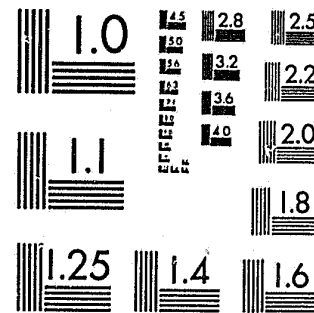

PRISONERS AND THEIR VOCATIONAL INTERESTS

Using the CAREER ASSESSMENT INVENTORY by Charles B. Johansson of the National Computer Systems, Minneapolis, we tested 37 inmates detained at a Community Correctional Center. The goals intended in giving the inventory were, firstly, that of determining and classifying the major vocational preferences of a special targeted group of inmates enrolled in educational programs available at the Center, and, secondly, of planning a meaningful career oriented learning programs.

The Idea

Our Community Correctional Center offers a special program in Computer Literacy, using a Commodore/Pet 4016. This program has been perceived as something that would have trained the participants to usable/marketable skills. Its success and favor amongst the inmates generated the desire of finding out more about the inmates's preferences in career-choices. We decided to find a ready-made tool to assess these preferences, and we found it in the inventory list created by Johansson.

The tool

The Johansson's inventory intends to measure vocational interests and not to test individual abilities. It is composed by three parts, that constitute a continuous sequence of 305 questions. The three parts in this inventory are:

- i. ACTIVITIES, with questions # 1 through 151;
- ii. SCHOOL SUBJECTS, with questions #152 through 194;
- iii. OCCUPATIONS, with questions # 195 through 305.

The instructions for each one of the three parts are:

- i. Show your interest for each type of activity. Just think about whether you would like it or dislike it, even though you may not have the training. Work fast.
- ii. As you did in part i., show your interest in these school subjects, even though you may not have studied them.
- iii. For each occupation listed below, show whether or not you would like that kind of work. Do not think about the salary, or whether you would be good at the job, but whether you would like or dislike that type of work.

The preferences are given by selecting one of the five statements:

- "L" = if you like the activity very much;
"l" = if you like it somewhat;
"I" = if you are indifferent or undecided or neutral;
"d" = if you dislike it somewhat;
"D" = if you dislike it very much.

The goals of the inventory are suggested on the front page of the inventory form. It says:

By comparing your answers with satisfied workers in various occupations, it is possible to determine whether you would like certain occupations or not (...). Your answers will be used to help find work and career areas that will be satisfying to you.

The results

Though the results will be used particularly for individual career counseling and educational planning, they were also cumulatively combined in order to obtain a composite profile of the inmates's preferences.

The nature of the target group

The tested group of 37 inmates are a part of the pre-sentenced population present at the adult facility on December 1982. They were selected out of 80 students, on the basis of their willingness to take the test and of their level of reading ability. The general education level of this group was between 8 and 10 grades, according to the reading and math scores in the WRAT (Wide Range Achievement Test). Their criminal charges did not enter into the considered elements for the selection. Their age

composition was the following one: 6 inmates were between 18 and 21; 26 were between 22 and 29; 5 were between 32 and 38.

Comments

Though this study was very limited in its pretensions, it revealed itself to be of a very high interest and use. A certain number of [do's] and [don'ts] could be derived in planning career oriented programs for persons in limited and controlled environments, such as jails, detention facilities and correctional centers.

The vocational interests within this category of persons seem to center around those activities, subjects and occupations that would likely offer an outlet, an alternative to the constraints and the limitations of their present contextual living arrangements. The high preference for physical or sociological new spaces is of great moment, considering the nature of the tested sample. Travelling, camping, driving; meeting new friends; becoming member of groups or clubs, in our sample, seem to be choices dictated by unconscious desires (daydreaming, allucinations, delusions,...). The lesson to be derived from this is that perhaps all tests given to persons under "controlled environments" may not reflect their "real"(permanent?) likes or dislikes.

It would be useful to compare these results with those derived from the assessment of vocational interests of a composite pool of the general population, let's say, by testing the members of an adult evening class. A parallel analysis between the two groups could probably clarify the questions here raised.
