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REPORTING PROGRAM



CRIME FACTORS

Statistics gathered under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program are submitted by the law enforcement agencies of Texas and project a statewide view of crime. Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community.

Crime, as an outgrowth of society, remains a social problem of grave concern and the police are limited in their role to its suppression and detection. As stated by the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Criminal Justice in their report "The Challenge of Crime in a Free Society" (1967 - Page 92);

"But the fact that the police deal daily with crime does not mean that they have unlimited power to prevent it, or reduce it, or deter it. The police did not create and cannot resolve the social conditions that stimulate crime. They did not start and cannot stop the convulsive social changes that are taking place in America. They do not enact the laws that they are required to enforce, nor do they dispose of the criminals they arrest. The police are only one part of the government; and the government is only one part of society. Insofar as crime is a social phenomenon, crime prevention is the responsibility of every part of society. The criminal process is limited to case by case operations, one criminal or one crime at a time."

Set forth below are some of the conditions which will, by type and volume, affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.

Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.

Economic status of the population.

Relative stability of population, including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.

Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.

Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.

Standards governing appointments to the police force.

Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.

Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems.

The Administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

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HISTORY OF UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of the Federal Bureau of Investigation provides a nationwide view of crime based on the submission of police statistics by city, county, and state law enforcement agencies throughout the country.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program is the outgrowth of a need for a national and uniform compliation of law enforcement statistics. A voluntary national Program of collection of crime counts was initiated in 1930 by the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). In that same year, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) was authorized by the Congress of the United States to serve as the national clearinghouse for statistical information on crime.

Crime reports are obtained from law enforcement agencies throughout the Nation based on uniform classifications and procedures of reporting. In an effort to provide as complete a picture of crime in the United States as possible, the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the IACP chose to obtain data on offenses that became known to police. A meaningful overview of crime was available through examination of seven offenses which were selected because of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence and likelihood of being reported to police. These offenses, known as the Crime Index Offenses, are murder, forcilbe rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft.

To provide for uniformity nationwide in the reporting of these offenses, standardized definitions were adopted. This standardization was necessary to overcome the variations in definitions of criminal offenses in the states and localities. Reporting agencies are required to interpret local criminal acts and law violations in the context of these definitions prior to submission of their counts to the FBI. Because of the differences among the state codes, there is no possibility in a Program such as this to distinguish between crimes by designations such as "felony" or "misdemeanor".

The Committee on Uniform Crime Records, IACP, continues to serve in an advisory capacity to the FBI in the operation of this Program.

The National Sheriff's Association (NSA) in June, 1966, established a Committee on Uniform Crime Records to serve in an advisory capacity to the NSA membership and the national Uniform Crime Reporting Program. This Committee actively encourages sheriffs throughout the country to fully participate in this important Program.

Committees on Uniform Crime Reporting within state law enforcement associations are active in promoting interest in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, fostering widespread and more intelligent use of uniform crime statistics, and lending assistance to contributors when the need exists.

In recent years, the FBI has actively assisted individual states in the development of statewide programs of police statistics compatible with the national system. These state statistical programs provide the advantage of increased coverage of law enforcement agencies due to state mandatory reporting reguirements. The state systems also can provide direct and frequent service to law enforcement agencies in assuring completeness and quality of information provided by them.

The conditions under which these systems are developed provide for consistency and comparability in the data submitted to the national Program. They also permit regular and timely reporting of the national crime data. These conditions are:

