation office may provide treatment by either using available resources at no additional cost to the government, providing direct treatment itself or by contracting for services. Specific procedures were developed to insure competition and fairness for contractors and competent treatment for federal offenders at a reasonable cost to the government.

Information Management System

This has been a year of further growth for the Probation Information Management System. The first of four phases of this project has been to describe the existing probation information system; that is, the maintenance, accumulation, flow, and retrieval of information necessary to the realization of the probation offices' mission. This required the complete description of the day-to-day operations of a probation office.

During fiscal year 1979 a task group has collected and examined forms and documents used by eight large probation offices, developed a detailed listing of probation office functions, and conducted further studies to assure the validity of system documentation. The project staff are nearing completion of the second stage of field validation. With the cooperation of the Federal Judicial Center, the next steps in the project are: development of user requirements, a software and feasibility study, and field testing.

MANAGEMENT REVIEW

Establishment of the Division of Management Review on May 12, 1975, marked the first time that the functions of the federal judiciary would be analyzed by an organization within the Administrative Office. In conducting reviews, the Division identified areas where the efficiency and effectiveness of the operations of each office of the court could be improved, conducted financial audits, recommended suggested improvements, and identified management techniques which might be useful to other courts. Prior to the establishment of the Management Review Division, the basic yardstick used for judging a court's management effectiveness had been its statistics compared with those of similar courts and with national averages. The division expanded the parameters of this comparison by including such factors as caseload characteristics, geographics, adequacy of facilities and personnel, travel requirements, case assignment systems, senior and visiting judge availability, and other variables impacting on a particular court.

Calendar Management

Division of Management Review (DMR) findings included nonuniform case assignments, lack of coordination, underscheduling, inordinate Bar influence over continuances, disorganized systems for assignment of cases to senior and visiting judges, and, in particular, ineffective or nonexistent case monitoring systems.

To improve calendar management, recommendations included:

- statistical reports to monitor and manage each judge's calendar;
- equitable reassignment of cases to new judges;

- a formalized automatic system for scheduling of all pretrial proceedings with a comprehensive pretrial order which includes definite time limits;
- active participation of support personnel in the disposition monitoring process;
- use of trailing calendars; and
- more effective use of senior and visiting judges' time.

Clerks Offices

The division frequently found that clerks do not function as executive officers of the court, which creates administrative and managerial problems throughout the court family. In those situations, many clerks' duties, as specified by the Judicial Conference, are being performed by chief judges, thus limiting their availability to perform judicial functions. In addition, a widespread lack of formal training and cross-training programs, of manuals for standard operating procedures, of mid-management and supervisory positions, and of efficient non-duplicative record systems, was noted. Other findings include unnecessary attendance by the courthouse deputy during court proceedings, excessive and nonuniform docket entries, and inadequate and untimely data reporting systems.

Among the most frequently made recommendations are the use of modern filing techniques, formal file retirement programs, standard procedures for handling of exhibits and additional training and cross-training of financial clerks.

In the area of jury management, the division recommended jury wheel automation, six-member civil juries, the adoption of two-year master wheel refill cycles, increased use of code-a-phones and the adoption of jury pooling and multiple voir dire practices.

Magistrates

DMR found that in those courts where magistrates had a full range of duties, they were making significant contributions to case dispositions. In these courts, clerks' office were providing substantial clerical assistance to magistrates'

operations. It was consistently recommended that courts consider assigning a greater range of responsibilities and duties to magistrates.

Probation Offices

DMR found that problems in probation offices were generally created by poor office morale rather than by any actual incompetence of the employees. Such situations could be improved by more frequent exchanges of staff viewpoints, caseload monitoring, and increased judge contacts.

Bankruptcy

DMR found in general a lack of standard operating procedures, formal training programs, clearly defined duties and responsibilities of trustees, over-involvement of bankruptcy judges in clerical matters and interest on the part of the Bar members serving as trustees. It recommended a more careful screening of requests for appointment of attorneys and their petitions for compensation, institution of case monitoring systems, and formalized, timely administrative procedures for case processing.

INFORMATION SYSTEMS

During the past year the project managers in the area of automation were transferred to the Division of Information Systems and the planning functions were assigned to the Office of the Assistant Director for Plans and Program Management.

The Division of Information Systems has been making an all-out effort to implement the plan for nationwide adoption of the Uniform Payroll System which it is hoped will become operational early in 1980. In addition, the Division has developed a modern on-line bankruptcy system to meet both current and new statistical requirements.

ASSIGNED COUNSEL — DEFENDER PROGRAM

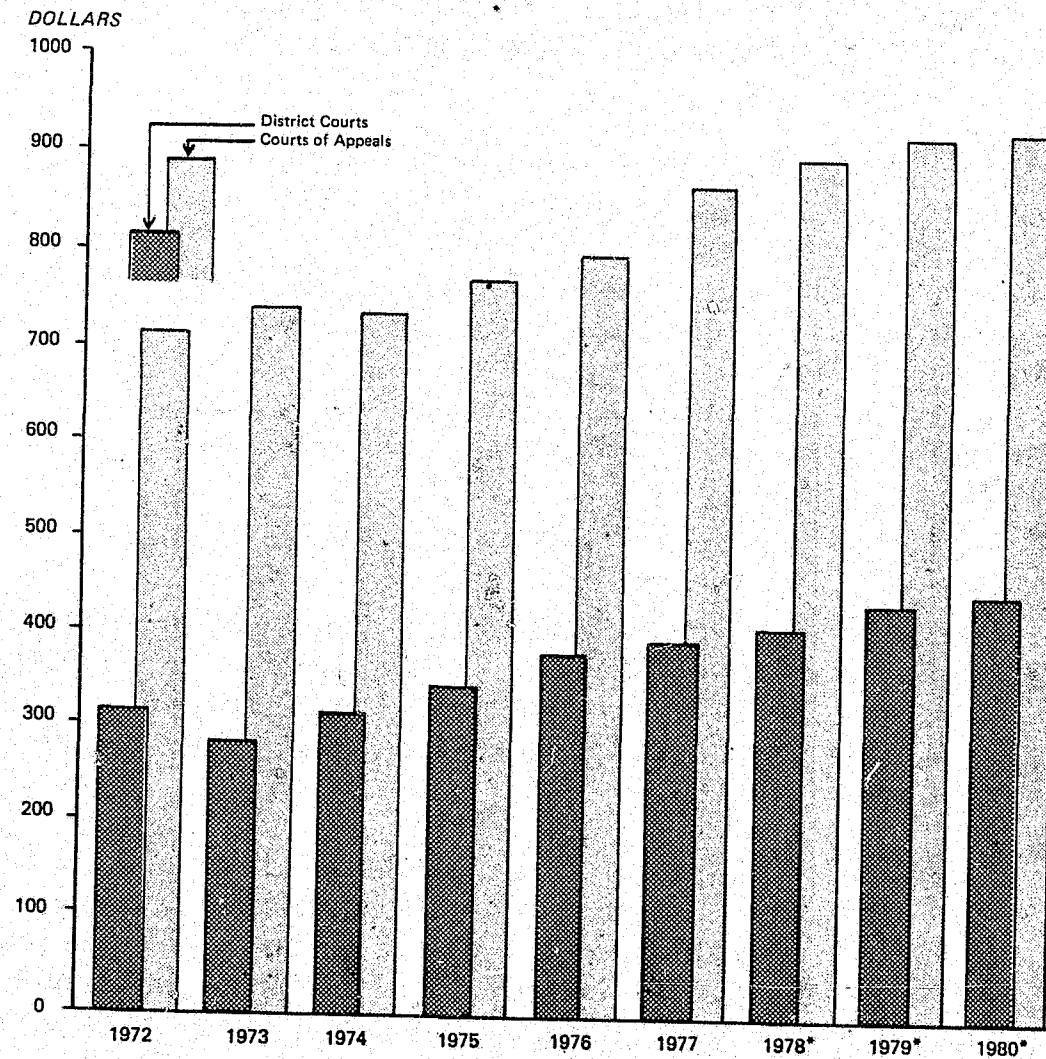
For the twelve months ending June 30, 1979, the Administrative Office has thus far recorded 43,000 appointments of counsel under the Criminal Justice Act. Of this number 21,671 persons, or 50 percent, were represented by private panel attorneys and 21,329 or 50 percent, by staff attorneys in the 38 federal defender organizations throughout the country.

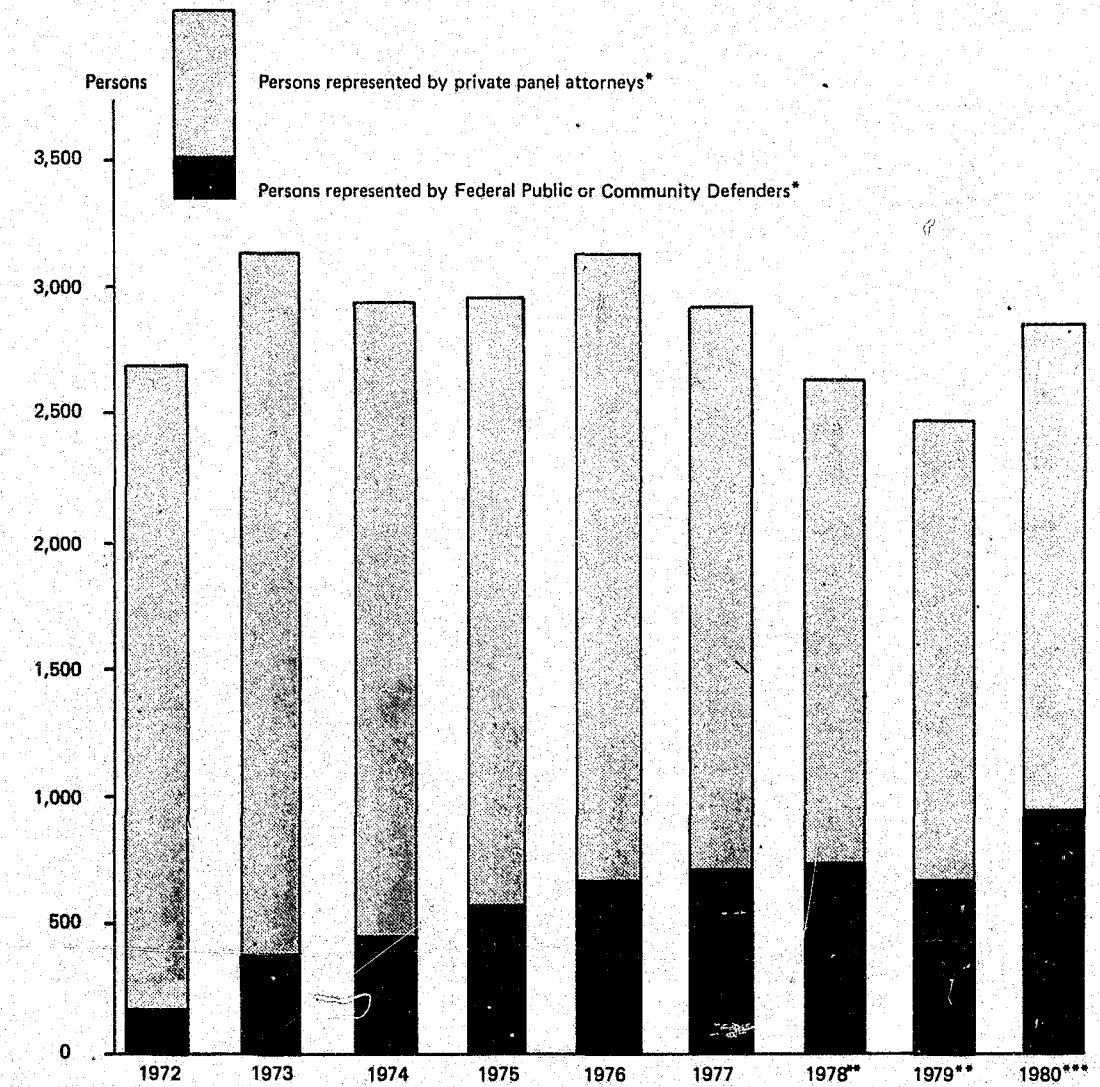

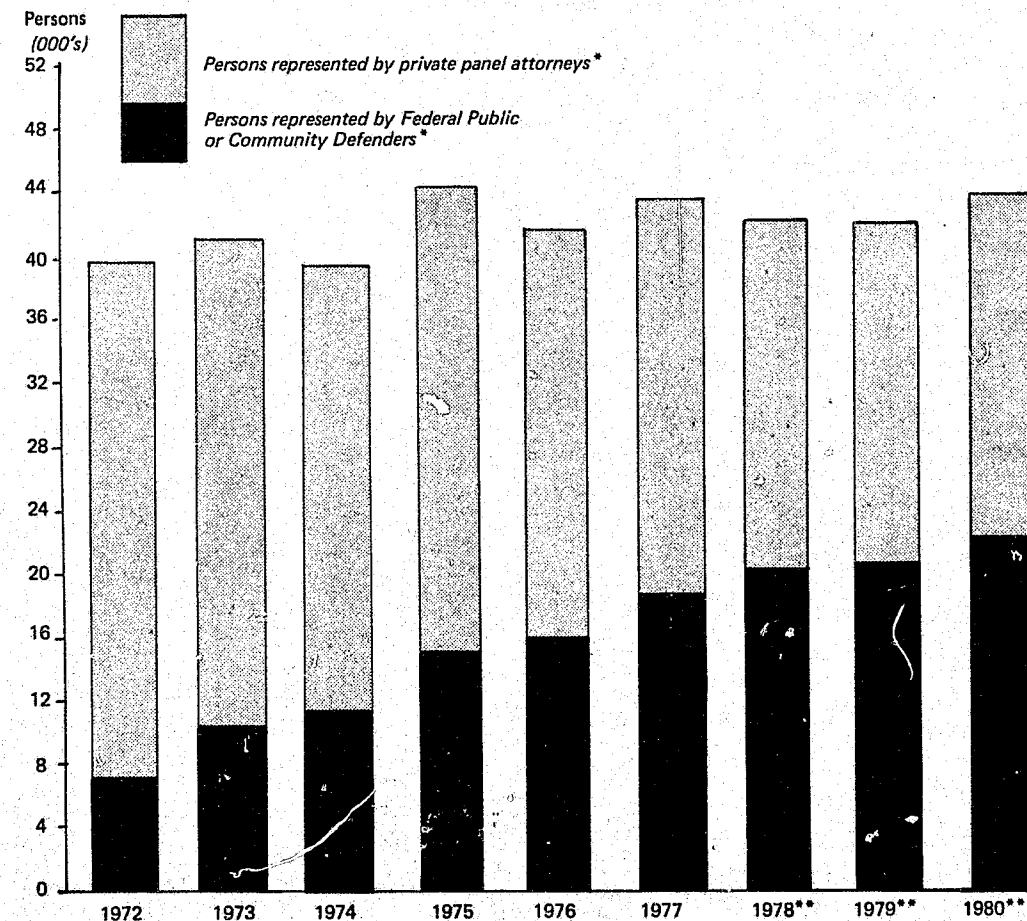

Expansion of the defender system has continued with the creation of one new defender organization and two branch offices. The District of Minnesota established a federal public defender office in Minneapolis which replaced a part-time community defender organization within that judicial district. The Middle District of Florida, which has its main office in Tampa and a branch office in Jacksonville, established a second branch office in Orlando. In addition, a new branch office in the Western District of Washington commenced operations in Tacoma. There are currently 31 federal public defender offices and seven community defender offices.

PRISONER TRANSFER PROGRAM

The Administrative Office provided the liaison and coordination for the transfer of prisoners between the United States and foreign countries pursuant to Prisoner Transfer Treaties with Canada, Bolivia, and Mexico. Transfer of prisoners between the United States and Canada occurred in October, 1978 and April, 1979. Transfer between the United States and Bolivia was effected in June, 1979 and transfers between the U.S. and Mexico have occurred and continue at regular intervals.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

Space Management

No area of the Administrative Office has felt the impact of new legislation more than the space management and procurement branches. With regard to space management, virtually all facilities to be provided under the Omnibus Judgeship Act and the Bankruptcy Reform Act will be major construction projects. From inception to completion, these projects usually require two or more years and involve the formulation of requirements, negotiations with personnel of the courts and the General Services Administration, development, review and approval of construction plans and general supervision of the project until occupancy. The installation of the new circuit and district judges will create above-normal expansion of other court activities in the probation and clerk of court offices. This, in turn, will result in securing space and making required renovations/alterations for those functions as well as the bankruptcy offices, for which new space standards have been developed. Every new judge will be provided with lawbooks, supplies and equipment and many bankruptcy offices will be requesting additional equipment. A

considerable increase in procurement activity is expected during fiscal year 1980.

Drug Dependent Federal Offenders Act

Plans are being developed to implement the Contract Services for Drug Dependent Federal Offenders Act of 1978. This Act, which will take effect on October 1, 1979, will transfer to the Administrative Office approximately 160 contracts covering an annual expenditure of \$3,000,000. Official estimates indicate that the ultimate expansion of this program will increase the number of contracts to 320. The Procurement and Property Management Branch will make continuing evaluations of contract services currently available and evaluate proposals for new contracts to facilitate the choice between competing bidders. The contracting officers will be instrumental in setting minimum standards, offering professional appraisals of the capacities of the contractors, and aiding the negotiation phase of contracts.

Construction

As of June 30, 1979, new buildings containing court facilities were under construction at Columbia, South Carolina; Atlanta, Georgia; Miami, Florida; and Tucson, Arizona. During this fiscal year, construction was completed for the projects at Anchorage, Alaska, and Fort Lauderdale, Florida and these buildings are now occupied. New buildings have been approved for East St. Louis, Illinois; Madison, Wisconsin; and San Jose, California. A contract for an architect/engineer has been awarded for the Madison, Wisconsin project. The East St. Louis, Illinois project has been held in abeyance because of the realignment of the Eastern District of Illinois.

Library Services

During the past year a Library Services Branch has been established to develop, coordinate, and recommend policies and plans for the operation of libraries and legal information resources in the Federal courts. The branch has prepared and submitted to the Ad Hoc Library Committee of the Judicial Conference Committee on Court Administration a report entitled the *United States Court Library System* which recommends a national court library system based on the existing circuit central library providing all library and information services to the entire judiciary within the circuit. The branch has also:

- Revised the list of suggested books available to new judges who have access to central libraries. This change is expected to result in a \$3,265,164 net savings in fiscal years 1979 and 1980.
- Conducted nationwide surveys to determine non-judiciary use of court libraries, library staffing by deputy clerks, and library needs of bankruptcy judges.

In addition to space management, procurement and library services, the Division of Administrative Services has also:

- Completed and forwarded to the General Services Administration the Master Housing Plan for judges appointed under the Omnibus Judgeship Act of 1978. One result of this two-year planning effort was the development of 29 prospectus projects which are now pending in Congress or GSA for approval.
- Completed a courtroom utilization survey as requested by the House Appropriations Subcommittee. This survey focused on courtrooms which were previously reported to be used 25 days or less per year.
- Completed 24 security inspections of court facilities which resulted in an annual savings of approximately \$560,000.
- In support of the Ad Hoc Committee on Records Dispositions of the Judicial Conference, drafted a completely revised district court records disposition schedule and applicable guidelines.
- Completed a work measurement study of the clerks' offices of the courts of appeals and the clerk's office of the Judicial Panel on Multidistrict Litigation. Completed the preliminary phase of a study in the clerks' offices of the district courts.

- In continuing the implementation of the Forms Management Program, seventeen forms were completely revised and three forms were cancelled.
- Developed, for publication and issuance to the courts, guidelines for the procurement, utilization, and disposal of supplies, equipment and legal reference material.
- Completed, published, and issued a court space and construction manual which prescribes new and revised space guidelines and design criteria for court facilities.

JUDICIAL APPROPRIATIONS AND EXPENDITURES

Appropriations for Fiscal Year 1979

The Appropriation Act of 1979, P.L. 95-431, approved October 10, 1978, included for the Judiciary, exclusive of the Supreme Court, budget authority in the amount of \$478,507,000. The Congress in the Supplemental Appropriation Act of 1979, (P.L. 96-38), approved an additional \$24,673,000: \$9,573,000 for increased pay costs and \$15,100,000 for implementation of new legislation, i.e., the Omnibus Judgeship Act, the Bankruptcy Reform Act, the Jury System Improvements Act, and the Court Interpreters Act.

As displayed in Table 27, the total budget authority for fiscal year 1979, taking into account the supplemental appropriations, is \$503,180,000. The Judicial Dollar graphically reflects the cost of various programs and activities in the judiciary.

Appropriations for Fiscal Year 1980

The budget estimates submitted to the Congress for fiscal year 1980 (excluding the Supreme Court) initially were in the amount of \$606,354,000. On April 30, 1979, the budget was amended (House Document 96-108) to include an additional \$1,008,000 for the nine full-time magistrates and staff authorized by the Judicial Conference in March 1979.

