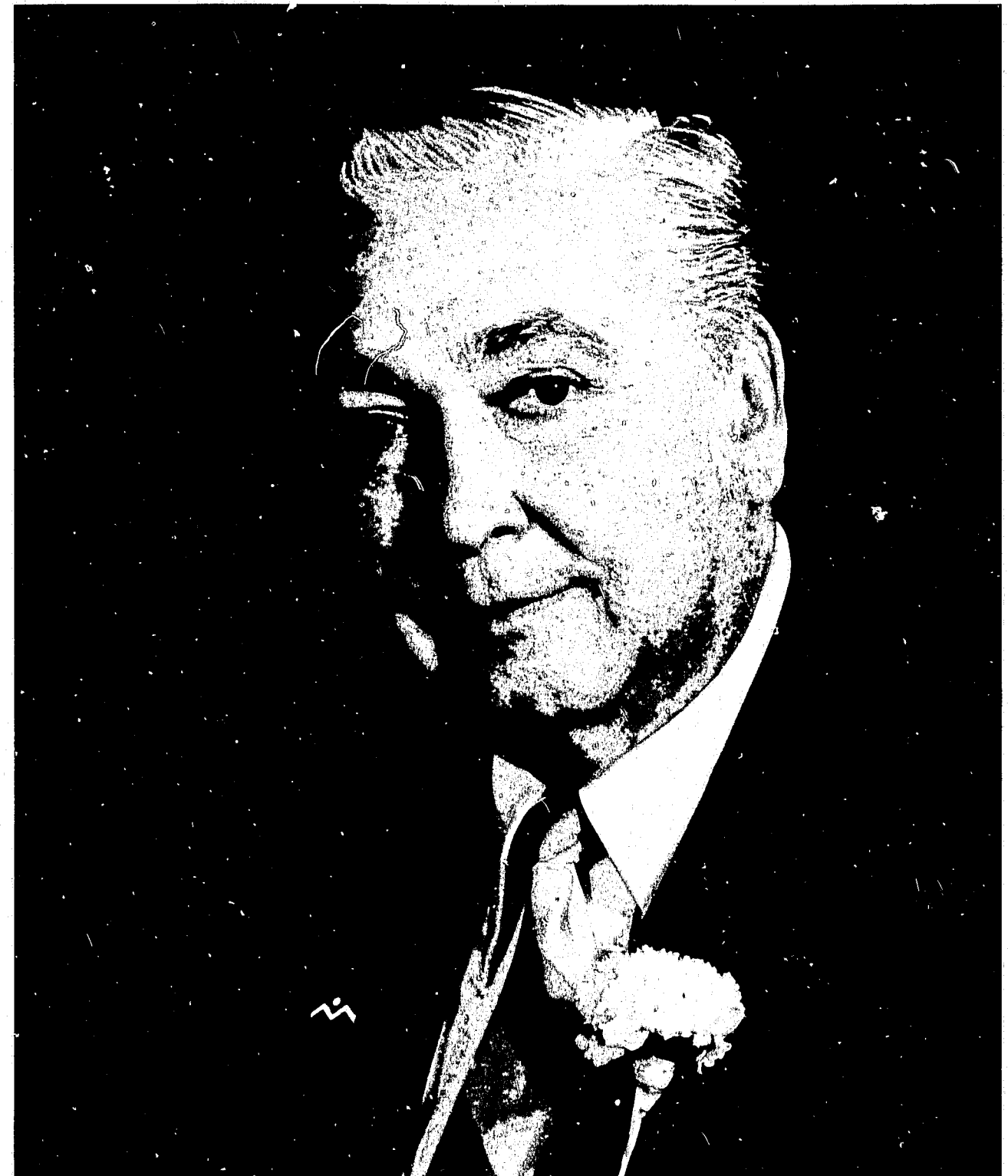
The year 1982 brought many challenges to the Police Department, all of which were met with the highest degree of professionalism and skill, for which we are extremely proud and grateful.

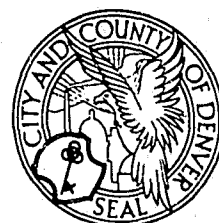

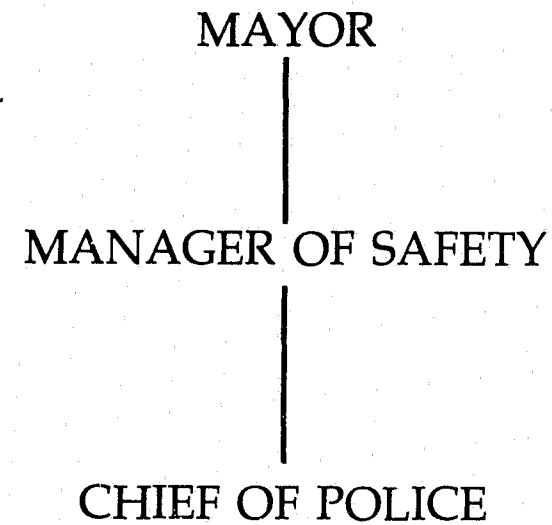

DIVISION ORGANIZATION

Delivery of primary police service consistent with legal mandates and community expectations falls upon the Patrol Division where 53% of all officers and 4% of all civilians are assigned.

Personnel within the Criminal Investigation Division, representing 15% of the classified service and 6% of the civilian staff, expand the inquiries begun by patrol officers to achieve their common goal of successful case closure.

Obtaining compliance with laws regulating the flow of vehicular and pedestrian traffic is a goal of the total police service. Specialists within the Traffic Division represent 10% of the Department's officers and 10% of the civilian personnel.

Primary responsibilities of the Juvenile Division are the investigation, protection and processing of youths under the age of eighteen years and the investigation of motor vehicle thefts. Assignments to this division represent 6% of the Department's officers and 12% of its civilian force.
