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THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL

Five new Judgeships created . . . District will split . . .

Following the recommendations of the Judicial Council of the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the 1982 Louisiana Legislature created five new judgeships.

One judgeship each was created for the 1st. Judicial District Court, Caddo Parish; the 15th Judicial District Court, Acadia, Lafayette and Vermilion Parishes; the 18th Judicial District Court, Iberville, W. Baton Rouge and Pointe Coupee Parishes; the 23rd Judicial District Court, Assumption, St. James and Ascension Parishes; and the 27th Judicial District Court, Caldwell Parish.

Additionally, the split of the 29th Judicial District Court, St. Charles and St. John Parishes, was authorized by the legislature. This split was subject to referendum by the people of the district and passed in both parishes on January 15, 1983. The split in the District will not be effective until January 1, 1985.

All recommendations of the Council relative to new judgeships were made after investigation by the office of the Judicial Administrator and evaluation by the Committee to Evaluate Requests for New Judgeships, chaired by Judge Thomas Tanner.

Trial Courts Committee appointed Deadline changes . . . Joint Legislative Committee formed

In other action, the council passed a motion in support of an Attorney General opinion which gave city courts the authority to allow payment of the same compensation to witnesses that is presently being paid by district courts; authorized creation of a Trial Courts Statistics Committee; and changed the deadline for receipt by the Judicial Administrator's office of requests for new judgeships from January 1, to November 1, each year. The Council also voted to ask the legislature to defer action on a proposal to create a Court of Appeal Coordinating Council, served by a Judicial Administrator for the Courts of Appeal, until the matter could be studied. A joint legislative committee has been appointed to do this.

Subcommittees study, plan, implement . . .

The Courts and Community Relations Subcommittee chaired by Bogalusa Attorney Richard F. Knight is studying the manner in which juries are selected and managed in the state and is now working to develop a model juror's handbook along with other related material for use in jury management.

The Financing and Facilities of the Louisiana Courts, Subcommittee, chaired by Judge Guy E. Humphries, introduced legislation calling for direct funding by the legislature of each judge's court reporter, secretary and law clerk. Due to the financial short fall which the state encountered last year, this legislation failed.

The Juvenile Courts Subcomittee, Chaired by Judge Salvadore Mule, is studying the feasibility of a statewide system of regional juvenile courts and of the possibility of providing services to juveniles on a regional basis. This subcommittee is also working with the Judical College on the preparation of a juvenile benchbook and gearing up to develop a uniform state statistical system for the juvenile courts. This latter project is being done in cooperation with the Trial Courts Statistics Committee.

The Science and Technology in the Courts Subcommitte has surveyed the types of electronic systems currently being used by the courts of Louisiana. This information was collated by Ronald Stritzinger, a Deputy Judicial Administrator, who serves as staff to the committee. Stritzinger is available to give technical assistance to all of the courts. Additionally, the Subcommittee has inaugurated a continuing education program on technology for the courts.

The Long Range Planning Subcommittee, chaired by Judge Patrick M. Schott, has surveyed the judges and clerks of courts of the State to ascertain the priority problems facing the Judicial System for use as a guide in determining future activities of the Subcommittee. The Subcommittee also reviewed the data concerning deliquent appeals in the state and has recommended that legislation be passed to upgrade the court reporting system in the state. The Subcommittee also recommends that steps be taken to increase compliance on the part of lawyers and clerks with the time requirements for sending notices of the costs in appeals and for paying those costs.

The Judicial Council of the Supreme Court of Louisiana was established in 1950 and received its first funding by the state legislature in 1954. Its task is to evaluate and monitor the operations and procedures of the judicial system of the state. In this capacity, it serves as a clearinghouse for ideas for simplifying and for expediting judicial procedures and/or correcting shortcomings in the system.

The Judicial Administrator Reports

Workloads increase Budgets decrease . . .

During the last five years, the work load of the Louisiana courts has grown by 34 percent. In order to meet this rapid growth during a period of tight budgets, courts at all levels are working harder and more efficiently than ever before. This effort to increase efficiency manifested itself during 1982 in the increased use of automation, development of improved management statistics, and efforts to make up for the lack of needed resources by using innovative management approaches to operating the courts.

Effects of the transfer of Criminal Appellate Jurisdiction on the Supreme Court is studied

In the Supreme Court, the first effects of the constitutional amendment giving criminal jurisdiction to the courts of appeal were felt during the second half of 1982. Because hundreds of cases had been filed in the Supreme Court prior to the transfer of jurisdiction on July 1st, it will be many months before the Supreme Court work load decreases. However, in preparation for the time when the full effects of the constitutional amendment are felt, the Supreme Court has commissioned a management study to enable it to reorganize its staff and update its procedures to handle its new case load.

