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### OJJDP FY 2017 Family Drug Court Statewide System Reform Implementation

WASHINGTON – The following Fiscal Year 2017 Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention grant awards were announced today:

Program Description: The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 Family Drug Court Statewide System Reform Implementation program aligns with the Attorney General’s priorities of reducing drug use, including opioid use, by building the effectiveness of family drug court practices at the individual and local levels and institutionalizing them in the larger state-level child welfare, substance abuse treatment, and court systems to improve child, parent, and family outcomes. The goal is for states to serve more families affected by parental substance use disorders who are involved in the child welfare system. This year’s grantees include:

## OJJDP FY 2017 Juvenile Drug Treatment Court Program

Program Description: The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 Juvenile Drug Treatment Court Program aligns with the Attorney General's priorities of reducing violent crime by taking a proactive approach that includes building the capacity of state and local courts and tribal governments to develop and establish juvenile drug courts for substance-abusing youth who might otherwise fall deeper into the criminal justice system if left unaddressed. The goals are to (1) implement system changes, service delivery, and programming practices that are in alignment with the JDTC guidelines and (2) implement research-informed approaches that are most likely to reduce future offending and improve outcomes.
