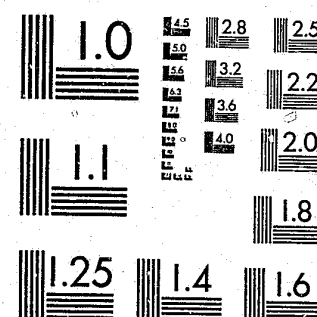

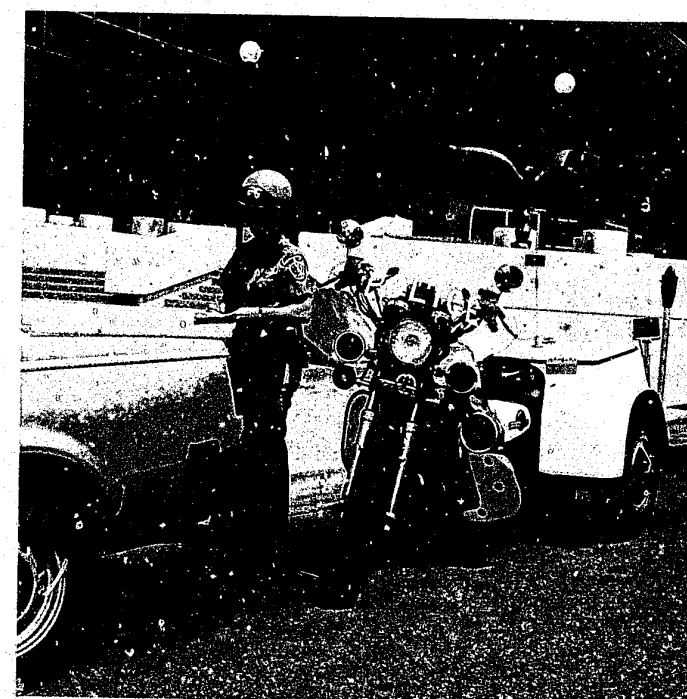

Dear Mr. Meiszer:

In 1982, 31,811 total Index Crimes were reported to the Austin Police Department. This represents a 3% increase over the 30,867 Index Crimes reported in 1981. In the Violent Crime category, the Murder rate jumped 46%. Murder is not a predictable crime; however, it has generally shown a steady increase over the years, consistent with population increases. The total Violent Crimes: Murder, Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault, registered a 1% decrease in 1982. The Property Crimes: Burglary, Theft and Auto Theft, showed a 3% increase over 1981.

The new police facility has brought with it the improved morale and productivity that was anticipated and so greatly needed. A goal of the police department for 1982 was to improve the 20% clearance rate for Index Crimes in 1981. Police employees responded to this goal and through their great effort in concentrating on clearing cases we accomplished a 32% clearance rate in 1982. This is the best clearance rate since 1973. The regional average for case clearances in cities 250,000 or more was 22% for 1982.

Three wheel motorcycles were received in June, providing more efficient traffic control during peak traffic periods. Since the inception of 9-1-1 in March, this service received an average of 26,893 calls per month. For the first time in departmental history, two female officers earned their promotion to Sergeant and are assigned as Detectives in the Criminal Investigation Bureau. In October, the police department was given an award for having the most outstanding Crime Prevention Operation in Texas. Two Crime Prevention officers received individual awards as Crime Prevention Specialist and Austin's Finest Crime Prevention Officer. The Crime Stoppers program continued to be an important operation for case clearances and a leader among Crime Stoppers Programs.

Traffic safety has always been of paramount concern with the department. In 1982 there were 52 fatal collisions of which 34 (65.3%) were alcohol related. To combat this alarming number of drunk drivers involved in fatal traffic collisions, the department obtained a state funded DWI Enforcement Program (STEP). This program places additional officers on the street at strategic times and places. I continued to meet with press and community groups to improve press relations and community understanding of police functions.

Your support and that of the City Council during the past year was appreciated. I will be looking forward to working with you and the City Council in 1983.