Taking into account this amendment, the total requested for the judiciary for fiscal year 1980 (exclusive of the Supreme Court) was \$607,362,000. The House approved \$577,459,000, a reduction of \$29,903,000. The Senate, at the

FISCAL YEAR 1979

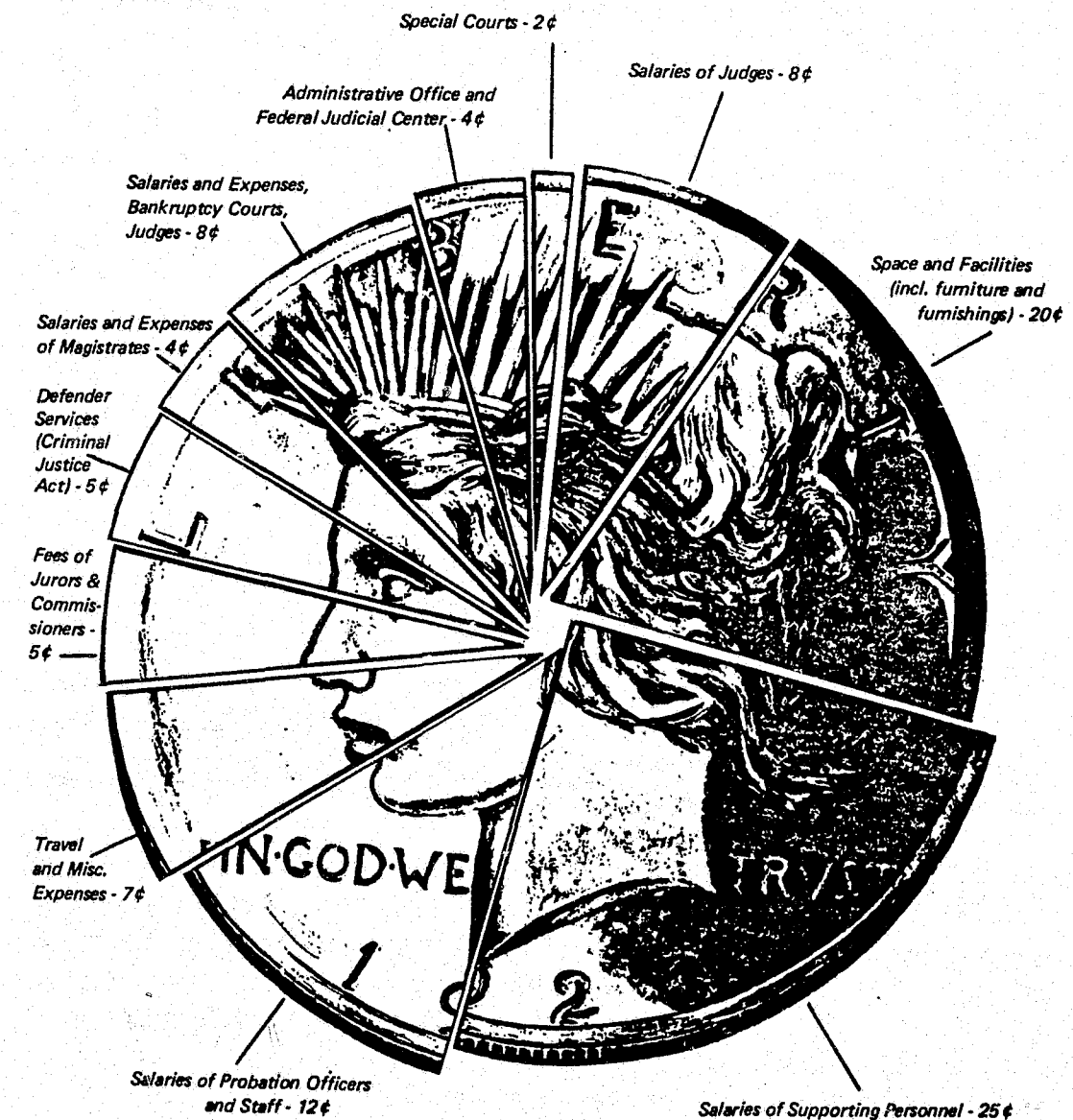

request of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, restored \$3 million of the reduction, primarily for upgrading the libraries of bankruptcy judges. The difference between the Senate and House allowance was resolved in conference with the restoration of \$1,500,000. Table 28 is a comparative statement of the budget estimates and the amounts appropriated for fiscal year 1980.

Salaries of Supporting Personnel

Both the House and Senate Appropriations Committee approved the appointment of an additional secretary and law clerk by circuit judges and a second law clerk for district judges in lieu of a crier or crier-law clerk. Provision also was made for the implementation of the qualification standards for a career law clerk, grade JSP-13, which was recently adopted by the Judicial Conference. The committees denied increases in the central legal staffs of the courts of appeals and requested that a study be made to determine the need for such central staffs.

Defender Services

The Jury System Improvements Act of 1978 (P.L. 95-572) authorized payment of compensation to attorneys appointed to represent jurors in civil actions for the protection of their employment. Language was added to the Defender Services appropriation to provide for such payments.

Fees of Jurors and Commissioners

An increase of \$9,250,000 over the current appropriation was approved. This increase represents the higher fees and allowances authorized by the Congress in the Jury System Improvements Act of 1978 (P.L. 95-572). The Senate Appropriations Committee also inserted language in the Act providing for refreshments, e.g., coffee and doughnuts, for jurors.

Travel and Miscellaneous Expenses

The Appropriations Committee denied a requested increase in the travel allotment and expressed the view that the travel of new circuit and district judges should be absorbed through the adoption of various economy measures and a reduction in the number of conferences and/or meetings attended by judges, clerks of courts, probation officers, and other Judicial officers and employees. The committee also denied an increase for printing of opinions and asked that the Administrative Office of the United States Courts conduct a survey to determine if such printing can be done more economically.

Salaries and Expenses of Magistrates

The increase in this appropriation will provide for the establishment of eight new full-time magistrates and the conversion of twelve part-time magistrates to full-time status, as authorized by the Judicial Conference of the United States in September 1978 and in March 1979.

Salaries and Expenses, Bankruptcy Courts

With respect to the bankruptcy courts, the House Appropriations Committee approved \$57 million, an increase of \$21.7 million over the amount appropriated for 1979, but \$10.8 million less than the amount requested. Provision was made for the appointment of a law clerk by each full-time bankruptcy judge and the appointment of mid-level management personnel for the bankruptcy clerks' offices. Funds also were provided for the reclassification of secretaries and other personnel in the bankruptcy courts pursuant to the

Bankruptcy Reform Act. The committee denied a request for full-time salaried court reporters and, in lieu thereof, included funds for contractual reporting services. At the request of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, the Senate Appropriations Committee restored \$3 million to be used primarily for the procurement of additional legal research material and upgrading the libraries for bankruptcy judges.

Services for Drug Dependent Offenders

The House and Senate Appropriations Committees approved \$3,500,000 to enable the Federal Probation System to provide special supervision and service to drug dependent offenders. The responsibility for such services is being transferred from the Bureau of Prisons to the federal judiciary in fiscal year 1980 pursuant to the Contract Services for Drug Dependent Federal Offenders Act of 1978 (P.L. 95-537).

Space and Facilities

With regard to "Space and Facilities," both the House and Senate Appropriations Committees expressed concern over the substantial growth in the space inventory of the judiciary and both committees stated that they do "not believe that existing facilities are being fully utilized." Each committee also remarked in their respective reports that they do "not believe that bankruptcy judges and magistrates require facilities comparable to those being provided circuit and district judges." The Judicial Conference of the United States has been asked to reconsider the standards and guidelines relating to courtrooms, hearings rooms, chambers, and general office space of these judicial officers. The committees reduced the appropriation by \$7 million with the understanding that the United States Marshals Service in fiscal year 1980 would assume responsibility for court security, thus obviating the need for the judiciary to augment the level of protective services being provided by GSA on a reimbursable basis. Additional funds are being provided to the Department of Justice for this purpose.

Special Rail Reorganization Court

The budget request of \$2,000,000 was denied. The delays in appointing Special Masters and supporting personnel has substantially lowered the rate of expenditures below the current estimates; therefore, sufficient funds remain to continue the program through fiscal year 1980.

Registry Funds

The total on deposit in the registry fund accounts of the district courts, as of June 30, 1979, is \$267,805,827. Of this sum \$73,723,843 (27.53 percent) was on deposit in the Treasury of the United States and \$194,081,984 (72.47 percent) in local depositaries. Despite the resolution of the September 1976 Judicial Conference that such funds be deposited to the Treasury to interest-bearing accounts, \$7,189,511 was on deposit in noninterest-bearing accounts as of June 30, 1979. This compares to a total of \$13,599,123 on deposit in non-interest bearing accounts a year ago. Table 29 shows the amounts on deposit in the Treasury and in local depositaries for the respective district courts.

A New Accounting Manual

A revised Clerk's Manual was prepared and issued during this fiscal year. It provided the clerks of court and their staffs with explicit instructions on accounting procedures for their financial officers, and for the reporting of the financial data to the Administrative Office. The Financial Management Division was assisted by a committee consisting of four clerks of court and four financial deputies in the development of the manual. Their comments and suggestions were invaluable in developing the final product.

The new manual also provides for the establishment of an imprest fund. This fund is a means to make emergency payments, such as cash advances to jurors and the reimbursement of employees for approved out-of-pocket expenditures of \$25 or less.

Three financial management seminars were held during the fiscal year in Chattanooga, Pittsburgh, and Salt Lake. These seminars provided information to the clerks and their financial deputies on the new Clerk's Manual and also stressed the need to develop appropriate security systems and fund control procedures for their offices. The seminars covered the financial liability of clerks and deputies, and the need for internal controls. Small sessions were conducted on these topics to allow the attendees to ask questions and to comment on the subject being discussed.

Juror Fee Regulations

The President, on November 2, 1978, signed into law the Jury System Improvements Act of 1978, Public Law 95-572, 92 Stat. 2453. As a result of this Act, which increased fees

and allowances paid grand and petit jurors, the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts revised and issued, in December 1978, new juror fee regulations. These regulations raised attendance fees, travel allowances and subsistence, and provided for reasonable parking fees for the first time. The new fee schedule and regulations went into effect January 1, 1979.

State Court Reporter's Survey

With the approval of the Subcommittee on Supporting Personnel, the Administrative Office conducted a nationwide survey of compensation and benefits of court reporters employed in the system of state trial courts of original jurisdiction. The survey was made as part of a study to determine if the salaries and/or fees of federal court reporters should be changed. A total of 86 responses were obtained from state courts of trial jurisdiction which employ 4,196 permanent

state court reporters. Information accumulated and tabulated included range, average and median annual salary of state court reporters in all states, different types of fringe and other benefits, and fees prescribed for ordinary, daily and expedited transcripts.

The results of this survey were made available to the Subcommittee on Supporting Personnel in a memorandum dated June 18, 1979, from the Chief of the Division of Financial Management.

Court Interpreters

The Court Interpreters Act, P.L. 95-539 which was signed October 28, 1978, and which took effect 90 days later, charged the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts with the responsibility to "establish a program to facilitate the use of interpreters in courts of the United States." Heretofore, interpreters in court were frequently employed by the Department of Justice or by the Public Defender Office. At times interpreters were deputy clerks who undertook to interpret for the court as requested. Under the new law, the courts may employ interpreters on a permanent basis or the services will be provided on a contractual basis. To expedite the employment and utilization of contractual interpreters, the Administrative Office of the United States Courts issued a general authorization which gives the courts authority to appoint and pay interpreters pursuant to the Court Interpreters Act. The "Interpreters Report of Services and Claims for Compensation and Expenses," AO Form 322, was prepared to implement this procedure, which provides for immediate payment by the clerk of court for interpreter services provided to the court pursuant to the Act, including interpreter service for magistrates and bankruptcy judges.

**AN ANALYSIS
OF THE WORKLOAD

The statistical analysis of the workload of the federal judiciary which appears in this chapter was prepared by the Statistical Analysis and Reports Division. Appendix tables for the courts of appeals, civil, criminal, bankruptcy, and probation statistics were computer generated by the Division of Information Systems.

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FOREWORD

This report by the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts represents the fortieth time that an annual compilation of statistics has been provided by the Director on the workload of the federal courts. Federal judicial statistics, however, have been available since 1871 when the Department of Justice included summary statistics on the federal courts in the Annual Report of the Attorney General. These data were obtained through summary reports submitted by each court.

It was in 1935 that the summary reporting system gave way to case reporting. Under Attorney General Homer Cummings case filings and disposition reports were received first for civil cases, then for criminal prosecutions, and finally for bankruptcy proceedings.

These reporting programs were transferred intact to the newly created Administrative Office of the United States Courts, with the civil and bankruptcy programs transferred in 1940 and the criminal program in 1942.

Since 1940, the individual statistical case reports have grown from 240,000 records to over one million in 1979. The number of individual records has reached a staggering volume in each program area. Thus:

In addition several summary type forms are provided by the courts including monthly petit and grand jury reports, and reports of the caseload of federal public and community defenders. Annually, the clerks of district courts supply information on three-judge court hearings, the status of three year old civil cases and the status of criminal defendants, plus an annual inventory of passport applications, petitions for naturalization, and aliens naturalized.

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All of the above reports are received and processed by the staff of the Statistical Analysis and Reports Division which then enters the reports via a mini-computer tape recording system to a mainframe computer operated by the Division of Information Systems. Beginning July 1, 1979, the two divisions initiated direct data entry of bankruptcy filings onto the main computer operated by the Information Systems.

And so in 40 years, federal judicial statistics have moved from small numbers of cases which were generally hand-tallied to the key punching of cards, to a key tape operation in early 1975, and now the direct entry of a vastly increased volume of reports into the main computer. The advantages of direct access are many. It provides immediate transfer of the information sent in by the courts to the computer files. It permits pre-edit of all records simultaneously with the entry by the data analyst, and as fast as a month's work is completed, summary tables can be provided for publication and for responding to special requests.

The "statistical customers" of the Administrative Office gain more current data, with more time to evaluate the trends which are changing at a more rapid pace than in earlier years. It provides a means of producing the "roll over" 12 months reports on a timely basis, as well as special reports required by the Congress on the implementation of the Speedy Trial Act and the experience generally with the civil caseload.

Other statistics collected by the Administrative Office serve as management tools. Thus, the summary report of investigations by probation officers assists the Probation Division in establishing personnel requirements. For the Magistrates Division, the monthly report of U.S. magistrate activity weighs heavily in preparing survey reports for Congress and for the Judicial Conference of the United States.

What has occurred in these last forty years is a greater intensity in collection of statistics not only for analysis and research, but for management. The concern in this endeavor has been continuity of the information with standard definitions and procedures for collection, processing, and tabulating the data. It is for these reasons that readers can be assured that the data in this report, including the special X series of tables in the appendix, represent the combined efforts of

several hundreds of judges, bankruptcy judges, magistrates, clerks of court and their deputies, probation officers and their statistical clerks, and public and community defenders. In a given year it has been estimated that over 2,000 federal judicial officials assist in this overall reporting program.

To assure that the tip of the statistical iceberg reaches its many audiences, the reports vary from this one, which is statutorily required, to the "roll over" 12 months reports published as of September 30, December 31 and March 31, the Speedy Trial Report (Title I and Title II), annual report on wiretaps, and four reports established by resolution of the Judicial Conference: *Court Management Statistics*, *Juror Utilization*, *Federal Offenders*, and *Persons Under Supervision of the Federal Probation System*. Of significance to many readers is the Director's summary to the Judicial Conference of the United States referred to as the *Pictorial Summary*.

For the most part, the published reports are available in the respective courts. In addition, circuit courts libraries, and depository libraries now maintain complete sets of these reports. Also, several reports also have been placed on microfiche by private concerns.

The statistics move from the court to a sophisticated processing system, but how effectively the data assist the courts is determined by the users themselves. Therefore, users are encouraged to identify matters which should be highlighted and to look for new data elements which will fulfill the requirements of a meaningful statistical system.

UNITED STATES COURTS OF APPEALS

Summary of the Workload

The workload of the United States courts of appeals topped the twenty thousand mark for the first time as 20,219 cases were filed throughout the eleven circuits - a 6.9 percent increase over the 18,928 dockettings recorded a year ago. Case dispositions during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 rose at the same rate as filings, 6.9 percent from 17,714 in 1978 to 18,928. The increase in terminations, however, was not sufficient to stem the rising tide of pending litigation which grew by 1,291 cases from 16,648 in 1978 to 17,939 as of June 30, 1979 swelling the pending caseload at a rate of 7.8 percent.

Table 1 illustrates the nationwide workload of the courts of appeals from 1962 to 1979. This year's increases follow last year's declines, the only downturns in the period covered by the table.

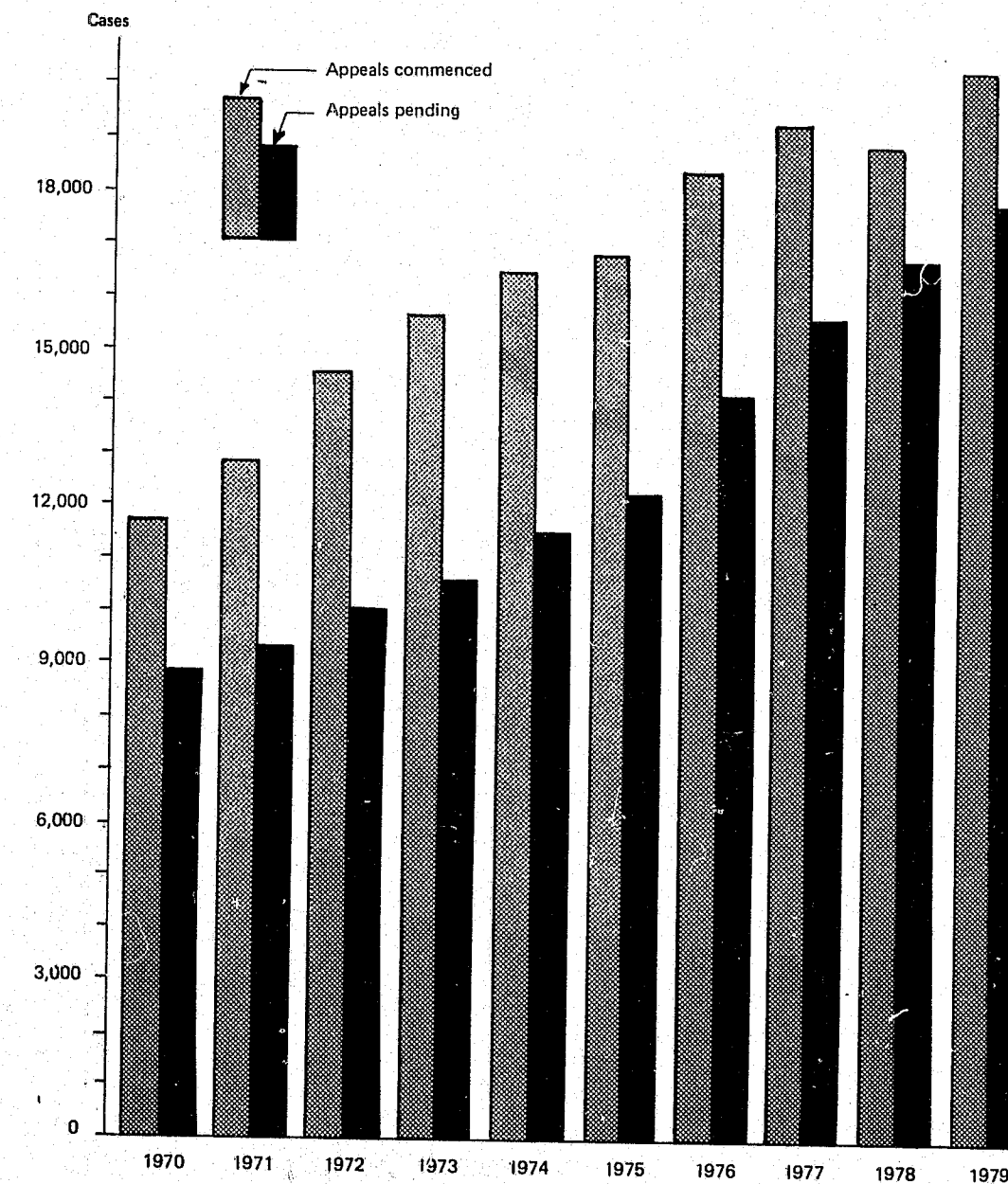

Workload Per Authorized Judgeship

This year witnessed the addition of thirty-five new judgeship positions to be filled in the courts of appeals bringing the total to 132 authorized judgeships. Table 3 graphically illustrates the effect of the seemingly ceaseless tide of appellate filings on the workload of the appellate judiciary. Although filings per authorized judgeship fell from 195 in 1978 with 97 judgeships to 153 in 1979 for the 132 authorized positions (all of the 35 additional were still unfilled), when compared to the 94 cases per judgeship in 1968 - the first year in which the courts of appeals operated at 97 judgeships - clearly the burdens of the judiciary continue to grow even when granted the relief of additional judgeships.

Terminations per judgeship would be reduced from 183 to 143 with the 35 added judgeships; yet when compared to the 1968 level of 85, the workload of each individual judge has skyrocketed 68.2 percent, while pending cases have increased a full 100.0 percent since the first year of the previously authorized level of 97 judgeships.

However, as of June 30, 1979 since none of the 35 additional judgeships to the appellate bench had been filled, the workload of each appellate judge was 36 percent greater than the data indicates. Furthermore, with each case normally handled by panels of three judges, the per judgeship figures should be multiplied by three to reflect the true burden carried by the individual judges.

Filings

Nine of the eleven courts of appeals registered increases in the number of appeals docketed. Three of the five circuits which recorded increases in excess of the 6.9 percent national rise had experienced declines in filings the previous year. In the Second Circuit filings fell 12.7 percent in 1978; however, in 1979 new appeals grew 14.3 percent. The largest increases in new dockettings occurred in the Fifth and Fourth circuits where filings jumped 347 cases and 281 cases, respectively. The largest increases in filings developed in the Second, Fourth, and Fifth circuits, all of which experienced declines in filings the previous year.

Dispositions

The disposition of appeals increased 6.9 percent from 17,714 in 1978 to 18,928 during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. This increase of 1,214 terminations follows a downturn of 70 dispositions the previous year.

The Seventh Circuit posted the largest increase, 434 dispositions, after suffering a 25 case drop-off in terminations in 1978. The most significant turnaround in disposition activity came in the District of Columbia where terminations fell off by 296 in 1978 then climbed by 225 in 1979. When the increases experienced in the District of Columbia and Seventh circuits are coupled with the Third Circuit's 234 case jump in dispositions, they account for nearly 75 percent of the rise in termination activity.

For only the second time in the last ten years, the Ninth Circuit experienced a drop in the number of cases disposed of from 2,715 in 1978 to 2,551 in 1979.

Pending Appeals

While filings and terminations both rose at a rate of 6.9 percent, docketings outdistanced dispositions by 1,291 cases pushing the pending case backlog to 17,939 - a rise of 7.8 percent for the second consecutive year.

Five circuits were able to close more cases than were filed with the Third and Seventh circuits reducing their pending workloads by 114 cases and 100 cases respectively. Once again, the nation's two most active circuits, the Fifth and Ninth, underwent the largest increases in pending case-loads as each circuit docketed over 450 more cases than they were able to terminate. For the sixth straight year, the Second Circuit was able to decrease its pending backlog which, since 1970, has fallen 39 percent from 1,105 to 674.

