ECONOMIC ABUSE IN THE LIFE OF SURVIVORS



ECONOMIC ABUSE IS A UNIQUE FORM OF ABUSE SEPARATE FROM PSYCHOLOGICAL AND PHYSICAL ABUSE

Women who are forced to be financially dependent on their partners are at greater risk of being further abused and are less likely to leave the relationship.

FORMS OF ECONOMIC ABUSE

Economic Exploitation
(eg., Ruins her credit score)

Economic Control

(eg., Demands to know how much money was spent)

Employment Sabotage

(eg., Discourages or prevents her from working)

IN ONE STUDY AMONG IPV SURVIVORS, THEY FOUND

94% experienced physical abuse

95% experienced psychological abuse

94% experienced economic abuse in their relationship

92% experienced behaviors of economic control

88% experienced employment sabotage

79% experienced economic exploitation