ACQUISITIONS

Organizational Structure

The Chief of Police is appointed by and directly responsible to the City Manager for the efficient operation and conduct of the Austin Police Department.

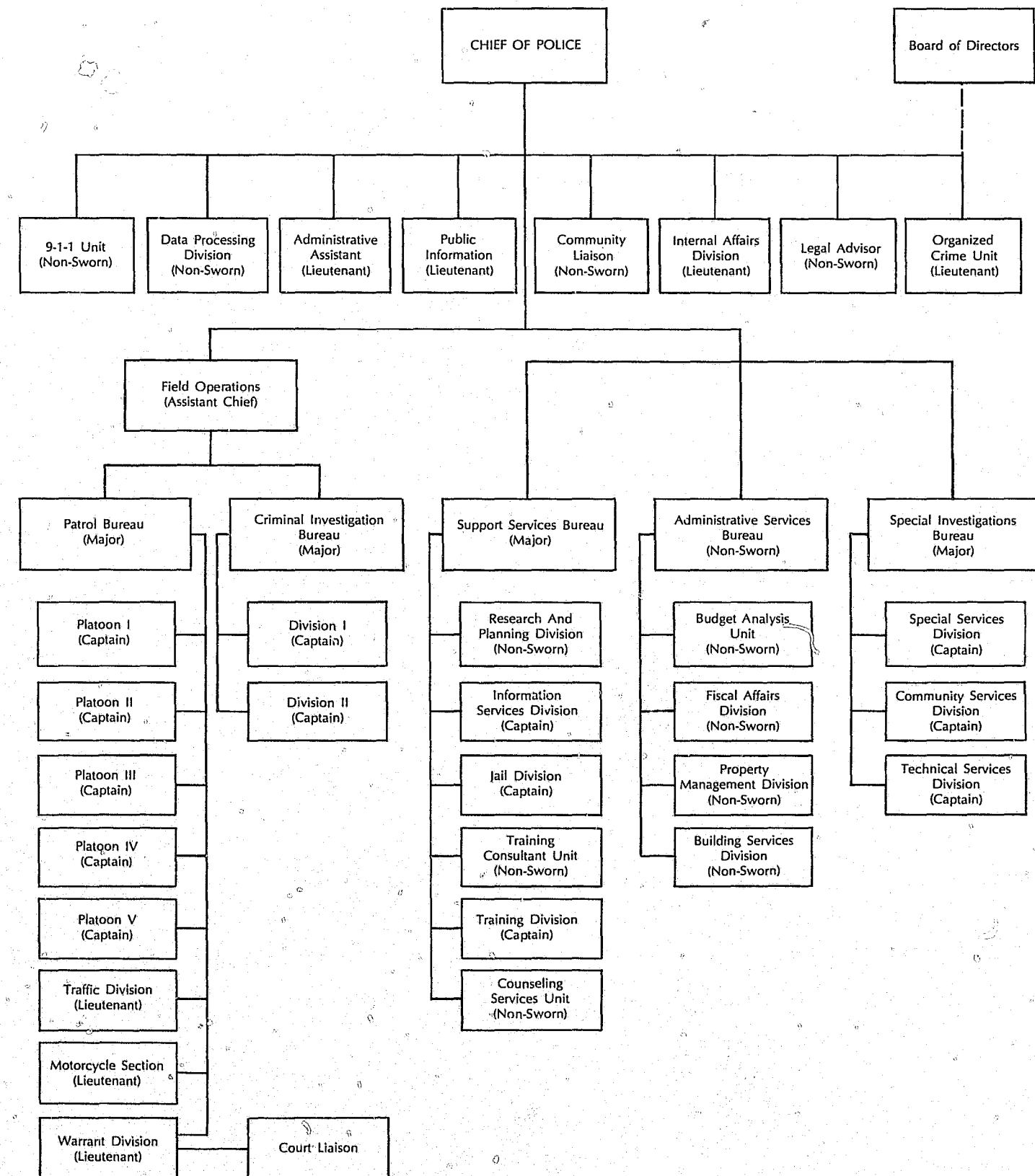
The Assistant Chief of Police is responsible for the operation and conduct of the Austin Police Department in the absence of the Chief.