Types of Appeals from District Courts

Appeals arising out of the U.S. district courts accounted for 16,322 of the 20,219 docketings or 80.7 percent of the filing activity in the courts of appeals during 1979. While civil and criminal appeals showed a combined increase of 4.3 percent over last year, a rise of 673 cases, criminal appeals fell 8.6 percent from 4,487 in 1978 to 4,102 in 1979. Since 1977, criminal appeals have declined 13.4 percent.

Civil actions comprised 74.9 percent of all appeals from the district courts totalling 12,220 filings, a climb of 9.5 percent over 1978. U.S. civil cases, which account for less than one out of every three civil appeals, rose only 1.4 percent to 3,983 appeals. However, actions in which the U.S. was a plaintiff rose 34.1 percent in 1979 and have increased over 70 percent since 1974. U.S. defendant cases dropped slightly

from 3,391 in 1978 to 3,263 in 1979. Docketing activity in U.S. defendant contract actions fell 24.4 percent after doubling in 1978. Tax suits dropped at a rate of 14.2 percent after jumping 24.4 percent a year ago. Federal prisoner petitions numbered 775 during 1979, representing 23.8 percent of the appeals from district courts where the U.S. was a defendant.

Private civil cases increased 13.9 percent accounting for 67.4 percent of all appealed civil actions. Those private cases involving federal question jurisdiction rose 15.3 percent, as civil rights litigations climbed by 260 cases or 16.9 percent and state prisoner petitions increased by 512 or 34.9 percent. Prisoner habeas corpus petitions grew 27.1 percent following six consecutive years of declines. Contract and tort actions rose 21.8 percent and 9.0 percent, respectively. Diversity of citizenship cases increased 10.9 percent to 1,991 appeals while general local jurisdiction cases dropped to only 38 appeals, the eighth year in a row such cases declined.

Impact of State Prisoner Petitions

State prisoner petitions climbed 35 percent to an all time high of 1,978 filings in 1979, representing 9.8 percent of all the new cases docketed in the U.S. courts of appeals. The sum total of Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth circuit filings accounted for 61.0 percent of all state prisoner petitions. The Fourth Circuit, alone, accounted for 29.7 percent of all state prisoner petitions as these appeals grew 47.4 percent from 399 in 1978 to 588 in 1979. The Fifth Circuit recorded the second

largest number of petitions placed on the general docket, 313, representing 8.1 percent of all new filings in the district as opposed to the Sixth Circuit, whose 307 state prisoner petitions comprised 16.3 percent of their new workload.

Reviews of Administrative Agency Cases

The review of administrative agency decisions in the courts of appeals rose to an all time high of 2,922 filings, 22.7 percent more than in 1978. After last year's drop in administrative reviews, four circuits - the District of Columbia, the Fourth, the Sixth and the Seventh - experienced gains of more than 25 percent in docketing these cases. Once again, the District of Columbia Circuit received more agency cases than any other circuit, 666 filings or 22.8 percent of the national total. These cases represent almost one half of the 1,415 total cases commenced in the circuit. The District of Columbia Circuit served as the primary court for the review of Civil Aeronautics Board cases (51 of 59); Environmental Protection Agency appeals (95 of 257); Federal Communications Commission decisions (83 of 93); and Interstate Commerce Commission findings (113 of 205).

Reviews of National Labor Relations Board decisions generated the most appeals - 931 up 18.4 percent over 1978. Such decisions accounted for nearly half of all agency reviews in the Second, Sixth and Seventh circuits. Other agencies with comparatively large numbers of appealed reviews were the Internal Revenue Service - up 28.9 percent to 272 filings; Environmental Protection Agency - up 65.8 percent to 257 cases; and Federal Energy Regulatory Commission cases - up 49.1 percent to 243 cases in 1979. For the third year in a row, Immigration and Naturalization Service cases decreased - down from 256 in 1978 to 194 in 1979. Since 1976 appeals of INS reviews have plummeted 49.9 percent.

Miscellaneous Proceedings

The number of miscellaneous proceedings filed in the courts of appeals jumped 10.6 percent to 3,573 in 1979. Although not placed on the general docket, these proceedings often require court time equal to that of a regularly docketed case. It should be noted that in the five years since 1974, miscellaneous proceedings have increased 41 percent while cases on the general docket have risen 23 percent. For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, increases were reported in all categories following last year's downturn. Habeas corpus petitions experienced the single largest rise, up 201 cases or 20.5 percent.

Oral Hearings and Submissions on Briefs

Hearings for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 rose 6.0 percent from 6,000 in 1978 to 6,358 in 1979. Since 1971 the number of hearings has increased only 9.3 percent. In a reversal of last year's data, eight of the eleven circuits reported increases in hearings; the Fourth and Ninth circuits accounted for 76.3 percent of the national rise with 112 and 161 more hearings, respectively. The nation's most active circuit, the Fifth, held 54 fewer hearings in 1979 than in 1978, while the Third Circuit had 45 less. It should be noted that 41 of the hearings were held before courts sitting en banc. In addition to oral hearings, a total of 2,636 cases were reported as submitted on briefs with 35.9 percent of these occurring in the Fifth Circuit. (See tables 8 and 9.)

Case Participations by Resident, Senior, and Visiting Judges

Case participations by the federal judiciary throughout the eleven circuits of the courts of appeals remained virtually unchanged rising only 1.2 percent from 27,256 in 1978 to 25,590 in 1979. Resident active circuit judges participated in 77.3 percent of the cases or 21,338 actions - 531 more than in 1978. Participations by resident senior circuit judges dropped to an all time low of 2,690 in 1979 from 3,301 in 1978 - less than 10 percent of the entire caseload. Visiting judges were responsible for 3,562 case participations or 13.0 percent. Of the eleven circuits the Ninth relied most heavily on assistance from senior and visiting judges, who accounted for over 41.1 percent of their 3,982 recorded participations. Two of the nation's three most active circuits, the Second and Ninth, relied on senior and visiting judges for 38.5 percent and 41.1 percent of their total case participations, respectively. However, the Fifth Circuit effectively halved its degree of assistance from senior and visiting judges from 23.2 percent in 1978 to 12.7 percent in 1979.

Opinions and Memoranda

Signed opinions and other papers (including per curiam opinions, memorandum decisions, and decisions from the bench) which set forth reasons for a decision accompanied 78.4 percent of the 9,361 cases disposed of after oral hearing or submission on briefs. Overall, these 7,341 stated opinions grew out of 15,711 cases terminated, exclusive of consolidations. Additionally, stated opinions supported 85.9 percent of the 6,350 cases decided without oral hearing or submission on briefs. Thus, stated reasons accompanied 12,798 or 81.5 percent of the 15,711 cases disposed of in 1979 (excluding consolidations).

Reversal Rate

The rate of reversals in cases disposed of after oral hearing or submission on briefs decreased in three of the four major types of appeals bringing the national average down from 17.3 percent in 1978 to 16.5 percent in 1979. Nationwide, the total number of reversals crept from 1,536 to 1,548. It should be noted that reversal data is selected from those cases which are fully reversed, vacated, or reversed and remanded. For statistical purposes, when a lower court decision is affirmed in part and reversed in part, it is considered an affirmance. This year seven circuits experienced decreases in their reversal rates with the Second Circuit showing the lowest rate - 11.6 percent. The Fourth Circuit posted the highest reversal rate - 19.1 percent.

Cases Disposed of After Oral Hearing or Submission

The U.S. courts of appeals terminated 9,361 cases after oral hearing or submission on briefs in 1979, compared to 8,850 in 1978. The number of cases disposed of in this manner rose a modest 5.8 percent; the proportion of cases terminated after hearing or submission to total dispositions remained high at 49.5 percent. As in 1978 those cases disposed of without oral hearing or submission on briefs in 1979 comprised approximately one-third of all terminations, while the proportion of consolidations rose from 13.2 percent to 17.0 percent. Data for individual circuits may be found in the Appendix Table B-1.

OTHER FEDERAL COURTS

Rail Reorganization Court

The Special Court was established by the Regional Rail Reorganization Act of 1973 primarily to determine the value of properties transferred by seven principal bankrupt railroads and numerous other transferors in the Northeast and Midwest region. The amounts claimed by the transferors range into the billions of dollars and the proceedings to determine these claims necessarily must be conducted in several stages. The Special Court announced the general principles it would follow in an opinion dated October 12, 1977, 445 F.Supp. 994. During the past year the court has been taking evidence as to the amount which the transferors claim could have been obtained for certain properties for continued rail use in the absence of the Rail Act. In other collateral proceedings arising under its original and exclusive jurisdiction the Special Court reported 6 cases filed and 11 terminated during the year, leaving 34 such cases pending as of June 30, 1979. One case currently entered on the miscellaneous docket represents 1,869 pleadings alone.

Temporary Emergency Court of Appeals

The Temporary Emergency Court of Appeals litigates all appeals from the district courts in controversies arising under section 4(e) of the Economic Stabilization Act of 1971, as well as those pursuant to the Emergency Petroleum Allocation Act of 1973, the Energy Policy and Conservation Act of 1975, and the Emergency Natural Gas Act of 1977.

The workload of the Temporary Emergency Court of Appeals increased significantly during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 as 51 cases were docketed compared to 35 a year ago - a rise of 45.7 percent. The disposition of cases brought to the Temporary Emergency

Court of Appeals more than doubled increasing from 17 in 1978 to 44 in 1979, leaving 33 cases pending as of June 30, 1979.

In the annual report to the Chief Justice, the Chief Judge of the Temporary Emergency Court of Appeals stated:

"To date 284 cases have been docketed. The usual number of cases pending within the court range from a low of 35 to a high of 50. The flow of cases is steady since, as of September 14, 1979, there are still 245 cases pending in the district courts, all of which could be appealed to TECA.

One hundred thirty-two opinions have been written by judges of the court, and there are always at least two cases awaiting publication of a printed opinion. Similarly, at all times there are seven cases scheduled for hearing.

Cases are assigned to a panel for consideration on the date that the notice of appeal is filed, and the time limits for brief filing provided by the Federal Rules of Appellate Procedure are halved by the rules of the TECA court. This procedure results in a hearing in most cases within two months of the date upon which the notice of appeal is filed. TECA judges have been most cooperative in the prompt submissions of opinions for publication in the cases in which they sit. In the seven and one-half years of the court's existence, opinions have not been filed within three months in only four cases. One of these four cases was a tremendously involved case in which the ultimate value to the prevailing parties was stated to be \$1.3 billion."

*Cases Under Submission in the Courts of Appeals
and Other Federal Courts*

There were 587 cases, not including cases awaiting the submission of additional memoranda or briefs or awaiting an opinion in another case, under submission over 90 days on June 30, 1979 in the United States courts of appeals and the Court of Claims. This is an increase of 78 cases, or 15.3 percent, over the 509 cases reported in 1978. A total of 378 cases (64.4 percent) had been submitted more than three but less than six months; 128 cases (21.8 percent) were reported as under submission for more than six but less than nine months; 34 cases (5.8 percent) had been submitted for more

than nine months but less than one year; and 47 (8.0 percent) were under submission for more than one year.

The cases reported by the courts of appeals and the Court of Claims were distributed as shown in Table 13. The Ninth and Tenth circuits reported 249 cases representing 42.4 percent of the total cases under submission. Judges in the Ninth Circuit similarly accounted for 17, or 36.2 percent, of the 47 cases reported under submission for more than one year.

The Temporary Emergency Court of Appeals and the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals reported no cases held under submission over three months on June 30, 1979.

Five of the circuits and the Court of Claims reported increases in the number of cases pending over 90 days. These increases ranged from a two case increase in the Court of Claims to a 51 case increase in the Ninth Circuit. The largest decrease in the number of cases pending over 90 days was reported by the Fifth Circuit when its pending caseload dropped from 108 in 1978 to 74 in 1979, a decrease of 34 cases. The number of cases pending over 90 days in the Third Circuit remained stable at three.

UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURTS

During the current year, two Congressional Acts impacted significantly on the statistical presentation in this report. The first was the 1978 Omnibus Judgeship Act (P.L. 95-486, October 20, 1978), which created 35 additional judgeships for the courts of appeals and 117 additional judgeships for the district courts. Also included in that Act was a provision which requires a \$10,000 jurisdictional amount on each receipt or bill of lading which is the basis for a claim under Title 49 U.S.C. Section 20(11) or Title 28 U.S.C. Section 1337. The effect of this provision was to transfer the litigation of small freight claims in federal courts to state courts which have concurrent jurisdiction. The effect in the workload of the courts is illustrated in the discussion of Interstate Commerce Commission cases in the civil caseload statistics.

The second Congressional Act affecting data presented in this report was the Federal District Court Organization Act of 1978 (P.L. 95-408, October 2, 1978). Section 4 of that Act reorganized the judicial districts of the State of Illinois. The existing Northern District was not changed; however, effective April 1, 1979, the counties in the old Eastern and Southern Districts were reorganized into the new Central and Southern Districts. The statistics appearing in this report reference the new district alignment just as though those districts existed for the entire twelve-month period.

Civil Cases

Summary of Caseload

Civil litigation in the U.S. district courts has increased steadily over the last twenty years. In fact, over the last decade, the number of civil cases commenced in the district courts has doubled, from 77,193 in 1969 to 154,666 for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. This represents an all-time high filing level and represents an increase of 11.5 percent over the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978. Similarly, the number of civil terminations in the district courts has also been on the rise. During the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, there were 143,323 civil cases terminated, an increase of 13.8 percent over 1978. Despite this increasing termination rate, the number of filings has exceeded the number of terminations every year since 1960. Thus, the pending caseload in the district courts has increased steadily over the past twenty years. As of June 30, 1979, there were 177,805 civil cases pending in the district courts, an increase of 6.8 percent over the 1978 level and 190.3 percent over the 1960 level.

Workload Per Authorized Judgeship

On October 20, 1978, the Omnibus Judgeship Act of 1978 (Public Law 95-486) was signed into law. This law increased the number of authorized judgeships in the district courts from 399 to 516. As indicated in Table 17, the per judgeship filing, termination, and pending caseloads have increased steadily since 1974. However, with the addition of the 117 new judgeships approved by the Omnibus Judgeship Act, the per judgeship caseloads for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 were reduced to approximately the 1976 levels. Such reductions generally follow the approval of additional judgeships.

Civil Filings

Of the 95 districts, 86 experienced an overall increase in filings. Sixteen districts recorded increases in filings of more than 30 percent over the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978. The Southern District of California showed the greatest increase, up 80.0 percent. A 223.1 percent increase in the Northern Mariana Islands results from the district court only operating for five months of the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978. The increase in California, Southern is based on an increase in the number of U.S. land condemnation cases filed, which increased from 8 for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978 to 217 such cases in 1979. Massachusetts,

12 MONTHS ENDED JUNE 30, 1970-1979

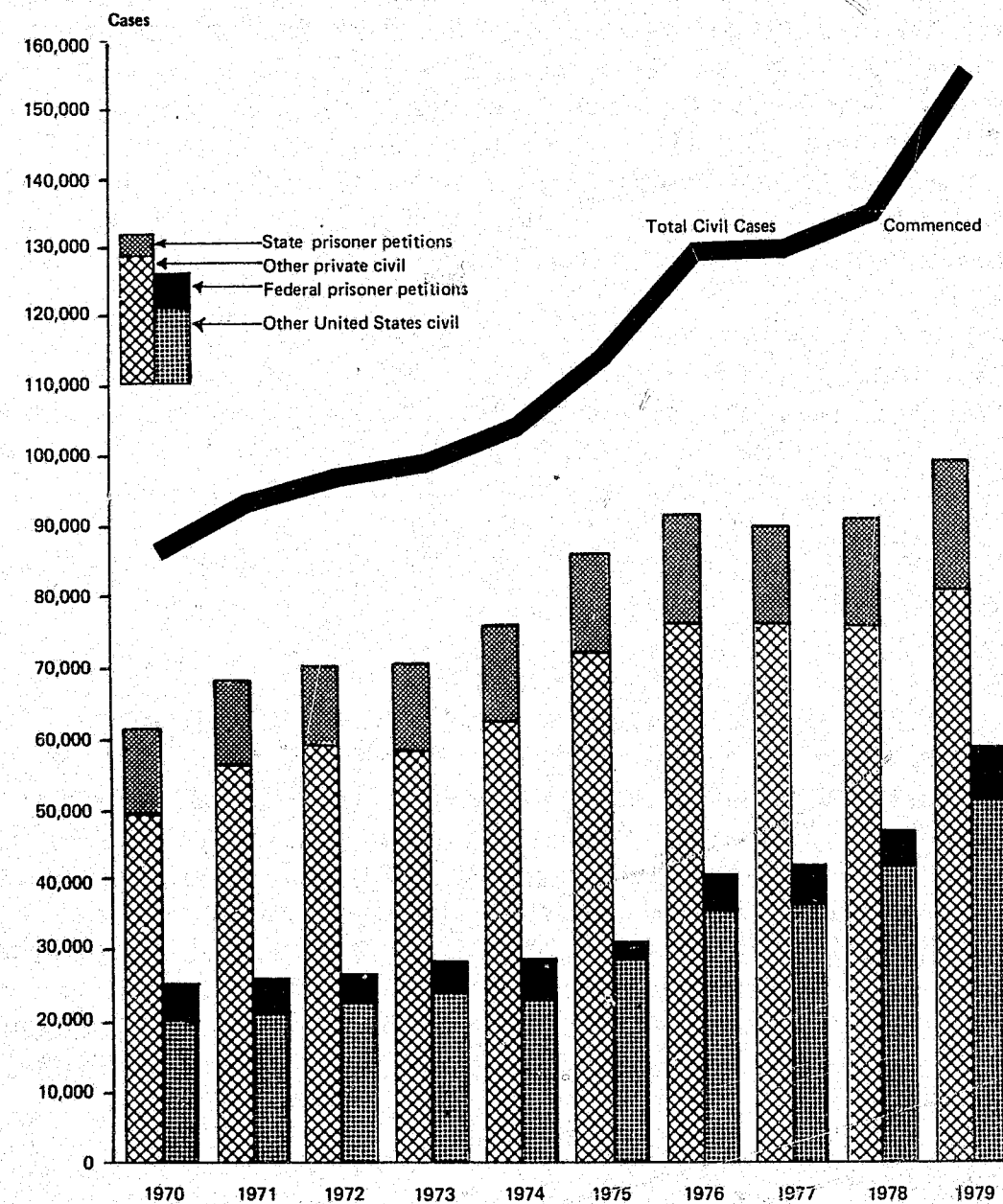

on the other hand, showed a decline of 23.8 percent in filings during the year ended June 30, 1979. This reduction can be largely attributed to the curtailing of district court jurisdiction over I.C.C. cases, pursuant to provisions of Section 9 of the Omnibus Judgeship Act of 1978 (Public Law 95-486). Detailed statistics on the number and type of civil cases commenced during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 are provided in appendix tables C2 and C3.

Civil Filings by Origin

The primary origin of civil cases filed in the district courts are original filings. For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, original filings comprised 89.3 percent of the 154,666 civil cases filed. Each source of filings recorded an increase with the exception of interdistrict transfers, which declined slightly. Remands from the courts of appeals represented the smallest portion of civil filings, accounting for only 0.5 percent of total filings.

Types of Civil Cases Commenced

During the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, 36.1 percent of the civil cases filed in the district courts were cases involving the United States as either plaintiff or defendant. In 1978, U.S. cases represented only 33.7 percent of total civil filings. As indicated in Table 19, the increase in U.S. cases can be attributed largely to a 37.6 percent rise in the number of U.S. plaintiff cases from 22,534 in 1978 to 31,003 in 1979.

The bulk of this increase is in cases related to recovery of overpayments and enforcement of judgments. As shown in Table 20, the number of such cases filed in the district courts during the year ended June 30, 1979 was 9,254, an increase of 398.6 percent over the number filed in 1978 and more than ten times the number filed in 1977. This reflects the concert-

ed effort of the government to recover delinquent or defaulted student loans. The greatest impact of this increase was in Michigan, Eastern, where filings of such cases increased from 18 in 1978 to 863 in 1979. There was also a substantial increase in tax suits filed in the district courts, which rose 31.8 percent over the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978.

Several types of civil cases showed substantial drops in filings. Cases filed under the Narcotic Addict Rehabilitation Act declined 89.2 percent, dropping from 74 in 1978 to only 8 in 1979. Commerce and land condemnation cases also declined sharply, down 41.0 percent and 20.3 percent, respectively. The reduction in I.C.C. commerce case filings was primarily the result of a drop of such filings in Massachusetts from 1,316 in 1978 to 358 in 1979. Similarly, the overall decline in land condemnation case filings was largely the result of a drop in Florida, Southern, from 5,425 in 1978 to 3,682 in 1979.

Prisoner Petitions

Another source of considerable civil litigation is petitions filed by federal and state prisoners. Table 21 provides a breakdown of the number and type of prisoner petitions filed in the district courts for each of the twelve month periods ended June 30, 1970 - 1979.