Courts of Appeal streamline utilize technology . . .

The courts of appeal are facing increased civil filings and have taken on criminal jurisdiction. They have moved to meet this challenge by exploring applications of advanced court technology, developing new rules of court, and by vigorously scrutinizing every phase of their operations. In addition, a subcommittee of the Judicial Council chaired by Judge Patrick M. Schott of the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeal is studying the appellate case flow and the standards applicable to court reporters (who form a vital link in the appellate process). Judge Schott's committee hopes to update the procedural law affecting the flow of appellate cases and to improve the performance of court reporters in Louisiana courts.

District, parish and city courts have experienced dramatic increases in their case loads. They have attempted to meet this challenge not by asking for large numbers of new judges but by working more efficiently. Based upon growth in case loads, the district courts could have sought more judgeships during 1982 under

existing criteria than the five requested. While case load growth has not been as critical in the parish and city courts, the increase has still been dramatic. It is interesting to note that only two new parish and city court judgeships have been created during the last five years.

Improved management techniques and automation help to cope with increased caseload in District, Parish, and City Courts . . .

More and more district, parish and city courts are automating their operations in an attempt to reduce costs. In addition, new managment statistical reports were developed for the district courts in 1982. It is expected that these reports will allow the courts to make better use of their current personnel. Similar forms will be developed for the city courts during 1983.

One interesting example of the efforts being made by the courts to improve their operations while keeping costs down is the successful program undertaken to speed up the flow of criminal appeals. The flow of criminal appeals is monitored by the Court of Appeals Reporting Systems (CARS) in my office. Once CARS indicates that a court reporter has fallen behind or will soon be overloaded with work, the judge and the court reporter in question are called to alert then, to the problem. If the court reporter has so much work that he or she cannot catch up, a reporter from the Supreme court reporter pool is dispatched to the district to assist until the backlog is cleared up. Not only has the flow of criminal appeals been dramatically speeded up, but significant savings have been achieved by creating a central pool of reporters rather than hiring a relief reporter for every court in the state. This innovative program is just one example of how hard work and innovative management techniques are improving our courts.

In 1982 the Louisiana Judicial College continued its goal of improving and increasing judicial education on the state level through seminar's and meetings held throughout the year.

Aside from the annual Spring and Fall meetings of the Louisiana Council of Juvenile Courts, the Louisiana City Court Judges Association, the Louisiana Conference of the Court of Appeal Judges, and the District Judges Association, the Judicial College sponsored several additional seminars.

In February, the College sponsored a seminar on "Strict" Liability for all members of the Louisiana Judiciary. The conceptual framework, practical problems and potential future development and limitations of Louisiana's unique form of "strict" liability were the focus of this intensive seminar. Presentations were made by leading members of the legal profession including Associate Justice James L. Dennis; Professor Alston Johnson, III, and Professor Frank Mariaist, both from the Louisiana State University School of Law; and Herschel Richard and David Robinson, Attorneys at Law.

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In June, the College held a special two day seminar to assist new judges in meeting the challenges of their positions.

The beginning of August brought about the annual seminar for all Court of Appeal and District Court law clerks. The program included sessions on "The Judicial Process" presented by Judge Morris A. Lottinger, Jr. of the 1st Circuit Court of Appeal,"Judge John W. Green and Court Administrator Robert Tyler of the 22nd Judicial District Court. The "Opinion Writing" session was presented by Judge Jasper E. Jones, 2nd Circuit Court of Appeal. Following this presentation a

Under Executive Director Winston R. Day, the College has expanded with new programs to facilitate improvement of the judicial system. One of these is a newsletter entitled Criminal Law and Procedure. This newsletter is written entirely by student research assistants for the purpose of updating judges on criminal procedure. The newsletter is published and mailed to all members of the judiary every two to three weeks.

special writing program was conducted by a group of nationally known experts from the University of Maryland. Also featured was Judge C. Thomas Wicker, Jr., 24th Judicial District Court who spoke on "Ethical Considerations for Law Clerks." The seminar was concluded by a "Roundtable: Perspectives from Former Clerks."

A shortcourse in Louisiana Criminal Law and Procedure was sponsored by the College at the end of August. The seminar topics touched on all areas of Criminal Law and Procedure, such as; Substantive Criminal Law, Search and Seizure, Arrest, Pre-trial Rights, Working with a Central Staff, Institution of Proceedings, Appeals and Supervisory Writs, Opinion Writing in Criminal Cases, Joinder, Severence Arraignments and Guilty Pleas, Pre-trial Motions and Proceedings, U. S. Supreme Court Decisions - The Recent Term, Problems at Trial, Sentencing and Post-Conviction Remedies and Procedures. The faculty arranged for this course included top experts from throughout the state and nation.