After the Chief and Assistant Chief, the line of succession in the Austin Police Department is by rank and seniority in rank beginning with Major.

The Chief has divided the Austin Police Department into five major operations:

- I. Staff Services
The Chief of Police, Assistant Chief, Bureau Commanders, Administrative Assistant, Lieutenant in charge of Internal Affairs, Legal Advisor, 911 System, Community Liaison, Organized Crime Unit, Press Information Office, Data Processing, and their respective personnel, comprise the Staff Services Program within the Austin Police Department. This program is responsible for establishing departmental policy, directing law enforcement activities, suppressing crime, apprehending offenders, recovering property, enforcing State and Federal laws as well as ordinances of the City.
- II. Field Operations
The Assistant Chief of Police is directly responsible for the Field Operations. Under Field Operations is two of the major Bureaus: The Criminal Investigation Bureau (CIB) and Patrol Bureau, commanded by Majors.
- III. Support Services Bureau
The Support Services Bureau under command of a Major, has among its responsibilities the direction of Research and Planning, Counseling Services, Jail Operations, Training Division and Information Services that includes Data Entry, Communications and Identification Division.
- IV. Administrative Services Bureau
The Administrative Services Bureau, under a non-sworn director, is responsible for the functions of Administration and Personnel, Budget Analysis, Fiscal Affairs, Property Management and Building Services.
- V. Special Investigations Bureau
The Special Investigations Bureau, under the command of a Major, is responsible for the activities of Narcotics, Special Crimes, Special Missions, Community Relations, Crime Prevention, Recruiting, Crime Stoppers and Technical Services Division which includes the Photo and Crime Labs and Polygraph.