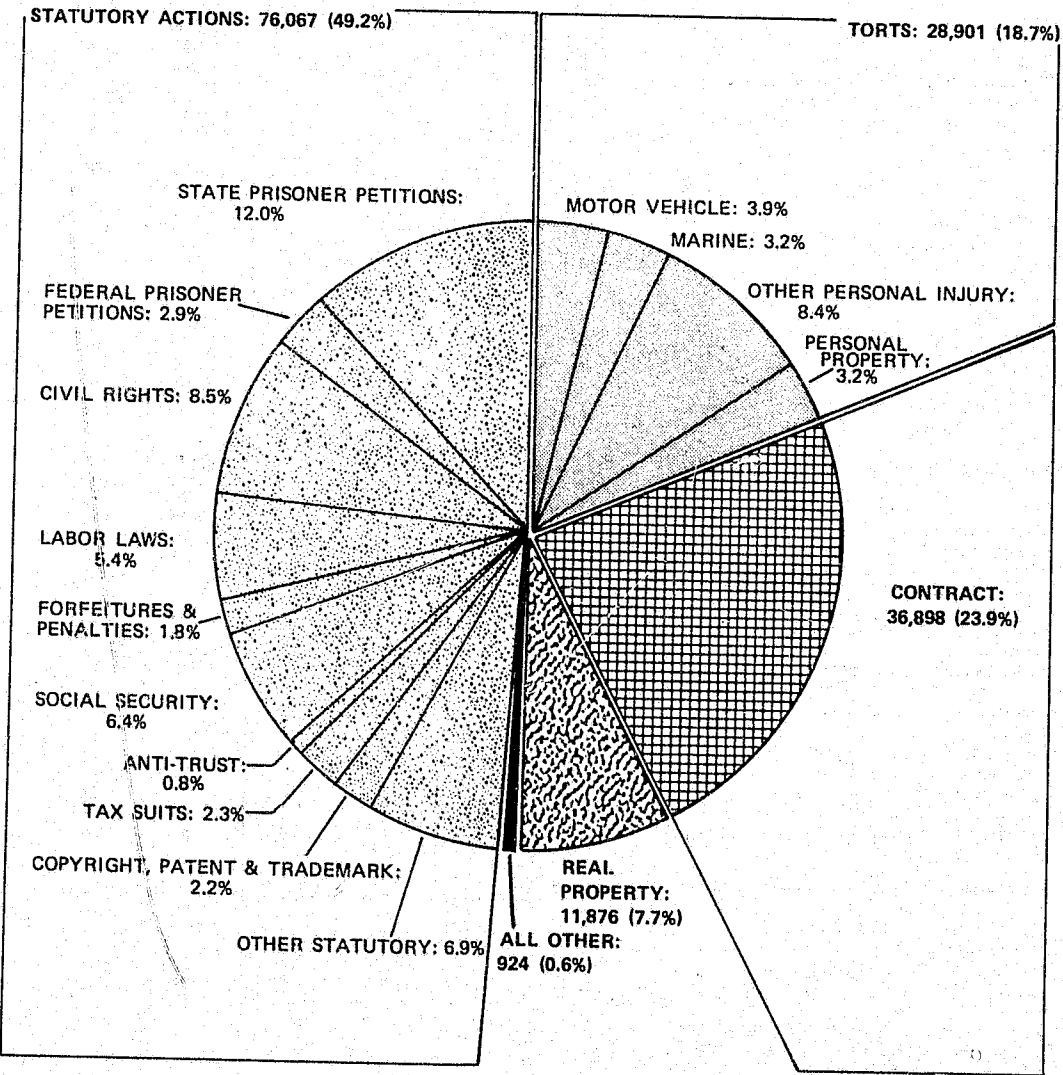
During the year ended June 30, 1979, a total of 23,001 petitions were filed by federal and state prisoners. This level represents an all-time high, 43.8 percent greater than the number of petitions filed in 1970 and 4.9 percent over the number filed in 1978. This overall increase is due solely to the

increased filings by state prisoners, an increase of 9.0 percent over 1978. The number of petitions filed by federal prisoners declined by 9.2 percent for the year ended June 30, 1979. The bulk of this increase in filings by state prisoners was in civil rights cases, which increased to 11,195 in 1979, 15.1 percent over the 1978 level and 451.5 percent over the number of civil rights petitions filed by state prisoners in 1970. State prisoners filed 80.4 percent of the total prisoner petitions filed in the district courts for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979.

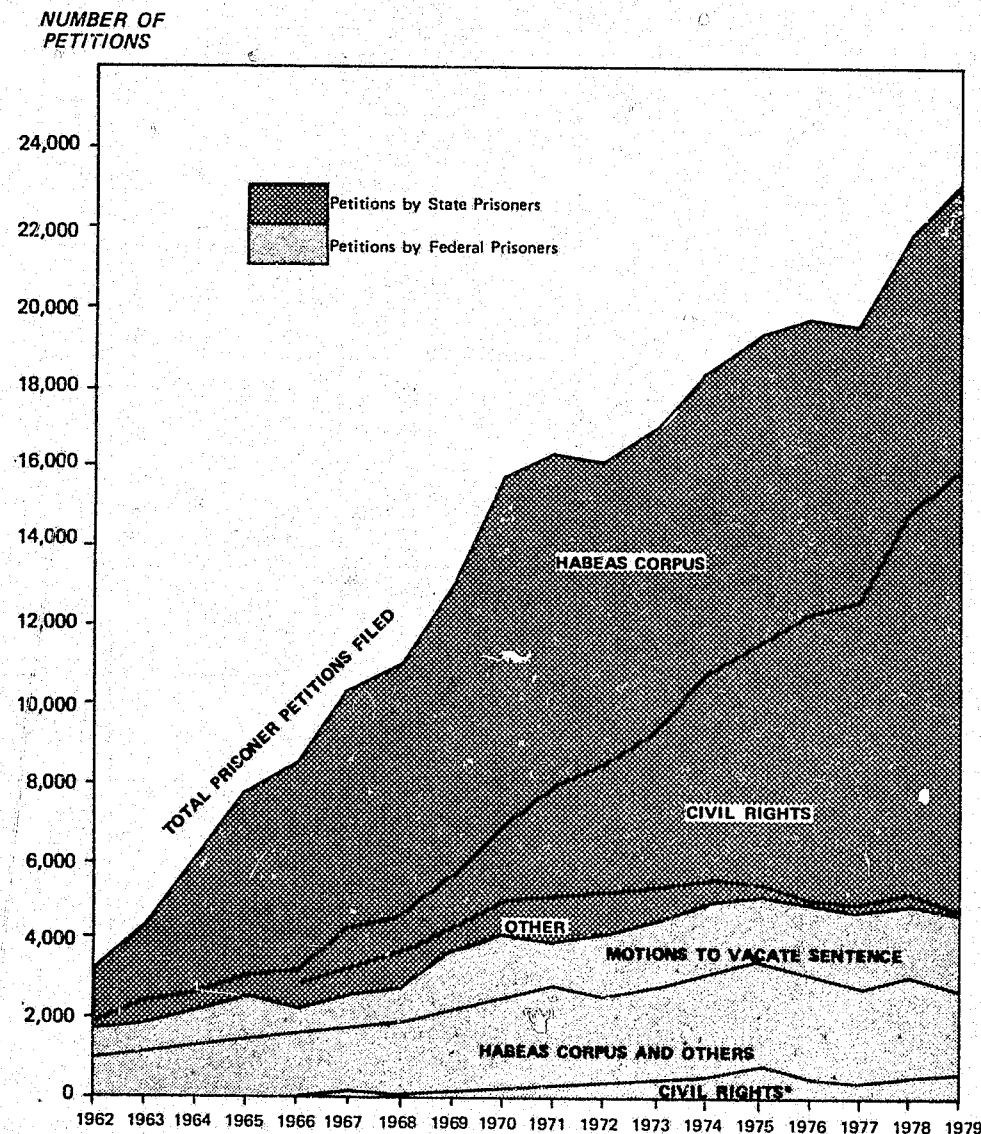

Prisoner petitions accounted for 14.9 percent of the total civil cases filed in the district courts during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. This is down from a high of 18.3 percent in 1970 and represents the lowest level since 1967. Table 22 provides a comparison of prisoner petitions to total civil filings for each of the twelve month periods ended June 30, 1960 - 1979.

Antitrust Cases

During the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, a total of 1,312 antitrust suits were filed in the district courts. This represents a decline of 12.9 percent from the 1978 total and is the lowest number of antitrust filings since 1974. Table 23 provides the number and type of antitrust cases filed for each of the twelve month periods ended June 30, 1960 - 1979.

The number of antitrust cases filed by the federal government increased slightly from 72 in 1978 to 78 in 1979. However, private antitrust filings declined by 14.0 percent to 1,234 case for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979.

Interstate Commerce Commission Cases

For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, a total of 1,294 private cases related to Interstate Commerce Commission regulations were filed in the district courts. This represents a decline of 40.9 percent from the 2,188 cases filed in 1978. This reduction is largely the result of changes in the jurisdiction of the district courts in handling these cases. Section 9 of the Omnibus Judgeship Act of 1978 (Public Law 95-486), approved October 20, 1978, severely restricts the jurisdiction of the district courts in cases dealing with commerce regulations. The impact of this law is clearly seen in the filing figures for Massachusetts, the court having the largest I.C.C. caseload. For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978, a total of 1,316 commerce cases were filed in Massachusetts; for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, the filings dropped to 358, a reduction of 72.8 percent. Table 24 provides an analysis of the case flow of private I.C.C. cases, both in Massachusetts and in the other 94 district courts, for the twelve month periods ended June 30, 1978 and 1979.

Land Condemnation Cases

The number of U.S. plaintiff land condemnation cases filed in the district courts for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 was 5,275 cases. This is a reduction of 23.6 percent from 1978 when the number of cases filed reached 6,906. Table 25 provides a comparison of the U.S. plaintiff land condemnation caseload for the years 1962 - 1979.

The vast majority of the land condemnation cases filed in the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 were filed in Florida, Southern, which recorded 3,682 cases. Table 26 provides an analysis of the case flow of land condemnation cases in both Florida, Southern and the other 94 district courts for the twelve month periods ended June 30, 1978 and 1979.

In addition to Florida, Southern several other districts recorded a significant volume of land condemnation filings: California, Southern (217); Oklahoma, Northern (158); Guam (152); and Missouri, Western (134).

Product Liability

For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, a total of 6,132 cases alleging product liability were filed in the district courts. This represents an increase of 40.3 percent over the 1978 level and 288.3 percent over the number of such cases filed in 1974. Table 27 provides a breakdown of the number and types of product liability cases filed in each of the 95 district courts.

An analysis of the data contained in Table 27 indicates that several districts experienced substantial increases in product liability filings. Increases in Washington, Western and California, Central of 865.0 percent and 386.4 percent, respectively, over the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978 were related to airline personal injury suits. The increase of 407.7 percent in product liability cases filed in the District of Columbia was the direct result of more than 400 suits against the United States related to the swine flu vaccination program.

*Environmental Matters, Economic Stabilization Act
and Energy Allocation Litigation*

For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, filings of cases in the district courts related to environmental matters, the Economic Stabilization Act and energy allocation all increased slightly. Table 28 distributes these filings by district.

Filings involving environmental matters increased slightly, up 7.7 percent. Cases related to the Economic Stabilization Act and energy allocation increased more substantially, rising 25.0 percent and 53.2 percent, respectively. The most extensive increases in the filing of energy allocation and economic stabilization cases were in the districts of Delaware and the District of Columbia. All but one of the 41 economic stabilization and energy allocation cases filed in Delaware and the District of Columbia were suits between the Department of Energy and the major oil companies; nine of the cases were filed by the U. S. and 31 were filed by the oil companies against the Federal government.

Truth In Lending

During the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, there were 2,340 civil cases filed in the district courts alleging fraud, including cases arising under the provisions of the Truth in Lending Act (Federal Question only). This represents an increase of 19.6 percent over the 1,957 such cases filed during 1978; it also exceeds the previous high of 2,237 cases filed in 1975. Table 29 provides a breakdown of the fraud cases filed in each of the district courts for the years 1975-1979.

Almost one-fourth of the cases alleging fraud filed in the district courts during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 were recorded in the Northern District of Georgia. The

542 cases filed in this district represent an increase of 83.7 percent over the 1978 level. The bulk of this increase involved cases filed under the Fair Credit Reporting Act and the Motor Vehicle Information and Cost Saving Act, which includes cases dealing with odometer fraud.

Employment Civil Rights

Civil rights cases filed in the district courts during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 related to employment discrimination declined slightly from 5,504 in 1978 to 5,477 in 1979. Table 30 provides a breakdown of employment civil rights cases filed for each of the years 1973 -1979.

For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, Illinois, Northern had 338 employment civil rights case filings, up slightly from the 295 filed in 1978. The only other district with more than 200 employment civil rights filings was Texas, Southern with 206.

Social Security Act Litigation

Since rising to a high of 10,355 cases in 1976, the number of filings related to the Social Security Act has remained relatively constant. For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, a total of 9,942 social security cases were filed in the district courts, down slightly from the 9,950 filed in 1978. Table 31 provides the number of social security cases filed in each of the district courts for the years 1971 - 1979.

Those districts experiencing the greatest decline in social security filings between 1978 and 1979 were Virginia, Western, West Virginia, Southern and Kentucky, Eastern. These decreases can be attributed to a reduction in the filing of cases related to "black lung" benefits. As indicated in Table 32, these three districts had only 230 black lung filings in 1979 compared to 581 in 1978.

The most substantial increase in social security filings occurred in Michigan, Eastern, where these filings increased from 608 in 1978 to 809 for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. The bulk of the social security filings in this district were related to disability insurance benefits, representing 679 of the 809 filings in 1979.

Table 33 provides a breakdown by district of the number of cases filed for each type of social security case. Claims for disability insurance benefits represent the largest

percentage of social security filings, accounting for 57.4 percent of the 9,942 cases filed. The smallest portion is represented by cases related to Medicare benefits, which accounted for only 2.5 percent of the total cases filed.

Class Action Litigation

Class action cases filed in the district courts pursuant to Rule 23, Federal Rules of Civil Procedure continued to decline with only 2,084 cases filed during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, a decline of 19.4 percent from 1978 and 41.9 percent from the high of 3,548 cases in 1976. As indicated in Table 33, class actions as a proportion of total civil filings also dropped, from 1.9 percent in 1978 to 1.3 percent in 1979.

The number of class action allegations filed by prisoners remained essentially the same for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 as in the previous year. In 1978 there were 174 such filings and in 1979 there were 172. Nevertheless, as of June 30, 1979, the number of prisoner petition class action cases pending in the district courts declined to 400, the lowest since 1973.

As shown in Table 36, the only district which recorded more than 100 class action filings during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 was Illinois, Northern with 136. As of June 30, 1979, four districts had more than 200 class action cases pending: Texas, Southern (369); Illinois, Northern (301); New York, Southern (246) and California, Northern (220).

Civil Terminations

During the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, a total of 143,323 civil cases were closed by the district courts, an increase of 13.8 percent over the same period last year. Statistics of these terminations by district, type of litigation and method of disposition are contained in appendix tables C4, C4A, C5, C5A and C5B.

Seventy-one districts showed increases in the number of civil cases terminated. Massachusetts recorded the highest increase in civil cases closed, an increase of 98.2 percent. For this district the increase in terminations results from a marked increase in the number of I.C.C. cases closed, from 1,006 in 1978 to 3,015 in 1979. This large increase reflects a concerted effort on the part of the district to terminate much of its pending I.C.C. caseload.

Other districts experiencing increases in terminations of more than 50 percent were Utah (69.9 percent), Arkansas, Eastern (51.9 percent) and Georgia, Southern (51.4 percent).

In Utah, the increase was attributed to the closing of litigation involving recovery of overpayments and enforcement of judgments and to increases in closings of securities, commodities and exchange cases. In Arkansas, Eastern and Georgia, Southern, the largest increases in terminations were cases related to recovery of overpayments and enforcement of judgments and to prisoner petitions involving civil rights allegations.

The number of civil cases terminated (land condemnation cases excluded) for each of the years 1969 - 1979 are provided in Table 37. This table also provides an examination of these terminations by type of disposition. During the year ended June 30, 1979, 43.0 percent of these cases were terminated with no court action. This represents a significant increase over the 36.8 percent closed with no court action in 1978. The proportion of cases terminated with court action thus made a corresponding drop from 63.2 percent in 1978 to 57.0 percent in 1979. This change is largely due to the increase in terminations of cases filed by the U.S. for recovery of overpayments and enforcement of judgments. In 1979, a total of 4,664 of these cases were terminated with no court action compared to only 744 in 1978. Another factor contributing to this decline is the increase in the number of federal question I.C.C. cases which were closed with no court action. In 1979, there were 3,463 such cases closed, which is an increase of 147.7 percent over 1978 when only 1,398 were terminated with no court action.

The percentage of cases terminated during or after trial has been declining steadily over the last ten years. For the year ended June 30, 1979, only 6.9 percent of the cases terminated reached trial, compared to 7.6 percent in 1978 and 10.8 percent in 1969.

Terminations By Nature of Suit

The overall increase in civil cases terminated (land condemnation cases excluded) was highlighted by significant increases in several case types. As mentioned above, case terminations for recovery of overpayments and enforcement of judgments increased from 1,115 in 1978 to 5,569 for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. Other types of civil case terminations which increased substantially include: Federal question I.C.C. cases (up 147.7 percent); federal question real property suits (up 110.8 percent); U.S. tax suits (up 35.4 percent); U.S. contract actions other than recovery

of overpayments and enforcement of judgments (up 32.7 percent); and state prisoner civil rights petitions (up 16.0 percent).

Median Time To Dispose Of Civil Cases

Appendix tables C5, C5A and C5B provide detailed examinations of the median time (in months) from filing to disposition for civil cases disposed of in the district courts during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. The median time required to dispose of civil cases declined by one month from 10 months in 1978 to 9 months in 1979. The most significant improvement was experienced by Rhode Island, which reduced its overall median time from 21 months in 1978 to 12 in 1979; this was primarily the result of a reduction in the time interval for cases going to trial, which dropped from 33 months to 23 in 1979.

The district with the lowest median time for disposing of civil cases during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 was the Northern Mariana Islands with 3 months; 5 districts has median times of 4 months. The highest median time was in Massachusetts with 31 months.

Appendix tables C5A and C5B provide a distribution of median times by type of suit. The lowest median time during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979 was one month recorded for state prisoner mandamus petitions; all other federal and state prisoner petitions had median times of 3 or 4 months. U.S. cases related to recovery of overpayments and enforcement of judgments also recorded a very low median time of only 2 months. Exclusive of local jurisdiction cases, the highest median time was recorded for U.S. antitrust cases with a median of 25 months.

Pending Civil Caseload

As of June 30, 1979, there were 177,805 civil cases pending in the district courts, an increase of 6.8 percent over the 166,462 cases pending on June 30, 1978. Appendix tables C3A, C6A, and C6B provide statistics on the number, type and age of civil cases pending in the district courts. The largest numeric increase in pending caseload was experienced in Florida, Southern, where the number of civil cases pending as of June 30, 1979 was 10,194, an increase of 27.0 percent over the 8,028 cases pending on June 30, 1978. This is the result of an increase of 1,791 in the number of pending land condemnation cases. Despite the overall increase in the pending caseload, 15 districts were able to reduce the number of pending civil cases, led by Massachusetts with a reduction of the court's pending caseload 17.9 percent over the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978.

Table 38 provides a comparison of the number and type of civil cases pending for each of the years 1970 - 1979. For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, the most significant increase is in U.S. contract actions, which increased from 3,763 cases pending in 1978 to 8,276 in 1979. This increase is largely the result of the influx of cases related to recovery of overpayments and enforcement of judgments. The most dramatic increase in U.S. contract actions was in Michigan, Eastern, where the number of such cases increased from 56 in 1978 to 779 in 1979. The most substantial decline in pending cases was recorded for interstate commerce cases, which dropped 26.8 percent from 9,635 in 1978 to 7,050 in 1979. The bulk of this decline was in Massachusetts where, due to a concerted effort by the district, the number of pending I.C.C. cases dropped from 8,828 to 6,144 in 1979.

Civil Cases Pending Three Years or More

Table 39 provides a comparison of pending civil cases (land condemnation cases excluded), by age of case, for each of the years 1961 - 1979. During the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, the number of civil cases pending three years or more reached an all-time high of 19,089, an increase of 18.9 percent over 1978. A significant increase was also experienced in cases pending less than one year; these cases increased 9.9 percent to 93,411 cases, also an all time high.

The 19,089 civil cases pending three years or more represents 11.5 percent of the 166,668 civil cases pending in the district courts (land condemnation cases excluded) as of June

30, 1979. Table 40 provides a comparison of the number and percent of civil cases pending three years or more in each of the 95 district courts.

The largest increases between 1978 and 1979 in the number of civil cases pending three years or more were experienced in Massachusetts (up from 4,426 to 5,314) and Kentucky, Eastern (up from 400 to 1,065). The three districts having the largest percentage of their pending caseload more than three years old include Massachusetts (45.5 percent), Kentucky, Eastern (29.0 percent) and West Virginia, Southern (24.6 percent).

For the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, there were 22 districts with 200 or more civil cases pending three years or more (land condemnation cases excluded). This compares to 19 districts for the same period last year. Two districts with more than 200 three year old civil cases in 1978 were able to considerably reduce these cases in 1979: Pennsylvania, Western declined from 220 to 146 and New York, Western from 220 to 156.

Table 42 provides a distribution by type of case, of all civil cases pending three years or more as of June 30, 1979 (land condemnation cases excluded). The most significant increases in these cases between 1978 and 1979 were in actions under statutes, which increased 23.2 percent from 10,777 to 13,272. Substantial increases were recorded in the older antitrust, employment civil rights, and I.C.C. cases.

Transfer of Cases Under 28 U.S.C. 1407

During the twelve months ending June 30, 1979, the Judicial Panel on Multidistrict Litigation transferred 936 civil actions which were originally filed in 87 different district courts to 20 transferee district courts for inclusion in coordinated or consolidated pretrial proceedings with 282 actions already pending in the transferee districts. In 1978, 696 civil cases were transferred from 81 different district courts to 28 transferee districts for the purpose of coordinated or consolidated pretrial proceedings with 252 actions already pending in the transferee districts.

The district judges to whom actions have been assigned by the Panel have the responsibility of conducting coordinated or consolidated pretrial proceedings in those actions. Unless an action is closed in the transferee court or ordered transferred by the transferee judge to the transferee court or other district under 28 U.S.C. 1404(a) or 28 U.S.C. 1406, each of the transferred actions will, at the conclusion of the coordinated or consolidated pretrial proceedings, be remanded by the Panel for trial and any other appropriate proceedings to the district from which the action was transferred by the Panel.

Since the enactment of the Multidistrict Litigation Act, approved April 29, 1968 (Public Law 90-296), which established 28 U.S.C. 1407 and the Panel, multidistrict dockets have included 4,706 transfers of civil actions and an additional 3,032 civil actions originally filed in the district receiving the transfers. Thus 7,738 cases have been a part of Section 1407 pretrial proceedings in the 59 different transferee district courts from 1968 through June 30, 1979. To date, 4,564 actions have been terminated by the transferee courts or reassigned to transferor judges within the transferee courts and 421 actions have been remanded by the Panel.

A look at the caseload in the transferee districts as of June 30, 1979, reveals that the 2,753 pending actions are distributed throughout 158 dockets. To date, 2,035 actions in those dockets have been terminated by the transferee courts or remanded by the Panel, as have 2,901 actions in 101 other

dockets that have resulted in transfers under Section 1407 and have been completely closed. In addition, 1,003 actions in 126 groups of multidistrict litigation have been docketed by the Panel but have not been centralized under 28 U.S.C. 1407.