The College is presently undertaking the publication of a Benchbook for judges of courts of limited and special jurisdiction. It is envisioned as a source book of information which will be of practical value to judges in their daily work. The project was suggested by Judge Darrell D. White of Baton Rouge City Court, Chairman of the Advisory Committee which will plan and format the book and direct the work of Judicial College research assistants.

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THE JUDICIARY COMMISSION OF LOUISIANA **1982 ANNUAL REPORT**

The Judiciary Commission of Louisiana, created in 1968 by an amendment to Article IX, Constitution of 1921, is continued in existence by Article V, Section 25, Constitution of 1974.

Powers

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may censure, suspend with or without salary, remove from office, or involuntarily retire a judge for willful misconduct relating to his official duty, willful and persistent failure to perform his duty, persistent and public conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice that brings the judicial office into disrepute, and conduct while in office which would constitute a felony, or conviction of a felony.

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may disqualify a judge from exercising any judicial function, without loss of salary, during pendency of disciplinary proceedings in the Supreme Court.

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may retire involuntarily a judge for disability that seriously interferes with the performance of his duties and that is or is likely to become permanent.

The Commission's jurisdiction includes justice and judges of all courts of this state, including commissioners, magistrates, and justices of the peace.

Confidentiality

In accordance with Rule XXIII, Section 23, of the Rules of the Supreme Court, all documents filed with, and evidence and proceedings before the Commission are confidential unless and until the Commission files a recommendation for discipline or retirement with the Supreme Court. The record filed by the Commission with the Supreme Court and proceedings before the Supreme Court are not confidential. Once a recommendation is filed with the Supreme Court, it becomes public as any other case before the Court.

Membership

The Commission consists of nine members who shall serve four-year terms: one court of appeal judge and two district judges selected by the Supreme Court: two attorneys admitted to the practice of law for at least ten years and one attorney admitted to the practice of law for at least three but not more than ten years, selected by the Conference of Court of Appeal judges; and three citizens, not lawyers, judges, or public officials, selected by the Louisiana District Judges Association.

During the year 1982 the Commission received 36 complaints against judges, and 13 complaints were pending from 1981. These complaints included serving in judicial office beyond the mandatory retirement age; allegations of conflict of interest; prejudice against complainants; physical and mental disability; violations of Canon 2 "A Judge Should Avoid Impropriety and the Appearance of Impropriety in All His Activities;" misconduct in exercising judicial discretion; misuse of judicial office, among others, and were filed by litigants, interested citizens, and by the Commission's own motion.

Dispositions

During the year 1982 the Commission disposed of 44 complaints and 5 cases are still pending at the beginning of 1983. These complaints were either closed because of insufficient evidence of judicial misconduct or otherwise resolved to the satisfaction of the Commission; 15 formal investigations were ordered and conducted; 2 formal hearings were held, and one recommendation for involuntary retirement was filed with the Supreme Court.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LAW LIBRARY OF LOUISIANA 1982

A report by Carol Billings, Head Librarian The challenge of operating a successful law library involves striking a balance between steadiness and innovation. While maintaining a reliable, up-to-date collection and providing prompt, unstinting service, the staff must learn about and introduce new materials, technology and methods to make the library grow and improve. Performing this feat, particularly in a period of severe budgetary restraint, is difficult at best.

The chronicle of library activities for 1982 reflects a combination of regular progress, financial restrictions and exciting new developments. Inexorably the daily mail bags and cartons brought not only over 700 bound volumes worth of brand new titles, but also nearly 3,000 complete volumes of continuations, not counting looseleaf supplements and pocket parts. Close to 1,600 volumes worth of microfiches, including 148 new titles, arrived. The total collection now numbers nearly 112,000 volumes. The financial statistics for the end of the 1981/82 fiscal year in June revealed that of more than \$196,000 spent on books and microfiches, 93 percent, over \$183,000, was required just for supplementation and upkeep of the existing collection. Less than \$14,000 remained for new titles. The October executive order requiring a 4.4 percent decrease in state agency budgets deducted \$16,000 from the 1982/83 book budget, thus necessitating numerous cancellations of subscriptions for continuations.

On the brighter side, 1982 was the first full year of the library's participation in the OCLC automated cataloging system. Over 1,100 items were cataloged using the online system. These included 637 new books and periodicals and 532 retrospective items already in the collection. Of this last group, all state reports and session laws and the library's collection of Canadian materials have now been fully cataloged. The online union catalog, which represents the input of hundreds of libraries nation-wide as well as the Library of Congress, also provided information for requesting interlibrary loans of materials not in our collection.