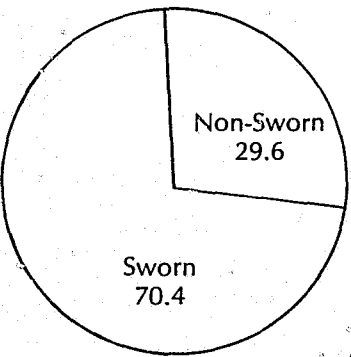

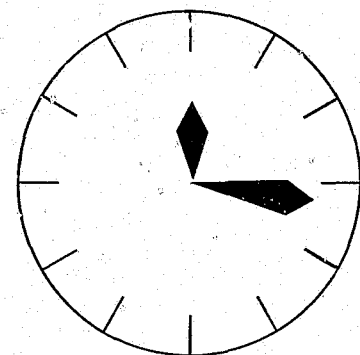

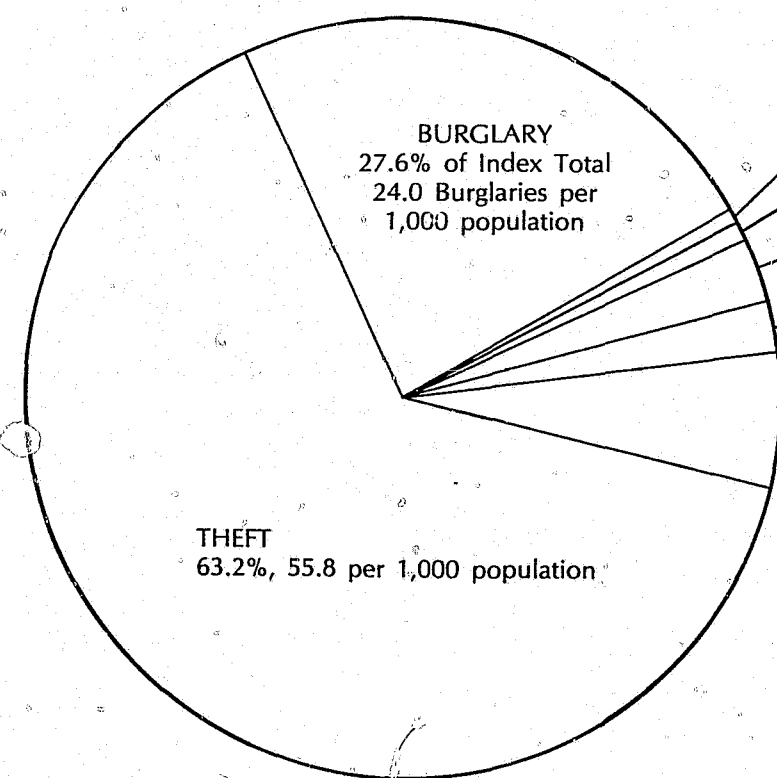

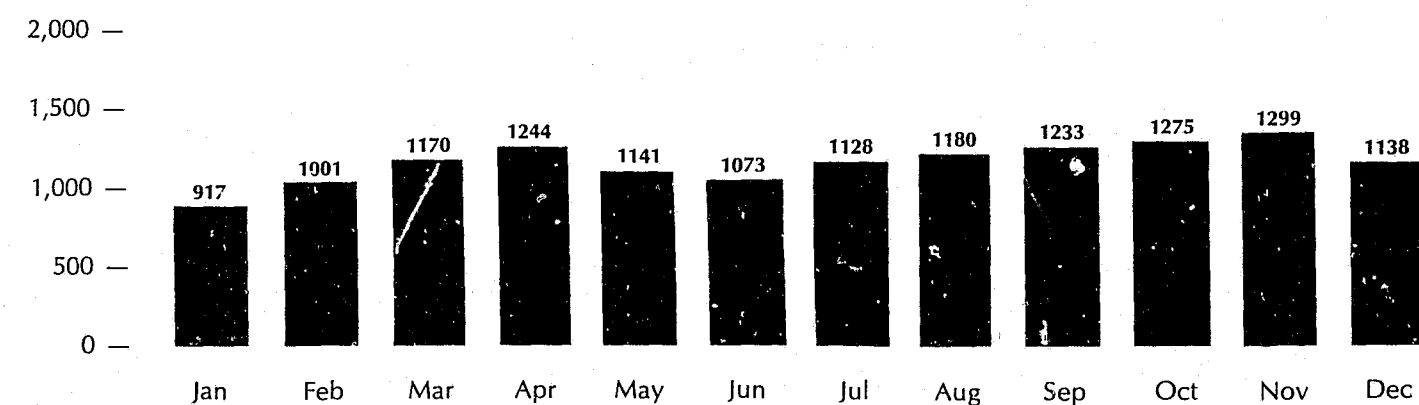
Total Motor Vehicle Collisions by Month