(1) The State Program must conform to the national Uniform Crime Reports standards, definition, and information required. This, of course, does not prohibit the state from collecting other statistical data beyond the national collection. (2) The state criminal justice agency must have a proven, effective, mandatory, statewide Program and have instituted acceptable quality control procedures. (3) Coverage within the state by a state agency must be, at least, equal to that attained by national Uniform Crime Reports. (4) The state agency must have adequate field staff assigned to conduct audits and to assist contributing agencies in record practices and crime reporting procedures. (5) The state agency must furnish to the FBI all of the detailed data regularly collected by the FBI in the form of duplicate returns, computer printouts, and/or magnetic tape. (6) The state must have the proven capability (tested over a period of time) to supply all the statistical data required to the FBI in time to meet national Uniform Crime Reports publication deadlines. (7) The FBI will continue its internal procedures to editing and reviewing individual agency reports for both completeness and quality. (8) The FBI will continue to have direct contact with individual contributors within the state where necessary in connection with crime reporting matters, but will coordinate such contacts with the state agency. (9) Upon request, the FBI will continue its training programs within the state with respect to police records and crime reporting procedures. For mutual benefit these will be coordinated with the state agency.

THE TEXAS UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

Introduction

On January 1, 1976, Texas joined a growing number of states that have adopted the Uniform Crime Report as the official statewide crime report. The Department of Public Safety has accepted the responsibility to collect, validate and tabulate Uniform Crime Reports from all reporting jurisdictions in Texas. A Uniform Crime Reporting Bureau was established within the Identification and Criminal Records Division (now Crime Records Division) to coordinate the collection, processing and dissemination of data regarding the extent of major crime in Texas.

The fundamental objective of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program is to produce a reliable set of criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management. This compiled data is also intended for the use and information of other professionals and scholars who have an interest in the crime problem. At the same time, this information is important as a reference source for the public as an indicator of the crime factor in our society.

The means utilized to attain these objectives are: (1) To measure the extent, fluctuation, distribution, and nature of crime in Texas through presentation of data on the seven Crime index Offenses. (2) To measure the total volume of serious crime known to police. (3) To show the activity and coverage of law enforcement agencies through arrest counts and police employee strength data.

Field Representation

In compliance with national guidelines for field representation, the Texas Crime Reporting Program has assigned five persons to assist local agencies in crime reporting procedures.

Working out of Austin, each field representative is responsible for a specific area (see map on page 5) to assist local police agencies in the resolution of reporting problems, train new personnel and contact non-reporting agencies to enlist their participation in the Program.

Reporting Procedures

Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own crime reports and submitting them to the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. The Program, in an effort to maintain quality and uniformity in the data received, furnishes full-time field representatives who provide training in Uniform Crime Reporting procedures. All contributors also are furnished with the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook which outlines in detail procedures for scoring and classifying offenses. The Handbook illustrates and discusses the monthly and annual reporting forms as well as the numerous taily sheets made available to facilitate the periodic tabulation of desired data.

On a monthly basis, law enforcement agencies report the number of offenses known to them in the following crime categories: murder, forcible rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft. The count of offenses is taken from the records of complaints received by law enforcement agencies from victims, witnesses, or other sources, or discovered by agencies during their own operations. Complaints determined by subsequent investigations to be unfounded are eliminated from the count. The resulting number of "offenses known to law enforcement officials" in these crime categories is reported without regard to whether anyone is arrested, stolen property is recovered, local prosecutive policy, or any other consideration. Municipal and county agencies also report, on a monthly basis, supplemental offense information such as the value of property stolen and recovered, circumstances surrounding homicides and other pertinent data. Additionally, monthly reports of persons arrested are submitted. These reports provide information concerning the age, sex and race of all persons arrested by each individual law enforcement agency.

Verification Procedures

An obvious concern in the collection of crime statistics is the validity and uniformity of the data received. With the receipt of monthly reports covering 755 jurisdictions, prepared on a voluntary basis, the problems of attaining uniformity are readily apparent. It is standard operating procedure to examine each incoming report not only for arithmetical accuracy but also, and possibly of even more importance, for reasonableness as a possible indication of errors.

Numerous checks and cross checks are used to insure the accuracy of the reports. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by the UCR report verifiers without contacting the contributor. Necessary arithmetical adjustments or unusual variations are noted by the UCR verifiers and brought to the attention of the submitting agency by direct contact through a UCR field representative. Upon resubmission of a corrected return from a field representative, the forms are re-verified. Upon completion of all individual form verification processes, summary statistics in various forms are derived.