The accompanying tables provide statistics on the number of cases transferred since the Panel was created, and the flow of cases into and out of individual districts for the twelve month period ending June 30, 1979, and cumulatively for the entire period since 1968. Information on specific cases transferred can be obtained by writing the Judicial Panel on Multidistrict Litigation.

Criminal Workload In the U.S. District Courts

The Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts continues to offer statistical data that reflect the work of the United States district courts and is constantly seeking improved methods of presenting the data. The most current improvement in the detailed statistical tables had its origin under the auspices of the Subcommittee on Judicial Statistics of the Judicial Conference. The statistics appearing in the "D" series of the appendix tables now show separately all four levels of offenses, unlike the "D" series tables for 1976 and 1977 which showed only two categories: "all cases" and "felony-misdemeanor" combined.

First time readers will find that the workload is identified by major offense categories and by offense level. Statistics on criminal cases and defendants appear in the Appendix Tables D-1 through D-10. The July 1, 1978 pending figure of 15,878 is 31 cases higher than the June 30, 1978 figure published last year due to minor adjustments in the criminal data base.

Appendix Table D-1 Cases and Defendants, in addition to showing filings by offense level, also shows statistics on cases and defendants terminated and pending for the 95 districts. Table D-2 provides nationwide filings statistics on the nature of the proceeding which commenced the case, the nature of the major offense charged, and the level of offenses. Table D-3 includes cases and defendants commenced within district for all levels of offenses combined and by "felony" only level.

The D-4 table details the disposition of defendants by nature of offense for all levels combined and by "felony" level only. Table D-5 gives sentence data on defendants convicted by nature of offense for all levels combined and for "felony" level only. Table D-7, a composite presentation of the D-4

and D-5 statistics, shows the type of disposition for all defendants and felony defendants terminated in each district.

D-8 through D-10 tables reflect statistics on pending cases and defendants. Table D-8 provides pending statistics for all cases and for felony cases only by major offense within district. Table D-9 provides a breakdown by district of all cases and defendants considered triable and non-triable on June 30, 1979.

In order to understand the offense levels that appear in the "D" Tables and in the text where they are specifically referred to as felony, other misdemeanor, minor, and petty, the operational definition for each level that the courts began to furnish beginning October 1, 1975 is set out below:

- *Felony* - a criminal offense punishable by imprisonment for a term exceeding one year. (18 U.S.C. §1)
- *Other misdemeanor* - any criminal offense where conviction could result in no more than one year's imprisonment and/or a fine greater than \$1,000, or any offense specifically excepted under 18 U.S.C. §3401(f)
- *Other minor offense* - any misdemeanor, other than a petty offense, for which the penalty does not exceed one year's imprisonment or a fine of not more than \$1,000, or both. (18 U.S.C. §3401)
- *Petty offense* - any misdemeanor for which the penalty does not exceed 6 months imprisonment or a fine of not more than \$500, or both. (18 U.S.C. §1)

Criminal Workload

During the year ended June 30, 1979, the criminal workload continued its downward trend. This year, case filings (excluding transfers) dropped to 31,536, a 8.9 percent fall compared to the 1978 total of 34,624 and 21.2 percent below the 1977 figure of 40,000. Compared to 1978, both felony and misdemeanor prosecutions dropped (16.6 percent) whereas minor and petty offenses increased (15.8 percent).

The 32,181 criminal cases terminated (excluding transfers) was a decline of 3,711 cases or 10.3 percent compared to last year's 35,892. When the 1979 total is compared to the 42,524 cases terminated during the twelve months ended June 30, 1977, the drop is even greater at 10,343 cases or 24.3 percent.

Cases pending as of June 30, 1979 declined by 723 cases or 4.6 percent fewer than the 15,847 cases pending on June 30, 1978.

Case Flow by Offense Level

Filings of the felony level cases (excluding transfers) continue to comprise the greatest percentage (62.6 percent) of the filing workload. The 20,755 felony cases filed this year is, however, substantially lower by 4,445 cases or 17.6 percent than last year. This drop in felony prosecutions continues the decline begun last year when such cases dropped by 11.6 percent from 28,504 in 1977 to 25,200 in 1978.

Other misdemeanor filings (1,250) increased modestly during the year by 56 cases or 4.7 percent compared to the previous year, but decreased by a significant 1,731 cases compared to 1977.

The table below sets out the case flow by offense level for all offenses reported (exclusive of transfers) during the three years ended June 30, 1977 - 1979.

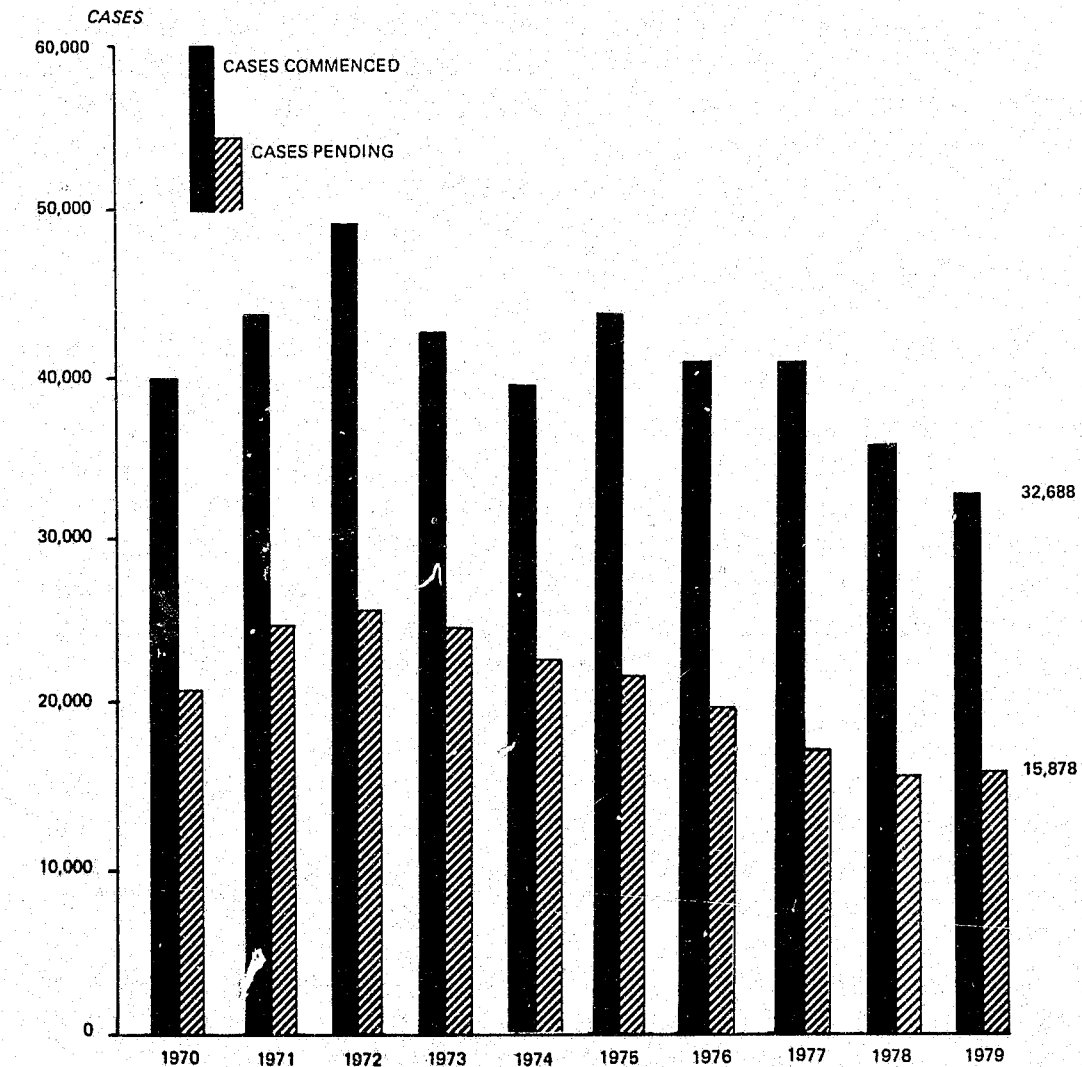
Offense Classification

Criminal cases are classified by the Administrative Office on the basis of the offense which carries the highest possible penalty at conviction. If several offenses are involved and they carry the same penalty, the crime against person would take priority over the crime against property. All attempts (except attempted homicide, which is classified as assault), are classified as substantive offenses, as are all conspiracies, aiding and abetting, and accessory crimes. The statistics shown in Appendix Table D-2 and D-3 were developed in this manner.

Criminal Filings Decline in Major Offense Groups

Overall criminal filings (exclusive of transfers) dropped 8.9 percent this year compared to last year. Most offense groups experienced declines, but weapons and firearms under the miscellaneous offense category, and liquor violations under the internal revenue laws led the groups with decreases of 1,867 cases or 60.7 percent and 59 cases or 59.0 percent, respectively. Other groups that experienced substantial decreases during the year were: auto theft with a drop of 411 cases or 50.7 percent; forgery and counterfeiting, down 24.7 percent or 941 cases; robbery, embezzlement, larceny and theft with drops of 228 (16.6 percent), 319 (16.4 percent), and 575 (14.4 percent), respectively.

Some offenses that experienced a decline in prosecutions can be attributed in part to guidelines established by the Department of Justice and federal authorities. For instance, auto theft violators that are the under twenty-one joyrider variety are turned over to the state or local authorities for prosecution. Also, other offenses like narcotics violations and larceny and theft that are committed by persons under twenty-one are diverted to the local or state authorities. Twenty-eight such defendants in 1979 were tried as juveniles under the Federal Juvenile Delinquency Act.

The steady decline noted in weapons and firearms violations represents the Treasury Department's policy of prosecuting convicted felons but turning over first time offenders to state and local authorities for prosecution.

Further, the implementation of the Speedy Trial Act of 1974 has had the effect of reducing the filing of new cases by excluding superseding indictments and informations unless the original indictment was dismissed pursuant to the defendant's request. Although all offenses are affected by this procedure, narcotics violations are mostly affected. (Table 46 presents a two year picture of criminal cases filed by nature of offense.)

Filings By District

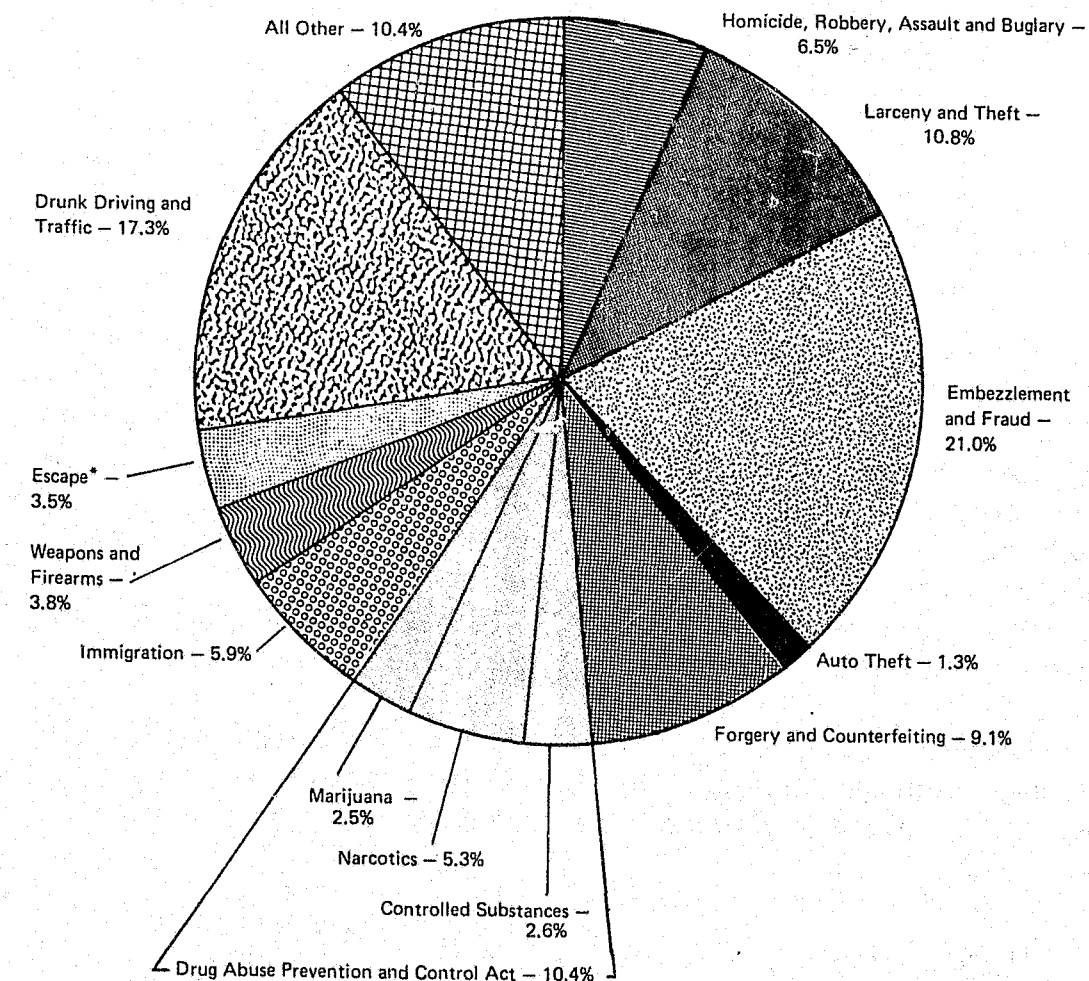
Criminal case filings (excluding 1,152 transfers under Rule 20 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure) declined 3,088 cases or 8.9 percent during the twelve months ended June 30, 1979 compared to a year ago. This drop is moderately lower than the 13.4 percent drop seen during the previous year.

Filings under weapons and firearms statutes dropped significantly in Louisiana, Middle (from 14 in 1978 to 0 in 1979) and Mississippi, Southern (from 33 in 1978 to 4 in 1979). Of the districts that experienced decreases in filings during the previous year, Michigan, Eastern and South Dakota recorded declines in larceny offenses of 46.6 percent and 22.6 percent, respectively. Declines during 1979 were recorded in larceny offenses for Louisiana, Middle, Florida, Middle and Illinois, Central.

Despite the national decline, ten districts during the twelve months ended June 30, 1979 reported gains of 27 percent or more in filings, down from 12 districts last year.

Contributing to New York, Western's increase in filings were larceny cases which rose to 120 compared to 109 a year ago, and fraud filings which rose to 75 compared to 43 a year ago. In Iowa, Southern the increase in fraud filings alone, from 25 in 1978 to 143 in 1979, accounted for the impressive rise in case filings.

During the twelve months ended June 30, 1979, Georgia, Southern reversed its down turn of 70.1 percent in filings last year to a rise of 86.7 percent this year. The 79.5 percent drop in minor traffic offenses during 1978 contributed to the overall decline for that year whereas the 206.8 percent rise in minor traffic offenses in 1979 accounted for the overall filing increase this year.

The majority of the cases pending in Hawaii (570 or 84.6 percent) and Colorado (295 or 68.3 percent) were minor offenses filed within the last six months.

Proceedings By Indictment Decline

The implementation of the Speedy Trial Act of 1974 effectively reduced the number of defendants reported as "new cases" by the use of superseding indictments and informations. Pursuant to Section 3161(h)(6) of the Speedy Trial Act, the clerks of court are instructed not to open new criminal dockets when the original indictment and or information is dismissed on motion of the government's attorney. This change in instruction resulted in a drop in indictment/informations filed as follows: 1977 - 3,106; 1978 - 2,310; and 1979 - 3,520. Stated differently, had these superseding indictments and informations been counted, the overall count of filings in 1977 would have risen to 43,106, in 1978 to 36,934, and in 1979 to 35,056. Cases commenced by indictment during the twelve months ended June 30, 1979 continue to comprise the greatest portion (59.4 percent) of the filing workload but represent a smaller percentage than in 1978 (65.5 percent), and 1977 (62.5 percent).

Pending Criminal Cases by Offense

The year-end pending reached a new eleven year low of 15,124 cases, a drop of 723 or 4.6 percent compared to June 30, 1978. Only one offense, burglary, remained the same as last year with 61 cases pending while six offenses increased in a range of 14 to 380 cases and 12 groups decreased in a range of 3 to 589 cases. (See Appendix Table D-8.) Drug law violations under the DAPCA law of 1970 were up slightly (2.4 percent) this reporting year. At the close of last year they represented the largest numerical drop (353) in pending cases.

Larceny and theft cases continued their downward swing with 1,038 such cases pending at the close of this year, 11.0 percent fewer than the 1,166 cases pending one year ago.

Weapons and firearms (1,212) and forgery and counterfeiting (1,562) also experienced a decline in cases pending with 589 and 317 fewer respective cases than the previous year. Robbery offenses showed 97 fewer cases pending compared to last year.

Pending embezzlement cases which rose in 1978 by 11.6 percent, dropped sharply this year by 17.9 percent. Immigration cases, mostly illegal re-entry, after an increase between 1977 and 1978 of 24.1 percent, rose moderately by 10.9 percent in 1979.

Pending by District

Not all districts shared in the overall decline of 4.6 percent in the pending caseload. Sixty-nine of the 95 districts were able to reduce their pending caseload. Twenty-eight districts lowered their pending caseload by over 20 percent this year, 6 more than last year's twenty-two districts. Declines in the pending caseload of more than 20 percent were recorded in the following districts:

Six districts from last year's list continued to make strides in reducing their pending caseload with more than a 20 percent drop. They were: Georgia, Southern; South Dakota; Alaska; Delaware; Alabama, Southern; and Michigan, Eastern.

Of the twenty-six districts that experienced increases, nine districts, as shown below, reported gains of more than 20 percent in their pending cases. The rise in pending cases in the districts of Hawaii and Colorado can be attributed to the substantial increase in minor offenses. These cases rose from 204 to 570 in Hawaii and from 9 to 295 in Colorado.

Status of Pending Criminal Cases on June 30, 1979

The Speedy Trial Act of 1974 began to impact in October, 1975 on the cases pending on the criminal dockets. Previous to that time defendants were classified as triable (available for final plea), tried, or non-triable. The non-triable defendants included fugitives, persons mentally incompetent to stand trial and others, including those for whom the U.S. Attorney had requested dismissals from the Department of Justice.

Now the emphasis has shifted to two categories: triable and non-triable. If a defendant is not a fugitive or is not classified in one of the existing excludable categories pursuant to the Speedy Trial Act of 1974, the defendant is considered triable. (See Tables 51 and 53.)

Cases with triable defendants on June 30, 1979 numbered 4,351, down 25.0 percent compared to last year when 5,800 such cases were pending.

Districts With More Than 500 Criminal Cases Pending

The number of districts with 500 or more criminal cases pending this year rose by one over the eight districts as of June 30, 1978. In 1978 eight districts accounted for 39.0 percent of the total pending caseload. In 1979 nine districts accounted for 44.4 percent of the pending caseload.

The nine districts, at the close of this year, were responsible for 29.7 percent of all triable cases and 50.3 percent of the non-triable cases; these figures represent a 3.6 percent and 3.8 percent rise in 1979 compared to 1978.

Status of Pending Criminal Defendants

The number of criminal defendants pending in criminal cases on June 30, 1979 is below last year's count of 22,484 by 1,067 or 4.8 percent. The majority (10,279 or 48.0 percent) of the defendants pending this year was filed within the last six months. A substantial number (6,971) of these defendants were available for final plea or were triable but whose cases still remained to be disposed of at the close of the year.

Defendants classified in the non-triable status accounted for more than half (67.5 percent) of all defendants pending, which is greater than last year's percentage of 59.1. The non-triable status also include defendants who were tried but have not been sentenced because they are under observation and study.

The 8,986 fugitive defendants in pending cases on June 30, 1979 represented 42 percent of all defendants in cases pending at that time. This total of fugitive defendants was greater than in either of the two preceding years.

Disposition of Criminal Cases and Defendants

In order to assist new readers in their analysis of the data published in the Appendix D-4, D-5, and D-7 (non-duplicate defendant) termination tables, a synopsis of a fuller discussion which appeared in the 1978 Annual Report is included.

In the statistical accounting used in the defendant termination tables, a defendant is counted as one individual (non-duplicate) irrespective of the number of indictments that may be filed in the same 12-month period in separately docketed cases (in which charges of single or multiple offenses are made). Thus, in counting defendants, it's imperative to count each defendant's disposition only once. The offense is always the most serious offense at the time the case was disposed of whether it ended in dismissal or conviction.

Where a conviction was obtained and was based on multiple offenses, the offense that carried the most severe penalty is considered the offense at time of disposition. The penalty is classified with a severity code used by the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts. The severity classification accounts for the nature of the crime. Thus, a crime against a person is classified as more serious than a crime against property, while a crime of a moral turpitude nature is second to both.

Duplicate defendants (charged more than once in separately docketed cases) are represented by the single offense that is the most serious. Thus, where the dispositions are mixed (include dismissals and convictions), the most severe offense at time of conviction takes precedence. To do otherwise would result in the dismissal nullifying the conviction outcome. There can be two or more dispositions vying for the most serious offense position. When that occurs, the selection

criteria is further based on the disposition by court or jury trial rather than by plea. If this does not end the selection process, the longer time interval from filing to disposition is favored.

Disposition of Criminal Cases

This year there were 33,442 cases terminated involving 44,567 defendants. The disposition rate was 68.9 percent, a slight decrease compared to the 70.2 percent disposition rate of June 30, 1978. The disposition rate is calculated by combining all cases with defendants filed and pending and then dividing by all cases with defendants disposed of, including disposition by Rule 20, pretrial diversion, nolle prosequi, and dismissal. (See the Appendix Table D-1 for the criminal case and defendant activity flow by district.)

Defendants Disposed of by Offense

At the close of this reporting year, 41,175 defendants were terminated in the 95 United States district courts. Of 41,175, a total of 6,791 were dismissals, 1,001 lower than last year's 7,792. The majority (80 percent or 32,913) of the prosecutions resulted in conviction and sentence; down by 9.8 percent compared to 36,505 last year.