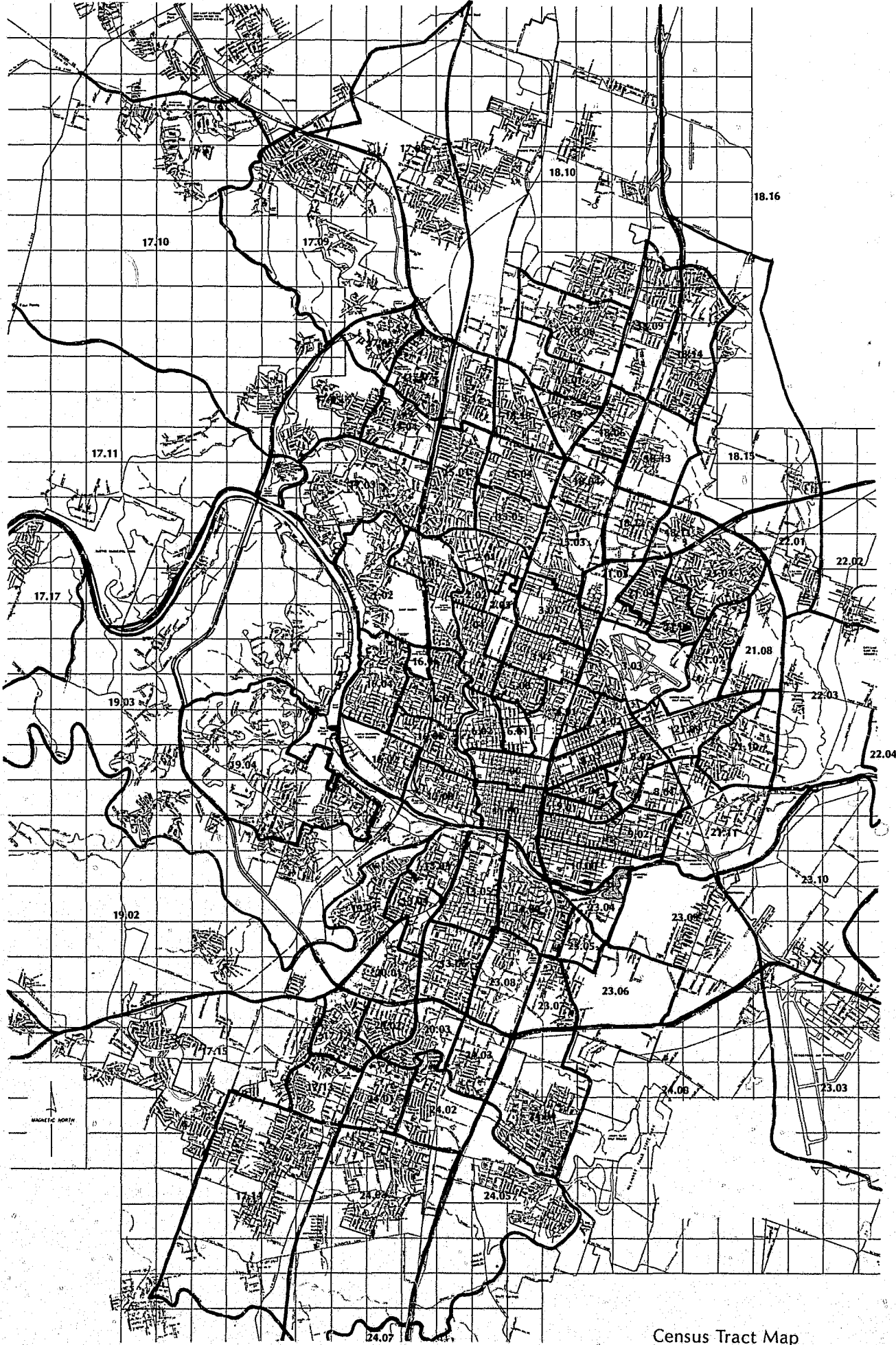

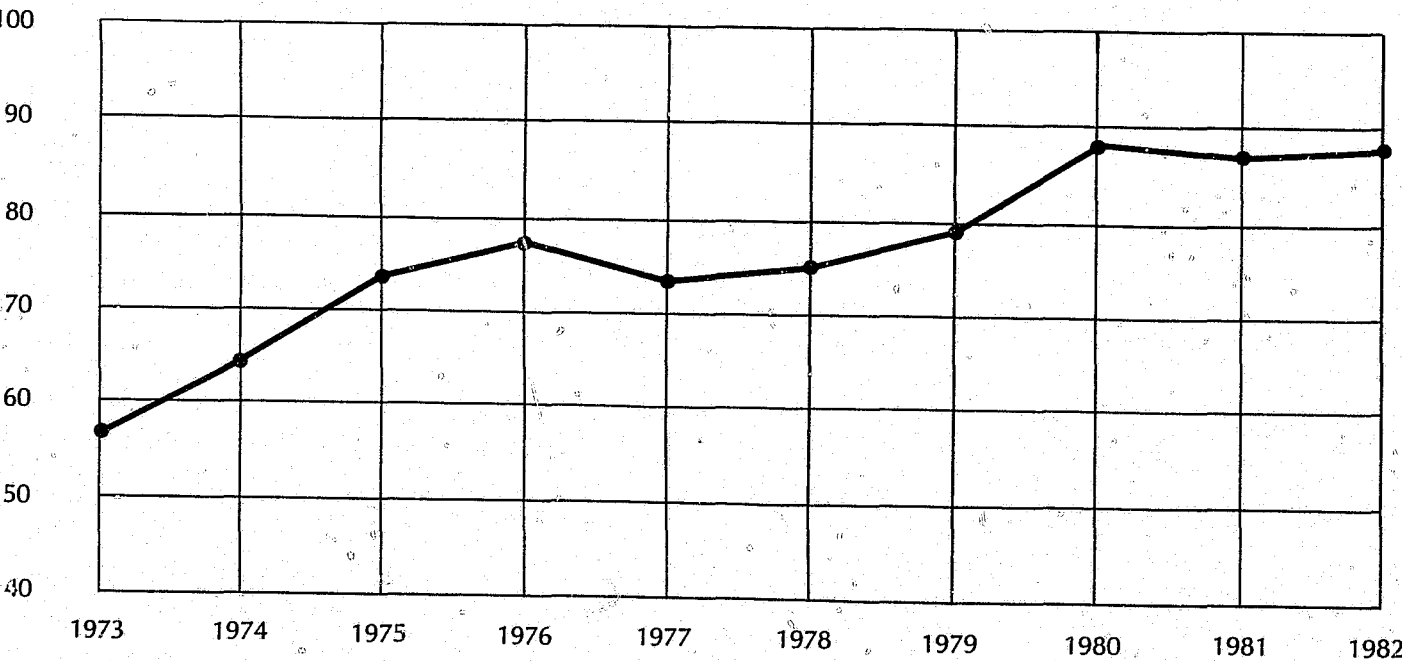