A great deal of the success of Texas' UCR Program to this point has been due to the full time field staff assigned to assist local agencies in crime reporting procedures. Personal contact is invaluable to the accuracy and uniformity of UCR data received.

OFFENSES IN UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

Offenses in Uniform Crime Reporting are divided into two groupings designated as Part I and Part II offenses. Crime Index offenses are included among the Part I offenses. Offense and arrest information is reported for the Part I offenses on a monthly basis, whereas only arrest information is reported for Part II offenses.

The Part I offenses are as follows:

1. Criminal homicide. (a) Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter: All willful felonious homicides as distinguished from deaths caused by negligence. Excludes attempts to kill. assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, or justifiable homicides. Justifiable homicides are limited to: (1) The killing of a person by a law enforcement officer in line of duty; and (2) The killing of a person in the act of committing a felony by a private citizen. (b) Manslaughter by negligence: Any death which the police investigation estabilished was primarily attributable to gross negligence of some individual other than the victim.

2. Forcible rape.-The carnal knowledge of a female, forcibly and against her will in the categories of rape by force, assault to rape, and attempted rape. Excludes statutory offenses (no force used-victim under age of consent),

3. Robbery.-Stealing or taking anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person by force or by violence or by putting in fear, such as strong-arm robbery, stickups, armed robbery, assaults to rob, and attempts to rob.

4. Aggravated assault. Assault with intent to kill or for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury by shooting, cutting, stabbing, maiming, poisoning, scalding, or by the use of acids, explosives, or other means. Excludes simple assaults.

5. Burglary-breaking or entering.-Burglary, house-breaking, safecracking, or any breaking or unlawful entry of a structure with the intent to commit a felony or a theft. Includes attempted forcible entry.

6. Larceny-theft (except motor vehicle theft) .-- The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Thefts of bicycles, automobile accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or any stealing of property or article which is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Excludes embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, worthless checks, etc.

7. Motor vehicle theft.-Unlawful taking or stealing or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is a self-propelled vehicle that travels on the surface but not on rails. Specifically excluded from this category are motor boats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.

8. Arson.-Willful or malicious burning with or without intent to defraud, includes attempts.

The Part II offenses are:

9. Other assaults (simple).-Assaults which are not of an aggravated nature.

10. Forgery and counterfeiting. Making, altering, uttering or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true. Includes attempts.

11. Fraud.-Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Includes bed checks except forgeries and counterfeiting. Also includes larceny by ballee.

12. Embezzlement.-Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

13. Stolen property; buying, receiving, possessing.-Buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property and attempts.

14. Vandalism.-Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or person having custody or control.

15. Weapons; carrying, possessing, etc.-All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers. Includes attempts.

16. Prostitution and commercialized vice.-Sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts, such as prostitution. keeping a bawdy house, procuring, transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

17. Sex offenses (except forcible rape, prostitution, and commercialized vice). Statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Includes attempts.

18. Narcotic drug laws. Offenses relating to narcotic drugs. such as unlawful possession, sale, use, growing and manufacturing of narcotic drugs.

19. Gambling.-Promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal dambling.

20. Offenses against the family and children.-Nonsupport neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

21. Driving under the influence.-Driving or operating any motor vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

22. Liquor laws.-State or local liquor law violations, except "drunkenness" (class 23) and "driving under the influence" (class 21). Excludes Federal violations.

23. Drunkenness.-Drunkenness or intoxication.

24. Disorderly conduct.-Breach of the peace.

25. Vagrancy.-Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

26. All other offenses.-All violations of state or local laws, except classes 1-25 and traffic.

27. Suspicion.-Arrests for no specific offense and released without formal charges being placed.

28. Curfew and loltering laws (juveniles).-Offenses relating to violation of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

29. Runaway (juveniles) .- Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes as runaways.







Offense Estimation

Because a few Texas law enforcement agencies experienced difficulty in finalizing their 1982 crime reports prior to state and national release deadlines, it has been necessary to estimate the number of offenses representing .1% of the states population. While it would be impractical to continually revise the state totals it has been possible to update the Crime by Contributor section of this publication.

