


INTRODUCTION






JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM FILTERING PROCESS TO COMMITMENT


New Commitments Demographic Trends FY 1981-82 Through FY 1983-84



The DYS policy for determining whether a youth is to be classified as an Admission or not is summarized below.

The initial intake screening of a juvenile should be done prior to placing a youth into the secure program. If it is determined that a youth can be released to parents or transferred to another program in a reasonable time, the youth should be pat searched and should remain in the intake area (holding cell or waiting room) until picked up. These youths should not be strip searched, showered or placed in routine contact with other youths admitted to the secure detention program.







¹Effective February 1, 1983, coding procedures for the Detention Record System (DRS) were implemented in order to track the number of youths screened out (intakes not admitted) from being admitted to a DYS Detention Center or detained at one of the nine Western Slope county jails listed above.

The DYS policy for determining whether a youth is to be classified as an admission or not is summarized below.

The initial intake screening of a juvenile should be done prior to placing a youth into the secure program. If it is determined that a youth can be released to parents or transferred to another program in a reasonable time, the youth should be pat searched and should remain in the intake area (holding cell or waiting room) until picked up. These youths should not be strip searched, showered or placed in routine contact with other youths admitted to the secure detention program.