Cataloging procedure was further streamlined this year by the addition of a high speed printer connected to the OCLC terminal. This has eliminated the need for much time-consuming manual copying and typing and also provides a hard-copy bibliographic record of materials found in the system.

Another forward-looking step was the acquisition of a number of important sets of primary source materials in microformat. This form of publication is ideal for voluminous, fast-growing collections because it saves both space and money. Current subscriptions are now in effect for both the legislative acts and attorney general opinions of all 50 states and for the Records and Briefs of the U.S. Supreme Court. In the spring the library became a member of the Law Library Microform Consortium, a non-profit corporation dedicated to the production of low-cost microform materials essential to the legal profession. Through the consortium the library purchased 341 volumes -- some to fill gaps in previously-owned titles and some totally new to the collection. Among the items are the Decisions of the U.S. Copyright Office, The Journals of

the Continental Congress. The Annual Reports of the Attorney General of the U.S., Treaties and Other International Agreements of the U.S., The Department of State Bulletin, Uniform Crime Reports from the U.S. Department of Justice, and The Reports of the Office of the Administrator of the U.S. Courts.

One of the most welcome events of the year was the arrival of the new Wang computer terminal and printer. The equipment is a boon to the staff as a word processor, streamlining a number of typing jobs related to ordering books and subscriptions, editing administrative reports, corresponding with patrons and other libraries, and preparing bibliographies. Because the equipment also possesses data processing capability, it will allow the library eventually to automate a number of clumsy, time-consuming precedures. When "software" has been developed by the Court's data processing experts, we hope to check-in new issues of periodicals, up-dates for loose-leaf publications, pocket parts and supplements "on-line." the by-products of such a system would be extremely valuable. Lists of the library's periodical holdings could be sent not only to other libraries, but also to all parish courthouses, judges' offices, and out of town attorneys:

One of the most exciting developments for the library in '82--and potentially the most helpful--was the founding of the Friends of the Law Library of Louisiana. With the support of Chief Justice Dixon. Justice Dennis, Justice Blanche, Eugene Murret, Paulette Holahan and Dr. Hugh Collins, the library staff assembled a steering committee of judges and attorneys to launch the new organization. It is the purpose of the Friends to facilitate communications between the library staff and its clientele throughout the state. Efforts are underway to publicize the goals of the Friends, and the membership campaign is beginning to bear fruit. As soon as enough funds have accumulated, the Friends plan to finance the installation of a Westlaw computerized local research system, accessible not only to judges, but also to attorneys on a "pay-by-theminute" basis. Contributions will also be earmarked for the purchase of new titles and continuations for the library collection and for restoring deteriorating rare books. Eventually the Friends hope to promote the expansion and improvement of law library service throughout Louisiana by helping to establish or augment parish law libraries.

STATISTICAL APPENDIX

INTRODUCTION TO STATISTICAL SECTION

The statiscial information in this section was compiled from data submitted to the Judicial Administator's Office by the various courts of Louisiana during calendar year 1982.

In 1982, due to the constitutional amendment which gave criminal jurisdiction to the circuit courts of appeal on July 1, 1982, filings in the Supreme Court fell for the first time in more than a decade. During 1982, there were 3,254 matters filed in the Supreme Court, approximately the same level of filings as in 1980. Even with the relief given by the constitutional amendment, the filings in 1982 were 179% greater than the filings ten years ago.

Since 1972, total filings in the Louisiana Courts of Appeal have increased to 4,281 filings (a 79% increase). Total filings during 1982 were 23% greater than in 1981. Civil filings grew by 5% over 1981 and totaled 3,654 filings. The dramatic area of growth was in the criminal area. The circuit courts of appeal assumed criminal jurisdiction on July 1, 1982. During the second half of 1982, there were 301 criminal appeals and 326 criminal writs filed in the courts of appeal.

The past 10 years have witnessed a 100% increase in the combined civil and criminal filings in the district courts of Louisiana. During 1982, there were 520,781 civil and criminal filings in the district courts. Of these 160,801 were civil filings and 359,980 were criminal filings. Civil filings during 1982 were up 3% over 1981, but criminal filings decreased by 3% (No comparison of 1982 juvenile filings in the district courts is attempted since juvenile filings were not contained in this report during the last several years). The number of civil jury trials remained virtually unchanged during 1982 (687 in 1982 vs. 689 in 1981). However, the number of criminal jury trials rose sharply from 1073 in 1981 to 1255 in 1982. This is an increase of 17%.

In 1982, filings in Louisiana City and Parish Courts continued to grow. The 1982 filings were 6% greater than in 1981 and 45% greater than in 1975. As in past years, the bulk of these filings (500,503) were traffic related. However, the city and parish courts also received a total of 250,879 civil, juvenile, and criminal (non-traffic) filings.