Volume

During the calendar year of 1982, there was an estimated total of 962,260 Index Offenses in Texas. The crimes in this group are all serious, either by their very nature or because of the frequency with which they occur, and present a common enforcement problem to all police. Crimes within this index can be further categorized as Violent Crimes, which include Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery, and Aggravated Assault, or as Property Crimes, which consist of Burglary, Larceny-Theft, and Motor Vehicle Theft. In addition to the above offenses, there were 8,201 cases of arson reported.

Violent Crimes

Violent Crimes involve the element of personal confrontation between the perpetrator and the victim. Because of their nature, Violent Crimes are considered more serious than Property Crimes. These Offenses for 1982 made up 9.2% of the Crime Index Total.

An estimated 88,101 Violent Crimes were reported during 1982. This figure represents a 12.3% increase over the crimes reported in 1981. A review of the distribution of the Violent Crimes discloses that Murder accounted for .3%, Rape .7%, Robbery 3.5%, and Aggravated Assault 4.7% of the Total Index.

Property Crimes

The estimated number of Property Crimes reported during 1982 was approximately 10 times greater than the number of Violent Crimes reported. As a group, Property Crimes made up 90.8% of the Total Index.

Property Crimes increased 7.5% over 1981 UCR figures. Burglary accounted for 32.7% of all property offenses and 29.7% of the Total Crime Index. Larceny Theft accounted for

57.3% of all property offenses and 52.1% of the Total Crime Index. Motor Vehicle Theft made up 10% of all property offenses and 9% of the Crime Index Total.

Clearances

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a Crime Index Offense is cleared when a law enforcement agency has identified the offender, there is enough evidence to charge him and he is actually taken into custody. The arrest of one person can clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in the process of clearing one offense. Clearances are also recorded in exceptional circumstances when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes formal charges against the offender.

Law enforcers in Texas cleared by arrest or exceptional clearance 23% of all Index Offenses reported to them in 1982. 57% of the Violent Crimes were cleared while 20% of all Non-Violent Crimes were cleared.

Reports submitted by the law enforcement agencies of the State during 1982 disclosed that, in the area of Violent Crime, they were successful in solving 77% of the Murder offenses, 56% of the Forcible Rapes, 36% of all Robberies, and 66% of all Aggravated Assaults. They showed clearances in Property Crimes of 17% in Burglary, 21% in Larceny-Theft, and 24% in Motor Vehicle Theft. Arson has an 20% clearance rate statewide.

The relatively high clearance rate for Violent Crimes as compared to the Non-Violent Property Crimes is in part attributable to the element of confrontation between the victim and the perpetrator which contributes to identification of the offender.

in 1982, persons under the age of 18 represented 14.5% of all cases solved. They accounted for 5.4% of all Violent Crime Clearances, while being responsible for 16.9% in the Non-Violent Crime categories. The involvement rate of persons under 18 years of age was 4.6% for Murder, 6.4% for Forcible Rape, 5.9% for Robbery, and 5.2% for Aggravated Assault. In the Non-Violent Crime categories, this age group accounted for 17.2% of the burglaries, 17.6% of the Larceny-Thefts, and 11.5% of the Motor Vehicle Thefts.

Stolen Property Value

The Total Value of Property Reported Stolen during 1982 in Texas was estimated at \$927,052,176.

MURDER

Murder, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, is the willful killing of one human being by another. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime is included here. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are also excluded. The classification of this offense, as for all other Crime Index offenses, is based upon police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body.

Volume

The estimated number of murders in 1982 was 2463. Throughout the State, law enforcement agencies continue to be successful in clearing or solving by arrest a greater percentage of murders than any other Crime Index offense. In 1982, 77 percent of the murders were cleared.

