
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

INTRODUCTION

Since 1978, the Uniform Crime Reporting program has strived to depict the crime problem in Utah. This program provides a statewide view of crime based on the submission of statistics by law enforcement agencies throughout Utah. The success of UCR is a testimony to the cooperative attitude of Utah's peace officers.

OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the UCR program is to collect, analyze, and disseminate information that will present a more relevant and timely picture of criminality in our state. This publication will inform the Governor, Legislature, other government officials, and the public as to the nature of the crime problem in Utah.

REPORTING PROCEDURES

Each agency is responsible for compiling its own crime reports and submitting them to the Uniform Crime Reporting program. The program, in an effort to maintain quality and uniformity in the data received, furnishes full-time field representatives who provide training in Uniform Crime Reporting procedures. All contributors also are furnished with the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook which outlines in detail procedures for scoring and classifying offenses. Utah UCR forms and tally sheets are made available to facilitate the periodic tabulation of desired data.

LIMITATIONS OF A UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

The Uniform Crime Reporting program has been subject to much criticism during its history and, while many of these commentaries have been valid, at least some of the shortcomings are understandable when it is remembered that the program has been developed to furnish management information primarily for law enforcement agencies. The Uniform Crime Reports are not a court or corrections statistical program. They are not designed to furnish an overview of the workings of our entire criminal justice system, nor are they able to give a complete picture of law enforcement activity.

The main goal of the UCR program is to furnish police administrators with a measure of their activities and operational problems as indicated by the number of reported offenses, arrests, clearances, and the like. Therefore, much of the criticism of the UCR program itself is weakened when its stated primary purpose is kept in mind. Uniform Crime Report data is the best crime information currently available since it reflects the key events (criminal offenses) that set in motion the various phases of our criminal justice process.

DEFINITIONS

To provide for uniformity nationwide in the reporting of these offenses, standardized definitions were adopted. These Part I Index Crimes are defined as follows:

- 1A. Murder The willful (non-negligent) killing of a human being.
- 1B. Manslaughter The killing of a human being by the act, procurement, or culpable negligence of another.*
- 2. Forcible Rape The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.
- 3. Robbery The felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence and/or putting him in fear.
- 4. Aggravated Assault An attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another.**
- 5. Burglary An unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny.
- 6. Larceny/Theft The unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to permanently deprive him of ownership.
- 7. Motor Vehicle Theft The larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle.
- 8. Arson Willful or malicious burning with or without intent to defraud. Includes attempts.

CLEARANCES

For UCR purposes, a crime index offense is cleared when a law enforcement agency has identified the offender, there is enough evidence to charge him, and he is actually taken into custody. The arrest of one person can clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in the process of clearing one crime. Clearances are also recorded in exceptional circumstances when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes formal charges against the offender.



CRIME & LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

Crime, as an outgrowth of society, remains a social problem of grave concern and the police are limited in their role to its suppression and detection. This problem is stated in the report "The Challenge of Crime in a Free Society".

"But the fact that the police deal daily with crime does not mean that they have unlimited power to prevent it, or reduce it, or deter it. The police did not create and cannot resolve the social conditions that stimulate crime. They did not start and cannot stop the convulsive social changes that are taking place in America. They do not enact the laws that they are required to enforce, nor do they dispose of the criminals they arrest. The police are only one part of the government; and the government is only one part of society. Insofar as crime is a social phenomenon, crime prevention is the responsibility of every part of society. The criminal process is limited to case by case operations, one criminal or one crime at a time".

OFFICERS & THE COMMUNITY

Caution should be exercised in using rates for comparative purposes since a wide variety of factors dictate the number of officers necessary to various law enforcement agencies. The same conditions and factors that affect the amount and type of crime in a given community also must be considered in the employment of personnel. Officer numbers are best determined by citizens and public officials of a community based upon the level of service they need and are willing to pay for.

CRIME RATES FOR INDEX OFFENSES

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program provides data for police executives to measure local problems. To facilitate this function, the local data must be converted to terms of rates and percentages.

CRIME RATES

One of the most meaningful crime statistics is the crime rate. This rate is the number of Part I offenses per 1,000 inhabitants. This rate can be calculated regardless of the number of inhabitants in any city, town, or county.

In computing crime rates by county, population estimates for individual counties were prepared using current census reports.

During 1981, some law enforcement agencies did submit fewer than the solicited 12 months of offense reports. Therefore, offense counts were estimated for agencies within the county which failed to submit complete records for the year. University and College crime offense counts were added to the respective county totals.

No attempt has been made to incorporate either transient population or other factors which contribute to the ratio and type of crime in a given area. Any effort to make comparisons of crime rates between one area and another should recognize these population changes and varying environmental factors.