A part of the reduction in the prosecutions discussed earlier resulted from diverting certain offenses like weapons

and firearms and auto theft to state and local authorities pursuant to policies of the federal authorities. For those offenses that were prosecuted in the district courts, the majority were disposed of by plea of guilty or nolo contendere. During the year, 1,255 or 62.5 percent of those charged with firearms violations was disposed of in this manner; the number was 514 or 69.4 percent for auto theft violations. For narcotics drug law violations there were 6,609 defendants terminated with over half (3,662) convicted by plea of guilty or nolo contendere. (Table 54 provides a 10 year span of the narcotic drug law case flow.)

Of the 32,913 convicted defendants terminated during the twelve months ended June 30, 1979, 14,580 were sentenced to prison terms. This number represents a 16.3 percent drop compared to the 17,426 so sentenced last year. Most of the imprisonment terms were imposed under provisions of regular sentencing statutes (9,818), include 172 juveniles under the Federal Juvenile Delinquency Act, with the remaining under special sentencing statutes (4,762). The average sentence for the 9,818 imprisoned under the regular sentencing statutes was 49.0 months. The average supervision term for the 13,459 placed under supervision of the Federal Probation Service was 32.3 months which is about the same as last year (32.4 percent) when 14,515 received probation terms.

Disposition by Circuit

Analysis of the D-7 table shows that nationwide a total of 3,234 split sentences, 887 indeterminate sentences, and 641 Youth Correction Act sentences were imposed, representing respective decreases of 0.9 percent, 21.6 percent, and 19.6 percent over the previous year. Of the 41,175 defendants disposed of from July 1, 1978 to June 30, 1979, the majority were closed in the Fifth (10,291 or 25.0 percent) and Ninth (8,279 or 20.1 percent) circuits. These two circuits had the largest number of defendants sentenced to imprisonment terms of sixty months and over, 693 and 574, respectively.

The Fifth and Ninth circuits imposed the largest number of sentences under these special statutes with two districts, Texas, Southern (188) and California, Central (167), which led in these circuits with "split sentences". On a national basis, more split sentences were imposed for fraud violations (718), DAPCA Drug law violations (454), larceny and theft (410), and forgery and counterfeiting (359) convictions than any other offense. (See Table 58 which shows regular splits and DAPCA Drug Law splits separately for the years June 30, 1972 through June 30, 1979.)

TRIALS

Trials Completed

During the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, a total of 18,563 trials were completed in the district courts. For the purposes of this report, a trial is defined as "any contested proceeding before either a court or jury in which evidence is introduced." The 18,563 trials completed in 1979 represents a decline of 1.5 percent from 1978 and is the lowest since 1971. Table 59 provides statistics on the number and type of trials completed in the district courts during the twelve month periods ended June 30, 1962 - 1979.

Of the 18,563 trials completed, 11,764 (63.3 percent) were civil trials, an all-time high; this compares to 61.1 percent for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1978. Nonjury trials comprised 61.8 percent of the trials completed in 1979 compared to 61.9 percent in 1978. Civil nonjury trials experienced the greatest drop, declining 8.1 percent from the 1978 level; the 3,667 criminal jury trials completed in 1979 was the lowest since 1967. Appendix Table C-7 provides detailed statistics on the numbers of civil and criminal trials completed in each of the 95 district courts for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979.

Length of Trials

While the number of trials completed in the district courts during 1979 declined slightly, the length of these trials increased. The reduction in overall trials completed was highlighted by a 5.3 percent reduction in the number of trials lasting one day, from 9,358 in 1978 to 8,863 for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. The 8,863 one day trials is a new low for the period from 1972 - 1979. This decline was somewhat compensated for by increases in the number of lengthy trials, especially those lasting from 10 to 19 days.

During 1979, there were 384 trials lasting between 10 and 19 days, an increase of 11.6 percent over the 344 such trials completed in 1978. In addition to one day trials, the only other category experiencing a decline was trials lasting 20 days or more, which dropped slightly from 114 in 1978 to 111 in 1979. This increase in the overall length of trials completed is reflected in the fact that during 1979, 18.8 percent of the trials lasted 4 days or more compared to only 17.7 percent in 1978.

The increase in the length of overall trials is also reflected in jury trials. Jury trials lasting only one day declined to 1,066 in 1979, a drop of 11.8 percent from 1978 and 58.4 percent from the number of one day trials completed in 1973. The greatest increases in jury trials were experienced in trials of 4 to 9 days and those 20 days or more, both of which increased 5.0 percent in 1979. The percent of jury trials lasting 4 days or more increased from 33.9 percent in 1978 to 35.9 percent in 1979. This continues a steady rise in this figure from 1972.

Appendix Table C-8 provides data on the type and length of civil and criminal trials completed in the district courts

during the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. The largest portion of civil nonjury trials lasting 4 days or more were civil rights trials, which accounted for 28.5 percent of the 799 such trials completed. Trials related to personal injury suits represented 558 (46.2 percent) of the 1,208 civil jury trials completed in 1979 which lasted 4 days or more. The largest number of criminal nonjury trials lasting four days or more in 1979 were cases related to drug law violations (30.2 percent) and fraud cases (28.6 percent). Similarly, the largest numbers of criminal jury trials lasting 4 days or more were also related to drug law violations (25.0 percent) and fraud cases (25.0 percent).

Median Time From Issue to Trial

The median time from issue to trial in civil cases where trials are completed has increased steadily since 1976 after remaining constant for the period 1971 - 1976. (Issue is defined as the date when the answer or last response is filed.)

During the period ended June 30, 1979, the median time from issue to trial continued to rise, increasing to 14 months which is an all time high. The median time for nonjury trials also increased to an all time high of 14 months, up from 13 months in 1978. The highest median time is indicated for jury trials which rose to 15 months for the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979. This matches the previous high time interval attained in 1967, 1968, and 1969.

Appendix Table C-10 provides detailed statistics on the median time from issue to trial for each of the 95 district courts. The highest overall median time was recorded in Massachusetts with 39 months. The lowest median time was 4 months in the Middle District of Alabama. The district with the lowest median time from issue to trial for nonjury trials was Pennsylvania, Middle with a median of 3 months. Virginia, Eastern recorded the lowest median time in jury trials of 5 months.

THREE-JUDGE COURT HEARINGS

The volume of three-judge court hearings plummeted 55.2 percent to a total of 30 during the year ended June 30, 1979. The number of three-judge court hearings had started to fall after the 1973 high of 320 hearings, but the major decline in such hearings in the last three years was due to legislation which reduced the requirements for three-judge courts under Title 28.

Section 2284 of Title 28 provides that a district court of three judges shall be convened when:

1. Required by special statute elsewhere in the law. Such statutes include three-judge court provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the Civil Rights Act of 1964.
2. An action is filed challenging the constitutionality of the apportionment of Congressional districts.
3. An action challenging the constitutionality of the apportionment of any statewide legislative body is filed.

Of the 30 three-judge hearings reported in 1979, 15 were classified as involving voting rights, 3 dealt with taxation, another 3 were hearings on the constitutionality of state statutes, a further 3 were held on reapportionment, while the

remaining 6 were matters involving alleged violation of civil rights.

JUROR UTILIZATION

A comprehensive picture of the jury operations in the federal courts follows with grand and petit juror usage statis-

tics. These statistics, presented in Appendix tables J-1, 2, and 3, are compiled from information reported on the JS-11G and JS-11 monthly forms submitted by the 95 district courts during the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979. National totals for prior years are included in text tables to provide a means of identifying trends in juror usage.

Detailed information on payments to jurors will appear in the 1979 Juror Utilization Report which will be available in the fall.

Grand Jury

Grand jury activity increased markedly in the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979. As shown in Table 64, the total number of grand jury sessions convened increased 9.7 percent from 8,929 sessions in 1978 to 9,791 sessions in 1979. Nationally, the number of jurors in session climbed to 194,168 in 1979 - a 10.0 percent increase over the 1978 figure. Hours in session also rose substantially to a record 50,896. This increased activity can be traced to a growing use of special grand juries.¹

In 1979, there was an increase of 15 grand juries in existence over the 659 reported in 1978. Twelve of the 15 were special grand juries. The number of special grand juries in existence, thus, increased 13.5 percent from 89 in 1978 to 101 in 1979. In large judicial districts, regular² grand juries, as a rule, meet to investigate isolated instances of criminal activity, while a special grand jury will be impaneled to study the overall picture of criminal activity in the district. The role of the special grand jury has historically been that of an advisory body and it has had greater discretion than the regular grand jury in investigating crime. At the end of its term of service a special grand jury may submit a report concerning the misconduct of public officials or organized crime conditions in the district.³

¹ A special grand jury is impaneled pursuant to the authority of 18 U.S.C., Section 3331(a) and may be extended by court order beyond the original 18-month term up to 36 months.

² Regular grand juries have a natural life of 18 months but may be discharged by court order at anytime during the 18-month period, Rule 6(g), Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure.

³ 18 U.S.C., Section 3333.

The statistics which are collected on grand juries show that special grand juries meet more frequently and for longer hours than regular grand juries. Each special grand jury met an average of 110.8 hours per year in 1979, up from 84.9 hours in 1978. In comparison, each regular grand jury met an average of 68.7 hours in 1978 and 69.3 hours in 1979. Moreover, in 1979 special grand juries averaged 23.6 sessions per year (19.0 in 1978) compared to 12.9 sessions (12.7 in 1978) for each regular grand jury in existence at some time during the year.

Nationwide, 363 grand juries were in existence on July 1, 1978. During the current year 311 grand juries were impaneled and 287 were discharged, resulting in a total of 387 grand juries in existence on June 30, 1979. Overall, 674 grand juries were reported in existence at some time during the 12-month period. The number of grand juries in existence varies considerably among the districts due to such factors as amount and type of criminal activity and the number of places of holding court. The Eastern District of New York recorded 48 grand juries in existence in 1979. In contrast, only one grand jury served in six of the 92 districts⁴ reporting grand jury activity in the 12-month period.

Twenty-four districts reported a total of 101 special grand juries in existence during the 12-month period. The distribution of these ranged from thirteen districts reporting one impaneled special grand jury to the Southern District of New York, Central District of California and Eastern District of New York with 17, 19, and 22, respectively, in 1979.

The Southern District of New York reported the greatest number of grand jury sessions convened (979), the largest number of grand jurors in session (19,738), and the highest number of hours in session (4,329). Montana presents a contrasting picture of grand jury activity with 7 sessions involving 143 grand jurors for a total of 45 hours. Forty-five of the 92 districts reporting grand jury activity conducted 50 or more sessions during the 12-month period - an average of approximately one session per week.

Grand jurors are included in the category of "Jurors in Session" only when they participate in a convened session.⁵ Jurors in travel status, prospective jurors reporting only for impanelment, or jurors waiting for a quorum are not included in this category. Nationally, there were 19.8 jurors per grand jury session and 5.20 hours per session. The average number of grand jurors per session ranged from a low of 18.1 in Oregon to 22.5 in the Western District of Arkansas. A higher average number of hours per session is one indication of more efficient use of grand jurors' time. Twelve districts averaged 7 hours or more per session in 1979. The Western District of Washington recorded 7.97 hours per session, while grand jurors in Vermont spent an average of 3.66 hours per session.

The following table provides a summary of the number of cases that were commenced by indictment and the number of defendants that were proceeded against by indictment for the years 1975 through 1979. This information is derived from the criminal statistical reports submitted to the Administrative Office by the clerk of court for each district. The number of grand jury sessions convened, as well as the number of hours grand juries were in session, is also provided. This information can be used to determine what was produced by the grand jury system in the past five years. Nationally, 18,973 cases, involving 28,395 defendants, were commenced by indictment

as a result of the 9,791 grand jury sessions in 1979. While the number of grand jury sessions continued to increase, the average number of defendants indicted per grand jury session continued to drop. In 1975 an average of 5.10 defendants were indicted per grand jury session, while in 1979 the average had decreased to 2.90.

Petit Jury

The utilization of petit jurors in the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979 improved in many district courts; however, the national Juror Utilization Index (J.U.I.) increased slightly this past year. The J.U.I. is the average number of jurors on hand for each jury trial day and is calculated by dividing the total number of available jurors by the total number of jury trial days. The national J.U.I. for 1979 was 19.60.

As shown in Table 66, there were 565,617 prospective jurors available during the current 12-month period. This total has been broken down into three categories according to the status of jury service each juror attained on each day of service. For the first time since 1974 the percentage of jurors selected or serving dropped below 60 to 59.2 percent. The percentage of jurors who were challenged for cause or peremptorily by counsel increased to 16.2 percent. Jurors not selected, serving or challenged rose slightly from 24.0 percent in 1978 to 24.6 percent in 1979.

A 5.7 percent decrease in the number of criminal jury trial days¹ coupled with a 4.0 percent increase in the number

of civil trial days resulted in a 1.3 percent drop in the total number of jury trial days in 1979. While criminal trial days account for a majority of jury trial days, civil jury trial days are in an ascent and will soon take the lead if the trend of the last three years continues.

The percent of jurors selected for or serving on jury trials ranged from a high of 81.7 percent in Rhode Island to a low of 18.2 percent in the Northern Mariana Islands. In this category a total of 54 districts recorded percentages higher than the national figure of 59.2 percent.

The Middle District of Louisiana and Western District of Virginia reported highs of 39.1 percent and 39.0 percent, respectively, for prospective jurors challenged either for cause or peremptorily by counsel, while the Northern District of New York recorded 7.4 percent in this category. The wide range of percentages of challenged jurors is partially attributable to the various local court practices and traditions in the use of peremptory challenges by counsel and the increased number of challenges for cause in districts which have had one or more notorious trials.

A prime area of concern for those involved in juror management is the reduction of the number of people who attend court and who are not selected, serving, or challenged. This group includes the people who are not sent to a voir dire because of such factors as an overcall of jurors for that day or late settlements or pleas, and also those who are not reached on voir dire questioning due to such factors as excessively large panels or poor pool management. Many districts have been able to show improvement in this area through the use of juror utilization practices such as the use of less than 12 member civil jury, jury pooling, multiple voir dire, established deadlines for settlements or pleas, staggering of trial starts, reduction in voir dire size, effective use of pretrial hearings, and use of the code-a-phone for notifying jurors of a postponement or cancellation of a trial.

Hawaii achieved the lowest figures of jurors not selected, serving or challenged with 4.2 percent, while 63.4 percent of the jurors in the Northern Mariana Islands and 52.5 percent of Alaska's jurors were so classified. Eighteen districts recorded 15 percent or less of their available jurors as not selected, serving or challenged during the year ended June 30, 1979.

The percentage of criminal jury trial days for the 12-month period ranged from 15 percent in New Hampshire to 100 percent in the Canal Zone and the Northern Mariana Islands. Thirty-seven of the 43 districts having a majority of civil jury trial days recorded J.U.I.'s under 20.00, while only 23 of the 52 districts having a majority of criminal jury trial days recorded J.U.I.'s under 20.00.

The information on jury trial days can be used to develop a better understanding of the type of jury trial demands which the different districts must meet. A high percentage of criminal jury trials generally presents more problems to overcome in attempting to utilize jurors efficiently. The criminal jury trial often requires a larger panel of prospective jurors than needed for most civil trials due to anticipated increases in challenges and alternate jurors.

The Juror Usage Indexes for the year ended June 30, 1979 range from a low of 11.70 in the Western District of Oklahoma to 46.10 in the Northern Mariana Islands. Sixty of the 95 districts recorded indexes under 20.00 for the 12-month period.

FEDERAL PUBLIC/COMMUNITY DEFENDERS

As of June 30, 1979 there were thirty-one federal public defender and seven community defender organizations in operation. (The defender office in Minnesota converted from a part-time community defender organization to a full-time federal public defender on October 1, 1978.) Appendix tables K-1 and L-1 provide information, by defender office, on the number of cases opened, the number of cases closed, the average number of hours spent in court on each closed case, and the number of cases pending at the end of the report period. The information is broken down into three major categories of representations: criminal, appeals, and other (includes habeas corpus, parole/probation revocation, witness, and motions to correct or reduce sentence). The statistics in tables K-1 and L-1 only cover representations by federal public/community defender offices and therefore exclude representations provided by private panel attorneys under the Criminal Justice Act of 1964. These statistics are available in a separate report.

Federal Public Defenders

Federal public defenders were assigned a total of 14,077 new cases during the twelve-month period ended June 30,

1979, a decrease of 550 cases, or 3.8 percent, from the 14,627 cases opened during the same period last year. This is the first year that there has been a decrease in the incoming caseload of the federal public defenders since the inception of the defender reporting program in 1972. The number of cases opened by those offices which were in operation the entire twelve-month period ranged from a high of 1,627 cases in California, Central to a low of 65 cases in the office serving both Illinois, Central and Southern.

Of the twenty-four offices which were in operation during the entire twelve-month periods ended June 30, 1978 and 1979, seventeen recorded a decrease in the number of cases opened. The largest decrease was reported by the Arizona public defender which opened 957 cases, a decline of 23.4 percent from the 1,250 cases reported in 1978. At the other end of the scale, West Virginia, Southern with 137 representations in 1979 showed an increase of 14.2 percent over the 120 representations reported in 1978.

As in previous years the majority of matters assigned to federal public defenders were criminal cases. In 1979, 8,834 (62.8 percent) of the cases opened involved criminal matters.

The number of "other representations" (including appeals) assigned to federal public defenders continued its upward climb. A total of 5,243 such cases were opened in 1979, an increase of 203 cases, or 4.0 percent, over the 5,040 cases opened in 1978. Court directed representations of inmates of

the U.S. Medical Center for Federal Prisoners at Springfield, Missouri continue to decline. In 1978 these representations accounted for 17.1 percent of all "other representations", while in 1979 this figure fell to 14.4 percent.

Federal public defenders closed 14,205 cases in 1979, down 3.3 percent from the 14,695 cases closed in 1978. Of this total 9,204, or 64.8 percent, were criminal case closings, while 5,001, or 35.2 percent, were closings of "other representations." The number of cases closed by offices which were in operation during the entire twelve-month period ranged from a high of 1,710 case closings in California, Central to a low of 55 case closings in Illinois, Central and Southern. The number of hours in court per closed case has averaged approximately 1.6 hours since 1972.

The 3.8 percent decrease in the number of cases opened accompanied by the 3.3 percent decrease in the number of cases closed resulted in a decrease of 4.0 percent in the number of cases pending as of June 30, 1979. Nineteen of the thirty offices in operation before July 1, 1978 recorded fewer cases pending at the end of the report period.

Community Defender Organizations

A total of 7,177 cases were opened by the eight community defender organizations during the twelve-month period ended June 30, 1979. This was an increase of 10.9 percent over the 6,472 cases opened during the same period in 1978. Only eight case openings were reported by Minnesota in its last three months of operation (July-September 1978) as a community defender organization. Of the total number of cases opened 5,206, or 72.5 percent, were criminal matters, while 1,971, or 27.5 percent, were "other representations" (includes appeals).

The Southern District of California recorded the largest number of case openings with 2,586; the New York organization (includes the Eastern and Southern districts of New York and the Second Circuit Court of Appeals) was second with 2,051 case filings. Georgia, Northern and Oregon recorded the smallest number of case openings with 329 and 320, respectively.

Of the seven offices in operation during the entire twelve-month periods ended June 30, 1978 and 1979, three recorded decreases in their case openings. The largest decline

was experienced by Pennsylvania, Eastern which opened 584 cases, 45.7 percent fewer than the 1,076 cases opened a year ago. The number of cases opened by Michigan, Eastern and Georgia, Northern fell by 21.6 percent and 17.5 percent, respectively. At the other end of the scale, California, Southern recorded an increase of 1,170 cases, or 82.6 percent. Most of this increase can be attributed to the large number (975 petty offense cases) of representations before a magistrate for plea and sentencing of aliens charged with illegal entry.

The community defender organizations also recorded an increase of 11.9 percent in the number of cases disposed of during this report period. Three of the seven offices in operation for the entire twelve-month periods ended June 30, 1978 and 1979 experienced an increase, with California, Southern recording the largest increase of 86.2 percent. Pennsylvania, Eastern recorded the largest decline in cases closed, 440 cases, or 40.6 percent.

Of the 7,585 cases closed by the community defender offices in 1979, California, Southern disposed of 2,744, or 36.2 percent. As noted previously, this figure includes 975 immigration related petty offense cases. The New York organization disposed of the second largest number of cases with a total of 2,708 closed. At the other end of the scale, Oregon disposed of 285 cases during the same period.

The average number of hours in court per closed case was 2.0, a modest decrease compared to the 2.3 hours reported a year ago. California, Southern recorded the lowest average in this category with 1.2 hours per closed case; while Georgia, Northern recorded the highest with 3.3 hours.

The pending caseload for the community defender organizations dropped from 2,137 on June 30, 1978 to 1,729 on June 30, 1979, a decline of 19.1 percent. California, Southern recorded the largest decline at 37.5 percent. The only office which reported an increase in its pending caseload was Oregon with an increase of 47.3 percent.

UNITED STATES MAGISTRATES

During the year, magistrates conducted 560 evidentiary hearings in criminal cases in 52 districts and 783 hearings in civil cases in 59 districts. There were 563 hearings conducted by magistrates in prisoner cases in 53 districts. Magistrates completed 590 special master references in 48 districts. In 53 districts magistrates conducted 570 full trials of civil cases, including 109 jury trials, upon the consent of the parties. These full trials were in addition to other cases terminated without actual trials in which the parties had also consented to disposition of the litigation before magistrates.

Magistrates disposed of 100,267 minor offense cases, including petty offenses, during the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979. The total was slightly less than the 102,547 minor offense cases handled in 1978 (down 2.2 percent).

Of the total, 87,460 were petty offense cases, about 0.2 percent below the 87,654 petty offenses reported last year, but more than reported in any other prior year. The relative stability in petty offense cases in the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979 occurred despite continuing improvements and refinements in the statistical reporting system and the growing use of collateral forfeiture procedures which permit the disposition of many petty offenses without an appearance before a federal judicial officer. During the year, a total of 455,092 violation notices were issued.

Petty offense cases involving traffic, drunk and disorderly, trespass and theft charges increased during the past year, as did offenses grouped under the "other" category.

Cases involving immigration, mail, food and drug violations, and hunting, fishing, and camping offenses, decreased.