The law enforcement agencies which participate in Uniform Crime Reporting cooperate in providing additional information regarding homicide so that a more in-depth analysis of this offense can be made. Through a supplemental reporting system, information is provided regarding the age, sex, and race of the victim and the offender; the weapon used in the murder; the relationship of the victim to the offender; and the circumstances surrounding the offense. All tables reflect actual offenses as well as the victims of justifiable homicides.

RAPE

Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female through the use of force or the threat of force. Assaults to commit forcible rape are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) is not counted in this category. Crime counts in this offense classification are broken down by actual forcible rapes and attempted forcible rapes.

Forcible rape differs from other violent crimes in that the victim, in many cases, is hesitant in reporting the offense to police. The rigors of court procedure, embarrassment and fear of any accompanying stigma have a deterrent effect on the victim's willingness to make the crime known to police. The presence of a prior relationship between victim and perpetrator makes the determination of the act of force difficult to establish, and the usual clandestine nature of the offense presents a problem in verification.

Volume

Cases of forcible rape reported to law enforcement agencies in Texas in 1982 totaled an estimated 6,814.

Robbery is a vicious type of crime which takes place in the presence of the victim to obtain property or a thing of value from a person by use of force or threat of force. Assault to commit robbery and attempts are included. This is a violent crime and frequently results in injury to the victim.

Volume

An estimated 33,603 cases of robbery occurred in Texas in 1982. The average value loss in each robbery incident was approximately \$779.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Aggravated assault is defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or serious bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Volume

Cases of aggravated assault in Texas in 1982 totaled 45,221. The use or attempted use of dangerous weapon in an assault or the serious injury inflicted by hands, fists, or feet separates this index offense from those assaults categorized as "simple" and not felonious in nature. There were 53,651 "simple" assaults reported in Texas in 1982.

BURGLARY

Burglary is defined as the unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or theft.

As with other nonviolent crimes, the motive of personal gain coupled with the element of opportunity, results in the commission of this offense by both the amateur and the professional perpetrator. Only the absence of confrontation and the use of force separate this crime from robbery of the violent crime group. However, detection during commission many times results in a confrontation of the victim by the perpetrator demonstrating why this offense is considered the most serious of the nonviolent crime group.

The volume of this offense presents the police with a serious enforcement problem made more difficult in many areas by the lack of sufficient personnel to act as a deterrent and to provide successful solutions to these crimes.

Volume

The estimated number of burglaries in Texas in 1982 totaled 285,757. The average value loss in each burglary incident was

LARCENY-THEFT

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles without the use of force, violence, or fraud. It includes crime such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc. In the Uniform Crime Reporting Program this crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft, of course, is excluded from this category for crime reporting purposes inasmuch as it is a separate Crime Index offense.

Larceny offenses cleared by police arrest are dramatically affected by the nature of the crime. As with other nonviolent crimes, opportunity and stealth, working in favor of the perpetrator and against police detection, reduce solutions for this offense.

As with other offenses against property, larceny is primarily a crime of opportunity. Types of larcenies will differ in volume depending upon the opportunity for theft offered in a given area.

Volume

Larceny/theft cases in Texas in 1982 accounted for an estimated 501,312 of the total crime index. When average value is applied to the reported crimes in this category, the dollar loss to victims was \$429. It is true that a portion of goods stolen was recovered and returned to the victims, but the relatively low percentage of crimes cleared by arrest and the lack of specific identification characteristics on such property indicate these recoveries will not materially reduce the overall loss. in addition, many offenses in this category, particularly where the value of goods stolen is small, never come to police attention.

4. A

The 66th Texas Legislature passed a concurrent resolution requesting that the Department of Public Safety compile and report data pertaining to sexual abuse crimes against children. The DPS Uniform Crime Reporting Bureau was assigned the responsibility of implementing procedures to collect such information. In order to expedite the effort it was decided that rather than ask all agencies to provide detailed data on child sexual abuse cases reported to law enforcement a cross section of agencies would be selected and invited to participate. SUMMARY OF 1982 CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE OFFENSES

The population represented by this survey was 5,759,920 or 37.7% of the state total.

