Highlights: National Southwest Border Counternarcotics Strategy July, 2011

The *National Southwest Border Counternarcotics Strategy* is a key component of our comprehensive national response to the threat along the Southwest border. The strategy complements the Administration's unprecedented increases in technology, personnel, and resources to the Southwest border; our cooperation with Mexico through the Merida Initiative; and our national effort to reduce the demand for illegal drugs at home. The strategy guides actions focused on the following goal and ten strategic objectives.

Strategic Goal

Substantially reduce the flow of illicit drugs, drug proceeds, and associated instruments of violence across the Southwest border

Strategic Objectives:

Enhance intelligence and information sharing capabilities and processes associated with the Southwest border

- Enhance coordination of intelligence collection, analysis, and dissemination to all those, at the border and across the country, working drug issues.
- Expand the scope, quality, and timeliness of actionable information and intelligence that is shared with state, local, and tribal partners.
- Improve the coordination of information that is shared with Mexican partners.

Interdict drugs, drug proceeds, and associated instruments of violence at the ports of entry along the Southwest border

- Employ enhanced technology, resources, and training to support interdiction.
- Work with interagency partners, Mexican counterparts, and the private sector to increase the use of advance information to screen vehicles and cargo.
- Improve infrastructure and use of license plate readers at POEs.

Interdict drugs, drug proceeds, and associated instruments of violence between the ports of entry along the Southwest border

- Increase operational capabilities at or near the border.
- Improve the use of biometric identification systems between POEs and enhance information sharing with Federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement.
- Increase operational coordination among Federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies.

Interdict drugs, drug proceeds, and associated instruments of violence in the air and maritime domains along the Southwest border

- Sustain air and maritime detection and monitoring, intercept, tracking, and apprehension operations along the Southwest border.
- Increase cooperation with Mexican counterparts through the exchange of liaison officers and increased information sharing.
- Modernize airborne sensors and other information collection mechanisms.

• Improve coordination with state, local, and tribal counterparts.

Disrupt and dismantle drug trafficking organizations operating along the Southwest border

- Broaden the presence and function of U.S. law enforcement liaisons in Mexico.
- Increase the focus of personnel and resources on the Southwest border.
- Increase the capacities of prosecutors and other criminal justice components.
- Increase judicial cooperation with Mexico.
- Target corruption on the U.S. side of the border.
- Counter corruption among foreign officials through visa denials and revocations.

Stem the flow of illicit proceeds across the Southwest border into Mexico

- Stem the southbound flow of bulk cash out of the United States and into Mexico.
- Target illicit use of money services businesses and electronic payment devices.
- Employ targeted financial sanctions to disrupt drug trafficking organizations.
- Enhance cooperation with the Mexican Government's financial intelligence unit.
- Improve statistical measures of effectiveness for countering money laundering.

Stem the flow of illegal weapons across the Southwest border into Mexico

- Improve intelligence and information sharing relating to illegal weapons with Federal, state, local, and tribal partners.
- Increase interdiction of illegal weapons shipments destined for Mexico.
- Enhance cooperation with international partners in weapons investigations.
- Strengthen domestic coordination on weapons investigations.
- Increase the likelihood of successful Federal prosecution of weapons cases.

Provide improved counterdrug technological capabilities and capacities for drug investigation and interdiction activities along the Southwest border

- Employ state-of-the-art technology to interdict drugs and other contraband.
- Improve sensor, data fusion, and data sharing capabilities.
- Enhance communications and intelligence technologies to facilitate greater information sharing with State and local law enforcement agencies.
- Develop capabilities to detect, identify, track, and interdict small vessels, including self-propelled semi- and fully submersibles.
- Develop the capability to detect clandestine and infrastructure tunnels used for illegal activities.

Develop strong and resilient communities that resist criminal activity and promote healthy lifestyles

- Develop strong, resilient communities that resist criminal organizations and develop a culture of lawfulness.
- Continue development and implementation of evidence-based treatment techniques and strategies.
- Continue to integrate substance abuse disorder services into mainstream medicine.
- Improve the quality of care available by ensuring providers are competent.

• Interrupt the cycle of drug use, violence, and crime.

Enhance U.S. - Mexico cooperation on joint counterdrug efforts

- Expand upon ongoing bilateral efforts to stem the flow of drugs, money and weapons across our shared border.
- Deepen local cooperation across our shared border.
- Enhance capacity building and training initiatives to strengthen Mexican agencies and institutions.
- Expand on existing bilateral mechanisms and create new ones.

Tunnel Strategy

- Pursue enhanced tunnel detection technology and capabilities.
- Improve interagency coordination on tunnel related activities and investigations.
- Utilize task forces for interagency tunnel operations.
