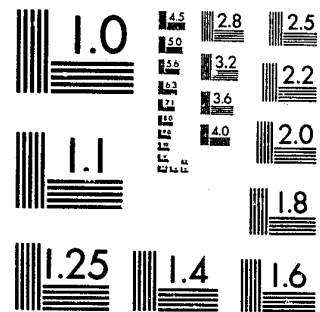


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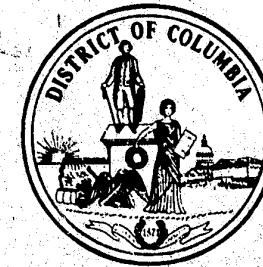

PREFACE

HOW TO USE THIS PUBLICATION

1. ALPHABETICAL INDEX

All abstracts are listed in alphabetical order showing page number and juvenile or adult services.

2. MASTER INDEX AND INDICES

Search the master index for the appropriate kind of service desired and the index pages listing the name of agencies and organizations providing the service. Turn to the page number or numbers given in the index for these service descriptions.

3. ABSTRACT OF SERVICE DESCRIPTIONS

The abstract of service descriptions is mainly self-explanatory. However, there are a few points which may help the reader understand the format:

- (a) The abstracts were completed only for those community resources whose services were related to or were willing to serve offenders.
- (b) The budgetary sources of funds were listed in the abstract in descending order, with the largest contributor first.
- (c) The "percentage of program effort to offenders" is, in many cases, an estimate and should be considered as such.
- (d) The "program description and services" category of the abstract is an attempt to state concisely the essence of each program. In addition, the services are ranked in order of program emphasis. In some responses, services were not ranked by the agencies completing the survey questionnaire. In these few cases the ranking is estimated.

The Bowie Involvement Program for Parents and Youth is a Youth Services Bureau committed to providing a variety of services for the young people of Bowie and their families. The Bureau sees the symptoms of vandalism, running-away, and drug misuse as the most prevalent youth problems in the community, and as the community's greatest problem, its failure to alter social patterns that affect youth unfavorably and the lack of youth related services. Problem solving methods to be utilized include providing alternatives to youth, for example, field trips, special interest workshops, prevention and personal counseling, outreach and crisis intervention which are available on a 24-hour emergency basis. In order to meet needs sufficiently, BIPPY will operate every afternoon and evening, and work with other groups and agencies to fulfill a youth advocacy role.

This would include changing negative attitudes of adults towards youth and youth towards adults, supporting pro-youth legislation, as well as, meeting individual youth and parent needs through one-to-one, family and group counseling, tutoring, in addition to providing support and transportation to a variety of referral sources. The staff of BIPPY consists of street counselors (formerly roving leaders), vocational and youth counselors, experienced family counselors, and experienced psychologists. Our staff will be called upon to meet both the crisis intervention and long term needs of residents.