The number of child sexual abuse cases reported by the agencles above during 1982 was 2701. Based on the percentage of population covered by the sample survey the estimated number of offenses reported to police would project to 7164.

In 44% of the above offenses, the victim did not know the identity of the offender. In the other 1501 cases 33% of the offenders were related to the victim.

Eighty-five percent of the child sexual abuse victims were female. 78.7% of the victims were white and within that racial group 85.4% were female. 34.2% of the white female victims were of Hispanic origin while 27.2% of the white male victims were Hispanic.

21.1% of the victims were black with 82.7% of them female.

Other races accounted for .2% of the victims.

Age of Victims

14.1% of the total number of victims were under the age of six years. Other percentages were:

Injuries:

There were two deaths reported among the 2701 victims in the 1982 survey. Physical injury was incurred by 9% of the victims. Eleven of the victims became pregnant and 20 of the victims contacted venereal disease.

Locations:

Thirty two percent of the offenses occurred at the victim's residence, 11% at the residence of the offenders, 9% within other types of structures, 23% on public streets, 16% in other outdoor locations, 3% in motor vehicles and the location was undetermined in 6% of the cases.

Offenders:

71.3% of the identified offenders were white with 40.8% of the white offenders being of Hispanic origin, 28.4% of the offenders were black and the remaining .3% were of other races.

The highest percentage (20.2%) of the known offenders were in the 16-20 age range with the 26-30 age groups ranking second at 15.4%.

THE REPORT OF THE REPORT OF

**ADULT -** In Texas an adult is defined as a person 17 years of age or over. In this publication we have followed this definition.

CLEARED BY ARREST OR EXCEPTIONAL MEANS . For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared by arrest or solved when at least one person is (1) arrested, (2) charged with the commission of an offense and (3) turned over to court for prosecution. In certain situations police are not able to follow these three steps. In many instances police have exhausted all leads and have done everything else possible to clear a case. If the following four conditions can be met, the offense can be cleared exceptionally: (1) the investigation has definitely established the identity of the offender, (2) there is enough information to support an arrest, charge, and turning over to the court for prosecution, (3) the exact location of the offender is known so that he could be taken into custody and (4) there is some reason outside the police control that prevents the arresting, charging, and prosecuting of the offender.

**CRIME FACTORS -** Conditions which affect the amount and type of crime that occurs in a geographical area.

**CRIME INDEX** - The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a given geographical area. Crime classifications used in the index are: (1) murder, (2) forcible rape, (3) robbery, (4) aggravated assault, (5) burglary, (6) larceny-theft and (7) motor vehicle theft. Each of these offenses is referred to as an "Index Offense."

**CRIME RATE** - The number of offenses per 100,000 inhabitants. This rate can be calculated regardless of the number of in-

habitants in your city or county. To compute rates, divide the population by 100,000 and divide the number of offenses in each class by that answer. The answer is the number of offenses in that class per 100,000 and is your crime rate for that offense. Example: (a) Population for your jurisdiction, 75,000. (b) Number of burglaries for your jurisdiction for a year, 215. Divide 75,000 by 100,000 - 0.75. Divide 215 by 0.75 - 286.7. Your burglary rate: 286.7 per 100,000 inhabitants. The number 0.75 can now be divided into your totals in any offense class to produce a crime rate for that offense.

**JUVENILE -** In Texas a juvenile is defined as a person 16 years of age or under. In this publication we have followed this definition.

**NON-VIOLENT CRIME** - Consists of the Index Offenses of Burglary, Larceny-Theft and Motor Vehicle Theft.

**PART I OFFENSES** - The first of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part I Offenses are by their nature more serious and/or occur most frequently. The monthly tabulation of Part I Offenses provides a count of "offenses known."

**PART II OFFENSES** - The second of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part II Offenses are generally less serious in nature and/or occur less frequently. Montihy tabulations of Part II Offenses are limited to arrest information only.

VIOLENT CRIME - Consists of the Index Offenses of Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault.



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