Census Tract Map

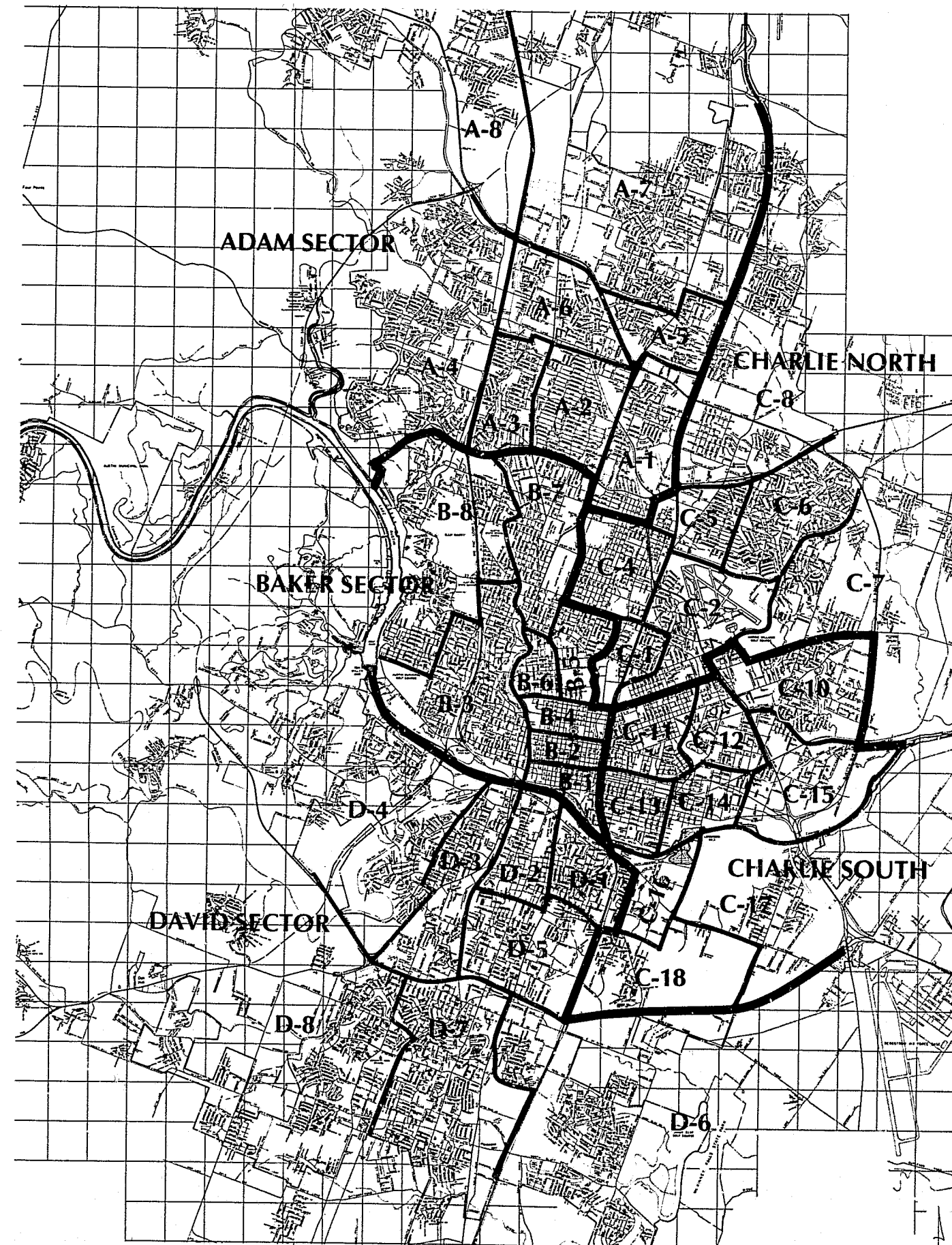

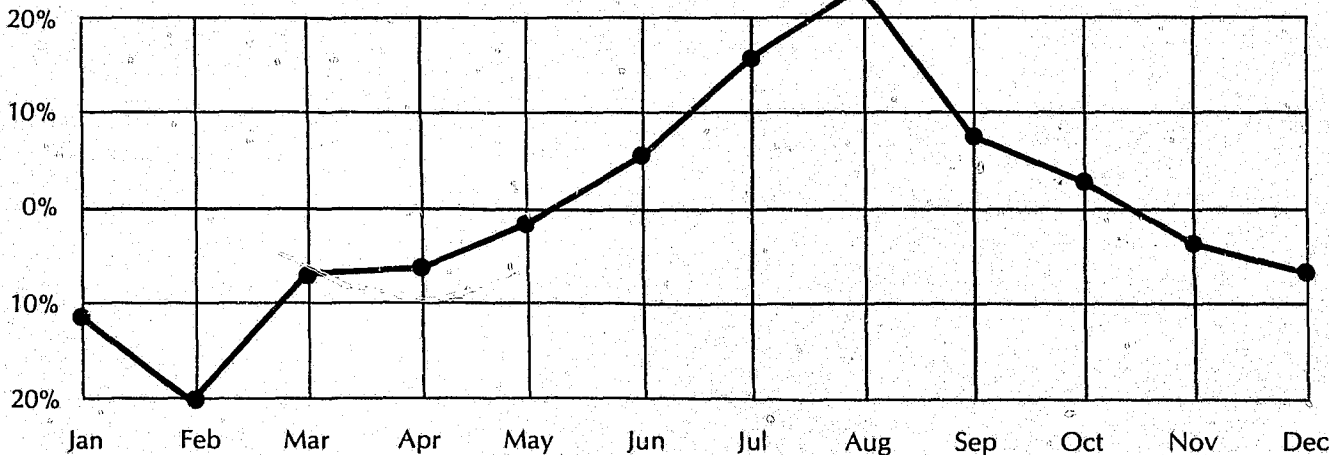