Of the total number of minor offenses disposed of by magistrates during the year, 12,807 were above the level of petty offenses, a drop of 14 percent from the 14,893 reported in 1978. Of these, 8,302 involved serious traffic violation charges, such as driving while intoxicated, a drop from the last year's figure of 10,473. The other specific categories of minor offenses cases above petty offenses generally declined during the year ending June 30, 1979. Assault, mail and food and drug violations, however, increased during the year, as did offenses under the general category of "other" offenses.

Of the 100,267 minor offense defendants coming before magistrates this year, 19,578 received a full trial on the merits. There were 65,349 defendants who pled guilty, and the remaining 15,340 minor offense cases were dismissed in open court by the magistrates. Of the 19,578 defendants who participated in full trials before magistrates, 13,661 were convicted of the charges against them.

Table 69 shows the number of minor offense cases disposed of by United States magistrates for the years 1972 and 1976 through 1979, classified by nature of offense. The ten districts with the largest number of minor offense cases

disposed of by magistrates during the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979 are set out in Table 70.

The number of precommitment proceedings in criminal cases conducted by United States magistrates during the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979 has continued the decline of past years. This category dropped 9.7 percent, from 77,332 last year to 69,798 this year. The decline was, in large part, attributable to an overall drop in the number of felony prosecutions initiated in the district courts by the Department of Justice over that period, as well as to an increased emphasis on initiating prosecutions by presentment to grand juries rather than by complaints before magistrates. It is also due in part to changes in court procedures, such as the conduct of arraignments by magistrates. This procedure permits the combining of some bail hearings with the arraignments, thus a separate bail hearing is not counted in the statistics.

Applications for arrest warrants considered by magistrates fell from 14,721 in 1978 to 11,423 from the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979. Summonses sought, however, rose from 1,413 to 1,722 and search warrants rose from 4,491 to 4,606 for the same period.

The total number of bail hearings, including those involving material witnesses and alleged probation violators, decreased slightly from 43,147 in 1978 to 40,573 for the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979. This year 5,513 applications for review of these bail determinations were reported, also less than the 6,427 applications reported last year. Preliminary examinations conducted by magistrates declined from 5,384 to 4,349 for this period, and removal hearings fell from 1,749 to 1,612.

There were 176 full-time magistrates positions authorized for appointment on October 1, 1978. During the twelve-month period ended June 30, 1979, the incumbents of those positions handled 221,495 matters - 76 percent of the total disposed of by magistrates nationally. The remaining 70,684 proceedings were conducted by part-time magistrates.

Full-time magistrates conducted 79 percent of the preliminary proceedings in criminal cases, disposed of 57 percent of the minor offenses cases and handled 90 percent of the "additional duties" performed during the year. Table 72 shows the breakdown of matters handled by full-time magistrates vis-a-vis part-time magistrates for the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979.

At least two full-time magistrates had been authorized for appointment in each of the 25 largest district courts by October 1, 1978. The extent to which these full-time positions have been used in each court is reflected in Table 73.

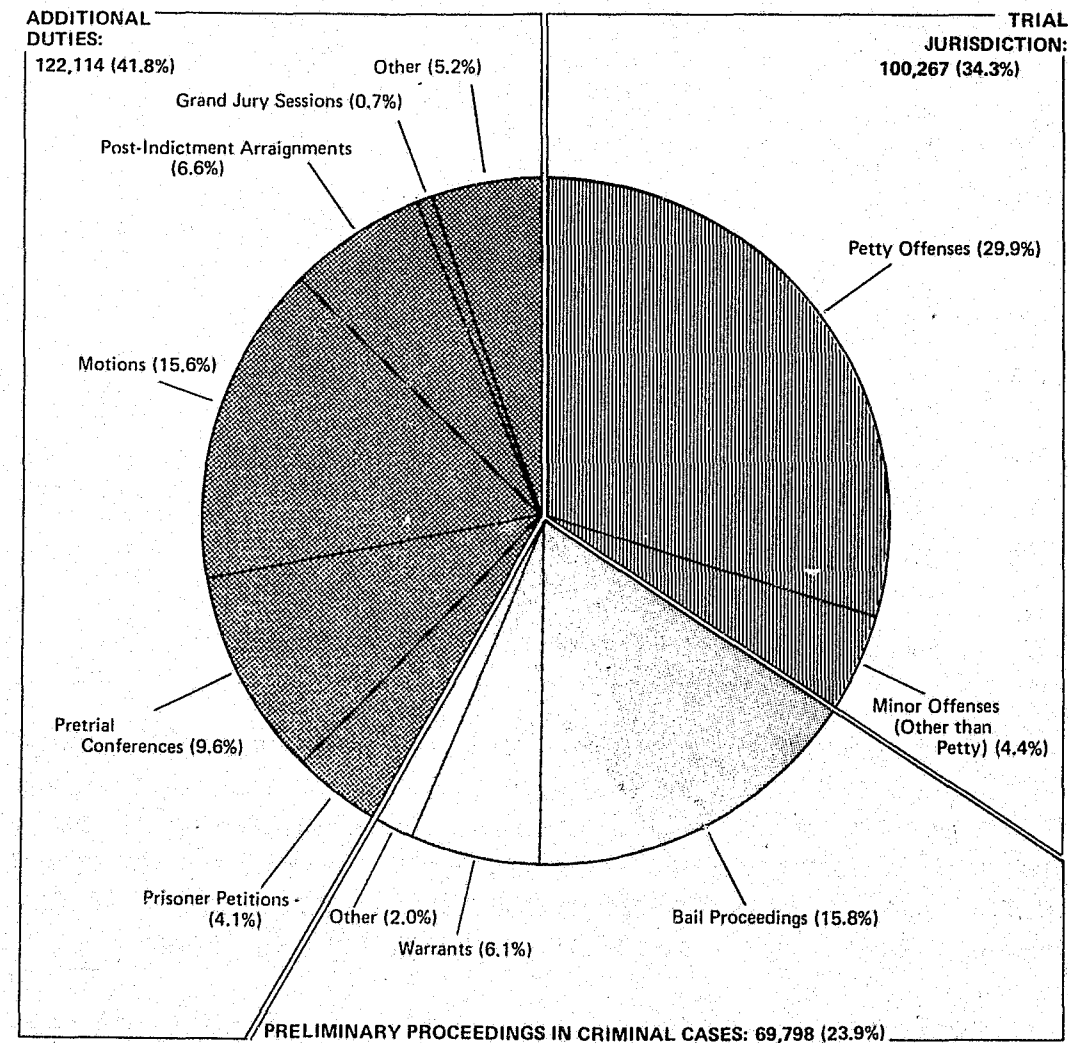

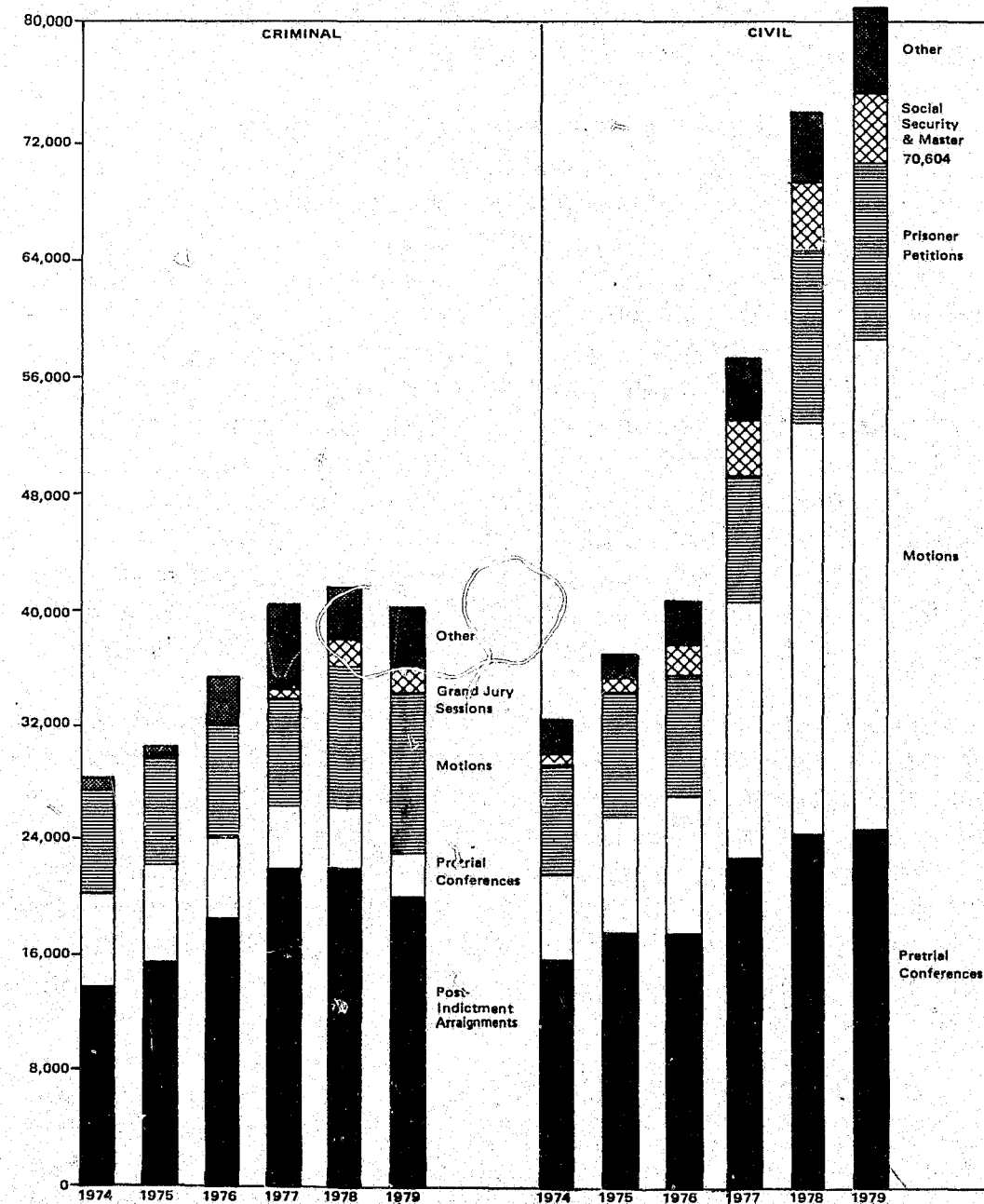

Additional Appendix Probation Statistical Tables

This marks the second year that an analysis of the Federal Probation System caseload has appeared in this section of the Annual Report of the Director.

In 1969, because of other program priorities, the processing of individual probation records was discontinued. Tables E-1 and E-2 in the appendix were thereafter produced using monthly summary sheets provided by each district. Subsequently, an improved computer system for capturing records on each person received for and removed from supervision was reestablished, and in 1976, a mini-computer was installed with terminals that allowed personnel to directly access and update the computer files. By June 1978, after five years of individual record entries and three reconciliations of field office files with the computer files at the Administrative Office of the U. S. Courts, Appendix tables E-1 and E-2 were produced from the probation records. This year Appendix tables E-3 through E-7 for the first time were generated by the same method for publication in this report.

This system provides a vast array of data collected on each person received for supervision, including the period of supervision, the number of months completed under supervision, and the reason for removal from supervision. Using this expanded base of information, five new appendix tables are presented in addition to tables E-1 and E-2. All new appendix tables on persons received for supervision and removed from supervision exclude inter-district transfer actions and reinstatements.

Appendix Table E-3 reflects all persons under supervision on June 30, 1979 for each district by major offense at the time of conviction. This table complements Table E-2, which focuses on persons under supervision by type of supervision, that is, probation, parole, pretrial diversion, etc.

Appendix Table E-4 indicates, by district, probationers placed on supervision by district court judges by the length of the probation term imposed. Also provided is the percentage of persons received with terms of two years or more.

Appendix Table E-5 presents court probationers who satisfactorily completed all of their supervision terms and

those discharged as satisfactory prior to the original expiration date.

Appendix Table E-6 indicates the average term imposed compared to the average term served for all court probationers who successfully completed their terms during the year, and the percentage of early terminations.

Appendix Table E-7 provides the national total of persons removed by type of supervision. Highlighted are the number removed with no violation, and violations with the type of violation in the three general categories, major, minor, and technical.

Probation System Case Flow

During the twelve month period ended June 30, 1979, 33,839 persons were received on new or reinstated periods of supervision. Persons removed from supervision numbered 35,852 excluding transfers, and the number of persons under supervision in the 94 reporting districts (Northern Marianas not reporting) at the close of this reporting period was 66,087 (see Appendix Table E-1).

Persons Under Supervision Decreases Slightly

Table 74 shows national totals of persons under supervision on June 30 of last year and this year by type of supervision with the numerical and percentage change. The 66,087 persons under the supervision of the Federal Probation

Technical Note

The date on which active supervision begins, or the "Received Date", is used to determine if an individual was under supervision at the beginning of the year (July 1) or was received for supervision during the year.

Each year a limited number of records are filed with received dates prior to the close of the previous year. Thus Appendix Table E-1 shows these persons as having been under supervision when the year began even though they were not counted at the close of the previous year. For this reason, comparison of persons under supervision on July 1 of this year's Table E-1 and persons under supervision on June 30 of last year's Table E-1 will show minor differences. Yearly comparisons in the text, however, are based on the June 30 figures shown in each report.

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System on June 30, 1979 represents a slight decrease of 0.9 percent or 594 fewer persons than at the close of last year. Increases in parolees (972; 8 percent), special parolees (492; 13.6 percent), mandatory releasees (111; 5.8 percent), and pretrial diversion cases (105; 4.6 percent) were offset by a large decline in court probationers (-2,031; -5.2 percent) and small declines in probationers serving terms imposed by U. S. magistrates (-161; -2.2 percent) and military parolees (-82; -28.6 percent).

Change in District Caseloads is Small

The relatively small change in the national caseload is reflected in individual districts as displayed in Table 75 with over half of the 94 districts showing no more than a five percent change from the 1978 ending figure of persons under supervision. However, fourteen districts, as shown below, had changes of 15 percent or more.

The following districts had increases greater than 15 percent:

Further, Eastern Michigan (-199; -10.4 percent), Northern California (-157; -9.1 percent), Northern Ohio (-125; -10.2 percent), New Jersey (-108; -6.3 percent) and Eastern Missouri (-101; -12.3 percent) showed declines of more than 100 persons under supervision on June 30, 1979 as compared to June 30, 1978.

Persons Under Supervision Showing More Parolees, Less Probationers

The final column in Table 74 shows the proportion of the national caseload which each type of supervision represented for last year and this year. Persons released on supervision from institutions proportionately increased from 27 percent on June 30, 1978 to 29.5 percent on June 30, 1979. This is an increase of 1,493 in the number of persons serving under the four types of institutional supervision. Conversely, probationers serving terms imposed by district court judges and U. S. magistrates or serving under conditions of pretrial diversion decreased by 2,087 from 73.0 percent of the total to 70.5 percent.

The accompanying graph shows that persons under the supervision of the court rose continuously from 1970 through 1975, leveled off between 1976 and 1978, and began to decline during the past year. During the same years, the number of persons supervised after institutional release has increased steadily excluding small declines in 1976 and 1977, and since June 30, 1977 this group has risen by 2,794.

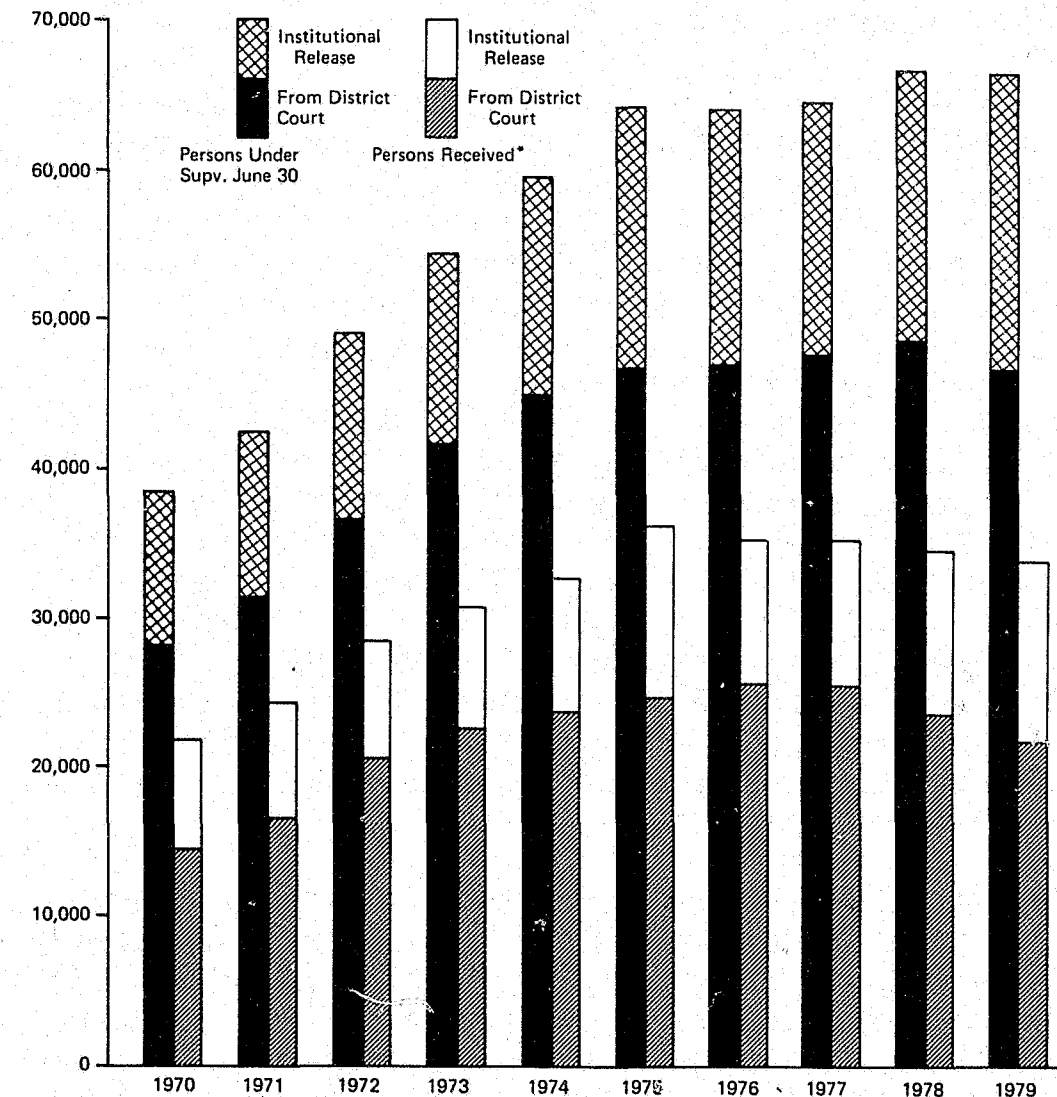
Table E-2 in the Appendix shows persons under supervision on June 30, 1979 in each district by type of case. Parole, mandatory release, military parole and special parole accounts for 40 percent or more of the total caseload in six districts. One of these, Eastern Michigan, shows 49.5 percent or one-half of its caseload as persons serving parole for the remainder of institutional sentences. The others are Minnesota (46.2 percent), Texas, Western (42.3 percent), Oklahoma, Western (40.9 percent), Indiana, Northern (40.1 percent) and Missouri, Eastern (40 percent).

The significance of this shift in the numbers of persons under the different types of supervision is that probation is controlled by persons directly accessible to the probation officer - judges, U. S. magistrates, and U. S. attorneys in pretrial diversion cases. Necessary arrest warrants can be obtained and violation hearings held in the immediate vicinity

of the probation office. Supervision upon institutional release, by contrast, must be coordinated with the U. S. Parole Commission regional offices which are usually distant from the district and thus communicated with by mail. Violation testimony is written rather than verbal in most parole revocation hearings, and exchange of information affecting the individual parolee is slow and indirect.

Parolees, more so than probationers, are convicted felons and many have previous arrests and convictions relating to an established pattern of criminal activity, making them less amenable to direction from the probation officer. For these and other reasons, parolees tend to require more time of the probation officer in the administration of supervision.

Persons Under Supervision By Offense

Appendix Table E-3 groups persons under supervision on June 30, 1979 in each district by offense. The accompanying chart presents graphically the national totals for all types of supervision. Nearly one out of every four persons under supervision at the end of this reporting period was a drug offender (15,176 or 23 percent of the total) with 12.1 percent (7,974) having committed offenses involving addictive narcotics, 5.8 percent (3,854) involved in marihuana offenses, and 5.1 percent (3,348) having committed offenses with other substances which are controlled under provisions of the Drug Abuse Prevention and Control Act of 1970.

Other offenses which accounted for large numbers of persons under supervision were: embezzlement and fraud, (19.5 percent; 12,855); larceny and theft, (12 percent; 7,942); forgery and counterfeiting, (10.9 percent; 7,226); and homicide, robbery, assault, and burglary which together comprised 8.5 percent (5,588) of the total. Of 66,087 persons under supervision as of this report, 73.8 percent (48,787) had committed an offense included in one of these five major categories.

Continuing Drop in New Probationers Causes Decline in Persons Received For Supervision

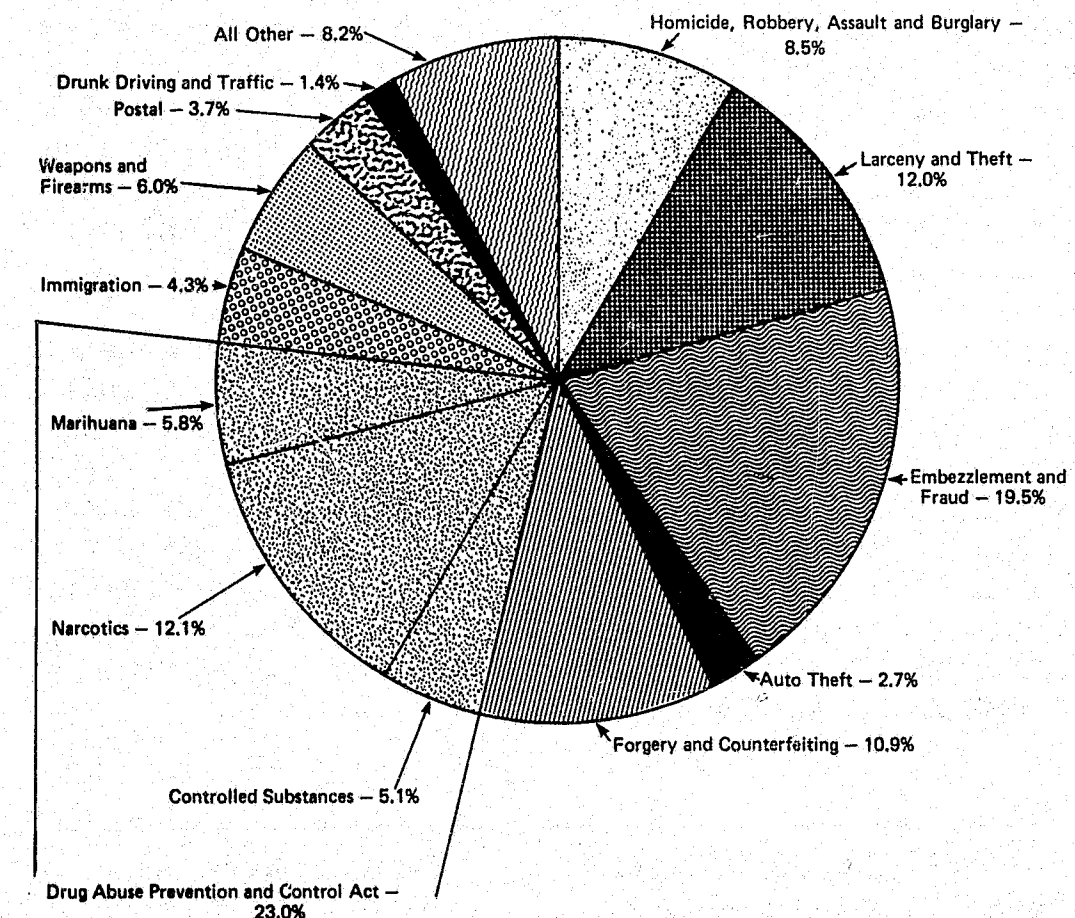
During the past year, persons received for supervision in the Federal Probation System numbered 33,839, excluding transfers, a decrease of 969 (-2.8 percent) when compared to the twelve-month period ended June 30, 1978. Persons received for probation supervision from the district court judges decreased by 1,574 (-10.1 percent) while probationers

received on terms imposed by U. S. magistrates dropped by 610 (-10.5 percent). Persons received under conditions of pretrial diversion increased by 120 (5.6 percent). Table 76 shows that the total decrease in persons received on probationary terms since June 30, 1978 is 2,074 (-8.7 percent) and the total decrease since the same date in 1977 is 3,769 (-14.9 percent).

The reverse is found in persons received after institutional release where a substantial increase in persons received on parole (1,013 or 17.4 percent) and a smaller increase in those received on special parole terms (234 or 12.3 percent) exceeded small decreases in mandatory releases (-76 or -2.3 percent) and military paroles (-76 or -44.4 percent). The combined total of 12,288 persons received after institutional custody represented an increase of 1,095 or 9.8 percent from last year and 2,510 or 25.7 percent since 1977.

The continued decline in probationers received for supervision can be attributed directly to the decline in criminal prosecutions reported during the last two years, since probationers are placed under supervision immediately in most cases. However, the relationship between reduced prosecutions and a change in persons received for parole supervision is not as direct. The figures below indicate that the rise in parolees received for supervision during the past two years was an effect of the increase in the number of prison sentences imposed during 1976 and 1977.

The decline in criminal prosecutions during 1978 and 1979 and the accompanying decrease in prison sentences imposed may begin to reverse this trend during 1980.

Table E-1 in the appendix shows all persons received and removed during the twelve months ended June 30, 1979 by district. Table E-4 displays probationers received in each district on court-imposed terms by the length of the probation term to be served.

Persons Removed from Supervision Rises

Excluding transfers, the number of persons who completed their supervision or were removed from active to inactive status rose from 34,102 during the twelve months ending June 30, 1978 to 35,852 during the twelve months ending June 30, 1979, an increase of 1,750 persons removed. Table E-7 in the appendix shows that persons removed during the past year for the first time in that sentence (first removals) numbered 33,943. Of this latter total, 28,541 or 84.1 percent were removed for reasons other than a new offense or violation of the conditions of supervision.

Rates of Violation by Type of Supervision

Analysis of Table E-7 by type of supervision reveals that probationers removed from terms imposed by district court judges and probationers removed from terms imposed by U. S. magistrates showed nearly equal percentages of overall violation, 15.5 percent and 14.9 percent respectively. Court probationers, however, showed a higher rate of removals for new major crimes (3.7 percent compared to 1.8 percent for U.S. magistrates probation.)

Concerning institutional releases from court-imposed prison terms, federal parole exhibited the highest violation rate overall with 1,360 violations of a total 5,425 removed (25.1 percent). Of these, 368 were violations as the result of involvement in new major offenses (a rate of 6.8 percent), also the highest for all types of supervision. Mandatory release showed a lower violation rate (13.4 percent) than parole. Special parole, while showing a higher overall violation rate (17.2 percent) than mandatory release, had the same rate of persons removed for committing new major crimes (3.0 percent). These three types of parole differ considerably in certain aspects and this should be considered when comparing their relative rates of violation.

Mandatory release is granted after an offender has served the maximum term required prior to a parole hearing, and because of this delay in parole, the ensuing post-release supervision is reduced by six months. Mandatory release,

therefore, is usually the shortest period of supervision after imprisonment; in some cases, it terminates in the same month that it commences. Releasees in this category have a shorter period in which to commit new offenses while under supervision, and the overall violation rate could be expected to be lower than for other types of supervision following institutional release.

A special parole term, on the other hand, is an additional period of parole supervision for drug offenders that begins after federal parole or mandatory release is completed. This lengthy period of continued supervision produces a high rate of technical violations not representing new offenses (12.7 percent). Furthermore, special parolees are strictly monitored through periodic physical tests for signs of drug use, resulting in violations that might go undetected for other types of offenders.

Only eight persons removed from pretrial diversion supervision committed new major crimes, and 71 total violations were reported for the 2,198 removals in this category. Persons are generally selected for pretrial diversion when the offense is relatively minor or non-violent and no evidence of a prior criminal record exists. These two factors help to reduce the rate of violations within this type of supervision.

Finally, for the 184 removals of persons serving on military parole after release from a military institution, 182 were removed without violation and none were removed because of a new major crime.

Cases and Motions Under Advisement in the District Courts

Cases and motions held under advisement over 60 days by United States district judges increased 24.3 percent from 1,117 matters on June 30, 1978 to 1,388 matters on June 30, 1979. As shown in Table 77, 488 district judges (including senior judges) reported on the status of matters before the court. A total of 308, or 63.1 percent, of these judges reported having no matters under advisement more than 60 days. The number of active judges who did not report decreased from 28 in 1978 to 10 in 1979.

A total of 180 district judges reported 737 cases and 651 motions held under advisement over 60 days. The majority of the matters reported (71.5 percent) had been held less than

six months, while 19.4 percent had been held over six months but less than one year and 9.1 percent had been held over one year.

Seven of the circuits reported fewer than 100 matters held over 60 days, while the Seventh Circuit reported 441 matters, or 31.8 percent of the total. The other circuits reporting more than 100 matters were: the Sixth Circuit with 279 matters (20.1 percent), the Second Circuit with 184

matters (13.3 percent), and the Fifth Circuit with 160 matters (11.5 percent). Further, the Sixth Circuit reported the largest number of matters held under advisement over one year with a total of 38 (30.2 percent); while the Fifth Circuit reported the second largest total of 28 (22.2 percent).

Tables 79 and 80 provide historical data on the number of matters held under advisement over 60 days for the years 1970 through 1979. The total number of matters held under advisement rose by a substantial 369 percent from 296 matters in 1970 to 1,388 in 1979. The most significant increase was in the number of cases and motions held more than six

months but less than one year which increased 647 percent from 36 matters in 1970 to 269 matters this year.

The average number of matters under advisement per judge increased slightly from 7.3 in 1978 to 7.7 in 1979. The District of Columbia reported an average of 1.8 matters per judge; while at the other end of the scale, the Seventh Circuit reported an average of 33.9 matters per judge. In all, 37 percent of all judges who reported had at least one matter under advisement over 60 days on June 30, 1979.

PASSPORT AND NATURALIZATION

The number of passport applications processed by United States district courts decreased for the ninth consecutive year. During the current 12-month period, 41 district courts handled a total of only 31,801 passport applications, 16.4 percent less than the 38,029 processed by 50 districts during the year ended June 30, 1978. As the U.S. Postal Service expands its passport function, there has been a steady decline

in the number of district courts which provide this service. In 1979 the district courts in Arizona and the Virgin Islands processed the largest number of passport applications, with 5,037 and 4,626, respectively.

Naturalization petitions filed with the federal courts decreased 2 percent, from 140,364 in 1978 to 137,624 in 1979; however, the number of aliens naturalized in 1979 increased 1.4 percent over the previous year, from 140,061 in 1978 to

141,963 in 1979. The Eastern District of New York reported the greatest number of aliens naturalized with 19,970 in the year ended June 30, 1979.

Twenty-five years of passport and naturalization statistics are summarized in the accompanying table. Detailed data by district on the number of passport applications processed, the number of petitions for naturalization filed, and the number of aliens naturalized during the 12-month period ended June 30, 1979 can be found in Appendix Table P-1.

PAYMENTS UNDER THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACT FIRST HALF OF FISCAL YEAR 1979

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE JUDICIAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE TO IMPLEMENT THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACT

The following is a report of activities relating to the Criminal Justice Act (CJA) during the first half of fiscal year 1979 (FY79) which ended on March 31, 1979.

Status of Appropriations

The Congress appropriated \$24,800,000 for "Defender Services" for FY 1979. The current estimate of obligations for FY 1979 is \$23,973,000 as follows:

*This amount includes FPD expenses of \$208,000 and CD expenses of \$70,000 for investigative, expert, and other services which are not included in their respective totals above.

Representation in Federal Courts

During the first half of FY79, 19,084 persons were represented in the United States courts pursuant to the provisions of the CJA. This compares with 20,328 appointments in the first half of FY78 and 20,614 appointments in the first half of FY77. The number of appointments in the first half of FY79 was thus 6.1% less than the comparable period in FY78 and 7.4% less than the comparable period in FY77.

The 31 Federal Public Defender Organizations represented 6,618 persons in the first half of FY79 accounting for 34.7% of the total Criminal Justice Act caseload. The seven Community Defender Organizations represented 3,583 persons or 18.8% of the reported Criminal Justice Act appointments during the first half of FY79. In FY78, in those 40 districts where Federal Defender Organizations operate, they received approximately 62% of all CJA cases.

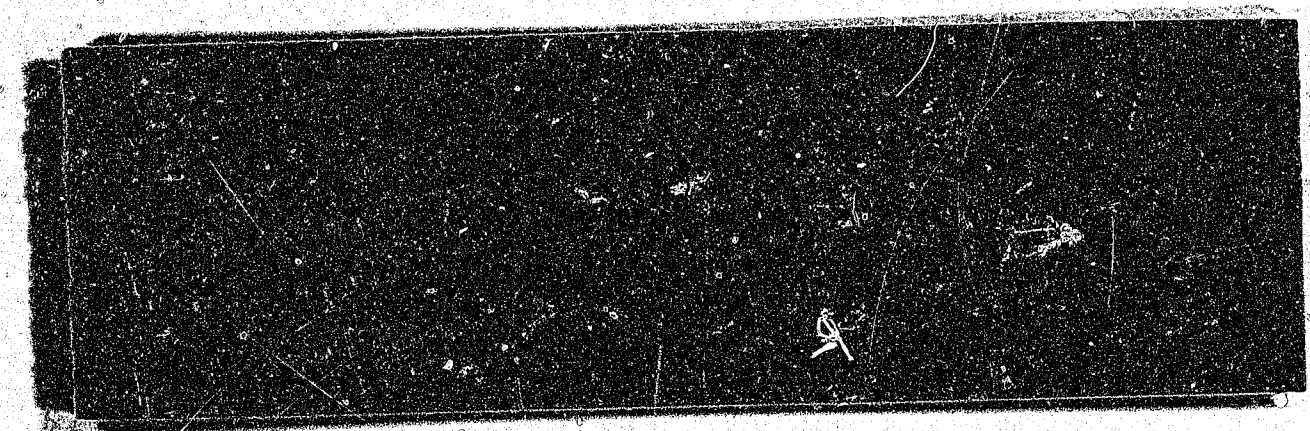

The decrease in CJA appointments in FY78 and in the first six months of FY79 may be attributed to the following:

In November, 1977, the Department of Justice, (DOJ), announced that it was fashioning an anti-crime program with four priorities: organized crime, narcotics, public corruption, and white collar crime. This program was to focus on eliminating the enterprises of organized crime, rather than simply prosecuting individuals on a case-by-case basis. Judiciary caseload statistics for 1978 reflect that during the twelve-month period ending December 31, 1978, a total of 33,573 criminal cases were filed, a decrease of 12.3% from their 1977 level of 38,275. During the same period civil filings totalled 144,212, an increase of 6.6% from the 135,298 filed in 1977. This increase in civil filings follows the pattern seen over the past several years - civil actions since 1972 have increased 49%. The following table reflects 1977 and 1978 criminal case filings statistics for the districts which have Federal Public and Community Defender Organizations, and the numerical and percent increase or decrease in filings they experienced.

At the close of 1978, the pending criminal caseload was almost identical to that of 1977, while the pending civil caseload had increased by 6.1 percent. All criminal offense groups, except three, recorded fewer filings. Only homicide, fraud, and immigration law prosecutions rose. The following table reflects the three offense groups which experienced increases in 1978 and those which showed declines of 15 percent or more.

One additional consideration is that in statistical year 1978, U.S. Attorneys tended to refer more federal/state law violations to the states for prosecution. There was also an emphasis on civil litigation by many U.S. Attorneys.

The full impact of the Speedy Trial Act has yet to be determined. A recent study by the DOJ stated that "many United States Attorneys have instructed law enforcement agencies in their districts to avoid making arrests before indictment whenever possible, notwithstanding the existence of clear, or even abundant, probable cause." This study showed that, for the twelve months ending on June 30, 1978, as compared to the previous year, the number of defendants whose arrests preceded formal charge decreased from 18,849 to 9,169, a decrease of 51%. This practice affords the government an opportunity to prepare a case before the time limits commence, and thus could very likely increase pressure on defense counsel through a reduction in the time available in which to prepare a case. In addition, the Speedy Trial time limits may result in an increase in the number of criminal declinations.

Panel Attorney Representation
Average Payments to Counsel

The following table provides actual average payments to panel attorneys for fiscal year 74 through 78, and those estimated for panel attorneys for fiscal years 78 through 80. These figures include attorney compensation and reimbursement pursuant to subsection (d) of the Criminal Justice Act but do not include costs of transcripts, expert and other services (which figures are provided infra).

The estimates for fiscal years 78 through 80 are based on the currently authorized compensation rates. It should be noted, however, that legislation might be reintroduced in the 96th Congress which would increase hourly rates of compensation and the statutory maximums. The 95th Congress considered, but did not enact, legislation (S. 1437 and H.R. 6869) which would have increased both hourly rates and statutory maximums by 50%.

Average payments to counsel have risen over the years and in all probability will continue to increase due to more complex and protracted litigation and a greater number of claims for excess compensation being approved by the chief judges of the courts of appeals.

An increase in the reimbursable expenses of attorneys due to inflationary pressures is also a contributing factor.

Average payments to counsel for services rendered in the courts of appeals for FY78, based on claims processed as of

March 30, 1979 ranged from \$624 in the Fifth Circuit to \$942 in the Second. The average for all circuits was \$777.

Payments for district court representation during the same period ranged from a low average of \$82 in the Southern District of California to a high of \$1,055 in the Southern District of Florida. The modest average for the Southern District of California is largely influenced by the more than 2,200 material witnesses who were represented under the CJA in FY78. Those cases account for more than 70% of the district's total assignments. The average payment to counsel for all districts was \$314.

Exhibits A-1 and A-2 present for fiscal years 1978 and 1979, the various categories for which counsel were provided, together with costs relating to such representations. Exhibits B-1 and B-2 contain the number and types of appointments made during fiscal years 1978 and 1979 in each circuit and district. Exhibits C-1 and C-2 provide details regarding the number of persons represented and the payments made to counsel in each circuit and district during fiscal years 1978 and 1979.

Compensation for Extended or
Complex Representation

During the first half of FY79, 537 payments in excess of \$1,000 in felony cases were approved. The largest payment amounted to \$33,511 for representation in an extortion/racketeering case in the Middle District of Florida. The average for all such payments was \$2,910. Exhibit D-1 details, by circuit and district, all approved payments for compensation in excess of \$1,000 for extended or complex felony cases approved during the period October 1, 1978 through March 31, 1979 (the first half of FY79) while Exhibit D-2 summarizes these payments by fiscal year.

Between October 1, 1978 and March 31, 1979, ten payments in excess of \$400 for extended or complex representation in misdemeanor cases were approved. The largest of these payments was \$1,490 for representation provided in a social security fraud case in the Northern District of Illinois. The average for all such payments was \$754. Exhibit E-1 lists the payments for the first six months of FY79 while Exhibit E-2 details these payments by fiscal year.

With regard to payments made for extended or complex discretionary appointments during the first half of FY79, 136 claims in excess of \$250 were approved. The largest payment was \$5,051 for a habeas corpus petitioner in the Northern District of Texas and the average for all matters was \$744. Exhibit F-1 lists all payments made from October 1, 1978 through March 31, 1979, while Exhibit F-2 summarizes these payments by fiscal year.

Between October, 1978 and March 31, 1979, 78 claims for compensation for expert and other services of an unusual character or duration were approved and paid. The largest single payment was \$5,825 for a psychiatrist in the District of Columbia, and the average cost per case was \$1,039. Exhibit G-1 lists all such payments by circuit and district for the first six months of FY79 while Exhibit G-2 details these payments by fiscal year.

Transcripts, Investigative, Expert and Other Services

As of March 31, 1979, a total of \$473,544 was paid from the FY79 CJA appropriation for transcripts, investigative, expert, and other services. Current estimates are that, as later claims attributable to FY79 are approved and paid, the total cost for FY79 will amount to \$2,320,000. The following tables reflect the cost of providing these services from FY74 through FY77 and estimates for FY78 through FY80.

The projected increases for transcripts and other services in FY79 and FY80 are based primarily on past experience and anticipated inflation.

Exhibit H-1 and H-2 provide a detailed breakdown of all costs attributable to transcripts, investigative, expert, and other services by circuit and district for fiscal years 78 and 79 as of March 30, 1979.

Federal Public Defender Organizations

Two Federal Public Defender branch offices commenced operations in FY79. The Middle District of Florida, which has its main office in Tampa and a branch in Jacksonville, established a second branch office in Orlando in February, 1979. In addition, a new branch office in the Western District of Washington (Tacoma) began operations in October, 1978.

Approximately 86.4% of the projected cost of operations of the 31 Federal Public Defender offices in fiscal year 1979 will be utilized for personnel compensation and benefits.

Exhibit I-1 is a composite statement showing for each organization the most recent estimate of obligations by classification and the projected number of case assignments and average cost per case. Exhibit I-2 provides details of personnel compensation anticipated for each office.

A total of 6,995 cases were opened by Federal Public Defenders in the first six months of fiscal year 1979 and 6,928 were closed. This includes 377 miscellaneous inmate requests by federal prisoners of the U.S. Medical Center in Springfield, Missouri, which were responded to by the Missouri (Western) Federal Public Defender office. The highest volume office during this period was California (Central) with 791 openings and 755 closings. Exhibit J reflects the openings, closings, hours expended in court, and pending caseload for the 31 reporting offices for the first half of the fiscal year 1979.

Based upon original budget submission projects, Federal Public Defenders have, as of March 31, realized 36% of their anticipated totals. This compares with 47% and 48% for the first halves of fiscal years 1978 and 1977, respectively. The shortfall in the first half of FY79 is, for the most part, a result of a decrease in criminal filings nationwide.

Community Defender Organizations

Grants to Community Defender Organizations totalled \$3,542,194 for fiscal year 1979 and those authorized for fiscal year 1980 totalled \$3,702,000. The following table details the Community Defender allocations for fiscal years 79 and 80.

The 7 Community Defender Organizations were assigned 3,583 cases and closed 3,663 during the first half of FY79.

The highest volume of cases was realized by Federal Defenders of San Diego, Inc. with 1,388 openings and 1,343 closings.¹ Exhibit K summarizes the openings, closings, hours expended in court, and pending caseloads for all seven organizations in FY79.

Based upon original grant submission projections made in December, 1977, Community Defenders have, as of March 31, realized 49% of their anticipated total caseload for fiscal year 1979. However, if the 716 immigration violation representations reported by the Southern District of California are excluded, Community Defenders will have reached only 39% of their original FY79 caseload projection. The comparable acquisition rate for the first halves of fiscal years 1978 and 1977 were 45% and 43%, respectively.

Comparative Costs of Representation By Panel Attorneys, Federal Public Defenders and Community Defenders

Average compensation to panel attorneys for FY79 (district and appeals courts) is expected to reach \$455 per case. This figure does not include the cost of investigative, interpreter, psychiatric, and other expert services. Such expenditures are expected to add another \$14 per case, thereby raising the average cost of panel attorney representation to \$469. The estimated average cost per case for FY78 is \$440 plus \$14 for expert and other services or a total of \$454 per case. The estimated increase amounts to \$15 per case or 3.3%.

Based on current estimates, Federal Public Defender costs will average \$574 per case in FY79. This figure excludes the approximately 750 Missouri (Western) inmate requests, and nonrecurring costs of newly established offices. This compares with an average cost of \$511 in FY78, an increase of 12.3%.

The average cost per case for Community Defenders in FY79 is expected to be \$464, which is approximately the same as the \$463 average for FY78. It should be noted that the FY79 cost per case is unusually low due to the inclusion of a large number of petty offense representations in the Southern District of California. It would be \$571 per case if the approximately 1,430 immigration violations were excluded. These cost estimates are based on the authorized FY79 funding for Community Defender Organizations, and revised caseload projections which are included in fiscal year 1981 Community Defender grant requests.
